Tonight's corresponding fixture last season was the catalyst for changing our kick-off times for our Friday night fixtures to 8.00pm. Traffic problems encountered by Luton Town supporters, and some of our own, on that particular evening led to a number of late arrivals for the 7.45pm kick-off. Whether or not that extra fifteen minutes will make a difference remains to be seen. As I have said before, though, the Club would be interested to hear your views on this matter.

This kick-off time will be repeated for the two other Friday home fixtures against Peterborough United and Colchester United, but all other evening fixtures this season, including the forthcoming home games against Stoke City and Northampton Town, will kick-off at 7.45pm as usual.

Since our last home game against Bristol Rovers, confirmation has been received of the re-arranged dates for the away games against Swindon Town and Wrexham. We will now travel to Swindon on Tuesday, 31st October 2000 for a 7.45pm kick-off, whilst the Wrexham fixture will be played on Tuesday, 21st November 2000 with a 7.30pm kick-off.

Last Thursday, Roy McFarland and I attended a disciplinary hearing at The Football Association with Steve Slade as a result of his actions following his sending-off against A.F.C. Bournemouth back on August 19th. Fortunately, Steve, who had previously never been sent off in his career, was given a very fair hearing and an opportunity to explain the events leading up to and immediately following the incident in question. He has received a further one match suspension and a £250 fine as punishment and has been warned as to his future conduct. He will now be suspended for the home game against Northampton Town on October 24th.

At present, the Family Enclosure is not a 'No Smoking' area, and we only ask that supporters refrain from

smoking in that particular area of the ground. However, following a recent conversation with a Season Ticket holder in the Family Enclosure we have decided to review the situation. We are in the process of sending letters to all Family Enclosure Season Ticket holders to gauge their opinions on this matter. I would also be interested to hear the opinions of those supporters who buy tickets in the Family Enclosure on a match-by-match basis.

We are presently selling tickets for the away game at Colchester United on Saturday, 21st October 2000. We have received 850 terrace tickets, priced at £10 for adults and £5 for concessions, and 196 seats priced at £12 for adults and £7 for concessions. Tickets, which are currently only on sale to Season Ticket holders and Away Travel Club Members, will go on general sale after the Luton Town game tonight. Tickets can be purchased over the telephone with a debit or credit card, subject to a £1 administration charge.

Having recently won the Final of the Eastern Junior Plate competition at Southend Manor, which was held over from last season, the Youth Team will make their entry into the AXA F.A. Youth Cup later this month. They have been drawn at home to either Redditch United or Bloxwich Town, whose replay was postponed on Tuesday evening and will now be played next Tuesday. Therefore, no date has yet been set for the First Round tie.

I felt that against Bristol Rovers, it was a disappointing result but a good game of football. When you lose 3-0 you don't normally enjoy it, but I quite enjoyed the game. I thought two of their strikes were tremendous, the first goal and the free kick for the third.

Overall I thought we played quite well, and created a number of chances that we should have scored from. We didn't, I think there were reasons for that and we were a little bit off that pace. I think the fact we missed the Swindon game affected our sharpness and fitness. But it could have been different if the Rovers goalkeeper had not been in such great form. He's on loan from Manchester United and looks to have an excellent future.

I let the dust settle, and we sat down with the players and watched the video together and it surprised one or two of them as regards how well we had played. They felt quite tired, and not very sharp, but it looked a bit better on the video.

patchy performance

It was a patchy performance at Oldham. We gave the ball away when we were not under pressure, we weren't really with it in the first half an hour, and we didn't take half of our chances again. When we went 2-0 up we eased off, and Lionel Perez had to stop Oldham getting back into it.

Starting with the sweeper system was not meant as a negative tactic, but I had

to accept it wasn't working. I took the decision to change back to 4-4-2, and after Tom Youngs got that important goal just before half time we dominated the match, although there were a few lapses. I still believe the sweeper system is an option for us in certain games against particular teams, but on this occasion it didn't provide what we wanted. Like all the players I learn something from every game, I'm not afraid to put my hand up and admit I might have made a move which didn't work out as hoped, and although it's not always easy to make major changes during a match I'm glad I did on this occasion.

When Oldham got a goal just before the end, which couldn't make any difference to the result, Lionel was furious at losing the clean sheet. That's the attitude we need throughout the team. I was delighted to seem him react like that, because it shows he doesn't want to give a thing to the other side.

It was encouraging that we could win 3-1 away when we were not at our best, but we need to aim at a higher standard than that to stay with the leaders in the division. Oldham have been having a hard time, but they put us under pres-

sure in the first half when we were fortunate that Lionel was on song, as well as our centre-backs, Andy Duncan and John Dreyer. That's the best they've played.

Tom Youngs has that knack of getting into scoring positions and is a very cool finisher. His first goal with defenders snapping at his heels was expertly taken.

new contracts

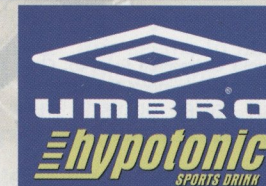

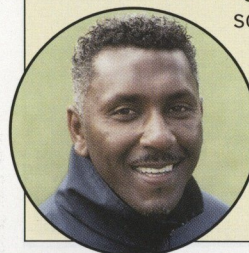

ricky hill

I feel so far we have under-achieved. At the end of the day we have been put in a situation, under no fault of anybody, where we haven't had a really settled side. We definitely haven't had our strongest side out throughout the season and at times the concentration level hasn't been good enough and we have given away silly goals at important times.

From a creative aspect we haven't looked at our best and I would like to see more of that which I know we can do. We have not really been able to get in front in enough games so again that is disappointing. On the positive side I have been impressed with the attitude, especially after the criticism they have been in, unfortunately that doesn't win us any games.

I haven't been here very long but at the moment, despite our poor form the job has been very exciting, there is a lot of work still to be done. I never thought for one minute it would change over night. We do need to



We really do need to get back to just winning again and getting some kind of a winning run going. We have to start somewhere and hopefully it will happen at Cambridge. We do have a problem in winning games but in order to do that we need to play a lot better and that is what we are actively doing at the current time.

People keep talking about pressure but at the end of the day I didn't come believing that I would wave a magic wand and make things better and put it right overnight with the same personal. What I am looking for personally is to be given the opportunity to bring in a certain amount of players. If I get given a fair crack of the whip and get given the chance of proving myself then that is totally okay and I will hold my hands up and say yes it didn't work out, but at the moment pressure has really not sunk in to me yet.

Cambridge have done very well this season, they started a bit slowly but then they had a great patch when they were beating everybody so I have to admit it has been a bit of a surprise in the way they have started. Obviously they knew what they had within and they had Zema and others. Roy seems to have got over the difficult periods the Club were having and has turned it around.

uton Town come to the Abbey Stadium in search of their first win since the end of August when they recorded their sole victory so far under new boss Ricky Hill, a 1-0 home win against Bournemouth.

the squad

In goal today should be Mark Owendale, signed from Bournemouth for £425,000 in August. He was immediately given the No. 1 shirt for this season but he faces competition from Nathan Abbey, and there is little doubt the young goalkeeper would love to play today against his older brother, Cambridge striker Zema.

In defence expect to see Matthew Taylor, one of many talented young teenagers introduced into the side after Luton went into receivership last summer and experienced players had to be sold or given away to save money. He firmly established himself as part of the team last season and has nearly 50 appearances already at the age of 18.

He is expected to play alongside Gavin McGowan who joined on a free transfer from Arsenal in June 1998 after two loan spells with the Hatters, and Julian Watts, an experienced defender who played a major part in Luton's recovery from receivership restrictions last season, after joining on a free transfer.

