

TWO GOALS by emergency striker Gary Doherty saved the Town's blushes on Friday night in front of a big TV audience, and gave them a second bite at Third Division opposition who so nearly went home with victory at the first attempt.

Lincoln will surely relish the chance to finish the job at Sincil Bank to earn a third round tie away to First Division Fulham. And the Town know they must do better next Tuesday to have a chance of repeating last season's league victory at Craven Cottage.

Doherty was a potent centre-forward in the youth team, and for the Irish under-18s, but he is now seen by Lennie Lawrence as a centre-half.

But with Neil Midgley ruled out by Ipswich, who did not want him cup-tied, and Phil Gray and Andrew Fotiadis still injured, the Town had to face Lincoln with only two up front, with Adam Locke added to midfield. It didn't pan out too impressively, and at the interval Lawrence made the change that saved the game.

Efe Sodje went on as sub for Locke, and performed well in the back three, while Doherty went upfield and did even better.


For the TV audience it was probably a good game to watch, but for Town fans it was nerve-wracking, particularly when Lincoln regained the lead with less than ten minutes left.

The visitors hustled and hustled better than we did, and our passing game was well below its best for too much of the game.

True, Lincoln had the run of the ball when it fell nicely for Gavin Gordon to give them a 15th-minute lead, but from then on Town nerves were twitching. We started to think it wouldn't be our night when Barry Richardson saved from Liam George with his legs, Matthew Taylor had two power-drives well saved, penalty claims for a handball were rejected and Stuart Douglas put a close-range chance wide after George had presented him with what looked like a goal offer that could not be refused.

Douglas, to his credit, put the disappointment behind him in the second half, creating both openings to make it comparatively easy for Doherty to score his brace.

The equaliser on 63 minutes should have settled us down, but instead Lincoln went ahead again on 81 minutes through Dave Barnett's bundled header at a near post corner, and we cut it fine, with the equaliser arriving on 84 minutes. Lincoln chairman and manager John Reames said he was proud of his team,

except for the poor defending at the Town goals, and felt frustrated and disappointed - "We should have won, but I am pleased we more than matched a good Second Division side."

Lawrence admitted it would have been a steal if the Town had nicked victory, against a side that caused far too many problems for his liking.

He added: "Gary Doherty is a centre back, but it speaks volumes for his character that he went up front for the second half and did the business. But if we play against Preston like we did against Lincoln, they will bury us. One or two lessons must be learned, because we made Lincoln look good. They're a decent Third Division team, but nothing more."

Doherty collected the man of the match bubbly, and said he had enjoyed the switch into attack. "The gaffer made it easier for me, saying I was not under pressure to score. In the event, Stuart Douglas made it easy for me by making them both."

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
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The Manager

AFTER the drama of the cup-tie on Friday, we are back to the more important business tonight, seeking league points in the first of two games in five days which will both be difficult.

Against Lincoln, because of a shortage of fit and available strikers, we attempted to play with two forwards and three midfielders, and that was patently unsuccessful. Lincoln were fired up for the game, and for the first 30 minutes we were totally ineffective as an attacking force, and certainly it was not good enough for a home team.

Yet it could easily have been 1-1 at half time instead of 1-0 to them. Their first goal had an element of luck about it, with the ball breaking their way, while we missed an excellent chance of an equaliser just before the interval.

Perhaps, on reflection, the fact that we were behind at half-time was not a disaster - I might have had second thoughts about the changes I had in mind if it had been 1-1. When the switch was made we looked a far better team and we had a very good attacking spell in which we got the equaliser. Then we conceded a very poor goal from a corner - very frustrating for a manager and coaches, because we knew what to expect, having seen Lincoln rely on set pieces for at least half their goals.

With ten minutes to go Lincoln must have thought they had done the job, but Stuart Douglas showed his character in laying on the second equaliser. He is a real manager's player: he is always fit on match days, and if he misses chances he doesn't let it get to him. Without his perseverance we would be out of the cup today. He is the only man in the team who could have kept chasing an apparent lost cause and win the ball to make a goal for Gary Doherty.

