From the manager's chair

TODAY we welcome the players, supporters and officials of Watford Football Club who have enjoyed an excellent start to the season, and whose fortunes are in stark contrast to our own.

Our finishing position in the play-offs and Watford's finishing position in mid-table last season seems a distant memory now.

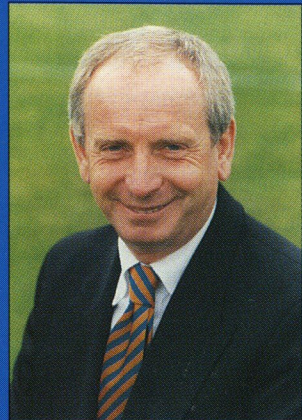
Under the management of Graham Taylor - one of the most able and experienced operators in the game - and with the aid of an infusion of new players, Watford have made an excellent start and our unbeaten record against them over the last 10 years will be subject to the most severe examination possible.

Our injury problems have been well documented and I do not propose to further elaborate on the situation.

Suffice to say I have never experienced anything like it before, and I sincerely hope that I do not do so again!

All we can do at the moment is our best, and above all we must endeavour to keep pride intact, which, in spite of early setbacks, we managed to do quite well at Bristol City last week.

This game means a tremendous amount to both sets of supporters, and the only demand that will be made of our players is to

be seen to be doing their absolute best and to wear the Luton shirt with pride whatever the circumstances.

Those circumstances at the moment are extremely difficult and demanding, and I hope that you the supporters can show the necessary patience, tolerance and passionate vocal support to help us in our cause this afternoon.

A crowd that is totally supportive of the team can help remove any apprehension or fear, and enable us to play our football and overturn the odds.

One definition of professional is to do your best whatever the circumstances, for as much of the time as possible.

If those on the pitch are

professional in that respect, and those in the crowd are as supportive as they can be - then who knows in football.....

We may have one or two players returning from our lengthy injury list this afternoon, but at the time of writing nothing is certain except the return of Gavin McGowan to the defence after suspension.

But hopefully, in the not too distant future, players will return.

The young players who have come in have been subject to more exposure, and in our current situation more pressure, than would have been reasonably expected, and on the whole they have acquitted themselves well.

The away performance at West Brom in the Coca-Cola Cup second round, second leg, was extremely creditable, especially as we also had to make do without the on-loan players Gavin McGowan and Bryan Small.

I felt that the 4-2 result in West Brom's favour was harsh rewards for our efforts.

As mentioned previously, at Bristol City last week pride was kept intact after a difficult start when we were somewhat unfortunate to concede a fourth minute penalty - and might have had one of our

own not long after.

It was a creditable second-half performance, with two good saves from the Bristol keeper denying Simon Davies and Tony Thorpe as we came close to pulling a goal back.

But now we must look forward, and turn our attentions to Watford.

If all the players can make a massive physical and mental effort in the team's cause, and all the supporters can put any frustrations and disappointments they might have aside for 90 minutes, then all things are possible.

Please get behind the team as we bid to turn our fortunes around.



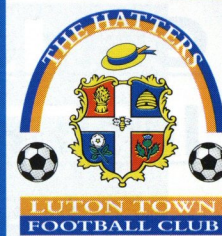

Gray earns Irish recall ...if he's fit!

PHIL Gray has earned a recall to the Northern Ireland squad just a week after his return to English football to rejoin Luton Town.

Gray, who missed Ireland's last game in Albania - which they surprisingly lost - replaces suspended Blackpool striker James Quinn for the World Cup qualifier against Portugal in Lisbon on October 11.

He will thus miss Luton's home game next Saturday against Plymouth, but the ankle injury he suffered against West Brom last week threatens his place in Bryan Hamilton's squad.

Phil has already been forced to sit out last week's defeat at Bristol City with ligament damage, and at the time of writing was a doubtful starter this afternoon - making him unlikely to travel to Lisbon.

But when the squad was originally picked, Bryan Hamilton, the Northern Ireland manager, said Phil Gray's return to English football was the reason he had recalled him.

"I thought he was losing his way a bit in continental football," said Hamilton. "He's a proven goalscorer and we definitely need one of two of those."

Hamilton's side cannot qualify for next summer's finals in France, and losing their last game in Albania was a particular blow.

"Even though we had top players missing, we should still have been good

enough to win that match," added Hamilton.

Gray could link up in attack with ex-Hatter Iain Dowie, a regular member of the Northern Ireland set-up.

Watford have no postponed their trip to Bristol Rovers next Saturday due to international call-ups, with skipper Robert Page once again in the Welsh squad. Wales play Belgium in Brussels on October 11, with Page joining a trio of ex-Hatters in the squad - John Hartson, Mark Pembridge and Ceri Hughes.

Watford keeper Chris Day is in the England U21 squad next weekend, and new striker David Thomas has been called up by the Welsh for U21 duty.

Giffon Noel-Williams is on England Youth duty, so Watford will travel to Bristol on Tuesday, October 14.

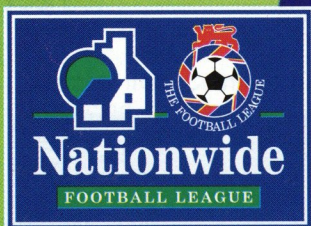

"Honest, decent people united in common cause"

The following letter has been received by Luton Town FC, and is reproduced in full:

Dear Sir,

During the course of the game between yourselves and Northampton on Tuesday, September 9, a collection was held on behalf of the National Meningitis Trust, a registered charity, in memory of my niece, Stacey Lewin, who died suddenly of meningitis in April this year. Stacey was 17 years of age. She was put on a life-support machine only four hours after entering hospital with mild symptoms, but, sadly, she never recovered consciousness.

The collection amounted to nearly £750. It was one of a number of events all raising money for the Trust, which has three main aims - funding research, increasing awareness and offering support. Until July 1996, the President of the Trust was Diana, Princess of Wales.

May I take this opportunity of expressing my sincere gratitude to your fans at the match - not only for their generous support for the collection but also for their respectful and good-humoured manner.

There is also one side issue which you may wish to be aware of. Although there is no way that your fans would know of this, one of the collectors at the 'away' end was Stacey's mother, Christine, who, as you might imagine, is still finding it extremely difficult to cope with the tragic circumstances of Stacey's death.

Because this fixture was re-arranged at short notice, a number of our original collectors were unable to attend. Christine agreed to stand in to assist one of my daughters - and I can tell you that she was greatly impressed by the attitude and generosity shown. Her experiences at this match have certainly assisted in the slow process of coming to terms with the future.

