Forward

TOWN manager Lil Fuccillo was anxiously waiting yesterday for news of strikers Liam George and Stuart Douglas after their planned appearances for the reserves at Norwich on Thursday evening to prove that they are fit again after injury.

If they are it will be welcome good news after a rash of injuries hit the club this week - see the physio's report on page 8 today. While he hoped to be able to consider Douglas and George for recalls to the squad, the manager knew that he would be without two defensive stalwarts, Marvin Johnson and Julian Watts, and it looks as though 18-year-old Jude Stirling will get the chance he craves to prove himself at senior level by making his FA Cup debut.

Despite giving away a couple of penalties for handball, Stirling has done a job when called on, and his manager believes he is ready for today's challenge.

Paul McLaren, Emmerson Boyce, Mark Stein and Peter Thomson were all ruled out, which added to the pressure on the boss to find reinforcements for his squad.

He very nearly signed an experienced defender this week, but pulled out of the deal with a mixture of shock and dismay, complaining about "nonsense" wages. "The player is over 30, with a middling First Division club, and surplus to their requirements. He is very unlikely to get back into their league squad, and the manager said I could have him on loan. I then discovered that his wages, for playing reserve team football, are £5,500 per week. It's utter nonsense! A realistic figure would be £1,500 a week at most. As a loan signing he has the right to safeguard his salary, but I was certainly not going to pay out that sort of money, so the deal was off."

Also off, for the time being at least, is a move to bring in Aston Villa striker Richard Walker. Villa are not ready to release him yet, and even if they are the Town are likely to face competition for his services, on loan or for a permanent move. "I just don't know what the prospects will be on that one," said the boss.

He has also been talking to a Premiership club about one of their fringe players who is getting frustrated at failing to make the breakthrough to first team football.

Word is that he and his manager are talking about his future, and the Town manager said: "I think he might be on the market in a week or two, probably at a price between £150,000 and £200,000. If that is so, I would be interested, but once again there might be a problem with his wages.

"I am determined that we should maintain a sensible wages policy in this club. It's a matter of good housekeeping, and living within our means. I have been told that money is available for players, but I am determined to spend it wisely."

Up to six players could be leaving soon, to reduce the wages bill, but in

all cases they are men under contract, so it will be a case of negotiating their terms of release. Having got that job done, said the manager, he expects to have a little more freedom to bring in new players. He is also demanding greater enthusiasm from some already here, with an implied criticism that some cry off matches for not very good reasons.

"It's not until you finish playing that you realise how lucky you are to be a footballer," said the ex-player turned manager. "I know what it is like to suffer broken legs, but I am sure that I was keener to play when I had less serious injuries than some are nowadays.

"We have a big job to do, and if we all pull together we can achieve our ambition, with our Second Division status safeguarded. But it will mean that sometimes men must be prepared to play through pain for the good of the club.

"I wish everyone was like Stuart Douglas - he has been champing at the bit, desperate to get back, since the first day he was injured. We need that sort of determination from everybody, and anyone not prepared to give it will not last long.

"We are in a transitional period, and some players here are not good enough. I don't think we have enough genuine first-teamers. But at least it means that players get a chance here at Luton, and it is up to them to take it."

AFTER the holiday disappointments in the league the FA Cup

gives us a distraction today, and I hope it will be a welcome one. We have done well in the cup so far, but I would gladly swap those results for league points, because safeguarding our status is the number one priority. The formbook says we don't have much chance this afternoon, against opposition from a division higher than ourselves, but we can go into the game in a relaxed frame of mind, which should help us. I also think we are capable of winning – but only if we are at the top of our form, and able to produce it for just about every one of the 90 minutes, instead of in shorter spells, which has been one of our problems this season.

I am afraid that in our final game of the year at Kenilworth Road we were second best to Wigan, who showed why they are favourites for promotion.

They did a very good professional job, while we did not show enough against a team who always looked stronger. Wigan have invested heavily to try to achieve their ambition, and if you looked at the two benches that told you something about the gulf between the clubs: their subs have attracted around £3million in transfer fees. Ours, by comparison, were one veteran striker and four with very little Football League experience.

The game underlined our need for a target man – Simon Haworth showed why Wigan paid £800,000 for him, and I suspect if he had been on our side instead of theirs we would have won the game. My search for an extra striker continues!

On the day, I thought Wigan looked a division higher than us, and it was no disgrace to lose to them. But it was hugely disappointing as we missed the chance of giving ourselves the boost of moving out of the bottom two.