My hope now is that Lincoln have spurned their best chance of further cup progress. We can expect a bombardment at Sincil Bank next Tuesday, but I hope this time we will cope better and get enough space to play our football and get a result.

If we can, we then have a chance of causing an upset at Fulham. That is a game for our supporters to relish and it should be a good football occasion. It was not quite the draw I wanted - I would rather be at home to any team we can beat - Second or

Third Division, or some of the First - or a really big game away, where the club could make some money. If we earn the right to go to Fulham, we will not be too daunted, having won there in the league last season and in the Auto Windscreens Shield the year before.

The Auto Windscreens Shield draw this weekend was not the news I wanted - I would have preferred a bye to the second round. Having to go to Oxford in a fortnight means that we suddenly have a period of two games a week for three weeks, and with our current injury list we are facing a testing time.

None will be more testing than tonight, and it will be interesting to see how we and Preston react to Saturday's cup-ties. This evening's game pits us against one of the sides I expect to be involved in the promotion reckoning at the end of the season. Of the teams we have played, Wigan, Brentford and Burnley are, like Preston, as likely as anyone to be in the top four, Wigan probably in the top two. That leaves a couple of places, perhaps three if I am wrong, for the likes of us. We passed a tough test against Burnley, and gave a good account of ourselves at Wigan. Now we have to prove we can do it against another good side. There are a lot of clubs still with play-off hopes, like us within five points of the top six. I would not want that gap to expand to eight or nine points after the games tonight and at Bristol Rovers on Saturday. If it were to happen, the task would not be impossible, but certainly it would be very difficult.

Preston will not be happy at having to replay away to non-league Enfield in the cup, but they have all-round strength, and we will have to reproduce our best home form to have a chance of victory. We are conceding too many goals from basic errors, but at least we are also making chances and scoring goals at home, and that is the most important thing of all.

I will welcome Graham Alexander back to Kenilworth Road - he was a real bargain when Luton bought him, and gave very good service to the club. If he had not joined Preston when he did, he could have left as a Bosman free last summer. Obviously, tonight I hope to see him on the losing side, and with the backing of supporters, we can do it, and prove that our play-off hopes are realistic. To beat Preston would be a real feather in our caps.

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Captain's Log

Marvin Johnson



AS WE had not played anywhere near as well as we can, we were eventually pleased to save the game on Friday. It was probably one of our poorest home displays of the season, and we know it almost cost us dear. Lincoln were up for it, and at the final whistle they were more disappointed than we were with the 2-2 draw. We had talked about problems underdogs can cause, and we were certainly not complacent. If we had been, we were soon given a painful shock when they took the lead.

I hear both managers blamed their defences, and for our part we know we have to be more professional at the back. But I was delighted for Gary Doherty, and for Stuart Douglas, who made both his goals. We had a problem in that we could not use our normal game plan, because we did not have three fit and available attackers, and one thing the game showed was that a three-man strike force is vital for us.

When we changed back to our normal shape for the second half we were OK, although it was still a nasty shock when Lincoln went ahead for the second time. But "Dozza" did the business again, and we felt we were worth the draw.

We also had admiration for Stuart Douglas - he did not need telling he had missed an excellent chance in the last minute of the first half, but he refused to let it get him down. He picked himself up and got on with the job, as he always does. He has our respect in the dressing room for giving 100 per cent in every game, and his determination and good play led to both our goals.

The chance of playing at Craven Cottage in the third round adds another incentive, if one were needed, to do well in the replay next week, and once again we will not be taking anything for granted at Sincil Bank.

We know we are overdue to turn it on in away games, but at Lincoln it might just be a case of a home side feeling it has done the hard part of the job in earning a replay. They and their supporters will fancy their chances, but of course they don't know that we are normally a much better team than the one they matched at Kenilworth Road.

If we can get through, we will fancy our chances at Fulham, particularly remembering the excellent

performance and result we achieved last season, when we were the only visiting team to bring home three points during Fulham's run to the Second Division championship.

