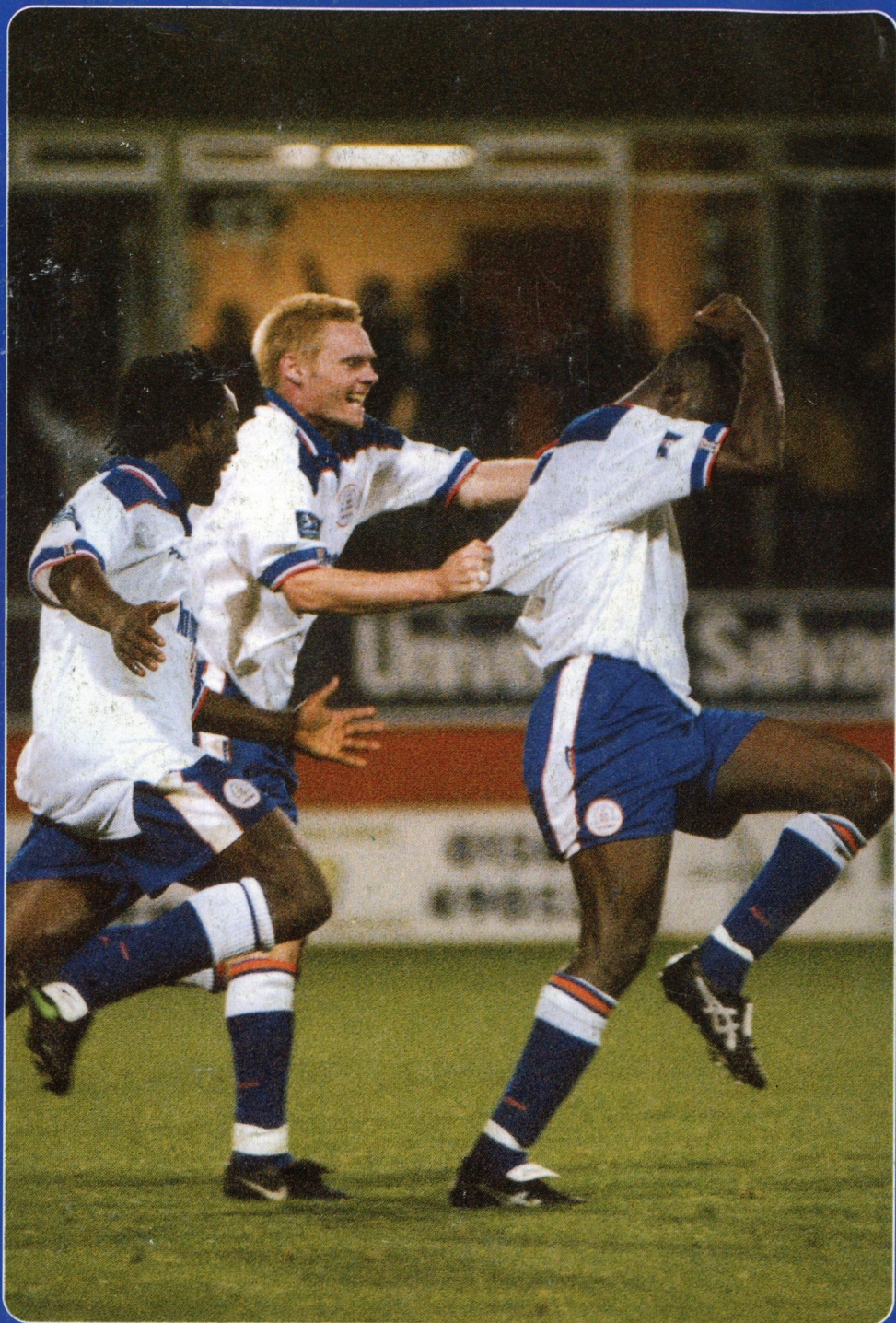

TOWN manager Lennie Lawrence was scratching his head, and chairman David Kohler was rubbing his hands this week at an item of transfer news that must have puzzled a lot of our supporters.

Amazement was the predominant reaction around Kenilworth Road to the news that Glasgow Celtic have paid £1.5million for striker Vidor Riseth.

Remember him? Three years ago, when the Town's autumn slump was gathering pace with frightening speed, we bought two Scandinavians, midfielder Johnny Vilstrup from Denmark, and Riseth, a 23-year-old striker from Kongsvinger in Norway.

Neither were great successes with us - Vilstrup had persistent fitness problems, and Riseth did not settle too well. He failed to get a goal and by spring he was on his way back to his Norwegian club on long-term loan.

In the summer he moved on to Linz of Austria, with the Town relieved to recoup the £100,000 they had paid.

Riseth turned up in the World Cup in France this summer, and to Luton eyes looked little better in France 98 than he had done in Luton 95.

So it was a bit of a surprise this week when Celtic paraded him as their new £1.5million capture. Perhaps they were trying to end the stories about Scots and their money being difficult to drag apart.

Terry Westley was the manager who bought Vilstrup and Riseth, Lennie Lawrence the one who sold them.

The boss recalled: "When he was here Riseth was a young boy and was not very happy at Luton - this was wrong and that was wrong, and so on. In the end we were glad to take almost any offer we could get. "I watched him in the World Cup this summer and didn't even recognise him. You would have to be psychic to see what was to happen three years on, after we let him go."

And why was chairman Kohler rubbing his hands? Money, natch. Lawrence made sure, as he always does, that the transfer agreement included a further payment to Luton Town if Riseth moved on, with the result that shortly some tens of thousands of Scottish pound notes will be heading our way. Nice one, Lennie!

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It took my mind back more than 20 years, when the late Harry Haslam was getting into foreign player deals. He was later to hit the jackpot with Ossie Ardilles and Ricky Villa from Argentina, but the first foreigner he brought to Luton, for a short-lived trial, came from an Eastern European country Harry could hardly pronounce, let alone spell.

The player knew no English, but was given a crash course on vital soccer jargon - things like man on, leave it, my ball, and so on.

