

TONY Thorpe is looking forward to his "third home debut" for Luton Town this afternoon, after signing for us on three months loan from Bristol City. He hopes his return will get his career moving again, after a disappointing spell since he left nearly two years ago. We eventually received £900,000, but after spending £7million on the team that missed promotion - they were beaten in the 1998 play-off semi-finals by Grimsby - Fulham embarked on another squad rebuilding job

and Thorpe moved on to Bristol City for £1million.

They had won promotion, but came back down again last season, with changes in management not helping the team, or individual players, as Julian Watts recalled on these pages earlier this season.

Now Thorpe is back among familiar surroundings, and delighted to be wearing Luton Town's colours again.

He still appreciates the progress he made here after nearly being on the scrapheap. David Pleat remembered him in the Leicester youth team, and brought him to Luton on a free transfer in 1992 when Leicester decided their local lad was not good enough.

Few who were there, or who saw it on TV, will forget Thorpe's debut, when he scored a cracking goal in an FA Cup-tie at Newcastle in January 1994.

A couple of years later he was converted from midfield to striker, and in the 1996/97 season he hit 31 league and cup goals, the first Luton man to achieve that mark since Malcolm Macdonald in 1971.

He is back after Tony Pulis, his third manager at Bristol City, decided that the nimble striker was surplus to requirements. A transfer fee has been agreed with the Town, and it could be paid to make the deal permanent at any time during the three-month loan.

"I am very pleased indeed to be back," said the 25-year-old striker. "Life has been a bit difficult since I left - I have had six managers since then, and different managers have different ideas. It would suit me if the transfer becomes permanent."

Thorpe had taken a pay cut to rejoin the Town, but said: "It's worth it to be playing first team football again."

In his first spell with us he scored 60 goals in 144 games, and when he came back on loan for the final six weeks of last season he netted four times in eight games. Having been forced to miss the cup-tie at Lincoln, he would rather like to put his name on the Luton score sheet again this afternoon.

As Thorpe came in, two players went out, to help Lennie Lawrence box up his wages budget. Neil Midgley went back to Ipswich, after they declined to extend his loan into a third month. They were worried about cover for injuries, and suspensions which are on the near-horizon.

He left with a grateful handshake from Lawrence for services rendered - three goals in ten games. "He deserves our thanks, if only for the two goals that beat Burnley," said the boss. "And his time here will have done him no harm, giving him a taste of league football."

As Midgley said good-bye, so did defender Alan White, although in his case it is only for a month at present. He has joined Colchester on loan, and made his debut for them on Saturday. They are fighting to avoid relegation, and he helped them to a creditable 1-1 draw at Stoke. But he will not be allowed to play against us when we go to Layer Road in 13 days time.

SAFEGUARDING the club's interests, and rewarding a player who deserves tangible recognition for his achievements, Lennie Lawrence has reached agreement with Gary Doherty to extend his contract. A new deal has been signed, running to June, 2002 for the Irishman who will be 20 next month.

WE MEET an old friend when we go to Oxford on Tuesday for the Auto Windscreens Shield first round. Ray Harford, the only manager ever to bring major silverware to Kenilworth Road, has just been appointed Technical Director at the Manor Ground.

He will be the experienced guide for new manager Mickey Lewis, who has been put in charge until the end of the season. The Town can take some of the credit, if that is the right word, for the vacancy. Our 1-0 win at Oxford was the last straw for the then manager Malcolm Shotton, who walked out 48 hours later. It was Oxford's fifth consecutive defeat

Harford has known somewhat greater success than that - he stepped up from No. 2 to John Moore to become manager of the Town in 1987, and 12 months later led us out at Wembley on the day we beat Arsenal in the final of the Littlewoods Cup. We returned a year later, when we were runners-up to Nottingham Forest, but Harford was to enjoy an even greater prize after leaving us. After a spell at Wimbledon he joined his old pal Kenny Dalglish at Blackburn, and as his assistant helped to guide the Rovers to the Premiership championship.

Spells as manager of West Brom and QPR followed, and he helped out Jim Smith at Derby for the second half of last season before leaving Pride Park in the summer.

THERE was a unique Luton Town family treble tucked away in the pages of the matchday magazine for the cup-tie with Lincoln.