It once again shows that, contrary to certain sensationalist media reports, football fans - whatever their rivalry - are, for the most part, just ordinary, honest and decent people who can be united in a common cause. Well done, Luton fans - you have every reason to be proud of yourselves! Best wishes for the rest of the season.

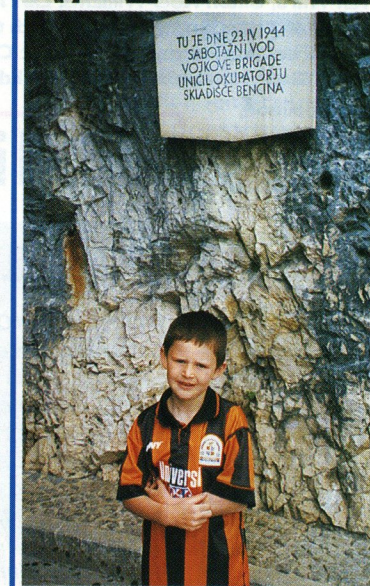

York arrived at Vicarage Road with one thing on their minds - halt the Hornets' promotion surge.

And after Alan Little's side came within 18 minutes of achieving their objective, Taylor is worried other Second Division teams will try to copy York's spoiling tactics.

He said: "That's the second time a team has set out to frustrate us. I would have hoped the players had learned from the first time.

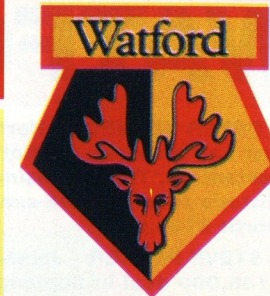
players can't keep looking at the manager to lift things."

ALEC CHAMBERLAIN - One of the Hornets' more recent recruits, Alec signed for Watford in July 1996 in a £40,000 move from Sunderland. The experienced goalkeeper has recorded well over 450 senior outings in a career which has so far taken in Ipswich, Colchester, Everton, Tranmere (loan), Luton, Sunderland and Liverpool (loan).

CHRIS DAY - Joined Crystal Palace from Tottenham in August 1996, and made 28 appearances for the Selhurst Park side. The current England Under-21 keeper, Chris arrived at Vicarage Road during the close season as part of the deal which took Kevin Miller to Palace.

DARREN BAZELEY - Originally fielded as a right winger, Darren made his first-team debut while still a youth trainee and is now in his sixth year as a professional. During the 95/96 campaign he made a successful switch to fullback, but was then used as an emergency striker and netted a hat-trick in a 4-0 win at Southend. Netted Watford's equaliser in last season's 1-1 draw at Vicarage Road.

NIGEL GIBBS - The longest-serving player in the Watford side, who made his debut for the Hornets against Sparta Prague in 1983, when he was just 18. Was granted a free transfer at the end of the 95/96 season after lengthy injury problems, but stayed on and was rewarded with a new contract last term.

DOMINIC LUDDEN - Joined the Hornets from Leyton Orient in August 1994, having represented England Schools at Under 18 level.

KEITH MILLEN - Signed from Brentford in March 1994, as part of a deal which took Barry Ashby in

the opposite direction. Spent 10 years with Brentford, helping them to the 1992 Division Three championship, and has recently returned to the Watford side after injury.

ROBERT PAGE - Watford's club captain and a regular in the Welsh international side at centre-half. Progressed through the youth set-up at Vicarage Road, and also represented his country at youth and Under-21 level.

CLINT EASTON - England youth international who won a first-team place last season in midfield in his first year as a professional.

RICHARD FLASH - Signed on a free transfer from Wolves in July 1996, having been signed by the Molineux club when Graham Taylor was in charge. Progressed through the youth set-up at Manchester United as a schoolboy and trainee player.

MICAH HYDE - Joined the Hornets from Cambridge in the summer for £100,000, with further payments dependent on appearances. Captain at the Abbey Stadium, despite being just 22 years old.

RICHARD JOHNSON - Australian-born midfielder whose coach in Australia paid for the youngster to come to England for a trial. Has a reputation for spectacular, long-range goals!

RONNY ROSENTHAL - Experienced Israeli international who joined Watford from Tottenham on a free transfer just after the start of the

season. First came to England in 1990, whilst playing for Belgian side Standard Leige, and had a loan spell at Luton playing a number of trial games in the reserves. Impressed with a good scoring record, but the two clubs couldn't agree a fee, so he moved on to Liverpool where seven goals in eight games secured a permanent transfer to Anfield. Scored 14 goals in 66 league games for the Reds after that, and moved to Tottenham.

PETER KENNEDY - Northern Ireland B international who played just half a season for Notts County last term, having signed from Portadown. The promising left-sided player became Graham Taylor's second close-season signing for the Hornets in a deal worth £130,000.

STEVE PALMER - Joined Watford from Ipswich Town in a £135,000 deal in September 1995. Obtained a degree at Cambridge University prior to joining the Suffolk club, and has played in midfield and defence for the Hornets.

STUART SLATER - Arrived at Vicarage Road on a free transfer from Leicester City, after a roller-coaster career which began with West Ham, where he signed schoolboy forms, and continued with Ipswich and Celtic, who paid a record £1.5 million for him. Has had to be content with a place on the substitute's bench of late, but could start this afternoon as Jason Lee is suspended.

STEVE TALBOYS - Joined Watford from Wimbledon in the summer of 1996 on a free transfer. The Bristol-born player was plucked from non-league Gloucester City by the Dons in January 1992.

WAYNE ANDREWS - Speedy striker who made 30 first-team appearances last season, after an excellent scoring record in two years of youth and reserve team football where he netted 46 times in 89 outings.

JASON LEE - Previously with Lincoln and Southend, the 6'3" target man was signed by Graham Taylor in the summer from Nottingham Forest for £200,000. Suspended this afternoon following his sending off at Gillingham two weeks ago.

NATHAN LOWNDES - Striker who joined the Hornets from Leeds in October 1995, scoring seven goals in his first eight reserve games.

TOMMY MOONEY - A trainee at Aston Villa, he signed professional forms at Villa Park when Graham Taylor was in charge. Moved on to Scarborough and Southend, before joining Watford initially on loan. A firm favourite for his work-rate and attitude he spent much of last season up front, but has now reverted to defence.

DAVID THOMAS - Scored 11 goals last season for Swansea, and moved to Watford for £100,000 in the summer. Welsh Under-21 international.

MARK ROONEY - Right-back or centre-half who signed professional terms with the club this summer.



COLIN PLUCK - Former youth team captain, now challenging Page and Millen at centre-half.

PAUL ROBINSON - Watford-born left-sided player.

DARREN WARD - Centre-back who made his league debut at Luton in 1995/96.