Veteran defender Marvin Johnson is probably the most popular member of the Kenilworth Road staff with his colleagues and with the fans. He is in his 13th season as a first-team regular at Luton, his only Club, and is Club Captain.

Other young defenders on regular first team duty are Emmerson Boyce, another product of Luton's youth scheme to establish himself last season, and Stuart Fraser a former youth team skipper who has already made nearly 40 appearances at the age of 20. Following in their footsteps is James Ayres, a commanding centre-half who skippered the youth team to the championship of the South East Counties League and has already made his first team bow.

In midfield Luton are likely to name the well-travelled Adam Locke, who joined them on a free transfer from Bristol City in the summer of 1999 to bring experience to a young squad. He is expected to play alongside Paul McLaren who has been with the Club since he was a schoolboy, and is a forceful midfielder.

Luton town

presence ever ready to back up attacks.

Matthew Spring is yet another of the teenagers in the Luton side. A competitive midfielder who made his league debut at 17, Spring was a driving force in the Luton side which reached the FA Youth Cup semi-finals in 1997. 20-year-old Dean Brennan is a new signing who was delighted to join up again with former Sheffield Wednesday youth boss Ricky Hill when he was offered a free transfer by the Owls this summer.

Peter Holmes arrived by the same route as Brennan, snapped up by Ricky Hill for a nominal fee when relegated Wednesday looked to cut their wages bill this summer. A two-footed midfielder, he is a product of the FA's School of Excellence where he played alongside Michael Owen.

Winger Andre Scarlett made his league debut in October 1998, coming off the bench against Oldham with the score at 0-0. He helped to set up one goal and scored the other in 2-0 victory, but has not yet established himself in the team. Lanky midfielder Fredrich Breitenfelder was born in Vienna and was one of the hopefuls who joined Luton on trial this

summer, and the former Rapide Vienna schoolboy impressed enough to be offered a one year contract.

Luton have plenty of talent in attack and Liam George is probably one of the best known young talents after breaking into the first team two years ago. A pacy, tricky player, he earned Ireland under-21 honours while finishing last season as a first team regular and leading scorer.

He is likely to be joined by Tresor Kandol, a lanky Zairean born teenager who has broken into the team this season and scored goals, and 34-year-old veteran Mark Stein, who returned to Luton to help out former teammate Ricky Hill nearly 20 years after joining Luton as a schoolboy.

Andrew Fotiadis is another local discovery, a strong 'old fashioned centre forward' who has been capped by England at under-15 and under-18 level. Peter Thomson was released by home town Club Bury as a teenager but established his goalscoring credentials at non-League Clubs Chorley and Lancaster, before joining Dutch club NAC Breda for £25,000. His regular goals there persuaded Luton to sign him for a reported £100,000 in September.

Fellow strikers are Stuart Douglas, a nippy striker who scored on his debut as a 17-year-old in 1995 but found his early career interrupted by injury, and Bermudan Tommy Carter who was capped twice by his country while still a student. He earned a short-term contract with his displays on trial this summer.

Cambridge gained a 2-2 draw in the return fixture four months later with goals from Trevor Benjamin and Ian Ashbee. The latter last triumphed here in the League 1-0 in March 1982 with a goal from Brian Horton.

ever-present

Former Luton Town defender Jamie Campbell was ever-present for Cambridge United in 1997/98. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in July 1991, he featured in Luton's 1993/94 F.A. Cup run and his solitary goal in 36 League games came in their 2-1 defeat at Leicester City in August 1992. He joined Cambridge on a free transfer from Barnet in August 1997 and starred in the 1998/99 promotion triumph. Fellow defender Ben Chenery joined Cambridge on a free transfer from Luton in July 1997 and also featured prominently in United's 1998/99 promotion campaign.

record goalscorer

Former Luton Town striker John Taylor

holds Cambridge United's goalscoring record. Initially moving to The Abbey Stadium from Sudbury Town in August 1988, he starred in Cambridge's meteoric rise under John Beck and was swapped for Bristol Rovers' Devon White in March 1992. He joined Luton from Bradford City for £200,000 in March 1995 and scored three times in 37 League outings for today's visitors prior to rejoining Cambridge in January 1997. Starring in the 1998/99 promotion success, he has now netted a record 83 goals in 297 League games overall.

wembley winner

Cambridge United player-coach David Preece featured in Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph at Wembley. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Walsall for £150,000 in December 1984, the England B international also played for Luton in the 1989 Littlewoods Cup final and starred in their 1993/94 F.A. Cup run. He scored 21 times in 336 League games for today's opponents prior to joining Derby County on a free transfer in August 1995. Tommy Taylor signed him in September 1996 and he featured in Cambridge's 1998/99 promotion success. Central defender John Dreyer was ever-present in three consecutive seasons for Luton, netting 13 goals in 214 League outings.

irish international

Ex-Luton Town midfielder Tom Finney gained a record seven Northern Ireland caps while at Cambridge United. Having to Kenilworth Road from Crusaders for £17,000 in August 1973, he featured in Luton's 1973/74 promotion success and netted five times in 14 Second Division games for today's visitors before being sold to Sunderland for £30,000 in July 1974. He joined Cambridge for £10,000 in August 1976 and starred in two consecutive promotion campaigns, returning from a ten month spell at Brentford to score 61 goals in 332 League games overall.

managing to succeed

Former Luton Town central defender Chris Turner had a spell as Cambridge United's manager. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Peterborough United for £100,000 in July 1978, he netted five times in 30 Second Division outings for Luton before being sold to New England Teamen for £90,000 in May 1979. He joined Cambridge four months later and returned from Swindon



Lil Fuccillo

Town in October 1980 to score three goals in 90 League games overall, then became manager for four years in January 1986. Ex-Luton defender John Ryan was Cambridge's player-boss for a year.

two spells

Former Luton Town striker Steve Claridge had two spells at Cambridge United. Initially moving to Abbey Stadium from Aldershot for £75,000 in February 1990, he starred in Cambridge's meteoric rise under John Beck and was sold to Luton for £160,000 in July 1992. He scored twice in 16 First Division outings for today's visitors prior to rejoining Cambridge for a record £190,000 in November 1992 and was leading marksman in 1992/93, netting 46 goals in 132 League games overall before moving to Birmingham City for £350,000 in January 1994.

title triumph

One-time Cambridge United midfielder Lil Fuccillo featured prominently in Luton Town's 1981/82 Second Division title triumph. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in July 1974, he netted 24 goals in 160 League games for Luton prior to joining Tulsa Roughnecks in April 1983. He joined Cambridge on a non-contract basis in January 1988 and scored twice in 19 Fourth Division outings while at Abbey Stadium. The likes of Jack Bannister, Ian Benjamin, John Collins, Alan Guild, Rick McEvoy, Peter Phillips and Robin Wainwright have also played for both Clubs.

Matthew Spring is just 20-years-old but has already made over 100 appearances for the Hatters and is making a name for himself in the domestic game.

A tough tackler and inspired passer, Spring is the main playmaker and driving force in Luton's midfield and despite his tender age was a regular in the Luton team last season.

The 6ft tall midfielder is not shy of scoring the odd goal either. He has managed 11 goals so far for Luton, including several spectacular long-range efforts, one of which got a place in Match of the Day's goal of the month top-ten.

The youngster's efforts have not gone unnoticed, as a host of top clubs have visited Kenilworth Road to catch a glimpse of the young star. Tottenham Hotspur's Director of Football David Pleat admitted that he was watching the youngster, and Ipswich and Wimbledon are also keen admirers.