Club secretary Cherry Newbery spotted it after reading Roger Wash's column about a previous cup-tie between the sides, in December 1931. We wonder if three generations of the same family have ever before featured in the same programme: Cherry's normal column from the secretary's office appeared, while in the advertisement for the club shop one of the models for polo shirts on offer was her daughter Claire.

And way back in 1931 the Yardley mentioned by Roger Wash was Cherry's grandfather, Jimmy Yardley.

He scored both our goals in a 2-2 draw at Sincil Bank and got another when we won the replay 4-0 at Kenilworth Road. He was on target again when we were beaten 2-1 by Wolves in the third round a few weeks later.

A Scot, Yardley spent five seasons at Kenilworth Road, joining us from Clapton Orient in 1926 and scored 94 goals in 188 league and cup appearances before moving on to Charlton Athletic. In Luton, he met and married a local girl, and Cherry Newbery is their grand-daughter.

MANAGER sackings are common enough in football, but we were sad to hear that our former player Paul Futcher has lost his job at Southport. He was elbowed as manager after a 5-0 thrashing at Kidderminster, which left Southport below mid-table in the Nationwide Conference, and with no hope of regaining Football League status this season.

Futcher, one of the most elegant central defenders ever to wear a Town shirt, was a £100,000 bargain from Chester, and after four years with us moved on to Manchester City, Oldham, Derby, Barnsley, Halifax and Grimsby. His first effort in management saw eight defeats in ten games at Darlington, and he left after ten weeks, but as player-manager he led Gresley Rovers to the Doc Martens championship two years ago. They were denied promotion to the Conference because their ground was not up to scratch, and Futcher moved to Southport in the summer of 1997 as 41-year-old player-manager.

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
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The Manager

UNTIL Tuesday evening's game at Lincoln things had not been going too well for us recently, but that well-deserved result should be turned to our advantage.

Our last game at Kenilworth Road saw the unbeaten home league record ended, by the best team we have seen in the league so far. We started brightly enough, but were undone by defensive lapses.

Then we had two away games, and two contrasting performances. At Bristol Rovers we were two down in the first 18 minutes, which left us a mountain which proved too steep to climb on a ground where we traditionally do not do well.

We were guilty of lack of concentration for the first goal, and the second came from great technique by Mark Walters.

I rested two players for the trip to Bristol, and am glad I did. Young players need a rest sometimes, and Matthew Taylor and Stuart Douglas were looking a little jaded. As the match developed, I doubt if it would have made any difference to the result if they had played. Bristol Rovers are strong in every area of the field, and probably there is no team in this league better equipped to deal with us.

Taylor and Douglas came back into the side for the cup-tie replay at Lincoln, and both bounced back with a vengeance.

I was pleased for all the players that we got a result at Sincil Bank, because I wanted to take this team back to Fulham and see how it compares with a good First Division side. We compared very well indeed the last time we went to Craven Cottage to become the only visiting team to win there last season.

At Lincoln it was a night for players to show determination, especially after the performance at Bristol, and we showed the right attitude right from the start. Conditions, with rain and a strong wind, were difficult, but we made our extra quality tell, as a Second Division team should against Third Division opponents.

Lincoln never got close to scoring, and we were pleased to deal with their set pieces, knowing how important they are to Lincoln. The clean

sheet was overdue and very welcome, and although there was only one goal in it at the end we were so much the better side that it could easily have been 3-0 or 4-0.

We redeemed ourselves with a resolute, professional performance and now we are looking forward to next Saturday's game at Fulham. We are in good spirit, and collecting £150,000 from TV has been a nice little bonus for the club. There will be no pressure on us at Craven Cottage - it will make a change for us to be the underdogs, and we have a good chance of another nice little earner if we play up to our capabilities.

I will be looking for maximum effort again today, because we can be sure Notts County will give us a good game.

They will want to win to put more daylight between themselves and the chasing pack, including us, while we need to start collecting points again after suffering our worst run of the season so far, three consecutive defeats in the league.

The cup-tie next week means that we have only three more league games this year after this afternoon's match. By the turn of the year our points total must be well into the thirties to keep us in touch with the play-off places.

Finally, like everyone else I am delighted to see Tony Thorpe back at Luton Town. I will neither confirm nor deny the alleged transfer fee that is being asked, but I am pleased that we and Bristol City have a deal lined up, and I hope to make his move permanent before the three-month loan runs out.