The cup draw gives us a chance, although my personal preference would have been a home game against Arsenal, Chelsea or Spurs. That is now wishful thinking, and cup-ties have been put on the back burner as we prepare for two difficult league games which are vital to our chances of getting back among the top teams in the Second Division.

I am still good friends with Graham Alexander, and it will be good to meet up with him again. He seems to have become a firm favourite with Preston supporters, and I am sure he will enjoy playing at Kenilworth Road again. So will Kurt Nogan. I remember him very well in our youth team, and when he first broke through to the league side with Jimmy Ryan's squad. He was always quick, and with a good touch, and I always knew that he would become a regular goal scorer. Tonight, of course, must be a different matter, and I hope I will be there to make sure he and Jon Macken are bottled up.

Preston's record speaks for itself, and I have had them marked down from the early days of the season as likely promotion material. I think tonight's game will be our toughest home test of the season so far, which was how I viewed Burnley when they came here a couple of weeks ago.

We then have our third meeting of the season with Bristol Rovers, at the Memorial Ground, and we owe them one - they caught us at a bad time when they beat us in our first home match of the season, in the Worthington Cup. We haven't lost at home since then, and need to exact revenge on Saturday to peg them back.

We earned a creditable draw in the second leg of the Worthington, at Bristol, and we need to match that, at the very least, on Saturday.

Before then, Preston have to be taken care of, and I hope to be playing my part in their downfall. But first I have to shake off an ankle injury I picked up on Friday night. I am not quite sure how it happened but Clive Goodey has been working his magic since, and I have every hope that it will be OK again for tonight.

We need to win, and we need your support, so please get behind the team again.

Treatment Room

Clive Goodyear



OUR biggest fitness worry preparing for tonight's game surrounded Marvin Johnson, and he had to report to the treatment room on Saturday to begin work that hopefully will see him recover full fitness today.

He picked up an ankle injury during the game against Lincoln, and could feel it giving discomfort before he went down in need of treatment.

I think he is suffering from a stretched tendon, and the early indication were that it was responding to treatment. We have been keeping a close eye on him and much depends on how things have been in the last 24 hours. It could well be one of those cases when a very late decision is made. Knowing the skipper, he will be keen to play tonight, but he is also professional enough to understand the longer-term benefits if he has to be rested.

Otherwise, although Friday's game was quite a tough one, everyone came through unscathed. Stuart Douglas took a knock in a clash of heads, but was able to carry on after treatment. He still had a bit of a headache some time after the game, but it was nothing serious and he was able to take part in Saturday's training programme. Fortunately there was no cut, and he will be 100 per cent tonight.

So will Stuart Fraser, having come back against Lincoln after three weeks on the sidelines with a thigh injury. I was confident that the gash had healed completely, and so it proved.

I mentioned in this column on Friday that we were awaiting results from another scan on Phil Gray's hamstring, and I am afraid they were not quite as good as he and I hoped they would be. Compared to a scan a fortnight previously the area of muscle injury is much less, but there is still a small area which is not quite right. The healing is nearly complete, but as a safety-first measure it is doubtful if he will be able to make his hoped-for comeback with the reserves next Wednesday.

We will see how it goes in the next few days, but certainly we would not risk bringing him back into competitive football too soon.

I can tell you that he has worked extremely hard to overcome the injury, and deserves his chance to be ready soon to compete for a first team place.

Landry Zahana-Oni and Andrew Fotiadis are still making progress after their knee injuries, and Fotiadis was able to step up his training this week.

Our youth team skipper, James Ayres, is just about over a head injury he received in a match. He cut his forehead, and four stitches were put in. They were due to be taken out yesterday, and the defender is ready to play again when required.

They had a dozen cameras to cover the action, and that entailed what seemed like miles and miles of cables. Add in scaffolding, a fleet of very big trucks and a satellite dish, and an army of workers, and it all amounted to a reminder of why we need a new modern ground! The TV people coped brilliantly, but of course when Kenilworth Road was built no-one had a clue about the facilities that would one day be needed.

We were surprised at the amount of preparation that went into it: the first TV employees were in the stadium four days before the game, sorting out where equipment should go and working out the best camera angles.

