

's been a busy week in terms of matches at The Abbey, with tonight's local derby against Luton Town being third game we have staged in five weeks.

Monday night the Youth Team were in on in The Times F.A. Youth Cup at 10 to Colchester United. Sadly, Daleoks' side lost 2-1 after leading the visitors for much of the game. Despite the fact, the positive aspect of the evening was the fact that they were watched by a lively crowd of 162, boosted by a new initiative from The Times newspaper. According to the Cambridge Evening News, a bumper was published in Friday night's paper which, if completed, allowed one son in free of charge and also entered into a draw to win ten Umbro t-shirts. Then, on Wednesday evening, we entertained Peterborough United's reserve team in the Avon Insurance Combination League Cup.

Right we are anticipating a large crowd, a good contingent expected to travel to Luton Town. However, the gate for the Scunthorpe United game earlier this month was the lowest since October 1998, when on that occasion we beat Shrewsbury Town. The average attendance is currently running at 4,333 compared with the final average for last season of 4,583. The latter figure did include three bumper gates against Bury, Peterborough and Brentford during our promotion run-in, so this season's figure is very encouraging. Attendances for future selected games will also be boosted by the Nationwide Season of Sport initiative, which is being co-ordinated by Graham Eales. Newmarket is the third town for the home game against Bournemouth on December 4 and the last of 1999 will be Ely, who will be featured for the game against Oldham Athletic on December 18th. Graham has been extremely hard to set the wheels

in motion on this project and during the course of the season he will welcome a number of special groups and deserving causes from the surrounding area.

Entry to next Saturday's F.A. Cup tie against Bamber Bridge for Main Stand Season Ticket holders will be gained using the same procedure as used for the previous round against Gateshead. You will need to bring your Season Ticket book to the game, as you would for a League game, and the turnstile operators will tear out Voucher C from the back of the book and you will then pay the required rate for your seat - Family Enclosure £10 for adults, £6 for concessions and Main Stand £13 for adults and £7 for concessions. You can use any of the five Main Stand turnstiles in Cut Throat Lane - therefore, use the one with the shortest queue. Your seats are not printed, which means that entry can only be gained by using your Season Ticket book. This procedure will only apply for low-key fixtures. For any possible future Cup games this procedure may differ, depending on the opposition. Details will be released to all the usual media sources, but should you require further information then please contact the Club. Terrace admission is simply just 'pay at the turnstile' with no need to bring your Season Ticket book.

The draw for the Auto Windscreens Shield will now not take place tomorrow morning, so as that it does not get lost among the hype of the Scotland v England fixture. The draw will now take place next Saturday morning on Sky's Soccer AM programme.

With Christmas rapidly approaching, we will shortly be announcing details of prices for half Season Tickets. Details will be published in a forthcoming programme.



We haven't taken many points lately, but I've seen a steady improvement on the pitch, which was carried on at Bristol, and, in a sense, I believe that this match could be like a new beginning for us.



Despite a disappointing result against Scunthorpe, I thought that there were some positive points we could take from the game. We sat down as a team and watched a video of the first half before the Bristol match and although, in a sense, we were able to highlight the mistakes that led to the goals, the video also showed what a lot of good football we played. We had a lot of strikes on goal, Martin Butler hit the post, and their keeper made a very good save from Neil Mustoe. Scunthorpe had three attacks in the first half and scored two goals.

I hoped that watching the video would have helped the team's confidence for last Saturday's game at Bristol City, and I think, in a sense, it worked. We were taken apart by Bristol in the Worthington Cup in August but we were more than a match for them this time.

We looked more solid at the back and had better chances than they did to win the match. I was pleased with the way Martin McNeil came into the side at short notice. Without doubt, he did very well. He hadn't really been pushing for a place. This season and his form in the reserves has been quite poor, but he took his chance on Saturday.

We haven't taken many points lately, but I've seen a steady improvement on the pitch, which was carried on at Bristol, and, in a sense, I believe that this match could be like a new beginning for us.

I'm still trying to get some more experience into the defence though, as I have been for some time, and with a bit of luck we might get a breakthrough on that in time for tonight's match.



"That will be easier said than done at Cambridge. They have got a young side that is struggling to adapt to the Second Division at the moment, but they are well capable of improvement."


"But that doesn't mean we will underestimate them. Roy McFarland has got them organised and they are particularly strong upfront, so I would be delighted with a clean sheet and a win."



Pacy forward Stuart Douglas made his debut as a 17-year-old trainee against Oldham Athletic in 1995. The 21-year-old terrorises defences with his speed and sharp-shooting, scoring goals from anywhere in the box.

