From the manager's chair

LAST Saturday's result against Chesterfield saw us extend our unbeaten run away from home, in a game which we controlled for most of the time.

We restricted Chesterfield to two or three clear cut chances, and created three or four good ones of our own, and the only disappointment was our failure to score the goal.

I feel certain that had we managed to take even one of the chances we created, we would have won 1-0 against a team who were fourth in the league at the time of the game, although to be fair to Chesterfield their recent home performances have left something to be desired.

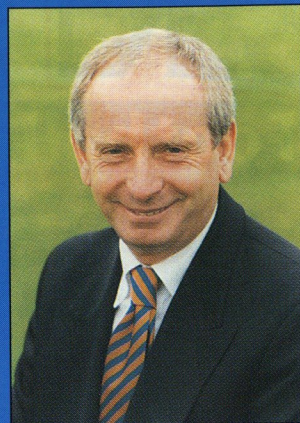
We were solid and professional, and did everything but win the game.

The last home match against Gillingham seems a long time ago now, and although we found ourselves in a customary situation of being a goal behind with half an hour to go, this time we managed to stage a spirited rally which earned a point - and I felt we were only narrowly denied a victory.

Again in fairness, Gillingham's results have not been inspired in the last few weeks, but more so at home rather than away in their case.

Today we turn our attentions to Bristol Rovers, and welcome their players, supporters and officials to Kenilworth Road.

When I saw Rovers beat Gillingham about three weeks

ago, they looked an excellent footballing outfit, with a good cutting edge, and thoroughly deserved their victory.

Since then they seem to have walked under several ladders, and have lost at Wigan in a now infamous game where they had four players sent off, and then lost 4-0 at home last Friday to an in-form Grimsby Town team.

Much has been made of the wisdom or otherwise of the sendings off in that game at Wigan, and the fact that they will subsequently be without those four players today.

Nevertheless, the four that will replace them will want to do their best for Bristol Rovers and themselves, to try and establish a place in the first team.

Whilst it certainly isn't any harder than it would normally have been, there is no reason to suppose that Bristol Rovers will not be as committed to

their cause as would normally be the case.

Obviously we are in dire need of three points, and this presents us with as reasonable an opportunity as we are going to get.

If we were able to then follow up with victory here next Friday against Northampton, then we would be well and truly on the road to recovery.

Much has been said about the performance of the players in recent weeks, and of the manager, but any team that can show the skill and commitment we have shown in recent away games should not have their desire called into question.

What we obviously need to do is transfer that to home games - starting today.

There will be one or two changes to the team this afternoon in order to give us a better attacking balance, and of course there is one changed forced upon us through injury.

Julian James suffered a medial knee ligament injury in the first five minutes at Chesterfield, and will not return to first-team action for at least six to eight weeks.

This is a blow to Julian and to the team, as he was finding his best form.

Darren Patterson will return in his place after various injuries, and it is up to him to make the position his own in Julian's absence.

Elsewhere on the injury front, Marvin Johnson and Phil Gray have returned from Lilleshall and should be able



to rejoin training at the end of next week.

Hopefully they can both play in a reserve match in the first week of January.

Paul Showler is also back in training, and hopefully by the second Saturday in January we should have a full squad to

select from - Julian James apart.

Finally, can I take this opportunity to wish all supporters and your families a very happy and peaceful Christmas and we look forward to seeing you on Boxing Day.

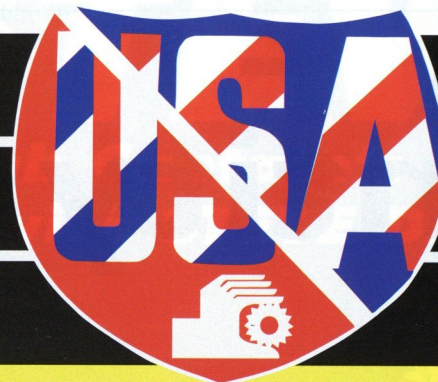

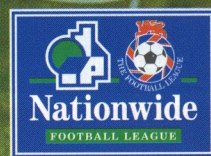

Hatters draw Brentford in Auto Winds'ns Rd 2

LUTON Town have been drawn at home to fellow Division Two side Brentford in the second round of the Auto Windscreens Shield.

Both sides received a bye to the second round stage, with matches to be played in the week commencing January 5, 1998.

Among the first round losers were Division Two leaders Watford, with a very much under-strength Hornets side going down 1-0 at Fulham.

