Forward

MANAGER Lil Fuccillo hopes to announce within the next few days the arrival of another player to strengthen his squad. But first, several others will suffer the disappointment of being told that they are no longer required at Kenilworth Road. Rocky Baptiste, 28, signed from non-league soccer in October, was in negotiations with the boss this week with a view to his contract being ended by amicable agreement. Other fringe players are also taking in the bad news, with the boss keen to help them get fixed up elsewhere if possible.

The idea is to get enough names off the payroll to enable at least two new men to come in, with the first choice, as the manager says in his column on page 5, a target man to play in attack. He has given up hope of signing 27-year-old Gareth Taylor, a former England under-21 international, from Manchester City. Joe Royle was prepared to talk business, but the player was not keen.

The Town boss has now turned to Aston Villa's 23-year-old six-footer Richard Walker. He has had Premiership experience - his first-ever goal at that level was against Watford last season - but has slipped down the pecking order since. He was already behind Dion Dublin and Darius Vassell, and Villa have just signed another striker who is obviously going straight into their first team squad. The Town manager hopes that the arrival at Villa Park of Columbian international Juan Pablo Angel for over £8million will improve his chances of attracting Walker to Kenilworth Road.

The Second Division

IF THE bottom two clubs win this afternoon, the Town will move up a notch in the league table. While we entertain Wigan, Oxford United are at home to Port Vale, who are currently two points ahead of us.

The Boxing Day victory over Peterborough brought the safety gap down to five points, thanks to other results being reasonably kind.

Not one of the struggling teams managed 100 per cent records from the first

two of the four holiday fixtures. Oldham, 20th at the start of the month, were the only team in the bottom six to avoid defeat, with a draw at Brentford and a 2-1 home win over Wigan.

Swansea kept pace with us, losing at Wycombe but then winning at home to Walsall, and we drew closer to the other strugglers. Bristol Rovers collected one point, losing the local derby away to Bristol City but then

drawing at home to Reading on Boxing Day. That left them still without a home win so far this season. Our other rivals drew blanks, God bless them, with Oxford, Port Vale and Swindon losing both holiday games so far.

The board have made money available, but Lil Fuccillo's plan is to sign Walker on loan, giving the player and the club time to size up the situation and each other, before talking about a possible permanent move.

The Town are also keeping tabs on a 26-year-old defender who is attracting interest as a Third Division player who looks capable of doing well at a higher level.

The boss is making no rash promises about his plans being fulfilled - "I've lost count of the phone calls I have made to try to get players in," he said. "What surprises me is how many won't come on loan if only to be in the shop window. As a player I always wanted first team football. Today, there are a lot of players who don't seem to care, and are content to pick up their pay packets while meandering along in the reserves."

One player most definitely not in that category is Adrian Whitbread, who has impressed everyone with his determination to prove his worth. He will be released from Portsmouth at the end of the season, and is playing to earn a contract before that happens. He has agreed to extend his loan to the Town into a second month, and striker Lee Nogan has also accepted another month-long contract following his release by Darlington.

For today's game the Town will have Brian Stein available again after a three-match suspension for his red card at Peterborough in the LDV Vans fixture, and Peter Thomson was close to being fit again after his foot injury.

But Paul McLaren is unlikely to return after a knee injury, and he will be suspended for next Saturday's FA Cup game against QPR after becoming the first Town player to collect five bookings this season. He gets a one-match ban, which looks like being served while he would have been unavailable anyway. Julian Watts might be back this afternoon, but Marvin Johnson, Liam George and Stuart Douglas all have little chance of returning from injury.

The Manager Lil Fuccillo

AS THE old year ends to make way for the new, I would love to

know what lies in store for us in the next 12 months. I know what my objectives are, starting with better results for Luton Town, league position safeguarded as soon as possible, and then work on the wider scheme of things.

If you think that sounds a touch fanciful, I have good cause to know that life can often bring surprises. Twelve months ago I was happily enjoying my football as a freelance scout, checking on players and assessing matches for Peterborough, Bury, Reading and Walsall before going full time with Manchester City.

I would probably be doing the same today but for the surprising sequence of events of the past three months. I was well pleased when I was asked to come back as a scout. To be appointed assistant manager was a surprise, and to find myself manager was amazing.