Former England international schoolboy Andrew Fotiadis is typical of an old-fashioned centre-forward, with power, a good physique and an eye for goal. The 22-year-old has been very unlucky with injuries but when fit he is a handful for any defence.

Livewire striker Liam George is this






Experienced and influential striker Phil Gray is in his second spell at the Club after joining from Fortuna Sittard for £400,000. The 31-year-old ex-Tottenham, Sunderland, AS Nancy and Northern Ireland striker is excellent at linking play from midfield to the forwards with his off the ball running.

worth a swap for a late night's work on a Friday.


The only problem then is that we could easily be dragged off to the shops on the Saturday afternoon! Me, I could be out on my bike!

Two goals by John Francis plus another from Lee Philpott gave Cambridge United a 3-3 First Division draw on Luton Town's last League visit to Abbey Stadium on 3rd November 1992. Goals by Kerry Dixon and Scott Oakes gave Luton a 2-0 victory in the return fixture four months later. The Hatters last triumphed here in the League 1-0 in March 1982 en route to the Second Division title that season, while Cambridge have never beaten Luton in a League match.


RECORD GOALSCORER

Former Luton Town striker John Taylor holds Cambridge United's goalscoring record. Initially moving to Abbey Stadium from Sudbury Town in August 1988, he starred in Cambridge's meteoric rise under John Beck and was swapped for Bristol Rovers' Devon White in March 1992. He joined Luton from Bradford City for £200,000 in March 1995 and scored three times in 37 League outings for today's visitors prior to rejoining Cambridge in January 1997. Starring in last season's promotion success, he has now netted a record 78 goals in 268 League games overall.

WEMBLEY WINNER

Cambridge United player-coach David Preece featured in Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph at Wembley. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Walsall for £150,000 in December 1984, the England B international also played for Luton in the 1989 Littlewoods Cup final and starred in their 1993/94 F.A. Cup run. He scored 21 times in 336 League games for today's opponents prior to joining Derby County on a free transfer in August 1995. Tommy Taylor signed him in September 1996 and he was an experienced figure in last season's promotion success.

EVER-PRESENT

Former Luton Town defender Jamie Campbell was ever-present for Cambridge United in 1997/98. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in July 1991, he featured in Luton's 1993/94 F.A. Cup run and his solitary goal in 36 League games came in their 2-1 defeat at Leicester City in August 1992. He joined Cambridge on a free transfer from Barnet in August 1997 and starred in last season's promotion triumph. Fellow defender Ben Cheney joined Cambridge on a free transfer from Luton in July 1997 and also featured prominently in last season's success.

IRISH INTERNATIONAL

Ex-Luton Town midfielder Tom Finney gained a record seven Northern Ireland caps while at Cambridge United. Having to Kenilworth Road from Crusaders for £17,000 in August 1973, he featured in Luton's 1973/74 promotion success and netted five times in 14 Second Division games for today's visitors before being sold to Sunderland for £30,000 in July 1974. He joined Cambridge for £10,000 in August 1976 and

starred in two consecutive promotion campaigns, returning from a ten month spell at Brentford to score 61 goals in 332 League games overall.

MANAGING TO SUCCEED

Former Luton Town central defender Chris Turner had a spell as Cambridge United's manager. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Peterborough United for £100,000 in July 1978, he netted five times in 30 Second Division outings for Luton before being sold to New England Teamen for £90,000 in May 1979. He joined Cambridge four months later and returned from Swindon Town in October 1980 to score three goals in 90 League games overall, then became manager for four years in January 1986. Ex-Luton defender John Ryan was Cambridge's player-boss for a year.

TWO SPELLS

Former Luton Town striker Steve Claridge had two spells at Cambridge United. Initially moving to Abbey Stadium from Aldershot for £75,000 in February 1990, he starred in Cambridge's meteoric rise under John Beck and was sold to Luton for £160,000 in July 1992. He scored twice in 16 First Division outings for today's visitors prior to rejoining Cambridge for a record £190,000 in November 1992 and was leading marksman in 1992/93, netting 46 goals in 132 League games overall before moving to Birmingham City for £350,000 in January 1994.

TITLE TRUMPH

One-time Cambridge United midfielder Lil Fuccillo featured prominently in Luton Town's 1981/82 Second Division title triumph. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in July 1974, he netted 24 goals in 160 League games for Luton prior to joining Tulsa Roughnecks in April 1983. He joined Cambridge on a non-contract basis in January 1988 and scored twice in 19 Fourth Division outings while at Abbey Stadium. The likes of Jack Bannister, Ian Benjamin, John Collins, Alan Guild, Rick McEvoy, Peter Phillips and Robin Wainwright have also played for both Clubs.

uch-travelled striker Steve Claridge featured prominently in Cambridge United's 1990/91 Third Division title triumph.