Brentford have already visited Kenilworth Road this season in the league, losing 2-0 to goals from Graham Alexander and Tony Thorpe in October.

But since that visit, they have had a change of manager, with former Fulham

boss Micky Adams taking over at Griffin Park following the departure of Eddie May and Clive Walker.

Luton have never gone beyond round two of this competition, having gone out to Northampton at this stage in our first ever appearance in the competition last season.

The Hatters beat Leyton Orient 2-1 in the first round, before going down 1-0 to a last minute goal from Matthew Rush at the Sixfields Stadium.

Grounds for concern, as Rovers dream of new home

FOR over half a century now, Bristol Rovers have been a club without a ground of their own. They had played at five different venues before the purchase of Eastville and in 1932 the directors granted a 21-year lease to the Bristol Greyhound Racing Association to operate race meetings twice a week at the stadium.

In March 1940, with the club's financial position in a precarious state, Eastville was sold to the greyhound company for £12,000, a decision which, with the benefit of hindsight has cost the club dearly.

In 1980, the south stand at the ground was destroyed by fire and six years later, faced with mounting debts and an increase in the rental for Eastville, Rovers moved to

Bath to share Twerton Park with the Vauxhall Conference side. During 10 years in exile, the club worked desperately hard to find a new site for a ground back in Bristol, without success.

However, a move back to their home city was achieved in August 1996, when Rovers entered into another ground-sharing agreement, this time with Bristol Rugby Club at The Memorial Ground.

Although a 25-year lease has been signed with the rugby club, Rovers are still actively pursuing the dream of moving to a purpose-built stadium of their own.

Though that will not be realised until the 21st century, the club, for the present, are glad to be back home and are looking to increase their support.

SPOTLIGHT ON TODAY'S VISITORS

ANDY COLLETT - Middlesbrough-born goalkeeper who signed schoolboy forms for his hometown club, but found first-team opportunities limited in the north-east. Joined Rovers on loan in 1994 and made a permanent move on deadline day 1995. Missed only two games last season and was voted Player of the Year by the Rovers supporters.

SHANE HIGGS - Goalkeeper who signed professional for the club in 1995. Made his Rovers league debut in November 1996, and also enjoyed a spell on loan at York in the 95/96 season.

DAVID PRITCHARD - Defender who began his career with West Brom, making his league debut in September 1991. Was released a year later and joined Vauxhall Conference side Telford United, but was signed by Rovers for £20,000 in February 1994. Has returned to first team action after a lengthy absence with a serious knee injury, but is likely to be one of several players suspended today following a sending off at Wigan.

ANDY TILLSON - Centre-half who joined Rovers in November 1992 for a club record fee of £370,000 from QPR. He played for Kettering in the Conference before joining Grimsby in 1988, signing for QPR two years later for £500,000. First-team opportunities were limited at Loftus Road, and although he began his Rovers career in a 5-1 defeat at Wolves, a few weeks later he skippered the side for the first time in a 4-0 win over neighbours Bristol City. Another likely to be suspended following the game at Wigan when four

Rovers players received red cards.

TOM WHITE - Joined the club as a 14-year-old, playing in the youth team whilst still at school. Made his league debut in 1995, but suffered with injury before claiming a first-team place in the centre of defence in the second half of last season.

LEE MARTIN - Former Manchester United and Celtic defender, who scored the winner for United in the 1990 FA Cup Final replay against Crystal Palace. Has recently returned from a loan spell at Huddersfield.

GRAEME POWER - Former England schoolboy and youth international who joined the club from QPR. Still recovering from a dislocated shoulder suffered on the opening day of the season.

STEPHEN FOSTER - Formerly with Mansfield, Telford and Woking, he joined Rovers from the latter just days after playing in the FA Trophy Final in May 1997, when Woking beat Dagenham 1-0.

JASON PERRY - Full and Under-21 international for Wales, who signed for Rovers in the summer. Made 283 league appearances in ten years at Cardiff, but as one of the 'Wigan Four' will be suspended this afternoon.

JOSH LOW - Another product of the Rovers youth set-up, he has been with the club since the age of 12. Made a brief debut as a last minute sub on the final day of the 1995/96 season, but suffered a knee injury last season that sidelined him for three months. Welsh youth international, but is another ruled out by suspension today.

