

NEW DEAL FOR NEIL

Striker Neil Harris put pen to paper last week signing a new three year contract with Millwall. The player had been in discussions with the club over the past few months and both sides acknowledged that there were a couple of issues to be resolved. Having done so, Harris was happy to commit his future to The Lions, and his satisfaction was shared by the management team.

"I'm pleased that this situation has now been resolved, because it is important to us that we keep our best players at Millwall," admitted Rhino. "I don't know whether it has been playing on Neil's mind, because I think he would admit that he hasn't been quite the same player so far this season as he was last. But now his future is sorted out, hopefully Neil can focus his attention on recapturing his best form and scoring goals."

There are still one or two lads who we will be talking to about new contracts. But the likes of Neil, Richard Sadlier, Joe Dolan, Tim Cahill and Paul Ifill, who have all signed new deals recently, as well as Leke Odunsi who signed with Neil last week, are all players who would be comfortable playing at a higher level. When offering people new contracts we have to ask ourselves, not only whether they can do a job for us at Second Division level, but can they help us into the First Division and to compete at that level."

STARRING ROLE FOR CHERNO

Cherno Samba and Peter Sweeney were both in televised action again last week, playing for England Under 15's in the 3-1 win over Wales. Cherno scored one of the goals and was voted 'Man of the Match', re-emphasising just what a talent he is. The fact that Cherno, Peter and others are attracting attention is something of a headache for Millwall because inevitably bigger clubs will come sniffing round our door.



"It's the bane of our lives in many respects, as it is with most lower League clubs, that the Premiership big boys cast envious glances at our youngsters," explained Alan McLeary. "The boys are contracted to us on Academy forms until they are 16 when we can sign them on Scholarship forms full-time. We can't offer them a professional contract until they are 17, and clearly other clubs have the opportunity to make them an offer until that point. But both these lads are happy with us at the moment and we're hoping that they will stay here and continue their education with us."

SEVEN UP

On the advice of the England doctor, neither Cherno nor Peter played for Millwall's Under 17 side on Saturday, to ensure that they got sufficient rest after their international exertions. They weren't missed, however, as the Millwall youngsters beat Fulham 7-2. Ambrose Ideawor helped himself to a first half hat-trick before Jamahl Campbell-Ryce got in on the act after half time with a brace and Joe Kevin and Steven Cant completed the scoring.

No joy, however, for the Under 19's who went down to The Cottagers 4-0.

Sunday's Cup-tie at Hartlepool was a poor game in difficult conditions, but we felt we had done enough to bring them back here for a replay, until we let it slip with the last kick, or rather header, of the match. It was tough on the back four in particular, because they were as solid as they've looked for quite a while, but we have to concentrate for every one of the ninety minutes, and we failed to do that again.

We were desperately disappointed to go out of the Cup at the first hurdle again because we were looking forward to the possibility of progressing to the latter stages when the big clubs come in. It was particularly hard to take because of the manner of the defeat which gave us no chance to come back. But we do have to pick ourselves up quickly for tonight's game. It is vitally important now that we start to find some consistency in the League and pick up points which will move us up the table.

This will be a difficult game against a side in a good run of form, and who have done well against us at The Den in recent seasons. But what our players have shown, both this season and last, is the character to bounce back when we've suffered a reverse, and we'll be expecting the same again from them tonight. There's no doubt that we have the ability within our squad to do well, but at the moment we're still making too many mistakes and are not sustaining our best form week in week out. That is something we have to keep working to rectify.

Paul Moody, who didn't recover in time from the groin injury he suffered at

Colchester to play at Hartlepool, must still be rated as doubtful for this evening. But everyone else came through unscathed on Sunday. Fortunately, apart from Sean Dyche, we haven't been too seriously affected by injury so far this season. But we are continually looking to strengthen the squad and have players training with us on a regular basis so that we can assess them. One such player has been Christophe Kinet, whose name was linked with us in the press at the weekend. He's

a left sided player contracted to Strasbourg, who has trained with us a few weeks ago, and at the moment we're just having another look at him. There is nothing more to it than that at present, he can't play in a Reserve game for us because he is contracted to a French club, so we just have to make a judgement on what we see at the training ground.


Paul Banishes Moody Blues

It had been a long time coming, but in the end it was worth waiting for. Paul Moody's first goal for The Lions won't stay in his memory as the most spectacular of career, but it set his side on the way to a vital three point haul at Colchester the weekend before last, and doubtless eased the burden which inevitably weighs the shoulders of a striker suffering something of a goal drought.

It was a good workmanlike performance from the lads to get that win at Colchester, but we came back after a slow start and thoroughly deserved the win in the end. We had been working on the corners and free-kicks in training, it was pleasing for one of those to come off, and for myself it was good to score my first goal for Millwall.

There was a little bit of a worry for us after having that Paul Ifill 'goal' disallowed, because we had to wait until near the end of the game to score the one that counted. Now it's up to us to be a little more consistent week in week out and push on from here."