John Ryan, I think it was, came up with a wheeze: he persuaded the guy that the English for referee was a very crude, four-letter word. The inevitable happened: during a friendly the player thought he had been fouled, and as the arbitro had not seen it, he shouted loudly at him several times. He thought he was yelling "ref, ref, ref..."

He wasn't - in football terms it was foul and abusive language and the poor ref wondered what on earth he had done to be the subject of so much four-letter crudity. Luckily it was a private practice match, and the ref, who was a good friend to the Town, joined in the laughter when the explanation was offered. I don't think we ever saw the trialist again.

IPSWICH manager George Burley wishes Luton Town all the best in the Worthington Cup.

He was less than happy with his own team, especially for conceding two goals from corners in Tuesday's 4-2 thriller at Kenilworth Road, but he had no moans about the result: "All credit to Luton," he said. "They gambled by pushing Steve Davis upfield, and it came off. I wish them all the best in the next round."

Lennie Lawrence can be forgiven if he is dreaming of Old Trafford.

The win at Kenilworth Road on Tuesday gave him his biggest scalp since he took over the Town, he said, explaining that when we beat Derby we were playing a Premiership team that did not have the cup as its priority.

"Make no mistake, Ipswich were up for it," he said. "They wanted it, and for drama, excitement and satisfaction that has to be the best cup match I have ever been involved in.

"My best run as a manager in the competition was with Middlesbrough when we lost in a semi-final replay to Manchester United."

That was five years ago, and the effort of beating a Lennie Lawrence team obviously took its toll of United - they were seen off 3-1 by Aston Villa in the final.

STAND by for another entry into the bargain transfer market by Lennie Lawrence. Not put off by his previous experience of Scandinavians at Luton, he is keeping tabs on two or three players who are within the Town's price bracket - ie free.

The Scandinavian season takes a break at the end of next month, and over there the Bosman free transfer rules apply to all players, not just the over-24s as in this country.

"We will be looking at likely 21 and 22-year-olds," said the boss, "Perhaps loans, perhaps Bosmans."

WHILE we were enjoying Tuesday's cup cracker, there was an old boys reunion from Luton in another tie that night, when Cambridge United beat Sheffield Wednesday.

The Owls boss, of course, is Danny Wilson, who scored one of our goals in the famous 1988 victory over Arsenal at Wembley, and the Wednesday Secretary is Graham Makrell, who was club secretary here a decade ago.

Cambridge had coach David Preece on the bench, and their team included former Town men John Taylor, Ben Chenery and Jamie Campbell, who was much relieved to see an equaliser go in for a 2-1 aggregate win after he had headed a spectacular goal... into his own net. Everyone wants to be a Steve Davis these days!

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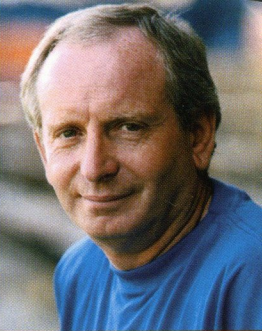

from the manager's chair



Tuesday's cup-tie against Ipswich was an occasion which will long be remembered, and so pleasing for us as a club, for the coaching staff and players, and for the supporters.

I doubt if a top fiction writer could have scripted the amazing events of the last five minutes.

Just when it looked as though we had won, we apparently had victory snatched away from us on the away goals rule, and that would have been very harsh.

But the players made one last effort and Marvin Johnson came up with a winner, and he deserves praise for the very cool way he placed his header into the right spot. In some quarters our win over a good First Division side might be seen as a surprise result, but it was richly deserved against a quality team which reached the First Division play-offs last season, and is likely to do it all again this time round. And of the squad of 17 we had on duty, only four cost fees, and two of those were very modest by today's standards.

Certainly the result was a tremendous testimony to our players. By the time you read this the draw for the next round of the Worthington Cup will have been made. Clubs at our level look for two possibilities: an away tie against a "glamour" club so that you can collect a significant amount of money, or a home tie against somebody you can beat. On our day we are capable of giving anyone a good game, so my hope for the draw was a home tie - let's have the money-spinner in the two leg semi-finals!

We are now at the end of the regular twice a week playing programme, and it's a good time to take stock, and remind ourselves that much as we enjoy cup success, promotion is what we need more than anything else.

After the trials and tribulation of a year ago - it's 12 months since an injury hit team lost at Bristol City and then plunged to the painful depths of defeat at home to Watford - I am pleased that we are now giving supporters something to cheer about, and I hope the win over Ipswich pays them back for some of the last year's suffering at home games.

The key to our ambition of a play-off place at least is a good solid home record, and I hope I am not tempting fate by pointing out that we have not been beaten in the league at

Kenilworth Road since January. Walsall will doubtless put that record to the test this afternoon. They have made an excellent start to the season, with only one away defeat so far in the second division, and that at Manchester City. They showed spirit and goal power last week to come back from behind to beat Notts County.

We too are in good heart, and with justified confidence despite the disappointing result at Blackpool, where we did not deserve to win, but might have snatched a draw.

Despite that reverse, we are well placed with roughly a quarter of the season completed today. If we beat Walsall, I would imagine we will be in the top four, and still in the Worthington Cup, and that is a satisfactory return for our endeavours over the opening phase of the season.

The win we want will also be important in terms of games coming up, because our next two are both away, and Fulham at Craven Cottage next week will be no walk-over.

There is a danger that after the amazing two hours of football against Ipswich today could be something of an anti-climax. We must not allow that, and Walsall's visit will be a test of our professionalism and spirit.

We must stay focussed: Wembley is a nice dream, but the reality is that the big prize for us is promotion, which is why we cannot afford to take anything less than three points today, particularly as once more we are playing a team who are up there with us at the top end of the league table.