It was more disappointing to pass up another chance to do that at Bournemouth. We got it right tactically at Dean Court, but our inexperience was painfully obvious, conceding a free kick and then a penalty, and conceding a decisive late

goal from a corner which should have been cleared.

I was unhappy about their first goal, with the fourth official not allowing us to get our sub on quickly when it was obvious Julian Watts was not going to play any further part in the game. Perhaps it was significant that Bournemouth's big target man, Steve Fletcher, should get the goal. Nevertheless, we showed good spirit and attitude to hit back, and we had enough chances to win the game. We should have well and truly plucked the Cherries after hitting them with the rapid two-goal burst just before the interval. Bournemouth were on the rack at that stage, and we should have scored at least once more, perhaps twice. We ought to have been more ruthless.

We didn't want the half-time whistle to blow, and it was very disappointing to concede late goals and come home with nothing. Bournemouth pinned us back a bit in the second half, but we ought to have been able to deal with their long-ball game. Naive defending cost us at least one point.

It was another match in which we heard nice things said about the way we played our football, but what consolation is that when you are losing? I believe in the "Luton style" but even more I believe in putting out sides that can win games, and to be honest I would rather see us play badly and win.

Today we can forget about our league worries for a few hours, and it will be good to welcome back Iain Dowie and Tim Breacker. Like us QPR are not having the best of seasons, and they too have a chronic injury list.

We are looking forward to the game. I respect the quality within the Rangers side, but we want to win, for various reasons. A confidence booster would be very welcome, and entry into the fourth round could also bring in extra revenue, to give us a stronger hand in the transfer market. But what I most certainly do not want is a good cup run at the expense of league survival.

But there is a bit of magic about the FA Cup, and we would like to enjoy it a little longer yet.



Captain's Log

WITH no league points at stake this afternoon, I hope the

lads will go into the game feeling relaxed and free of all pressure, and who knows, perhaps we will cause a bit of an upset and go through into the next round of the cup.

I wish I could be playing, but I will have to settle for a seat in the stand again, because my neck injury is responding to treatment very slowly. At present I cannot even train fully, so I have to be patient. I have had my fair share of injuries over the years, but this one is all the more frustrating because I would dearly love to be out there on the park, doing my bit for the team.

After the victory over Peterborough I was hoping to see three more points in the bag from the Wigan game, but it wasn't to be, and on the day you could not begrudge Bruce Rioch's team their success. I felt we were a touch unlucky. We matched Wigan in many ways, except the one that matters most - we had plenty of the game, but they stuck away two chances.

They were a well-organised team and all their players looked confident and comfortable on the ball, which is the mark of a good side. I thought their first goal was top class, an expert volley by Simon Haworth.

I went home from the game feeling sorry for the lads, but also thinking that Wigan are near-certainties for promotion. We gave them a good game, but they had a little more quality and experience than we could muster, as they should after the money spent to bring their squad together.

There were different problems to be faced at Bournemouth, never one of our luckiest grounds, and it was a real choker to finish up with nothing after being in front at the interval.

It was another reminder that we have to stick at our jobs professionally for the whole 90 minutes. I still think that we are not doing that often enough - at our best we can take care of most teams in the Second Division, and the demand

for the rest of the season is that we play at our best more consistently, and for far longer in each match.

There are enough points to play for between now and May for us to move up the table, but we need to concentrate on our jobs, work hard, and give every ounce of effort possible.

I only wish I was able to play my part this afternoon, because I think this cup-tie is one we can win, despite the difference in status between us and QPR.

We have had some tremendous games against Rangers over the years, but today the pressure is on them rather than us. If they win, it will be no more than is expected of a First Division side playing Second Division opposition.


But anything can happen in a one-off cup game, and underdogs have been known to become top dogs for 90 minutes. I think we can win. I hope we do - I want the lads to keep the cup run going as long as possible so that I have a chance of getting fit again and having a taste of FA Cup action myself!

I hope to be meeting old friends, and will give a warm welcome to Iain Dowie, Tim Breacker and Gary Waddock. They have all had good careers, and gave Luton good service.

Iain Dowie is a perfect example of what can be achieved if you are determined enough, and prepared to work for what you want. He came to us as a non-league forward from Hendon, and when he first joined us we thought he was a rough diamond in football terms. He soon changed our minds - he was dedicated to his profession, grateful for the chance to be a full-time footballer, and worked on his game to such good effect that he won 49 caps for Northern Ireland. He is an example to all young players of what is possible if your attitude and application is right.

