

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WRITE FROM THE TOP

with Ian Holloway

Last Saturday, against Oxford, my team put in a very commanding performance and did everything I asked of them. All that was missing from our first half performance was a goal and I asked them to show me a little bit more devilment and character in the second half. They did just that and I was very, very pleased for them.

Oxford are a good side and have some very talented players and we did exceptionally well to limit them to so few chances. Jason

Roberts picked up the Man of the Match award, but I'm glad I didn't have to make the choice, because it must have been difficult. I felt



that our midfield trio, and our wing backs, were absolutely phenomenal and won every ball and knockdown that mattered.

David Hillier probably had his best game for us since signing from Portsmouth. There's no doubt that the lads are enjoying themselves at the moment and I'm very pleased for them, because they are seeing some rewards, at the moment, for the hard work they have put in.

Tonight we face a Luton side, holding a two goal advantage from the first leg of our Worthington Cup tie at Kenilworth Road. However, the tie is far from over and we expect a hard match and are not taking it for granted that we are already through to the Second Round. Luton's league form is as impressive as our own and they come here on the back of a 2-1 win at Reading last Saturday, so we will need to be at our best to make further progress in a competition in which we have not been too successful in recent years.

Our reserves began their league campaign last week with an excellent result at Norwich and I'll be looking for young players from Garry Thompson's squad to come through into the first team. We now have a situation where

youngsters can learn in the reserve team and if they make mistakes, it is not as vital as it would be in a first team

situation. I believe that young players can break into the first team and do well if they are in a strong team, and they will gain confidence from the people around them. Unfortunately, I had to throw many youngsters in at the

deep end last season and I thought they coped magnificently. However, I would like to protect them a little bit by getting together a really strong first team and then if one or two of them have to come into it, as Marcus Andreasson did at Gillingham, they will be helped by those around them.

It is important that the reserves are playing in a competitive league and if they do well, then standards at the club can only improve. It helps the players as well. When you are a footballer, you need to have a game to look forward to and last year, it was very soul destroying for players in the reserves, as we were playing the same teams as many as four times. Playing in the Avon Insurance Combination means we are playing in a higher standard of football.

There are also changes at youth team level as well, with the formation of The Football League Youth Alliance. This is an U-19 competition, which means that Bobby Zamora, Mike Trought, Ray Johnston and Nathan Ellington can all play in that competition, which is good for them, and the club, as it enhances their development.

A number of our youngsters are being integrated into training sessions with the first team on a regular basis, to get them used to coping with the pressures of being a pro and I am delighted with the way they have responded and believe that the future of this club is very promising.

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VIEW FROM ABOVE

If you were at the Brentford game a couple of weeks ago, give yourself a well-earned pat on the back. You contributed to Bristol Rovers' best attendance for their first home League game of the season since 1974.

That crowd of 8,514 was also the fifth best in the Second Division on the opening day. This continues a very positive trend that is lifting the club out of the doldrums and into the millennium in fine shape.

When Warboys and Banister were in their prime, home crowds were buoyant. An average of over 13,000 clicked through the Eastville turnstiles during the promotion season of 73/74 (the best average gate for 13 years) and a respectable 12,222 for the first campaign in the old Second Division.

However, after Don Megson's dream had been reduced to a grim battle for survival, an alarming almost fatal decline set in. For the next seven seasons, the Eastville crowd diminished year-on-year, so that by 1982 Rovers had lost a terrifying 60% of their 1974 fan base. A similar reduction would see Manchester United's crowds fall from 55,000 to 22,000.

Some of my most enjoyable times as a Rovers supporter came during David Williams' reign from 1983 to 1985, but despite some majestic football at Eastville during that time, the missing thousands never returned. In April 1984, Rovers were poised for promotion. A win at Bournemouth on a lovely spring afternoon would take them into second place. The 'big match' crowd was just 5,032 which would have been the second lowest crowd last season.

But the worst was still to come. The last campaign at Eastville saw crowds plummet to 4,183. Rovers' spiritual home no longer evoked Bradford, Biggs and Jarman. It reeked of poverty, decline and constant failure.

When the Dunfords led Rovers away from Bristol in 1986, they could hardly claim that the club was heading for the Promised Land. They knew the Pirate could soon be walking the plank if the club declined any further. It was a bold gamble that has paid off with spectacular results.

