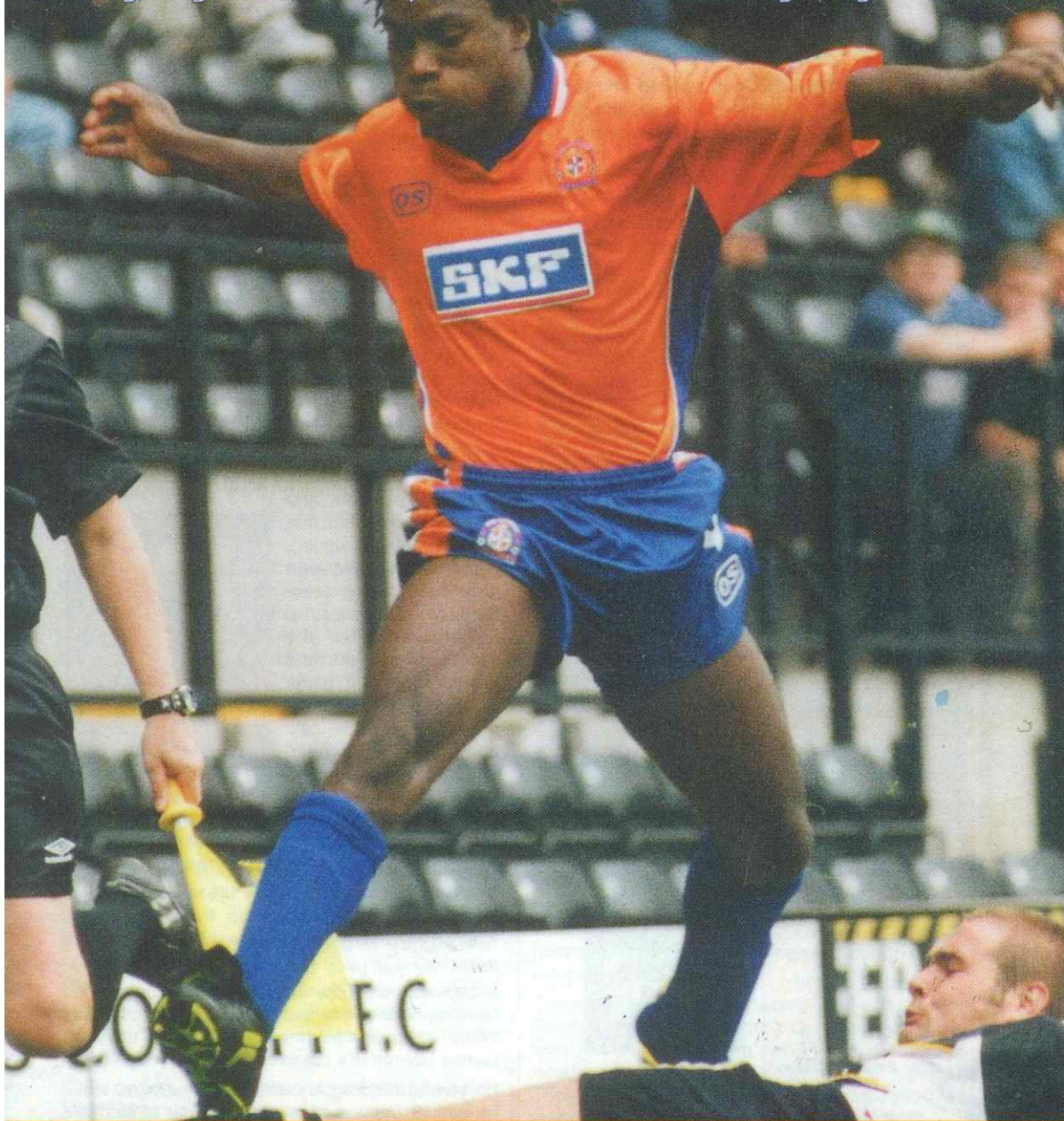

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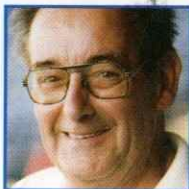

Inside Forward

welcome to kenilworth road



THE long-awaited end to the receivership saga, effectively settled just hours before the new season kicked off, has freed Lennie Lawrence from the financial straitjacket that prevented him from doing his job properly through the summer.

Technically, Luton Town is still in receivership, with the formalities expected to take another week before the deal is completed for Cliff Bassett to replace David Kohler as majority shareholder.

But there was an immediate effect this week, when the manager was able to do two deals that the receiver had blocked on financial grounds: defender Effy Sodje and midfielder Ray McKinnon are now both under contract, although Sodje cannot play today because of suspension.

For him it is second time lucky - he came to Luton for trials as a youngster and sort of impressed then manager David Pleat. On Pleat's advice, Sodje signed for non-league Stevenage. Come back in a year, said Pleat. Not likely, said Stevenage at the end of the 12 months.

Born in Greenwich, British but also qualified to play for Nigeria - the bandanna he always wears is a sign of his mother's culture - the young centre-half did so well, helping Stevenage to the

Conference title, that they would not let him return to Luton.

Eventually, he moved to Macclesfield for £30,000, playing a big part in their rise through the Conference, via the championship and into the Football League and instant promotion through the Third Division. He refused a new contract last season, after Macclesfield were relegated, and came to Luton to agree a one-year deal with Lennie Lawrence.

It should have been signed before the start of the season, but the receivers put it on ice, saying they could not commit unknown future owners of the club. This week, Cliff Bassett gave the go-ahead for that commitment.

It was thought that the delay - Sodje signed on Tuesday - would cost him games. He had a three-match suspension, and the Town expected that to start after he signed, which would have kept him out of the team today, next Saturday at Reading and for the second leg of the Worthington Cup game at Bristol. But after poring over the rule books, the Town have had FA confirmation that technically, for disciplinary purposes, Sodje was still a Macclesfield player, so two matches were served when the Silkmen played on Saturday and Tuesday, and the ban ends after today's match.

One deal that was allowed by the receivers was to bring in Julian Watts on loan from Bristol City, where they seem to have coachloads of players available.

A big mate of Tony Thorpe, who might also be heading back to Kenilworth Road before too long, Watts is hoping he is not the kiss of death to Lennie Lawrence's Luton career.

He started his league career at Rotherham, when he was 18, but was always a supporter of Sheffield Wednesday and was well pleased when Trevor Francis signed him at Hillsborough. Then came a change of manager, and David Pleat promptly flogged the centre-half to Leicester, for £200,000.

Unable to claim a regular place in the Premiership, Watts took advantage of the Bosman ruling a year

ago, and moved on to Bristol City. John Ward did the deal - and three months later he was sacked. "It soon went pear-shaped," said Watts, "For me, Tony Thorpe and several others. We thought the new manager was an idiot."

Relegated a year after winning promotion to the First Division, City hired their third manager in less than 12 months, and Watts hoped for better things under Tony Pulis.

"He doesn't fancy me," said the centre-half. "I got the message in a pre-season game when he put on the right wing... in the reserves."

At 28, Watts knows he cannot afford to hang around, and has come to Luton determined to prove he is worth a place in a league team.

The manager will consider the next move when the month's loan is complete. He will also then be talking again to Ray McKinnon, who was among the players released at the end of last season, partly because he wanted to be free to consider his options, and partly because the receivers wanted as many names as possible scrubbed from the wages list.

As pre-season dawned, the manager was refused permission to sign McKinnon, but at the weekend, with the ban lifted, it took player and boss little time to agree a month's deal for the time being, giving the midfielder the chance to claim a regular place in the first team.

Easy Rider?

MOST of us going to Reading next week will sit in some comfort, in coach, car or train, but one group of dedicated fans will be on their bikes.