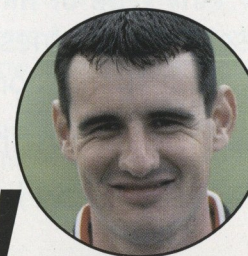
influential midfielder

Departure Time: 9am

Arrival at Ground: Low cloud, mist and fog were the prevailing conditions for the drive up, leaving no doubt that the football season was now in full swing. These conditions, coupled with accident-induced jams and a rather leisurely coffee stop, meant that I didn't arrive at the ground until 12.45pm.

This did give me time to discover possibly the only place in the world where you can buy a scarf and book your holiday. Yes, the Club Shop (sorry, Latique) is also a travel agency. And once in the ground, I was amused to hear that the Latique was selling a limited edition Oldham Athletic watch which was "only in while stocks last" - although it would be difficult to imagine an alternative arrangement!

MJ's Mileage: 371.5 miles

Admission Price: £15, £12 or £7 - depending on the usual concessionary criteria.

Programme: £2 for 52 pages sounds good value. Unfortunately, many of the articles went for the big print approach to fill as much space as possible with minimum effort approach (something we're

all guilty of at times!) ...once you'd found the articles in amongst the shed-load of adverts. About the only person to be delighted with the 'Latics Review' would, I suspect, be John Taylor, who was listed in the programme as being 29!

United Travelling Contingent: 269

Conduct of Police/Stewards: Friendly and unobtrusive, the 80's revival was in full swing amongst the Oldham Stewards, as they all seemed to be sporting mullets and marble-washed denim!

Conduct of United Fans: Well conducted by Marvin throughout much of the match and Lionel Perez for the second half, U's fans made plenty of noise.

Conduct of Home Fans: Despite their side's lowly position, Oldham fans were surprisingly patient with their team - leaving it until the last fifteen minutes before starting a slow hand-clap. Mind you, they streamed out after our third goal and some of those I heard on the GMR phone-in after the game were planning to return their season tickets, convinced that they were already down.

State of Ground: Boundary Park is a real mixture of old and new. There were newish stands behind either goal, but along each side wooden upper tiers were counter-pointed by plastic, uncovered seats which contrived to accentuate the slope of the pitch. Facing the Main Stand, one corner contained a raised, enclosed seating area which looked not unlike an airport gangway, whilst the other corner had a small box of indeterminate use, and little else, which gave a great view of the cinder coach park.

Despite the new bits, the whole ground had a distinct 1950's air, and the only surprise was that some of the seats weren't made of Bakelite!

View from Away End: Comfortable, with loads of legroom and no obstructions ... other than Marvin's fuzzy head!

Food/Drink: Whilst the service was extremely quick and efficient, the food was a little more patchy. Although the hot dogs, at £1.50, came with a choice of mustards and received a thumbs up, the pies were less impressive. My food researcher, Richard Kipping, managed one bite of the Steak & Kidney [sic] pie before being overcome by the gristle content. He was more impressed with the 30p bags of popcorn and was last seen filling his rucksack and pockets for the journey home!

Toilet Facilities: Some of the best facilities we've seen for aeons! Nicely painted in amber, they were clean, not smelly and contained all the accoutrements you would expect. And reports from the ladies were equally complimentary.

Officials' Performance: Although it sometimes felt as though Mr Kaye was running a parallel match, he generally kept things flowing nicely without becoming too obtrusive.

Additional Comments: There has been much talk around The Abbey recently about the benefits of half-time penalty competitions and music being played after goals are scored. This match showed the downside to both! The half-time competition consisted of trying to kick a ball through a small hole, suspended from the bar, from a distance of five yards - which no one could manage! Fortunately, we were saved further tedium by the appearance of the teams for the second half, at which point they decided to settle the competition by the toss of a coin!

And playing music after a goal is all well and good, but a thumping rendition of 'I feel good' when the Oldham scored a late consolation only served to amuse United fans!

And to cap a thoroughly miserable day for Oldham, a U's fans won the half time draw!

With such a long break between home games, a lot has happened on the U's Net web site since the Bristol Rovers match. On the message board there has been the usual range of messages - from light-hearted banter between home and visiting supporters alike, items of speculation, questions about players, old programmes, long lost friends etc. Last weekend, as the long break without a match took hold, the messages turned to the England match, news of Kevin Keegan's departure, and speculation over his successor. Our own Roy McFarland received more than one mention!

In the wake of the good news from the Government about the allotment land there was a fresh wave of questions about the redevelopment. Most of them had been answered previously so I supplied director Gary Harwood with a list of the common queries and he provided the answers, which have formed the basis of a one page FAQ ('Frequently Asked Questions') about the redevelopment. Hopefully that page will remain a reference point over the next couple of years and can be added to as new concerns surface.

Two more weekly opinion polls have taken place since the last home match. The first asked visitors to the web site to vote for their preferred strike partnership, and there was a clear preference for Zema Abbey and Jonas Axeldal to continue their partnership. They attracted 62% of the votes but there was support too for an Abbey/Youngs pairing, which received 22% of the votes, and an Abbey/Slade partnership received 12%.

the next poll

Daniel Lee suggested the next poll, asking how people first heard about the new supporters' organisation Cambridge Fans United. The result is obviously only relevant in respect of those with access to U's Net, but the result showed that the web site and the distribution of leaflets at the ground were the most effective initial means of reaching those supporters. 39% said they found out from U's Net while 30% said it was the leaflets.

