

Inside Forward



TWO managers and the player were all happy when Neil Midgley signed to stay with us for another month on loan. George Burley at Ipswich is pleased that the young striker - he was 21 ten days ago - is getting first team experience, which was unlikely to be available for some time at Portman Road.

Midgley is enjoying his time with us, and so is Lennie Lawrence. "He's finding his feet, and he gives us another option," said the boss

Liam George is also pretty happy with the new man, having already picked up a couple of goals made by Midgley's determined approach play. But the striker sits it out today, because Ipswich did not want him to be cup-tied. Fortunately, Phil Gray has made good progress since his hamstring injury, and should be able to return.

Adam Locke was still considering an offer of a new contract as we went to press. Having taken two one-month deals while we were in receivership, he felt he deserved more than the contract on offer this time, to run until the end of the year.

At 29, he wanted a deal to run to the end of the season at least. Experienced, and a First Division player less than a year ago, he was this week taking time to consider the Town's offer. He was due to make a decision yesterday.

Lennie Lawrence said he had offered the best deal he could in all the circumstances, and hoped Locke would accept it.

The boss is under pressure from the board to get his wages bill back within budget, and that was one of the reasons he changed his mind about taking goalkeeper Mark Cartwright from Wrexham last week. He did not want an extra pay packet for a player who was only expected to sit on the bench.

DETERMINED to protect the Town's exciting young talents into the new millennium, the manager this week agreed contract extensions for two who have become regulars in the league side this season. Leading scorer Liam George, 20, has agreed a deal to run to June 2001, and 17-year-old wing-back Matthew Taylor has signed a new contract which continues until the summer of 2002.

IF TODAY'S match is drawn, the replay will be at Kingstonian on Wednesday November 10, kick-off 7.45pm. See page 11 for ticket details. If it happens travel advice will be in next Saturday's programme.

OUR match at Cambridge, scheduled for November 13, is now to be played on the previous evening, Friday November 12 (7.45) to avoid a clash with the England v Scotland Euro 2000 play-off game, which

will be on television. The Town and Cambridge agreed on the switch, and decided Friday evening was a better bet than a Sunday afternoon.

HOW'S the team playing? What do you think of the Kenilworth Road hamburgers? Have you got a question about the policing of football at Luton Town? The club is ready to listen to its supporters, and on Thursday week, November 11, there will be a unique opportunity for fans to put their questions to the people who matter.

Luton Town Supporters Club is hosting a Fans Forum in the Eric Morecambe lounge, and the brave club personalities willing to sit on the panel and take questions are club captain Marvin Johnson, commercial executive John Bailey, catering officer Fiona Wallace and safety officer Geoff Lovell. And if you want to have a go at the programme editor, he too will be in attendance.

Tickets are available from the LTSC kiosk on match days, or on the night if there are any available by then. They cost £2 for LTSC members, and £3 for others. Doors open at 7pm, and kick-off will be at 7.30 sharp - Marvin will not want to be too late getting home to bed the night before a match.

REPORTS that defender Alan White was on the point of signing for his home town club Darlington are premature at best, but a deal could be in the offing in the near future. He joined us for £40,000 from Middlesbrough just over two years ago, when three of the regular back four were injured, but has been unable to gain a regular place in our league side.

Gary Doherty has come through to overtake him in the pecking order, and Efe Sodje is next in line, so 23-year-old White has dropped to the rear of the queue for hat is now a back three.

It is frustrating for him, and the prospect of nothing more than regular reserve team football is not too appealing, and Lennie Lawrence is not surprised that White would like the chance of first team football somewhere else.

As he was born in Darlington, a transfer to the North East club would not be a bad move for White, but recent reports in the press have ignored the fact that they, like us, have to keep the wages down, and word from Feethams is that while they would like to recruit White, they must first do a spot of unloading so that they can afford to pay him.

THE in-tray at Kenilworth Road was overflowing this week as supporters took up the invitation of new chairman Cliff Bassett to give their views about Luton Town and its future. The club thanks everyone who took the trouble to write in. Every suggestion will be looked at.



The Manager

Lennie Lawrence



LAST Saturday's win at Oxford ended a very good eight-day spell for us, starting with the end of receivership and the gathering of seven points out of nine. We were overdue for an away win - and an away goal! - and it was to the players' credit that it was gained so professionally at the Manor Ground, particularly after the effort that was called for to get back and save a point against Wycombe in midweek.