Initially with Fareham Town, he joined AFC Bournemouth in September 1984 and had spells with Weymouth and Crystal Palace before moving to Aldershot for £14,000 in October 1988. John Beck paid £75,000 for him in February 1990 and he helped Cambridge to clinch promotion via that season's Fourth Division play-off final at Wembley. Joining Luton Town for £160,000 in July 1992, he netted twice in 16 First Division games for today's visitors before returning to Cambridge for a record £190,000 in November 1992 and was leading marksman in 1992/93.

Scoring 46 goals in 132 League games overall for United, he was sold to

Birmingham City for £350,000 in January 1994 and was top scorer in their 1994/95 Second Division title & Auto Windecreens Shield 'double' triumph. He joined Leicester City for £1,200,000 in March 1996, scoring the winner in the 1995/96 First Division play-off final and 1996/97 Coca-Cola Cup final replay. After a brief spell at Wolves, he has been with Portsmouth since August 1998.

central defender Chris Turner was 'Player of the Year in Cambridge United's 1982/83 FA Cup run. Signing professional for Peterborough United in November 1969, he starred in their 1973/74 Fourth Division title triumph and moved to Luton Town for £100,000 in July 1978. He scored five times in 30 Second Division outings for today's visitors before being sold to New England Teamen for £90,000 in May 1979, then joined Cambridge four months later and headed the equaliser to take Aston Villa to a fourth round replay that season.

Returning to New England Teamen the following summer, he rejoined Cambridge via Swindon Town in October 1980 and netted three goals in 90 League games overall before moving to Southend United for £20,000 in October 1983 but a back injury ended his playing career. He



AMBER & ORANGE CLASHES

Cambridge United 1 Luton Town 2

Division Two - 3rd November 1979

This was Luton's fifth season back in the Second Division and they looked well placed to mount a serious promotion challenge as they were occupying top spot at the time. United were 16th in what was their second season amongst the big boys and were still concerned about relegation.

United's main problem was midfield injuries, but Steve Spriggs managed to harness his inexperienced colleagues into a unit that provided plenty of ammunition for Alan Biley and Roger Gibbins. United attacked brightly for the rest of the match, but the goal (from Biley) came too late to threaten a turnaround, though manager John Doherty was pleased with the performance.

The match was a turning point in hindsight. Luton suffered a jittery run that cost them promotion, whilst Cambridge perked up to ultimately finish eighth.

The U's immediately hit back and giant George Reilly soared high to plant a header beyond Jake Findlay. Once they had drawn level there was plenty of guts being shown by the home side to deny their classier opponents their usual win. In fact Jake Findlay had to resort to a crude foul to deny Floyd Streete what looked to be a certain goal, but alas for him the ref never saw it that way.

That draw was a minor blip on Luton's charge to the championship, whilst again it spurred United on towards mid-table as a four match losing run was stopped.

United were struggling in 17th having just sacked John Beck. Luton were five places below that. Luton belied their position and took the lead on 22 minutes through Scott Oakes. They made it 2-0 just after the break when Phil Gray was credited with a goal that deflected off Micky Heathcote and when Gray added a third with a superb solo goal on 54 minutes the victory seemed assured.

Trailing 3-0 with 17 minutes to go, United staged one of the greatest comebacks in their history. The key was the introduction of John Francis for Gary Rowett just after that last goal. Francis had blistering pace, but hadn't shown it until this match, mostly due to injuries. He had nothing to do with what seemed like a consolation goal when Lee Philpott converted Devon White's cross, but he out-raced keeper Andy Pettersen four minutes later and the ball fell kindly to him. With only three minutes remaining certain defeat was turned into a draw. Much-maligned strikers White and Mick Norbury combined to set up Francis for a dramatic twelve yard volley.

Sadly that game was a brief highlight in a poor season for United as they sank slowly to the second, but Luton revived sufficiently to save themselves at United's expense.



Result:

Method of Travel: Car

Departure Time: After the luxury of a couple of relatively close away matches, the 9am start came as a bit of a shock to the system ...

Arrival at Ground: ... and so did the State of the M4. The tone was set when I spent the best part of half an hour trying to join it from the M25 as roadworks, accidents and Rugby World Cup Final traffic conspired to get in the way. Traffic was heavy going for the remainder of the journey before grinding to a halt again just before the M32. Fortunately, this was my cue to leave the queue and head into Bristol.

The brief stop en route, at a service station packed with Australian and, for some reason, South African, rugby fans on their way to the aforementioned match, did at least allow me to break my journey before parking at the ground at about 1pm.

MJ's Mileage: 329.6 miles

Admission Price: £13, £10 or £8 - depending on your age (that's physical, not mental age!)