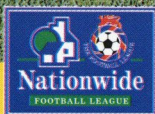
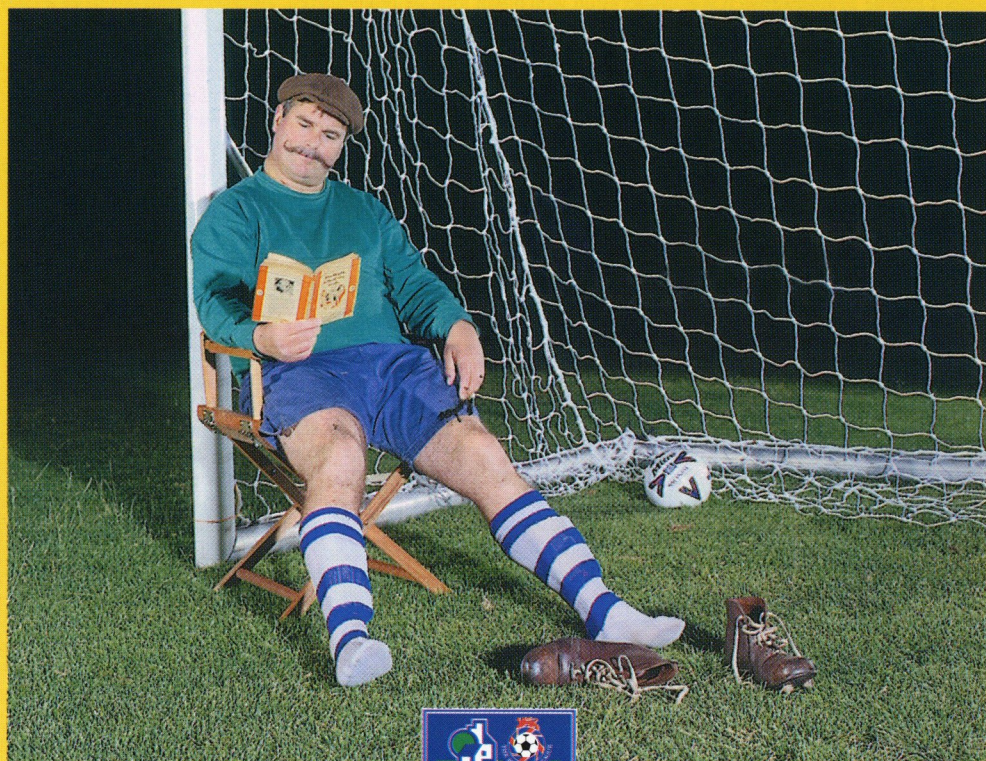
On a broader front, it has been a good week throughout the club. Our reserves went to Swindon on Wednesday night, and a young team won 1-0 to stay in the top three of the Avon Insurance Combination. Our youth team won again last week, and are top of the South East Counties League. So things are being done correctly at every level - we have the right players in the right teams and you only have to recall how well Michael McIndoe and Jimmy Cox have done when they were promoted to the first team to realise that our progress at all levels is very heartening. That too, is part of pay-back time for the supporters who suffered painful experiences with us a year ago, they were dark days, indeed, especially that game against Watford.

Today, it looks a lot sunnier, whatever the weather, and I hope you all have more reasons to cheer this afternoon as we try to cement our place in the top six. Your backing on Tuesday was tremendous, and thanks for that. But please keep it up - league games are even more important than cup-ties. Enjoy the game.

Confidence is high we've halted our mini slump of two defeats on the bounce and hopefully today we can try and get back into the top two.

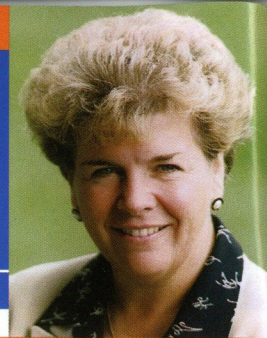
It was great support on Tuesday, so more of the same today please! Enjoy the game.

AFTER our superb win over Ipswich on Tuesday I wish to issue a reminder to all supporters about going onto the pitch: it is an offence to enter the playing area, even if it is in a spirit of celebration.

We have a good record for spectator behaviour, and we want to keep it. You probably know that the draw for the third round of the Worthington Cup was being made at 12.30 today. If you have missed it, we will be giving out the news on the PA system.

We were all hoping to draw a big one, at the stage of the competition when teams in the draw included Premiership clubs who had byes for the first two rounds because they were in Europe. From now on, until the two-leg semi-finals, the Worthington Cup is a one-off match each round. 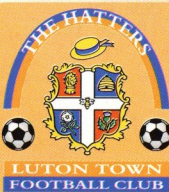

We have offered them potential dates, and are awaiting Northampton's reply, and I will pass on the information as soon as it is available. Finally today, we have a bucket appeal. It is in aid of the Herald and Post £40,000 Heart Scanner Appeal, which has been launched to buy a new cardiac ultra-sound machine for the Luton and Dunstable Hospital.

I would like to welcome the appeal organiser, Mary Biswell and her helpers who do so much for charity in this area. I hope they enjoy their day with us, and trust that supporters, as they always do, will again give generously for a good cause.

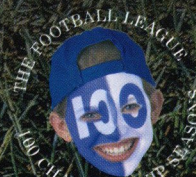

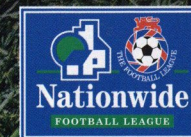
The picture shows David and James Garley, who are season ticket holders in the new stand, on a holiday where a Luton Town kit was of course an essential part of the luggage.

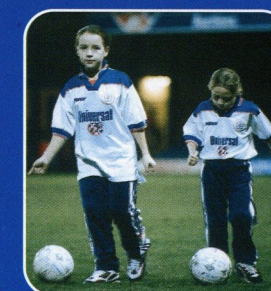
SCHOOL VISITS

GIRL POWER!

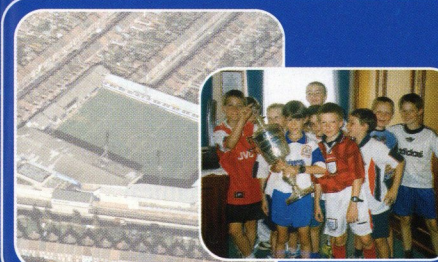

The cost is £2.50 per person and for more details please contact the Community and Schools Department.