We are discussing with Bristol City their feelings on allowing Thorpe to play in the Auto Windscreens Shield at Oxford on Tuesday, and in the FA Cup next week. He should really be up for that one, back at Fulham, just as I hope we all will be.

Meanwhile, give us your backing today, and help us collect more points, because for all the enjoyment a good cup run can bring, promotion is still the number one priority for this club.

THE NICE little win at Lincoln has given us a timely lift, and set us up to get back on track in the league this afternoon. It was a difficult game, in wind and rain, and perhaps not as much of a "footballing" occasion as we wanted it to

be. But we produced the better football, and, importantly on the night, we showed we can battle a bit as well.

Liam George was not the happiest man in the dressing room after missing two or three good chances, but we are not complaining - he is having a cracking season, and we appreciate the way he gets into position for those opportunities. He can't remember missing so many chances in one game, but each time it happened I let him know that it was nothing to worry about. He will get goals, and knows the old adage about not being afraid to miss.

Stuart Douglas's goal was timely, and typical of his all-action determination. He took the goal very well, despite being under considerable pressure. As professionals, and for me personally as a defender, the clean sheet was more than welcome - we know we have not had enough of those so far this season. Efe Sodje has done a good job at the back, and Gary Doherty is still a dual-purpose player. With Tony Thorpe available this afternoon, the boss has a nice problem on his hands with team selection. Personally, I am not sure which is Dozza's best position, because he has done so well in whatever role he has filled.

Having mentioned our pleasure at Tuesday's result, I have to admit that we were poor at Bristol on Saturday. We just didn't get going, and I can't explain why. We know we have to be more consistent, because we have shown that on our day we can match just about any team in this division.

We are also aware of the need to get back to winning ways in the league, and in front of our own supporters. Three league defeats in a row is an experience we have not enjoyed, and much as we are looking forward to the cup-tie at Fulham we all know that league points are more important.

We began the campaign at Notts County, and our draw there on the opening day of the season has

looked better and better as the weeks have passed. County have surprised a few people by doing so well, although I bet their coaches were not too happy with last week's 4-4 draw at home to Bristol City. If you see two similar defences today we should win 10-8!

Needless to say, that is not our game plan, and I think we are well capable of going one better than the 0-0 draw at Meadow Lane in August.

We were very disappointed to lose our unbeaten home record in the league to Preston, but they were a very good side, and I note that a few days later they went to Bury and won 3-1 before winning in the cup on Tuesday.

We now have to put together another unbeaten home run, starting this afternoon. I quite like the idea of a final league table showing only one home defeat against our name.

The return of Tony Thorpe is a real bonus, and we are all pleased to see him "back home." I think he is the right man for us, and that Luton Town is the right club for him, and his move should be beneficial on all sides. He's a cheerful character, confident in his own ability, and in the right mood to make an impact again with regular first team football.

I hope Bristol City allow him to play in the cup, and perhaps in the Auto Windscreens Shield at Oxford on Tuesday. Their players must have thought "Oh, no, not again" when they heard the draw. We were not at all displeased, because we have shown twice already that we must have a good chance of winning at the Manor Ground for the second time this season.

And don't be kidding about the importance of this competition: I don't yet know how strong our team will be, but I can promise that every one in the side will want to win. It might be a Cinderella competition, but it still offers the chance to play at Wembley, and that is every footballer's dream.



PAUL McLaren was our only major injury worry from the cup-tie at Lincoln on Tuesday, and he was fighting an uphill battle to be available for this afternoon's match.

The odds were very much against him, after he suffered a slight hamstring strain and had to be subbed early in the second half at Sincil Bank. As with all injuries like this, you have to be patient and allow nature the time it needs to give the physio a helping hand. I don't think we will be able to risk him today.


In terms of physical effects, the match at Bristol on Saturday was more bruising. Gary Doherty collected a nasty wound in a clash of heads and had to be taken off to have eight stitches inserted.

They will be taken out in the next few days, but the injury, near the temple, is no big problem, and Doherty was able to play at Lincoln wearing a protective plaster. If selected, he can do the same today.

There were a lot of minor bumps and bruises from the Bristol game, but the only other one giving cause for concern was an ankle injury suffered by Julian Watts. It was very sore, but he was able to play at Lincoln, and while the soreness has still not entirely vanished I expect him to be available to play this afternoon.