Programme: At £2 for 48 pages, the programme was twice the price of the one produced for the Worthington Cup match earlier in the season, and about three times the value. The abridged version had hinted at the possibilities of fine effort and this proved to be the case. With tonnes to read and the adverts mixed so they were not intrusive, the only 'messy' section was the double-page spread of kit sponsorship.

Mind you, this was unavoidable as Bristol City's squad numbers went up to 45!

Number of Travelling U's: 189

Conduct of Police/Stewards: Stewards seemed friendly enough, and had more to do looking after the home directors than they did with U's fans.

Conduct of U's Fans: Tried to give the lads good support, but only really came into their own midway through the second half when they seemed to start to believe that we would avoid defeat.

Conduct of Home Fans: Decidedly disgruntled. Bristol City supporters seem to believe that they have a right to be close to the Premiership, so to say that they expect a lot from their team would be something of an understatement. The only positive support they gave was in the form of some annoyingly Wycombe-esque drumming. However, their expectations seemed to get out of hand, quarter of an hour from the end, when the Bristol City Manager made a couple of substitutions, so perplexing that only United supporters would have been pleased to see two of their more dangerous players replaced. This was the cue for chants of 'You don't know what you're doing' aimed at the Bristol bench, and a mass exodus.

One supporter was so annoyed that he stopped to vent his anger at the Bristol directors on his way from the ground. Whatever he said didn't appear to go down too well as the Bristol Chairman, sitting in the front row of the directors box, leapt from his seat and attempted to punch his lights out! Only the intervention of a couple of stewards prevented bloodshed.

State of Ground: I seem to recall being reasonably impressed when we visited Ashton Gate earlier in the season. That

impression seems to have been slightly misguided though. In daylight, parts of the ground is starting to show signs of its age. The stands along either side are particularly past their sell-by dates with wooden seating in the upper tier starting to look as if it's ready for the next stage of redevelopment.

Food/Drink: I got as far as trying the tea which, at 80p for a large cup, was more than welcome after a trying journey.

Officials' Performance: Mr Parkes has probably had better days than this. Although he kept his cards commendably in his pocket, he only appeared to have a tenuous grip on the match at times ... not that this affected the spectacle.

Additional Comments: Bristol City tried to provide an entertaining pre-match show ... but all did not go tremendously smoothly! For a start you couldn't hear a word the on-pitch P.A. announcer was saying. Then an under-11 troop of Pom-Pom girls arrived. With little coordination, their routine gave the impression that this was either an avant-garde, experimental routine where they were all meant to do different things, or that they had never practiced. My money would be on the latter! We then had to endure a 'beat the goalie' competition between three U's fans and three Bristol fans (needless to say the goalie seemed to try harder against the U's fans) and then, just as you thought it was all over and you could relax, the Pom-Pom girls returned - presumably in case anyone didn't believe how bad they'd been first time around.

It was therefore a massive relief when the game actually kicked-off and the girls could retreat to behind an advertising hoarding in one corner, where they could continue their random pom-pom waving throughout the match unobtrusively.

WHAT THE PAPERS SAID.....

If you want to read nice things about United these days I wouldn't advise you to take the trouble of crossing the Dartford Bridge and buying a copy of Medway's Kent Today. After referring to 'wretched Cambridge' following the clash with Gillingham at the Abbey earlier in the season, this time, following an improved performance from United in Kent, the paper referred to the home side as: "somehow 1-0 down to Cambridge". Although in summary they said: "The result had gone the way it deserved but it was not as easy as it sounds." Strange indeed, as I'm not sure how easy 2-1 sounds when the winner is scored in the final minutes.

Of United's goal, the report reads "Gillingham, all over their opponents for the first quarter of an hour, went to sleep on 17 minutes and were caught out by a simple ball over the defence by Neil Mustoe to Tom Youngs. With his first touch he rounded Vince Bartram. With his second, he slotted home inside the left hand post from a tight angle." This was followed by: "Sucker punched, they took a while to rediscover their composure and Youngs created another good chance for himself. As he ran at the defence, Adrian Pennock and Paul Smith backed off and gave him space to fire a shot which dragged wide." and "Just before the whistle, Cambridge's counter attacking almost paid off and following a great pass by Ian Ashbee, Neil Mackenzie blasted a shot which Bartram did well to punch away. The ball fell nicely for on-rushing Mustoe but Pennock blocked his shot".

Into the second half, and following the home side's equaliser: "Although they equalised in seconds, there were still plenty of nervous moments. Ten minutes into the half, Bartram blocked one shot on goal but, although he managed to get a leg in the way of Mackenzie's follow up shot, he still had to acrobatically flip himself over and dive onto the ball just as it was about to roll over the line."