GIFTON NOEL-WILLIAMS - Striker who last season became the youngest ever player to score for Watford in a league match whilst still a youth-team player.

MEET THE MANAGER



GRAHAM TAYLOR returned to Vicarage Road in February 1996, following the departure of Glenn Roeder, but couldn't keep Watford in Division One as they were relegated along with Luton Town and Millwall.

Last season he took on the role of General Manager, leaving former Hornets defender Kenny Jackett in charge of playing matters.

But Watford failed to maintain a promotion challenge and in the summer Taylor resumed control of team affairs, having been instrumental in the boardroom restructuring which saw the return of Elton John as chairman, and the groundshare scheme with Saracens rugby union club.

With Kenny Jackett as first-team coach, and another Hornets favourite Luther Blissett also on the staff, Taylor has now done a fair amount of restructuring on the field.

With goalkeeper Kevin Miller having departed for Crystal Palace, striker Kevin Phillips moving to Sunderland, and Republic of Ireland starlet David Connolly packing his bags for a free transfer to Holland, Taylor has brought in several new faces.

Micah Hyde, Jason Lee, Ronny Rosenthal, Peter Kennedy and David Thomas are all new arrivals, but have settled quickly to take Watford to the top of Division Two.

Taylor's first spell at Watford started in 1977, after five years in charge at Lincoln, and he masterminded the Hornets' rise from fourth to first division, before taking Aston Villa back to the top flight.

From Villa Park, he succeeded Bobby Robson as manager of England, guiding his country to the 1992 European Championship finals, but missing out on the finals of the 1994 World Cup.

He was then appointed manager of Wolves, leaving Molineux in November 1995, before returning 'home' three months later.

WATFORD come to Kenilworth Road this afternoon for the 37th time in search of League points, almost eleven years since their last victory here. That win, over Christmas 1986, was only the sixth since our first clash in 1920/21 following the formation of Football League Division Three.

The Hornets went on to complete a rare double over us that 1986/87 season but we repaid the compliment during the next campaign winning 1-0 at Vicarage Road, courtesy of a Steve Foster header, and 2-1 here in a game which was preceded by the players proudly parading the Littlewoods Cup.

With Watford relegated at the end of that season four years were to pass before the clubs met again, this time in the newly formed Division One. Following the career ending injuries suffered by Darren Salton in a car accident the previous week the players were in a determined mood to "do it for Darren" when the teams met at Kenilworth Road in a televised game in December 1992. Two late goals from Ian Benjamin and Scott Oakes sealed an important victory in an entertaining game which is more than could be said for the return match, played the following April, when both teams fought out a dire 0-0 draw on a bumpy, windswept Vicarage Road pitch.

The fixture computer decreed that both teams should meet at Kenilworth Road on the opening day of 1993/94. Although it would seem to have been an ill tempered affair with both Barry Ashby and Jason Drysdale of Watford being sent off it was, in truth, a fairly tame clash with the Town coming out deserving 2-1 winners following goals from Paul Telfer and Kerry Dixon. This was our first opening day win for nine years.

The return was played just before Christmas and the Hornets seemed to have built up a winning lead with two goals from Bruce Dyer in the first half, but David Preece halved the deficit just after the interval with John Dreyer

netting a late penalty (our first of the season) for a deserved equaliser.

Our meeting with the Hornets at Vicarage Road in 1994/95 is still talked about by Hatters supporters present on the day with our 4-2 win the biggest since 1929/30. After Jamie Moralee had put the Hornets ahead we hit back with three quick goals from Oakes, Telfer and Dixon. Tommy Mooney briefly reduced the deficit only for Telfer to hit our fourth and complete the scoring on a brilliant afternoon.

Live TV was again the order of the day for the return and with Kelvin Davis making his home debut and John Taylor pulling on a Luton shirt for the first time we could have been expected to play it tight in the opening minutes. We started like whirlwinds, however, and Telfer gave us an early lead only for the Hornets to gradually claw their way back and equalise through Kevin Phillips on the hour. Kelvin Davis was the Luton hero on the day, saving a late Gary Porter penalty and deservedly winning his 'Man of the Match' award.

The following season saw both teams relegated to Division Two and both games finish in stalemate. In the clash at Vicarage Road, Steve Davis gave us an interval lead and with Watford missing another penalty, Ian Feuer saving from Craig Ramage, we seemed to be heading for victory. An uncharacteristic error from Trevor Peake just before the end, however, gifted the Hornets an equaliser gratefully accepted by Phillips.

Last seasons meeting at Vicarage Road, fought out in our new surroundings of Division Two, saw Paul Showler give us a deserved lead with a spectacular shot only for the Hornets to equalise (very) deep in 'stoppage' time. The home clash, again televised, finished in a boring 0-0 draw and we are obviously hoping for a more end-to-end contest this afternoon.

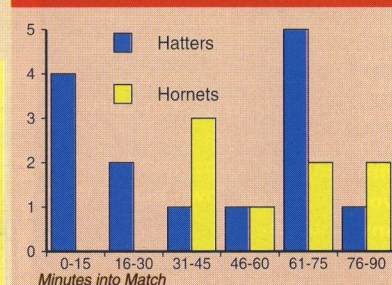

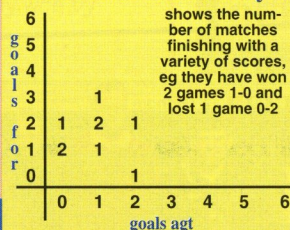

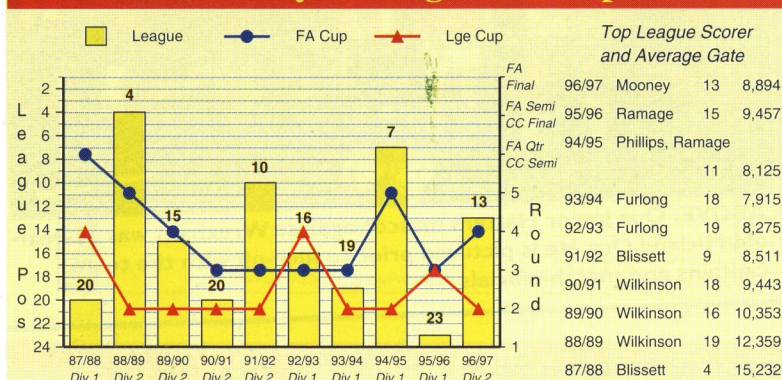

Former Town Player-of-the-Year returns with derby rivals

ALEC'S KEEPING UP APPEARANCES

THERE aren't many Hatters and Hornets - Kerry Dixon being a notable exception in recent seasons - but this afternoon Alec Chamberlain returns to Kenilworth Road, a ground where he enjoyed many fine performances in the late 80s and early 90s.