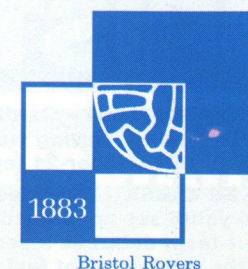
MATTHEW LOCKWOOD - One of three former QPR players recruited by Ian Holloway in the summer of 1996, he enjoyed a successful first season at Rovers in midfield. Played 39 times in the league last term, usually in central midfield, but also on the left and at left back.

TOM RAMASUT - Cardiff-born midfielder who joined Rovers from Norwich, having won international honours for Wales from Under-15 to Under-21 level. Joined Rovers in September 1996.

LEE ZABEK - The latest recruit to the professional ranks from the youth set-up. Signed professional in July, having made his first-team debut as a second-half substitute, against Rotherham, in the final game of last season.

JONATHAN FRENCH - Former youth team captain who signed professional in July 1995, and skippered the reserve side for much of last season. Also played for Conference side Bath City during a two-month loan spell last term, and has played as a central defender, in midfield and up front.

GARY PENRICE - Joined Rovers in 1983, and made his first-team debut in 1985. Joined Watford in November 1989, and moved to Aston Villa for £1 million in March 1991. Just seven months later he was on the move again, to QPR, where he played alongside Ian Holloway, and had a further stint at Watford before rejoining Rovers in the summer of 1997.

MATTHEW HAYFIELD - With Chelsea as a schoolboy, before being taken on as a trainee by Rovers in July 1992. Made his league debut in 1995, but suffered two knee injuries, returning to first-team duty in November last year.

JUSTIN SKINNER - Joined Rovers from Fulham for a then record fee of £130,000 in August 1991. Made his Rovers debut against Newcastle, and earned himself a unique place in the club's history by becoming the club's first player to score on his league debut as a substitute. Has recently returned from a loan spell at Walsall.

JAMIE CURETON - Formerly with Norwich, and initially joined Rovers on loan in September 1996. Four goals in six appearances led to a permanent £250,000 transfer, and was voted Young Player of the Year by the Rovers supporters.

STEVE PARMENTER - Also signed from QPR by Ian Holloway in the summer of 1996, he had played for Cambridge and Ipswich as a schoolboy, before serving his apprenticeship at Southend. First-team opportunities were limited at Loftus Road despite eight goals in 16 reserve appearances, and he made his Rovers debut in a Coca-Cola Cup tie at Luton in August 1996. Established himself in the first-team in the latter stages of the 96/97 campaign.

PETER BEADLE - Joined Rovers from Watford for £50,000 in November 1995, having started his career at Gillingham. From Kent he made a dream move to Tottenham, but unable to break into the first-team at White Hart Lane he had loan spells at Bournemouth and Southend, before a permanent move to Vicarage Road.

FRANKIE BENNETT - Joined Southampton from Halesowen in 1993, and after a loan spell at Shrewsbury he joined Rovers in 1996. A knee operation kept him out of contention until March 1997.

JULIAN ALSOP - Joined Rovers from Halesowen Town in February 1996, making his league debut against Luton. Six foot, four inch tall centre-forward, who won a regular starting place at the end of last season.

BARRY HAYLES - Former Stevenage striker who joined Rovers in the summer in a deal worth over £200,000. Played for the England semi-professional XI whilst at Broadhall way, and scored 20 goals in the Conference last season despite a number of injuries. Speedy striker who has been a regular scorer so far this term.

MEET THE MANAGER



Now in his third spell with the club he joined as a youngster, IAN HOLLOWAY is, arguably, one of the most popular players ever to wear Rovers colours.

He made his debut in April 1981, with a substitute appearance against Wrexham, left to join Wimbledon for a £35,000 fee in July 1985, and nine months later moved on to Brentford who paid £25,000 to secure his signature.

He had a loan spell at Torquay before Gerry Francis brought him back to the club in August 1987, and it proved a shrewd move by Francis as he built a promotion-winning side around the influential midfielder.

The play-off final was reached in 1988/89 and one year later, Rovers clinched the third division championship and reached Wembley for the first time, losing to Tranmere in the Leyland Daf Cup.

When Francis left to take charge at QPR in 1991, one of his first signings for the London side was Holloway, who cost them a fee of £230,000. Ian went on to play 147 league games at the highest level, before being given the opportunity to rejoin Rovers as player/manager in May 1996, following the departure of John Ward.

Former Rovers player PHIL BATER is the club's first team coach. He first joined Rovers as an apprentice in 1973 and made his league debut a year later.