Obviously, with the game tonight and TV here on Friday a lot of hard work had to be done over the weekend to make the stadium ready for use again, and another small army was busy throughout the weekend.

We try our hardest to make the best of what we have at Kenilworth Road, but sometimes a minority of supporters defy every endeavour.

For instance, before the gates open at 1.30 on Saturdays, we go round every toilet in the stadium and check that they have soap, paper towels, and toilet rolls. Unfortunately it is not uncommon for towels and toilet rolls to disappear by 2pm, and we get criticism as a result. Some people even seem to get pleasure from stuffing complete toilet rolls down the pan.

I know our decent supporters expect better facilities, and we are trying. We have now



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LETTERS and pictures sent for inclusion on this page are usually light-hearted holiday snaps and tales, but tonight's offering from James Cook, of Peakes End, Steppingly, comes from a trip that left him thinking deeply about some of the things that have happened on the other side of the world, and not always fully reported in our newspapers.

There is not space to quote all of his letter, but the two pictures give a flavour of his experiences when his Luton Town shirt and he went on a journey through South East Asia.

From Bangkok he made his way east into the heart of the jungles of Cambodia and he described the background of one of his pictures as one of the most fantastic examples of architecture anywhere in the world, the temples of Angkor, near Siem Reap.


"There are many temples of Angkor, but this is the main one, known simply as Angkor Wat, and it was a privilege to see it, even though it was a scorching 120 degrees that day."

James also visited a monument containing 8,000 skulls, arranged by age and gender, at the infamous Killing Fields just outside Phnom Penh. It recalled the unbelievably barbaric atrocities of the Khmer Rouge in the 1970s. James found it a disturbing place and "an experience I will remember to my dying day."

He added: "People in the western world know little about Cambodia, but from my experiences I can safely say that although the people are very poor and deprived, they are among the happiest and contented I have ever met - amazing considering the unrest and belligerent turmoil they have had to endure."

The other picture was taken just north of Hue, in central Vietnam. James admits the landmark is not terribly significant, but it is the only photo he has of him and his Town shirt in Vietnam.

The location was "very Apocalypse Now" and



was Tu Duc's tomb - built more than a century ago by 3,000 soldiers for Tu Duc, an emperor who ordered its construction to be a recreation ground for himself after he died!

James was in South East Asia for seven weeks, and recalled: "I found out Luton

TEUVO ('TEPI') MOILANEN (GOALKEEPER)

Finnish international who has represented his country in World Cup qualifiers, most notably a last-gasp defeat to Hungary before the 1998 competition which helped deny Finland a place in France. Has extensive first team experience and was in good form prior to injury and recently got back into the first team after David Lucas was suspended and has kept him out since.



GRAHAM ALEXANDER (DEFENDER)

The 27-year-old right-back was signed from Luton Town for £50,000 last March. Started his career at Scunthorpe and has also played in mid-field. Slotted into the Preston team well after taking over from the injured Gary Parkinson and is a key member of the squad. Has been in great form so far in 1999 proving his reputation as one of the division's best full-backs.

MICHAEL JACKSON (DEFENDER)

Michael was rewarded for a marvellously consistent season by sweeping the board in the end of season awards. He was Players' Player of the Year, Fans Player of the Year, and the club's official Player of the Year. The awards were a fitting reward for a host of sterling performances last season. Sean arrived at Deepdale from Third Division Darlington for a fee of £300,000 and it has turned out to be a bargain. Local youngster, who arrived at North End via the club's youth training scheme. A wily and highly skilled midfielder, Paul has established himself in the first team with a number of prominent displays over the past couple of seasons.

BRIAN BARRY-MURPHY (MIDFIELDER)

Left-sided utility player who is already a regular member of the Eire under-21 squad. Came to Deepdale from Cork City under a "Bosman" and gives David Moyes extra options of the left side.



MARK RANKINE (MIDFIELDER)

Combative midfielder with energy to burn, Mark arrived at Deepdale from Wolverhampton Wanderers for £80,000 and quickly established himself in the side. Played a key part in Preston North End's push up the table last season and his enthusiasm and willingness to hustle and work hard marks him out as a player who commands the utmost respect.

