
CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

ON THE BENCH WITH Barry Fry

Tonight I am delighted to be able to welcome officials, players and supporters of Luton Town to London Road after big changes in the Kenilworth Road set-up during the summer when Mike Watson-Challis took over as chairman from Cliff Bassett and Ricky Hill returned to the Hatters as manager.

Ricky is a Hatters legend and I know he will do an excellent job and, with the enthusiastic backing of his chairman and new board, make Luton Town a force to contend with in the Second Division. We will see them here at London Road in league action during January but tonight's test is different as both sides will want to progress to the second round of the Worthington Cup and, hopefully, earn the chance of a meeting with one of the big clubs that come into the competition at the later stage.

The onus is on us to produce a first winning display at London Road this season after a couple of draws and with the disappointing defeat against Swansea City sandwiched between. On Saturday, just as against Bristol Rovers in last month's opening game here, we had to be content with a point after taking the lead.

Facing Bury our first touch let us down badly. The opening 45 minutes produced some tremendous attacking football with real end to end entertainment and we deservedly took the lead with a great move involving Ritchie Hanlon and Andy Clarke before a calm finish from Francis Green. There were chances to go further ahead, Clarke was through wide after Jon Cullen's excellent pass but his first touch was not good enough and David Farrell suffered the same problem just after.

We needed that second goal because Bury are a good side and one full of experience and confidence. They ground out a result in the end and from a Posh point of view this is not good enough at home and we only have ourselves to blame. The Bury equaliser should have been prevented after



we watched them several times and did our homework, telling the players what to expect. But after conceding an un-necessary corner, we also failed to pick-up Darren Bullock when he headed it in.

As we have one or two knocks from Saturday there will probably be changes tonight which will give some of the other lads the chance of 90 minutes as we make use of the full squad - just as we did at Kenilworth Road in the first leg. Although finishing without a goal being scored, this was a good attacking game and after coming through strongly in the second half we must try to carry on where we left off.

Enjoy the game!

■ So what is going on in Division Two with all these away wins? Over the two-day Bank Holiday programme, 12 out of 18 games resulted in away victories including Swansea's first win of the season over Posh here at London Road and Bristol Rovers' 6-2 mauling of Brentford. It just seems that in the higher division there is more opportunity to play football, more available space, and away from home any team with space and quality has the chance of hitting the opposition on the break. The perfect example of what can be achieved was of course superbly demonstrated by Posh at Boundary Park with David Farrell twice supplying pinpoint crosses after out-stripping the Oldham defence. Andy Clarke and Francis Green did the rest.

■ What on earth was the referee thinking about in the match against Swansea? Adam Drury giving away a penalty? Whatever next? It is a bit like the Queen Mum slapping an innocent bystander around the face with her handbag or Kirsty Young playing Rugby League or 'Peter Burrow' chasing 'Mister Posh' out of the ground. Things like that do not happen, do they?

■ Posh are overdue a cup run but if they are to reach round two of this year's Worthington Cup competition they have to

get the ball past one of my all-time star pupils. In 32 years of teaching and coaching junior football teams only one pupil ever made it through to the professional ranks - and he is playing in goal for Luton tonight. Mark Ovendale who made some outstanding saves in the second half of the first leg a fortnight ago signed for Luton in the summer for £425,000. I remember him as a versatile 10 year old, very athletic and a good all-round sportsman. Little did I realise that one day he would be worth the best part of half a million otherwise I would have volunteered to be his agent!

Kit Carson COLUMN

When I meet other Academy Directors or youth Development Officers, they often tell me how lucky I am to be at a club whose manager so obviously believes in giving young players a chance. By the end of last season 18 players from our youth policy had made their debuts in the first team. The last was defender Dan Murray.

I would be a poor Academy Director if I did not constantly push for our young players to be given their chance and hopefully Barry gets sick of me constantly going on about it. However, we can point to players who are permanent fixtures in the first team such as Mark Tyler, Adam Drury and Tony Shields and ask the question: Have they ever let the club down?. We can say the same about the other 15 lads and the answer would have to be: No!

