

Forward

AFTER one deal went wrong at the last minute, manager Ricky Hill was this week working quietly on overtures that might bring in at least one experienced player to give him and his squad a lift.

No details were given, beyond the fact that the boss has identified two possible targets who might fit the bill, probably as loan signings. The need to keep cards close to chests was underlined when one deal fell apart after it was all but signed and sealed.

The Town were poised to sign Northampton defender Ian Hendon. The clubs agreed a £55,000 fee, and after protracted negotiations with the 28-year-old wing-back and his agent, and a medical, hands were shaken and Hendon left Kenilworth Road saying he would be back the following day to start training with his new club.

A Londoner, and former England under-21 international, he was a YTS boy at Spurs, before moving to Leyton Orient, then Notts County, and to Northampton 18 months ago.

But after agreeing a deal, but not signing any agreements, Hendon was contacted by Sheffield Wednesday, and the next the Town knew he had signed for them, to play in a side battling against relegation from the First Division. "I'm not exactly thrilled about what has happened," said the Town boss, with some ironic understatement.

In the circumstances, it was hardly surprising that this week the manager's latest targets were being kept secret.

He said he was keen to add more experience to his squad, though also delighted at the latest news on the injury front. As reported elsewhere in this issue, Marvin Johnson, Stuart Douglas and Andrew Fotiadis are all on the way back after injuries.

ONE change was announced by the club this week, with a statement on Thursday confirming that assistant manager Chris Ramsey had left by mutual consent. The statement added: "Manager Ricky Hill will assume total responsibility for the first team, with Lil Fuccillo assisting him on a day to day basis."

The Town are also about to lose their physio. Clive Goodyear is taking a job with Cardiff City, where the general manager is Bobby Gould, his boss at Wimbledon when Clive picked up an FA Cup-winners medal. His old playing mate Alan Cork is in charge of the first team at Ninian Park. The physio will stay at Kenilworth Road until the Town find a replacement.

Manager's "fixture"

RICKY Hill will meet supporters in the Eric Morecambe Suite on Thursday week, November 2. He will be guest speaker, and ready to listen to the fans, at the season's first open meeting of Luton Town Supporters Club.

Accommodation is limited and at present admission tickets are available only to members of LTSC, price £2. They can be obtained from the supporters club kiosk before and after today's game, or on Town on Tour coaches. Any tickets still available next Saturday will go on general sale, at £5. You can, of course, save money for this and future speakers' evenings by joining LTSC for a modest donation of at least £7 per season.



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
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The Manager

Ricky Hill

WE CAME home very disappointed that we did not get the win we wanted, and deserved, at Oxford on Tuesday, but I think the Luton supporters who saw the game will agree that there were positive signs to suggest we are capable of better results than we have had so far.

In the home game with Millwall one unlucky incident cost us a draw against a team that has been regularly winning by four goals. At Cambridge we were ahead, and looking comfortable, until an unlucky red card disrupted us, and we were beaten by a team which is in the top six.

We thought the referee was harsh, to say the least, but while we did not agree with his decision we had to get on with the job, and if we could have held out a little longer in the second half I think we might have got a point at least.

But the defending was not good enough when it mattered most, so we could not complain too much about being punished for lack of concentration or wrong decisions.

At Oxford, there was some good news, some not so good. It was very encouraging to see so many scoring chances created, particularly in the second half. It was pleasing to keep a clean sheet for the first time in eight games. The down side, of course, is that goals win games, and we failed to get one on a night when we might easily have had three or four. Their goalkeeper played exceptionally well, and our finishing was not as clinical as it should have been.

Disappointingly, we once again saw a performance that was not consistent enough for the 90 minutes. Our front three had a poor first half, and were told at half time to play it more simply, pass and move, and encourage others to join in. They responded, and we certainly had a much better second half, and were always looking more likely to score.