He moved to Wrexham in 1981, but rejoined Rovers two years later, and had made 310 league appearances in his two spells with the club before moving on to Brentford in June 1986. Initially returned, via local football, as a coach at the club's Centre of Excellence, and took on the first team role in March 1996.

Former Rovers goalkeeper PHIL KITE completes the backroom line-up. He is now the club physio, and combines that role with goalkeeping coach at the Centre of Excellence.

He is still registered as a player in case of emergencies.

The Hatters and The Pirates.....

TODAY we meet up with yet another club who have been regular opponents since the formation of Football League Division Three in 1920.

Rovers scored an early double over the Town, in our first season together, winning 2-1 at Kenilworth Road and 5-0 at Eastville before following it up with another pair of victories in the next campaign.

We finally broke our duck when Sid Reid scored the only goal of the game in the win at Kenilworth Road in 1922/23.

Things then started to go our way and we went eight seasons unbeaten at Eastville before going down 5-1 in 1930/31 and during the same period and, indeed, leading up to our eventual promotion in 1937, we remained unbeaten at Kenilworth Road recording eight victories along the way.

Among those twelve victories was the biggest in the club's history when Rovers were seen off 12-0 on Easter Monday 1936.

Much has been written about the game, with Joe Payne scoring ten goals in his first outing at centre forward for the club, the controversy over one of the goals and the sheer number of people professing to have seen the game when the recorded attendance was 'only' 14,296! Pity poor Rovers goalkeeper, John Ellis, who apparently played a blinder.

Paths did not cross from 1937 until Rovers promotion to the old Division Two in 1953, and in our first meeting for 16 years an Eastville crowd of 20,021 was treated to a goal feast with Jesse Pye, with two, and Bert Mitchell scoring in a 3-3 draw.

In the following campaign 30,623 were present at Eastville to see the Town go down 3-2 in a game that saw Terry Kelly make his debut. We gained our revenge later in the season when Charlie Watkins, making his farewell Town appearance before emigrating, scored both goals in a 2-0 win to virtually seal our promotion to the top flight.

Following our relegation from the old Division One five years later we met up again with the Pirates winning the game at Kenilworth Road 4-2 after being two goals down, but losing out 4-1 at Eastville where Seamus Dunne made his final appearance for the Town.

Rovers suffered relegation at the end of the next campaign with their 2-0 defeat at Kenilworth Road late on confirming the demotion.

We followed them at the end of 1962/63 and in the next season we completed the double, winning 4-2 at Kenilworth Road with John O'Rourke hitting a hat trick, and 2-1 at Eastville where O'Rourke scored both Town goals.

We were relegated to the old Division Four in 1965, met up with Rovers again three years later before leaving them behind only for them to catch up again in

1975 for a six season spell. This latest spell was highlighted by an amazing finale to a game at Kenilworth Road over Easter 1976 when, with the game petering out to a dull 1-1 draw a young Ricky Hill was introduced to the Town fans as a substitute making his debut.

With his first touch he set up Brian Chambers for a goal to put us into the lead, and with his second nonchalantly stroked the ball home to put the game beyond doubt. He then turned to walk back to the centre circle, almost in embarrassment, but was quickly submerged by his team mates. A star was born!

During the period leading up to Rovers' relegation in 1981 highlights included a virtually flawless performance in a 3-1 home win in 1979/80, and a hat-trick from Brian Stein in a 4-2 victory at Eastville during the following campaign.

We then had to wait until 1992/93 before meeting up again but the two games during that campaign were instantly forgettable with a dull 1-1 home draw following a lacklustre 2-0 defeat on our only league trip to Twerton Park.

Last season saw a late Tony Thorpe penalty secure all three points in a 2-1 home win, while at the Memorial Ground we went down 3-2 with Gary Waddock scoring a rare goal against one of his former clubs, after another Thorpe penalty had given us a 1-0 lead.

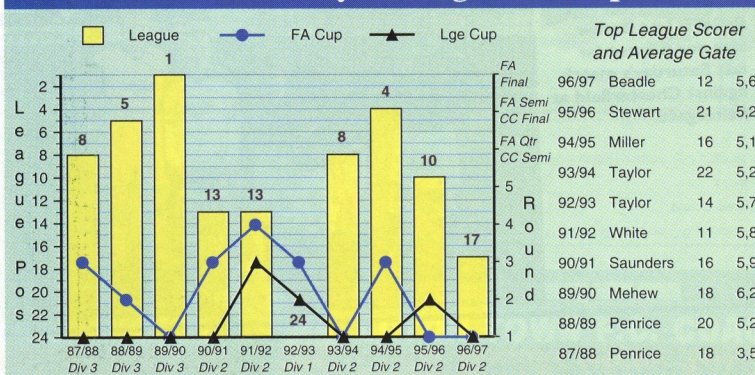

Ian signed for the Hatters from West Ham in December 1995, for a fee which could rise to £580,000 depending on appearances. The 6ft 7ins American arrived at Luton in September, and spent three months on loan. Was Luton's Player of the Year for the 95/96 season.