So was this the first fixture he looked for? "I suppose you always look for games against your old clubs, and at Watford, as they do at Luton, you always look out for the 'derby' game," said Alec.

"For me the two big games are Luton and Northampton, the latter because that's where we are living now, and when we play them in November it has taken on extra significance because of the start they too have made."

Infact he went to watch Luton's recent trip to the Sixfields Stadium, but was five minutes late and so missed the goal!

"Luton's injury problems have been well documented, and I keep in touch with the club although there aren't too many players left that I played with," Alec pointed out.

"I keep in touch with Richard Harvey, and Marvin and Julian James are still there, along with Trevor Peake, and I know David Oldfield from his first spell at the club.

"But they have some quality players. Phil Gray is obviously someone I know well having played with him at Luton and Sunderland, and he will be one we will have to watch."

Since leaving Luton, Alec has primarily been stationed in the north-east with Sunderland, but had a loan spell at Liverpool before returning south to Watford last summer.

Indeed his spell at Liverpool was rewarded with a League Cup winner's medal in 1995, as he was on the bench as the Reds saw off Bolton 2-1 with two goals from Steve McManaman. Ironically his former Luton team-mate John Dreyer was at Bolton on loan at the same time!

It was from Merseyside that Alec Chamberlain arrived at Luton Town, signed in 1988 from Everton where he was understudy to the man he rates as 'number one' Neville Southall.

Alec forced his way into Ray Harford's Luton side at the end of the 1988/89 season, following the Littlewoods Cup Final defeat by Nottingham Forest, as the Hatters stayed up on the final day of the

season with victory over Norwich.

He was first-choice at the start of the 1989/90 campaign, which started under Ray Harford but ended under Jim Ryan, and once again with a last day decider - that never to be forgotten 3-2 win at Derby.

Alec was an ever-present that and the next season, and following Ryan's departure he started the 1991/92 season under David Pleat.

But Alec lost his place during Pleat's first season back at the helm, as first Steve Sutton arrived on a three-month loan, and then Mervyn Day was drafted in.

Pleat recalled him for the latter stages of the season, but the Hatters went down on the last day at Notts County. It was one Houdini act too many.

The Australian Andy Petterson, now first choice at Charlton, was Pleat's choice between the sticks for the first season in the 'new' Division One, but after the Hatters squandered a 3-0 lead with 15 minutes to go to draw 3-3 at Cambridge, Alec was back and remained in goal for the rest of the season.

Bye, bye to Boro - hello to the Hatters

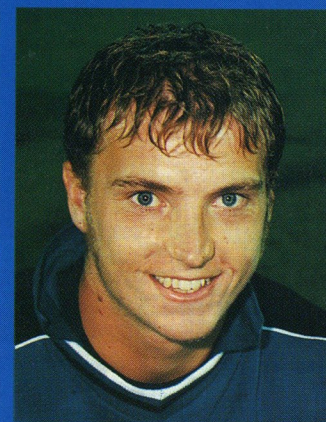
TWENTY-one-year-old Alan White is the latest recruit to the Luton Town defence after a £40,000 move from Middlesbrough.

The Darlington-born centre-half had found first-team opportunities limited at the Riverside Stadium, and after impressing in two trial matches for the Hatters' reserves, Lennie Lawrence signed him for the second time in his career to date.

Alan was on Derby County's books as a schoolboy, but Lennie Lawrence signed him for Boro as a 17-year-old during the Town manager's stint in charge on Teeside.

But a handful of games on the substitutes' bench is the nearest he has got to a senior appearance under Bryan Robson.

"The size of the squad there has made it difficult to get a chance in the first-team," explained Alan, "and although I had signed a new contract it was likely to be a long wait. When the chance to come to Luton came along, I was happy to accept."



With the injuries to Darren Patterson, Julian James, Marvin Johnson, Mitchell Thomas and now Steve Davis, Alan got his chance straightaway with the Hatters.

He made his debut at West Brom, with a first league appearance following at Bristol City.

"It's worth a gamble at that price, and in our current situation the decision is made a lot easier," said Lennie Lawrence.

"Alan's opportunities have been limited at Middlesbrough, but he showed his ability in those two reserve games for us."

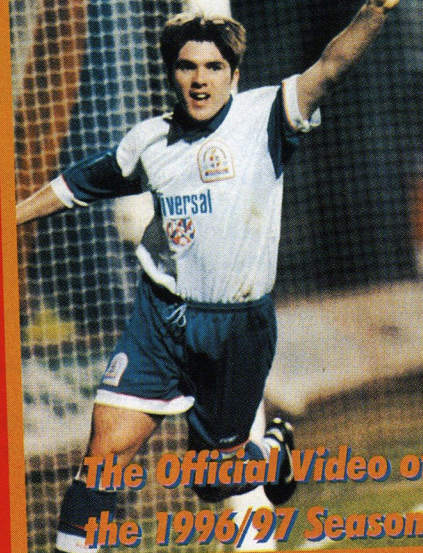

But in the summer came the move to Sunderland, as he and Phil Gray both headed to Roker Park for 1993/94.

In 1994/95 Tony Norman started the season in goal for Sunderland, but Alec was back by the time the Wearsiders came to Kenilworth Road just after Christmas, losing 3-0 on a waterlogged pitch, to a Luton side for whom John Hartson was catching the eye.

It was a happier return for Alec the following season with Phil Gray among the scorers in Sunderland's 2-0 win, but by the time of the return at Roker Park - when Dwight Marshall broke his leg - the on-loan Shay Given was Peter Reid's choice in goal.

Alec signed for Watford last summer for £40,000, making rare appearances last season as understudy to Kevin Miller.

He readily admits that was an education in itself, and is full of praise for his former team-mate who is now earning rave reviews in the Premiership. But with Miller having moved on to Crystal Palace, Alec's experience has won him the nod from Graham Taylor - ahead of England Under-21 keeper Chris Day.

Taylor's faith has been rewarded with some fine

performances as Watford sit on top of the table, reproducing last season's sound defence, but with goals going in at the other end this time around.

"We have started well, but we were disappointed to only draw at home against York last week, especially after getting a point from a difficult trip to Gillingham the week before," said Alec.

"What we have to do now is continue the form we have shown, and maintain it over the next 10 games."

Having played in the top two divisions what does he make of Division Two?

"I got a good look last year from just watching most of the games, and I think on the whole you have to battle your way out.

"Crewe played their way out in some respects, but they still had some power in that side, and the majority of sides who do well will be well organised and strong on set-pieces.