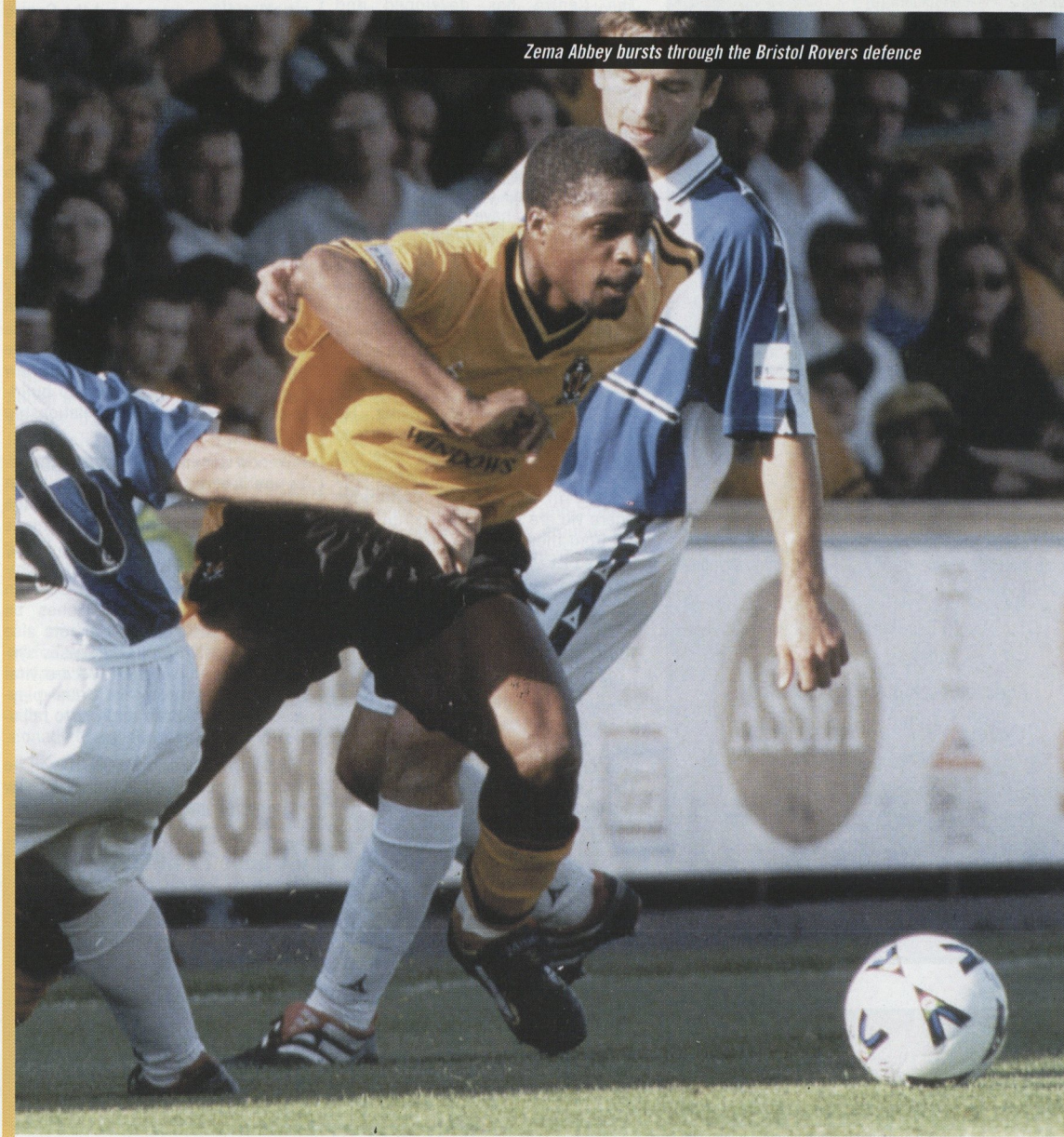

centre of excellence

The Centre of Excellence is now fully underway with all age groups from U'9 to U'16 now undertaking their weekly training programme. The Centre has developed and become even bigger this season with one U'9 squad, which will progress into two squads at about Christmas time, then we have two squads in the U'10, U'11 and U'12 age groups. This is due to a couple of reasons, the first and main point is that we now operate our squads in relation to the players date of birth. So therefore, we now have a younger and older squad per age group.

The other reason is that we have developed our recruitment procedure for players in this age group with the introduction of a dedicated Youth Development Officer, being Paul Taylor whose sole responsibility is to overlook the U'9 - U'12 section of the Youth Development Scheme. He is also in charge of our newly formed Advanced Centres that we have just set up. There are 6 Advanced Centres in and around Cambridge where we are looking to recruit players from these centres into our main Centre of Excellence.

At U'13, U'14 and U'15 age group we have just one squad, while the U'16 play in our newly formed U'17 Youth Team.

We compete in the Centres League on Sundays with the U'12, U'13, U'14 and U'15s. This League consists of only professional Clubs who also operate a Centre of Excellence. The League is about development and not winning, as there are no

results published or table produced. We also have a couple of different rules to encourage the emphasis of development.

I will tell you more about the Centre of Excellence and how it is developing later in the season.

Paul Taylor has come on board full time within the Youth Development Scheme as the new Assistant Youth Development Officer.

Paul was a part-time member and worked with the U'9 squad last season, he also did a vast amount of scouting for me, securing some very talented players. I know that Paul will be very successful in this area due to his knowledge and experience and I wish him all the best in his new position and I look forward to building a successful working relationship with him.

Wendy Gammon has recently, within the last couple of weeks, taken over the administration role for the Youth Development Scheme. This is a vital area within our Youth Development Scheme as it is essential that all communication between players, parents and coaches be passed on efficiently. Her role also involves updating our databases system, which is in place to record vital information on every individual player enabling my staff and me to holistically develop our players.

Within the next few weeks, I will be able to inform you of another new member to the Youth Development

I recently saw an excerpt from Alex Ferguson's autobiography, talking about David Beckham and how important it is to work on the basic principles of technical work, and the repetition of such work.

He was making the point that David Beckham's ability to cross the ball unfailingly with such quality was not a God-given right - but that it comes through practice, practice and more practice. The point being that whether we play a Youth Alliance game, F.A. Youth Cup or Eastern Junior Cup match, we have to ensure that at all times we are trying to do the right things in the right ways.

This is a principle that we apply in training on a daily basis. We believe that what you attempt to undertake or achieve on the training ground, will be the habits you take into match situations.

Can I take this opportunity personally to compliment all the lads on their progress so far this season, not only shown by their position in the League, but also by the hard work they have put in on the training ground.

Keep it up lads, good luck with your careers.

zema abbey

the task was never going to be easy - but without a doubt the early form of Zema Abbey has taken everyone by surprise. Abbey came from non-league football with Hitchin Town and has filled the boots of departed Trevor Benjamin with ease, scoring three times already this season and showing a wealth of promise.

Abbey joined the U's in February 2000 from Ryman League side Hitchin Town for a nominal fee after a successful trial period and the early form he has shown at the Abbey Stadium has been nothing less than brilliant.

So good in fact that a host of top Premiership Clubs are sitting up and taking notice at his recent good form. But Abbey is taking life day by day and admitted that he is more than happy at Cambridge.

"If there was ever an attractive Premiership offer then obviously I would consider it," said Abbey. "The temptation is going to be there, no doubt, but I don't think that will happen at the moment.

"At this current time I am happy learning my trade at Cambridge United. I haven't been at this Club long and I'm still learning the game as I go along."

His form so far suggests he can become the next Benjamin, but Abbey is hoping that he can bring his own ideas to the Club.

Abbey continued: "For me Trevor going was the best thing for me. I found myself in for my first game against Bury and I grabbed that opportunity with both hands.

"I always just go into each and every game to do the best I possibly can, I like to bring in my own ideas and for me it is just a case of simply doing my best."

Everything has happened in such a short space of time for the striker, and even though he is a latecomer to the professional football world, his grass-roots football started at the age of 10.

A member of a Sunday League side in Luton, where he was born, he then moved to Hitchin under-18's while at University studying a degree in sports science and leisure management.

He then earned a playing contract at Arlesey Town and then at Baldock Town where he remained under the guidance of Robbie O'Keefe at both Clubs.

So it was inevitable that when O'Keefe took over at Hitchin, Abbey would follow again. It was his spell at the Ryman League Club that made the U's stand up and take notice.

He scored six goals in a dozen appearances in the 1997/98 season and the following year he led the way with 20 goals as the Club bounced back with immediate promotion.

It was that form that brought him to the Abbey Stadium and it has been a wonderful time for the 23-year-old striker, who is enjoying every moment of his professional career, especially under the guidance of manager Roy McFarland.

"Roy is a terrific bloke," he said. "I get on with him extremely well and he is an approachable bloke, unlike some managers. He has always let me know where I stand and I have been ever so grateful for that."

While playing non-league football in his early days, his younger brother Nathan, the current Luton Town goalkeeper, was well on the way to making a success of his football career.

So this clash has been a day Zema has been waiting for and he is crossing his fingers, in the hope, that his brother will play a part in today's game, as he is adamant he will score.

"I'll defiantly stick one past him, without a doubt," said Abbey. "I really hope he plays. I don't know if after the game it will go down too well but I'd love to score against him.