Phil Chapple has an important role to play in the development of our young players as the Reserve team is the crucial testing ground for young talent coming through. It is so easy to worry about results and not select young players. They will make mistakes and this is how they learn. All young players develop at different stages of their career and we need to be sensitive to this.


We can offer youngsters at this club an incredible incentive. Following a decision of the chairman and the board at the end of last season, it was decided that a minimum of three youth players compete in Reserve team games. The selection is a reward for achievement at youth team level. Already

this season Matthew Byrne, James Bishop, Luke Hardy, Louie Evans, John-Paul Duncliffe and Simon Rusk have played for the Reserves.

I can say to any young player today that if they sign for Posh they will have a real chance. I call this THE POSH GUARANTEE and the whole club endorse it.

So who are the new Posh players to watch other than those already mentioned ? John O'Flynn, our Republic of Ireland striker, is a name to look out for when he recovers from injury. I know Barry is anxious for him to get fit and to see how he handles the higher level. The same applies to defender Adam Lang who is continuing with the recent flow of producing fine left backs here at London Road.

Peterborough United is one of the best clubs in the country for a young player to join. We can point to Matthew Etherington making his debut as a 15 year-old and this says it all. At this club there is a real chance. It is not easy to play in the first team but there is a clear route to it which is the envy of many other clubs.

WELCOME TO Luton Town


Luton Town will be looking for a win this evening to establish some consistency in their play after kicking off the League campaign with a mixed bag of results. The Hatters suffered defeat in the opening two matches of the season but supporters will no doubt have faith in old favourite Ricky Hill, now in the managerial hot-seat.

The Worthington Cup first round first leg meeting between Posh and Luton Town at Kenilworth Road ended goalless, despite both sides creating goal scoring opportunities. Francis Green went close late on but his shot was saved by record signing Mark Ovendale in the Hatters goal.

Andrew Fotiadis almost opened his side's account in the first half when his diving header flew agonizingly wide of the upright. And Spring had the ball in the back of the net in the 54th minute, but his effort was ruled out for offside.


Town have seen a handful of players come and go during the summer, most notably goalkeeper Ovendale who was signed from AFC Bournemouth for a club record £425,000 fee. The Luton Town board made money available to spend after Gary Doherty left for Tottenham Hotspur at the back end of last season for £1million.

Mark Stein is now in his second spell with the club, having arrived from Dean Court along with Ovendale after he was available on a free transfer. Peter Holmes and Dean Brennan were also snapped up from Sheffield Wednesday's youth squad on free transfers. Prolific marksman Phil Gray left for Burnley in the close season under the Bosman ruling, and Michael McIndoe joined Conference side Hereford United also on a free.



Ricky Hill was installed as manager of Luton Town during the summer after being first choice of a new board of directors at Kenilworth Road following the departure of Lennie Lawrence. It is the first time the former star midfielder has tried his luck at management, although Hill underwent various coaching appointments in this country and in the USA, where he was player-coach of the year while assisting Rodney Marsh at Tampa Bay in the early 1990s. Widely regarded as one of the most creative midfielders Luton Town have ever signed, Hill joined the Hatters as a school boy and was a regular in the senior side by the time he was 17 years of age. He reached the pinnacle of his 14 year Town career in 1988 when his side clinched the League Cup after beating Arsenal 3-2 in a scintillating Wembley final. He went on to star in 507 League and cup matches for the Kenilworth Road club, scoring the first of his 65 goals in his debut against Bristol Rovers in 1976. After leaving Town, the London born midfielder played in France for a year before signing for Leicester City and then ending his playing career in America. Hill rekindled his association with David Pleat, who was youth coach when he joined Luton, and worked alongside the one time Posh player of the late 1960s in coaching roles beginning at Sheffield Wednesday for three years in 1996 before following Pleat to Tottenham Hotspur.

EMMERSON BOYCE
(24th Sept 1979, 5ft 11ins, 11st 2lbs) Defender signed as a YTS after coming through Luton's schools and youth development programme in 1995. Broke into the first team squad at Kenilworth Road last season after sporadic appearances following his debut in the Auto Windscreen Shield in January 1999.