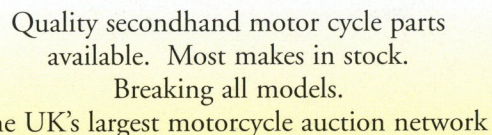
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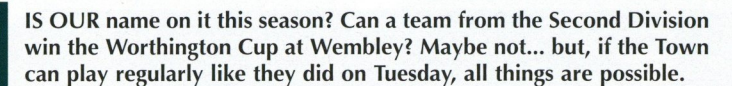

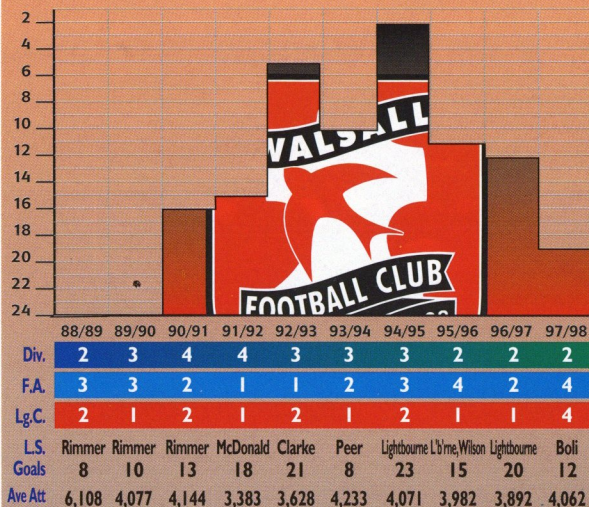

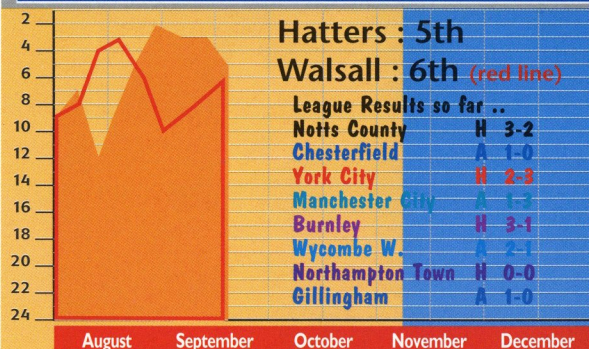

TEAM MANAGER - RAY GRAYDON

Emerged as the surprise choice to replace Jan Sorensen in the Saddlers hot seat during the course of the last pre-season break. The vastly experienced coach has never previously sampled life in the manager's chair, but commands a tremendous amount of respect throughout the football world.

A disciplined and intelligent man, he ended the 1997/98 campaign working as a coach at Port Vale, where he was an instrumental figure helping the Valiants avoid relegation. Best known in the mldlands for his time as a player at Aston Villa for whom he scored the winner in the 1975 League Cup Final against Norwich City.

JAMES WALKER

An inspiring and vociferous figure who provides an extremely sound base to the side. Ever present last term, the agile and all action 'keeper also skippered the side to good effect on a number of occasions, playing with a high level of confidence and reliability which transferred itself to the players around him. Moving to Bescot Stadium from Notts County in August 1993, he is another free transfer capture who has gone on to prove his worth in no uncertain terms.

DANIEL NAISBITT

A promising young keeper who many believe has potential to go far in the game. Currently being forced to bide his time in the reserve team, he is working hard so that when his opportunity eventually arises he will be able to grab it with both hands.

WAYNE EVANS

Since joined The Saddlers back in August 1993, the Welshman has blossomed into an extremely accomplished defender, playing with an extraordinary level of consistency, which has made him a firm favourite amongst The Saddlers faithful. On the fringe of the Welsh national squad, he was delighted to finally break his Football League scoring duck towards the end of the last season by bagging the winner against Gillingham.

MATTHEW GADSBY

After impressing greatly with some solid performances whilst coming through the ranks, the young defender was given a brief opportunity to taste first-team action in the final game of last season against Wycombe Wanderers when coming on as a second half substitute. With his appetite well and truly whetted this could well be the season in which he emerges from the shadows.

IAN ROPER

Another youngster who has made the transition through the ranks to become very much a part of the first-team set-up. His overall game is gradually improving as he learns from the more experienced people around him. A good competitor, he is expected to become a key figure in the heart of defence.

ADRIAN VIVEASH

The rock on which the back-line is built, he enjoyed yet another solid season last term whereby he reaffirmed his position as an extremely vital and

well respected figure in the side. Showing a steely determination to succeed which transferred itself to other members of the side, his experience proved essential to the youngsters around him. Walsall stepped in to snap him up on a Bosman transfer in October 1995 when he was somewhat surprisingly released by Swindon Town and what an acquisition he has proven to be!

CHRIS MARSH

Comfortably the longest serving player in the current squad, Chris arrived at Walsall as a fresh-faced youngster back in July 1998 and has gone on to serve the club tremendously well over the intervening year, playing in a whole host of different positions - including goalkeeper. An extremely popular figure both on and off the field, he is sure to prove his worth in no uncertain terms during the course of the season.

NEIL POINTON

Not one to shy out of a challenge, he has a tremendous strength of character which should serve the club well.

An extremely busy player in the middle of the park, made a big impact when introduced to the side in 1996-97 Season. He was used only occasionally over the course of the last season, spending a spell out on loan to Kidderminster Harriers. Nevertheless, when called upon he showed considerable skill, approaching each game with refreshing 100% commitment to the task in hand.

JEAN FRANCOIS PERON

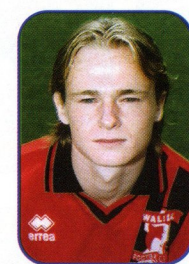

DEAN KEATES

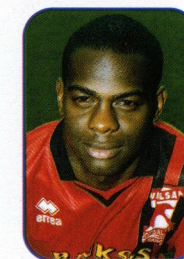

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Director Ron Hedley is celebrating the 46th anniversary of his first visit to Kenilworth Road on September 27th 1959, as a nine year old, when he saw the Town beat Preston 4-1 in front of 23,000 spectators.

Hatters On Card

IT IS almost 40 years since the Town beat Preston 4-1 at Kenilworth Road to go top of the First Division, which is now the Carling Premiership. Jimmy Adams scored twice, and George Cummins and Billy Bingham netted the other goals on September 27, 1958.