At again last week, 'Moods' was forced to spend time in the company of physio Gerry Docherty after suffering another groin strain in the last minute at Layer Road, and the big striker is clearly keen to get a run with injuries having established himself in the starting line-up for the four games prior to Monday. When he arrived at The Den in July, the former Oxford and Fulham man was at pains to stress that he was desperate to make up for lost time after missing much of last term with a broken leg. Consequently, it is unlikely that he will be lingering on the treatment table for a period longer than is absolutely necessary, and his strength and forceful presence is likely to prove a valuable asset in the coming months as the winter weather makes life increasingly difficult for defenders.

HATS OFF TO LENNIE

It makes you cringe when you hear managers of top Premiership outfits whinging about injuries depleting their squads. They should try managing without a squad in the first place, which is virtually the situation in which Luton Boss Lennie Lawrence found himself at the start of this season, with the club's very existence still in doubt.

Lawrence himself has, of course, managed in the top flight with Charlton and Middlesbrough, although without the resources enjoyed by most of his colleagues at that level.

During his tenure at The Valley (and Selhurst Park), he earned something of a reputation as a 'Houdini', master of the great escape, and one senses that he takes a strange pleasure in conjuring a measure of success out of adversity. He is currently doing so once again at Kenilworth Road, by keeping Luton up with the promotion pack at

this stage, in spite of the fact that he's having to do so seemingly with half his Youth team in the side.

Millwall's recent record against Luton is a strange one. In the last three seasons, The Hatters have won here at The Den, whilst we have taken the spoils from our last three trips to Bedfordshire. Unbeaten at home to date this term, The Hatters haven't been quite so impressive on their travels, losing four times, but they were successful last time out with a 1-0 win at Oxford.

This evening we welcome **Luton Town**

say that Luton fans will be savouring their football this season is something of understatement. Up until 15 hours before the start of the new campaign it looked as if the club would be thrown out of the Football League.

While most people were able to put their feet up and relax at some point during the summer, the Hatters were left in limbo. Boardroom politics had taken an icy grip on proceedings at Kenilworth Road and just before deadline day in March, director and major creditor Cliff Basset called in the receivers, who were still running the club until the day before the new season started. The club was put up for sale.

Manager Lennie Lawrence, himself no stranger to running a club on a shoestring budget during his days at Charlton, was unable to splash the cash, and instead found himself losing star men Kelvin Davis and Chris Wilmott to Wimbledon.

Despite his efforts and the tireless work of the staff and fans at Kenilworth Road, Luton staggered towards the opening day of the season still in receivership but with the Football League ordering them to sort something out by midnight on August 6, to face expulsion. Thankfully that threat was averted and the club's majority shareholding passed to director and life-long supporter Bassett.


With some boardroom stability and a man in charge with a clear desire for The Hatters to succeed, the future certainly looks brighter for the club who are now aiming for a return to the First Division after a four year spell in the Second. Manager Lawrence has assembled an exciting young squad who showed flashes of their flair and attacking nature during Saturday's 4-2 FA Cup first round win against Kingstonian.

Although their goalscorers took the headlines in Sunday's papers, goalkeeper **NATHAN ABBEY** had to be at his best to keep out a Kingstonian side inspired by ex-Lion Geoff Pitcher. Nathan, nicknamed 'Tanny', left to join a club in Antwerp after spending two seasons as understudy to regular number one Davis. But the move didn't really work out and by the time he came back to England, Davis had joined Wimbledon and Abbey felt the time was right to try and establish himself as first choice five years after signing YTS forms for The Hatters. So far, Tanny has managed to do just that, much to the frustration of Brent-born youngster **SCOTT WARD**, who has to be content with a place on the bench.

In defence **MARVIN JOHNSON** still cuts an awesome figure at centre-half or on either of the flanks. The big man is now skipper of the side he joined as a schoolboy and is in his 12th season as a first team regular. He has chalked up over 360 appearances for The Hatters, and celebrated his 31st birthday last Friday. Joining him at the back are exciting teenage prospects **GARY DOHERTY** and **STUART FRASER**. Doherty made a huge impact in central defence for Luton's youth team last season, and even spent a time filling in up front when they suffered an injury crisis. He is making an impact





on the bigger stage too, having already won recognition by being on the subs' bench for the Republic of Ireland. Fraser is another 19-year-old the club have high hopes for. An outstanding skipper of last season's SE Counties League championship side, he was handed his full debut on the final day of the 1997/8 campaign. Within a year he was competing hard for the left-back spot held by Mitchell Thomas. Experienced campaigner **JULIAN WATTS** is the sort of rock-solid player every team needs. Born in Sheffield, he started out at Rotherham before signing for his home team, Sheffield Wednesday. Sold to Leicester in 1996, he was on the move again a couple of years later on a Bosman free and signed for Bristol City. The departure of manager John Ward brought a premature end to his spell there, and the tough tackling defender jumped at the chance of

regular first team football at Luton. **ALAN WHITE** is hoping to break back into the team after sitting on the bench against Kingstonian. He is another Hatter who is strong in the air and good at set-piece plays with his 6ft 2in frame always likely to cause problems for the opposition. **EFETOBORE SODJE** was born just down the road in Greenwich, but spent much of his childhood in