They are cycling across country to the Madejski Stadium, just for the fun of it and to raise money for charity.

It was the brainchild of the fan in the picture, Norman Gray, a 43-year-old print worker from Northview Road, Luton, a Town supporter since, as a young boy, he watched the 1968 team win the Fourth Division championship. He rarely misses games home or away.

"I like cycling, as a recreation to keep fit," he said. "Normally I do 40 or 50 miles a week, including going to and from work."

"Last year I cycled to the match at Wycombe to raise money for leukaemia research, and thoroughly enjoyed it. This year, I thought Reading might be a nice place to ride to, and I wanted to support FLAG as well as leukaemia research."

"In view of the good news about receivership I am not sure if it is right to still raise cash for FLAG, but certainly I am looking for charity sponsorship, and because of the FLAG involvement we have ten riders signed up so far."

The group will leave Kenilworth Road at 8 am next Saturday, and even if they become strung out they intend to meet at a pub on the outskirts of Reading so that they ride the last leg together. They are hoping for a cool and dry day, and we wish them well in their endeavours.

A COUPLE of late goals completed a competent performance in the first pre-season fixture, when we had our first look at trialists Mark Cartwright and Efetobore Sodje among others.

Both did all right, but Adam Locke, released by Bristol City, had a bigger say in matters after going on as a midfield sub for the last half hour.

At the time the Town were comfortably holding on to the lead given them by Matthew Spring's powerful drive after 21 minutes.

Earlier a narrowly-wide header by Johnson, and a tipped-over drive by Matthew Spring, had been the Town's best attacking efforts.

A harsh penalty, for hands against Liam George, gave Barnet an injury-time chance to double the score, but Mark Cartwright dived the right way to stop the kick by John Doolan.

AN EYE-catching display by Matthew Taylor gave the first hint that he could jump straight into the first team squad from the youth side. Palace stirred themselves after the break, and made a match of it, but it was poor far post defending which led to a last-minute equaliser. Lee Bradbury had thumped in a 51st-minute goal to start the Palace revival, and James Hibbert scrambled in the late second.

AN EXPERIMENTAL formation at Sixfields made little impression on a full-strength Cobblers side which was desperate to put on a show for the home fans after relegation last season. Marvin Johnson, Matthew Spring and Phil Gray were left out of the starting line-up.

Lee Howey was unmarked from a free kick to head Northampton into a sixth-minute lead and Dave Savage bundled his way through a fragile defence to make it 2-0 on 72 minutes. Guy Kipoua, on trial from Bristol Rovers, did the major work in laying on an 85th-minute consolation for sub Emmerson Boyce.

WITHOUT getting carried away - the visitors did not field their full strength team - Town fans had cause for optimism about the display which was more than good enough for First Division opposition. The Town come back strongly after an awful start and left Rangers manager Gerry Francis most unhappy as he saw heads go down.

The defence stood around when Keith Rowland slung in a far post cross after only 64 seconds. He admitted later that he was not expecting to score, but the ball bounced into the net.

With Matthew Spring and Matthew Taylor doing well in midfield, the Town picked themselves up. Rangers thought Phil Gray was offside before laying on a 36th-minute equaliser for Stuart Douglas, and although Taylor took his chance expertly, the opening to make it 2-1 on 51 minutes came from a mis-hit shot by Michael McIndoe. The clincher, ten minutes later, was even more distressful for Francis, who watched in horror as Stuart Wardley's headed back pass looped gently over the advancing keeper for a cracking own goal.

Julian Watts, on trial from Bristol City, on his Luton debut, probably wished Rangers had given him more chance to demonstrate his abilities.

WE NEED to bounce back quickly today from the disappointment of Tuesday's cup result. There might be a case for thinking the defeat was a bit harsh, but the fact is that the goals underlined our major weakness.

I thought we started brightly, but that spell, in the first 20 minutes, was not translated into goals and the major criticism I have is that we did not look likely enough to score.

Bristol Rovers were well organised, and we were not able to put consistent pressure on them. The strength and pace of Jason Roberts, and his ability to take a goal was the key difference between the sides.

Having said that, we could have equalised early in the second half, but a good chance went begging, and they punished us quickly by scoring their second.

So we are disappointed, but most definitely not down-hearted. Our task in the second leg will be difficult, but not impossible. Memories on Tuesday night immediately went back 12 months, and to the matches against Oxford and Ipswich in the Worthington Cup, when the odds were also stacked against us after losing in the first legs. But to do it again, we must produce a lot more goal threat.

We will be working on that today as well, as we welcome Blackpool and their supporters to Kenilworth Road. They should be in good heart after two victories in their first two matches, and doubtless will be hoping to produce better away results this season than they did last. They had a decent home record, but were not so good on their travels. Honours were even between us and Blackpool last season, each side winning 1-0 at home. I hope the trend continues today!

Nigel Worthington has done a steady job as manager at Blackpool, and while they may well travel with some confidence after their good start, we should be able to field a stronger team than the one that faced Bristol Rovers.

Marvin Johnson looks set to return, and his absence was a blow, particularly when we also lost Alan White at half-time through injury.

Our young players do their best, but experience counts for a lot in football, and that is why I was pleased this week to finally complete agreements with Effy Sodje and Ray McKinnon.

It was a real bonus when we discovered the quirk of FA regulations about Sodje's suspension, as is reported on page 2 today, and he will now be available to play at Reading next week.

The contracts for McKinnon and Sodje were top of my priorities when I knew we were coming out of receivership, and hopefully I will soon be able to bring in more players.

We are actively exploring several avenues, and to return to the lesson of Tuesday, and the lack of attacking power, Tony Thorpe is one of the players under active consideration.

He wants to come back here, and after seeing how he responded to a return last season, when he was on loan I am rather keen on the move as well! We have to be careful about transfer fees and wages, but if a deal is possible we will do it. It might well be a case of mutual benefit - Tony Thorpe could do a job for Luton Town, and just as importantly from his point of view a return to Luton might well be a good career move for him.

I am sure supporters would be glad to see him back, but in the meantime it is important for them to have some understanding of the unusual circumstances that have led up to this season. Thankfully, we have a team behind the scenes, including in the boardroom, determined to build a better future. That is what we all want, but we may have to be patient. That goes for supporters too - you have a big part to play, and your encouragement can work wonders. And if you can persuade others to come to games, that too will be very much appreciated by all of us at Luton Town.

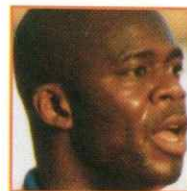

Captain's Log

WELCOME back for another new season, and if you are anything like me, you will be glad to see us kick off the first home game in the league this afternoon.

I had a good summer with a holiday in Portugal, and little rest and relaxation, and a little fitness work. When you get to May, you are often tired, and perhaps more than ready for a break from football. But within a few weeks I find myself counting the days to the start of the new campaign. It's been like that for me ever since I came to Luton Town as an apprentice way back in the summer of 1985, and this year has been just the same.

I am lucky in that I can eat well without putting on too much weight, but I still watch my diet throughout the summer, and make sure that in terms of fitness I keep ticking over - I play a bit of tennis and go to the gym to work out two or three days a week.

Naturally we keep an eye on the papers, to see who is going where (and how much he's getting!) and of course this summer we also kept watch for news of what was going on at the club.

Footballers tend not to worry about who is running a club, so long as they are left to get on with their jobs, but when you have played for a club as long as I have you get a deep feeling for Luton Town.

So I shared the feeling of relief when news came through, with perfect timing before the first game of the season, that the club was out of receivership at long last. It's nice to know it has been sorted out, and we know Cliff Bassett, without being an in-your-face director, is a genuine Luton Town supporter.