Looking likely is one thing. Doing it is another, and we all know that we are under pressure to get a victory this afternoon. The recent results have fallen short of what we want, but apart from the game at Swansea, when we were reduced to ten men, no-one has given us a hammering, and even the top team, Walsall, had to settle for a point when they were here five weeks ago.

Fortunately we are not adrift at the bottom of the table, painful though it is to see our current position. We have run some good teams close, and the need is to kick on. Narrow defeats are not good enough. They have to be turned into draws at least, and the draws need to become victories.

We were able to make a couple of team changes at Oxford, and the players involved, those brought in and those left out, all responded with the right attitude.

Marvin Johnson, Stuart Douglas and Andrew Fotiadis are all well on the way back to fitness after their injuries, so that will give us a few more options, and more competition for places as we face up to the challenge that faces us.

And we are not despondent about our prospects. I have seen enough flashes of good football to know that we can be a capable side. If we make it more than just flashes, as we should, we will be all right.

But time is not on our side: we cannot afford to allow the rest of the division to pull further ahead, and that means our home results have to improve dramatically. We have already lost more home games than would be acceptable for the entire season.

Brentford will give us a good test today, and it is a pleasure to welcome them and their supporters to Kenilworth Road. So far they are having a better season than us, but if we concentrate on our jobs, we can get the result which all of us who support Luton Town desire.

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



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Captain's Log

Marvin Johnson

THERE has not been too much to be cheerful about in

terms of results since I last wrote in these pages, but I hope I can be forgiven for being really cheerful for myself after some long-awaited good news this week.

Along with Stuart Douglas and Andrew Fotiadis I was able to play my first game for two months, with the reserves at Gillingham on Wednesday, and I can't tell you how good it is to be back in action. I played on the right of two centre-backs in a four-man defence, with a young trialist as the centre-half, and I was pleasantly surprised at how well I got through the game.

Stuart and Andrew were both subbed in the second half, but although I was offered the chance to come off I felt so comfortable that I completed the 90 minutes.

We got a 1-1 draw and only a diabolical refereeing decision prevented me from marking the occasion with a rare goal. I exchanged passes with Stuart and got into the box, with just the goalkeeper to beat. I figured he might bring me down, so I let him, but mysteriously the ref failed to see the clear penalty, so my big chance had gone. I would, of course, have insisted on taking the spot kick if it had been awarded!

I am delighted to report that I felt no after-effects from a game I thoroughly enjoyed. Your first one back after a long lay-off is always a touch nervy, but I felt good from the first minute, and it was a very good "fitness test." The pace of the game was slower than in the Nationwide League, and of course with hardly any crowd there is no atmosphere. So it was a slightly gentle re-introduction, but nevertheless it was a competitive game, and I was able to tackle and run at full power and pace.

I now desperately hope to be able to play some part in today's game, but that of course is down to the manager. I have told him I think I am ready, and I want to get back into the team

because I think my experience can help us get over our poor start to the season. I expect the physio and club doctor will also be involved in decisions about me, Stuart and Andrew, but all three of us will be glad when the frustration is finally over and we are back in the first team squad.

It has been frustrating suffering with the team from the sidelines, and while our league table position is dreadful, I have seen enough from the stand to know that we can get out of trouble, and I am very confident we will, especially when we have a full complement of players for the boss to choose from.

Luck has been against us in recent games, and I am a believer in luck evening itself out over the course of a season. Cambridge had their luck when Matty Spring was harshly sent off, and Oxford could thank their lucky stars that their goalkeeper was in tremendous form on Tuesday. I see that match reports are now available on the internet, and the official club site has earned some good reviews since it was started a couple of weeks ago.

But I have to voice my disgust at some of the things that appear on unofficial web sites. It is bad enough to read crude and cruel jibes, but there is no excuse for out and out lies. A so-called supporter claimed on a message board that Matty and Douglas were in the stand laughing when Cambridge scored their second goal. What an insult, that is. I was with them. It was simply not true - we all feel it badly when we lose, just as we all want to enjoy winning together. The author of that message was well out of order. I don't see how he could call himself a Luton Town supporter. I wonder if he is really a fan of our friends in Hertfordshire?