The result at Oxford turned out to be very important, because it was a day when nearly all the top teams did well, and we needed a good result to stay in touch with the leading pack. We have shown we are a top eight team, and now I want to see us push on from there. We will be tested again on Tuesday, when we are away to Millwall, and I trust we will go there with the unbeaten run still intact.

Three games without defeat have set us up nicely for today's cup-tie, and it is a pleasure to welcome Kingstonian to Kenilworth Road. They have made amazing progress in recent years, and they have an excellent pedigree as FA Cup fighters. And that goes for their experienced manager, Geoff Chapple, who has a long record of success. At Woking he led his team to three FA Trophy finals in four seasons, and he has steered Kingstonian up from the Ryman League into the top two of the Conference.

I also have great respect for Chris Kelly, an astute chief executive at Kingstonian, although you might remember him better when he was "The Leatherhead Lip" in a non-league team that almost knocked Leicester City out of the FA Cup.

That might be in the past, but there is a lesson for us today in recalling the exploits of non-league teams in the cup. Make no mistake, Kingstonian are in with a shout of promotion to join the Football League next season. They looked a very useful side when I saw them win their cup replay at Boston, and they had another good win in the Conference last week, 2-1 at Morecambe. Today's opposition may be

non-league, but there are the equivalent of a decent Third Division side.

We haven't forgotten the pain of being knocked out at home by a lowly Third Division club last season, and I am sure you all remember the problems we had disposing of non-league Boreham Wood.

We have a serious game on our hands today, and we will have to be well prepared and focused. Kingstonian have a good away record, and experienced attackers in David Leworthy and Dwight Marshall. Doubtless Dwight would enjoy it if he and his pals embarrass us today.

It has all the ingredients of a good cup-tie, and we must be mindful that at this stage of the competition it is quite common for half a dozen league teams to be knocked out by non-league sides. The giant-killers will make tomorrow's headlines, and good luck to them. We must make sure we are not among the victims.

We ought not to be. We are playing well, with good spirit and commitment, and a proud home record to defend. We need to win today, and to get through the second round as well. Not until the third round do you have a chance of making money from the cup, and we want our share and a little bit of the glory that cup success can attract.

I will be delighted if we show the professionalism that was the basis of the victory at Oxford. It was very important to get the first goal, and then it was vital that we held on to the lead. The goal was very well worked, and Oxford very rarely threatened to cancel it out.

We had the spectre of Oldham in mind: at Boundary Park we played excellent football in the first half, failed to score, and were over-run after the interval. That was hard to bear, and we asked the players to learn from it. At Oxford, they did.

We will need professionalism again today, but we have every confidence in our ability, especially with home advantage. I hope it is a game and a result that we and the supporters can all enjoy.

Captain's Log

Marvin Johnson



AFTER getting a very important result at Oxford last week, the FA Cup gives us a chance today to keep the momentum going, with a little extra excitement around the game.

I know league points are top priority for us, but even after my ten years as a first team player I still feel an

extra tingle preparing for a cup-tie. As a kid I was always up early on FA Cup final day, to watch every minute of the TV coverage from mid-morning to late at night. I dreamed of playing at Wembley one day, and I still do.

While we are confident in our own ability we will not under-estimate Kingstonian. On the day it is 11 players versus 11, and I suppose Kingstonian will see today as their cup final.

The game is a one-off, and Dwight Marshall has already told me he fancies Kingstonian's chances, and he would enjoy knocking in a goal or two against us. I am sure he will read this before kick-off, so sorry Beamer, much as we like seeing you back, you will have to go home disappointed!

Dwight's nickname, incidentally, says a lot about him. When he first came to the club, what struck us most was that he was a lovely lad, with a wonderful smile - it was always on full-beam. I hope he has not got much to beam about this evening!

Like the rest of us, he is looking forward to the match, and I have apologised to him in advance for anything I might have to do to him during the game - nothing personal Beamer, but I am due for a good cup run.

So far as I can recall, I have yet to play in anything beyond the fourth round. I was injured when we went to Wembley for the semi-final in 1994. The following year I suffered with the team that was thrashed by Matt Le Tissier in a fourth round replay at The Dell, and as you know we haven't made too much of an FA Cup impact since then.

I was rested last year when Hull City dumped us out at Kenilworth Road, and that hurt. It is a

lesson for us - league placings count for little in the FA Cup.

Kingstonian are a top Conference side, and have a lot of good players. David Leworthy is a very dangerous attacker, and I remember having problems against him in the reserves when he was at Spurs.