Two strikers with long-term injuries are making good progress. Andrew Fotiadis is ahead of schedule, and has got another week's training behind him after his knee ligament injury. He saw the specialist again during the week, and the verdict was that everything was OK. He had been hoping to play at least a part of the game for the reserves next Wednesday, but that game has been postponed, so his earliest date for a return to competitive football is December 22, when we have our next fixture in the Avon Insurance Combination.

Fulham Reserves play on a University of London pitch, and that will not be available on the original date.

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

Hatters Abroad

A huge thank you to the 600 people who completed the questionnaire from Cliff Bassett handed out to fans at the Gillingham match in October. The response has left us in no doubt you really do care about what happens to our club in the future.

Every single one of the ideas contained in the responses has been captured on computer so you can be sure none of your effort has been wasted. We are now in the process of putting together a plan to implement as many of the ideas as possible.

It was no surprise that the most frequently mentioned subject was the saga of our new ground - some 162 supporters said they want to move to a new ground while just four fans said they wished to stay at Kenilworth Road.

Almost one in seven of those who replied were women, a significantly higher proportion than for a fans' survey conducted in March 1995, when the figure was under one in ten. Overall, almost 9 in 10 of you claimed to go to all or most games each season with more men making this claim than women.

Some 3 in 4 attended with either family or friends and 4 in 10 of those with more than two others. Most of you clearly like to watch your football with others. A quarter of the fans also came with at least one child, though only about 1 in 10 came with more than two.

In total, just over 7 in 10 of the fans who responded claimed to be season ticket holders, compared with more than 8 in 10 in the 1995 survey. In the current survey the proportion of fans claiming to be season ticket holders was far higher for women than for men. In terms of membership, 3 out of 4 of the fans claimed to be members.

Your Thoughts and Concerns

Cliff gave you the opportunity to suggest improvements you would like to see at the Club and new ideas you would like to see tried. Not surprisingly this brought a huge range of responses covering everything from the format of the programme to intricate plans on how to raise new finance for the club. After recent events, it was clear that a huge number of fans were simply relieved that they still have a club to support at all. In fact many fans included notes of thanks for Cliff Bassett and the staff at the club for all they have done in the past few months.

As well as seeing improvements off the pitch, Luton fans are also fairly optimistic about what is happening on it. The bright start to the season had many people raving about what one fan described as the best group of youngsters he has seen at the club in about 50 years! Despite this wave of optimism just about everyone had improvements to suggest.

The suggestions raised by the most number of people are listed below, with the number who raised the point in brackets:

- Relocate to a new stadium please (162)
- Encourage young fans with either cheap or free tickets (87)
- Young/talented players shouldn't be sold as frequently (82)
- Ticket prices should be reduced for less attractive matches (51)
- More toilets of a higher quality (49)
- Fans must be consulted more - a supporters' representative on the board (42)
- Money should be raised through a share issue (42)
- More pre-match/ half-time entertainment (40)
- More advertising over a wider area (36)

We have wasted no time in getting to grips with some of these issues.

We are working hard on finalising our stadium plans so we can make a planning application to Luton Council in the New Year, and part of this process may well involve raising additional finance.

Today we are launching our limited edition range of merchandise which we are sending to 100,000 supporters across four counties. As part of this promotion we've also launched an end of century ticket bonanza that will give you all chance to benefit from reduced prices at Kenilworth Road for the rest of the season. But be quick - you've got to buy your cut price tickets before the end of the year!

Cliff has gone on record as saying we have no plans to sell any of our young players, and we've been talking to FLAG and a cross-section of our supporters to find out how we can get you more involved with the club.

We're also planning improvements to Kenilworth Road, subject to agreement with the Council, and we'll let you know what can be achieved shortly. A bigger function room, improved refreshment and toilet facilities, and improvements to the ticket office and club shop are top priorities.

As for pre-match and half-time entertainment, we've got plans here too.

We hope to give you a taste of things to come at the Boxing Day game with Chesterfield - so make sure you get here early to enjoy the fun!

We are listening and we are acting as fast as we can! Thanks again for your terrific response to the questionnaire, and please keep the bright ideas coming.