In those days boys could buy little packets containing half a dozen picture cards of footballers and a slab of bubble gum.

These cards, along with those found in packets of tea, sweets and breakfast cereals, were collected as avidly by the youngsters of the day as the pre-war cigarette cards had been by their fathers.

With Luton Town being one of the leading teams in the 1950s - promoted in 1955 and reaching the FA Cup final in 1959 - it was not surprising that they were featured regularly in these trade sets of the day.

Of the team that thrashed Preston, two players were to be found in the 50-card set of footballers produced by the A & B C Gum company. This was the first in a long line of football sets issued by the firm. On card 12 was Ron Baynham, and further on at 36 captain Syd Owen was pictured.

Baynham's card is reproduced here. He had joined Luton from Worcester in 1952 and soon established himself as a brilliant goalkeeper, who won three England caps in 1956.

By 1958, when this card was produced, he was turning in some of the best displays of his career, but he had stiff competition at Kenilworth Road. We had Bernard Stretton, also an England goalkeeper, and lowerth Hughes, who was capped by Wales.

On the back of the card, in a brief description of Baynham and his career, it states: "At present out of the England side, his burning ambition is to regain his place once more."

Alan Hodgkinson of Sheffield United, Eddie Hopkinson of Bolton and Ron Springett of Sheffield Wednesday prevented that ambition being achieved, and, like Owen, Baynham had to settle for three caps. But he stayed at Luton until 1965, playing 388 league games before injury ended his career.

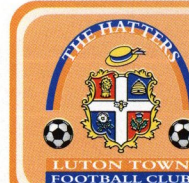
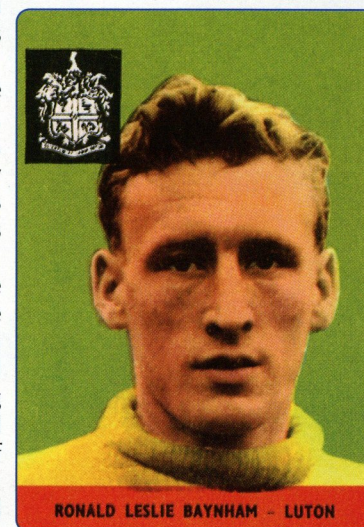
Incidentally, it is said that he loved to fill in crossword puzzles, without

The 6ft 1in tall goalkeeper appeared on several cards during his Luton career, including later issues from the A & B C bubble gum makers.

Examples from this set are still relatively easy to come by, at around 60p per card.

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It happened on this day

26th September 1964

Luton Town 1 Peterborough United 1

After the early season flurry of three wins from the first five games the team was starting to show its true colours with three straight defeats leading up to the visit of Peterborough to Kenilworth Road.

Despite this lapse in form a reasonable crowd of 9339 gathered, although some had turned up to see Northern Ireland international, Derek Dougan, who had surprisingly stepped down a couple of divisions to play for Posh. Peterborough had the worst defensive record in the division but had recruited ex-Aston Villa goalkeeper, Nigel Sims, in a bid to stem the tide. He certainly had a steadying influence allowing Posh to break away and take the lead through Tony Moulden after ten minutes.

Moulden missed another couple of sitters to sew the game up but the Town, taking advantage of these lapses, assumed control in the second half and a long pass from Dave Pacey allowed John O'Rourke to glide through a hesitant defence to slip the ball past Sims.

O'Rourke was denied a late winner when he was judged to have fouled Peterborough centre-half Jimmy Walker when heading home a free kick.

26th September 1972

Swindon Town 0 Luton Town 2

After a run of three straight wins the Town had come a cropper at Sheffield Wednesday the previous Saturday, going down 0-4 to the rampant Owls. The chance to shake this defeat out of their system came three days later at the County Ground, Swindon where the game

got off to a sensational start with Peter Anderson being booked after only ten seconds!

Swindon started brightly but they huffed and puffed in front of the Hatters goal and gradually the Town took over using an accurate long ball game.

Vic Halom opened the scoring just before the hour when his header slipped through Swindon goalkeeper, Peter Downsborough's hands and five minutes later Robins' defender Rod Thomas mis-headed a Bobby Thomson free-kick to Halom who expertly lobbed home number two.

26th September 1981

Luton Town 4 Watford 1

Although the Town boasted a 100% away record they were licking their wounds after suffering two consecutive home defeats to Sheffield Wednesday and Cardiff. What better time to take on local rivals Watford!

The Town dispensed with their sweeper system and tore into the Hornets from the start. It came as no surprise when David Moss opened the scoring from the spot after Watford striker Gerry Armstrong, back helping his beleaguered defence, brought him down. Soon after, Brian Stein was bundled over in the area by Ian Bolton leaving Moss to do the honours again.

Stein took advantage of an expert through pass from Ricky Hill to sew the game up by

half-time but was not finished as he headed home number four soon after the break. Watford netted a consolation through Bolton's free kick but the Town's season had well and truly taken off. It was also the biggest derby win for 45 years to boot!

Into the archives a blast from the past courtesy of Roger Wash

We welcome another team to Kenilworth Road who have featured constantly in our history since our earliest times. Meetings commenced in 1897/98, following our election to the old Division Two of the Football League.

We were well beaten in our first clash, in January 1898 at Walsall, going down 0-5 even though the Saddlers were reduced to ten men when 'Sailor' Aston was dismissed for fighting with James Coupar. It must have been some scrap as sendings-off were rare in those far off days when football was a lot rougher than it is now.

In the return, a month later, the boot was on the other foot as we won through 6-0 at Dunstable Road, and in the period leading up to our resignation from the Football League in 1900 there was rarely a dull moment during our clashes.

A 3-2 win at Luton in 1898/99, with two of our goals being scored in the final five minutes, was followed by a 0-6 reversal at Walsall. In 1899/1900 we overwhelmed the Saddlers at Dunstable Road with a 4-0 victory after using 'dubious, rough tactics' but were hammered 3-7 in the return fixture.