Anyway, I know the true supporters will be in the ground this afternoon. They have every right to voice their views, but with a bit of luck we will all have something to cheer about by this evening.

Treatment Room

Clive Goodyear

A RESERVE game at Gillingham on Wednesday gave us more good news about our injured players, with three proving they are well on the way back after long-term lay-offs.

I gather Marvin Johnson has already said in his column today that he thinks he could return to the league team this afternoon, after getting comfortably through 90 minutes at Priestfields. Certainly his hamstring injury, sustained at Wigan way back in August, has healed, and he has worked hard to aid his recovery.

The same goes for Stuart Douglas and Andrew Fotiadis, who were also back in action at Gillingham. They, however, did not play the full game, mainly because forwards do a lot more running than defenders, and we wanted to be sure we did not ask them to do too much in their first appearances for some weeks.

Douglas did 70 minutes with no sign of problems, and Fotiadis completed an hour before he began to tire. The game was a very good "fitness test" for all three, and I am glad to say that there were no after-effects for any of the three. Match fitness, however, is another matter, because there is a big difference between reserve team games and Second Division fixtures.

The three were all able to join in training sessions in the latter part of the week, but obviously they will be short of match practice and match fitness at present. I would not be surprised to see them involved again in next Wednesday's reserve game, at home to Cambridge.

While three are hoping to stay out of the treatment room, three others have been in this week. Paul McLaren was a late withdrawal from the team at Oxford because of an injury collected in training on Sunday. He took a kick on a calf muscle, and while it was not serious, it was bad enough to rule him out of Tuesday's match. By Thursday he was able to do a bit of running as the bruise faded, and the plan was to have a look at him in training yesterday before deciding if he could be made available for selection to face Brentford.

It was something similar with Gavin McGowan, who tweaked his ankle again at Oxford. It is not too serious, and was caused when he turned sharply to block a shot. He kept going for a while, but experience - his and mine - made us decide at the interval that he should be taken off. Footballers can usually judge these things accurately, and Tuesday's decision at half-time has helped McGowan in the recovery process. He was expecting to be able to resume training yesterday, which would give him a chance of keeping his place in today's team, if selected. Julian Watts picked up an ankle knock at Oxford, but by Thursday he was looking as though it would not be a major problem, and if he maintained his progress he should be available today.

THIS weekend has been designated as the fourth FIFA

World Fair Play Day, and we are pleased to take part in the event this afternoon. The two teams will line up in front of the Main Stand to shake hands with each other before kick-off. Our thanks go to the children from our Junior Hatters section, who will be participating.

There has been some comment regarding the arrangements for the game against Millwall which I would like to explain.

In the interests of safety, and after discussion involving the club and the police, and with the approval of the Safety Advisory Group, the match was designated ALL TICKET for ALL supporters. That means we do not sell tickets on the day of the match.

We used every media outlet possible to give the details as much publicity as possible, and Millwall played their part as well. The ticket office stayed open all day on the Saturday, the day before the game, to give every possible opportunity for supporters to purchase tickets.

Unfortunately, there were some foreign visitors, and other fans from both Luton and Millwall, who turned up on the day, and discovered they could not obtain tickets.

This may seem harsh, but you cannot differentiate to allow some supporters access and not others.

The Police Commander, the FA Security Advisor, and the Safety Advisory Group were all here on the day checking on how things went.

It was interesting to hear that some foreign journalists, knowing that it was an all ticket match, came to the ground on the day to try to see if they could gain entry. I suppose they thought it would have made a good

story if they had got in.

Having said all that, it must seem odd to supporters when some games, for instance the one at Cambridge last week, are said to be all ticket, but cash admission on the day is then allowed. The difference was that at Cambridge it was all-ticket for our supporters ONLY. It is annoying that, having made the effort to purchase tickets in advance from our ticket office, supporters discover they could after all pay on the turnstile.