So were the 1,500 who turned up at Meadow Lane - our thanks to every one of you. I don't think I have experienced that sort of atmosphere from our fans in a league game since we were in what is now the Premiership. They created a tremendous atmosphere, and while we wanted to win, I think everyone felt reasonably satisfied with the draw.

We might have got a late winner, because we had a good shout for a penalty when Phil Gray was going for goal. To be honest, at the time and from my position, I didn't think it was a penalty. Tippy thought it was, and when I saw replays on TV, I agreed with him. So spare a thought for the ref - he gave what he saw, and perhaps had the same view of it as I did during the game, and TV replays after that make no difference at all.

I got clouted, accidentally I am sure, early in the match when County had a goal ruled out for offside. There was a clash of heads, but I was OK after treatment, and able to carry on. I was not knocked out, but on the way home I had a head-ache and felt sore. On Monday, in training, the first time I headed a ball I felt dizzy, so it was back to the treatment room and a thorough medical examination.

The verdict was that there was no serious damage, but as a precaution I was pulled out of the side for Tuesday's cup-tie, and sat and suffered with the rest of you as I watched from the stand.

I thought we were doing OK early on, and looking good for a result, but Jason Roberts had other ideas. He's a bit of a handful, but I would have enjoyed doing battle with him.

I hope I will face him in the second leg, and I promise we haven't given up hope of making further progress in the Worthington Cup. Twice last year we were behind on first legs, against Oxford and Ipswich, and twice we came back to win. Modesty forbids that I mention the scorer of the wonderful, very late, winner against Ipswich!

Before the trip to Bristol there are six points to play for, and we will do our best to pocket the first three this afternoon. I hope to be back in the side, and if you give us the kind of support we had at Nottingham last week, we must start as favourites. Whatever happens, I hope we all enjoy the game, and have a season to remember for all the right reasons.

Treatment Room

WE HAVE had one or two fitness concerns this week, after the first games of the season, but generally I was well pleased with the overall state of health of the squad when the players reported back for pre-season training.

They all came back in decent shape, which means that they had taken note of the programme of work they were given for the summer. It was designed to maintain a general level of fitness, and most of them seemed to have kept to it.

We draw up a full programme of overall fitness work to be done from the first day of pre-season right through to next May and the objective is to reach the ultimate peak of fitness at the most important time of the season, in the spring.

That is how all clubs do it - think back, for instance, how Manchester United and Arsenal were both able to make their late surges towards the title. In today's highly professional world of football, fitness has become a science.

Recent injuries...

But strains and sprains will always be part of football, and Gavin McGowan was unlucky in pre-season training. He fell awkwardly, and strained a hamstring tendon, and has not yet fully recovered. He is training at about 75 per cent capacity, but you have to be careful not to over-do it, and he is not yet ready for consideration for a competitive match.

Marvin Johnson missed Tuesday's cup-tie because of delayed concussion after taking a whack on the head at Notts County. If it had been desperate he might have been able to play against Bristol Rovers, but it was not worth taking the risk. We certainly did not want to take any chance of him collapsing during the game. Time is the great healer, and has done its work, and the captain should be ready for action against this afternoon.

I am not sure the same is true of Alan White, Phil Gray and Stuart Douglas, who were all hurt on Tuesday evening.

Alan White twisted his ankle in the first half, and is quite sore, with sprained ligaments. We are working hard in the hope that he will be all right for today.

Likewise, Phil Gray has been under treatment for a strained hamstring, while Stuart Douglas went down with a deadleg - severe bruising of the muscle inside his leg.

Both have been undergoing treatment, and it was a case of wait and see before decisions were made on their availability for today.

Farewell...

Finally, a little news about one of my most regular customers last season. Paul Showler, who was given a free transfer, is a qualified physio-therapist, and has put his experience to good use - he took a job as physio at Peterborough United on Monday. He will see it from the other side of the fence from now on, and we wish him well in his new career.

NEW club chaplain, the Rev Catherine Bell, gets an official welcome to Kenilworth Road. She has been one of the assistant clergy at St. Mary's, Luton's parish church, for the past two years, but most of her duties revolve around ministry to the 15,000 students of Luton University.

"I love the job, and they have got a pretty good football team as well," she said.

Born in the North East of England, Catherine, 35, spent most of her early life at Harrow, and had relatives in the Luton area, so has known the town well for many years.

"I was always a football fan, and when I was about eleven I fell in love with Kevin Keegan," she confesses. I joined the London branch of the Liverpool Supporters Club, and went to Anfield quite a lot because I also had family up there."

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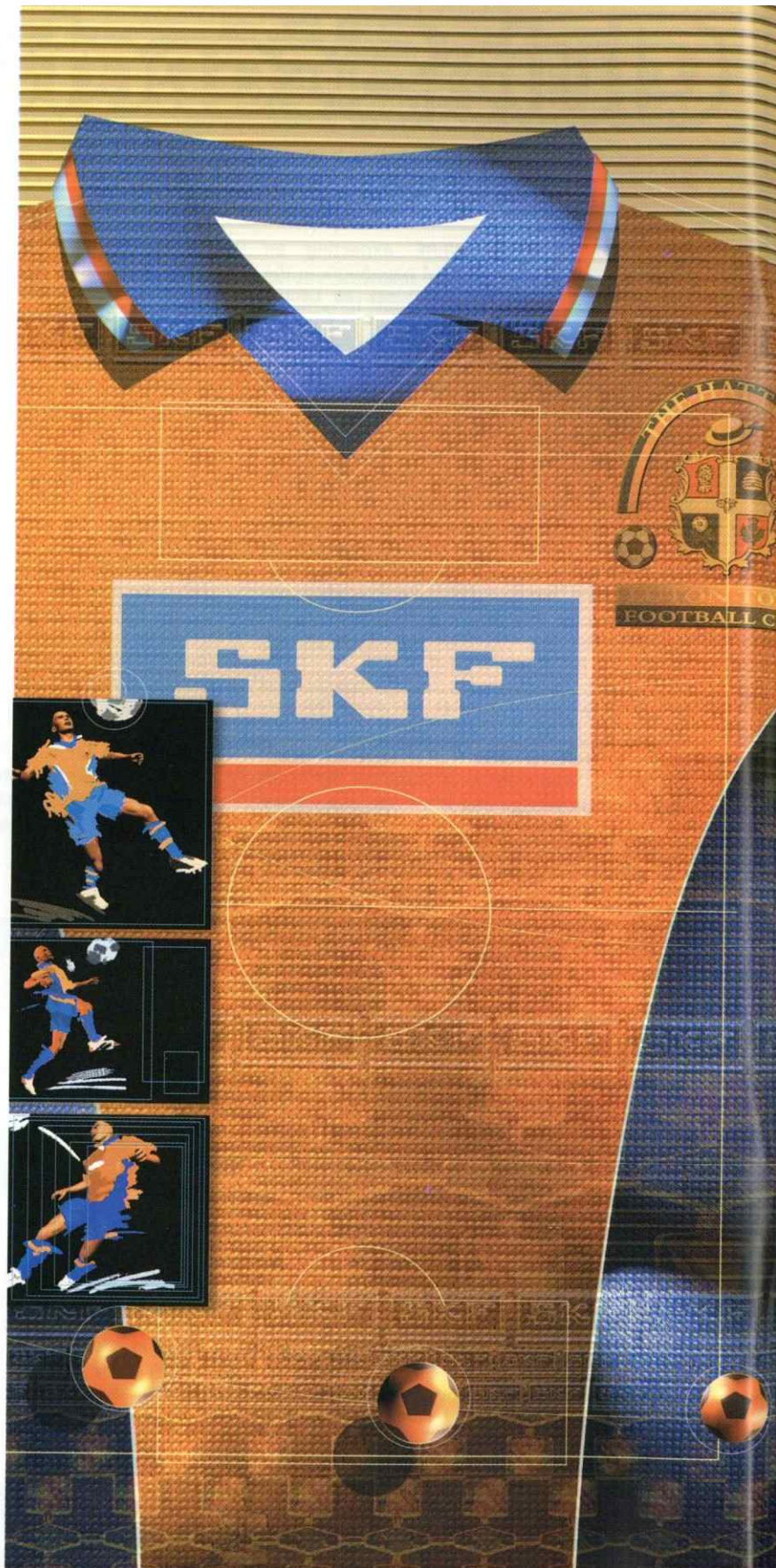