LIAM GEORGE
(2nd Feb 1979, 5ft 9ins, 11st 4lbs) Front man with pace and nimble footwork who came through the ranks after joining as a schoolboy. A member of the Republic of Ireland squad that progressed to the European Youth Championships in 1988. Completed his first full season last year after injury, and was Town's leading scorer.

PETER HOLMES
(18th Nov 1980, 5ft 10ins, 10st) One of Hill's first

signings and another player plucked from the Sheffield Wednesday youth squad. A product of the FA's School of Excellence in the same year as Michael Owen and a two footed midfielder who adds an extra dimension to the centre of midfield.

MARVIN JOHNSON
(29th Oct 1968, 6ft 1ins, 13st) Defender who is the longest serving player at Kenilworth Road and is in his 13th season as a first team regular with Luton Town, his only club. Skipper of the team, he joined the Hatters as a schoolboy and has made over 400 appearances, scoring nine goals.

ADAM LOCKE
(20th Aug 1970, 5ft 11ins, 12st 7lbs) Well travelled midfielder who joined Luton on a free transfer from Bristol City last summer. Began as a YTS boy with his local club Crystal Palace but could not get into the first team and moved to Southend United before spells at Colchester United and Bristol City.


PAUL McLAREN
(17th Nov 1976, 6ft 1ins, 13st) Midfielder who was offered professional terms while still only 17 years of age. A forceful player who is always ready to back up attacks and soon became a regular in the side after his 1994 debut.

MARK OVENDALE
(22nd Nov 1973, 6ft 2ins, 13st 10lbs) Goalkeeper who arrived from AFC Bournemouth in the summer for a substantial fee after having previously played for Wisbech Town, Northampton Town and Barry Town. The 26 year-old was immediately given the number one shirt and has quickly settled in at Kenilworth Road.



ANDREW FOTIADIS
(6th Sept 1977, 5ft 11ins, 11st 7lbs) Old-fashioned centre forward with good physique and power who is a constant worry to opposing defences. Born not far from Luton in Hitchin, he won England Schools caps at Under 15 and Under 18 level, and chose to gain his GCSE exams before being a full time professional.

MATTHEW SPRING
(17th Nov 1979, 5ft 11ins, 11st 7lbs) Competitive midfielder who was the driving force in the Luton side which reached the FA Youth Cup semi-finals in 1997. Made his League debut when he was 17 and has made over 120 appearances for the Hatters. Opened his 2000-2001 season Town account with a penalty kick in the 1-0 home success over AFC Bournemouth 10 days ago.




NATHAN ABBEY
(11th July 1978, 6ft 1ins, 11st 13lbs) Reliable defender who played a major part in Luton's receivership restrictions last term by joining on a free transfer from Bristol City where he was out of favour. Started his League career at Rotherham United where he enjoyed his first taste of league football before moving to Sheffield Wednesday and Leicester City. He went on to Ashton Gate in 1998.

MARK STEIN
(28th Jan 1966, 5ft 5ins, 11st 7lbs) Crowd pleasing striker who returned to Luton Town nearly 20 years after joining as a schoolboy. Brother of Brian, another noted Luton striker, he enjoyed four years at Kenilworth Road, winning the League Cup in 1988. The South Africa born forward furthered his career at QPR, Oxford United, Stoke City, Chelsea and AFC Bournemouth. Poised to join Swansea City this summer but responded to a call from his old team-mate Hill.


MATTHEW TAYLOR
(27th Nov 1981, 5ft 10ins, 11st 8lbs) Young wing-back who came through the ranks and was given his chance at the age of 17. Settled in immediately and became a regular in the team, gaining over 50 appearances and five goals.

(17th Mar 1971, 6ft 2ins, 13st 6lbs) Reliable defender who played a major part in Luton's receivership restrictions last term by joining on a free transfer from Bristol City where he was out of favour. 


DEAN BRENNAN

Posh lads head for Everton clash