As expected crowds dipped yet again during the first year

at Twerton Park, to a post-war low of 3,242. Then the promise of Gerry Francis's first season added 300 to the gate, but the first real sign that the long haul to recovery had begun came during the play off season of 1988/89. Attendances rose by 50% to 5,259, a bigger average than three of the last five seasons under the shade of the M32. There was life after Eastville; it had simply been a case of taking a step back to go forward.

But Rovers' huge potential remained suffocated at Twerton. The 1989/90 Championship/Wembley campaign was one of the best in the club's history, but the average gate of 6,202 has been smashed in each of the last two seasons. Even the erratic 98/99 campaign drew more fans than Gerry's Invincibles, and all of the last six seasons at Eastville. Some of that increase is the result of football's incredible boom of the late 1990s, but Rovers' return to Bristol and new dynamic image is surely the main factor.

The next big target to aim for must be an average attendance of 7,000. This figure was last surpassed during the free-fall into oblivion, in 1979/80, so it would be wonderful to see this figure on the way up this time.


The increased capacity here is just under 12,000, another huge source of optimism. Just a few years ago, much to our embarrassment, we were struggling to find a club with a lower capacity than Rovers.

Thank heavens for the likes of Crewe and Cambridge, who spared our blushes a little.

Nowadays, we have the 12th biggest ground in Division Two! The prospect of a five-figure gate for big League games, rather than for a one-off visit of David Beckham and his pals, is becoming a reality.

We're still along way from global domination, but when you hear Geoff Dunford's claims that Rovers are set to become the dominant club in Bristol, it no longer seems a pipe dream. After decades of decline, the club is being managed and projected on the right lines, probably for the first time in its history. Spread the Gas Gospel whenever you can, and let's all help to take the club onto a new level.

Generally speaking, it was a good night for Second Division clubs in the First Leg of this season's Worthington Cup. Oxford, Gillingham and Rovers (who recorded their first away win in the competition since 1991) will be favourite to progress to Round Two, following 2-0 wins at Southend, Brighton and Luton respectively.

Chesterfield, 2-1 winners at Rochdale and Wigan who beat York 1-0 will also hope to progress further. Stoke were held to a 1-1 draw at Macclesfield, whilst Bristol City drew 2-2 at Cambridge.

Colchester 'keeper Simon Brown was sent off in the third minute of their match against Crystal Palace, which also finished 2-2. Bournemouth travel to Barnet with a 2-0 lead and Blackpool defend a 2-1 lead at Tramore, whilst Bury and Preston both won 1-0, against Notts County and Wrexham respectively.


Reading were held to a goalless draw at Peterborough, whilst the remaining Second Division sides were all beaten. Cardiff went down 2-1 to Q.P.R and Scunthorpe went down 2-0 at home to Huddersfield, Wycombe also lost at home, where a Keith Curle penalty was enough to give Wolves victory. Brentford were beaten 2-0 by Ipswich at Griffin Park, whilst Oldham (at Stockport) and Millwall (at Swansea) also lost 2-0. Burnley were on the wrong end of a 5-0 hammering by Manchester City and will be playing for their pride only in the Second Leg.




Liam George finds himself surrounded by Rovers players in the first leg at Kenilworth Road





IN TOWN TONIGHT...

Welcome to the Memorial Stadium
Home of Bristol Rovers F.C. and Bristol Rugby Club

You could excuse Luton Town players and supporters for being a little distracted by events off the field in recent months. Their 1999-2000 campaign was only given the go-ahead when a midnight deal was struck with the football league because of a financial crisis. Now, with a new consortium headed by director Cliff Bassett, Luton are hoping they can look ahead and concentrate on affairs on the pitch. There is even some money to spend at last - with Bristol City striker Tony Thorpe believed to be weighing-up a £300,000 transfer back to his former club, though he scored for City last weekend. Of course the ongoing cash crisis has inevitably had an effect on the team's performance. Lennie Lawrence has been unable to sort out short-term contracts for his players, and pre-season departures have heavily outweighed arrivals at Kenilworth Road.

