

Obviously the game against Bury last Saturday was bitterly disappointing for everybody and I said one or two things that I felt needed to be said. The players know deep down that they let themselves down and we have to make sure our

commitment is there right through all our 46 league games. If it's not and we drop below our standards, the kind of Bury result is what will happen to us.

We had a chat about things and I could have easily made three or four changes for the game at Bristol City and no one could have complained about it. I knew they couldn't possibly play as badly as that again and only the injured Rob Scott was missing as I gave them a last chance to produce the goods.

However, last Saturday we still had some half decent chances to have won the game although the performances wasn't good and to be fair, the lads then rolled their sleeves up to produce a tremendous display at Bristol on Monday.

It was just the sort of response I wanted from the players, one or two of them probably said stick that in your pipe and smoke it. That's what we need.

The commitment was there again but we also passed the ball well and we had enough chances to have won by two or three goals. We had a lot of the play and it turned out to be one of the best away performances we have had.

When you think City have paid £600,000 for a centre forward and they have 40 professionals on their books while they have 9,000 season tickets holders, it shows they are a massive club so for us to do what we did was magnificent.

That's the standard we have set ourselves and we have to maintain that week in, week out. Today's opposition Luton Town have had to work to stay at their level and they haven't got millions to fork out for players and they will again provide tough opposition for us. We have to try and follow their example to maintain our position.

They have done well over the last few years and now Ricky Hill has taken over and they got a tremendous result to take a point at Wycombe so we will have to be at our best to match them.

Just briefly looking at Tuesday night's game at Barnsley, if anyone thinks we are dead and buried, they are in for a surprise despite our one goal, deficit. We are sometimes at our best away from home and if we score we are back in the tie. I would like to see us do well in the competition and Dave Bassett will know the game isn't over.

Barnsley have no game this weekend but sometimes a rest can work against you so here's hoping we can pull one out of the bag.



Rotherham were hoping to reproduce the good form they had showed against Barnsley in midweek but they weren't able to do so and were punished when Bury showed them how to take chances.

All three injury doubts - Kevin Watson, Chris Beech and Stewart Talbot - were able to retain their places as the Millers made a good start coming close to taking a sixth minute lead.

Beech headed across the face of goal and Guy Branston climbed above the Bury defence to power a header into the net but the joy was short lived when the linesman raised his flag for offside.

Ian Gray saved a 20 yarder from Littlejohn before two Bury corner were cleared without too much trouble.

Watson twice hit free kicks too deep and on 28 minutes, Rotherham came close to opening the scoring with a good move. Talbot and Watson linked well for Mark Robins to hit a first time shot which was saved by Kenny. Three minutes later a great ball from Beech put Robins through but before he could control the ball properly, the keeper was out quickly to block his shot.

Paul Warne headed wide following a Watson corner and as the Millers kept up the pressure, Branston headed wide from another corner.

But despite doing most of the attacking, Rotherham fell behind in the 43rd minute when Bhutia curled a superb 25 yarder into the net. However, the lead lasted just two minutes before the Millers grabbed an equaliser. A corner wasn't cleared properly and when Robins hit a deep cross to the far post, Rob Scott scored with a header.

Eight minutes into the second half Branston again came close, heading just over the bar but in the 64th minute he almost put the Millers in front. He met a corner and his header looked to be going in the net only for the keeper to produce a brilliant save.

Worse was to follow a minute later when Bury went in front again, Littlejohn volleying home a Collins long throw.

From then on Rotherham were unable to create an impact up front as they slipped to their third home defeat of the season.

Just one change was made to the team which visited Ashton Gate with criticism from manager Ronnie Moore ringing in the players' ears following the defeat against Bury. Brian Wilsterman came in for his first game of the season to replace the injured Rob Scott.

City were soon into the attack and Ian Gray had to get down well to save Tinnion's header following a Peacock cross but the Millers replied quickly.

Kevin Watson curled in a free kick which Leo Fortune-West headed down and Paul Warne's shot was deflected for a corner. Two minutes later the City keeper almost let a fierce Warne cross slip into the net while at the other end, Gray saved comfortably from Thorpe's header. Rotherham looked the better side as they passed the ball about well and came close when Mark Robins turned smartly but his 20 yarder was just too high.

Guy Branston had a header saved following another Watson free kick and on 23 minutes, the Millers came within a couple of inches of taking the lead when Robins' shot hit the inside of the post and came back into play. Millen headed over the Rotherham bar and Bell drove a free kick through the defensive wall but Gray was equal to it. A smart link up between Chris Beech and Watson saw Robins to hit a deep cross which Millers plucked away from Fortune-West's head and in first half injury time, a good Branston tackle conceded a corner.