DAVID EYRES (FORWARD)

Icelandic International who joins North End until the end of the season from KR. The 26-year-old has played 27 times for his country and is the brother of Leicester City's striker Arnur.



JONATHAN MACKEN (FORWARD)

Another former Manchester United reserve player who has made the grade at Preston. A strong forward, who can shake off defender's tackles with robustness and efficiency, Jonathan has been

consistent provider for his partners up front, as well as scoring goals himself. Has been the star of the team so far this season, notching 11 goals, making him one of the most clinical marksman in the Division.

ALEX MATHIE (FORWARD)

Former Newcastle and Ipswich frontman remembered warmly by both sets of fans. Joined North End on a three-month loan deal from current club Dundee United after Steve Basham was forced to have a knee operation. Alex has also played for Celtic, Morton and Port Vale (loan).

KURT NOGAN (FORWARD)

Finished last season as leading scorer with 20 goals before injury curtailed his campaign prematurely. The Welsh striker arrived at Deepdale from Turf Moor for a bargain fee of £150,000 and has since repaid that amount in full with a myriad of goals which helped elevate Preston into the upper echelons of the Nationwide Second Division last season. He should enjoy tonight's game - he began his career in the youth team at Luton, and Jimmy Ryan gave him his league debut. mystery solved

A SEARCH of ancient records has solved a mystery sparked by a chance conversation between two members of a family who are descendants of one of the very earliest Luton Town players.

Maureen Ingram has recently joined the committee of Luton Town Supporters Club, and when she told her sister-in-law was surprised to be told - "My granddad played for Luton."

What's more, Judy Ingram, nee Catlin, of Carlton Crescent, Luton, had the proof tucked away in a drawer - a very old football medal. Her mother had kept it because it had been won by her father-in-law, but that was as much as she knew about it.

Four centimetres deep and three across, the medal looks as though it is bronze, although it bears what seems to be a hallmark, and a manufacturer's name of Vouchton, Birmingham.

The front of the medal is engraved Bedfordshire Football Association 1897, and on the back an inscription reads "Won by W. Catlin, Luton Town Football Club, 1897."


For years the medal was all but forgotten, but Maureen took it to a recent meeting of the Supporters Club Committee to ask if anyone could shed light on its origins.

The official centenary history of Luton Town, published in 1985, records that a player called Catlin - no full name given - made one appearance for the Town in season 1897-8, in Division Two of the Football League.

Two years ago, a more complete set of records was published, the Definitive Luton Town FC, one of a series of club histories, produced on behalf of the Association of Football Statisticians.

It includes a full list of men who have played for Luton, mostly with date and place of birth, previous clubs, and following clubs.

The entry for Walter Catlin is short of the full facts - no date or place of birth, but records one league appearance for the Town, and one goal scored. A check of the league results shows his only game



was in a 3-0 victory at home to Darwen on April 11, 1898. Walter Catlin was last heard of at Watford, never again to figure in the chronicles of Luton Town until today.

In view of the medal, Walter Catlin obviously played at least one other game for Luton, and that problem was soon solved by Peter Brown, Secretary of Bedfordshire FA.

In their offices at Skimpot they have all the paperwork from a century and more ago, and it took only a few minutes for Mr Brown to turn up the relevant minutes of 1897. And there, in copperplate handwriting, for all the world as though it were done with a quill pen, it is recorded that Luton Town won the cup competition. Today, Beds FA has many cups, but that one is the original, now known as the Beds Senior Cup. Other winners around the turn of the century were Luton Montrose, Dunstable Town, Luton Falcons and Bedford Montrose. Intriguingly, in 1901 and 1902 the Town took the trophy again, but are recorded as winning it as Luton Reserves.

The minutes of 100 years ago also show that referees then, as now, came in for a bit of stick on occasion. Toddington Rovers were up before a disciplinary committee because a referee was "deposited in a pond after the match." The club was fined half a crown, a lot of money in those days - it was a week's wages for the first professionals at Kenilworth Road.