"But you need quality where it matters, and we feel we have that at Watford with Jason Lee and Ronny Rosenthal up front.

"The potential was there last year, but for one reason or another it just didn't quite gel, and we were unlucky with injury with Kevin Phillips and David Connolly ruled out for much of the time. We drew too many games, but we look like scoring more this time around."

It's ironic that he should finally team up with Rosenthal. It might have happened in a Luton shirt, because the Israeli was on trial at Kenilworth Road before signing for Liverpool.

But Graham Taylor looks to have made a shrewd investment in bringing Rosenthal from Spurs on a free - albeit on a Premiership wage.

Having worked with the likes of Pleat, Reid and Harvey, Alec has been impressed by his current manager's influence on the club.

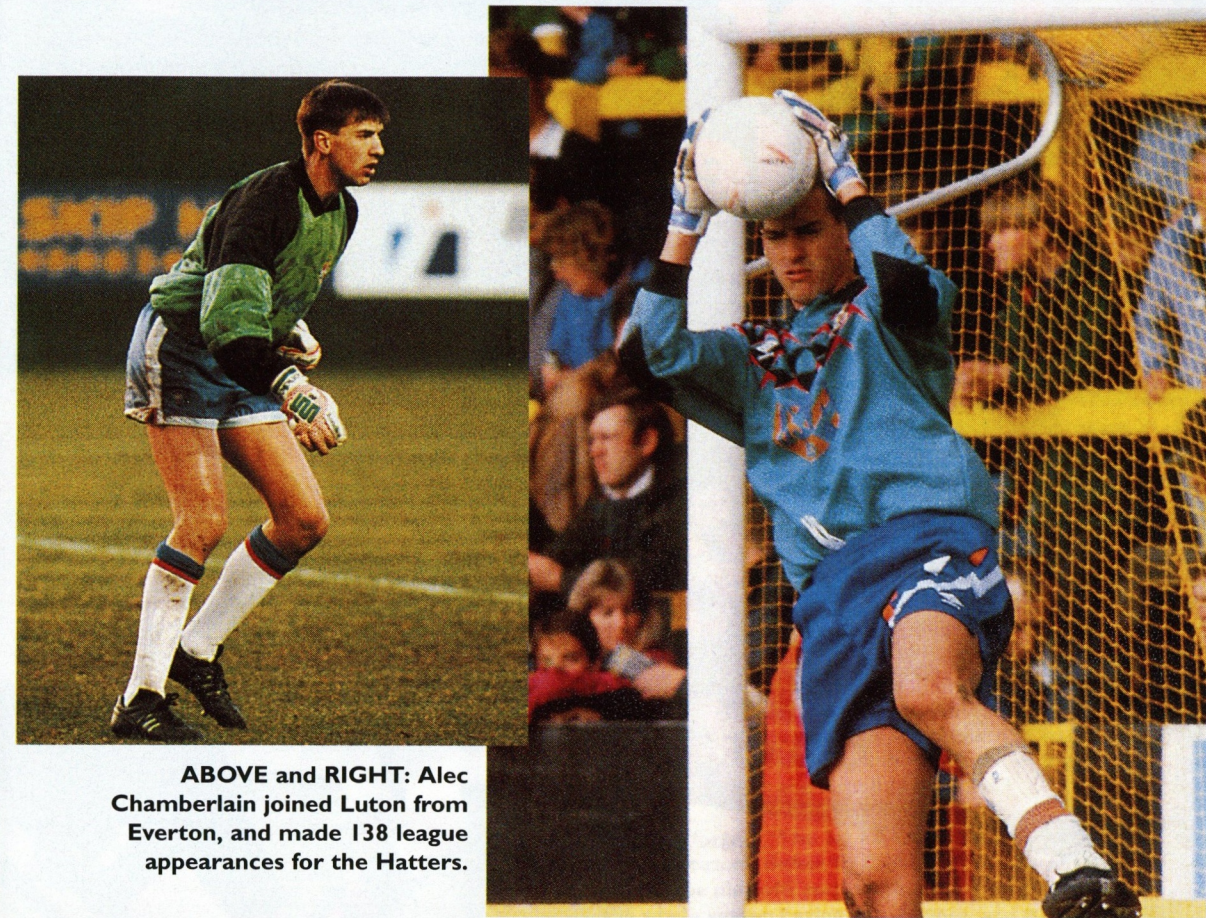
"He has a proven track record, and is determined to have success again, and the first aim is to get out of Division Two.

"The supporters worship him, and he has a great relationship with them, and with Elton John involved again there is a great spirit at the club."

It sounds like the time could be ripe to end Luton's recent good run in the derby matches, a run Alec played a part in, albeit just two appearances - a 2-0 home win in a televised game, and a 0-0 draw at Vicarage Road in season 1992/93.

Luton supporters will I'm sure acknowledge the part he played in some memorable seasons here, when the club defied all the odds to stay in the top flight.

His standing ovation on his return here with Sunderland was a gesture which touched Alec Chamberlain. Whatever the badge on the shirt, it would be fitting to a true professional to witness it again.

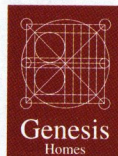

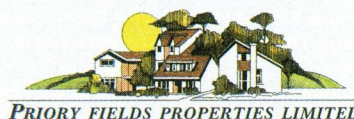

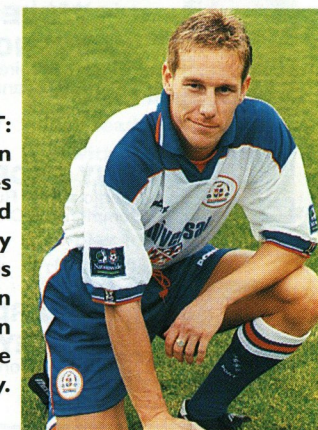
Both have seen the surgeon once again to monitor their progress, and have started jogging.

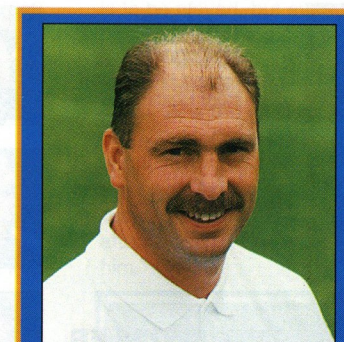

Managers want refs to be wired for time

THE League Managers' Association (LMA) are calling time on referees and are to ask for them to be 'wired' to stadium clocks to diffuse potential disputes over the length of matches.

The LMA want the watch of the official to be linked to electronic clocks around grounds so that players, officials and fans all know exactly how long is remaining.

The time problem reared its head again last month when Arsenal players surrounded referee Graham Barber after he had played six minutes overtime in the 3-3 draw with Leicester at Filbert Street.