Nigeria. When he returned, Effy signed for Stevenage Borough and did so well that they clinched the Conference title. Although reluctant to let him go, Borough sold the 27-year-old to Macclesfield, and the Effy magic worked again as he helped steer them up into the Football League and then win promotion to the Second Division first time out. Signed for Luton in August, he missed the first three games of the campaign through suspension and is another player aiming to re-establish himself in the starting line-up. Former YTS player **EMMERSON BOYCE** graduated to the first team squad after impressing during an Auto Windscreens Shield match in January. A regular in Lennie Lawrence's squad, he is determined to make the next step up from a place on the bench into the first 11. Moving into midfield,


Luton offer power, pace and players always keen to offer useful support to the front men.

MATTHEW SPRING is the name on most fans' lips at the moment following his spectacular 30 yard screamer on Saturday, and he has regularly been watched by Premiership scouts. An all-action type of player, he made his debut aged just 17 in September 1997 and has gone on to make over 70

appearances for the club. The Harlow-born teenager, 20 on November 17, is a highly competitive player never afraid of getting stuck in. **MATTHEW TAYLOR** is another to have come through the ranks at Kenilworth Road and made an impact. He came to light during the latter part of last season when the club were in receivership and unable to import new recruits. Taylor grabbed his opportunity and turned in some excellent performances, displaying a maturity way above his 17 years. Luton's youthful looking middle men do have some vital experience provided by **PAUL MCCLAREN**, although even he is hardly pushing on at 22! Signed on YTS forms, he was offered pro terms while still 17. His strength and determination has been crucial to the club

the word 'Houdini' and will probably have Lennie Lawrence running for her, or simply giving a big yawn. But whatever he says, you cannot deny that Lennie has a real knack of turning adversity into some form of success.

At Plymouth, Lincoln and Middlesbrough, the former school teacher has earned the respect and admiration of pretty much everyone he has worked for. His dry sense of humour also being noted! Since joining Luton in 1995, with the club in dire need of a boost after four wins from 22 starts, Lennie brought his wiles to The Hatters with the club in a precarious position. The survival task proved too much for the former Wydon, Carshalton and Sutton United player, but he at last installed some respect and passion in the players he inherited.

In typical Lennie fashion, Luton's first season in the Second Division saw Luton involved right down to the wire, when a play-off semi-final defeat by Crewe ended their ambition of an immediate return. A season of struggle followed last year, but, miraculously, Luton still managed to attain 12th spot in the table despite all their on-field problems.

Looking at the way that Lawrence and his right-hand man John Moore have worked so hard to encourage and utilise the undoubted talent at Kenilworth Road, it would be a fool to bet against them being involved in the final take-up come May.



since making his debut in 1994, and he has now played more than 130 games for Luton. McLaren always seems to be involved in the thick of the action, whether it be helping out defensively or supporting the attack. If The Hatters need a bit of extra width, they have the option of the speedy left-sided **MICHAEL MCINDOE**. He joined Luton as a YTS after leaving school, and made his first team debut over 12 months ago against Oxford and has gone on to record more than 30 other appearances since, including a place on the bench at the weekend.

Although Luton's midfield have proved themselves more than adequate at backing up their front men, the responsibility for scoring on a week in, week out, basis falls heavily on the current partnership of **PHIL GRAY** and **STUART DOUGLAS**. Gray is perhaps the better known of the two, not least because he has two rare commodities for a Luton player - age and experience! Signed by the club for a second time in September 1997, the Northern Ireland striker is keeping his fingers crossed that he actually gets through a season fully fit after suffering a succession of niggling and frustrating injuries. He was in Spurs reserve team when ex-boss at White Hart Lane, David Pleat, splashed out £275,000 to sign him for The Hatters. Two years later Gray was on the move again in an £800,000 switch to Sunderland, from where he went on to French club Nancy and then Fortuna Sittard in Holland. After successful spells there, Gray opted to return to his beloved Luton - and has had little reason to regret his return with a succession of quality displays. Quite capable of making and breaking defences on his own, Gray has recently been partnered by former youth team hot-shot Douglas up front. The London-born striker was a 17-year-old when he made his debut for Luton against Oldham in 1995, but has since fought various injury battles to try and establish himself as a regular in the starting line-up. What he might lack in size at 5ft 8in, he more than makes up for in ability, aggression and an unnerving desire to upset opposition defences. Like Gray, he is mobile, quick and just as likely to cause problems as a couple of strapping six footers. Where height is concerned, **LIAM GEORGE** is the main man, standing at 5ft 11 in tall. A pacey and nimble player, who operates behind the front two, he is currently Luton's top scorer and added to his tally with another fine effort against Kingstonian. A regular member of the Republic of Ireland squad that progressed to the European Youth Championships in the summer of 1998, he made his League debut against Bristol City in September 1997, but suffered the horrors of a broken leg at Wigan a year ago. However, he has come back in fine style and, if anything, is even more of a handful for defences to manage than before.