GARY BRAZIL MANAGER

Gary started his career as an apprentice at Crystal Palace, and in 1985 he moved to Preston North End for £25,000. Four years later his ability attracted the interest of Newcastle United who paid £250,000 for his services. Gary finished his playing career at Fulham following a £125,000 move in 1990. In 1998 he joined Notts County as Youth Team Manager and in this past close season was promoted to Assistant Manager. Following the shock resignation of Sam Allardyce, Gary was appointed Caretaker Manager but has now been given the manager's job on a full time basis at least until the end of the season.

DARREN WARD (GOALKEEPER)

Widely regarded as one of the most promising

'keepers outside the Premiership, Darren has played for Wales at U21 level and regularly been selected for the National Squad. Notts paid Mansfield £160,000 for 'Wardy' in 1992, since then he has become a favourite at Meadow Lane, figured in the PFA Divisional select elevens.

JAMES LINDLEY (GOALKEEPER)

A product of the Notts youth system, James came on in leaps and bounds last season, sufficiently so for the management team to award him with a professional contract. Modelling himself on the former Man Utd 'keeper, Schmikes' as he is known to his team mates, is a brave and committed young goalkeeper.

RICHARD LIBURD (DEFENDER)

Richard joined Middlesbrough from Eastwood Town for a £20,000 fee in 1993 and shortly thereafter followed manager Lennie Lawrence

to Bradford City after making 50 appearances for 'Boro. At Bradford, who paid £200,000 for him, he established himself as a strong tackling wing back. He was released on a free and played for Carlisle for a short spell before being recruited by Sam Allardyce in the summer of 1998.

DENNIS PEARCE (DEFENDER)

A skilful left back and wing back whose talents delighted the Notts faithful in the Championship winning 1997/98 season. Dennis failed to capitalise on that most productive spell as he made too many indifferent appearances last term. He will be looking for a return to the form that won him an accolade from his fellow professionals when being named in the PFA Third Division Select Side in 1998.

MARK WARREN (DEFENDER)

A former England youth international, Mark joined Leyton Orient as a trainee and won Player of the Season at Brisbane Road in 1997. Following a very successful spell on loan at Oxford, he was spotted by Sam Allardyce who was relentless in his pursuit of the signature of the impressive central defender. Once a regular in the side last season, his performances made him a favourite with the supporters and one of the first names on the team sheet.



MATT REDMILE (DEFENDER)

Although having previously made a number of first team appearances, it was an immediate impact that the then 20 year-old made as Notts set about gaining immediate promotion back to the Second Division in August 1997. His headed goals from set pieces and his command of the penalty area became a trade mark and like so many other of his team mates, he made the Third Division look easy.

IAN RICHARDSON (DEFENDER)

Ian entered professional football relatively late at the age of 24, when Birmingham City's then manager Barry Fry paid Dagenham & Redbridge £60,000. After only a handful of games for Birmingham, Colin Murphy brought him to Meadow Lane as a ball winning midfielder at a cost of £200,000.



RICHARD HOLMES (DEFENDER)

Following some impressive performances in the youth team, Richard was awarded a professional contract before completing his traineeship last year.

CLAYTON BLACKMORE (DEFENDER)

Clayton still trains long and hard in the belief that there are two or three good seasons left in him, a belief that literally shines from his eyes with boyish enthusiasm. His far too infrequent appearances for Middlesbrough in 1997/98 still gave the fans plenty to shout about, and the experienced mid-fielder proved he was still a force to be reckoned with, when displaying his consummate skill and boundless energy on the pitch. A product of the Manchester United youth scheme Clayton made 250+ appearances for the 'Red Devils' collecting many honours along the way including FA Cup, Coca-Cola Cup, Super Cup and Premier League Winners medals. Signed during the middle of July on a free transfer from Barnsley, he has 39 Welsh caps.



FRANCIS TIERNEY (MIDFIELDER)

A trainee at Crewe Alexandra, he became one of Dario Gradi's star youngsters. The disappointment of an on/off transfer to Liverpool finally failing to materialise made it difficult for Fran to hold down a regular first team place at

Gresty Road. A wide right player with considerable flair and good ball control, he was signed by manager Sam Allardyce last summer.



GARY OWERS (MIDFIELDER)

In an illustrious career that has seen him complete well in excess of 500 first class games, Gary has been a midfield ball-winner for Sunderland and Bristol City before joining Notts in the summer of 1998. Following a season at Ashton Gate, during which he spent long spells on the injury list and having missed pre-season training at Meadow Lane, he took several months to find fitness and fluency. His crunching tackles and high energy performances then endeared him to the Notts supporters.