Several managers have contacted the LMA to see what can be done to eliminate such situations, and it was due to be discussed at a technical liaison panel consisting of representatives of the Football Association, the Premier League, the Football League and the LMA this week.

But the LMA want the referee to remain as the timekeeper and also can see flaws in the Italian system whereby an electronic board is held up at the end of the 90 minutes indicating how much additional time is to be played.

LMA chief executive John Barnwell said: "The Leicester-Arsenal game highlighted the situation and several managers have made enquiries to me as to what moves could be made to eliminate the problem. Many are concerned about what can be done.

"The LMA believe that the referee's watch should be linked to the electronic clocks that are in many grounds now so that everybody knows exactly just how much time is left.

"If the referee stops his watch, for example, two minutes for an injury or 30 seconds for a substitution, then the stadium clock does likewise, and so when it finally reaches the 45-minute mark that would be the end of the game.

"Referees have been instructed to make it as clear as possible how things stand regarding just how much extra time is being played, but hopefully the introduction of the technology would help greatly."

Supporters from both sides this afternoon will doubtless recall last season's match at Vicarage Road when Watford scored an equaliser deep into stoppage time to draw 1-1, with the referee Trevor West coming

under fire for the amount of added time played.

"We definitely think the referee should remain as the time-keeper," said John Barnwell. "He will have the feel for the game and if he gets the feeling that someone is wasting time then he can, for example, put his watch back 15 seconds - and with it the electronic clock goes back 15 seconds.

"That sort of thing would be difficult for someone controlling the time in the stand to implement because it is not a hard and fast situation like with an injury or substitution.

"The Italians put a board up at the end of 90 minutes telling how much additional time is to be played, but even that system can have flaws. What happens if someone is injured or a substitution is made after the board has been held up in the extra time?

"We think the official being linked to the clock is the best way forward. Technology is already working well with the linesman's electronic flag this season whereby he presses a button in the flag to attract the attention of a referee if he has his back to him."

Mel Daniel

IT is with regret that we inform supporters of the death of former Luton Town player Mel Daniel.

Mel, an inside forward for the Town in the late 1940s, died last month in Ashford in Kent, aged 81, after a long illness.

One of his most famous post-war appearances came in a memorable 1946 victory for the Hatters when they overturned a 3-0 first-half deficit to beat Division Two leaders Newcastle 4-3, with Mel netting the second Luton goal.

Mel's son Alan was later to play for the Town in the 1960s.

All at Luton Town FC extend their sincere condolences to the family at this time.

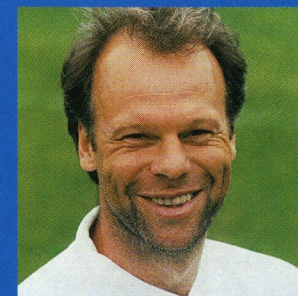

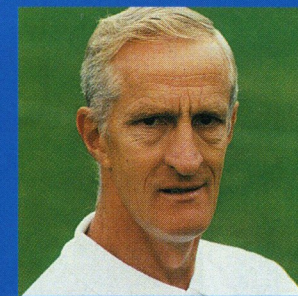

Keegan's Fulham find Wigan pier pressure hard to handle

KEVIN Keegan discovered the hard facts of life in Division Two as his newly-acquired **Fulham** charges went down to a last-minute goal at **Wigan**, writes *Simon Oxley*.

Keegan and his former England team-mate Ray Wilkins took charge at Craven Cottage last Thursday, and after the Premiership splendours of their respective previous employment, Saturday afternoon at Springfield Park just wasn't the same.

Fulham took the lead through Steve Hayward, before former Luton defender Gavin Johnson equalised, with Wigan skipper Colin Greenall netting the 89th minute winner.

Greenall has won promotion in the lower divisions with Chester, Blackpool and Wigan, and now aged 34 has experienced life in the basement.

"If Keegan brings Premiership players down to this level it will really open their eyes," he said. "They won't get pretty football in this division, it can be mayhem at times. People think it is easy to get out of the second and third divisions, but I can tell them it isn't. It takes time. You have to dig in, be organised and be able to fight."

Keegan and Wilkins of course have Mr Al Fayed's money to spend - like John Deehan's Wigan who are backed by millionaire sports shop owner Dave Whelan.

But Greenall warned Fulham not to expect overnight success.

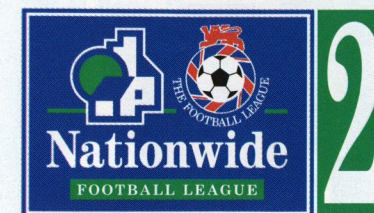
"John Deehan has completely turned the playing squad around here, but it has taken time," he pointed out.

"You can't bring a whole new team in and be successful straight away."

Watford manager Graham Taylor said his players have to learn to cope with sides coming to Vicarage Road aiming for just a point.

Taylor was speaking after the 1-1 draw with **York**, which kept the Hornets top on goal difference.

They were just 18 minutes from defeat, as York defended grimly after



Neil Tolson's first-half opener. But the arrival of substitutes Steve Palamer and Stuart Slater saw Watford step up a gear, and Jason Lee headed an equaliser.

Taylor said: "That's the second time a team has set out to frustrate us. I would have hoped the players had learned from the first time."

Two goals in the final 10 minutes gave **Blackpool** a flattering 3-0 win over **Southend**.

Mark Bonner opened the scoring, but after Blackpool keeper Steve Banks had denied Andy Thomson three times, the home side scored two late goals through Tony Ellis and Phil Clarkson.

Luton had two players making their league debuts, and three subs without a league appearance between them in the 3-0 defeat at **Bristol City**. Mickey Bell with a penalty, and Steve Torpey (2) netted City's goals in the first-half.

Northampton joined Watford at the top of Division Two with a 2-0 home win over **Millwall**.

Ian Sampson opened the scoring in the 53rd minute when Ray Warburton's shot hit him and went in, with victory confirmed by Roy Hunter's penalty.

Millwall, who had the better of the first-half, had Paul Sturges sent off.

Bristol Rovers recovered from a 3-0 deficit to draw 4-4 at **Oldham**, to leave Latics' boss Neil Warnock to reflect: "It should have been all over - we blew it!"

Stuart Barlow (2) and Sean McCarthy put the home side in control, before former Watford striker Peter Beadle (2) and Barry Hayles made it all-square at half-time. Shaun Garnett made it 4-3 to Oldham, but Rovers hit back again with

a Jamie Cureton penalty.

It was another miserable day for Chris Waddle's **Burnley**, as **Brentford's** Kevin Rapley netted a late winner for a 2-1 victory for the Bees.