Our team is likely to include one or two who have yet to sample an FA Cup match, and while today's game is a tricky hurdle to overcome, it should be an occasion to enjoy.

I am not suggesting we should have Wembley in our thoughts just yet, but who knows? If we can win today, and then get the luck of the draw with home ties, anything is possible. Last season in the Worthington Cup we showed that on our day we could more than match Premiership teams, and the glamour of the FA Cup is all about shocks and upsets.

In some ways, I would rather be playing a league game today, because we are on a bit of a roll, and want to keep it going, to stay up with the leading bunch in the Second Division.

So I am pleased that we have our next league game in a few days, at Millwall, on a ground where we have done well in recent years.

If we can perform like we did at Oxford, we have every reason to be confident. We needed that win after losing four away matches on the trot, and the game plan worked perfectly. We were invited to kick down the slope in the first half, which we would have done if I had won the toss. The plan was to hit Oxford with an early goal, and we did - and what a beauty. The passing that led up to it was tremendous.


The requirement after that was simple - don't concede a goal, don't do anything silly, and success would be assured. It was, and in the end, we could easily have had two or three more goals with our sharp counter-attacking.

I can tell you we all felt very pleased with our day's work as we came home from Oxford, and I just hope that we can earn the same satisfaction today. Give us your support, and we will do our best.

Treatment Room

Clive Goodyear




WITH no new injury worries cropping up from the game at Oxford, we were having a good week in the treatment room until Thursday, after two players had to be subbed during the reserves match at Bristol on the previous evening.

Tresor Kandol and Andre Scarlett both suffered ankle injuries, and at the time of writing it was not clear how serious they might be.

Scarlett suffered his when he was kicked, and was very sore as we travelled home. It was going to be touch and go for him in his efforts to be fit for the bench this afternoon.

Kandol developed a limp during the Bristol match, and my early verdict was that he might have a strained ligament. Again, it had to be a case of waiting to see how it settled down before giving a firm diagnosis.

My best news for the boss this week was to clear Phil Gray for a return after his hamstring problem. We know it was connected with posture - that was confirmed when Gray underwent a bio-mechanical examination at a specialist clinic where they study these things. They video-tape the patient in action,

and then use slow-motion studies to check every aspect of the action.

In Gray's case, it confirmed that his hamstring nerve difficulty has cleared up, and he has been training with the rest of the first team this week. Subject to final considerations yesterday, I expect him to be able to return to the team this afternoon.

Andrew Fotiadis is looking forward to the day when we can say the same about him, but he still has some way to go before his knee ligament injury is completely cured. The good news is that he is now running at about half pace, but nothing more than that. He is not yet able to twist and turn, and next week he will go to Lilleshall for further treatment and training. After that, he might be able to look for a return to full exertion in two or three weeks.

You may recall that Gavin McGowan had the Lilleshall experience recently after his knee ligament injury, and I am glad to say that he is now not far away from full training. His has improved greatly recently, and he is now able to run, twist and turn. But he has not played a game for the best part of six months, so he will have to work hard on general fitness. He will be monitored closely, but has to complete the equivalent of a pre-season training schedule. I hope he will be at full training level in a couple of weeks.

Landry Zahana-Oni will also go to Lilleshall next week, having recently stepped up the pace of his training, and he is now not far away from a full recovery.

The same goes for reserve goalkeeper Daniel Tate, who has had a shoulder injury. He is improving day by day, working to strengthen the muscles in and around his shoulder, and should be training again next week, and ready to play in a fortnight or so.

I have been contacted by several supporters who raised concerns about the way some Luton Town fans were allowed access to the game at Oxford.

Some were let in through a side gate, and we took up the matter with Oxford. They have advised us that their safety officer approved the action to help speed up the flow of people into the ground. The weather was awful, and it was done with the best of intentions.

The numbers going through that gate were added to the official attendance, and congratulations to our fans yet again - over 1,500 were there to cheer on the team, a magnificent following.

Speaking of our determination to listen to our customers, one of the points emerging from the questionnaires distributed at the last home game is the fact that we seem to have hidden our light under a bushel about some of the things we do within the local community. For instance, our community department distributes free match tickets to schools every week. We also give free entry to juniors who are members of the Chiltern Youth League clubs, if they are accompanied by a paying adult, and the same facility has just this week been extended to the Vauxhall Mini-Soccer League.

Free tickets are also given to many local clubs for the disabled and under-privileged, and we

offer discounts to students and people who are out of work. Cheap season tickets are available for children - £30 for under-11s and £60 for under-16s. Incidentally, season tickets for all are always on sale, at a pro rata rate depending on the stage of the season, and they offer a saving on normal match day prices.