At West Ham he was understudy to Ludek Miklosko, but never played a first team game, and due to restrictions on overseas players was kept off the bench by Les Sealey. Spotted by West Ham playing in Belgium, although he actually signed from Los Angeles Salsa.

Regular for the Hatters in 96/97, but suffered a serious shoulder injury in August 1997.

Most memorable game: "For Luton last season's game at Gillingham stands out, when I saved a penalty in the last minute and we won 2-1. I would also have to mention playing for the USA in the 1992 Olympics against Italy at the Nou Camp Stadium in Barcelona, and playing for Los Angeles Salsa in the semi-finals of the US Championships. We won in a penalty shoot-out after I saved four out of five!"

Game I'd prefer to forget: "The play-offs in England last season against Crewe, and also my FA Cup debut at Grimsby - enough said! Also the final of the above US Championships when we led 1-0 only to concede an injury-time equaliser, and then lose in extra-time."

Which present-day player do you admire most? "Alan Shearer is a star player who still seems to keep his feet on the ground, and keeping working hard. Away from football my favourite sportsman would be basketball's Michael Jordan."

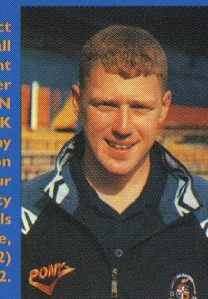

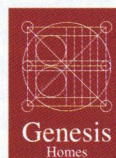

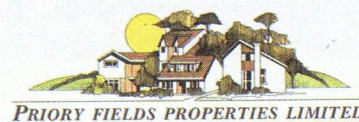

There's better news of DARREN PATTERSON who played a full game for the reserves this week following his ankle and calf injuries.

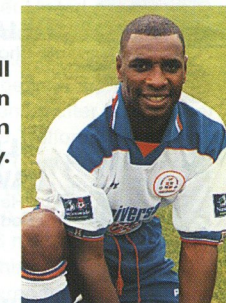

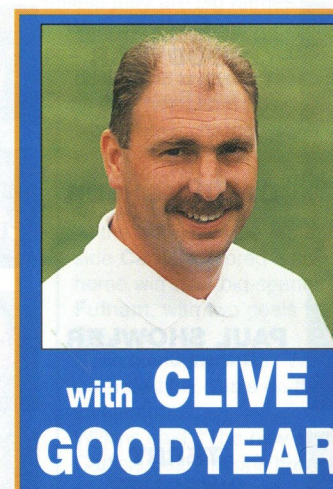
LEFT: Steve Augustine - recovering after a broken leg.

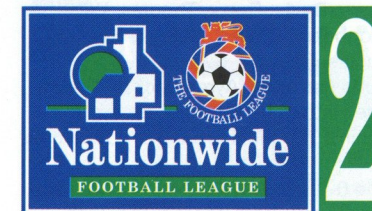
Honours even as top two battle out a 1-1 draw

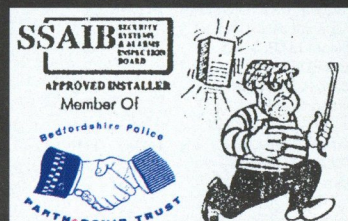

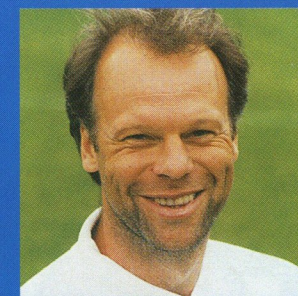

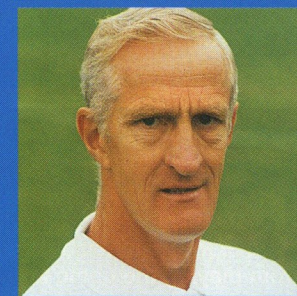

Where are they now?