WE PAY the first of two visits in a month to Bristol on Saturday. We have our third meeting of the season with Bristol Rovers, seeking revenge for our defeat against them in the Worthington Cup. They beat us 2-0 at Kenilworth Road in our first home game of the season in August, and the second leg was a 2-2 draw, with Tresor Kandol and Gary Doherty netting our goals.

If you want to use them, car parking arrangements have been made easier - you can leave your car at the club's Maple Road car park, which is staffed by a security man all day until the coaches return, and you no longer have to book a parking spot in advance - pay £3 on the day.

The Bobbers Travel Club will have a coach leaving Cranfield at 9.30am, with various pick-up points on the way to Luton, and departure time from Kenilworth Road is 10.30. The fare is £10.50 adults, and £8.50 for junior and senior citizens and tickets can be bought at the Bobbers Travel Club kiosk before home matches, or by phone call to Paul Deason after 6pm on 01234 750996. He will also be pleased to enrol you into the Bobbers Travel Club -



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membership is obligatory to use the service, but life membership costs only £1.

Executive coaches run by Town on Tour, an offshoot of the Luton Town Supporters Club, will leave Maple Road at 11am. The fare is £11.50 for adult members of LTSC, £9.50 for concessions, and £13.00 for all others. You can book at the LTSC kiosk in Kenilworth Road before or after tonight's game, or through the club shop at other times. You might find it worthwhile joining the Supporters Club - it's £6 for adults, £5 for concessions, or £12 for families of up to two adults and two children, and they all get discounts on Town on Tour.

IF YOU want to drive to Bristol, the journey is quite simple. Leave Luton on the M1 south, then make a right turn onto the M25 west. Near Heathrow leave M25 to turn right onto the M4 heading west. Leave M4 at junction 19, turning left onto the M32. Leave the M32 at junction 2, and turn right, signposted to Fishponds and Horfield. Bear right where the road forks, and at the sixth set of traffic lights, about a quarter of a mile further on, turn left into Filton Avenue. The ground is on your left, and there is ample street parking in the area.

Luton Town v Preston North End



After the narrow miss from winning promotion to the old Division One at the end of 1979/80, the following close season was relatively quiet as everyone at Kenilworth Road got their breath back in readiness for a fresh tilt at the title.

The wily Bob Hatton, who was so instrumental in making Brian Stein the player he became, decided that two seasons at one club was quite long enough and departed to Sheffield United. The only signing of note coming the other way was Raddy Antic, picked up from Real Zaragoza as manager David Pleat dipped his toe into the foreign transfer market for the first time.

The season started off fairly well with F.A.Cup holders West Ham being beaten 2-1 at Upton Park, courtesy of two late David Moss penalties, and old enemies Watford going down to a Steve White goal at Kenilworth Road.

If the Town were fairly fortunate to beat Watford then they could count themselves very unlucky when Derby performed a smash and grab raid at Kenilworth Road in the next game and somehow sneaked out of Luton with both points.

This defeat seemed like a dagger to the heart of the Town players and by the time of the visit to Preston, eight games later, only three further points had been picked up and the relegation places were fast approaching.

The game at Preston, unfortunately, did not prove to be a turning point as, following a dismal 0-1 defeat the Town had slipped to 19th position in the table. In a match between two struggling sides, completely devoid of skill or passion, the proceedings were settled in a fashion typical of these sort of games by a miss-hit shot that took a deflection.

Gone was the swift, close passing that had typified the Pleat team of the previous season and in its place was a style characteristic of a group of players suffering a crisis of confidence.

Pleat ordered several of the players into the reserves for a short, sharp shock. He then dropped forward Andy Harrow and sold him to Aberdeen only weeks after buying him and replaced Mike Saxby with Clive Goodyear at centre half.


There was certainly more heart about the Town's performances in the next two games, at home to Shrewsbury and Swansea, with draws being seen as victories after all that had gone on before.

The real turning point in the season came a week later in a difficult match at Cambridge where the Town battled through to win 3-1 despite playing a large part of the game with ten men. With the substitute already on the pitch, goalkeeper Jake Findlay was stretchered off injured leaving the ever dependable Mal Donaghy to put on the green jersey.