ANDY HUGHES (MIDFIELDER)

Andy failed to make his mark at Oldham, where he had progressed through their youth ranks to become a highly rated young professional. He grasped the opportunity when Notts took him on loan and impressed sufficiently for a £150,000 transfer fee to prise him away from Boundary Park. He was a deserved Third Division Championship medal winner in 1998.

ALEX DYER (MIDFIELDER)

Alex is a much travelled player who started his career as a striker but has, certainly as far as his involvement in the Notts team is concerned become 'Mr Versatile'. He has filled the roles of striker, central defender, full back and wing back. He came to Meadow Lane from Huddersfield and previously played for Blackpool, Hull, Crystal Palace, Charlton, Oxford, Lincoln, and Barnet plus Portuguese Second Division side Maia.

CRAIG RAMAGE (MIDFIELDER)

Signed on a free transfer from Bradford in August 1999. Craig has already proved himself to be a key player in this seasons squad. He had a horrific season at Bradford in 98/99 when suffering a series of cartilage injuries, and did not start a first team game. His previous clubs

include Derby County, and Watford with loan spells at Wigan Athletic and Peterborough United.

MARK STALLARD (STRIKER)


In the steal of the season, Sam Allardyce made an audacious swoop for Mark Stallard from Wycombe Wanderers. The (almost) local front man had been a trainee at Derby but had made only a handful of appearances at first team level before being transferred to Bradford City for £110,000 in 1994. Although registering some impressive performances at Valley Parade he was sold to Wycombe in 1997 where he made an explosive start with 11 goals in his first 16 games. He finished top scorer with 18 from 48 games in 91/98 before missing most of last season through injury. His return to fitness coincided with a predatory strike from Sam Allardyce and he joined County for a nominal sum just before the transfer deadline.

KEVIN RAPLEY (STRIKER)

A quick and tricky right-sided striker, Kevin made an early and impressive impact on Brentford's first team following his traineeship at Griffin Park. He was almost ever present under manager's Eddie May and Micky Adams but fell somewhat out of favour with the arrival of Chairman/ Manager Ron Noades. Whilst on loan at Southend last season last season he hit a rich vein which sparked a £50,000 move to Meadow Lane. In his first outing for the Magpies he scored the only goal of the game at Luton, ending a long and worrying win-less spell for County.

DUANE DARBY (STRIKER)

Following a successful start to his professional career at Torquay, where he had a scoring rate of 1 in 3 games, he moved to Doncaster then Hull City where he continued his scoring feats. A fractured cheekbone caused a spell on the sidelines but failed to prevent him finishing Hull's top scorer in 1997/98. The Bosman ruling enabled him to join County on a free last summer but he snapped an Achilles tendon in pre-season training, an injury which was to deny him to manager Sam Allardyce all season.



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

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Fulham v Luton Town

For Fulham, traffic and parking make the motoring trip difficult, and the best advice is to use the coaches, or public transport, via Kings Cross and Putney Bridge underground station. If you want to drive, it is about 35 miles, and our preferred route is via the M1, and M25 west, leaving at junction 15 near Heathrow to join the M4 towards London. It becomes the A4, and you leave at the Hammersmith Flyover to follow Hammersmith signs to the Hammersmith roundabout. Follow the road alongside and underneath the A4 and turn left where you see the sign Alternative Route via Putney Bridge. That takes you down Fulham Palace Road, and after 1.2 miles the ground is on your right. Street parking is controlled, and charged by meters.

DIY TRAVELLERS

The road journey to Oxford takes a little over an hour, depending on traffic, via the M1 south, M25 west and M40 west. Leave M40 when you see Oxford signposted, and join the A40, and see below for the final approach. The cross-country route is shorter in miles but takes a little longer. Leave Luton on the A505, through Dunstable, and follow the signs to Aylesbury. There pick up the A418 and go beyond Thame to join the A40, which is signposted to Oxford. On the outskirts of Oxford you come to the Headington roundabout, with the ring road running left and right. Go straight ahead at the roundabout, and you are in London Road, and in just under a mile you will see the ground on your right.

Luton Town v Notts County



"It could have finished ten-all."

Having walked away with the championship of the old Division Two in 1982, after three years of close misses, everyone involved with the club felt that we had a side more than capable of holding its own at the top level.