Carl Hutchings had put Brentford in front, with Mark Ford equalising, but Burnley's cause wasn't helped by the dismissal of Lee Howey for a professional foul.

But Waddle maintained afterwards: "I knew only one way to play, and I'll carry that on into management."

"I'll not start playing direct and pumping the ball into the box, and I don't think our fans would want us to."

Wycombe skipper Paul McCarthy was sent off after just 30 minutes for handball on the line in the home game against **Preston**, but the visitors' missed the resulting penalty and the game ended 0-0. It was also goalless in the game between **Wrexham** and **Chesterfield**, whilst **Carlisle** made it three games unbeaten since Mervyn Day's departure with a 2-1 home win over **Gillingham**.

Plymouth scored their first win of the season with a 2-1 victory at home to **Walsall**, with Paul Groves on target for **Grimsby** in their 1-0 win at **Bournemouth**.

Elsewhere around the leagues, there were several ex-Hatters on the scoresheet. John Hartson netted for West Ham in their 2-1 win over Liverpool, whilst in Division One, Paul Dickov scored two in Manchester City's 6-0 win over Swindon.

Martin Williams scored for Reading in their 2-0 win at Portsmouth; Scott Houghton scored as Peterborough drew 1-1 at Macclesfield; and Sean Farrell scored Notts County's winner in the 2-1 victory at Scarborough.

And best wishes for a speedy recovery to Ben Chenery, who was taken to hospital with concussion after a clash of heads during Cambridge's game against Cardiff. Ben was treated on the pitch for eight minutes.

Calls cost 50p per minute at all times

BORN in Belfast in September 1957, Mal Donaghy made an early name for himself as a Gaelic footballer and while at school represented County Antrim in the sport.

After leaving school and becoming a clerical officer with the Post Office, association football began to take over and it was not long before he was playing for Larne in the Irish League. Picking up a 'Player of the Month' award in the Irish League just weeks after turning out for the first time he went on to win the award three months in succession.

Honours came thick and fast and he was voted 'Newcomer of the Year' by the Northern Ireland Professional Footballers Association, and was outstanding in his first international at under-21 level against Eire.

"I was picked to play for the Northern Ireland Under 21 team to play Eire in Dublin and was apparently watched by David Pleat," recalled Mal.

"He was obviously impressed and put in a bid of around £20,000 for me, but the Larne manager Brian Halliday wanted considerably more."

Pleat waited for Halliday, who was also secretary of the Northern Ireland Professional Footballers Association, to go on holiday and then stepped in with a further bid which was accepted by the Larne directors who thought that Donaghy had not re-signed for them and could have left for nothing.

"Halliday was not happy, to put it mildly," said Mal. "But I do see him now from time to time, and he does talk to me!"

The Town had therefore snapped up 'one of the best players to leave Northern Ireland' for a song and from under the noses of Celtic, who had previously invited him over for a week's trial, Wolves, Sheffield United and Q.P.R. "We think we have something special," reported David Pleat at the time.

Mal was very homesick at the start of his stay at Luton but was looked after by landlady Mrs Haughney in Shaftesbury Road who made him welcome, and with

whom he keeps in contact to this day.

Making his first team debut in a friendly at Oxford, playing at left half, Donaghy scored what was to be a rare goal in a 2-2 draw. This was followed by a home defeat at the hands of Coventry in another friendly before the first league game of the season, at home to Oldham.

"I think there were seven players making their league debut for Luton that day (Donaghy, Steve Sherlock, Kirk Stephens, Chris Turner, Mark Aizlewood, David Moss and Bob Hatton) which must be some sort of record.

"I thought we played reasonably well in the first half, considering the number of new players in the side, but we went in at the interval one down. "We certainly made up for it in the second half with David Moss and Bob Hatton each scoring twice in an eventual 6-1 win."

Although the Town struggled after a bright start during that 1978/79 campaign, things eventually got better and we were unlucky to miss out on promotion from the old Division Two in each of the next two seasons. It was therefore third time lucky when we won the championship, at a canter, in 1981/82.

"The team that won promotion was a dream to play in and although we were always liable to let in goals, such was the cavalier nature of our play, we were always likely to score more," said Mal.

"I must admit, as a defender, that a 1-0 win was always better than 5-4 but the crowd always seemed to prefer the latter."

By this time Mal was already a regular in the Northern Ireland team, having made his debut against Scotland in May 1980.

He eventually went on to win 91 caps, with 58 of them earned during his time at Kenilworth Road which is a record I should imagine will stand for all time.

From looking at the record books a good many of his international appearances were made at left back, a position he only appeared in during his early days at

Kenilworth Road. So which was his favourite position?

"I was always happy to play wherever I was picked, but if pushed I preferred to play in central defence playing off the big, ugly centre half (Clive Goodyear excluded, of course!).

"I also played in goal on three occasions during my time at Luton, moving back to replace Jake Findlay, which I didn't mind as my previous life as a Gaelic footballer taught me good hand and eye co-ordination."

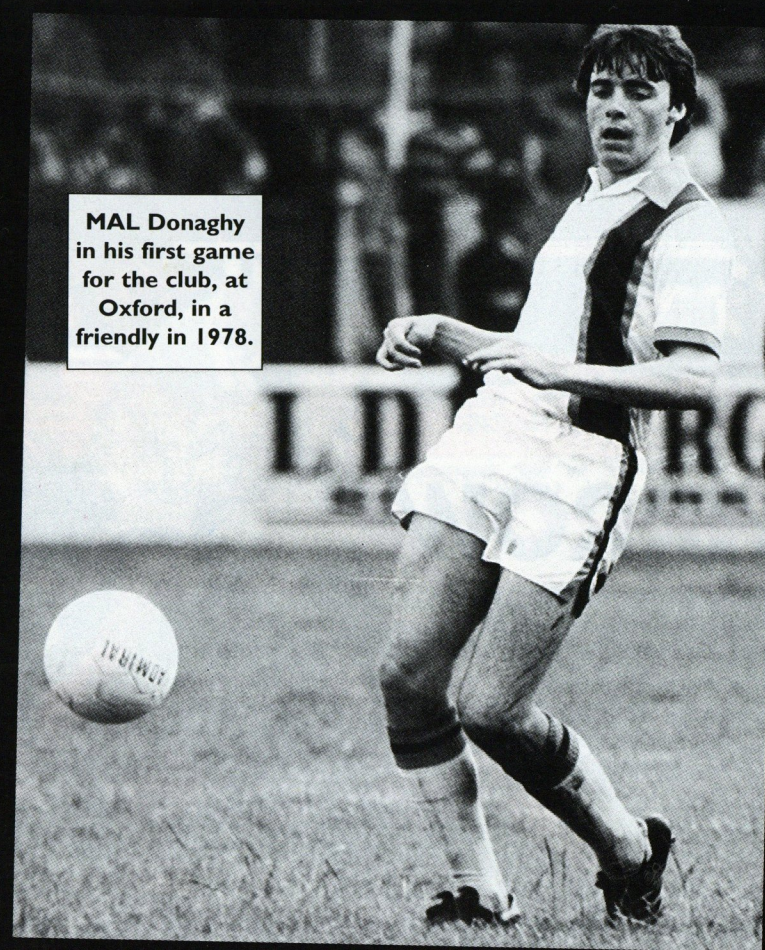
The games that Mal recalled playing in goal were at Cambridge, which we won, at Charlton which we lost and at Liverpool, which was drawn.