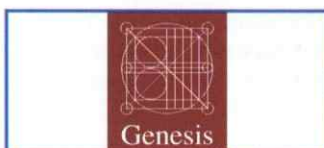

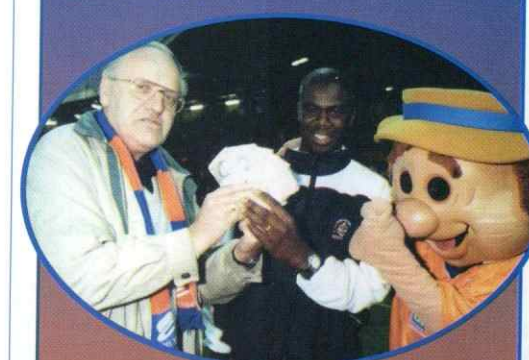

NIGEL WORTHINGTON MANAGER

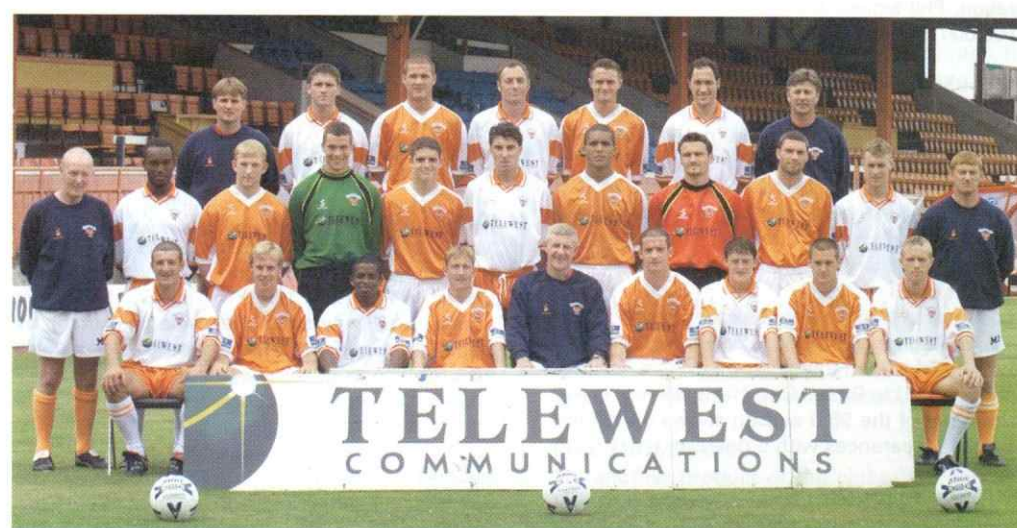
Nigel Worthington was appointed on July 8th 1997 to his first managerial post. Nigel, was an experienced Northern Ireland International with 66 caps together with being their captain on a number of occasions. During his illustrious playing career he played at left back or in midfield but although signing as player manager he played only a handful of games in the early part of his first season with the club before hanging up his boots to concentrate on his management roll.

He comes from Ballymena and was a Youth International and captain before joining Notts. County in 1981. In 1984 he was transferred to Sheffield Wednesday and spent 10 years there in which time they were Coca Cola Cup winners and runners up. They were also F.A. Cup runners up. He then moved to Leeds United for £325,000 in 1994 and on to Stoke City in 1996. He made over 600 Football League and Cup appearances.

He has been busy in the transfer market since his arrival selling established players like Tony Ellis, James Quinn and Micky Mellon. He also released the experienced Andy Preece, Chris Malkin, Jason Lydiate, Dave Linighan and Anton Rogan. His shrewd moves into the transfer market have seen the capture of Ian Hughes, John Hills, Junior Bent, Steve Bushell, Martin Aldridge, Andy Cousins and Tony Caig. He has also proved himself very shrewd in his ability to bring in young players and blend them into the team.

The 1998/9 season saw many ups and downs but Nigel did manage to collect a Manager of the Month award. He gave many more youngsters their chance and some are now a regular fixture in the side. With Bosman transfers of established stars Steve Banks and Tony Butler he acted swiftly on deadline day to bring in both cash and replacements.

Nigel signed a two-year extension to his contract at the end of the 98/9 season that will keep him at Bloomfield Road till the end of season 2000/2001.

MARTIN ALDRIDGE

Striker signed on a two-year contract in August 1998 after impressing in the pre season games. He scored 10 goals in league and cup despite two long injury lay-offs. He previously played at Northampton Town and Oxford United.



DAVID BARDSLEY

Very experienced defender who signed in July 1998 after being released by Q.P.R. He actually started his career at Blackpool before going to Watford and Oxford United and finally Q.P.R.

David is a former England International who has proved invaluable in helping our young defenders.

PHIL BARNES

A young goalkeeper who continues to improve, he made two first team appearances last season to add to the one the previous season and will be a serious contender for the leading role this season. Phil signed from Rotherham United for £100,000 in the summer of 1997.

PAUL BEESLEY

Very experienced defender who signed on a free transfer from Port Vale in the summer of 1999. He has close on 600 league and cup appearances for his previous club's that include Sheffield United, Leeds United, Manchester City and Port Vale of course.

JUNIOR BENT

Speedy and tricky winger signed from Bristol City in August 1997. He started his career at Huddersfield Town then after a few loan spells he finally moved to Bristol City. His Blackpool career to the end of the 98/9 season shows 54 full and 31 sub. appearances with 5 goals.

MARVIN BRYAN

Defender signed from QPR in August 1995 for £20,000. Currently on a week to week contract after refusing the new terms offered to him. Kept up his record last season of scoring 1 goal in each of his seasons with Blackpool. This time a last minute effort at Reading that earned a point. Very much a fans favourite for his ability to support

the attack. His Blackpool record to the end of the 1998/9 season shows 186 full and 8 sub. Appearances with 4 goals.

STEVE BUSHELL

Came from York City in June 1998 on a three-year contract under the Bosman ruling. A very hard working midfielder who settled well and was missed for the last two months of last season with a broken foot. His Blackpool record is 36 appearances with 3 goals.

TONY CAIG

Goalkeeper signed from Carlisle United for a small fee on deadline day in March 1999 to replace Steve Banks. He came through the youth system at Carlisle and made over 250 appearances for them before his move to Blackpool. He will face stiff competition from Phil Barnes for the goalkeeping shirt this season that should help both keepers improve. Blackpool appearances 10 to the end of 1998/9.

CLARKE CARLISLE

Very strong young defender who has attracted the attention of several Premier League clubs. He came through the clubs strong youth policy and looks to have a bright future in the game if he continues to improve. Despite his young age for a central defender he has already made 46 full and 9 sub appearances and also added three important goals to his general play.

PHIL CLARKSON

Midfielder who moved back home to play for Blackpool when he signed from Scunthorpe United in February 1997 for £80,000. Started at non-league Fleetwood before being picked up by Dario Gradi at Crewe and on to Scunthorpe. He was top scorer in the league last season with 9 goals and now has 30 goals from 117 full and 3 sub. appearances.