After all this excitement we then settled down to get our breath back and waited until 1927/28 before renewing acquaintances with the Saddlers this time in Division Three. The inconsistency, however, remained with a 4-1 home win on Easter Saturday followed by a 1-4 defeat at Walsall two days later. The only consistent feature was Andy Rennie who scored in both games.

In 1929/30 Walsall achieved the double over the Hatters, winning 3-2 at Luton and 1-0 at Hillary Street (the ground was not re-named Fellows Park until the summer of 1930). In the game at Kenilworth Road, Luton goalkeeper George Harford was a spectator

for the first 25 minutes but the first time he touched the ball was to fish it out if the net with Vincent Murphy scoring after a quick break by the Saddlers. Three minutes later Harford was picking the ball out of the net again when John Eyres doubled Walsall's lead and although Rennie reduced the deficit from the spot, after Sid Helliwell handled, Wallace Harris restored the two goal advantage for the Saddlers.

The Luton supporters could not believe that a team that had seen so much of the ball should be behind, and when Jimmy Yardley pulled another back for the Hatters in the second half everyone was expecting a grandstand finish. Walsall had other ideas, however, and packed their defence, with goalkeeper Fred Biddlestone showing breathtaking form. Biddlestone was also the Walsall saviour in the return keeping the Luton forwards at bay after ex-Hatter, Bert Walters had stolen the lead early on following a poor back pass from Luton defender John Fulton.

Due to Walsall's geographical position they were switched to Division Three (North) at the end of the following campaign but not before the Town had gained some revenge. Although the game at Kenilworth Road was a dull score draw, the return at Fellows Park saw the Town on the rack for most of the match, but sneak out and snatch both points when Bob Bryce set up Bill Brown who beat Saddlers goalkeeper Roy John with ease.

We met up again briefly in 1936/37, when Walsall were switched back again, just as we were about to win promotion to the old Division Two. Our clashes with the Saddlers were both early season affairs with winger George Stephenson netting the all-important goal in a 1-0 win at Fellows Park at the end of August, with Joe Payne and Jack Ball on the scoresheet in the return the following week, in front of a Kenilworth Road crowd of 11043. Another long gap appeared before we met again, this time in 1961/62 following the

Saddlers promotion to the old Division Two. On Boxing Day 1961 we went down 2-0 at Fellows Park, in a game marking the debut of Fred Jardine, but the press seemed more interested in former England international goalkeeper, Ron Baynham, because he turned out in tracksuit bottoms. Remember these were the days when goalkeepers who even wore gloves were regarded as sissies!

At the end of the following campaign both clubs were relegated, but not before we won an entertaining game 4-3 at Kenilworth Road with young striker Ron Davies scoring his first goals for the Hatters.

On now to the old Division Three in 1963/64, when we met up again with the Saddlers on the opening day at Kenilworth Road.

With Gordon Fincham and Gareth Salisbury making solid debuts for the Town it was left to veteran striker Gordon Turner to net the all-important goal as we won a tight game 1-0. We crashed 0-4 in the return in front of 3863 spectators, which was then the second lowest league attendance at Fellows Park since the War.

In 1964/65 we slipped down to football's basement and our meetings with the Saddlers took place over Easter 1965. In the Good Friday game at Kenilworth Road a youthful Allan Clarke, later to play for Leeds and England, scored twice as the Saddlers won at a canter, 3-1. The return, three days later, showed up all the old Luton/Walsall inconsistencies when Ted Phillips scored the only goal of the game to earn two valuable points in our vain fight to avoid the drop. It was to be only three years before we met up

again, following our eventual promotion from Division Four, and although we went down 0-2 at Fellows Park, we won the return 1-0 with Bruce Rioch on target in front of a crowd of 15205. After scoring, Rioch was carried off on a stretcher with a knee injury that was to keep him out of the game for some time.

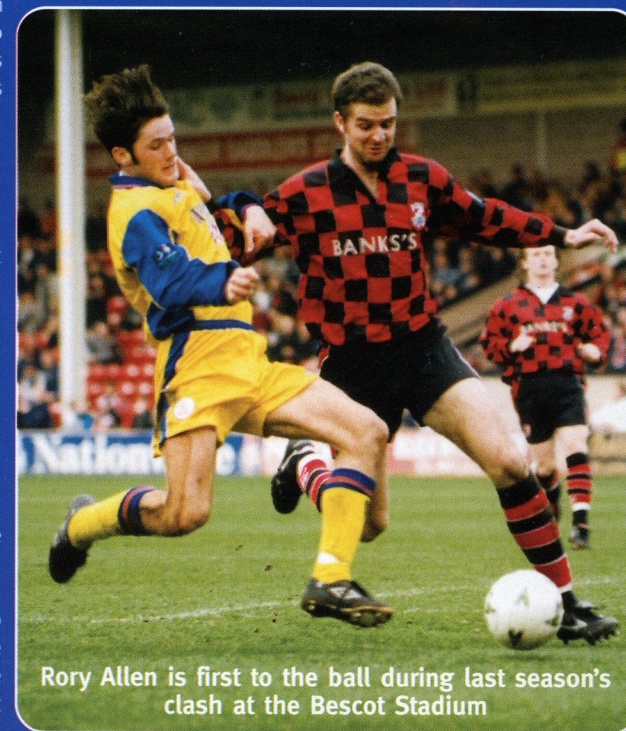
The next season brought about another parting of the ways with the Town winning promotion back to the old Division Two. We won 3-1 at Fellows Park, in an early season clash, for our fifth away victory of the campaign, with Matt Tees scoring twice and then swept the Saddlers aside 3-0 in the return played on Cup Final evening.

In more recent times our clashes resumed in 1995

after our relegation to Division Two. Goals from Tony Thorpe, Paul Showler and Andrew Fotiadis were all eclipsed by a brilliant volley from Saddlers' Kyle Lightbourne in our 3-1 victory at Kenilworth Road and, in the return, Lightbourne showed blistering pace to destroy the Hatters in a 2-3 defeat which virtually confirmed the end of our hopes of an automatic promotion spot.