This victory, against the odds, seemed to lift a great grey cloud from above the players heads as suddenly they started to play the type of football we all had come to expect. Sheffield Wednesday were walloped 3-0 in front of the television cameras at Kenilworth Road, a Steve White goal at Watford made it four successive 1-0 victories over the Hornets and, most impressive of all was a 3-2 home win over West Ham. The Hammers were walking away with the Division One title and had not lost since the opening day when we won at Upton Park and in a pulsating game a late goal from Moss deservedly earned the points.

So, only two months after our terrible display at Deepdale, we were about to face Preston again but this time in very different circumstances. We were up to eleventh in the table while Preston were still struggling near the basement. On the other hand we had two injuries to contend with as both Tony Grealish and Steve White had received knocks in a tough game at Oldham the previous week.

Into their places stepped Godfrey Ingram and Lil Fuccillo. Ingram, who as a youngster had stunned the football world with his skills while playing for England Schoolboys at Wembley, had failed to live up to this early promise. All the skills

were there but the Luton coaching staff felt that he did not have the heart for the physical battering that forwards had to take and had, in fact, placed him on the transfer list.

Fuccillo was a different case as he was making a welcome return to the first team after two years absence following two broken legs. At the time of the first broken leg, which came about following a disgusting tackle by Brighton's Paul Clark at the Goldstone Ground in December 1978, Fuccillo was playing so well that international scouts from Italy were reputed to be watching him.

Refreshingly, despite their lowly league position, Preston had not come to Kenilworth Road for a point and gave as good as they got in the first half. The breakthrough came just before the interval when Brian Taylor handled Ricky Hill's cross in the box and the deadly David Moss made no mistake from the spot.

The lead was doubled on 48 minutes when Moss volleyed in a pass from Fuccillo but Preston

fought back and Findlay had to dive smartly to tip an Alex Bruce drive round a post before a goal was pulled back. Steve Elliott, later to play for the Hatters, headed a long cross from Steve Doyle in at the near post and for a time an equaliser looked on the cards.

Just as David Pleat was about to bring Fuccillo off, the Bedford born midfielder blasted home a pass from Ingram to send the crowd wild and to more or less make the game safe. The goal of the match came ten minutes from the end when Ingram took a pass from Moss, held off Preston defender Mick Baxter and accelerated past two further defenders before smacking in an unstoppable shot.

Preston refused to lie down and Bruce converted a Peter Sayer cross with five minutes left but by then the game had been won. Nobby Stiles, the Lilywhites manager, praised the Town afterwards and took some consolation from the fact that his side had helped contribute to an entertaining game.

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



FORTY years ago this week, tonight's opponents were also visiting Kenilworth Road. That time it was for a fixture in the old First Division, and Preston's supporters can take heart from the fact that their team triumphed 3-1 over a Town side that was struggling at the foot of the league.

But there was one Hatter in very good form at the time - and scored our goal that afternoon - namely wing wizard Billy Bingham.

The confectionery firm Barratt's had for many years produced annual sets of Famous Footballers, and the skilful Irishman was the only Luton player featured in the 1959 issue of 60 cards. On the reverse he was described as being "a fast, clever winger... his elusive body swerve has worried and upset the best defences."

There are many who remember seeing his skills and trickery during his time at Kenilworth Road who would consider that to be an understatement!

Bingham was born in Belfast in August 1931, and first came to prominence at Glentoran. At the age of 19 he joined Sunderland, and it was not long before his displays in the No. 7 shirt brought him to the attention of the Irish selectors.

For many years he did not miss a single international, and in total won 56 caps. After Sunderland's relegation from the top-flight in 1958 Luton splashed out a then record fee of £15,000 to secure his services.

Everybody considered it money well spent as a series of brilliant performances helped shoot Luton to the top of the league by October - the only time we have reached the pinnacle, coincidentally with a victory at Preston.