MICHAEL CONROV

Experienced striker who joined the club from Fulham for £50,000 in March 1998. He has previously played at Clydebank, St Mirren, Reading, Burley and Preston North End. To date he has not figured much in the senior team with 14 full and 3 sub. appearances bringing just 1 goal. Last season he spent two loan spells at Chester City.

ANDY COUZENS

Defender/midfielder who came to Blackpool from Carlisle United in March 1999 and made 6 appearances before injury ended his season. Carlisle United paid his first club, Leeds United, £100,000 for his services in July 1997. He has looked very strong in the preseason games so far now he is fit again.

RICHARD FORSYTH

Midfielder who signed under the Bosman Ruling from Stoke City in July 1999. Birmingham City, who brought him into the league, spotted him playing for non-league Kidderminster Harriers. He then moved on to Stoke prior to his move to Blackpool. He will be looking to add vital goals from his midfield role.

STEVE GARVEY

Signed on a free transfer from Crewe Alex. in July 1998. He is happy in either flank and can provide some excellent crosses. Opportunities were limited in his first season with us with only 6 full and 8 sub appearances being made. Those appearances brought him 1 goal.

JOHN HILLS

Another defender who started his career at Blackpool and moved away before returning later. John signed for Everton prior to making a first team appearance at Blackpool but returned in February 1998 when he failed to get regular first team football with the Premiership side. He is a local lad who played his youth football for the YMCA club. He has proved an excellent purchase and has now made 52 full and 1 sub. appearance with 1 goal.



IAN HUGHES

Ian signed from Bury in December 1997 as part of the Tony Ellis deal. He has been used in both midfield and defensive roles and has proved to be one of the most popular players with the fans who recognise his ability as a hard working and determined player. He scored his first goal for the club to earn a point at Colchester United last season and now has made 59 full plus 3 sub. appearances.

ADAM NOWLAND

Young striker who has been top scorer at both Reserve and Youth levels. He broke into the first team squad early last season and scored his first senior goal in the last minute of the game with Luton Town after coming on as a sub. He came through the clubs YTS scheme. He has now 13 full and 26 sub. appearances with goals.



BRETT ORMEROD

Another young striker, he joined the club from non-league Accrington Stanley in March 1997. He finished the season as second top scorer in the league with 8 goals. If he continues the improvement he made last season he has a bright future in the game. Signed an extended contract for the club in the summer of 1999. Appearances to the end of 1998/9 41 full plus 19 sub, with 11 goals.

PHIL ROBINSON

A young local defender who came through the club's YTS scheme and now his second season as a pro. To date he has 3 full and 5 sub. appearances.

BARRY SHUTTLEWORTH

Left sided defender who signed a two-year contract after an initial three-month trial in the summer of 1998. He started his career at Bury before moving to Rotherham United from where he was released at the end of the 1997/8 season. The form of John Hills has limited his opportunities but he still made 15 full and 2 sub appearances with 1 goal in 1998/9.

PHIL THOMPSON

Yet another product of the clubs YTS scheme, Phil is a central defender who signed a three-year contract in September 1998. Hatters Chatter

players merry-go-round

SOMETHING like 600 footballers were on the move in the summer as the Bosman transfer ruling continued to have its effect on the game.

The European court decision enabling players to walk out at the end of their contracts, and offer their services for signing-on cash instead of transfer fees, has made a few of them very, very rich.

The vast majority have suffered a very different after-effect. Clubs everywhere have had to slim down and good players have been out and about seeking new employers.

Remember Chris Allen, the Nottingham Forest player we had on loan for three months 18 months ago? At 26, he was given a free transfer by Forest at the end of last season, and is still looking for a new chance elsewhere.

The huge free transfer list was peppered by names familiar to Town fans, with more than a dozen ex-Hatters figuring on it.

Two are heading for retirement from league football: Tony Adcock, freed by Colchester, and Garry Parker, released by Leicester City. Parker was in one of our best-ever youth teams, in the early eighties, but had the misfortune to be understudy to Ricky Hill, and had to move on. After a spell at Hull (we collected £72,000 in 1986) Parker became an under-21 international, and a popular midfielder at Nottingham Forest, Aston Villa and Leicester.

Hill, incidentally, has gone to Spurs as a youth coach, in a similar job he did with David Pleat at Sheffield Wednesday.

Not all of our ex-players who moved in the summer went for free - Mark Pembridge, who had two years in our first team before a £1.25million move to Derby County in 1992, has just come back to this country from Benfica, joining Everton for £800,000. He went to Portugal, as a Bosman, from Sheffield Wednesday last summer. Three years earlier Pleat had splashed out £900,000 to take him from the Baseball Ground to Hillsborough. In view of last week's changes in the boardroom perhaps now we can be excused for telling a tale previously kept well under wraps. As transfer deadline day loomed in 1992, Pleat knew that Derby wanted Pembridge, but figured the Town's need was greater. David Kohler wanted the money, but on deadline day, with Derby waving their cheque, and the chairman wanting to grab it, Pleat ensured that Pembridge was well out of the way. He sent him to

play golf. As the minutes towards the deadline ticked away the manager had to tell his chairman that it was impossible to find Pembridge to get him to sign for Derby. He was playing golf somewhere... It ensured we kept Pembridge until the end of the season, with the deal then being completed to everybody's satisfaction.

Another deal that wasn't was recalled by another name in this summer's free transfer bumper bundle. Goalkeeper Steve Sutton, who might have kept us up in the old First Division and therefore into the first season of the Premiership, has retired after finishing his career at Notts County and is taking up coaching. We had him on loan from Nottingham Forest, but would not pay the £300,000 asking price to keep him.

A couple of former Town players left Cambridge United on free transfers: Jamie Campbell to Brighton, and Kofi Nyamah to Exeter.

Striker Dwight Marshall has dropped out of the league, with a free from Plymouth to Kingstonsian, and so has another veteran marksman, Mike Newell, who left Crewe to join Doncaster Rovers.

Rory Allen, the best loan signing Lennie Lawrence has ever made, is now a Portsmouth player, after a £1million move from Spurs, and his new teammates include goalkeeper Andy Petterson, who has joined on a free transfer from Charlton.

News of a £150,000 move for Sean Dyche from Bristol City to Millwall was a blow for Lawrence, but the centre-half left a lovely message on the club's answerphone before signing at the New Den. He explained that much as he would have liked to come to Luton, as the club was in receivership and unable to make him an offer, he felt he had to take the chance offered by Millwall.

One of the most famous names in Luton Town's history figured in the summer free transfers - Rioch, from Hull to Macclesfield. Not the brilliant Bruce, of course, but his son Greg, a steady defender who joined us in 1992 to complete the second year of his YTS. He had been at Millwall, but left after his dad was sacked as manager there.

Rioch Jnr went to Barnet on loan, and made a league debut at Underhill, but never made it to our first team, leaving on a free transfer to Peterborough four years ago. He had a year there, before three at Hull, and was in the Hull squad, but injured, which came to Kenilworth Road and embarrassed us in the FA Cup last season.



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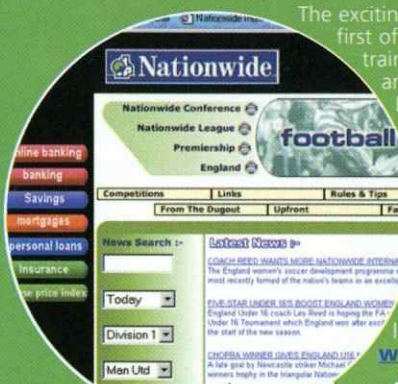

TOWN ON TOUR, which advertises its service as more luxurious than the average, will also be on the road to Reading next week, but as we went to press had not booked a coach to the Memorial Ground for the cup-tie.