I always felt I would come back to Luton one day, but could never have guessed how things would turn out. The job to be done is a real challenge, but hopefully we have laid foundations to give us a happy new year. The main concern is to get some sort of consistency in results. Since my first game, the record reads win, lose, win, lose, draw, lose, win, lose and win. Not bad – but nowhere near good enough if we are to make up the leeway between us and safety.

I am confident it can be done, and am working to get the squad I want, with some players leaving the club shortly to make way for new ones, starting with a target men striker.

Defensively, we have been giving away too many goals, some of them from suicidal decisions and actions. Offensively, we have not taken enough of our chances.

Both points were underlined in our two holiday games so far. At Reading we were not as bad as 4-1 sounds, but results don't lie. We did not capitalise on a bright start, when we were the better attacking side, and paid heavily for sloppy defending against a pair of strikers who cost £1million. Equally worrying was our lack of mental strength and the failure to push on after getting back into

the game when we pulled a goal back. You know you will have spells when you will come under pressure, and it needs a fierce determination to keep the opposition out. "Over my dead body," should be the motto.

Against Peterborough we got the points we deserved, but made very hard work of it. I was delighted with the early goals I asked for, but then very upset when we didn't go on to finish them off in the first 30 minutes or so, when we were looking very bright. Again, more determination in taking chances was needed, and after a silly penalty raised Peterborough spirits for the last half hour, we so nearly threw it away. In the end I was pleased with the team for getting a win we desperately needed, but it should have been more comprehensive and more comfortable.

A look at the league table shows the task ahead. We need to win every one of our remaining home games, but we know that won't happen – even Manchester United can't do that this season! But we have got to win most of them, and pick up points away as well.

The sequence of results so far is a start, but it has got to be turned into something like win, win, draw, win, win, draw... and so on!

It is possible for us to move out of the bottom two this afternoon, and to do that by beating Wigan would be a real confidence booster. I was a boy here when Bruce Rioch was a big star, and it is a pleasure to welcome him back to Kenilworth Road.

I am surprised that Wigan are still in this division after the money they have spent on players. Like all the best teams they have a good front pairing in Simon Haworth and Andy Liddell, a £950,000 investment designed to gain Wigan promotion. I think they might achieve their objective this season. Ours first aim may be more limited, but more important to Luton Town.

Whatever is in store in 2001, I do not intend to be manager of a relegated club. The town and supporters deserve better than that, and I promise we will put every possible ounce of effort into making it a happy new year for all of us.

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

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Captain's Log

Tuesday it was Peterborough's turn to suffer, and while the result looks close, I think we were much the better team.

I sat with the nerves tingling a little as I watched us get the three points we needed against Peterborough. I am sidelined again with a neck injury which refuses to go away, and I would have loved to be in the team instead of being a spectator.

You get a different view from the stand, and I understood the manager's viewpoint afterwards, with some criticism as well as praise, despite the result. There was a possibility - and no more - that we could have been deprived of two points after putting in so much effort to get all three.

The early goals were just what we needed, and after 20 minutes or so I felt comfortable and confident that we would win. I also heard supporters worrying after we let Peterborough nick a goal just before the break. The day we let Wrexham overturn a three-goal lead is still painfully fresh in the memory, but to be fair I thought they were a better team than we allowed Peterborough to be. Against Wrexham we were second best over the 90 minutes, but that was certainly not the case on Tuesday.

Sure, I was on the edge of my seat for the closing stages, after it went to 3-2, but I agree with Peterborough's manager that overall we deserved the points.

We might easily have gone 4-2 up to finish it off, and I felt for Andrew Fotiadis, who did so much excellent work without getting the goals he deserved. I like the way he is playing at present, and the way he makes chances it can only be a matter of time before the goals go in for him. When a striker is having a blank run it is easy to take the easy way out and hide during games, but Foti is not like that, and all credit to him.

Both teams were under strength because of injuries, but as you might guess I have taken a little stick from the lads who enjoy winning while I am ruled out! I don't mind that, because like the rest of us I desperately want to see us get out of trouble.

We have played some decent football in spells in recent games, but have suffered for not producing it over the whole 90 minutes of games. On

Tuesday it was Peterborough's turn to suffer, and while the result looks close, I think we were much the better team.

We face a similar challenge this afternoon, and we do not need telling that we must play well to have a chance of beating Wigan. It will be nice for Bruce Rioch to come back as a manager, and I don't doubt he will have his team all fired up as they come into the game just one point off the top two.