That match at Anfield, in 1982, will live long in the memory as three different goalkeepers conceded goals to Liverpool forwards in the same game.

Jake Findlay was injured in the first half to be replaced by Kirk Stephens with each letting in a goal to put us 2-1 down at half time. Mal replaced Stephens in the second half and performed heroically as we went 3-2 ahead. Unfortunately Liverpool equalised before the end and quite understandably Mal blamed his defence!

1982 was a good year for Mal Donaghy as his son, Ciaran, was born, the Town were promoted to the old Division One and he appeared for Northern Ireland in the World Cup finals.

He then went on to enjoy central defensive partnerships with Clive Goodyear, Paul Elliott, and an enduring one with Steve Foster which would see us to eventual glory in the Littlewoods Cup final in

1988.

During his time at Kenilworth Road Mal was remarkably injury free, no doubt down to playing alongside the big, ugly centre half, and in his first nine seasons here he was ever present in six of them, and missed only six games in total from the other three.

It therefore came as a big shock

when he was stretchered off, badly injured the week before the biggest game during his time at Kenilworth Road, the Littlewoods Cup Final against Arsenal.

League delegation meet European Commission

A SENIOR delegation from the Football League, including the Chairman, David Sheepshanks, and Secretary, David Dent, have visited the European Commission in Brussels to discuss their formal complaint against UEFA's ruling to disallow the Coca-Cola Cup as a means of qualification for the UEFA Cup.

Commenting after these discussions, David Sheepshanks said: "We have had an extensive and sympathetic meeting at which we were able to present our case arguments to the officers of Department DG1V and the Competition Commissioner's office.

"They will now further consider our complaint while taking into account the views of other interested parties including UEFA.

"As expected, there is no more to report at this stage. However, nothing we heard

in the meeting suggests that we have taken anything other than the correct course of action considering the importance of this case for the League."

The Football League have also circulated details of its case to nearly 100 British members of the European Parliament - an initiative which has already seen an excellent response from the country's representatives in Brussels.

Citing infringements of Articles 85 and 86 of the European Treaty of Rome, the Football League felt that UEFA's actions amount to 'an abuse of a dominant position', are discriminatory and penalise the Football League for the Premier League's refusal to reduce its numbers in accordance with UEFA's requirement - a matter over which the Football League have no control.

Shield draws live on Virgin Radio

THE Football League have announced that the draws for each round of this season's Auto Windscreens Shield will be broadcast live on Virgin Radio's award-winning 'Russ 'n' Jono Breakfast Experience'.

The draw for the first round of this season's competition, which will also determine the 16 clubs to go straight through to the second round of the Auto Windscreens Shield, will be made on Virgin Radio on Thursday, November 20.

Auto Windscreens have confirmed their fourth year of sponsorship of the competition for second and third division clubs.

The current format, in operation for the second successive season, incorporates a northern and southern section, with the first round now played on an instant knockout basis - rather than the round-robin format of previous years.

The first round sees 32 clubs competing, with the remaining 16 clubs receiving a bye into the second round.

The second round, area quarter-final, and area semi-final sections follow, with the area finals once again played over two legs on a home and away basis. The competition final is at Wembley on Sunday, April 19, 1998.

Busy Bees get stadium boost

THINGS are certainly buzzing for the Bees of Barnet FC, with the North London club announcing major news concerning their new stadium development, on the back of a new sponsorship deal.

London Borough Council have given the third division side the green light for the move from their Underhill home to a redeveloped arena at the present site of Barnet Copthall Stadium.

The project will cost the football club in the region of £14 million to construct, with club officials hoping that they could be in the new 10,000 all-seater stadium at some stage next season.

Barnet chairman Tony Kleanthous said: "This decision goes a long way towards securing the future of Barnet Football Club. I am both relieved and delighted with the news."

The news of a move followed the announcement of a new shirt sponsorship agreement with 'Loaded' magazine.

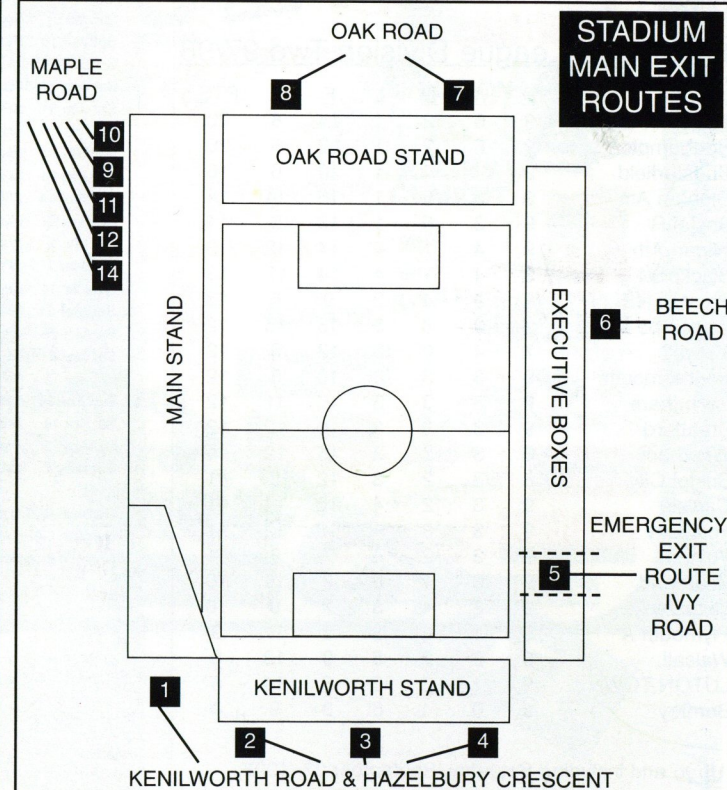
LTFC EVACUATION PROCEDURE