Ours will have to be this afternoon if we are to enjoy another cup success.

THE HOLIDAY brought very little rest for the medical staff, with the treatment room being busier this week than it has ever been since I was appointed.

But at least some of the news is encouraging, with Stuart Douglas and Liam George both on the verge of returning to fitness. At the time of writing, they were pencilled in for comeback games with the reserves at Norwich on Thursday, for some or all of that game, depending on how things went. Hopefully both were able to prove that they could be considered for this afternoon's game.

Both have worked hard to regain fitness, and Douglas has had the benefit of a full week's training, with George able to rejoin the first team squad sessions in midweek.

Stuart Fraser is all right after a scare at Bournemouth, when we decided to sub him after he felt a groin strain. The decision was a sensible precaution, and has paid off because he will be available for selection today.

Unfortunately Julian Watts will not make it this

afternoon. Before going to Bournemouth he had a knee injury after a collision with Mark Ovendale, but more serious was the hamstring pull he sustained at Dean Court. He and I both knew immediately what the problem was. I thought he might be doubtful for Monday's game, but he was determined to soldier on, and it was bad luck to pick up another injury. However, he is a quick healer and a hard worker, and while he will not be ready to play today, I hope he will not be out of action for too long.

Five other players have to suffer the frustration of being ruled out by injuries.

Marvin Johnson has seen a specialist about his neck problem, and is undergoing treatment for it, and I think it will be a couple of weeks or so before we can judge how long it will take him to return to training. He is doing some light work, but is banned from heading a ball. Emmerson Boyce has had cauterisation to get over a nosebleed difficulty, and a specialist thinks he is on the way back. He was looking much happier on Thursday, after that verdict, but will have to wait a week or two for final clearance to resume full training.

Mark Stein is suffering with a knee injury, and was having a scan on Thursday. When we get the results of that, and the specialist's report, we will have a better idea of how long he will be out.

Paul McLaren is also facing a spell on the inactive list, although he would have missed today's game anyway, through suspension. He has a small tear in a medial knee ligament and will be out of football for a few weeks, while we wait for the fibres to heal.

There was much better news for Peter Thomson, who has got over his foot injury, and was able to resume full training this week. The specialist's advice, which we always take, is that he needs a week or two to regain full fitness.

Fans pitch in

FOOTBALL took a hammering from the weather on the last playing day of the old year - but not at Kenilworth Road, thanks to the dedicated efforts of Town staff and supporters. About 40 fans answered the call to help ground staff shift a couple of inches of snow off the pitch on the morning of the game, and their hard work paid off because the match with Wigan was never in doubt.

The official pitch inspection 90 minutes before

kick-off turned out to be a formality, with referee Graham Laws full of praise for the work done to beat the frost, and delighted to find that the turf was soft enough to take a stud. Both managers and teams were well pleased with state of the pitch.

Good planning and preparation helped the Town buck the trend on a day when 26 of the 45-game scheduled Premiership and Nationwide League programme was frozen off, including a London derby at West Ham, where the pitch has undersoil heating.

Work to safeguard the Wigan match began the minute the final whistle blew after the Boxing Day game against Peterborough. Richard Bird and his team worked quickly to flatten the divots, roll the pitch, and then cover it with tarpaulins. The snow that was forecast duly arrived, but had a beneficial effect in adding to the covers' insulation of a surface which was clear of frost.

The fans answered the call to report with their shovels, put their backs into clearing the snow to the sides of the pitch, and when the covers were unrolled the surface was near-perfect.

The club expresses its very grateful thanks to all who helped. Without the efforts of our supporters, the game would probably have been called off.





On leaving the stadium, you will find some roads closed to pedestrians, to enable swift and unobstructed access for the emergency services. Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.





Dutch striker signed from SV Salzburg in November 1999 for £250,000. Made his debut when he came on as a substitute against Huddersfield Town in December 1999 and scored his first goal for Rangers in a 3-1 victory against Ipswich Town in April 2000.

GEORGE KULCSAR

DOB - 12/8/67

Although born in Hungary he was brought up in Australia and represented them in the 1983 World Youth Cup. He spent a period playing in Belgium for Royal Antwerp before joining Bradford City. Made his Rangers debut against his old side, Bradford, at Loftus Road in December 1997 and scored his first goal for the club on the final day of the 1998/99 season against Crystal Palace.