City started the second half in much more lively fashion and in the first couple of minutes substitute Goodridge cut in to fire a shot into the side netting.

Peacock headed wide from a Tinnion corner and on the hour mark City came close to taking the lead when Holland headed only just wide from a corner.

But it was Rotherham who broke the deadlock on 64 minutes when Darren Garner quickly played a short free kick to Marvin Bryan who sent over a perfect cross which big Leo met superbly at the far post to head home his first goal of the season.

Bristol responded with Goodridge having a shot saved and then Holland shot straight at Gray before appeals for handball in the Rotherham penalty area were denied. Rotherham might have increased their lead in the 77th minute when a quick break saw Garner and Robins combine well only for Warne to hit his shot too high. Fortune-West then brought a great save from Miller with a left foot shot and five minutes injury time brought City no reward as the Millers recorded their second away win of the season.




MUCH-TRAVELED

Luton Town's much-travelled central defender Julian Watts began his League career with Rotherham United. Signing professional at Millmoor in July 1990, he featured in Rotherham's 1991/92 promotion campaign and his solitary goal in 20 League games clinched the 2-1 win at home to Walsall in November 1991. He was sold to Sheffield Wednesday for £80,000 in March 1992 and joined Luton on a free transfer from Bristol City in August 1999, netting four goals in 45 Second Division outings for the Hatters last season.

PROMOTION WINNER

Former Luton Town midfielder Steve Thompson was an experienced figure in Rotherham United's promotion success last season. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Bolton Wanderers for £180,000 in August 1991, he made five consecutive First Division appearances for Luton prior to joining Leicester City in an exchange deal involving Scott Oakes and Des Linton in October 1991. He joined Rotherham on a free transfer from Burnley in July 1997 and



scored 14 goals in 103 League games before moving to Halifax Town this summer.

LEADING MARKSMAN

Luton Town's former loanee striker Lee Glover was Rotherham United's leading marksman in 1997/98. Moving to Luton on loan from Nottingham Forest in September 1991, his solitary League appearance for the Hatters was in that month's 2-1 win at home to Southampton. He joined Rotherham from Port Vale for £150,000 in August 1996 and featured in last season's promotion campaign scoring 29 goals in 85 League outings prior to joining Macclesfield Town this summer. Ex-Luton loanee striker Imre Varadi was Rotherham's leading goalscorer in 1993/94.

IRISH INTERNATIONAL

Ex Rotherham United midfielder Tony Greasham was capped 17 times by the Republic of Ireland while at Luton Town. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Orient for £150,000 in August 1979, he scored twice in 78 Second Division games for Luton before being sold to Brighton for £100,000 in July 1982. He joined Rotherham on a free transfer from Manchester City in August 1987 and was an experienced figure in the 1988/89 Fourth Division title triumph, netting seven goals in 110 League outings prior to joining Walsall as player-coach in August 1990.

TITLE TRIUMPH

Former Luton Town striker Rodney Fern featured prominently in Rotherham United's 1980/81 Third Division title triumph. Moving to Luton from Leicester City for £45,000 in June 1972, he featured in their 1973/74 promotion campaign and scored five times in 39 League games for today's visitors before being sold to Chesterfield for £8,000 in July 1975. He joined



Rotherham for £35,000 in June 1979 and netted 34 goals in 105 League outings while at Millmoor until retiring in May 1983 to run a local pub.

TOP SCORER

One-time Rotherham United striker Vic Halom was Luton Town's top scorer in 1972/73. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Fulham for £35,000 in September 1971, he netted 17 goals in 59 Second Division games for Luton prior to joining Sunderland for a similar fee in February 1973. He joined Rotherham as player-coach from Oldham Athletic for £25,000 in February 1980 and featured in the 1980/81 Third Division title campaign, scoring twice in 20 League outings while at Millmoor before coaching Norwegian side Fredrikstad.

SEASMAN'S SUCCESS

Former Luton Town midfielder John Seasman was an influential figure in Rotherham United's 1980/81 Third Division title success. Moving to Luton from Tranmere Rovers for £14,000 in January 1975, he sampled top-flight soccer with the Hatters that season and scored twice in eight League games before being sold to Millwall for £10,000 in February 1976. He joined Rotherham for £30,000 in August 1980 and netted 25 goals in 100 League outings while at Millmoor prior to joining Cardiff City in August 1984.