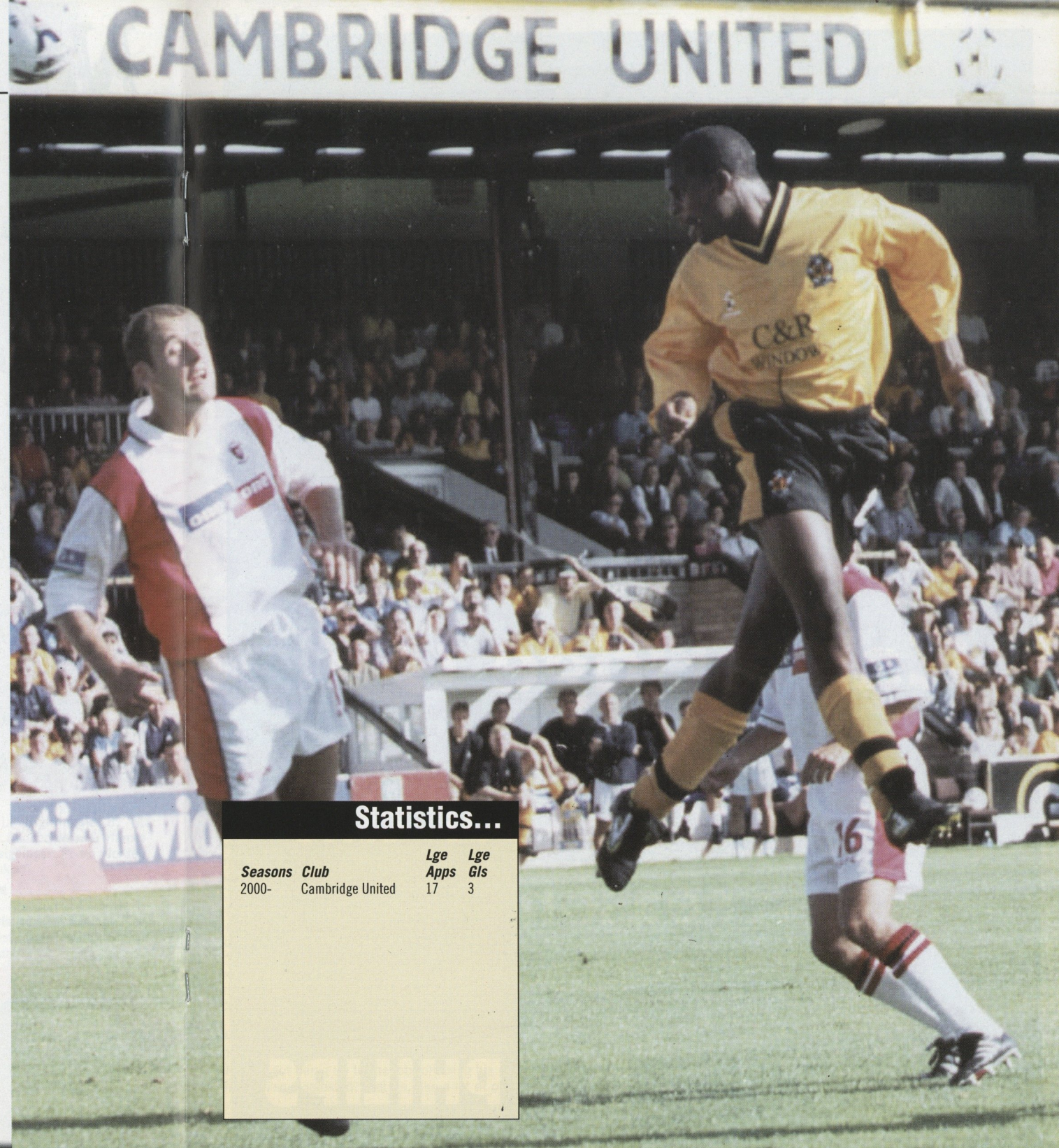
"I speak to him every day and he has been a big influence on me. Even though he is younger than me I always look up to him and ask him for advice."

But it is keeping Cambridge at the right end of the table that is the most important factor for him at the moment. Abbey is hoping that will continue today against the team from where he was born.

"So far it has been a good start to the season and hopefully we can keep it up," he added. "The gaffer has brought in some experienced pro's like John Dryer and Lionel Perez and we seem to be conceding a lot less goals.

"But this is an improvement from last season and we need to try and keep this form going, I hope that I can remain on the score sheet constantly because it all helps with my confidence."

Brazilian football is suffering somewhat of an upheaval at present. Congress has launched a special investigative commission into corruption in the game. The objective is to open the black box of Brazilian soccer where the relevant facts are hidden, denigrating the image of our country abroad ... at least according to Alvdor Dias, who proposed the investigation.

The investigation comes in the wake of allegations that Clubs pensions have failed to make payments and tax evasion by coaches. The sale of players to abroad is done in a hidden way because there is no control.

Meanwhile, the national team suffered a humiliating exit at the Olympics when nine-man Cameroon recorded one of the biggest upsets in Olympic soccer history, in one of the most exciting games, when they defeated the Brazilians 2-1 in an astonishing quarter-final match in Australia. The winning golden goal came from substitute Modeste Mbami in the 113th minute when he cracked a scorching right foot drive from the edge of the box past the Brazilian keeper. Cameroon didn't look in with a chance when they went into extra time without skipper Geremi Njitap, who had been sent off after 75 minutes, and defender Aaron Nguimbat who followed him in the last minute of regular time. Following the second red card, Brazil equalised almost immediately to take the tie into extra-time ... only for the nine men to stage one of the biggest smash-and-grab raids in Olympic history. Cameroon went on

to win the Gold Medal, defeating Chile in the semi-finals and Spain in the final, following a penalty shoot out. Chile won the bronze medal play-off game.

Following the alarming exit manager Wanderley Luxemburgo was released from his contract with immediate effect. An announcement of Luxemburgo's successor will not be made immediately, with assistant coach Candinho taking on the job in a caretaker capacity.

UEFA have fined Crvena Zvezda, formerly known as Red Star Belgrade, for their supporters behaviour when the Club beat Leicester City in a UEFA Cup second leg tie last month. Former United star Trevor Benjamin watched events from the touchline as a substitute. Offences included racist chanting against Foxes players and the throwing of flares towards fans and keeper Tim Flowers. Racist chanting was directed towards Ade Akinbiyi and Andy Impey, while Leicester fans were forced to retreat from flares hurled towards their section of the stadium following a Crvena goal.

Finally, German Christoph Daum is having his hair tested in order to prove his innocence of accusations that he took cocaine. The Bayer Leverkusen coach, who is due to take over from Rudi Voeller as the German national coach at the end of the season, has given a sample of his hair to be examined by a doctor after the allegations from the media. If the results prove the allegations it's likely to be a case of hair today, gone tomorrow ...

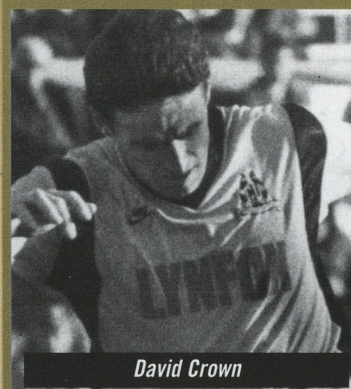
The A-Z of Cambridge United

Mark Anthony CROWE (1987-88) 51 lge apps, 0 gls

A Suffolk-born lad, but started his career at Norfolk's top Club. His only league appearance in a Norwich shirt was as a substitute for Steve Walford in a 0-3 defeat at Brighton in December 1982. He earned a professional contract on the back of that, but didn't play in the league until he transferred to Torquay in July 1985. Became an established central defender in Devon before making the move to Cambridge in December 1986. He made his debut in the heat of a Cambridgeshire derby and went on to form a partnership with Lindsay Smith for just over a season. He was replaced at the end of the following season by Phil Chapple.