DURING this series of interviews with former players we have seen, in the most part, the player concerned enjoying a reasonable living from playing the game and able to take part in normal activities following retirement.

We focus this week on a player who had to retire from the game at the age of 26 and, nearly forty years later, still suffers from the legacy of his injuries.

Les Spencer was born in Manchester in September 1936, and turned out in local amateur football in Wythenshawe, combining playing with a job in a newspaper office.

One of his duties was paying the newspaper reporters and after constant pestering from Les one of the sports reporters eventually recommended him to Harry Catterick, then manager at

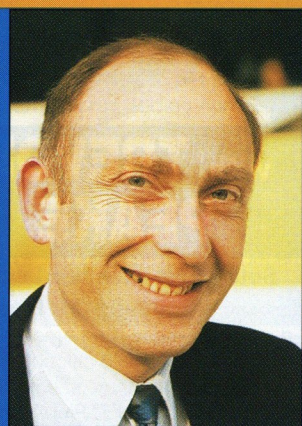
Rochdale, who invited him to a trial at Spotland.

"I played five times for the 'A' team, then had nine reserve outings before making my debut at home to Chester on 5th April 1958," he recalled.

"For the next two years I was virtually ever present playing firstly in the old Division Three (North), then in Division Three when clubs were split up in the summer of 1958 and then, following relegation, Division Four!"

Les was joint top scorer for Rochdale in 1958/59 with eight, and finished with nine in the following season playing in a side that included a mixture of elderly pro's on their way out and youngsters not quite ready for first team duty.

"The game at the lower levels was quite tough and intimidation was often used to unsettle the youngsters. I remember playing against Manchester United in a Lancs Senior Cup game on a waterlogged pitch and Stan Crowther, a seasoned old pro brought in by United as a stop gap following

the Munich disaster, asked me deadpan whether I could swim. I must say I kept away from him during the

game."

Les caught the eye of Town scout George Martin while playing for Rochdale at Watford towards the end of the 1959/60 season, and on returning from his honeymoon that summer found a letter on his doormat asking him to report to Kenilworth Road for transfer talks. Les signed immediately, with the transfer being negotiated by Town Secretary Phil Coley as we were managerless at the time, and £4000 changed hands between the clubs. Shortly after Les signed for the Town we appointed Sam Bartram as manager, replacing Syd Owen who had left following our relegation at the end of the previous campaign. From our conversation it became

apparent that Les did not really rate Bartram although he did feel that the Town side of the time, that was shortly to plummet down through the divisions, had the wrong balance of old and young players even before the new manager started.

"I made my debut for Luton in October 1960 in a home game against Bristol Rovers which we won 4-2 after being 2-0 down, and played a total of seven games leading up to Christmas including a 6-1 thrashing of Middlesbrough when we were four up at half time.

"In that match it was rumoured that Brian Clough had to be forced out for the second period as he was so disgusted by his team's performance.

"Before that particular game Sam Bartram came over to me in the changing room to give me a pep talk which consisted of telling me that I was up against Mick McNeill who was an international!"

After a promising start to his Kenilworth Road career Les then started to suffer from boils as well as

a pain in the groin. The normal treatment for this involved sessions under the heat lamp which in hindsight was the worst possible remedy as Les was suffering from an abscess in the hip joint which quickly turned to septicaemia.

Les then spent 18 months in a hip spiker, which meant plaster from neck to ankle and an abrupt end to his playing career.

"When my contract came to an end I decided to return to Manchester, but as I was still in plaster I had to be taken back up north lying down in a transit van as I could not sit up.

"The club organised a testimonial game for both

myself and David Brogan, whose career was ended by a badly broken leg, against an 'International Club X1' but on the night of the game it tipped down with rain thus cutting the attendance.

"I think that David and I shared £161 being the proceeds of the match."

Les returned to the newspaper office from where he started and an artificial hip joint, shortened leg and curvature of the spine later he still looks out for the Town's results and keeps in touch with a couple of his old Kenilworth Road team mates.