"Cambridge had been put back in their place but were still due to be knocked down another peg or two. Gills made hard work of it however, and put the fans through a nail biting 45 minutes, though nobody afterwards could deny they had got their money's worth of excitement."

After reporting on all of that, the final word didn't quite fit. "By then, Gillingham had done enough for the points ..."

Yesterday's Programmes



The home programmes from the 1980/1 season saw a dramatic change in the format from the previous seasons. Gone was the indexing system and although the programme consisted of 40 pages it could hardly have been called the programme of Cambridge United. The reason being that 24 of the 40 pages were designed and produced by Sportopia Promotions Ltd. and as well as including articles on football there were also articles on motoring for example and a large content of advertising. It's interesting to note at this point that a number of League teams this season also used the articles produced by Sportopia.

The remaining 16 pages (the U's bit!) included an article from the U's boss, John Docherty, profile on the visitors of the day, a round up on Division 2 results and news, statistics and team line-ups were featured inside the programme on page 38. This season the programme was printed by Labute of Cambridge and cost 30p throughout the season.

The general availability of the home programmes is very good and you should have few problems in finding those missing copies and you would expect to pay something in the region of 40/50p for them.

The main thing to look out for is that the original programme printed for the postponed match against Sheff Wednesday (27/12/80) was used for the re-arranged game (24/01/81) together with a single page insert.

The away programmes from this season are generally quite easy to find apart from the following: Derby (29/11/80) which was issued in newspaper format and could cost you between £5/6, the programme for the West Ham game (21/2/81) is available with two different covers and the cover featuring West Ham captain Billy Bonds is the more difficult to find. For the match at Oldham (played on Sunday 15/3/81) as well as the nor-


mal programme there are six different coloured team sheets available and one can only assume that these were for different parts of the ground due to the game being played on a Sunday. Finding these team sheets is very difficult and each one could cost anything between £4/5 and may only appear on the dealers "offers lists". Another thing to look out for is that Notts County reprinted the programme for the match played on 5/5/81 and there was a programme printed for the postponed game from the 26/12/80.

Once again this season the U's played in the pre-season Willhite Cup tournament and programmes were issued for all the three matches played: A 4 page programme was issued for the home match against Ipswich (26/7/80) and is generally quite easy to find (£1.50/2). The programme for the away match at Norwich (29/7/80) was issued in the format of a single white sheet printed green. This one is very difficult to find and could cost you anything between £6/8 and once again keep a look out on the dealers "offers lists". The final programme issued was for the match at Colchester (5/8/80) and finding a copy of this one might set you back about £3/4.

Other programmes to look out for from this season are as follow: there was a single sheet was issued for the home match in the Cambs Professional Cup against Peterboring (6/8/80) and Royston Town issued a full programme for the friendly game played 13/10/80. Both of these would probably set you back anything between £3/5 and both are quite difficult to find.

The CUSA held a full committee meeting on 12th October. We were joined by Director Gary Harwood, General Manager Colin Davies, Andy Pincher and Graham Eales, as well as the seven applicants for the two CUSA vacancies.

Each of the applicants said a few words about themselves and what they could offer the CUSA. Following the meeting a vote of the existing members selected David Stroud and Lionel Webb to join us, but all the unsuccessful applicants have agreed to keep in touch and to help us out along the way as they can. This is the way the CUSA should work, and we hope this selection process has not given the impression we are an elitist organisation. We are not! We are just an ordinary group of United fans helping out our Football Club and, hopefully, representing our fellow supporters. Honest!

The re-development of the Abbey was the main topic for discussion. We expect the Council to rule on the Club's planning application very shortly now. Hopefully the decision will be in our

favour and the Council will then formally apply to the Dept of the Environment, Transport & the Regions for permission to sell us the small amount of the allotment land we need. Without giving too much away, the CUSA and the Club are planning a campaign in support of the DETR application – watch out for more details, we will need your help! It is the allotment issue, of course, that has been at the centre of most of the debate about the Club's plans. This is a great shame, as we are neighbours. Both the Football Club and the allotments have important roles in the community, let's not forget that it is only very reluctantly we need to buy some allotment land but, as you know, the Club has over the past 5 years exhausted all other conceivable options.

On other business, the CUSA are helping out with two forthcoming events – a Race Night (tomorrow evening in the Harris Suite) and a Fans Forum (watch out for details). Match Day (tea bar) catering still comes up as a concern for a lot of fans, a problem that tends to be exacerbated by increasing

gates – and long may that continue. We have spoken to the new Catering Manager (Paul Cleary) and given him a copy of the results of the fans survey we conducted over two successive close seasons. Give him a chance to turn things around, but, as always, if you have any specific complaints about Match Day catering, or ideas as to how to improve things, please get in touch and we will pass your comments onto Paul.