Following the lock-out last season at the Abbey for Luton supporters, Cambridge made the match all-ticket for away supporters this time. However, when we had 1,000 tickets left, they decided to put them on the turnstiles. The difference between that game and ours with Millwall was that at Cambridge it was not all-ticket for all supporters.



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Hatters Away

AS usual two coach services are running to the next away game, at Oldham on Tuesday. And Town on Tour promise that they will give much better value than they did for the trips to Swansea and Sunderland, when they were so embarrassed by the poor facilities on their coaches that they gave passengers some of their money back.

They have ditched the coach company concerned, and switched to Hallmark, who take the Town team to matches. The Bobbers Travel Club have had no problems with their long-time association with Shoreys Travel.

For the game at Boundary Park the Bobbers will set off from Cranfield at 1.30, calling at various villages on the way to Luton, with departure from Kenilworth Road at 2.30. The fare is £13 adults, £11 for children and pensioners.

Town on Tour will leave Maple Road at 2.30, picking up at Milton Keynes Coachway 20 minutes later. Their fare is £14.50 for members of Luton Town Supporters Club, £12 for concessions, or £16 for passengers who are not in the supporters club.

Stewarded car parking is available at Maple Road, at £4 per car, or £3 if the drivers are members of the Bobbers Travel Club or LTSC.



DIY travellers

THERE is a choice of route to Oldham, and with the M6 becoming ever more congested in the Midlands, our advice for midweek afternoon travel is to take the slightly longer route, up the M1 and over the Pennines. The alternative is taking M1 and M6 north, and in Lancashire, after crossing the Thelwall viaduct over the Mersey and the Manchester Ship Canal, take M62 east, towards Leeds. Our man will ignore the M6 and continue up M1 into Yorkshire, to join the M62 heading west.

Either way, leave M62 at junction 20 to follow the signs towards Oldham, and after half a mile, where the road divides, keep to the right, signposted towards Manchester east. After another mile and a half, join the A627, signposted to Oldham and Ashton. At the first roundabout take the second exit, and you will see the ground, and its car park, on your left.

Mileage: Around 200 via M1 and M6, about 220 via M1 and M62.





RON NOADES - MANAGER

In 1974 he took control of Southall, and two years later, in 1976, became benefactor and Chairman of Wimbledon, guiding them to League status. In 1981 he became Chairman of Crystal Palace and remained at Selhurst Park until June 1998, when he became owner of Brentford, and appointed himself Manager prior to the start of the 98/99 season.

NO 1 - ANDY WOODMAN

Born: 11.8.7

Previous clubs: Crystal Palace, Exeter City, Northampton Town

Andy joined the Bees from Northampton Town for £75,000 in the Bees' Championship season. He made the position his own until late last season when Jason Pearcey replaced him. He is currently on loan to Third Division Southend United with a view to a permanent move.

NO 2 - DANNY BOXALL

Born: 24.8.77

Previous clubs: Crystal Palace, Oldham Athletic (loan)

This talented young defender was signed on a free transfer from Crystal Palace during the 1998/99 season. His exciting form earned him recognition by the Republic of Ireland's Under 21 squad, and he had become an integral part of the Bees' first choice defence before he pulled up with a ligament injury at Luton at the end of February.

NO 3 - IJAH ANDERSON

Born: 30.12.75

Previous Club: Southend United. Fans' favourite, Ijah, is the Club's longest serving player having joined them from Southend United in July '95 on a free transfer. He made the number three berth his own last season, and started this season with an inspired performance at Northampton last Saturday. But he subsequently suffered a ligament injury in training and is expected to be out of action until next year.

NO 4 - ROBERT QUINN

Born: 8.11.76

Previous Club: Crystal Palace. Robert, a former Republic of Ireland Under 21, and B International, figured in almost every Brentford match last season, either by playing or as a

substitute. His ability to play in a number of positions is of enormous benefit to the Bees.