PROMOTION PUSH

One-time Rotherham United centre-forward Laurie Shefield featured in Luton Town's 1968/69 promotion near-miss. Moving to Millmoor from Norwich City in August 1967, he netted six goals in 19 Second Division games for Rotherham prior to joining Oldham Athletic four months later. He joined Luton in July 1968 and scored 12 times in 35 League outings while at Kenilworth Road before returning to Doncaster Rovers in October 1969. The likes of Andy Kiwomya and Robert Wilson have also played for both clubs since the war.

Luton Town make a rare visit to Millmoor this afternoon but they do so with the knowledge that they have lost a league game here since December 1962, although in fairness they have only played four games since then.

Last season they finished in a mid-table 13th position not really being involved in either the battle for promotion or the need the fight against relegation.

During the close season the major signing was the acquisition of keeper Mark Ovendale who cost £425,000 when he moved from Bournemouth.

He was joined by former Cherries colleague striker Mark Stein and these two were among the five newcomers while the same numbers move down to pastures new.

On the opening day of the season Town suffered a 1-0 home defeat at the hands of Notts County and then were beaten 2-1 at Wigan Athletic where their goal came from former Milliner Julian Watts who will be offered a warm welcome back to Millmoor today.

Then came a goalless home draw against Peterborough United in the Worthington Cup and last Saturday Town recorded their first win of the season when a penalty gave them a 1-0 win against Bournemouth at Kenilworth Road.

On Monday the Hatters took their first away point from a 1-1 draw at Wycombe Wanderers.

RICKY HILL (Manager) Born London 3.5.59

In a summer of immense change at Kenilworth Road, a long-time fans' favourite returned as the choice of a new board of directors to become a manager for the first time. But the former Luton star midfielder had undergone his apprenticeship in management with coaching appointments in this country and in the USA, where he was player-coach of the year while assisting Rodney Marsh at Tampa Bay in the early 90's.

Hill is remembered with great affection by Luton supporters as one the most creative midfielders the club has ever had. He joined as a schoolboy, and was a regular in Luton's league team by the time he was 17. He went on to win three caps for England. More importantly for Luton fans, he was a driving force in the team which won the League Cup at Wembley in 1988 in a memorable match against Arsenal. It is still the only big prize Luton have ever landed.

He went on to play 507 league and cup games for Luton, scoring 65 goals, including one on his debut against Bristol Rovers in 1976.

After 14 years with Luton, Hill played in France for a year before signing for Leicester City, where the manager was David Pleat, who had been youth coach when Hill joined Luton. After ending his playing career in the USA, Hill returned to England to become a coach at Sheffield Wednesday in the summer of 1996. Pleat was the Hillsborough manager who recruited him, and after three years in Sheffield, Hill rejoined Pleat yet again to become coach at Tottenham. But he had always maintained links with Luton, his first football love, and when the chance came to return as manager in succession to Lennie Lawrence in July 2000 he needed little time to accept the offer.

CHRIS RAMSEY (Assistant Manager)

Born Birmingham 21.12.43

Knowing that he needed an experienced assistant, Ricky Hill recruited one of the FA's top coaches to help him at Kenilworth Road. To most fans Chris Ramsey will best be remembered as a defender at Brighton. He was in their 1983 FA Cup final team which drew 2-2 with Manchester United, but was injured and replaced by Steve Foster in the replay which united won 4-0.

Ramsey had been at Bristol City before moving to Goldstone, and went on to play for Swindon



and Southend. He started his management career as player-manager with Naxxar Lions in Malta, before joining the FA's coaching team under Howard Wilkinson. He and Hill knew each other as players and coaches, and mutual respect ensured that when the chance came to team up at Luton both were more than pleased to accept.

NATHAN ABBEY (Goal Keeper)

Born Islington 11.7.78

The goalkeeper has battled defiantly to keep his career going at Kenilworth Road. He joined Luton as a YTS boy after being spotted in local schoolboy football. But a succession of good goalkeepers left Nathan as a near-permanent understudy. He nearly accepted a free transfer move to Holland in the summer of 1999, but decided to stay on, and was rewarded with No.1 shirt after the sale of Kevin Davis. Luton record to the start of this season: 45 appearances

JAMES AYRES (Centre-half) Born Luton 18.9.80

A commanding centre-half, Ayres joined his home town club as a YTS boy in 1996, and two years later skippered Luton's youth team to the championship of the South East Counties League.