THE BOBBERS TRAVEL CLUB is a members-only service, but the price is modest: life membership costs just £1, or 50p for under-16s and pensioners.

Reading v Luton Town

Saturday August 21, kick-off 3pm



For the trip to Reading, Town on Tour coaches leave the club at 12.30 and the fare is £8 for LTSC members and £7 for members who are under 16 or over 65. Non-members can get on board for £12.50. The Bobbers Travel Club service leaves Cranfield at 11 am and Kenilworth Road at noon. The fare is £7.50, £6 for concessions.

Bristol Rovers v Luton Town

Wednesday August 25, kick-off 7.45pm



For the trip to Bristol with BTC the fare is £10.50, or £8.50 for concessions and departure from Luton is at 3.30. For further information, visit the Bobbers Travel Club kiosk in Kenilworth Road before kick-off on any match day, or contact Paul Deason on 01234 750996.

The BTC's service includes pick-up points at Cranfield, Ampthill, Flitwick, and Westoning. Coaches depart from the top of Kenilworth Road, and also pick up near the hotel next to the M1 junction with Dunstable Road.

Town on Tour completed its first season's operations in May, having been set up by a sub-committee of members of Luton Town Supporters Club. Its best deals are offered to LTSC members, who have a kiosk in Kenilworth Road on match days and will be able to offer membership and travel tickets. Application forms to join LTSC are available at the kiosk, and the annual rate has been pegged at last year's, £6 for adults, £5 for under-16s and pensioners, or £12 for family membership of up to two adults and two children.

Part of the Town on Tour service is a secure car park at Maple Road, from where their coaches depart. That costs £3, but has to be pre-booked, either at the kiosk on match days, or during the week at the Luton Town shop.

DIY travellers

IF YOU want to drive yourself to Reading and Bristol, the journeys are quite simple. For both destinations, leave Luton on the M1 south, then make a right turn onto the M25 west. Near Heathrow leave M25 to join the M4.

For the Madejski Stadium, leave M4 at junction 11, and turn right, following the A33, signposted to Reading. Keep to the left hand lane, resisting any temptation to take the right fork. Go straight ahead at the first roundabout, and left at the next. The route to the stadium is signposted. There are 2,000 parking spaces, at £3 per vehicle, but beware: for Saturday's opening game, against Bristol City, the car park was

full by 2pm. More parking is available close by, at the speedway stadium, priced at £2.

Mileage from Luton: 64.

FOR Wednesday week's game at the Memorial Ground, home of Bristol RFC, head towards Reading as outlined above, but carry on beyond junction 11 to junction 19, and there turn left on the M32. Leave the M32 at junction 2, and turn right, signposted to Fishponds and Horfield. Where the road forks bear right, and at the sixth set of traffic lights, about a quarter of a mile further on, turn left into Filton Avenue. The ground is on your left, and there is ample street parking in the area.

Mileage from Luton: 150.

Luton Town v Blackpool

The Hatters, so full of confidence as they travelled to Nottingham Forest on the opening day of the 1973/74 season, were brought down to earth with a bump as they were well and truly thrashed by a rampant home side.

It was back to the drawing board for manager Harry Haslam but, after a great deal of soul searching, he made only one change for the next game, at Kenilworth Road against Carlisle. Young Tom Finney, a close season buy from Northern Ireland side Crusaders, was given his full debut and he turned out to be a revelation.

Aided by the man with the famous name the Town ripped Carlisle apart and came off at the interval to a standing ovation leading 6-0. Although the players were unable to maintain their first half brilliance, finally finishing up 6-1 victors, the season had now well and truly started.

Finney was on target again as the Hatters followed up their demolition of Carlisle with a 3-1 win at Bristol City, scored the Luton goal in a 1-1 draw at newly promoted Notts County and made it five goals from four starts when netting in a crazy, but highly entertaining, 3-3 home draw with Portsmouth.

The next test came at the home of F.A.Cup holders Sunderland. The Hatters did not need reminding that they had failed to perform in a quarter-final tie at Roker Park only a few months before leaving the way open for the Wearsiders to upset all the odds and beat mighty Leeds at Wembley.

A crowd of 27,334 turned up at Roker Park to see the Town put in a far more committed performance this time around and a single effort from Barry Butlin was enough to seal both points.

After their disastrous start the Town were now up to seventh position and looked forward to welcoming Blackpool to a Kenilworth Road bathed in late autumn sunshine. The Seasiders were unbeaten at home at that stage in the campaign but had yet to win on their travels.

In a manner reminiscent of their early season battering of Carlisle the Town set about Blackpool from the start and it was no surprise when Butlin slammed the ball into the net after 13 minutes to open the scoring. Swift interpassing between Don Shanks and Finney was finished with a clever backheel flick from John Aston which made the scoring space for Butlin.

'Bullet' Butlin needed no help from his teammates for goal number two which came only ten minutes after his first. Collecting the ball in midfield he beat the challenge of Blackpool defender, Peter Suddaby, before unleashing a tremendous drive from 25 yards which streaked into the net.

From then on it was carnival football time from the Hatters and only an eccentric performance from referee lowerth Jones prevented a goal avalanche. John Ryan and Aston both had goals disallowed for offences that only the official spotted and two confident penalty appeals were turned down much to the surprise of everyone in the ground.

Peter Anderson hit the woodwork and both Ryan and Aston had efforts cleared off the line before goal number three killed the game shortly after the interval. Butlin flicked on a corner from Jim Ryan leaving Anderson to score from close range.

Blackpool were almost non-existent in attack with Luton centre-half John Faulkner effectively shackling ex-Wales and Newcastle

forward Wyn Davies who had been a close season target of the Hatters.

The referee caused a rumpus by refusing to allow the trainer on to attend to the injured Jim Ryan and Anderson was booked for complaining. A little later Blackpool defender Bill Bentley went down after a collision with Finney and again the official refused to let the trainer on.

Unfortunately Bentley was found to be suffering from severe concussion and had to be rushed to hospital leaving the Seasiders down to ten men for the final 15 minutes as they had already used their substitute. The press had a field day over the referees failure to stop play, leaving the official having to make

a public apology to Bentley and all at Bloomfield Road.

Luton manager Harry Haslam was obviously delighted with his charges and the fact that the run had pushed the Town up to second position but was disappointed that 'only' 10,365 had bothered to turn up at Kenilworth Road.

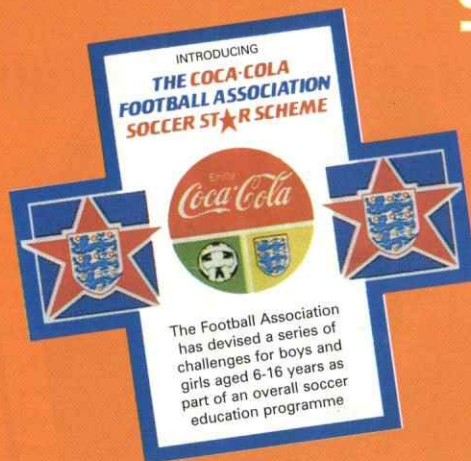
"If we keep winning and scoring goals the supporters must surely come back" said Haslam believing that a team hitting the net 14 times in their previous five games was certainly deserving of bigger crowds.