NO 5 - DARREN POWELL

Born: 10.3.76

Previous Club: Hampton.


In the 1998/99 Championship season, having signed from non league Hampton for an original £15,000, in his first full season in the League, he picked up the Supporters "Player of the Year" award. He continued to impress with almost every performance last season. He is currently sidelined but expected to be fit within a couple of weeks.

NO 6 - SCOTT MARSHALL

Born: 1.5.73

Previous Club: Arsenal, Rotherham (loan), Sheffield United (loan), Southampton, Celtic (loan).

A former Youth and Under 21 Scottish International, Scott spent seven years as a professional at Highbury before moving to Southampton in August '98. The experienced central defender joined the Bees for £250,000 last October, but was sidelined for almost four months with an injury.




NO 7 - PAUL EVANS

Born: 1.9.74

Previous Club: Shrewsbury Town.

The former Welsh Under 21 International joined from Shrewsbury in March of last year for £100,000, and his signing was the catalyst for the successful assault on the Championship. His exceptional skills as a captain are matched by his ability in midfield, and his long range scoring prowess last season made him become known nationally.



NO 8 - GAVIN MAHON

Born: 2.1.77

Previous Club: Wolverhampton Wanderers, Hereford U.

Gavin was the Bees' only ever present last season until injury forced him to miss the match at Blackpool in January. This was only the 2nd match he had missed since forcing his way into the side at Christmas '98. An influential midfielder, he cost the Bees £50,000 plus when signing in November '98.

NO 9 - LLOYD OWUSU

Born: 12.12.76

Previous Club: Slough Town.

Twenty three year old Lloyd, having been the Third Division's 2nd top scorer in the Bees' Championship season, continued to hit the net with a further twelve to his credit last season. Brentford pipped Walsall to his signature in August '98, which cost the Bees an original bargain fee of £25,000.

NO 10 - SCOTT PARTRIDGE

Born: 13.10.74

Previous Club: Bradford C, Bristol C, Plymouth A (loan), Scarborough U (loan), Cardiff C, Torquay. Scott joined Brentford from Torquay United for £100,000 over a year ago. He is a handful for the best of defences.

NO 11 - ANDY SCOTT

Born: 2.8.72

Previous Club: Sheffield U, Chesterfield, Bury (loan). Andy is now the second longest serving player at the Club and completed his 100th full appearance for the Club in the Bees' opener at Northampton. He is currently the Bees' leading scorer with six goals.

NO 12 - MARTIN ROWLANDS

Born: 8.2.79

Previous Club: Farnborough Town.

In only eighteen months of League football, 21 year old Martin has gained both Football League representative honours and has become a mainstay of the Republic of Ireland Under 21 squad. Meanwhile he had another outstanding season for his local side, and became the Player of the Year last season.

NO 13 - JASON PEARCEY

Born: 23.7.71

Previous Club: Mansfield Town, Grimsby Town. Twenty-nine year old Jason had his appearances strictly limited last season. However he did keep a clean sheet, the Bees' first in 12 matches, in his first League appearance in March.



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NO 14 - TONY FOLAN

Born: 18.9.78

Previous Club: Crystal Palace.

The Republic of Ireland Under 21 International was cruelly hit with an injury sustained in training last season. As a result his appearances were minimal following a season in which his spectacular goals were legendary. He became the Bees first substitute of the season when replacing Gavin Mahon at Northampton.

NO 15 - IVAR INGIMARSSON

Born: 20.8.77

Previous Club: IBV (Iceland), Torquay United (loan) Ivar, a former Player of the Year in Iceland, has been capped by his country at Under 16, 18, and 21 levels. He was signed having completed a one month loan with Torquay United, for a deal totalling £150,000, and was ever present before the Bees injury hoodoo struck just before the end of the season. He scored the Bees first of the season on the opening day of the season.