I suspect Wigan fans will look at our home record and fancy their chances. We too need to look at those statistics and remind ourselves how important it is for us to continue where we left off on Boxing Day to put another improvement on our Kenilworth Road sequence. We must also be mindful that we must play well, at a good tempo, for all of the game. Hopefully, if we get a good early start again, we can do the job, and I will be shouting my head off from the stands.



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Treatment Room

Bruce Sewell

THERE IS a mixture of news from the treatment room today, with some players close to full fitness again, but others facing a period out of competitive football.

We picked up three injuries at Reading, resulting in the team against Peterborough being denied the services of Marvin Johnson, Paul McLaren and Liam George, and I very much doubt if any of them will be close to a return today.

Johnson suffered what seems to be a recurrence of his neck injury, and was due to have another scan yesterday. That follows a scan a week or two ago, and when we get the results it will show us whether his condition has deteriorated. The injury is a prolapsed disc near his neck, which affects his shoulder. Until we have more information we have decided that he should do no training, purely as a precaution, and the scan results might also enable us to give the player a forecast of how long he will be under treatment before he plays again. He has little or no chance of being considered for today's game.

Liam George is also unlikely to figure in the team after being unlucky with injuries to his right thigh. There are two areas causing him pain, at least one of which was caused by a kick. The second area of bruising was caused at Reading, where he had to be substituted, and for some days he was unable to run properly. He is coming on well, and doing rehabilitation work, but might well need more time to regain full fitness.

Paul McLaren is another who has had a scan, and at the time of writing results were awaited to assess the seriousness of his knee injury. It looks like a slight rupture or tear in a ligament, potentially tricky to diagnose. We can be more positive about the required treatment when the scan results are to hand, but he knows that it is possible he will be on the

injured list for a week or two, maybe more. There is better news of Julian Watts, whose hamstring injury kept him out of the team at Reading and on Boxing Day. It is clearing up, although when he trained the day before the Reading game he felt some soreness, and had to ease off. However, he was going well this week, and I was able to put him through his paces on a five-mile run - on the treadmill in the gym, which was somewhat more comfortable than if we had sent him out across Dallow hills! I was expecting him to join in a full training session yesterday, and he might have a chance of being available for selection today.

Peter Thomson is also getting close, and is now able to run without pain after treatment for his foot injury, while Stuart Douglas is also doing very well after his troublesome hamstring problems.

He is a model professional in the way he has coped with the injury and treatment requirements, and is very keen to be involved again as soon as possible. You might have noticed that on Boxing Day he went out with the rest of the players before kick-off to warm up for a game he was not playing in. His target is to return with the reserves at Norwich on Thursday, and if he gets through that without adverse reaction he could well be in with a chance of being involved in the cup-tie against QPR next Saturday.

A bit of illness struck the camp in midweek, after the Peterborough match, with Stuart Fraser and Emmerson Boyce both feeling unwell the day afterwards. It was a flu-type bug that affected Fraser, while Boyce has had some difficulty with his breathing after cauterisation to cure a tendency to suffer nosebleeds. The club doctor has had a good look at them both, and the verdict is that they are minor problems, and nothing to worry about.

Century Club's Gift



WHEN Clive Goodyear signed off as physio last month, he made a point of mentioning in his last matchday magazine column the generosity he and the club receive from fans. Specialist equipment for the treatment room is expensive, and continually in need of updating as modern developments see ever-improving medical gear comes into service. Our picture illustrates the point. It was taken in the Century Club, and the piece of equipment on show is the latest to be bought by our supporters there for the physio's room. It is called an interferential, for pain relief. It costs several thousand pounds, and the Century Club, who meet on matchdays underneath the main stand, raised the money for it.

They hold raffles and other fund-raising exercises throughout the season, and donate the proceeds to the club. On this occasion they asked Clive what he needed within their budget, and then delivered. New physio Bruce Sewell and the Town players are now feeling the benefit.

The Century Club has been going strong for over 20 years, born out of the old vice-presidents club set up by Harry Haslam as one of the ways of staving off bankruptcy in 1975.

It became the Century Club when it offered membership to 100 fans, for £100 a year. Those were the days! Inflation over 25 years has seen the subs rise on a par with match tickets, and the old idea of 100 members has had to be pared down a little because of modern health and safety requirements.

But membership offers a top quality way to enjoy supporting the Town, with car parking, free programmes, the club's own private bar, refreshments, and good seats in the main stand.