David Ian CROWN (1985-87) 106 lge apps, 44 gls

Ken Shellitto is widely regarded as the worst-ever U's manager, but he does get

credit for signing this prolific striker. David was a late starter to League footy, only leaving Walthamstow Avenue at the age of 22 in 1980. He was a mediocre player with Brentford, Portsmouth and Reading scoring only 28 League goals in 169 games in total before Shellitto snapped him up in July 1985. The U's had to apply for re-election for the only time at the end of his first season, but it wasn't David's fault. He set a Club record (which still stands) of 24 League goals that season, including a hat-trick against Halifax. The following season he shared the limelight with Mark Cooper, but is remembered for a wonder-goal that sunk East-Anglian rivals Ipswich in the Littlewoods Cup. Unusually, he nearly always wore the number 11 shirt. Inevitably he wanted to move on, but it was a disappointment that his fee was only £45,000 and that he went to lowly Southend in November 1987. Incredibly he started rattling in even more goals, garnering 61 in 113 League games for the Shrimpers, before adding another 38 for Gillingham in the early nineties.

Liam Sean DAISH (1988-93) 138+1 lge apps, 4 gls

Portsmouth-born, but only made one appearance for his hometown Club before Chris Turner signed him in July 1988. He made his league debut along with Dion Dublin in a 1-3 defeat at Wrexham in December 1988. Became United's established central defender throughout the glory days of the late eighties and early nineties. Although his partners Phil Chapple and Mick Heathcote were more cultured footballers, Daish stands out for his strength, commitment and inspirational captaincy. A reckless sending off cost

him a place at Wembley in the 1990 Play-Off Final, but he played in nearly all the big games of that era. He had already played for the Irish Republic's Under-21 and 'B' sides, but his appearances for Cambridge led to Jack Charlton calling him up to the full squad, for whom he played twice in 1992. Made big money moves to Birmingham in January 1994 and Coventry in February 1996. With the latter he resurrected his international career briefly, bringing his total number of caps up to five.

Graham David DANIELS (1983-85) 37+2 lge apps, 4 gls

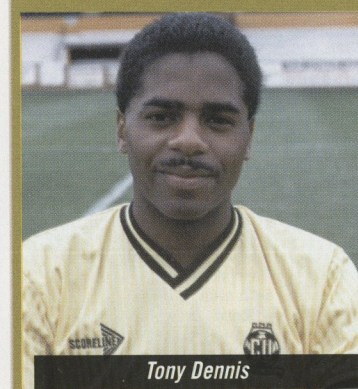
Born in Hampshire, but listening to him there can be no mistaking that he was brought up in Wales. Started in Cardiff City Reserves, then left to study Philosophy at the University of Wales. He was playing for Cardiff Corinthians when he found himself wanted by

Cardiff City (again), Bristol Rovers and Cambridge United. He joined the U's to 'broaden his horizons' and he certainly did that. They were bottom of the old Second Division, and though only 21 years old was a year older than his skipper (David Moyes). The state of the team can be ascertained by the fact that Graham's 39 League appearances produced just three wins. An ankle injury forced him out, and he joined Cambridge City, before becoming assistant manager at Sudbury and manager at Histon and Cambridge City. He also became interested in theology, becoming minister at Hardwick Evangelical Church between 1988 and 1991 and a member of the Christians in Sport movement. He is now a presenter on Radio Cambridgeshire, usually in the afternoons.

Michael James DANZEY (1992-94) 18+9 lge apps, 3 gls

Failed to make an impression with Nottingham Forest, Chester or Peterborough and was playing for St Albans City when United signed him. Scored on his debut at Notts County in the Coca-Cola Cup (in his home city), but that was as good as it got and he became a fringe striker for the U's. Left to join Aylesbury.

Ian Claude DAVIES (1984)

5 lge apps, 0 gls

A specialist left-back, he started at Norwich, but didn't establish himself fully until he joined Newcastle United in 1979. After 75 games for the Magpies he moved to Manchester City where he was farmed out on loan to various Clubs including Cambridge. He came to us in February 1984 during our disaster season in the Second Division. He helped us to a rare point on his debut at Oldham, but his last four games were all defeats. Went on to play for Carlisle, Exeter, Yeovil, Bristol Rovers and Swansea.

Kevin Charles DEARDEN (1989) 15 lge apps, 0 gls

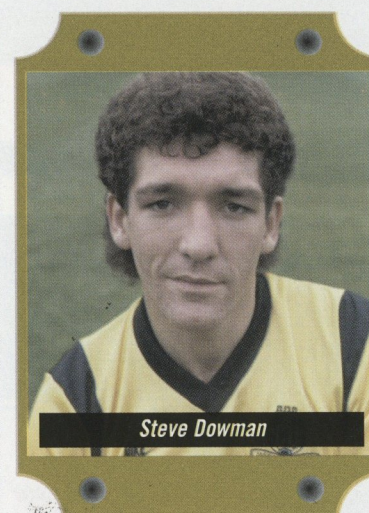
Made just one substitute appearance for Spurs in the 1992-93 season, but this goalkeeper was loaned out to Cambridge in March 1989 when John Vaughan was injured. He played in the last 15 games and was a fine keeper. He made more loan appearances for Hartlepool, Swindon, Peterborough, Hull, Rochdale and Birmingham. Finally in 1993 he became the first-choice keeper for Brentford, making over 200 League appearances for them.

John Anthony DENNIS (1989-93) 89+22 lge apps, 10 gls

One of my favourites. Tony was a right-winger, briefly with Plymouth and Exeter before moving to Slough Town. He joined Cambridge in February 1989 for £15,000 and fought out that right-wing berth with Michael Cheetham and Steve Claridge in his time here. Nippy and enthusiastic he was a very strong member of United's impressive squad of the early nineties. He moved to Chesterfield in June 1993 for £20,000 before moving on to Colchester and Lincoln.

David John DONALDSON (1980-84) 130+2 lge apps, 0 gls

Started off with Arsenal, but made his League debut with Millwall, for whom he signed in June 1973. Made 216 League appearances for the Lions before joining John Docherty's Cambridge in February 1980. Was first-choice right-back for four seasons in the old Second Division and is one of

the few players who has impressed for United in that most troublesome of positions. He was a largely unsung hero of Doc's amber army. He left before we went down to the Third Division. He went on to manage Ramsey Town.

Stephen John DOWMAN (1985-87) 45 lge apps, 3 gls

Made over 150 League appearances for Colchester as a central defender in the late seventies. Went on to star at Wrexham (1980-83) and Charlton (1983-85) before moving to Newport County in August 1985. He was only there for two months before joining the mighty U's as we started to pull out of the team's mid-eighties recession. He usually partnered Andy Beattie and Lindsay Smith. It was the footballer's curse of injury that forced him to leave, but he went on to become another player to make his name in non-League management, this time with Wivenhoe Town.

John Brian DREYER (2000-) 9 lge apps, 0 gls to date

Almost into double figures as regards League appearances for the U's, his career total is well in excess of 400, mostly for Luton. For a fuller picture you are going to have to peruse this season's programmes.

Nick Pomery is not a well-known figure at the Abbey Stadium, yet he is the Chairman and one of the leading proponents of Cambridge Fans United. So who is Nick, and what are his connections with United?

Nick was raised in Cambridge, his mum moving to Girona soon after his father's death when he was five. "I was the youngest of four brothers, the eldest (who were already grown-up) were Spurs and Colchester fans, and I went to the odd game with them in the late 60's. United were elected to the League when I was nine, and I saw virtually every game that first season I was hooked, and my poor mother was nagged into taking me to sit in the Main Stand every two weeks. My pocket money was just enough to get me into a game a fortnight, including programme. In the mid seventies I graduated to standing, switching between the Corona and the Habbini as the mood took me."