Even so, manager David Pleat felt the squad needed strengthening and spent many hours trying to entice young Paul Walsh away from Charlton Athletic. Walsh was sought after by most of the top clubs in the country, but the persuasive tongue of Pleat finally won the day although the transfer came at a sad cost with Steve White, the previous season's second leading scorer, forced to go to the Valley as part of the deal.

Pleat now felt he had the best attacking pair in the country in Walsh and Brian Stein and with ace winger David Moss providing the ammunition, the Division One defences were going to be in for a hard time.

Our opening fixture was away to F.A.Cup holders, Tottenham, and after 20 minutes all Pleat's bold promises seemed to be shot to ribbons. In that opening spell Spurs went into a two goal lead much to the delight of the packed White Hart Lane crowd of 39,180 and Luton supporters could be forgiven for thinking that our top flight stay was likely to be as long as our previous one-just twelve months!

Making his debut for Tottenham that day was ex-Pleat target, Gary Mabbutt, and he took only three minutes to open his account for his new club, heading in a Glenn Hoddle free kick. Hoddle set up the second goal as well, threading a pass through for Mick Hazard to make simple work of beating Jake Findlay in the Luton goal.

The players had to learn fast and gradually started to make an impact on the game with Stein, in particular, causing problems for the Tottenham defence. It was a direct run and shot from the

clever South African that panicked Spurs defender John Lacy into knocking the ball into his own net for the first Town goal and then speeding through a square home defence to tap in number two.

Scars at both ends as the match wore on caused both sets of supporters to bite their fingernails, but a draw was a fair result although Pleat warned that better teams than Tottenham would not fritter away a two goal lead.


Pleat's words certainly came home to roost three days later with West Ham the first visitors to Kenilworth Road. It was really men against boys as an uncharacteristic Hammers, using physical power, soaked up everything the Town could throw at them and then scored two quick second half goals to kill the game. This time there was no fight back and no happy ending as the players found out the hard way that at this level you must take your chances and that any mistake at the other end was bound to be punished.

In those days we worried if we went two games without a win and a nervous crowd of only 9,071 turned up at Kenilworth Road the following Saturday to see if the Town could break their duck and overcome Notts County, who had drawn their opening two games.

The Magpies, managed by the wily Jimmy Sirrell, were a side that had played together for a while and had caused more than a few upsets in their first season back in the top flight in 1981/82. They also possessed the quickest player around at the time in John Chiedozie who according to Pleat, "could catch pigeons" but often hit the by-line before his fellow forwards were in the penalty area.

Paul Walsh, still finding his feet at the new level, missed an early chance but suddenly the clouds lifted from above the 19 year old when he headed in a pin-point Ricky Hill cross. Stung by this, County surged forward and equalised when giant centre-half Brian Kilcline headed a corner through a static Luton defence.

Worse was to follow soon after when Chiedozie scampered through on to a long ball, past a

stretched Luton back four, and hammered County in front. Hatters defender, Richard Money, then had to leave the field after breaking his nose in a clash with Trevor Christie but before substitute Mike Small could come on Hill had slammed in a loose ball following a corner to level the scores once more.

Picking up a pass from full back Kirk Stephens he set off for goal, avoiding two foul tackles from Magpies defender Pedro Richards, before skipping past Kilcline and goalkeeper Raddy Avramovic to slot the ball home and bring the house down.

Walsh's hat trick goal came soon after when he reacted quickly to a low Moss cross and got in front of the Notts defenders to steer the ball in. County had no option now but to attack and made

life extremely uncomfortable for the Luton defence with shots raining in from all angles and Jake Findlay having to pull off a string of acrobatic saves. A goal was pulled back when Mark Goodwin scored with a simple header following a long throw and it was a relieved crowd that rose to give the players a standing ovation at the end of a pulsating game of continuous excitement.

There were mixed emotions from David Pleat afterwards when he reflected on a game "that could have finished ten-all" with the pleasure of the first win and marvellous entertainment for the crowd tempered by obvious defensive frailties.


We were missing the injured Marvin Johnson, and not until the late stages, when Gary Doherty was


But Preston were never going to concede two goals, let alone three, and their experience shone through as they settled to play a containing game after the break.