Last season another Saddlers wonder strike, this time from John Hodge, earned the visitors all three points at Kenilworth Road. In the return at the Bescot Stadium (where Walsall moved in 1990) we gained ample revenge winning 3-2 in a cracking match.

This time we needed points for different reasons, compared to the previous campaign, and with Rory Allen making a sparkling debut on loan from Tottenham, we earned a vital victory in our fight to avoid the drop.

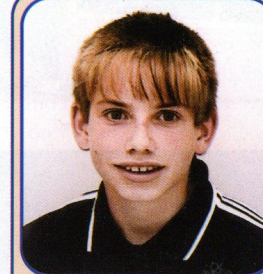

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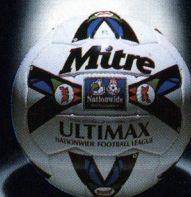

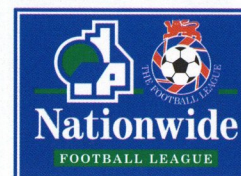

Action Replay Blackpool 1 Luton Town 0



DISAPPOINTMENT, not disaster, was the sound - bite summing up of Lennie Lawrence after the Town went down to their second league defeat of the season.

"I felt we deserved a draw, but no more," said the Town

manager after seeing Blackpool nick a very late winner to maintain their unbeaten home start to the season.

A hint of tiredness crept into the Town's performance in the second half, and the Town boss was concerned about lack of movement and ideas in the last 20 minutes.

All three subs were put on, and the boss was unhappy that the changes made no difference.

Blackpool's did - they sent on a 17-year-old YTS boy for his debut, six minutes from time, and four minutes later he scored the winner, capitalising on poor defending - "Dwight Marshall gave away a free kick, the ball goes 80 yards, and bang, it's in our net," was the manager's succinct description. It was poor defending, but from the Pressbox the main problems looked to be at the other end of the field, with an attack that enjoyed some early promising moments before running out of ideas. The threat to Blackpool's rugged defence was virtually nil in the second half.

It might have been different if the Town had a touch more luck when they opened up at a brisk pace. Matthew Spring and Sean Evers carved out a chance for Phil Gray, whose shot was saved at the expense of a corner, and Steve Davis surged upfield to fire in a low drive which was also saved.

Spring, backing up well, was inches wide of his first goal for the club, and Gray hooked another chance just wide of the target, with goalkeeper Steve Banks well beaten.

All that happened in the first 25 minutes, but slowly Blackpool settled down to tighten up in defence and midfield, and a match that started with fourth place entertaining third became something of a stalemate.

After escaping with a fumble from a powerful drive by Barry Shuttleworth, Kelvin Davis saved

bravely at the feet of Martin Aldridge, but the balance of play was tipping all the time towards the home team.

But the Town looked as determined as Blackpool to give nothing away - the free kick count was 11 to each side - and even Blackpool manager Nigel Worthington admitted that if it had stayed 0-0 Blackpool could not really have complained.

"Luton started brighter than we did, and caused us problems in the first 25 minutes," he said. "They are a good side, although I thought we were the only team in it in the second half. The result was earned by our honesty and hard work. But we had a little bit of luck early on."

The Town's luck finally ran out in the 88th minute, when no-one dealt with a long free kick. Subs Junior Bent and Adam Nowland swapped passes and Nowland drifted past Graham Alexander and despatched his one and only shot so far in league football into the net. Trust us to be on the receiving end.

Travel

THE Bobbers Travel Club and Town on Tour are both running trips as we take to the road for our next two league matches, at Fulham on Saturday and York the week after. Full details are available at their kiosks at the Kenilworth Road end of the ground today.

If you want to drive, Fulham poses problems with heavy London traffic and street parking only, including pay-and-display zones.

You might like to try M1, M25 and then M4 to come in from the west of London. The M4 becomes the A4 and you leave it at the A3 roundabout, signposted to Portsmouth and Guildford. Take the A306 to Hammersmith until you reach the infamous massive Hammersmith roundabout. Go almost all the way round to take the road signposted as the alternative route to Putney Bridge, into Fulham Palace Road. Ignore the sign to A3218 Fulham, and go straight on at those traffic lights, and the ground is on your right within half a mile. If you get lost, find Putney Bridge and park if you can - you can walk to the ground from there.

The shortest route, on the map in miles but not time, is down the M1 and onto the North Circular

to Hammersmith - nice if the roads are clear but can be horrendous on a Saturday. It's only about 30 miles, but the 40 on the other route is likely to be more pleasant.

York is about 140 miles away from Luton, but motorway nearly all the way, although the city centre is diabolical for traffic. Leave Luton on the M1 north, all the way up to south Yorkshire, then the M18 and the A1. (If you don't like motorways, join the A1 in Bedfordshire and use that to Yorkshire). On the A1 watch for the A64, signposted to York. Some of us then have the misfortune to have to drive into the city centre to drop off wives near the shops, and in the scrum of tourists. The Minster, incidentally, is worth seeing, and a 20-minute walk from the football ground.

To avoid city centre traffic problems leave the A64 at the A1237, signposted to York North. Go straight ahead at the first roundabout, still heading for York North. Stay on that road for five miles, over three roundabouts and across the River Ouse. At the next roundabout turn right, signposted to York Centre A19. Go straight on for just over two miles, and at the Burton Stone pub turn left into Burton Stone Lane. Take the first right for the ground. Street parking is adequate, but beware restrictions, including residents-only zones.