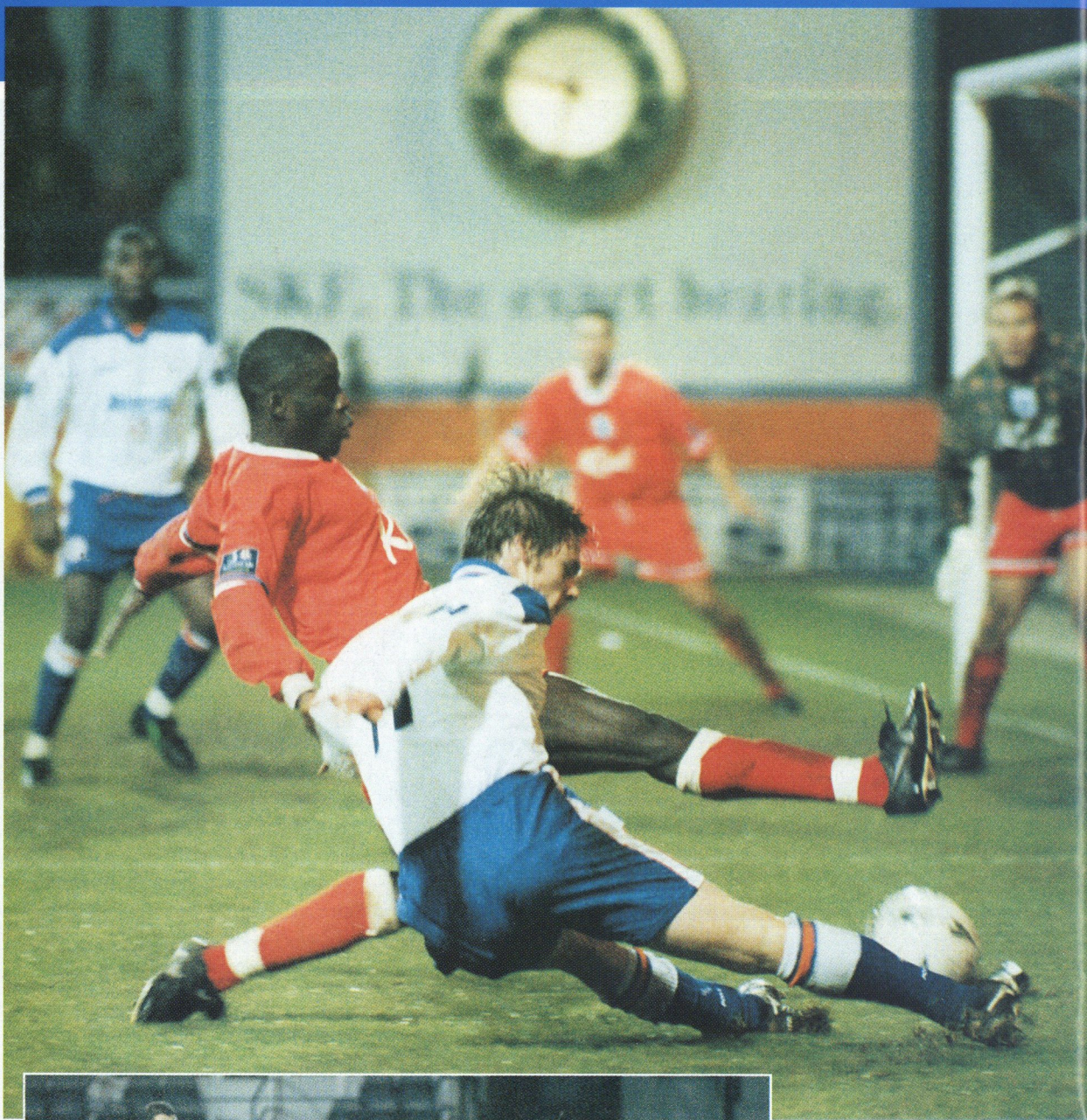

FOOTBALL League chairman David Sheepshanks has stressed the need for change to keep clubs financially secure and maintain the interest of fans.

Mr Sheepshanks was among the 72 Nationwide League chairmen meeting in London last week to consider changes in the structure of the competition.

You may remember that we detailed the thoughts of the Town chairman David Kohler in a previous matchday programme earlier this season, and Mr Kohler, a member of the league's working party, has been at the forefront of discussions into possible changes.

The most radical of four proposals was a plan for a 12-club Super league for Nationwide teams, and Mr Sheepshanks, also chairman of Division One club Ipswich, explained the need to discuss change.

"Fifty-seven out of 72 clubs were losing money last year, that's the strongest reason," he said.

"Clearly we have to tackle that problem and improve the product and the excitement.

"We need to become more commercially led and need to become more responsive to the interests of fans.

"One of our challenges is to popularise the live experience and, while there is increasing opportunities for armchair viewers, we need to present the Football League in a guise which will work well for all our clubs."