TONY WARNER v NATHAN ABBEY

Tony Warner spent a lengthy apprenticeship at Liverpool kicking his heels as back-up to keepers David James and Brad Friedel. After coming through the ranks at Anfield to turn professional in 1990, the big stopper waited nine years for a debut without success, making only a handful of appearances whilst on loan at other clubs.

Now at The Den after his summer free transfer, he is playing first team football and looking to kick-start a career that, according to his ability, should have been up and running a long time ago.


Abbey has profited from Kelvin Davis' summer transfer to Wimbledon by making the Luton keeper's slot his own. The Hatters' promising start to the campaign sees them on the fringe of the play-off places with Abbey conceding 15 goals and keeping three clean sheets.

Warner has managed two shut-outs so far and has conceded 16 goals in Millwall's inconsistent start to the season. The Lions have shown their teeth more away from The Den in recent weeks, winning their last two away fixtures, while managing only one point out of six in their previous two home outings.

The Luton man has pulled off 35 saves already this term saving 70 per cent of shots. Warner is marginally lower than his counterpart repelling 67 per cent of efforts on goal, and amassing 33 saves to date.

The ex-Liverpool goalie's handling has been impeccable, having not made an error as yet this season. Abbey meanwhile has fumbled on four occasions raising questions about his ability to deal with the high ball, although he has been tested on more occasions than his opponent.

Warner also has the better of the kicking, finding a team-mate 47 per cent of the time, although he does have the aerial power of Paul Moody to aim at. The promising goalkeepers will each be looking for a clean sheet to add to their growing reputations.

Can do better

We were all as disappointed as the fans were with our performance against Preston here a fortnight ago. You can usually afford one or two players having an off day, but I don't think there were too many players who could honestly say that they had done themselves justice that night. The crowd were justified in giving us stick, because we didn't get tackles in, get any knock downs, win headers, and all in all it just wasn't a good night for us. Hopefully, it will be a long time before we play that badly again.

It was very frustrating, because I really felt that we could keep that unbeaten run going for a while longer, but all we can do now is go out there against Luton and prove to ourselves and the supporters that we are capable of doing a lot better.

Fortunately, we got the Preston result out of our system to some extent at Colchester. As usual we gave the opposition a goal start again, but I always felt we were in control of the game after that, and that we had enough about us to go on and win, which we did in the end thanks to a well worked goal from Paul Ifill, who had been incredibly unlucky to see his earlier effort disallowed.

Our away form has been quite encouraging, with back to back wins over Oxford and Colchester now, and we have to use that as a springboard to start moving up the table. In spite of conceding a goal in each of those games, we have looked comfortable defensively. Clearly, as we keep on saying, we have to cut out the errors and start to keep a few clean sheets to make life a little easier for ourselves, but we've shown on a few occasions that we're capable of coming back into games and turning them round after falling behind.

As a side I think we're still growing up, and one area in which we seem to have progressed is on the disciplinary front. Last season we suffered with a few harsh decisions, but it is evident that we have managed to improve our disciplinary record, with no bookings against Oxford, Preston and Colchester and no sendings off at all so far. Naturally we should benefit from this in the long run because we won't be suffering as many suspensions as some of the other sides.

Luton will be a good test for us this evening. They've had to do what we did last season, bringing a lot of youngsters through into the side, because they haven't got any money to spend, and so far it's working well for them. We'll give them respect, but at the same time go into this game believing that we're good enough to beat them and start moving up that table.

Millennium Managers

Jack Cock

Cock was born in Cornwall in 1893. He came to Millwall towards the end of a sparkling career which had begun before the First World War at Huddersfield Town in 1914. During the carnage of the war he was awarded the Military Medal, and once the war was reported to have been killed in action. At the end of the war he signed firstly for Chelsea and then Everton, before a move to the nearest Football League club to his birthplace, Plymouth Argyle. It was his spell with the Devon club that prompted Millwall to fork out a transfer fee of £2,000 to secure his services. After he hit an amazing 72 goals in 89 games for Argyle, his Lions debut he scored twice in the 9-1 thrashing of Coventry City.

England Cap

Jack was perfectly made for the centre-forward role, physically well built, he was pacey with good control, and he could score with his head and feet. He was twice capped by his country against Scotland and Ireland both in 1920, which seemed scant reward, when compared with his goalscoring record. But in his era there were many great players around vying for an international place. Signing for The Lions by Bob Hunter proved to be inspired as Jack's 25 goals in 27 matches gave Millwall the impetus they

needed to clinch the Third Division (South) Championship in 1928. In his time at The Den, Jack scored 77 goals, a record he held until Derek Possee passed that total with 79 in December 1972. When Jack left Millwall in 1931 he joined Folkestone of the Southern League.