Six form and college loomed, but there was time to start taking some away trips, notably the 2-0 win at Brighton in '79, as well as an unnecessarily exciting excursion to the Euro Championships in 1980, part of the terrace that serenaded the Turin police chief with a rendition of 'Nessun Dorma' and was tear-gassed by the Polizei Urbani for their pains.

"Later I moved to London. What with studying for accountancy and treasury qualifications, playing sport on Saturdays and getting married to a lady who admits to loathing football, for the next ten years I only got to a few games a season, I admit I was a typical glory hunter."

The turning point was three years ago when Ann, his wife, was searching for ideas for his Christmas present. In desperation she hit on the idea of buying shares in Cambridge United FC, and unwittingly bought enough to make Nick the 12th largest shareholder. She also got Steve Greenall, then Club secretary, on the phone asking who this Nick guy was!

Since then Nick has been involved in the redevelopment saga, lobbying local and national politicians, as well as the national Supporters Direct initiative. He also prepares the analysis of the Club's annual accounts for U's Net every year.

What led him to get involved in the founding of CFU? "I have enough accounting knowledge to be able to look at the Club's financial results and know for certain that the Club can't prosper without greater support from local business and from the fans. The aim of CFU is to bring the fans and the Club together, maximising support. Both sides get something big out of the set-up - influence (through shareholding and a fans' director) for the fans, money and practical help for the Club."

It seemed to me that helping to set up CFU was the best way that I could give something back to the Club that has given me so much joy, and heartache, over the years. I have friends who are Chelsea or Man Utd. fans, and they have never known the fun, the emotion that I have, following United. We've had some great teams at the Abbey, from the team that achieved League status, through Ron Atkinson's great side and the Cup heroes of the early 90's, to now - I think this team can match the best of them, given a chance. I want to help them, and the Club, achieve the most that they can."

Tonight's Cambridge born and bred subject is also a great away fan as well, and many I am sure will recognise him from his photo. He has chalked up an amazing 82 away grounds, all whilst watching the U's, so which ones have impressed him the most? Immediately he replied "Turf Moor due to the atmosphere generated, shame we won't be going there this season". Funnily enough The Clarets along with Oldham were the away teams who most impressed him last season here at The Abbey. At the other end of the scale he was pretty scathing about Colchester's Layer Road calling it a "dump"! One away trip that he certainly didn't want reminding of, was our 2-0 FA Cup defeat at Plymouth in 1989. He and his mates were ambushed in their minibus after the game, with the windows being put out by a variety of objects including a skateboard. With the January chill getting through to them, they also got lost going across Dartmoor, eventually arriving back in Cambridge at 5.00 on Sunday morning! Away Supporters in those days had to endure this sort of thing regularly.

This Corona Ender has always been impressed by the openness of the

Club as a whole and also marvels that being such a small Club it appears that everyone seems to know everyone else. His favourite Manager during all of our Football League career which he has witnessed? Without a moments hesitation he replied; "Roy McFarland, not only is he a good Manager working with a small budget, but he is also approachable and very open."

David's love of the Club meant that he wanted to get a lot more involved, and he certainly got his reward when last year he was voted in to become a member of the CUSA. He has since then tended to specialise, not unnaturally, in the Away Travel arm, being champion of their interests. He certainly did his bit in the highly successful Yellow Card protest of January this year, similarly the petition signing in April. Knowing him personally, I know he believes unwaveringly that the CUSA are looking after the interests of the fans and is more than glad that the Board recognise this!

David, I feel, is the sort of guy who is the future, and will strive to ensure that the ordinary Supporters views are taken into account when any major decisions have to be made.

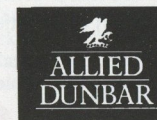

• What the papers said...

ten goals in four days. Wow! I was really looking forward to reading some column inches about this. But a trawl of local papers from Rotherham and Port Vale respectively drew a blank. The Sheffield Star and Stoke Evening Sentinel (yes, that's what it's really called) weren't playing.

I hunted down the 'web sites, where it appears that everyone connected with Rotherham were too p**** off to write a word on the game. I had a little more luck with Vale, where a solitary poor soul, who sounded totally dejected came up with this opening paragraph:

"After the disgust and emotion I felt after last night's game, I have only just calmed down enough to write a rather more lucid account of what transpired at a so called 'football' match last night at Abbey Rd."

Oh well, all you Abbey Road faithfuls, you may as well read on: *"Let's face it, Port Vale were dreadful last night. They were at least consistent enough to carry on the nightmare performance played out some days earlier at Bournemouth where the same unlucky supporters had to witness the same pathetic showing by the Vale team."*

As down in the depths as the poor chap sounded, credit where it's due, he did at least give credit where it was due: *"From the kick off last night Cambridge showed they were a football team, first touch immaculate and showing good movement and running off the ball, outplaying the Vale team by some way. In some respects they looked like the Vale of old, is this how low Vale have come!"*

"For the first twenty minutes Cambridge made all the running with the odd exception of the lively Minton getting hold of the ball and holding it up well. In the 20th minute after more Vale headless chicken routine in defence, Uriah Rennie gave a penalty which was duly dispatched."

He summed up the entire second half with this couple of sentences, gave more credit to United and Steve Slade, who obviously caught his eye: *"The rest of the game went pretty much of a blur as Cambridge looked a class outfit and could have scored lots more than the 4 goals. Their last goal - a half volley by the impressive Abbey (I think) - looked impressive even from the other end of the ground."*

Verdict: Horton must go before a Stoke embarrassment.

the wrong net most own goals by a united player

It must be pointed out that Fallon and Lindsay played a lot of games for the U's, so the law of averages works against them. Of the players listed above it is Mark Crowe who has the worst strike rate (an own goal every 261/2 matches).. John Dreyer's deflected own goal was the 44th occasion when a United player scored an own goal.

York have benefitted three times from own goals by United players. In February 1974 an Alan Guild deflection helped them to a 2-0 win, but the most astonishing game came in September 1984 when Steve Fallon got two own goals in a 2-3 defeat at Bootham Crescent in the Third Division. He put York in front after three minutes with a deflection, then put York 3-1 up after 84 minutes with a mis-hit clearance.

Two months later, Richard Overson put through his own net whilst playing for Burnley to give United a 2-0 lead, then Fallon boomed again to level the match at 2-2. Burnley eventually won 3-2.

Other U's matches to feature an own goal on each side are a Division Four game against Maidstone in September 1989 when Lindsay Smith's misdirected header gave the Stones the lead, only for Tony Pamphlett to score a classic o.g. when he ran the ball into the net when under no pressure at all to make it 2-2.

Three months later Colin Bailie turned the ball into his own net to give Lincoln the lead, then Matt Carmichael volleyed in an own goal to give United a 3-2 lead. Carmichael made amends by scoring an equaliser for Lincoln, who then went on to win 4-3.

Other players who have scored a goal for each side are: Eddie Garbett for Barrow in January 1971 in a 3-3 draw; Alan Biley for Cambridge at Burnley in November 1979 (Burnley won 5-3); George Oghani for Bolton in May 1985 (United lost 2-3); Neal Heaney for Cambridge in a 6-1 win over Bristol Rovers in February 1992; Ricky Otto of Birmingham who scored all the goals in a 1-1 draw against Cambridge in December 1994 and our own dear John Taylor who emulated the feat against Shrewsbury in January 1998 (another 1-1 draw)

Other teams have gifted United own goals on 48 occasions. Teams from the South-west being particularly adept at it. Exeter players Munks and Bond got an own goal each in a 1-4 home defeat in April 1974, whilst Kruse and Sandercock did the same in a 2-2 draw in January 1977. Kruse's goal being the fastest o.g. ever at six seconds.