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

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

NO 13 - DEREK STILLIE - GOALKEEPER

Scottish goalkeeper who signed from Aberdeen at the start of the 1999-2000 season. Made 18 appearances last season and produced some quality displays notably in the two play off matches against Millwall that were enough to earn him a new improved contract at the start of this season.

NO 5 - STUART BALMER - DEFENDER

A £200,000 capture from Charlton Athletic in September 98, Falkirk born Stuart made over 200 appearances at the Valley and helped the London Club gain promotion to the Premier League. He is a consistently solid performer at the heart of the defence.

NO 2 - CARL BRADSHAW - DEFENDER

As captain in 1999 he lifted the Auto Windscreens Shield at Wembley. Carl is a very

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versatile player who signed for the club in October 97. Previous Clubs include Norwich City and both the Sheffield Clubs. His favoured position is right back though he can play in midfield, and famously played in goal for 35 minutes when Roy Carroll was stretchered off against Wycombe a game which Wigan went on to win.

NO 6 - ARJAN DE ZEEUW - DEFENDER

Experienced Dutch Centre Half who joined the club in July 99 from Barnsley. He helped them to promotion to the Premier League where he remained a regular in the starting line-up. Scored three goals last season and was controversially denied a fourth at Wembley when his goal bound header crossed the line but was not allowed. Won the players' player of the year award last season and is the current team captain.

NO17 - HUGH DICKSON - DEFENDER

Promising young Irish centre back who joined the Club in August 2000 after impressing with his displays for Glentoran last season, where he played in the Irish Cup Final.

NO14 - SCOTT GREEN - DEFENDER

Scott signed for Wigan in June 1997 from nearby Bolton Wanderers for a £300,000 fee and went on to score on his Wigan Athletic league debut. A versatile performer he has played at right back, right wing back, central defence centre forward and midfield. He signed a new three-year contract in July 2000.

NO15 - GARETH GRIFFITHS - DEFENDER

Signed from Port Vale in the summer of 98 on a free transfer under the Bosman ruling. A tall Central Defender he will always give 100% for the cause. Scored with a bullet header recently against Rotherham.

NO4 - PAT MCGIBBON - DEFENDER

Pat is a Northern Ireland International who signed from Manchester United in July 1997 in a deal that finally cost Wigan £380,000. Famously scored the goal against Colchester in 1997 that secured Wigan's promotion to Division Two, and got the last ever League goal at Springfield Park.. Signed a new two-year deal in July 2000.

NO 28 - FRANCIS MCMAHON - DEFENDER

Left sided first year professional from Rainhill who has yet to make a senior first team appearance.

NO 24 - PAUL MITCHELL - DEFENDER

Manchester born Paul is a first year professional who made his debut as a substitute in the A.W.S win over Burnley in December 1999.. He is a good footballing centre half who looks to have a bright future in the game.

NO 11 - GINO PADULA - DEFENDER

The Argentinean born left back was signed in July 2000 on a free transfer under the Bosman ruling. Played in Division One last season with Walsall and won the Saddlers player of the year award.

NO 3 - KEVIN SHARP - DEFENDER

Signed from Leeds United in November 95 for a then record £100,000. Canadian born Kevin is the regular choice at left back having made over 160 appearances for the club.

NO 19 - STEFAN BIDSTRUP - MIDFIELDER

Danish Midfielder who signed from Lyngby in November 2000 for an undisclosed fee. Stefan has a tremendous work-rate in the centre of the park and scored on his first start for Latics in the FA Cup victory over Dorchester Town.

NO 18 - IAN KILFORD - MIDFIELDER

Bristol born Ian came to Wigan from Nottingham Forest in 1993 and is the clubs longest serving player. A tireless worker, he signed a new two-year deal at the start of this season, he is a pacey player with an eye for a goal who can play in a variety of positions, preferring central midfield.



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**NO 16 - ROBERTO MARTINEZ - MIDFIELDER**

Signed from Spanish Second Division side CF Balaguer in 1995, Roberto was Latics top scorer in his first season in England with thirteen goals. Twice named in the PFA Division Three team he is the only one of Wigan's three amigos still at the club.

NO 21 - BRIAN MCLAUGHLIN - MIDFIELDER


Scottish left winger who signed on a free transfer from Dundee United in the summer of 1999. Spent most of his career with Glasgow Celtic and was unable to break into the Latics first team last term. This season he has been a regular in the starting line up.