Managers Role

Cock, who like his predecessor, Billy Voisey had played for Millwall, became the second ex-Lion to take on the manager's job at The Den, and this he did on the 11th November 1944, (Armistice Day) the date the nation were paying homage to the war dead. At this sombre time

Millwall still hadn't won a game, and it would be the best part of two months before Jack would see his team win. When they did it was 4-1 over Charlton Athletic. At the end of the season Millwall finished in seventeenth place, but Jack would have the privilege of leading The Lions out for their first ever appearance at Wembley in the Football League (South) Cup Final against one of Jack's former clubs, Chelsea, who went on to lift the Cup by two goals to nil.

Humiliation

Jack's first full season (1945/46) was a 42 match programme of regional football, in which The Lions finished a creditable twelfth. But there were some quirky results to keep the fans talking, a 6-1 win over Plymouth at home was followed two days later by a 7-0 drubbing at Fulham. Through the course of the campaign

eight goals were conceded at Derby and Chelsea while seven hit the back of Millwall's net at Brentford and Coventry. To even things up a wee bit Millwall thumped six in at Leicester City's Filbert Street. The F.A. Cup matches were played on a home and away basis, and Millwall drew a plum when they were paired with Aston Villa in the 4th round, after they had defeated Northampton Town in the third with a 5-2 aggregate win. But on this occasion the boot was firmly on the other foot when Villa won 4-2 at Cold Blow Lane, and the return at Villa Park saw Millwall capitulate, going down 9-1 in the second leg.


Relegation

The 1946/47 season was the first competitive campaign of the Football League with Millwall finishing eighteenth in the table. The season stuttered into June due to a harsh winter, during which The Lions nose-dived out of the Cup at home to Port Vale. If this year hadn't been bad enough, the following one was a nightmare. With just nine League games won, relegation again came calling at Cold

Blow Lane and with this Jack decided to call it a day and he returned to run his public house, the White Hart in New Cross. Ironically his first and last games as Millwall's manager were against Newcastle United, and typically both were lost. Jack Cock, who passed away in 1966, had one of the most unenviable records as manager of The Lions and here are the figures for those two Football League seasons.



Physio's file

During the course of the season, in addition to bringing us a regular update on the progress of Millwall's walking wounded, physio Gerry Docherty will examine some of the most common injuries he has to treat and which amateur sportsmen and women may also suffer from. This evening he begins by looking at various types of ANKLE INJURY.

The most common form of injury when you go over on your ankle is called an **inversion sprain or strain**. There are three very strong ligaments on the outside of the joint which are attached to the lower end of the fibula, the outside bone on the lower leg and they attach to the heel bone and some of the smaller bones at the front of the foot. When you go over on your ankle, the main one that is damaged is called the anterior talofibular, and there are three types of strain you can have, grades one, two and three.

Grade One - minor disruption to the ligament, very mild swelling around the ankle joint. Likely to get you out of action - up to twelve days.

Grade Two - Ligament

partially torn. More moderate swelling, more loss of weight bearing function, sometimes more bruising. Likely time out of action - four to six weeks.

Grade Three - Other ligaments can be damaged as well as anterior which is totally ruptured and therefore unstable. Large swelling and bones around joint can't be distinguished clearly. Much more bruising (ie internal bleeding). Likely time out of action - eight to twelve weeks.

In some instances the joint will need to be immobilised in a plaster for a period of time.

In my time at Millwall I've never seen a Grade Three sprain, but Leke Odunsi has had a couple of Grade One's and both

Ronnie Bull and Steven Reid have had operations to repair tendon damage.

REHABILITATION

For sports people who are not professionals, and don't have access to sports physio's etc, the first rule over the first 48 hours, as it would be for the pro's in fact, is R.I.C.E. - Rest, Ice, Compression, Elevation. You

need to keep off the joint as much as possible, put ice on it regularly to reduce the swelling, wrap it in something like cotton wool and a crepe bandage and raise the ankle above the level of the hip to drain inflammatory tissue fluid.

What we gradually start to work on once the initial swelling and bruising subsides is strengthening up the ankle again, and a lot of what we do involves balance exercises, standing on one leg with eyes closed, throwing a ball whilst

standing on one leg, progressing to jumping and landing on one leg, hopping upstairs, jumping off a table. This is all to strengthen the tissues.

PREVENTION

Many players like to have their ankles strapped, although I try to encourage them not to depend on ankle strappings. Certainly those who have suffered from ankle problems will tend to do so, and others like to feel the security of having a strapping. Many of the modern shinpads have some sort of ankle supports anyway now. For me, the best prevention is to work on strengthening your ankles by practising jumping and landing, and the balance exercises outlined above. Try cleaning your teeth standing on one leg for example, it all helps to strengthen the ankle.