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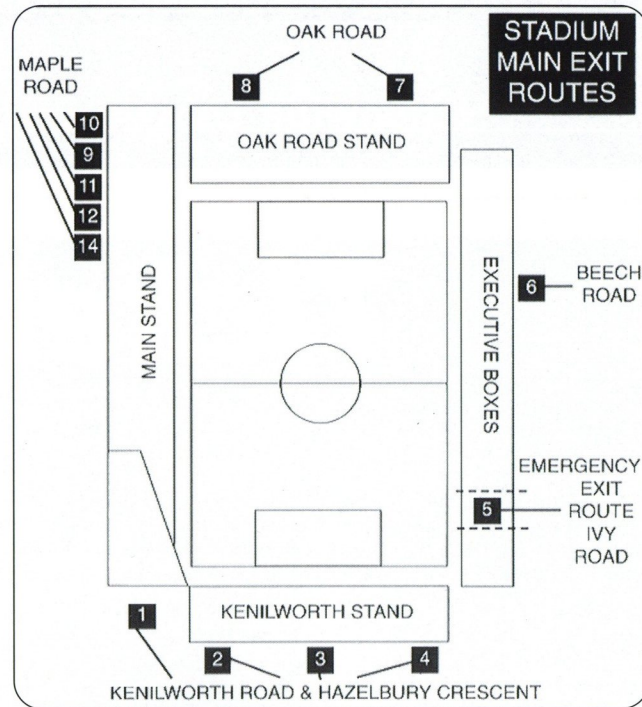


Evacuation Procedure

In the event of any emergencies at Luton Town Football Club, the emergency services and the club have agreed on an evacuation policy which is designed to: a) Ensure the safe and controlled evacuation of the crowd. b) ensure the dispersal of the crowd from the area to allow the emergency services to carry out their tasks.

In the event of an evacuation of all or part of the stadium, you will receive instructions over the public address system on how you should leave the stadium. Stewards will direct you to the nearest exit. It may be that your normal exit route will not be available. On leaving the stadium, you will find some roads closed to pedestrian traffic, to enable swift and unobstructed arrival of the emergency services. Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.

HARD matches like Tuesday's cup-tie can take a lot out of players, but after you win, especially in such dramatic circumstances, the aches and pains never seem to be too much bother. And the treatment room has been remarkably free of customers this week following the great exertions made against Ipswich.

We collected only a couple of knocks - Jimmy Cox and Andrew Fotiadis both got kicked, but they are not serious problems, just a bit of bruising, and I would expect both to be available for today, if the manager wants them in the squad.

With a little luck, Phil Gray might also be in contention again. He took a nasty blow on the ankle at Blackpool, but was close to being all right for Tuesday's match. The treatment is working, and the plan was to have him training again on Thursday with a view to being available for today.

Ray McKinnon has also had an ankle injury, as you probably know. It kept him out of the team at Ipswich and Blackpool, but he was able to return on Tuesday. He was not quite 100 per cent, but was comfortable, and wanted to play, and you always take a player's opinion before making a final decision. Some footballers can be laid low mentally by slight physical problems, but that is not something that affects us here at Kenilworth Road.

I know Paul McLaren, Liam George and Julian James are all itching to play again, and for McLaren there is light at the end of the tunnel: with luck, he should be able to train in a fortnight or so. His knee ligament injury is healing nicely, and he is getting his head down in terms of work. After being restricted to the exercise bike and the gym, he is now running, and about to start ball work again. But it is a case of taking it one step at a time - and so far we have not tried turning the knee joint. That must wait until the time is right.

Liam George and Julian James, getting over broken legs, have to be patient, but James might have good news next week. He is due for another scan to check on how well the bone is healing, and when we have that report we can think about the next stage of the road to recovery. Meanwhile, he is still working hard in the gym on general fitness.

On that subject, I think players are fitter now than they were when I was playing. That is one of the reasons why Tuesday's two hours of football will take it out of everyone to some degree, but you will have seen how well they all

lasted through extra time.

We pay much more attention to diet nowadays, with pasta, rice, bread and potatoes on the menu to build up carbo-hydrates.

High fluid intake is also important - plenty of water, and Isotonic drinks. They're in the plastic bottles you see being handed to players during games - they replenish minerals and energy levels, and act quickly.

They give an "instant hit" which is why they are used during matches. The game has changed since my day: they have to be athletes as well as footballers now, and thankfully our players are, and are willing to do what is necessary to enable them to stay that way.

WALSALL come to Kenilworth Road today with plenty of incentive to end our unbeaten home league record. If they beat us, they will overtake us in the Second Division table, because they are in sixth place, one notch and one point below us.

And they have a formidable away record, showing three wins and one draw from their first four outings on the road. Their only away defeat was an extra-time failure in the Worthington Cup first round to First Division Queens Park Rangers.

The bookies made them 50-1 shots for the title at the start of the season, when it was seen that they had sold French striker Roger Boli to Dundee Utd for £150,000, and spent nothing on new recruits.

But new boss Ray Graydon chose free transfers wisely, and their only away defeat in the league so far was a 3-1 reverse at Manchester City at the beginning of this month. They have won at Gillingham, Wycombe and Chesterfield, and Andy Rammell, signed on a free from Southend in the summer, has been an instant hit, leading the Saddlers' score charts with six goals.

One was in last week's 3-2 victory over Notts County at the Bescot Stadium. Paul Simpson, on loan from Wolves rifled in a 20-yard opener, but Notts County hit back with two in two minutes before Rammell headed an equaliser. Jason Brissett got the winner, and was then brought down for a

penalty which Gary Strodder drove wide.

The problem for the chasing pack around the top places is that Stoke are still steaming away merrily on top. They made it eight wins out of nine games at Wrexham, although they left it late - sub Ray Wallace headed the 77th-minute winner two minutes after being sent into the fray.

Preston, the division's top scorers, retained second place with a 1-0 win at Oldham, with the scorer Michael Appleton, the man who was sent off in Preston's game at Kenilworth Road.

Bournemouth continue to defy the pundits, holding on to third place with their second away win of the season. But it was at the expense of bottom club Wycombe, who are still looking for their first win of the season.

Reading, Lincoln and Macclesfield are all three points above the Adams Park outfit.

Reading were the only one of the three to take a point, with Martin Williams, ex-Luton Town, giving them a lead which was cancelled out two minutes from time by Carl Duiguid of Colchester.

We're still the only visiting team to leave the Majedski Stadium empty-handed.

Macclesfield's 2-0 defeat at Wigan underlined their major problem - they have failed to score in seven of their nine league games so far.

For seeing goals scored, the week's best game was at Fulham, who were held at home by York, who equalised three times to share six goals. And York did it with 10 men, after Barry Jones was sent off for two yellow card offences when the score was 2-2