Where United players have gaffed, the opposition has won 28 times, with 9 draws and 6 U's wins. Where the other team have boomed, United have been victorious 28 times, lost 8 times with 10 drawn.

Most spectacular U's own goal is probably a bicycle kick from Graham Howell against Stockport in September 1975. The only really crucial one was Jamie Campbell's in the giantkilling by Stevenage in 1997. The two most memorable to benefit Cambridge were Dave Thompson's backpass that enabled us to knock First Division Millwall out of the FA Cup in 1990 and Lee Sinnott's wild slice that won us promotion against Bradford a year later.

Mis-directed clearances are the most common type of own goal (39%), followed by deflections (24%), turning the ball into the wrong net (20%), sliced clearances (10%) and backpasses (7%).

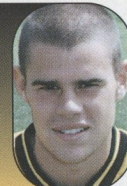

The win also came despite the 16th minute sending off of Tony Barras for a professional foul. £150,000 signing Leitao has now bagged six goals this season, and along with Brett Angell and Darren Byfield the frontline have notched an impressive 16 goals.

Another side with no problems in front of goal are Reading. They have scored nine in the past three matches, and now lie in fourth place. Ex-U Martin Butler is now the Division's top scorer with eight League goals and he, like Leitao, has scored in the last three fixtures. The floppy-haired forward won a man of the match award for his hat-trick against Swansea during a 5-1 win at The Madejski Stadium, and then took just six minutes to score at Rotherham in The Royals fine 3-1 away win. He then continued his exploits with a 9th minute goal in a tough 1-1 draw with Wigan at The JJB Stadium last Friday night.

games. An easy 2-0 home win over a desperate Port Vale side was followed up a week later with an away victory at Swansea, again the scoreline 2-0. They then faced Bristol Rovers at Gigg Lane in one of Division Two's more attractive fixtures last weekend. The Shakers ran out 1-0 victors and stay in second place thanks to a Nick Daws goal in the 81st minute, with Rovers despair added too in the 76th minute with the sending off of 17-year-old midfielder Steve Foster.

Millwall seem to be profiting from the appointment of Mark McGhee as their new first team manager, and as with Bury have gained a maximum nine points. The previously mentioned success over tonight's opponents Luton was preceded with a 5-0 win over bottom placed Oxford, in which Neil Harris bagged a classy hat-trick, and a ridiculously easy 4-1 win at London Road in the clash with Peterborough. As a result of this The Lions move up to 5th place with two games in hand.

After that 5-0 drubbing Oxford parted company with manager Denis Smith, who has bizarrely stayed on at the Club to help appoint his successor! Since his 'departure' the other U's have lost two M4 derbies, the first being a 1-0

defeat at home to Bristol City which prompted an after match protest, and the second a narrow 2-1 loss at the County Ground at the hands of slowly improving Swindon, who had a week earlier drawn 2-2 at the same venue with Bruce Rioch's 6th placed Wigan side.

chairboys challenge

Jumping quickly back to the top of the table, Wycombe have also put together an impressive run that has seen them claim a maximum nine point haul. The signing of Andy Rammell seems to have paid dividends and the disappointment of losing Sean Devine to long-term injury is fast fading for the fans at Adams Park. The former Walsall man grabbed the winner in a 1-0 travelling victory over Port Vale a fortnight ago, and was on hand to knock in the Chairboys' second goal during last weeks 3-1 win at home to Notts County, who bagged their only point in a month during a 2-2 draw with Brentford. Three weeks ago Lawrie Sanchez side also defeated table dropping Peterborough 2-0 in Buckinghamshire, which means his charges remain in third place on 21 points. Barry Fry's not-so-Posh side then regained some missing pride with a 2-0 win over lowly Port Vale to leave them in 12th position.

Just above Boro' in 11th place are Northampton, who have had mixed fortunes lately. They fell to two first half Wigan strikes in the 2-1 loss at The JJB Stadium last month, then a week later scored two second half goals at home to freescore Wrexham, who had taken a speedy 2-0 lead after just 18 minutes. Jamie Forrester grabbed the point for them with a spectacular 87th minute goal, powerfully lobbing the Robins keeper from all of 25 yards.

bournemouth baffled

Sean O'Driscoll remains mystified as his Bournemouth side gained just two points from their last four games, despite some improved performances and a total of seven goals. They dominated against Oldham but had to rely on a 62nd minute Steve Fletcher goal to secure a 1-1 draw, then took a 1-0 lead at Brentford only to lose 3-2. The following week they again took a 1-0 lead, this time at home to Wrexham,

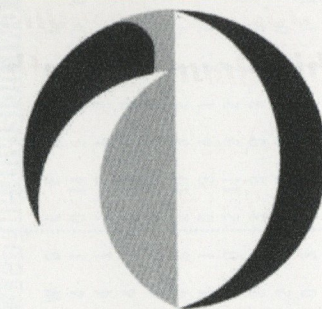
but conceded two goals in the last three minutes to go down 2-1. Moreover, in the game at Bristol City last week they once again took the lead but were then victims of a twelve-minute Tony Thorpe hat-trick to trail 3-1 after just 38 minutes. However, a Claus Jorgenson goal on 44, and an 89th minute Gareth O'Connor strike sealed a point for the hardworking Hampshire side.

Bristol City themselves are still finding Division Two life tough. Along with this draw and the win over Oxford they also stumbled to a 1-1 home stalemate with Colchester, which leaves them in 19th place.

Meanwhile, Oldham have continued their poor start to the campaign. As well the 3-1 home reverse to The Mighty U's and the draw at Bournemouth they were soundly beaten last weekend by Ronnie Moore's progressing Rotherham side. 3-0 was the final scoreline, so Andy Ritchie's days in the hot-seat are now surely numbered as his side drop to 23rd place.

Tuesday's visitors to The Abbey are Stoke City, who are currently in 9th place but like United have two games in hand. The Potters have also suffered from the same fixture headache as United recently, but have been boosted by the return from injury of Peter Thorne. He popped up to convert the winner during the single goal success at Colchester the weekend before last, then saved the Staffordshire sides blushes by scoring in the 81st minute to secure a point against Rotherham in the 1-1 draw at The Britannia Stadium.

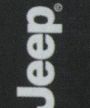
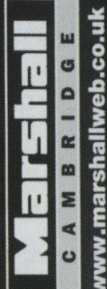

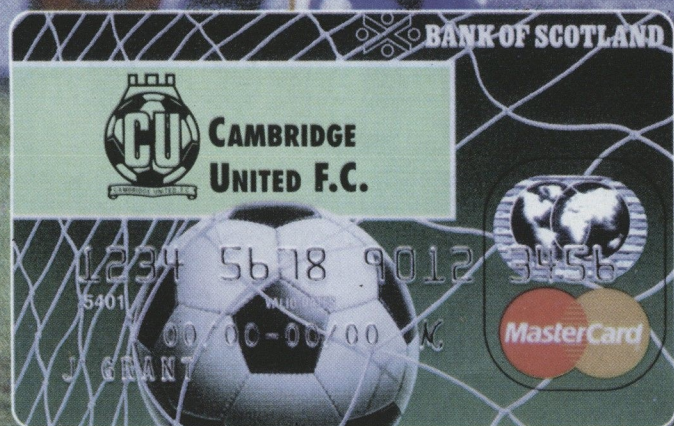