We also give active support to various parent and teacher associations in a wide area around Luton, for instance offering them free tickets for their schools fund-raising activities.

We are still going through the questionnaires supporters have sent in, and we will look at every suggestion made. We are always pleased to hear from you: it's easy to talk to us - just give us a ring.

Finally, confirmation of a couple of cup-tie arrangements. If today's game is drawn, the replay will be at Kingstonian on Wednesday week, November 10 (7.45). Please see page 11 for ticket details.

And congratulations to our youth team, for reaching the Times FA Youth Cup second round (see page 43). We have been drawn at home again, also on Wednesday week, in the second round to Maidenhead. Kick-off will be at 7.45 and admission will be £3 for adults, £1 for concessions. Only the Main Stand and Enclosure will be in use, but entrances will be open at both ends of the ground, at Maple Road and Kenilworth Road.

CASH ADMISSION TO KENILWORTH ROAD

THE increasing popularity of cash turnstiles at matches has led to changes starting with next Saturday's game against Burnley. They should simplify procedures for the benefit of supporters, but please note that as attendances are rising, the only way to be sure of getting into the ground, and of getting the kind of seat you want, is to buy tickets in advance.

As from next Saturday all tickets for blocks F and G of the Main Stand which are unsold at 1.30pm on the day of the match will only be available at cash turnstiles. Prices are £13.50 for block F, £7 for concessions, and £9 for block G. They will be sold on a first come, first served, basis. Our experience so far is that the £9 seats sell out first, and some supporters are disappointed when they discover that there are none left at that price when they arrive at the turnstile.

Other cash turnstiles for the Main Stand, New Stand and the Kenilworth Stand will still be available. To avoid disappointment we strongly urge supporters to buy tickets in advance. They go on sale a month before games, and there are discounts for early purchase. You can buy in person at the ticket office, or by credit or debit card on the phone to Luton 416976, on the credit card hotline on Luton 730758, or by post.


carrying the colours



GEOFF CHAPPLE

MANAGER

Geoff is probably the best known manager in non-league football. He is certainly one, if not the most, successful during the last twenty plus years, firstly with Windsor and Eton then with Woking with whom he won three FA Trophy Finals in four years and took them from Division Two South of the Isthmian League to runners-up in the Conference on two occasions. The FA Cup runs that Woking achieved under Geoff are legendary including their 4-2 victory at West Bromwich Albion which shook the whole nation before eventually losing 1-0 to Everton in the fourth round in front of 35,000 spectators at Goodison Park.

Geoff's success at Kingstonian has been phenomenal. In his first season (1997/98) he led them to the Ryman League championship and they also won the Surrey Senior Cup, beating Woking after a replay. Last season Geoff masterminded their greatest prize yet by winning the FA Trophy at Wembley by beating Forest Green Rovers 1-0. He is the first manager to achieve success on four occasions. Kingstonian's first year in the Nationwide Conference saw them maintain a top six position throughout the majority of the season. It was only in the last few weeks that the League form tailed off as the cup run took over. Kingstonian also reached the second round of the FA Cup before going out to Leyton Orient after a replay.

During his spell at Aldershot he became their Manager at the time they were going out of business and he proved what a great motivator he is by persuading his team to play despite not being paid. Ian deserves the success that he is currently achieving more than most for what he and his family endured during those dark days.

More recently he has been a coach at Millwall and Portsmouth.

COLIN LIPPIATT

COACH

Rejoined Kingstonian in October 1999 and thus with Geoff Chapple resumed one of the most successful partnerships ever in non-league football. During his playing career Colin was a centre back with Hayes, Wokingham and

Maidenhead United. His managerial career began with Windsor & Eton and Farnborough before linking up with Geoff Chapple at Woking. During that time the pair guided Woking from the Isthmian League Division 2 to the upper reaches of the Football Conference. Along the way his coaching skills ensured that Woking picked up many trophies, and had famous runs in the FA Cup and three FA Trophy winners medals. Was at Kingstonian for a short period in 1997 before joining Yeovil as Head Coach.

DEREK ALLAN

A central defender who joined Kingstonian at the start of the season. Has played for Ayr United and Southampton. He then went on loan to Brighton in March 1996 and created such an impression that he was signed permanently at the start of the 1997/8 season and became a regular in the first team making over 90 appearances. Has played for the Scottish under 21 team. His never say die attitude is a great benefit to the Kingstonians.