NO 34 - ALAN MCLoughlin - MIDFIELDER

Irish International midfielder who signed from Portsmouth for a fee of £260,000 in December 99. Scored after just 52 seconds of his third game for Latics in the 2-0 victory over Gillingham.

NO 23 - ANDREW MORRIS - MIDFIELDER

First year professional who made his debut as a substitute in the AutoWindscreens Shield win over Burnley last term. During extra time he scored the winning golden goal to cap a tremendous night for him.

**NO 8 - KEVIN NICHOLLS - MIDFIELDER**

Promising young midfielder signed in June 99 from Charlton Athletic in a deal which could net the addicks up to £600,000. Kevin captained the England Under 18's side and came through the ranks at the Valley.

NO 32 - NEIL REDFEARN - MIDFIELDER

The much-travelled midfielder signed for Latics in March 2000 from Premiership side Bradford City. Made an impressive start to his Wigan career with six goals in his first ten games.

NO 22 - DARREN SHERIDAN - MIDFIELDER

Combative central midfielder whom Director of Football John Benson when at Barnsley originally signed from non-league Winsford United. Spent his whole professional league career with the Tykes making over twenty appearances in the Premier League before joining Wigan in July 99. Scored the goal against Millwall that took Wigan to the play-off final, one of three last season.

NO 10 - LEE ASHCROFT - FORWARD

The former Preston North End and West Bromwich Albion striker signed from Grimsby Town just before the start of this season. Scored twice at Brentford recently.

**NO 9 - SIMON HAWORTH - FORWARD**

At £600,000 Simon is the club's record signing arriving from Coventry in October 98. Capped 5 times for the full Welsh squad, he also became a regular in the U21 team. Started his career with Cardiff City for whom he once scored the winner against Wigan. Scored Latics first ever goal at the JJB Stadium, and followed this up with the first ever hat-trick at the Stadium against Colchester this season. 19 goals last term.

NO 7 - ANDY LIDDELL - FORWARD

Hard-working striker signed from Barnsley for a bargain £375,000 in October 1998. Spent his whole career at Oakwell and was part of the side that took Barnsley to the Premier League. Won 11 Scottish U21 caps, his father Gary was a professional with Grimsby Town in the 1970's. Andy won the 1999-2000 player of the year award, voted for by the fans.

NO 12 - NEIL ROBERTS - FORWARD

Latics first signing of the millennium came on February 18th 2000 when Neil signed in a

£450,000 deal from Wrexham. Capped for Wales at U21 and Full level, Neil is an exciting young prospect who netted his first for Latics at Bournemouth on the final day of last season.





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
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

Blast from the Past

Roger Wash

Good start leads to record win

Many changes took part at Kenilworth Road during the summer of 1933 for, despite having reached the F.A. Cup quarter-finals for the first time in their history the previous season, a fairly low Division Three placing had caused much rumbling of discontent behind the scenes.

With crowds dipping to just over 2,000 something had to be done and following a lively Annual General Meeting a complete re-shuffle of the board took place with Charles Jeyes replacing Ernest Gibbs as Chairman and two directors leaving with two new faces being drafted in.

The new Chairman's first duty was to warn manager Harold Wightman that another poor league showing would not be tolerated.

Wightman took on board this threat to his position and decided on a major cull of his playing staff retaining only ten from the previous campaign. He then decided that the new recruits on the playing side should be experienced with the majority of his new signings having played in the top flight at some time in their career.

George Martin, who had played alongside Dixie Dean at Everton, and who was later to manage the Hatters on two occasions was the most famous of the new signings but Bill Pease from Middlesbrough had played for England a few seasons before.

The new season kicked off with a game at near neighbours Northampton, with the Town running out victors away from home for the first time since the previous Boxing Day. The 3-2 win was a personal triumph for centre-forward, Tom Tait, who bagged all three Luton goals to add to the 43 he had already scored in the clubs colours in only 69 starts since signing from Bolton two years previously.

The first home game came two days later on Bank Holiday Monday with relegated Charlton the visitors. A crowd of 11,904 turned out to see Tait on target again in a 2-1 victory, with that other prolific marksman, Andy Rennie, net-

ting the other. This game marked the return to the side of full-back Tom Mackey who, after reporting for pre-season training, returned home to apparently join the Police Force! The supposed internal dispute was eventually sorted out, thus enabling Mackey to resume his illustrious Town career which continued in a coaching capacity once his playing days were over.