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FA CUP REPLAY

Lincoln City 0 Luton Town 1 (HT 0-0)

THERE might have been only one late goal in it, but the Town's performance at Sincil Bank was a real tonic for supporters who had watched recent league games. The night was made for Third Division opposition to pull off a cup upset, wet and very windy, and the pitch greasy.

But having so nearly won at the first attempt at Kenilworth Road, Lincoln were never allowed to feel any optimism. The Town had the right mixture of battle and skill, and their superior football might easily have brought more than the goal steered in by Stuart Douglas six minutes from time.

He and Matthew Taylor returned to the side after being rested at Bristol, and both were in the strong surge of determination that ran through the whole team. The manager's decision to rest them on Saturday paid handsome dividends - both looked hungry for action and success, and they combined for the winning goal.

Gary Doherty, still seen as a centre-back by the manager, was the best attacker on view, partnering Douglas and, in the second half especially, laying off a series of clever flicks and headers, and showing no fear despite the plaster covering a head wound received at Bristol which had needed four stitches.

Most satisfying of all was the way the defence coped, making it look easy against a team which rates set pieces as the major weapon in its scoring armoury. Efe Sodje, Julian Watts and Marvin Johnson, aided when necessary by Taylor and Stuart Fraser, denied Lincoln even one clear sight of goal. Nathan Abbey dealt comfortably with what did get through in terms of corners and hopeful high crosses.

The home side were the battering ram team, while the Town's passing gave them the rapier thrusts, often through Liam George.

He was a bit miffed at passing up a possible hat-trick, but goals or no goals, his contribution was highly valuable. Lincoln always looked uneasy when George and Douglas ran at them with the ball.

The second half saw the Town so much on top that it was a mystery why the pressbox was starting to make arrangements for new deadlines as extra time got nearer - Lincoln were on the ropes, but miraculously escaping the knock-out that threatened throughout the second half.

But you could see Lincoln's players accept defeat once Douglas struck at the end of yet another move which was far brighter and sharper than anything the home team produced. Doherty laid off the ball to Taylor, who in turn switched it across the field to give Douglas the chance to compete with Stuart Bimson for possession. The fullback had less determination than the Town man, who muscled clear and kept cool to carefully steer in the winner.

"No less than we deserved," said Lennie Lawrence. "It would have been a travesty if we had not won that game."








● **THE WINNER:** Stuart Douglas leaves Stuart Bimson sprawling, and the shot is about to be despatched into the net.

THE MANAGER shuffled the pack without finding any aces as we went down to our seventh away defeat of the season at the Memorial Ground. A two-man attack, receiving precious little good quality service, rarely looked like unsettling a strong Bristol Rovers side that has lost only once at home this season, to Notts County.

Yet another goal conceded from a corner gave Rovers an early boost, and not until Tony Thorpe went on as a late sub did we look like scoring, and by then the game was all over.

Stuart Douglas and Matthew Taylor were rested, and with Marvin Johnson returning after injury Efe Sodje kept his place in defence. That allowed Gary Doherty to play as an attacker with Liam George, following Neil Midgley's return to Ipswich.

Adam Locke and Michael McIndoe were recalled to play in midfield, and we might have ground out a 0-0 draw on a day when neither team looked that clever. The first attack of the second half finished us off. Robbie Pethick played a good cross-field ball to the Rovers right wing, Thomson crossed hard and low, and Jamie Cureton swept the ball home.

Thorpe made his first appearance for the Town with half an hour to go, replacing Doherty who had to go off to have stitches after a clash of heads with Andy Tillson.

The Town kept plugging away, and Spring had a free kick tipped around a post, while Nathan Abbey made a good save from Cureton.

Just once did we see a flash of the old Thorpe magic, when he jinked his way goalwards alongside the by-line before firing a shot that was still rising as it missed the bar by inches.

Sadly, for the 417 Town fans who made the trip, the game looked like an encounter between two also-rans of the Second Division. Even winning manager Ian Holloway could not call his team's performance anything more than "very competent."

Town boss Lennie Lawrence said: "We had enough of the play, but the difference between what we and they did in our penalty area was staggering. We didn't defend well enough, and that was where we were second best."




● SO CLOSE: Liam George stretches in vain to reach a low cross from Julian Watts when we were looking for an equaliser after Rovers' early goal.



● IN FULL FLOW: Matthew Spring in action on the right of our midfield.




● RISING STAR: Gary Doherty gets up for it as spearhead of the attack at Bristol.



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