Those leaving the club include promising young goalkeeper **KELVIN DAVIS**, a signing for Wimbledon which will eventually bring in £800,000 to the Bedfordshire club. **CHRIS WILMOTT** also signed for



the Dons for £350,000, and **MICHELL THOMAS, JAMES COX** and **PAUL SHOWLER** have all left on free transfers. Former Bristol City player **SEAN DYCHE** has also departed to Millwall for £150,000.

Luton fans will, however, be heartened by the Hatters' promising start to the season. Defeat by Rovers in the first round of the Littlewoods Cup apart, two wins and a draw in the first two weeks of the season gives hope of a constructive campaign free from the spectre of relegation. One new face at Luton is the charismatic defender **EFETOBOR SODJE**. Rovers' fans will remember him as the Macclesfield man with the bandana - and the player sent off as he struggled to cope with the attentions of Jason Roberts in the final game of last season. He arrived as a free transfer from the Lancashire club pre-season and is likely to play a full part in this campaign after serving a ban for that dismissal. Lawrence has, by necessity, a very young team at Kenilworth Road. The movement of more experienced players has brought chances for several youth team players to break through. The victory over Blackpool emphasised the point - there were just two Hatters players over the age of 22. One player to grab his chance is winger **MATTHEW TAYLOR**. The 17-year-old former youth team player was promoted to the first team this year and has already become a firm favourite with the supporters. **MATTHEW SPRING** was a driving force in the side that reached the FA Youth Cup Final in 1997, and was called up to the full side as a 17-year-old. He and Taylor were probably the pick of the Luton players in the first leg defeat by Rovers, and Spring, now 19, has since picked up a goal against Blackpool.

Centre-half **GARY DOCHERTY** is

another youth team product, who at the age of 19 also offers the option of moving into the front line. Another 19-year-old, **STUART FRASER** is a stylish defender who starred in Luton's youth team in 1998/9. He made just one appearance until this year but has taken his chance and featured in every game so far this season. They are joined in defence by youngster **EMERSON BOYCE**, who has also started to push his way into the first team. One player who has taken full advantage of departures at Kenilworth Road is **NATHAN 'TANNY' ABBEY**. The goalkeeper had his taste of the big time last season and has now become a regular member of the first team following the departure of Kelvin Davis. His new understudy **DANIEL TATE** is yet another product of Luton's youth team.

Providing much-needed experience to the Luton defence are **MARVIN JOHNSON** and **GAVIN MCGOWAN**. At the age of 30, Johnson has become one of the team's veteran players and that is reflected by his role as skipper. A versatile defender he prefers centre-half but can also fill in on the flanks or

in midfield. He is celebrating a full decade as a first-team regular with the Hatters. McGowan struggled to get recognised at Arsenal and eventually signed for Luton for the third time in June last year when the Premiership side offered him a free transfer.

ALAN WHITE is another defender trusted by Lawrence to bring stability to the Luton side. The centre-half was at Middlesbrough, where the Luton boss had taken him on as a 17-year-old. He joined the Hatters as a 21-year-old in 1997 during an injury crisis at Kenilworth Road and has proved good value at £40,000. Rovers fans will be familiar, of course, with Bristol City defender **JULIAN WATTS**, who has also added his experience during his loan spell at Luton Town and played in the first leg Worthington Cup game two weeks ago. Former Scottish under-21 international midfielde



Luton Town supporters will be pleased to keep Lennie Lawrence at the helm.

Ordered to keep the wage bill low, it was to Lawrence's credit that he managed to achieve mid-table respectability last season - one place above Rovers in 12th. manager knows all about running clubs on shoestring budgets, having taken impoverished Charlton to the old First Division and keeping them there for four years against all odds. His predecessor at Kenilworth Road, former Hatters' youth coach Terry Westley, spent £2 million in four months but won only four matches out of 22. Lawrence steadied the ship but was also forced to stop the big spending. After relegation to Division Two, Luton failed by the narrowest of margins to bounce straight back. Last year in contrast was a struggle until the team picked up in the last couple of months. Lawrence started his football career as a non-league player with Croydon, Carshalton and Sutton United. He later became an assistant manager at Plymouth and then Lincoln before his association with Charlton started in the early 1980s, first at reserve level and later as manager. He moved to Middlesbrough in 1991 and enjoyed success with promotion to the Premiership a year later, but after relegation the following season he was replaced by Bryan Robson.