He made his debut at Oxford in December 1999 in the Auto Windscreens Shield, and did well enough to merit occasional places on the bench for league side after that. His soccer education included a loan spell at Stevenage Borough towards the end of last season

Luton record to the start of this season: 1 appearance

EMERSON BOYCE (Defender)

Born Aylesbury 24.9.79

One of the many to come through from Luton's schools and youth development programme, the defender was signed as a YTS boy in the summer of 1995, and made the breakthrough to the League squad last season after occasional appearances following a debut in the Auto Windscreens Shield in January 1999.

Luton record to the start of this season: 37 appearances, 1 goal

FRIEDRICH BREITENFELDER (Midfielder)

Born Vienna 16.6.80

The lanky midfielder was one of many hopefuls who presented themselves for trials at Kenilworth Road before this season kicked off. He impressed in trial games, and the award of a contract ended a major problem for him, because he was out of work with no hope of being recompensed by an employer who had gone out of business. He started with Rapide Vienna as a 15 year-old schoolboy, and moved up through the ranks to win an occasional place in their first team. At 18 he moved on to

Casino Bregenz, before another Austrian club signed him. It turned out to be an unlucky move, because FCM St Polten went broke in March 2000, leaving all their players out of work, but free agents, and Luton came to the rescue with a one-year contract.

DEAN BRENNAN (Midfielder) Born Dublin 17.6.80

After several years of penny-pinching caused by continual trading losses, Luton had only 19 full-time professionals on the books when Ricky Hill became manager, and he moved swiftly to strengthen the club at all levels. His long coaching career included three years looking after the youth squad at Sheffield Wednesday, and Hill went back to Hillsborough for tow young midfielders. Dean Brennan was doubly valuable because he can also play in attack, and was delighted to join up again with Hill when Wednesday offered him a free transfer.

TOMMY CARTER Born Bermuda 9.7.77

Capped twice by his country while still a student, the nimble striker put education before his football ambitions, which was why he was 23 years old when he arrived at Luton at the start of the season to ask for a trial. He studied for four years at the Old Dominion University in Virginia, USA, to earn a degree in health and physical education. He began his football career at the Academia de Tahuichi in Santa Cruz, Bolivia, before deciding to try his luck in Europe. In pre-season games, Luton boss Ricky Hill saw enough to offer Carter a short-term contract, which he signed in August.

STUART DOUGLAS (Striker) Born Enfield 9.4.78

A striker with excellent pace, Douglas was a 17 year-old trainee when he scored his league debut for Luton against Oldham in 1995, and he looked set for more than fleeting instant stardom. He was hit by a series of injuries before he could establish himself, but determination overcame all difficulties, and he won a regular place in Luton's league side in the 1998/99 season, flourishing as a marksman and also a creator for his front-line colleagues.

Luton record to the start of this season: 139 appearances, 18 goals

ANDREW FOTIADIS (Centre-Forward)

Born Hitchin 6.9.77

Another local discovery, Fotiadis chose to stay at school to gain GCSE A-levels before being a full-time soccer professional. He won England Schools caps at under-15 and under-18 level, and developed a style to delight Luton fans and worry opposing defences, as an old-fashioned centre-forward, with good physique, power, and concentrated determination to score goals.

Luton record to the start of this season: 85 appearances, 9 goals

STUART FRASER (Defender)

Born Edinburgh 17.6.80

Stylish defender and former skipper of the Luton youth team who was given his league debut against Carlisle, in a 3-2 win, on the final day of the 1997-98 season and within a year was established as a regular member of the Luton squad.

Luton record to the start of this season: 37 appearances, 1 goal

LIAM GEORGE (Striker) Born Luton 2.2.79

Full of pace and nimble footwork, the striker came through the ranks after joining Luton as a schoolboy, and became a regular member of the Republic of Ireland squad that progressed to the European youth championship final in the summer of 1998. George had made his league debut in September 1997, but suffered a broken leg soon afterwards. He returned in triumph, to complete his first full campaign in the league last season, in which he was Luton's leading scorer and also progressed to win Ireland under-21 honours.

Luton record to the start of this season: 67 appearances, 16 goals

PETER HOLMES (Midfielder)

Born Bishop Auckland 18.11.80

As well as being with Ricky Hill in the youth squad at Sheffield Wednesday, Peter Holmes moved to Luton as one of Hill's first signings with a better than usual pedigree. He is a product of the FA's School of Excellence, in the same year as Michael Owen. But relegation from the Premiership in May 2000 left Hillsborough desperate to cut the pay-roll. Hill took full advantage, snapping up the two-footed midfielder for a nominal fee.