NO 16 - DEREK BRYAN

Born: 11.11.74

Previous Club: Hampton.

Derek, who joined the Bees from Hampton for £10,000+ in '97 earned the title "super sub" for his performances when coming off the substitutes bench. His two goals last season both came from

such a role. However his goal against Oxford in the AWS Area QuarterFinal in January was his last piece of action, as he incurred a horrific injury in doing so, which is expected to sideline him until the end of the year.

**NO.17 - OLAFUR GOTTSKALKSSON**

Born: 12.3.68

Previous Club: KA, IA, KR, Keflavik, Hibernians.

Oli, as he is known, joined the Bees during the recent close season, on a free transfer from Hibs. He signed for the Scottish Premier Club, for £250,000 in '97. He has been capped over thirty times at Full and Under 21 level by his native Iceland and his form this season has earned him a recall to the Icelandic World Cup squad.

NO 18 - GARETH GRAHAM

Born: 6.12.78

Previous Club: Crystal Palace.

The tigerish midfielder, a Northern Ireland Under 21 International, joined us on a free transfer from Crystal Palace in October. His appearances were restricted through injury although he made his full debut at Scunthorpe in March, and featured regularly thereafter.

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**NO.19 - PAUL GIBBS**

Born: 6.12.78

Previous Club: Colchester, Torquay United, Plymouth Argyle.

Paul, joined the Bees from Plymouth during the summer, where he had been for the previous two seasons. In

1998/99 he was named in the PFA Third Division's representative team. He made his Second Division debut, for the Bees at Northampton.

NO 20 - KEVIN O'CONNOR

Born: 24.2.82

Previous Club: None


Kevin who is 18, is now starting his second season with the Bees, having been offered terms when a seventeen year old. He made his first appearance as a substitute when coming on against Exeter City in the Auto Windscreens Shield and his full debut against Wycombe hours after signing the contract.

Joined the Bees for £50,000+ in February, whilst he was in the middle of a loan spell at Brighton. Scored a first half hat trick against Gillingham in the Bees final pre season warm up match.




NO.26 - MARK WILLIAMS

Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.

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
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
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


OUR invitation to supporters to shows us the Town's youngest fans brought in one photograph and letter which could also qualify for the Hatters Abroad feature.

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
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

Blast from the Past

Roger Wash

Thorpe's magic shines through

Luton Town manager, Lennie Lawrence, was fully aware that major surgery was needed on a Town side that suffered relegation to Division Two in 1996. Pruning of the wage bill was the first step and out went previous season imports, Johnny Vilstrup and Vidar Riseth as well as former crowd favourite, Scott Oakes.

The pre-season pundits made the Town one of the favourites to win promotion from a division they had last left in 1970 but the opening day defeat at home to Burnley meant hasty revisions in their forecasts. To rub salt in the wound the Burnley scorers in their 2-1 victory were ex-Hatters Steve Thompson and Kurt Nogan both of whom had been discarded by the Town when the depth of talent at Kenilworth Road was decidedly rosier. A penalty miss from Bontcho Guentchev did not help matters though, in a thoroughly disappointing start to the campaign.

Next up were old friends and rivals, Brentford, and a surprisingly large number of Town supporters made their way to Griffin Park attempting to avoid torrential downpours along the way. The Bees had the better of the first half as the Town seemed strangely hesitant and it was only a flying save by Ian Feuer from a Paul Abrahams shot that prevented the home side from taking the lead.

The Hatters were, however, offered a lifeline just before half-time when David Oldfield cut in from the left and was brought down in the area by Jamie Bates. Tony Thorpe stepped up to take the penalty and netted his second goal of the campaign with little fuss.

Early in the second period Oldfield was put through by Gary Waddock and seemed certain to score only for Brentford goalkeeper, Kevin Dearden, to produce an amazing stop by tipping the ball around a post.

From this narrow let-off Brentford stormed back and levelled on 65 minutes. Ceri Hughes gave the ball away in midfield and with the Luton defence backtracking, too much room was given to Carl Asaba who made no mistake.