He returned south to Luton after an 18 month spell at Bradford City.

PAUL MCLAREN stepped into the shoes of Welsh international Ceri Hughes when he left for Wimbledon. Another YTS trainee, the midfielder is now one of Luton's most established first team players. Lawrence promoted striker **LIAM GEORGE** from the bench for Luton's second league match against Blackpool and rewarded his manager with a goal.

The Irishman has become a regular member of the Republic's squad that progressed to the European Youth Championships final. At 20 he is

another player who has come through the ranks at Luton.

Northern Ireland player **PHIL GRAY** signed for Luton for a second time in September 1997 but his return has been dogged by a back injury. The £400,000 signing has valuable experience, with spells at Spurs, Sunderland, Nancy in France and Dutch side Fortuna Sittard.

Pacey striker **STUART DOUGLAS** was a hot shot in Luton's youth side and reserves and was still a trainee when he made his debut. He has taken on the number nine shirt again this year after problems with injury last season.

Another local discovery is **ANDREW FOTIADIS**. An old-fashioned centre-forward, he has England schoolboy caps at under 15 and 18 level and has the physique and power to worry opposition defences. Winger **ANDRE SCARLETT** will hope to gain more opportunities in the first team this season. He made an immediate impact on his debut last October, drawing an Oldham player into a tackle which earned a red card before netting the winner.

Without wishing to be unkind to Luton there was not a great deal of



Whilst the circumstances are somewhat different this evening complacency will certainly not be in evidence come kick-off time.

Whilst I won't be here to witness our progress into the second round

There is one glaring exception in my memory to this, of course. Ashton Gate on Wednesday October 9th, 1991. 
It is impossible that any true Bristol Rovers fan will forget the six second-half goals at Reading last season, but unlikely that anyone present today recalls victory at Doncaster forty-three years ago. Yet, one common link unites these two games. Only twice in Rover's long history has the Club scored ten goals against another side in a league season - Reading was one, Jamie Cureton contributing five and Doncaster Rovers in 1956-57 was the other. When Rovers travelled to Belle Vue in 1956, Britain was on the brink of war. Newly-elected President Nasser of Egypt had seized all revenue from the Suez Canal and Prime Minister Anthony Eden was attempting to avert an international crisis. Rovers retained the side which had drawn 1-1 at Orient forty-eight hours earlier, while the home side recalled right-half Patrick Gavin and centre-forward Ron Walker for Eddie McMorran and Morgan Hunt. A crowd of 9,314 saw Rovers record an easy victory with goals from Geoff Bradford (two), Peter Hooper and Dai Ward, with Tom Ewing (penalty) and John Mooney scoring for the home side. The following December, a quickfire Dai

ON THIS DATE

Ward hat-trick and a 6-1 victory completed the first ten goal haul in Rover's seasonal league history. On the same day in 1956, tonight's visitors Luton Town won 2-1 at Charlton in a First Division fixture. The Hatters finished the season in sixteenth place, with Charlton bottom, while Manchester United won a second successive league championship.

25th August 1936

Twenty years prior to the Doncaster game, Rovers played Bristol City at

cricket in a curtain-raiser to the new season. 1935-36 had seen Rovers concede a Club record 95 league goals, a total still unsurpassed in the Club's history, including the demoralising twelve goal hammering at Luton on Easter Monday. The cricket fixture was designed to lift spirits and it certainly did so in the Rovers camp, as the old rivals from Ashton Gate were beaten by fifteen runs. Rovers were fortunate to have excellent opening batsmen in centre-half Allan Murray, a competent club cricketer, and goalkeeper Newman Bunce, who had made his county debut for Somerset earlier in the summer. Twenty five year old Bunce played only twice for Rovers but fourteen times for Somerset, scoring 227 runs with a highest county score of 46, he also once took 3-81 in a county match. Rovers' cricketing connections are numerous, not least in that Newman Bunce is one of nine players who also appeared in county cricket, the most famous being the England batsman Wally Hammond. In 1952 the former Rovers left-back Charles Littlewood organised a cricket match between Rovers and a Duke of Beaufort XI. Littlewood top-scored for the Duke's side with 26 runs out of a total of 164 all out. Rovers scored 75-5, with Ronnie Dix scoring 23.