MARVIN JOHNSON (Defender)

Born Wembley 29.10.68

Longest-serving player at Kenilworth Road, Johnson is arguably the most popular member of the Kenilworth Road staff with his colleagues and with the fans. Always cheerful, even when recovering from injury setbacks, the defender is in his 13th season as a first-team regular at Luton, his only club, and skipper of the team he joined as a schoolboy.

Luton record to the start of this season: 406 appearances, 9 goals

TRESOR KANDOL (Striker)

Born Banga, Zaire 30.8.81

Talent spotted by Luton playing in schoolboy football in London, Kandol is a lanky striker who became YTS boy at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1997. His first team debut was in the Auto Windscreens Shield in January 1999, against Walsall, and he made a Football League debut a month later, being on the fringe of the first team ever since.

Luton record to the start of this season: 10 appearances, 1 goal

ADAM LOCKE (Midfielder)

Born Croydon 20.8.70

Well-travelled in football terms, the midfielder joined Luton on a free transfer from Bristol City to add experience to a predominantly young squad in the summer of 1999. He began as a YTS boy with Crystal Palace, his local club, but could not get into the league team at Selhurst, and moved on to Southend, Colchester and Ashton Gate before becoming a regular with Luton last season.

Luton record to the start of this season: 12 appearances, 1 goal

MATTHEW SPRING (Midfielder)

Born Harlow 17.11.79

A competitive midfielder, Spring was a driving force in the Luton side which reached the FA Youth Cup semi-finals in 1997, and after a league debut when still only 17 he soon became a regular in Luton's Second Division team.

Luton record to the start of this season: 119 appearances, 11 goals

MARK STEIN (Striker) Born South Africa 28.1.66

Nearly 20 years after joining Luton as a schoolboy, the striker returned to Kenilworth Road in the summer to help out his old playing pal, new manager Ricky Hill. The two are the only men now at Luton who were members of the team which won the club's only major trophy, the League Cup in 1988. Brother of Brian, another noted Luton striker, Mark had four years at Luton before enjoying a career as a popular goalscorer with QPR, Oxford, Stoke, Chelsea and Bournemouth. He was poised to join Swansea as a Bosman in the summer, but rapidly agreed to go 'back home' when the call came from his old mate Hill, and he became the manager's first signing.

MATTHEW TAYLOR (Wing-back)

Born Oxford 27.11.81

When Luton were in receivership in the summer of 1999, players had to be sold or given away to save money, while severe restrictions were imposed on new recruits. So once more Luton had to look at the young talent coming through the ranks, and wing-back, though still only 17, was given his chance, and immediately settled to become a regular in the team.

Luton record to the start of this season: 47 appearances, 5 goals

MARK O'NDALE (Goalkeeper)

Born Leicester 22.11.73

The arrival of new board of directors at Kenilworth early last summer enabled Ricky Hill to break a mould that had been set over the previous three years. Then, with continuing financial problems, including a spell in receivership, Luton had been unable to buy players, while selling talent worth more than £3million. That changed when Mike Watson-Challis became the chairman and made cash available. The new manager moved swiftly to secure 26 year-old goalkeeper Ondale from Bournemouth for a substantial fee. Previously with Wisbech, Northampton and Barry Town, he was immediately given the No.1 shirt in Luton's squad number list for this season.


ANDRÉ SCARLETT Born London 11.1.80

"It wasn't the best time to have the operation and I struggled a bit during the pre-season training because of it. Training is always hard work, though, but now I am fine."



big squad and a manager who has come from the Premiership.

"We fully deserved our win and two or three goals wouldn't have flattered us at all. It is good to get on the scoresheet especially after last Saturday when we came under a lot of criticism from the manager.



There are arguments for and against as to whether he was right or wrong although he himself has already admitted he made a mistake in sending off Liverpool's Hamman. On the night he received verbal blastings from Sky's Andy Gray and both managers but spare a thought for the man in the middle.

He was criticised for being too lenient on one occasion last season and now because he is carrying out the rules to the letter of the law he has been accused of lacking in common sense.

Don't forget that on the night in question he had an assessor sitting in the stand in addition to the referees' chief Philip Don and the FA chief Adam Crozier.

If he had shown such leniency again, you can bet he would have come under criticism from his superiors.

It was refreshing to read last Friday that Coventry City boss Gordon Strachan, no stranger himself to conflict with referees, stated it was time managers and players had a good look at themselves before they spoke out so strongly and the men in the middle. We have done just that with the ten yards rule this season so why not do it in this instance as well. No harm could be done by trying.

Then in the second half we could have gone 2-1 up and suddenly we were behind again with another bad goal. That was the way things went for us.


W had to get that out of our system and we went to Bristol with that very much in mind.