Three minutes later the Hatters lead was restored when Thorpe saw a shot charged down and Hughes, first to the ball, fired in via a huge deflection.

It was now time to shut up shop to preserve the first three points of the season but crazy defending in the closing minutes left the Luton supporters shell-shocked. Firstly, with ten minutes remaining, the defence got itself in a terrible tangle following a cross from Lee Harvey leaving Bates with a free header. Worse was to follow as, with the seconds ticking away, a centre from Gus Hurdle let in Robert Taylor for another simple header and with it an improbable victory for the Bees.

By the time of the return, in the following March, the poor start to the season had long been forgotten as the Town had forced their way up the table and had actually hit top spot for a short period just before Christmas.

Poor weather in January and an extended F.A.Cup run had meant that the Hatters fell behind on number of games played and too many draws with only two wins in eleven since the turn of the year indicated a freefall down the table but they still, amazingly, remained in second position.

Brentford had been remarkably consistent until the end of February but had begun to wobble having gone four games without a win leading up to the Kenilworth Road clash, including back to back defeats against Preston and Burnley. Despite this, however, they were still top of the table.

A win for the Town would see the two clubs change positions and such was the interest in the game that it was switched to a Friday night for live coverage by Sky T.V. A crowd of 8,164 was present to see at first hand why Brentford boasted the best away record in the division with nine wins to their credit as they totally dominated the opening fifteen minutes leading up to a shot from Marcus Bent that rebounded off the bar.

Gradually the Town found their feet and from then on the game ebbed and flowed with chances going begging at both ends. It was to take something or someone special to settle the game and Tony Thorpe, already with 20 league goals under his belt, was the man to send the Luton fans home happy. With the game about to enter its final quarter Thorpe took a short pass from Paul Showler and for the first time in the match managed to turn his close marker, Jamie Bates, before firing in a low shot past Luton-born Dearden in the Bees goal.

Apart from a glaring miss by Brentford's Joe Omigie to add to his two in the first half the Town managed to hang on to their slender

lead and move back to the top of the table. A relieved Lawrence said afterwards, "We were under the cosh early on but got to grips and pushed them back in the second half. Tony Thorpe got us a goal out of nothing and then we battled away to the end. Give credit to Brentford because they showed why they had the best away record in the league."





KIDS AT KENILWORTH
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Hatters on Card

THERE have been several players over the years who have turned out for Luton and for Brentford, including today's subject, Wayne Turner.. His time here co-incided with Luton's return to the top flight in 1982, and he subsequently figured on several cards and stickers, including this one from Panini, which was issued for the 1983-84 campaign.

Turner was born in Luton in March 1961 and joined the Town from Lewsey Youth as a teenager. He proved to be a versatile utility player in the reserves, and his gritty displays were rewarded with a first team debut at Wrexham on the final day of the 1978-79 season. He wore the No. 11 shirt in a match which saw Mark Aizlewood sent off for dissent. In the opening match of the following campaign, against Cambridge, Turner occupied the suspended Aizlewood's left-back berth. Although he performed creditably and kept his place for the following game, Mal Donaghy was switched to that position, and made it his own for the rest of that season.

For the next couple of years Turner's first-team appearances were very limited, until he got a run in midfield towards the end of the 1981-82 promotion-winning season. During this spell, in April, he scored his first league goal, which was enough to secure a vital away point at Cambridge.

The following season saw Turner turn out 30 times in the old First Division, and although he played in a variety of positions, he figured mostly in midfield. After a bright start at top level, Luton struggled in the second half of the season, and there was a section of the crowd who seemed to make Turner a regular scapegoat when things went badly. This was rough justice on a player who, while not the best in terms of natural ability, always gave 100 per cent when it came to effort, no matter what position he was asked to fill.