The second home game of the season, played on a Saturday, was to prove an attendance barometer as far as the directors were concerned. They were more than pleased when 10,745 filed through the turnstiles to see if the good start could be maintained at the expense of Torquay United.

The supporters were disappointed to hear that Tait had suffered a leg injury during training and was unable to play. His place was taken by Tom Bell whose first professional club was Torquay. Coincidentally, Torquay included Albert Hutchinson who started his career with the Hatters.

The game began very evenly with both sides having difficulty in controlling the bouncing ball, but gradually the Town got on top and it came as no real surprise when Rennie opened the scoring after 20 minutes with a tap-in, following unselfish play by Bell.

The Hatters were denied a penalty ten minutes later when Torquay's Don Welsh blatantly handled a shot from Martin but soon after Rennie was on the spot to hit home number two after a strike from Bell rebounded off the bar.

The rest of the half was all Luton, with the unlucky Bell heading against a post and shots from Rennie and skipper Fred Kean being brilliantly saved by Percy Maggs in the Torquay goal.

The Torquay players came out for the second half determined to play with a vengeance, having had a good talking to during the interval. They soon reduced the arrears when Welsh

scored direct from a free kick after Martin had upended George Stabb on the edge of the box. For a time, Torquay had the upper hand, but when Welsh punched away a cross from Martin in the area, the referee was alive to the offence this time, and Kean made no mistake from the resultant penalty.

It was now the Town's turn to force the issue and soon after, Bell got the goal his unselfish play deserved, when he headed home a cross from Pease. Two minutes later, George Pearson set up a simple chance for Rennie and, straight from the restart, Bell took the ball past two defenders and the goalkeeper to literally walk it into the net. This devastating spell of play had therefore resulted in four goals in only five minutes.

The Hatters were now rampant and five minutes later Martin, despite being fouled by Torquay's Lew Tapp, managed to get his shot in as Maggs advanced for goal number seven and the same player cleverly backheeled number eight after a hard cross from Pearson had rebounded off a defender.

Despite all the heavy pressure, Torquay still tried to make a game of it and managed to break upfield and, with the Luton defence scattered, Hutchinson headed home a long cross to reduce the deficit a shade. The Hatters were soon back on top, however, and with the final minutes ticking away Pease scored the goal his good play deserved before Rennie knocked in his fourth and the Town's tenth.

This amazing 10-2 win was obviously a record for the Town at the time and everyone thought it would stand forever but the exploits of a certain Joe Payne, a couple of years later, knocked that on the head. But that is another story!



THIS time of year is a busy period for footballers and supporters. Take, for instance, 80 years ago, in Luton's first season in the Third Division, when they were in action four times in eight days. Clubs played on Christmas Day, with the return fixture against the same opposition taking place on Boxing Day. However, in 1920 Boxing Day fell on a Sunday, so the away match with Southampton had to wait until the Monday. The Town then had home games with Gillingham and Bristol Rovers on the Tuesday and the following Saturday, New Year's Day.

Many of the men who turned out for the Hatters over this hectic period were featured on a mammoth series of miniature photos which were issued with Godfrey Phillips's Pinnace brand of cigarettes. Among them were Ernie Simms, Louis Bookman and Allan Mathieson, who all figured in the following October's Ireland v England international, plus Luton's captain, Alf Tirrell, who was on card No. 763.

He was born in Desborough, Northants, on February 7, 1894, and joined Desborough Town at the start of the 1911-12 season. He moved to Peterborough a few months later, and in the following year he signed for West Ham, who were then, like Luton, in the Southern League.

He had to wait until 1914 to make his senior debut for the Hammers, but in the 1914-15 season the tall well-built full-back made half a dozen more appearances before the First World War interrupted his career.

Tirrell came to Kenilworth Road just before the 1920-21 season, when the Southern League's First Division was accepted en bloc into the Football League. He was probably glad to miss the Town's opening fixture - a 9-1 drubbing at Swindon. He was in at left back two days later in

a 2-2 home draw with Portsmouth, and was soon appointed captain. Like most full-backs of that era he was powerfully-built, weighing over 13 stone, and possessed a hefty kick, often put to good use with free kicks, from which he scored several important goals.

Luton's form was reasonable up to Christmas, when they had won eight of their 18 league games. Christmas and Boxing Day brought two 1-1 draws with Southampton before Gillingham were thumped 5-0 at Kenilworth Road.