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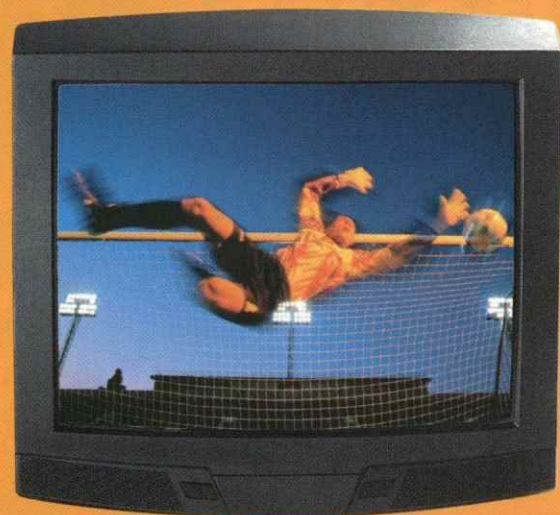

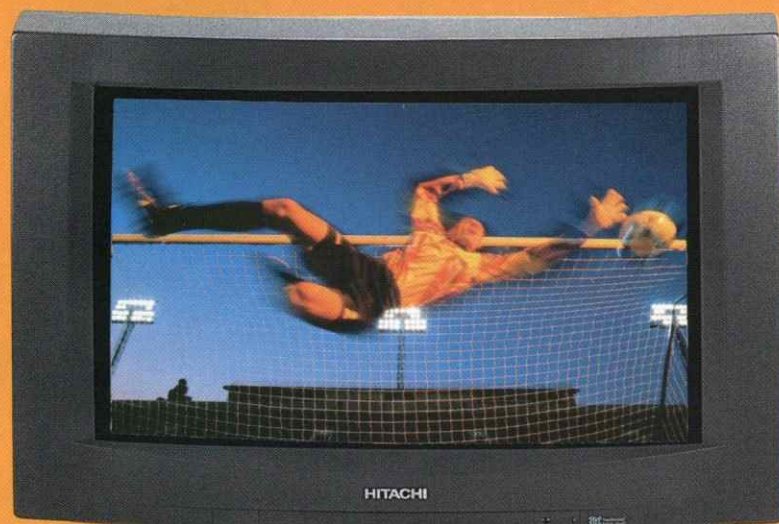

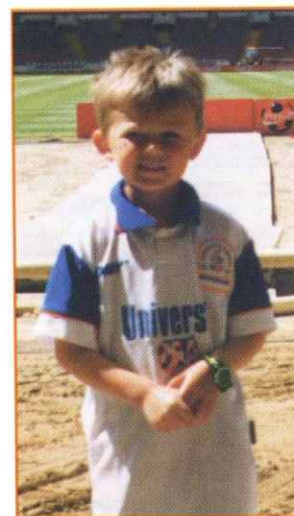
carrying the colours

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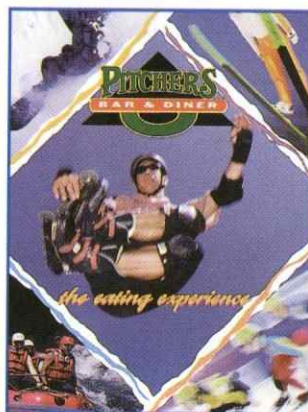

Action Replay

Notts County 0 Luton Town 0

THE FOOTBALL was not quite scintillating - County are not like that - but rarely can a goal-less draw have given so much pleasure to supporters. In April, at the tail-end of last season, we enjoyed watching two goals by Tony Thorpe prove to be one too many for County. The gate was 5,583, with 945 of them Luton fans.

On Saturday, for the opening league game of the season, a stand behind one goal at Meadow Lane was awash with bright orange, and full of exuberant happiness. Amazingly, out of 6,141 customers, 1,531 were Luton supporters. It was party day in the pubs before and after the game, spoiled only by a couple of idiots who let the club down by getting involved in skirmishes at the game which were completely out of character with our normal standards.

The cheering for a good result had started long before kick-off, and if the Town team was a touch makeshift, it did not show. It was, said the manager, a typical opening day fixture in the Second Division, full of effort and speed, and fierce competition. It was good to see the Town stand up to it, roared on incessantly by their fans. County had been able to strengthen their squad in the summer by signing the vastly experienced Clayton Blackmore. Luton Town's uncertain close season had seen two good players sold to Wimbledon, others given free transfers, and the numbers made up by loan and short-term contract signings.

We have taken to using three at the back, with wingbacks, because the manpower was not available for the 4-4-2 formation the manager prefers.

Saturday was a day to prove the old adage about good coming from adversity, as the Town more than matched County. Julian Watts, on loan from Bristol City, looked a battler when he started his Town career on the right. When he switched to the middle, he showed a lot more than battle, notably a calm and decisive authority about everything he did. With Marvin Johnson on his left, and Alan White on the right, it was a combination which was much too strong for County's respected strike force of Mark Stallard and Peter Beadle.

Unfortunately, our own attack was also blunted, although Phil Gray came nearer than anyone else to scoring. A snap shot in the first half was held by the keeper at the second attempt, and in the closing minutes Duane Darby sent Gray sprawling. At the far end of the ground 1,531 voices were raised in unison for a penalty, but the ref was not up with play and the assistant kept his flag down.

Overall, said Lennie Lawrence, he had to be pleased with the first day's work. The Town had looked the better footballing side for much of the match, and had defended well to keep a rare clean sheet when County tried to shell in ammunition for the front two.

Tanny Abbey settled down after early nervousness to do all that was required, and while everyone else came up with dependable fighting spirit, it was particularly pleasing to see the fearless and busy work of two of the younger players, Stuart Fraser and 17-year-old Matthew Taylor, who has skipped the reserves in transition from youth team to league squad. If you're good enough, you're old enough - Taylor most definitely is, although the coaches will keep a wary eye on the danger of asking too many games from a young talent in his first season.

Action Replay

Luton Town 0 Bristol Rovers 2

HAVING seen a decent performance at Nottingham earn a well-deserved away point, a disappointing first home game of the season has left the Town with plenty to do if they are to progress in the Worthington Cup.

Burly striker Jason Roberts was the difference between the sides, netting both goals and also being a general nuisance to an under-strength defence through his power and pace.

The turning point was a matter of barely 60 seconds in the second half, when the Town were looking capable of cancelling out Roberts's first-half effort. But two reasonable chances were scorned in the Rovers penalty area, and within a minute of the second a classic away team's sucker punch delivered the night's knock-out blow.

Thankfully, we have another 90 minutes to put matters right, in the second leg at Bristol in ten days time, and all things are possible - a year ago we lost in the home leg to Oxford United in the first round, but did the business in the second leg.

The Town were hit before kick-off by the news that Marvin Johnson had collected a head injury in training, which enabled Emmerson Boyce to come into the side, with Julian Watts taking major responsibility at the heart of the back three. Then, at half time, Alan White limped off with an ankle injury, to be replaced by Gary Doherty, who is still not 100 per cent right after his latest stint with the Irish youth squad.

Last season Jamie Cureton led the Second Division scoring charts, with 29 goals in the league and cups. The Town kept him reasonably quiet - but at the expense of struggling against Roberts, who netted 23 times last season.

Matthew Spring took over the captaincy, and produced his usual whole-hearted performance, while Matthew Taylor almost got the early breakthrough that might have made a difference, with a blistering free kick which narrowly missed the far post, and the outstretched legs of defenders and attackers alike.

For 20 minutes it was an even contest, and to their credit Rovers were positive as well as ready to mix it - David Pritchard collected the game's only yellow card after just two minutes, for unloading Phil Gray.

Tanny Abbey made a good save with his legs to deny Robbie Pethick, and slowly the match turned into the sort of pattern that explains why there are so many away victories in the Second Division.

The art is in the counter-attack, and the Rovers had the edge there as the Town tried to put on attacking pressure.

The visitors' spearhead was sharper than ours, but it ought to have been Rovers chasing the game after 34 minutes when Spring set up Stuart Douglas with a clear sight of goal. Lee Jones was off his line, but the chip went over the bar as well as over the keeper.