On another matter, if you use the new (Corona) car park you probably know how long it can take to get out after a game – if the Club charged by the hour we could probably afford Sol Campbell as cover for Andy Duncan! The CUSA are talking to the Club and the Police to see if something can be done to improve things, hopefully they can work something out.

Now he has tasted Second Division football for the first time, Martin McNeil is buzzing after his maiden chance in the first team this season, and hopes the next opportunity will come tonight against Luton.

McNeil, 19, who has come through the ranks at the Club, made his first appearance of the season at Bristol City on Saturday after making seven starts last season, and now wants to become a regular addition.

"I played a few games last year and Saturday was the first time I've got back into the side since last season and it felt great," said McNeil.

"I wasn't expecting to play and I was only told just before kick-off. It was brilliant in the end though, even if I was a little bit nervous, because I haven't played in the first team for a while.

"In a way it was best that the gaffer didn't tell me until quite close to the game, because my nerves could have been even worse."

McNeil has been at the Club since he was nine years old and has had to work hard for his chance in the first team, so now he is there he insists he won't give it up lightly.

He added: "I think I got in because it was down to injuries more than anything else, particularly with Scott Eustace being out. Had he been fit I don't think I would have played.

"But I got my chance and I enjoyed it. I thought I did quite well, and the gaffer said after the game that he was pleased with what I had done and the way I had slotted into the team.

"Hopefully, if I can stay in the side and get a few more games under my belt then things can go on from there."

McNeil is currently experiencing the fickle world of football, with the team storming to promotion last season and now struggling to adapt to the Second Division, but he is thriving on the challenge.

"We are still confident in the squad, and we know that we are still the same players that won promotion last season, if not better players," he said.

"We have brought a few new players but I am very confident we can at least stay up in this division. I think we knew the standard of this division would be a lot higher, but we were aiming to maybe get in mid-table or the play-offs."


"We've got a great bunch of lads and the team spirit is great. We're all fairly young so we're building for the future really."

In a very young squad, McNeil admitted he is learning from other young players, such as Trevor Benjamin and Martin Butler - two players he believes can keep the Club up.

"Players like Trevor and Martin are always going to score you goals. They have attracted a lot of attention from other Clubs, which is good for them, but if they keep scoring the

goals I think we will be alright.

"If we can build on Saturday, when we got a good draw at Bristol City, and start winning more games at home then I think there will be no problems."

Now in his 10th year at the Club McNeil owes much to the dedication and commitment of Roy McFarland to the Club's youth set-up, and believes without him he may never have got a chance.

He concluded: "I joined the Club when I was nine and signed schoolboy forms when I was 14 and have gone on from there really. The Club means a lot to me and it is important we keep going forward as a Club."

"The great thing about this Club and Roy McFarland is that if you train hard and play well, the manager will put faith in you and gives you the chance. That gives you confidence which I appreciate more than anything."

Second THOUGHTS

Doug Shulman's Nationwide League round-up.....

Tomorrow sees the most important game involving our national side since the game against Argentina in last year's World Cup. Not only is a place in the European Championships at stake, but also national pride against fierce rivals. Let's hope the game goes our way, and is free of unwanted trouble.

However, because of the aforementioned game we find ourselves involved in League action here tonight against Luton. The Bedfordshire side have been improving steadily over the last month and now find themselves eighth in the table. Lennie Lawrence's youngsters have also been attracting attention from bigger Clubs as a result of their performances. In last week's midweek fixtures though, The Hatters lost 1-0 at improving Millwall, their first defeat in six games. There was also a win for Wigan at home to Chesterfield, the prize being a place at the top of the table for the Lancastrians. Stuart Barlow scored another brace of goal, with Andy Liddell bagging the third. Burnley scored five without reply at home to Wrexham. The emphatic nature of their win sent Stanley Ternent's side above Notts County and into second place, although their position only lasted 24 hours.

Gary Brazil's side gained a great 1-0 away win on Wednesday night at in-form Stoke and bounced straight back to the summit, thanks to a 23rd minute Alex Dyer goal. A three goal blast from Preston's strikers also saw them climb the table. Jonathan Macken, Graham Alexander, and Paul McKenna all scored in a 3-0 win over Bournemouth to send North End into fourth place.

Bristol Rovers faltered at home to Bury to drop into fifth place, despite gaining a point in a 0-0 draw, Roberts and Cureton for once firing blanks at The Memorial Ground. There were also draws for Brentford and Cardiff at home, with both sides facing teams with unfulfilled ambitions so far this season. The Bluebirds had to wait till the 89th minute to secure a point against Blackpool, who had earlier gone ahead through a 57th minute Murphy strike. Kevin Nugent saved Frank Burrows blushes with that late equaliser, but Cardiff continue to fall away from the front-runners after a promising start. Brentford, too, are slipping, and they also let it late against opponents Reading. A 76th minute Tony Folan goal finally cancelled out Andy Gurney's early opener for The Royals.