Unfortunately the Town could not sustain it, but consolation came after Christmas in the shape of a wonderful FA Cup run which saw us

go all the way to Wembley.

Bingham, in his size five boots, scored in every round, including the only goal in the semi-final replay against Norwich City at St. Andrew's, Birmingham.

Sadly, as we all know, Billy's magic was not enough to prevent us losing to Nottingham Forest in the final.

More disappointment followed the following season. Despite more breathtaking displays from Bingham, and 16 goals which made him top scorer, Luton finished the campaign bottom of the table. It was obvious that a player of his class could not be expected to stay in the Second Division, and so in October 1960 he moved to Everton in exchange for two players, Alec Ashworth and John Bramwell, and a big fee. Billy scored 33 league and cup goals in 99 appearances for us. At Goodison, he won a championship medal in 1963 before moving to Port Vale, where a broken leg unfortunately ended his playing career.

He turned to management, beginning at Southport, and then moving to Plymouth, and back to Everton, where he was in charge from 1973 to 1977. He also had spells in Greece and was for a time the Northern Ireland team boss. Many older supporters were delighted to see him looking so fit and well when he returned to Kenilworth Road for the Cup final reunion last May.

Bingham also appeared in Barratt's 1960 football offering. But this time the sets were printed in colour, and had been reduced to 50 cards. Examples from either set are now increasingly more difficult to find, and in recent years their value has shot up, and they attract around £3 each for cards in good condition.

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Tonight's Referee

VISITING Kenilworth Road for the first time since last February, when he was in charge of the game against Notts County, tonight's referee is Robert Styles, a company director from Waterlooville, Hampshire.

At 34 he is one of the youngest refs on the Football League list, to which he was appointed three years ago.

Like all refs, he started at the bottom as a Class III official on the local parks in Portsmouth in 1987, but received rapid promotion, to Class I within two years.

It has been steady progress ever since, via the Hampshire County League in 1989, the Wessex League and Isthmian League line in 1990 and referee in the Isthmian League three years later. He was a Football League linesman for two years before promotion to the middle for Football League games.

As well as football he is keen on all sport, particularly cricket.

The Carling Opta Nationwide Factfile figures are acknowledged as the best impartial judgements that can be made of players, because they are based on extensive examination of video coverage of every minute of every league match played. It's a job for expert anoraks - they look at every tackle, every pass, every header and every mistake, and put it all together to award points to each player.

Liam George's form this season has been exceptional for such a young player in his first full season as a regular in the Hatters line-up. This afternoon he is up against one of the most experienced strikers at this level, Kurt Nogan.

George's coolness in front of goal has been evident by his ten league goals, and he has had a further 14 efforts on target. Nogan has been a little less prolific this campaign, scoring three times from a total of 17 shots at goal.

Nogan is the more accurate passer and has set up one goal more than George, but Liam displays his talents right across the forward line. He is happy to go wide and cross the ball if need be, despite Luton's strengths on the wings with the impressive Matthew Taylor on the left and Stuart Fraser on the right.

George's phenomenal pace and dribbling skills, which have seen him employed on the wing in the past, explain why he has had so many runs, and his pace means that he is able to put pressure on defenders which has helped him make 12 tackles.

Nogan is the archetypal centre forward and is more likely to occupy the centre of the forward line with the other players creating chances for him.

The former Luton striker will be keen to impress on his return to Kenilworth Road where he scored three times in 33 league appearances between 1989 and 1992.

This afternoon also sees the return of ex-Hatter Graham Alexander to Kenilworth Road, who has been a big hit at Deepdale since his move in March this year.

Each week the figures are used to pick a Nationwide League Division Two team of the week, and in the rankings worked out after our game against Burnley, two Town players were in the eleven, Matthew Taylor and Neil Midgley.

Taylor clocked up 1,110 points for two goal attempts saved, one wide, and delivering nine crosses. Midgley's score of 1,573 Opta points was for two goals and one near-miss. That was the top score of any of the team of the week, which also included Glen Little, whose cross led to Burnley's goal at Kenilworth Road.

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
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
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

look like getting a goal Jude Stirling had a shot cleared off the line.