EDDIE AKUAMOAH

A fast and tricky forward who is a prolific goalscorer. He is currently the K's longest serving player having signed from Carshalton Athletic in August 1993.

Played for the British Students XI at the Student World Games in Japan in 1996. Has a degree in Politics and Economics. Honours include Ryman Isthmian League Champions Medal in 1997/98 and FA Trophy Winners Medal in 1998/99 season.

Has made a total of over 330 league appearances for Burnley, Swansea City, Gillingham and Cardiff. Joined K's at the beginning of the 1998/99 season and quickly became a favourite with the crowd. Was yet another member of the Kingstonian Trophy winning team last season.

RICHARD HURST

Goalkeeper who joined the Kingstonians at the beginning of the season having previously been on Queens Park Rangers books.

JUNIOR KADI

Midfield. Started his career with Coventry who offered him professional terms. Transferred to Whyteleafe at the beginning of last season and joined K's in August 1999. He is one to watch for the future.

MICHAEL LESTER

A defender who after many fine displays in the reserve team has been given the chance to prove himself at first team level. Is likely to feature more regularly this season.

DAVID LEWORTHY

Forward. Needs no introduction to followers of non-league football. He was the subject of a record transfer fee of £50,000 between non-league clubs when Dover Athletic signed him from Farnborough Town. David has played league football for Portsmouth, Tottenham Hotspur – who sold him to Oxford United for £175,000 – and Reading. He is a superbly talented forward who is a prolific goal scorer. Honours include four non-league England caps and has represented the FA XI 4 times. David gained a League Cup Winners medal with Oxford United. Signed from Rushden & Diamonds at the beginning of the 1997/98 season for a fee of £18,000.

Has added an FA Umbro Trophy Winners Medal, Ryman Isthmian Champions Medal to his collection since joining the Kingstonians.

COLIN LUCKETT

Defender/Midfield. A scorer of some stunning and important goals, Cohn is a favourite with K's supporters. He made his debut in August 1994 and has remained loyal to the club ever since. Has won a Ryman's Isthmian Champions medal (1997/8) and of course an FA Umbro Trophy Winners Medal last season. Was formerly with Millwall.

DWIGHT MARSHALL

Striker who was Plymouth Argyle's leading scorer last season with 12 goals in 21 games. Dwight's skills have made an immediate impression. Was previously with Hampton Leyton Wingate, Kingsbury and Grays Athletic before moving to Plymouth. After 3 seasons Dwight transferred to Luton Town before returning to Plymouth in October of last season.

Wing back who scored a goal on his debut for K's. Signed from Barnet in August 1998, where he made 11 first team appearances. Previously with Wimbledon and Kettering. Won Match Magazine Nationwide Conference Player of the Month Award for March 1999. Highlight of his career to date was when he scored the only goal of the game in the FA Trophy Final against Forest Green last season.

GARY PATTERSON

A midfielder who started his career with Notts County and then transferred to Shrewsbury Town (over 60 appearances) where he won a Division Three Winners medal. He was signed at the beginning of the 1997/98 season from Wycombe Wanderers with whom he also made over 60 appearances. He covers every inch of the pitch during each game. Won two caps for the non-league England side last season. Was voted Club Player and Supporters' Player for season 1998/89. Gary's honours also include a Ryman Isthmian League Champions Medal and the FA Umbro Trophy Winners Medal.

GEOFF PITCHER

Midfield. A superb passer of the ball now in his second spell for the K's. Geoff returned at the beginning of the 1997/98 season from Colchester United. Millwall v Luton Town

Tuesday 2nd November, kick-off 7.45pm

WE ARE back to Second Division action in South London on Tuesday evening. Driving to Millwall, especially through the London rush hour, can be a strain, so Town on Tour and the Bobbers Travel Club might be a sensible way of getting to the New Den. Public transport is also worth considering: take the train from Luton to Kings Cross, tube to London Bridge, and then to New Cross or Surrey Quays and walk to the Den.

Town on Tour offers its best deals to Luton Town Supporters Club members, and their coaches will leave Maple Road at 4.45pm. The fare is £7.50 for adult members of LTSC, £6 for concessions, and £8.50 for all others. You can book at the LTSC kiosk in Kenilworth Road before or after today's game, or through the club shop at other times.