A late show was also in store for the 3,807 spectators at Boundary Park, who saw Oldham and Wycombe draw 2-2. Andrew Baird put the visitors 2-1 up with a minute to go, but with seconds left on the clock Steve Whitehall popped up to gain a point for Andy Ritchie's side, who move up to 18th place. Rounding off the draw theme for the midweek fixtures, managerless Oxford fought out a 1-1 stalemate with fellow strugglers Colchester at The Manor Ground, Lambert opened the scoring in the first minute of play to put Oxford 1-0 up, and delight the majority of the 4,444 crowd, but a 33rd minute strike from Steve McGavin was enough to secure Colchester a point.

The individual performance of the week though was from Gillingham target man Robert Taylor, who scored his second hat-trick in three weeks during a 3-0 home win over Bristol City. Taylor is luring scouts to Priestfield from all over the country, and it seems only a matter of time before he is snapped up for big money, with Manchester City emerging as the likeliest buyer. The win condemned Bristol City 16th place, and ensured another backlash from fans calling for Tony Pulis' dismissal after just three months in the hot seat. Supporters fury was also topped up with the sale of Canadian International and fans' favourite Jim Brennan to Nottingham Forest that same week, for a cool £1.5m.

Amazingly none of the top six sides in the division managed to win last Saturday, so Notts County remain top of the division by two points. They were held to 1-1 draw by visitors

Gillingham for whom Robert Taylor scored once again. County had earlier taken a 2nd minute lead through on loan Danny Allsopp, who had only joined the Magpies 24 hours previously from Manchester City. Wigan are making a habit of coming from behind to snatch points, and this was the case against Blackpool at Bloomfield Road. The Tangerines flew into a 2-0 lead and could have scored more, but fortunately for John Benson his side came out for the second half a different team. Graeme Jones and Stuart Barlow grabbed a point for Wigan within seven minutes of the restart.

Barlow had earlier that week stunned the Club by asking for a transfer, much to the chagrin of the Latics faithful. Preston also had to chase a point away at Colchester, who were 2-1 up with five minutes to play. Aaron Skelton, and the dangerous Lomana Tresor Luu-Lua both scored with ferociously struck shots from some distance to put time Essex side in place for three points, but Kurt Nogan pounced with seconds left to preserve North End's ten match unbeaten run.

Burnley lost out to two Neil Midgley goals at Luton, who haven't lost at home this season, with Andy Cooke's strike a mere consolation in a 2-1 reverse. Stoke drew 0-0 away at Bury in a dull game watched by The Shakers biggest gate of this term, whilst Bristol Rovers and Wycombe scored one apiece at Adams Park, Sean Devine with his 10th of the season for the Bucks side, and stand-in striker Nathan Ellington with a neat 25-yard strike for The Pirates.

There were three away wins on the coupon last Saturday, with Millwall being the most triumphant. They shattered Scunthorpe's five match unbeaten League run and recorded a handy 4-1 win at Glanford Park, thanks to a brace of goals from both Neil Harris and Paul Ifill, with John Cornforth replying for The Iron. The win was a blow for Brian Laws' team who have also lost the services of on loan Steve Guinan from Nottingham Forest. The striker did not take up the offer of a 2nd month's loan and was apparently involved in a bust-up with Laws, who promptly stripped him of his Club tracksuit and left him in the Club car park in just his underpants!

Oldham and Brentford both recorded 1-0 wins at Chesterfield and Wrexham respectively. Neil Adams secured The Latics win to plunge Chesterfield further into trouble, whilst new signing from Southampton, Scott Marshall, was the hero for Brentford against Wrexham, who have now not won since mid-September.

Rounding things off for the weekend was a 1-0 win for Bournemouth over free-falling Cardiff thanks to a Mark Stein winner, and in Sunday's fixture, Oxford grabbed a fantastic 2-1 away win at Reading. Joey Beauchamp netted the 84th minute winner for caretaker boss Mickey Lewis to no doubt boost his chances of bagging the job on a permanent basis.

vious Inter Milan have turned to FIFA in an attempt to resolve a long-running dispute with the Brazilian Football Confederation over the use of star player Ronaldo in friendly internationals.

Ronaldo has been included in the Brazilian Olympics team for three friendly matches to be played during November. Brazil coach Vanderlei Luxemburgo had previously assured Inter boss Marcello Biatti that he would only play him in one game, against Spain. An Inter spokesman said FIFA had informed the Club that they would be to the CBF suggesting Ronaldo did not play in the two friendlies.