 Millwall suffered their first home defeat of the season a fortnight at the hands of high flying Preston North End. This always promised to be a difficult game against a side previously unbeaten away from home, and The Lions cause was not helped by their inability to produce their best form.
 The first half was a scrappy affair. The visitors might have taken the lead after just 3 minutes when Paul McKenna met Cartwright's cross in close range, only for Scott Fitzgerald to make an important block. In the second half, Jonathan Macken had a similar chance, but it was time Tony Warner made a fine save.
 Millwall carved out chances of their own in that first period, with the first of them falling to Paul Shaw. From the first, and best, the striker lashed over from six yards, whilst the second was saved by Moilenen in the Preston goal and the third flashed across the face of goal. With the game finely balanced, the first goal was likely to be significant, and in this respect The Lions contributed to their own downfall when, five minutes after the restart, Jamie Stuart and Tony

Warner got their wires crossed in dealing with a through ball and Lee Cartwright was left to tap into an empty net from the edge of the box.
 If that was a setback, the killer blow was soon to follow as Stuart Nethercott got his head to a Macken cross six minutes later, only to see the ball loop over Warner into the far corner. Warner then did well to deny Alex Mathie and Michael Jackson further goals for Preston before Millwall briefly rallied. During an eight minute spell, Tim Cahill placed a firm header too close to Moilenen, Neil Harris shot over when clean through and Paul Shaw was inches wide following a free kick. When none of those efforts found the net it was evident that the game was over for The Lions, and Alex Mathie nearly rubbed salt into the wounds when he hit the bar from close range.

OUR TRAVELS

Scunthorpe United

Saturday November 6th - Kick-Off 3.00pm

On Saturday we make our first visit to Glanford Park to take on Scunthorpe United. We have only ever faced The Irons on four occasions, the last time being back in 1983/84 when we won 1-0. In fact we have never lost to Scunthorpe, so let's hope we can continue in that vein. Brian Laws' men are currently on their best run of the season, unbeaten in their last four League outings, although they are having difficulty finding the net, with just 11 goals in 14 games to date.

How to get there

By Car: All routes: Exit M180 at junction 3 onto the M181 (s/p Scunthorpe) and Centre. After 2.6 miles, at end of motorway, take 3rd exit at roundabout (s/p Scunthorpe A18). The ground is on the RHS a matter of yards from the roundabout, and is signposted.

From Railway Station (Scunthorpe): A tricky one this as it's about 2 miles from Glanford Park. By taxi: Between £1.50-£2. By bus: The bus stop is by Bridgehouse Hotel, opposite the museum. The 334 runs to the ground. By foot: Turn left out of station into Station Road. Straight across at the lights into Church Lane. Follow Church Lane for 0.8 miles past Scunthorpe General Hospital to T-junction with Kingsway (A18). Turn right along

Kingsway (A18). Turn right along Kingsway, past the Municipal Golf Course to roundabout (0.6 miles). Take 3rd exit (s/p Goole A161, Doncaster A18) and after 0.4 miles, the ground is on the LHS.

By Bus: The best bet is the no. 341, which runs along the Bolsover Road.

Parking: The car-park at the ground has 600 spaces and charges just £1, but as there's only one way in and out, expect a slow get-away. Occasionally this car-park gets full, in which case the club is helped out by a friendly farmer who loans his field! Otherwise the nearest side-streets are 15 minutes walk away.

Oldham Athletic Tuesday November 9th Kick-Off 7.45pm

Next Tuesday we travel to Ice Station Zebra for our rearranged fixture with Oldham. The Latics' home form has been poor thus far, with four defeats in six outings, and our record at Boundary Park is encouraging, being unbeaten on our last six visits.

How to get there

By Car: All routes: Exit M62 at junction 20 (s/p Rochdale, Oldham A627(M)). After 0.5 miles, where road divides, keep right (s/p Manchester East A663, Oldham, Ashton A627). After 1.4 miles exit A627(M) (s/p

Oldham, Ashton A627). At roundabout take 2nd exit (s/p Oldham, Ashton A627) into Chadderton Way. The floodlights are visible from here. After 0.7 miles, take 1st turning on LHS (s/p Boundary Park) into Boundary Park Road. Follow road round into Furtherwood Road. Ground is on LHS.

There is another route to the car-park at the ground: At the roundabout off the A627(M), take the 1st exit (s/p Royston A663, Rochdale A671) into Broadway. Take first right turn, after 0.4 miles, into Hilbre Avenue, which leads to the car-park.

From Railway Station (Oldham Werneth): 1.1 miles. By taxi: There don't tend to be any. By bus: The no. 420 runs along Featherstall Road - but only once an hour. By foot: Walk up pathway to main road (Featherstall Road South). Turn right, and go straight on for 0.3 miles, passing several curry houses. Cross road before roundabout and take pedestrian subway. Exit subway towards Westwood Conservative Club, turn left in front of the Club and immediately right along pathway towards Spinners Arms. Turn



left in front of pub, walking along Maygate. Straight over crossroads, through traffic no-entry signs. Follow road round to right, passing Health Authority building on LHS - road becomes more of a rutted track (Westhulme Avenue). Straight on for about 0.2 miles to ground. Cross road to away turnstiles.