The Bobbers Travel Club, which welcomes new members, will have a coach leaving Cranfield at 3.45pm, with various pick-up points on the way to Luton, and departure time from Kenilworth Road is 4.45. The fare is £6.50 adults, and £5.50 for junior

and senior citizens and tickets can be bought at the Bobbers Travel Club kiosk before home matches, but not after, or by phone call to Paul Deason after 6pm on 01234 750996

You can leave your car at Maple Road, with security guards in attendance until the coaches get back. The cost is £3 per vehicle, but you must book, in advance, through the club shop.

If you want to drive, our advice is to give yourself plenty of time and use the motorway route to avoid going through central London. Take the M1 south from Luton, then go east on the M25. Leave M25 at junction 27 to join the M11, signposted towards London east and City. After 4.8 miles, at a roundabout, take the third exit onto the A13, still heading towards the City. Watch for the signs to the Blackwall Tunnel, and go through that and on to the A102(M) for two miles. At a roundabout take the A2, signposted towards central London, into Shooters Hill, through Blackheath, and follow the signs towards Deptford and New Cross.

Go straight on at cross-roads near the George and Dragon pub, over the next set of traffic lights, and then take the right turn filter signposted towards Rotherhithe Tunnel and Tower Bridge, into Deptford Church Street. Go straight on at the first roundabout, then left at the next lights, still signposted towards Tower Bridge, and after just over half a mile you will see a left turn signposted to the New Den.

Mileage from Luton: 46.

If we have a replay at Kingstonian, travel details will be in next Saturday's programme.

Blast FROM THE Past

Luton Town v Kingstonian



FA Cup ties often throw up intriguing clashes with old players and today is no exception when we welcome back one of the most popular forwards to grace Kenilworth Road in recent times — Dwight Marshall.

Although born in Jamaica, Dwight moved to England as a youngster playing his early football in London. It was while playing in a game for Holloway Schools that the referee, of all people, recommended him to Hampton and from there he moved on through the London non-League circles turning out for Leyton-Wingate, Kingsbury and finally Hayes.

By now the chances of an opening in the Football League seemed to have passed 25 year old Dwight by and he had settled down to a job as an administrator in Local Government. Out of the blue came an invitation for a trial at Crystal Palace and although he felt he did well, nothing came of it but Palace's coach Wally Downes recommended Dwight to Plymouth manager David Kemp who was desperately looking for a forward.

"I remember sitting on the train going to Plymouth for my trial and thinking what a trek it was and that there would be no way that I would sign for Argyle even if they wanted me," recalled Dwight. After taking part in a three day tournament against Premiership opposition his misgivings disappeared and he signed on the dotted line.

Dwight quickly made up for lost time, scoring on his debut for Plymouth against Barnsley at Home Park, and finished up as top scorer in his first season with 14 goals to his name. Unfortunately the next highest scorer netted only four times as Argyle were relegated from Division One, albeit on the last day.

The following season was punctuated by injury and looked like being one to forget until Lennie Lawrence took him on loan to Middlesbrough where he achieved a major ambition in turning out in the Premiership.

Back at Home Park in 1993/94, with fitness problems behind him, it was a return to goalscoring ways with Plymouth narrowly failing to win promotion, losing to Burnley in the play-offs. By this time, however, the bigger clubs were taking notice and both Luton and Southend of Division One tabled bids of £150,000.

"I was more impressed by the set-up at Kenilworth Road as well as the coaching staff and manager David Pleat and decided to move to Luton, a decision I never had cause to regret. It took me a time to get going but once I had settled in I finished top scorer for the Hatters in my first season."


After making his debut at home to West Brom, Dwight opened his goalscoring account at Fulham in the Coca-Cola Cup before netting his first league goal in the 1-0 victory at Port Vale.

"We had a really good side at Luton and I was lucky enough to play alongside Scott Oakes, John Hartson, John Taylor and the legend, Kerry Dixon in my first season there. I can well remember winning 3-2 at Wolves, who were top of the table at the time, and the 5-1 thrashing of Middlesbrough, who eventually finished champions."

Dwight's second season at Kenilworth Road was not nearly so successful with the Town ending up relegated to Division Two for the first time since 1970. Even so the Hatters went on an eight game unbeaten run after the mid-season appointment of Lennie Lawrence and had managed to pull themselves out of the bottom three.

Dwight Marshall was on fire during this run but a broken ankle at Sunderland spelt the end of his season and the team went into free-fall at the same time. Most Luton supporters still feel that with Dwight in the side we would have avoided the drop.