Nigerian F.A. Cup has fallen into the hands of Plateau United after they defeated Iwuanyanwu Nationale 1-0 last Sunday. United, from Jos Town, and thousands of supporters celebrated the victory by dancing in the streets of Lagos, the venue of the final.

Algeria's Raja Casablanca have joined Esperance of Tunisia in qualifying for the African Champions League. Raja, winners of the continent's top Club prize two years ago, had to fight a tough rear-guard action against Al Ahli to secure their place with a 1-1 draw. Esperance limped through 1-0 against Dynamos, courtesy of a penalty.

Brazilian side Sao Paulo had a mixture of emotions to deal with last week. Goalkeeper Rogerio Ceni scored from a free kick to secure a 1-1 draw against Ponte Preta on Wednesday, but this came hours

after the Club's appeal against a three-point deduction for fielding an ineligible player was rejected.

The result left Sao Paulo fifth in the championship's first stage with 32 points from 20 games but with the possibility of having more points deducted at a later date because of a dispute with another Club.

Kashiwa Reysol lifted their first trophy since entering Japan's professional soccer League. They defeated League champions Kashimira Antlers on penalties in the Nabisco League Cup final. Reysol won a shootout after the teams had finished level after 120 minutes in front of 35,238 fans at Tokyo's National Stadium.

Finally, supporters of South American champions Palmeiras are taking matters into their own hands regarding the social discipline of their players. They are threatening to spy on them to make sure they don't stay out late. Last week television pictures showed about 50 angry fans jeering the players during a training session and chanting 'drunk' at them.

Paulo Serdan, the self-appointed spokesman for the fans, said the team played badly because too many of the players had been going out on the town. He let out the warning, "Anyone seen out at night again will get to know the nasty side of the Palmeiras supporters."


News this week of a less than venerable result from the extremely venerable ladies of the Women's Team:



In the middle...

MAN IN BLACK



As one of the more experienced referees on the Football League list, Terry Heilbron has come in for his fair share of criticism over the years. Heilbron, who started refereeing in 1981, is in his eighth and final year as a referee and believes the changes in the game over the years have increased the flak that officials must endure.

"You never hear a referee criticising a player for missing an open goal, but we get criticism from players or managers a lot of the time," said Heilbron. "We are only doing our job to the best of our ability, just like them."

"I train three nights a week as well as doing the games, so whilst we're not strictly professionals we are professional in the way that we do our job, and should get the due respect."

Heilbron, an Area Manager for Honda in County Durham, believes it is only a matter of time before all referees become professional - to hopefully silence the mounting number of critics.

He said: "Without a doubt referees will one day become professional, because that is the only way to stop the criticism. We try to be as professional as possible now and wait until the inevitable introduction of professional referees arrives."

As a keen footballer, Heilbron decided to turn to refereeing at the age of 29 and hasn't looked back, notching up some unique records. "I used to be a very keen footballer," he added. "I only played for the local town but it was good non-league standard. I got of an age of 29 and just thought I would take refereeing up."

"I also used to have a job as a manager and thought that turning up to work with bruises all over my face and limping from a hard match would not be ideal. I've always been involved with football and couldn't really bare the thought of being away from it, so refereeing provided me with the option to stay in touch with the game."

"I'm glad I did. I am the only referee to take charge of all three play-off finals at Wembley and I'm the only Football League referee to officiate the Worthington Cup final between Tottenham and Leicester City. Unfortunately I had to send Tottenham's Justin Edinburgh off in that game, which was disappointing because you never want to do that in a final, but his team won in the end."

Heilbron, who is married to Sue and has a 24-year-old son Neil, insists his job is all the more difficult as the prying eyes of millions of television viewers are often watching his every move.

He added: "The job gets harder because many years ago there was only one television camera at the ground if you were lucky. Now there are cameras in every corner. Everything is scrutinised more and there is a lot more money in the game. It makes the game all or nothing these days and the pressures have just built up."

"At the end of the day the referee is the man in the middle. My philosophy is to just let the players play and if they want to play I would say they will have the best referee to let them do that. But if they want to mess about then they have picked the wrong man."

This is Heilbron's final season as a referee in the Football League as he reaches the maximum age of 48 but he admitted he wouldn't change a thing and Cambridge themselves have provided him with great memories to retire with.

He concluded: "Unfortunately, this is my last season. I've had seven great seasons on the Football League and I've got some fantastic memories. I have refereed at Cambridge twice. It is a great little ground and I like coming down to referee there. The atmosphere is always tremendous and it is one of the grounds I will definitely miss."