By Bus: The nos. 182, 410 and 413 run from Oldham town centre to the Oldham Road, while the nos. 406 and 418 run from Oldham town centre along Chadderton Road. The following buses all run down the Oldham Road: the 409 from Oldham town centre to Rochdale, the 408 from Moston and the 400 from Stockport to Bolton.

Parking: There are large car-parks at the ground (£1), but cars are packed in tightly so no one gets away before the final whistle! The local police advise supporters to avoid the Elk Mill Business Park, which is a clammer's paradise.

Millwall Girls Centre of Excellence 1999/2000

Following a series of open trials at The Den last May and a four week training programme, the squads for this season have now been finalised for the Millwall Girls Centre of Excellence. For the very first time we will be running two squads: under 12 and under 14's.

The demand to gain a place on this centre has never been higher and we are continually receiving requests from parents and players who would like to be included, but only exceptional potential will be accepted. We are not looking for the finished product, but for indicators that a great player may be just under the surface. Factors we think important are: basic understanding of the game, movement skills (both on and off the ball), technical skills, competitiveness, desire to learn and enthusiasm.



The girls will take part in a carefully planned 40 week training programme which includes all the technical and tactical elements that a 12 to 14 year old will ever need, plus an introduction to 'football fitness'. There will also be 6 academic seminars planned for the season, the first of which was last Wednesday on Performance Profiling, where both parents and players discussed personal strengths and weaknesses, and how to modify them.

This Centre of Excellence, now in it's sixth season, was the first of it's kind in the country and was visionary to say the least. The FA now have 25 others in this country with the aim of producing a new generation of female players who can take the game forward at both club and international level. Progress may be slow, but that has nothing to do with the players, whose attitude and desire has been first class. With improved coaching and opportunities to play at all international levels the future of the women's game looks very promising.

DOUBLE HEADER

Millwall reserves had to battle back from two goals down to take a point from their Avon Insurance Combination clash with Brighton & Hove Albion at Worthing last Wednesday.

Outmuscled by a robust Albion outfit, The Lions found themselves a goal down at the break after failing to concentrate fully following a short free-kick, and even though Millwall's performance improved dramatically after the break, they fell further behind against the run of play, again from a dead ball situation.

Thereafter it was pretty much one way traffic, with the woodwork and three excellent saves from their keeper coming to The Seagulls' rescue.

However, young centre back Leon Cort was not to be denied his moment of glory. Firstly he headed home from a Michael Gilkes

corner and then grabbed the equaliser with a glancing touch his brother would have been proud of from Bobby Bowry's free-kick.

Afterwards, coach Steve Gritt expressed his satisfaction with his side's comeback.

"It wasn't a great first half display from us because we struggled to cope with the physical side of Brighton's game. Both the Millwall Under 19's and Under 17's suffered a blank day against Arsenal on October 23rd.






Celebration time after Paul Ifill's winner

IN AND OUT AFTERNOON FOR IFILL

The Lions bounced back from the disappointment of their home reverse against Preston by recording their second away win on the spin at Colchester four days later. The early signs weren't encouraging as Millwall made another slow start and found themselves a goal down just past the quarter hour, when **Steve McGavin** bundled the ball home at the far post, after Karl Duguid's mis-hit shot from Lua Lua's pull back fell to him. Lua Lua, who was Colchester's main attacking threat, then clipped the bar with a lob, but by the mid-point of the half, Millwall had taken a grip on proceedings.

Paul Shaw flicked a header just wide and then drew a fine save from U's keeper Simon Brown with an angled drive. It initially appeared that Shaw had got the vital touch to The Lions equaliser on 32 minutes, when **Paul Moody** powered a header goalwards from Steven Reid's corner, but Shaw later admitted that the ball hadn't touched him but rather the defender standing behind him,

and consequently Moods was able to claim his first goal for his new club. Shaw, though, did have an excellent chance to get on the scoresheet three minutes before half-time, when Marc Bircham put him clean through only for Brown to come smartly off his line to save.

Millwall thought they had taken the lead seven minutes into the second half when Paul Ifill 'scored' a goal of the season contender with a left foot snorter from 20 yards into the top corner. The ball crashed against the stantion at the back of the goal and rebounded out, whereupon a jubilant Tim Cahill thumped it back into the net. Celebrations were soon cut short, however, by the linesman's flag, raised for offside against Cahill. It later transpired that the officials didn't think the original shot from Ifill had gone in.

Lua Lua continued to pose a threat for Colchester, drawing a save from Tony Warner, firing another effort just wide and setting David Gregory up with another chance that was wasted.