"I took a long time to get over the injury and was out of the side for nine months. I eventually reappeared in a home game against Bristol Rovers and managed to score. Pure adrenaline kept me

going during those first few games back and the goals went in but after that initial rush I had to sit back to let Tony Thorpe, who had taken his opportunity following my injury, grab the scoring headlines."

"We were unlucky to miss out in the play-offs and naturally thought that we would stand a good chance in the following season. Unfortunately the 1997/98 campaign was another disaster with injuries, not just to myself, ruining everything. By this time though I could see that I needed to think about moving on as Lennie had several young forwards thrusting for a first team place. I certainly have no bad feelings as Lennie, who I hold in the highest regard, went out of his way to find me another club."

It was back to his old stamping at Plymouth that Dwight returned a year ago but even in a shortened season he still finished top scorer for

Argyle. After spending this last close season in contract negotiations with Plymouth that seemed to be going nowhere in stepped Geoff

Chapple of Kingstonian and terms were hammered out in a matter of hours.

"I am really enjoying my football at Kingstonian and even though I have yet to score this season we are currently second in the Conference. It will be great, though, to come back to Kenilworth Road where I always had such a great rapport with the supporters."

In closing Dwight wished to pass on his thanks to everyone at the club as well as the fans for the support he received at Kenilworth Road especially at the time he suffered from his broken ankle. We in turn thank him for all the electrifying goals he scored as well as the smile that lit up Kenilworth Road whenever he played.


OCTOBER HALF TERM COACHING

TODAY'S FA Cup visit of Kingstonian sees the return of a striker who was one of our most popular players, Dwight Marshall, and to mark the occasion we once again feature the products of the famous Italian Panini factory.

Normally the Modena company featured only Premiership players, but in 1995 they brought out packets of stickers concentrating on the Football League, and included in the 600-strong series was the entire Hatters first team squad. Marshall was on card No. 123.

That 1994/95 season was Marshall's first at Kenilworth Road, after David Pleat signed him in the summer from Plymouth Argyle.

The slightly-built Jamaican-born forward immediately formed a successful partnership with Kerry Dixon which proved particularly fruitful in away games. Marshall's first goal for us came at Port Vale in a 1-0 victory in September, and the Town were not beaten again on their travels until mid-December.

In all he was involved in 45 league matches that season, scoring 11 goals to be our leading marksman. His goals, together with his quick turn of pace, soon endeared him to the Kenilworth Road faithful. A brace in the 5-1 thrashing of eventual First Division champions Middlesbrough were especially memorable.

Born in October 1970, Marshall was a late entrant into full-time professional football. He was 24 when Plymouth were sufficiently impressed by his performances at Grays Athletic to risk £35,000 on him. It was money well spent - Marshall quickly adjusted to the higher standard, and was soon among the goals at Home Park. However, the distance from Plymouth to his family in London was a major factor in his decision to sign for the Town in July 1994 for £150,000.

In his second season with us, there was even greater onus on Marshall to perform well, because fellow strikers Dixon and the promising John Hartson had both moved on.

The Town struggled in the first half of the campaign, but by the time they prepared for a visit to Sunderland in late February it looked as though we had turned the corner. But tragedy struck at Roker Park when in what at first looked like an innocuous incident Marshall went down in a heap. It turned out to be a broken leg, which was to keep him out of the first team until the following November, by which time we had been relegated to the Second Division.

Marshall's value to the team, and a reminder of what we missed, was underlined by the fact that at the time he broke his leg he was our leading scorer again, with 11 goals in 29 league and cup appearances. And he was our top marksman when the season ended - Bontcho Guentchev was the only man near him, with nine goals.

Despite a brief flurry of goals after his return, Marshall was in and out of the side for the next two years, before rejoining Plymouth midway through last season. In his career at Luton Marshall had netted 28 league goals and nine in cup-ties.

His second spell at Home Park lasted only until the summer, when he moved on again to join Kingstonian in the Conference. All who remember him here will wish him every success - except for this afternoon, naturally!

As with most Panini stickers, those bearing the likes of Marshall, and colleagues such as Scott Oakes, Steve Davis, Kerry Dixon, Trevor Peake and Marvin Johnson, are still in plentiful supply, and very reasonably-priced.

Action Replay

Oxford United 0 Luton Town 1 (HT 0-1)

THERE were all sorts of reasons for Town fans to enjoy their day out at the Manor Ground on Saturday: the first double of the season, the first clean sheet in ten attempts, and the end of a run of four consecutive away defeats. But perhaps the most important cause for satisfaction within the camp was the sheer professionalism, discipline and organisation of a predominantly young team in showing they knew how to do a necessary job to protect an early lead.