Mathieson and Harry Higginbotham each scored twice, with locally-born Sid Hoar getting the other goal. All three can be found in the Pinnace series, on cards numbered 1110, 767 and 766 respectively. Unfortunately the Town did not start the New Year in the same vein, as Bristol Rovers won 2-1 at Kenilworth Road on January 1.

Tirrell then led the side to what is today's equivalent of the fifth round of the FA Cup. After beating Second Division sides Rotherham County, Birmingham and South Shields, Luton went out 3-2 in February to high-flying Preston in front of a then record Kenilworth

Road crowd of 17,754. Over the next few seasons Tirrell maintained his consistent form, and was regarded as one of the cleanest and most sporting defenders in the Third Division. He was eventually forced to retire following an injury received at Portsmouth in September 1923, after 130 first team outings. In total there are 20 Luton players featured in this series of 2,462 subjects. Some of these can also be found in larger-size format, but these command far more than the £1 to £2 which is the current catalogue price for the miniature versions.

Boss flies the Vauxhall flag

MANAGER Lil Fuccillo has put a little business the way of Vauxhall Motors to show his support for the car company workers whose jobs are under threat. We had to appreciate how lucky and privileged we were, because at the Vauxhall factory we saw men working so much harder than we ever did as footballers.

"The memory has stayed with me for ever. I suppose conditions are a lot better now than they were all those years ago, but I cannot help but admire those workers who turn out cars in Luton.

"I would like to think that by buying a Vectra I have done just a little bit towards showing those workers my thoughts for them. But the decision was not just sentiment - the Vectra is a very good car, and I'm very pleased with it."



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

Luton Town 3 Peterborough 2 (HT 2-1)

NEITHER manager was too impressed by his team's efforts as the biggest crowd of the season enjoyed a cracking Boxing Day contest, with a nerve-tangling finale threatening to reduce Town fans to gibbering wrecks in the closing stages as we worried that precious points might be snatched away.

On chances created, especially in a scintillating first half-hour, the Town were worthy winners, and Barry Fry had no complaints about that.

"I am sure it was terrific entertainment for neutrals, if there were any," he said. "But I am totally disappointed with many of my players and with the three goals conceded. We were awful in the first 30 minutes - Luton slaughtered us. "We should have got back into it after scoring just before the interval, although Farrell's goal was lucky - it went through a defender's legs and unsighted the goalkeeper.

"Our last 20 minutes was OK but the game is over 90 minutes, and you can't give anyone a two-goal start. On the day Luton wanted it more than us. By the time we woke up and had a go it was too late."

Town fans know better than that, having seen a three-goal start blown away at Kenilworth Road by Wrexham, and Lil Fuccillo has not forgotten it, either.

"I was very annoyed with them at half-time," he said. "If we had got five goals it would have been a fair, but I didn't enjoy the first half because we took our foot off the pedal with 15 minutes to go and gave away a silly goal.

"At half time they got the biggest rollicking a team could have. Then we scored at a great time to go 3-1 up, and we had three great chances to finish it off. But no, Luton Town like to make a game of it, and put themselves and the fans under pressure. We did things you wouldn't expect professional footballers to do."

There were no complaints about the ref's penalty award against Nathan Abbey which gifted Peterborough their second goal to set up a nerve-jangling last 28 minutes. The boss was relieved that a ref who dished out eight yellow cards settled for that colour for Abbey, when it might have been red. The goalkeeper claimed that he did not make contact with Howard Forinton, but Fuccillo said even if he did not, he had made a wrong decision in charging out to the corner of his area to make the challenge.

And the boss's final words were of praise. "Our goals were great goals. The first half hour was good, and if we had a target man we would have scored more. Once the opposition scores self-doubt sets in but my last words to them were to say well done because we need results, no matter how we get them."

Posh goalkeeper Mark Tyler prevented the Town going five up in the first 25 minutes, after being beaten by Matthew Spring and Peter Holmes in the first 13. Holmes was in the side as an extra midfielder in place of injured Liam George, with Stuart Fraser deputising for Marvin Johnson and Adam Locke for Paul McLaren. Holmes enjoyed a day to remember, making the opening goal and then netting his first-ever in the League.

Emmerson Boyce was rewarded for his efforts early in the second half to make it 3-1, and Andrew Fotiadis might have had a hat-trick either side of the penalty which gave Peterborough the incentive to pile on pressure in the closing stages. And five minutes of stoppage time piled on the agony for us before a huge roar greeted the welcome final whistle.