At the other end, Paul Moody hit the top of the bar with a header before justice was finally done for both Millwall and **Paul Ifill** nine minutes from time, when the winger latched onto a fine return pass from Neil Harris to slot the ball low past Brown into the bottom corner for the winner.



JAMES VALLEY TROUBLE

As the autumn leaves start to fall so the pace of managerial changes starts to pick up. The latest to go, apparently his own decision, is Malcolm Shotton, who for the last 18 months has had the difficult task of trying to arrest the decline of Oxford United. A veteran of over 300 games for the club, Shotton captained Oxford when they moved into the old First Division and won the League Cup. These were the days of Robert Maxwell's chairmanship, since when they have been sliding. Shotton returned to the Manor Ground in January and helped stave off relegation in 1997-98, but the trapdoor opened in May. Now, after three wins from their opening 12 games which took the U's in 18th place, Shotton decided to step aside. One of the options for stepping into the breach, temporarily, is Maurice Evans, who was a manager in those heady days of the 1980's. Evans has also managed the other Thames Valley club, Reading. They, too, are struggling in this year's Second Division (and lost 0-1 at home to Luton a week or so ago) and have changed their manager this season. Perhaps today, Maxwell's idea of pooling the resources of the clubs to form Thames Valley Royals does not seem so daft.

RAZIL AT NOTTS COUNTY

The latest recruit to the managerial ranks is Gary Brazil at Notts County. He is luckier than most newcomers because he has inherited a club that is on the up. The vacancy was created by the resignation of Sam Allardyce who, to nobody's surprise, emerged days later as Martin Todd's successor at Bolton. Allardyce is a former Bolton player whose home is still in the town. He guided County to the Third Division title in 1998 and today they lead the Second Division. Predictably, County were a bit miffed over Allardyce's departure and highlights the difference between the way a player under contract can act and what a manager can do. This is one of the arguments that is being used to put an end to the existing transfer system. For Brazil, however, this is a great opportunity. As a player he was a prolific striker with Sheffield United, Newcastle and Fulham, and he now has the chance to make his mark as a manager. A 1-0 win at Bristol Rovers was a pretty good start but County then went and wilted by losing 1-0 at home to Brentford days later.

MARCHING ORDERS

Fortnight ago there were a record number of red cards for one weekend, 27 in total, 15 in England and 12 in Scotland. There were, of course, the usual suspects, like Dennis Wise, but there also a few surprises. Nottingham Forest finished their match at Sheffield United with nine men and on the wrong end of a 2-1 scoreline, having led when they had a full complement of players. The first to see red was Nigel Quashie, who was then followed by his manager, David Platt. At least Platt will not be able to hide behind the standard managerial cliché of not being able to see the incident. It is

remarkable how many managers, who in the normal course of events see so much that the ordinary spectator misses, seem to suffer collective blindness when one of their players

has a brush with authority. There is a tendency to blame the referee, but too often it is players who try to con officials. The ref may make mistakes but he does not cheat and it tends to be the players who cheat the ref. The responsibility for improving relations lies more with the managers and players than it does with the referees.

FALTERING FOREST

Forest are struggling to make an impact in

Division One after their relegation last May. Following the defeat at Sheffield, they have drawn twice, with Stockport and Bolton, and four wins from 14 games is not the springboard for promotion Forest fans were expecting. On top of that they have lost on-loan striker Ian Wright to Celtic. Also relegated in May were Blackburn, one of only three clubs to have won the Premiership Title. On the day Forest had two sent off, three were dismissed at Ewood Park in a game against Grimsby, including two from Blackburn. Not surprisingly, both goals in the 1-1 draw were from penalties. Blackburn's current plight, three wins and 15 points from 13 games is five places worse than Forest. Brian Kidd has spent a lot of Jack Walker's money but the dividend is very slow to come through.

GREAT LOSS

A week or so ago, one of the grand old men of English football died, not a man who won high honours and earned vast amounts of money but a man who spent over 50 years working in football as a player, manager and scout. Bill Dodgin, who was 90, began his career as a player in 1929 with Huddersfield, and then went on to play for Charlton, Lincoln and Southampton, amongst others. After the war, he managed Saints, Fulham, Brentford (his son Bill junior also managed Fulham and Brentford) and Sampdoria but in 1961 he began an association with Bristol Rovers that lasted until his retirement well into his seventies in 1983. As the obituaries in The Times used to say, "We shall not see his like again."



Managers also have a part to play and instead of the famous statement "I was unsighted at the time" why not say "yes it was a foul", "my player did dive" or whatever declaration is necessary and then take steps to stop it happening again (Oops, there goes another flying pig!).

The sin-bin idea has also been mooted again and although I can understand the reasoning behind it I'm not sure how well it would work.

Everyone wants to see the game played fairly, especially the fans, without which it would soon cease to exist.

So perhaps it is time now everyone, managers, officials, referees and especially the players, realised this before it's too late.



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