The final game of that season, of course, was the

unforgettable victory at Manchester City, and it was Turner who was subbed to allow Raddy Antic to go on to become the day's scoring hero. "I knew we'd win as soon as I came off," grinned Turner afterwards.

The 1983-84 season started with Turner at left back, but the emergence of Mitchell Thomas after Christmas meant that the stocky fair-haired player was out in the cold again.

But he fought his way back for an extended run during the first half of the following campaign,

before the arrival of David Preece and Peter Nicholas sidelined him again.

However, both these were cup-tied, and so as the Town embarked on a famous FA Cup run which saw them unluckily knocked out by Everton in the semi-final Turner was needed again. And everyone loved him in the fifth round second replay against Watford, when he cracked in the only goal, a perfect way to celebrate his 24th birthday.

That summer Turner moved on to Coventry as part of the deal which brought Ashley Grimes to Luton. Turner made 102 first-team appearances for us, but things did not work out too well

for him at Highfield Road, and so he moved on to Brentford the following year. He was a regular for the Bees for a couple of seasons before quitting the league scene in 1989.

He eventually returned to Kenilworth Road as a coach, and it is in that capacity that he is now assisting Barry Fry at Peterborough.

Panini bring out a series of these stickers every season, but nowadays only the Premiership players get a look in. The earlier stickers are not too easy to find, and a complete album of this series from 1984, which also included Trevor Aylott, Frankie Bunn, Brian Stein and Ricky Hill, would now fetch around £30 if in excellent condition.

There was great sympathy for McGowan, because he had an excellent game in his first league start of the season.

The Town manager said he had been relieved to get to half-time with no goals conceded in a below-par team performance. The fact that it was a much better second half was little consolation, not only because of the result, but also because for all the good play, not much in the way of clear scoring chances had been created.





Cambridge Utd 2 Luton Town 1 (HT 0-1)

FOR the second game in a row we heard an opposing manager admit that his team was lucky to get a win over the Town after more unexpected circumstances led to defeat at the Abbey Stadium.

A controversial red card for Matthew Spring, and a penalty that was not given were the crucial moments as Cambridge came back from a goal down to take a victory which manager Roy McFarland agreed they hardly deserved.

It was precious little consolation for the Town or for more than 1,000 supporters who once again gave them tremendous vocal backing. But some of the loudest shouts were directed at referee John Brandwood. The Town looked well capable of ending their losing run in the early exchanges, with Mark Stein having a goal ruled out for offside, and Emmerson Boyce inches away from converting a hard low cross by Spring.

But the Town's first corner, in the 14th minute, led to Stein netting his third goal of the season, and Cambridge were looking somewhat bedraggled.

Spring was rightly booked for a late tackle on Zema Abbey after 19 minutes, the first of five yellow cards flourished before half-time, and was cautioned again, and therefore sent off on the half-hour mark. Julian Watts was pulled up for obstruction just outside the area, and while no-

one would have had much sympathy for Spring if his offence had been dissent, it turned out that Mr Brandwood yellow-carded the midfielder for playing on, saying it was to delay the free kick. Ricky Hill found that less than fair, saying that Spring was simply in the process of completing a clearance pass, with no Cambridge player trying to take the free kick anyway.

Right or wrong, Spring had to go, but for the rest of the first half the Town held their own. For the second half Tresor Kandol was taken off so that Peter Holmes could go into midfield, releasing Liam George to play alongside Stein at the front.

With five at the back, reasoned the manager, there was no reason why the Town should not hold on to their slender advantage.

Unfortunately, only nine minutes into the second half Mark Ovendale failed to make it as he went for a cross by John Dreyer, and Tom Youngs extracted full punishment with a headed equaliser.

Cambridge's confidence grew, but they were lucky in the 77th minute, when Abbey, under pressure from Taylor, stuck up a hand to deflect a long cross by Gavin McGowan. Mr Brandwood, who was much less noticeable in the second half, was probably unsighted, so Abbey escaped, and then rubbed it in with a 78th-minute winner.