Mr Sheepshanks though stressed that nothing is going to be decided in the immediate future.

"We are allowing a lot of time for discussion among the clubs, and any

idea that receives a broad consensus of support will be taken forward for voting at an EGM."

Two separate working parties have been preparing proposals to present to the clubs before next year's 100th anniversary of the formation of the world's original league football competition.

The first deals with an overhaul of the existing rule book to simplify regulations, and the second concerns the shake-up of the current league structure of three divisions of 24 clubs.

The league's working party has come up with four alternatives:

1) Three divisions of 20, 26 and 26 clubs respectively with increased promotion and relegation between the divisions.

2) Four divisions of either 18 or 20 clubs with increased promotion and relegation. Eight clubs would be co-opted from the Vauxhall Conference to make up the numbers.

3) Six divisions of 12 clubs with increased promotion and relegation.

4) The creation of a Football League Super League of 12 clubs with two divisions of 24 and another division of 12.

Keeping the current structure of three divisions of 24 clubs is also on the table. Among other points raised was the option of a radical change to the awarding of points, with an incentive for teams to lead at half-time, with extra points to clubs who win by large margins. Penalty shoot-outs could determine drawn games.

The chairmen meet again next month, but no votes will be taken until February's EGM.

League's early warning procedure

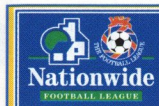
WITH the winter weather yet to cause any major disruption, the Football League have once again set out their early warning procedure for the inspection of pitches.

In an effort to prevent unnecessary inconvenience to the travelling clubs and their supporters, League clubs are instructed to liaise closely to ascertain the travelling arrangements of the visitors.

Home clubs are also asked to contact the

match referee for his travel details and any plans to stay overnight in order that he can be reached at short notice.

Clubs can also request referees to travel the day before the match if an early pitch inspection is necessary. In the event that the match referee is unable to travel early to the ground, the Football League would call in a local official to advise them on the condition of the playing surface.

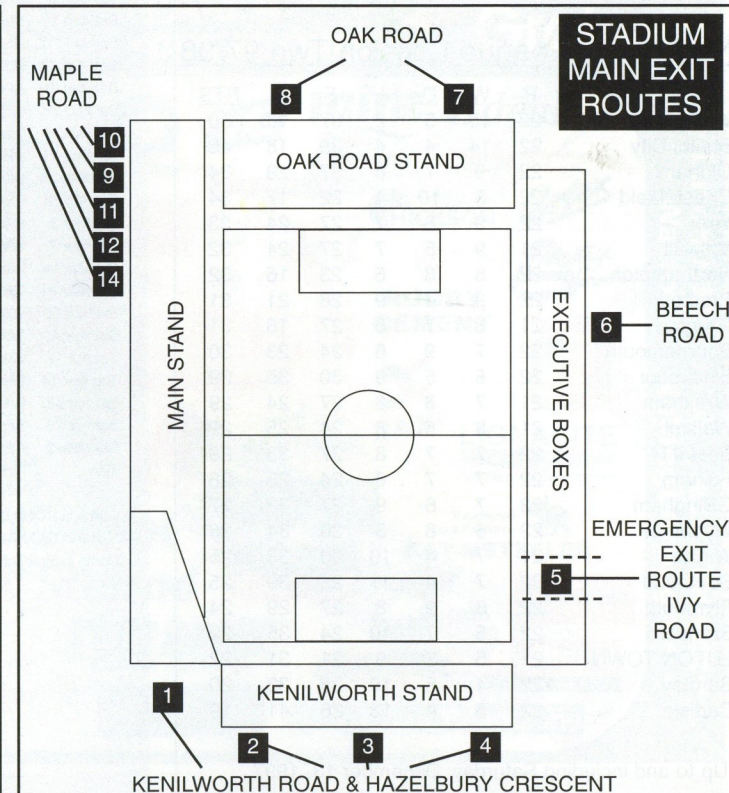
LTFC EVACUATION PROCEDURE

- Ensure the safe and controlled evacuation of the ground.
- Ensure the dispersal of the crowd from the area to allow the emergency services to carry out their tasks.

In the event on an evacuation of all or part of the stadium, you will receive instructions over the public address system on how you should leave the stadium. Stewards will direct you to the nearest exit. It may be that your normal exit route will not be available. On leaving the stadium, you will find some roads closed to pedestrian traffic, to enable swift and unobstructed arrival of the emergency services.

Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.

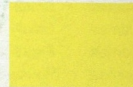