There was real personal pleasure too, for Lennie Lawrence, not only in seeing his demands answered so emphatically, but in making the right tactical changes to cancel out those of the opposing manager. Malcolm Shotton paid a high price – he resigned 48 hours later.

As a spectacle, the game was not a great crowd-pleaser - no cavalier heroics by a Town team that concentrated on holding what they had, and none from the home side who seemed incapable of turning on a bit of style. The Town would not let them, and long before the end Oxford were showing all the signs of lack of confidence brought on by their fifth consecutive defeat, and not a goal scored in the last four games.

That sagging confidence was battered within three minutes of the kick-off, when Neil Midgley and Stuart Douglas worked the ball down the Town's right flank. Midgley's low cross took out the goalkeeper, and Liam George accepted the open goal, to net for the ninth time this season. Oxford had their share of the ball after that, but not in the areas where it mattered most and as the Town settled for a policy of containment and counter-attack, the only first-half scare was when Joey Beauchamp's 25-yard drive caught a deflection and hit a post.

Douglas tested Andre Arendse twice before the Oxford bench made a double substitution near the hour mark, to play four up front, and three at the back.

The extra striker was beefy Steve Anthrobus, and just once he was allowed a clear sight of goal, but headed Jamie Lambert's good centre high over the bar.

The Town responded with two substitutions of their own, adding Adam Locke and Michael McIndoe to stiffen midfield, and leaving George as the lone striker.




The change snuffed out the one man who looked like creating mischief, Beauchamp. He was never allowed to get in any more threatening crosses, and in the closing minutes ragged Oxford were lucky to escape a heavier beating, with George thwarted by a goalkeeper's block in the closing minutes.

"We controlled the game," said the Town manager. "Oxford didn't offer too much threat except for long range shots. We knew they would have a bit of a go at us when they were playing down the slope in the second half. We were determined not to have a repetition of the Oldham fiasco, when we should have been three up at half time and then got battered in the second half. We had spoken to the players about that, and said it was a learning experience with a group of young players. They had to learn to win 1-0 after the chastening experience at Oldham.

"This was a step forward for us. We don't want end-to-end exciting stuff and then drop points. Sometimes we have all gone charging forward away from home, and we have paid for that."

Luton Town 1 Wycombe Wanderers 1 (HT 0-1)

THE MIRACLE men from Wycombe, fall-guys for just about everybody when they last came to Luton, demonstrated at Kenilworth Road the huge strides they have made since Lawrie Sanchez took over as manager in January, a few days after we had beaten them 3-1 in a bad-tempered affair. This time the Chairboys were well-organised and disciplined, and forced the Town to fight back from a goal down to preserve the unbeaten home record.

We were indebted to the sharpness of Stuart Douglas, for the second consecutive match, for another poacher's goal, this time a beautifully-placed glancing header which might have sparked a winning revival.

In the event, it was worth a point, and both managers held similar views on the game. Sanchez and Lennie Lawrence both said they thought their sides might have nicked a win, but overall were content with the draw.

We scarcely looked like getting it in the first half, when Wycombe showed how well they had done their homework. They marked Liam George tightly, which cut down our attacking threat, and drew us into a long-ball game, which suited them a lot more than it did us.

The result was that we rarely got to close quarters in the Wycombe penalty area, although a couple of fast crosses flew across the goal-mouth with no-one able to get a touch.

Wycombe's tactics clamped down on the overlapping by Stuart Fraser and Matthew Taylor, and in the first half they had the better of things simply by ensuring the ball spent more time nearer to our penalty area than theirs.

Fraser had to kick a shot by Matt Lawrence off the line, and Nathan Abbey made an excellent tip-over save from a rising drive by Michael Simpson.

But the defensive cover faltered to allow Wycombe to take a 25th-minute lead, from a set-piece. James Brown floated in a free kick from the right, and defender Jason Cousins arrived at the back post to head in from uncomfortably close range.

We reached the interval with no more alarms, and within two minutes of the re-start got the goal that might have put us on the way to victory. Neil Midgley, with an impressive performance to end

his first month's loan, combined with Fraser to work the ball down the wing, and Fraser's cross was met by Douglas's expertly-placed glancing header.

A year ago Wycombe would have wilted. But Sanchez, scorer of a memorable Wimbledon goal that beat Liverpool in an FA Cup final, has turned them into a much more determined outfit. 



● **ACTION-MAN:** Match-winner Douglas leaves another Wycombe defender floundering