Four minutes later Roberts taught a devastating lesson: it was sheer power and pace as he muscled through the middle for a solo run and drive expertly placed to leave Abbey helpless.

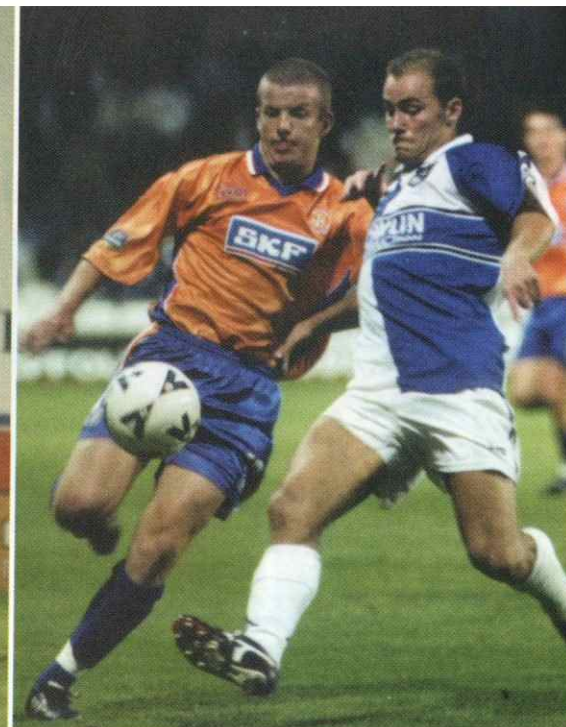
The half-time break seemed to have done the Town more good than Rovers, because for 15 minutes Rovers were forced onto the back foot.

Michael McIndoe's pass opened up the defence for Gray, but the shot went too high, and Taylor sent another effort fizzing narrowly wide. The crucial spell was in the minute or two after the 59th. Gray robbed Andy Tilson on the edge of the box and rolled an inviting pass into the path of Douglas. But the first touch was below par, and a relieved Jones was able to make an easy pick-up when he must have thought he was about to be tested to the limit. Play swung back to the other end, and with the Town caught too far upfield - they had induced Rovers to stray offside ten times - a long ball over the top sent Roberts racing clear to lob his second goal with another expert finish.

That just about finished it, although Gray saw a header cleared off the line, while Roberts was denied the hat-trick he should have completed by Abbey's late save.

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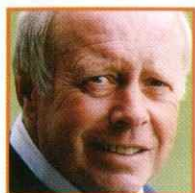

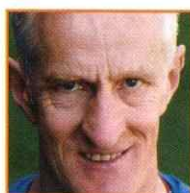
PRE-SEASON FRIENDLIES

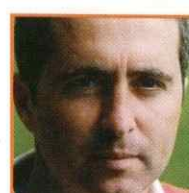

Youth Soccer

WITH another new intake of boys who want to be professional footballers, our youth team faces a new and potentially tougher challenge this season.

We will report later on the latest lads to join us after leaving school, and on today's opening fixture, at home to Walsall.

Regular followers of youth soccer will know that Walsall have not normally figured on our league fixture list, but they are one of several new names on our schedule this year.

Having won the South East Counties League championship again last season, we were very keen to make another successful title defence, but because of changes at all levels of football, many caused by the Premiership's growing influence, the South East Counties League has gone out of existence.

After so many years of providing us with good competitive football, we were sorry to see it go, but at the same time we relish the new challenges about to face us.

We have become part of the Football League Alliance, which includes all clubs in the Nationwide League. They have been divided into six regional conferences, with nine clubs in each, and each club will play the others home and away, giving a league programme of 16 games.

In the South East Counties League many of our games were against clubs from London and the south of England, but in the Alliance we have been put into the South Central Conference, in which the biggest names are West Bromwich Albion and Wolverhampton Wanderers. Our longest journeys will be to Shrewsbury and Notts County.

In the second phase of the competition, the top three clubs from each of three conferences will form a Merit One league, and next three will form Merit Two and the bottom three will form Merit Three.

For this stage, our other two conferences are South West and South East. To reduce the chance of long journeys in this phase, each team will play the other eight in its merit table once.

That makes sense, because the Alliance covers the whole country, so in the Merit League we could face, for instance, Plymouth, Exeter and Torquay.

We will keep you informed as to those possibilities as the season progresses. Meanwhile, our second fixture in the Alliance is next Saturday, at home to West Brom. Our youth matches are normally played on Luton Rugby Club's ground at Newlands Road, kick-off 11 am, and spectators are welcome. Admission is free and if you have not watched the youth team in action before, we can recommend it - the boys on view, after all are the cream of young football talent.

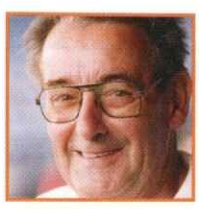

BLACKPOOL come to Kenilworth Road today looking to maintain a perfect start to the season, after an opening-day 2-1 victory at home to Wrexham, followed by an even better result when they saw off First

Division Tranmere in the Worthington Cup, also 2-1 at home.

We can boast that we are still unbeaten in the league, but if you check it out with the experts, the Town and Blackpool can both forget about promotion this season.

A year ago we had a little chuckle on these pages about the odds offered by the bookies on promotion and relegation. This year, William Hill's pre-season lists bracketed Luton and Blackpool as no better than 50-1 shots for the title.

Well, what do they know? They only got it half right a year ago: the betting was on Manchester City to win the championship, with Fulham as runners-up. They certainly didn't figure Walsall to make it. The Saddlers, who finished second behind Fulham, were marked down as one of the strugglers, offered at a whopping 40-1 for the championship. Put it another way, they thought Walsall would only just scrape clear of relegation, in 20th place.

To be fair to the bookies, they got three out of four right on the relegation positions - their odds marked down Colchester, Lincoln, Macclesfield and York as equal bets for the drop. In the event Colchester escaped in 18th place, while the betting suggested that Northampton, who went down, would be comfortably in the top ten. William Hill had us down for tenth place incidentally, and Blackpool for 16th, two spots lower than they actually finished. We ended up 12th.

Preston, Blackpool's arch-rivals, were expected to struggle along in the bottom six, instead of winning a play-off place.

So what about this season's prospects? Favourites for the title are big-spending Wigan, who invested another £250,000 in their team in the summer. They are at 9-2, with Bristol City second favourites at 7-1.

Then come Reading at 8-1 and Preston at 9-1. Millwall are 10-1 and Gillingham and Brentford 12-1.

At the other end of the table, Colchester and Scunthorpe are both 66-1, which means the bookies mark them down as near-certainties for relegation. The worrying thing is that five teams are lumped together as likely to accompany them, at 50-1 for the title - Luton, Blackpool, Oldham, Wrexham and Wycombe.

The rest of the teams in the division are rated as mid-table prospects, so if the bookies are right at least we are going to have an interesting season, fighting for survival.

And before we put the lid on last season, the Town had a couple of minor entries in the Second Division record books: we provided the opposition for the division's highest league attendance, 36,130 for the midweek match at Manchester City.

And in the summer we were the only Second Division club to sell players to the Premiership, with the £950,00 deals that took Chris Willmott and Kelvin Davis to Wimbledon.

But we were only second highest in terms of raising money through transfers - relegated Bury turned in profits of £1.85million as they brought in four players and got rid of ten.

It didn't do them much harm this week - they opened with a 2-1 home win over Gillingham, and beat Notts County 1-0 at home in the Worthington Cup.

The division's biggest spenders were Reading, with a net outlay of £630,000 to bring in Nicky Foster from Birmingham while selling Tony Barras to Walsall.

Millwall spent £300,000, half on Sean Dyche and half on Paul Moody from Fulham.