Richard made his first team debut in October 1998 when he appeared as a substitute against Swindon Town, he went on to score his first goal for Rangers on his home debut against Barnsley three days later. His confident displays in the mid-field made him a first team regular during 1999/2000 and he will be looking to build on his fast growing reputation this season.

TERRY MCFLYNN

STEVE MORROW

DOB - 2/7/70

Northern Ireland International signed in March 1997 from Arsenal for £500,000. Steve began his career in the youth ranks at Highbury and actually made his International debut before appearing in Arsenal's First Team when he came on as a substitute against Uruguay in May 1990 in Belfast. He made his League debut whilst on loan at Reading in January 1991 and spent further periods on loan at Watford, Reading (again) and Barnet before he returned to make his debut for Arsenal. Equally at home in defence or midfield. Scored on his debut for Rangers in a 1-2 defeat at Bolton in April 1997.

Made his debut for Rangers in November 1986 against Sheffield Wednesday at Loftus Road but less than a year later joined Gillingham for £40,000. Two years later he moved on to Bournemouth for £250,000 before Newcastle United snapped him up for £275,000 in November 1990. Gavin enjoyed

great success at St James Park as a striker, netting 47 times in 117 appearances before he returned to London to sign for Chelsea in a deal worth £1.25M in August 1993. Gavin returned to Loftus Road in December 1996.

MARK PERRY

DOB - 19/10/78

Former Trainee who signed professional on his seventeenth birthday. Made his debut for Rangers in September 1996 at Barnsley where he also scored the second goal in a 3-1 victory. Versatile defender who can also play in midfield. Broke into the side at right back towards the end of last season and looked comfortable and composed.

CHRIS PLUMMER

DOB - 12/10/76

Former Trainee who signed professional in July 1994. He made his debut for Rangers in the last match of the 1995/96 season as a second half substitute against Nottingham Forest. Chris represented the England Under 21 side on four occasions in the 1996 Toulon Tournament.

KARL READY

DOB - 14/8/72

Former Trainee who has now established himself as a first team regular after turning professional in August 1990 and making his league debut in October 1991. Karl has also represented Wales at Under 21, 'B' and full level, making his full debut for his country in February 1997 in a friendly international against the Republic of Ireland.

**MATTHEW ROSE**

DOB - 24/9/75

Signed from Arsenal in May 1997 for a fee of £500,000. Has been capped twice at England Under 21 level playing against Georgia in November 1996 and later Italy. He began his career at Crystal Palace where he signed professional in December 1993 after winning Republic of Ireland Schoolboy and Youth honours. Tony has since gone on to win eight caps for the Under 21 side. Made his Rangers debut in March 1998 at Stoke City.

**STUART WARDLEY**

DOB - 10/9/74

Signed from Saffron Walden for £15,000 in July 1999 after impressing during the club's pre-season tour of the West Country. Despite being signed as a central defender Stuart made an immediate impact on the team in midfield when he was introduced to the team in

September 2000. In only his second full appearance he scored twice against Port Vale, he then continued with his goalscoring exploits throughout the season, finally ending up with 14 goals to his credit. Voted the Club's Player of the Year for 1999/2000.

Striker signed from East Ham for an initial fee of £7,500 in March 1999. Made his Rangers debut in November 1999 when he came on as a substitute at Loftus Road in the 2-1 victory over Walsall.





Blast from the Past

Cup clashes with the Rangers

Today's match against Q.P.R. will be the ninth pairing of the two clubs in the F.A.Cup over the years, but amazingly the first four games took place in consecutive seasons between 1899 and 1903. Football League Division Two side Luton had comfortably accounted for Lowestoft and Watford in season 1899/00 before being drawn against Q.P.R. at home in the final qualifying round. It seemed a formality to see off Southern League Rangers but we were held to a 1-1 draw with Tommy McInnes saving our faces with a late equaliser.

In the replay, at Kensal Rise Athletic Ground, we were swamped 1-4 and it was perhaps this game that made us realise that the Southern League was not such a bad place to be with the improving quality of the clubs involved coupled with the shorter travelling distances.

In the event it was Southern League fare for the Town the following season, following the decision to move back amongst old friends, and in the midst of a disappointing campaign a good F.A.Cup run would have made a welcome break. After wins against Kings Lynn away 4-1 and the Civil Service at home 9-1 we were drawn against Q.P.R. in the fifth qualifying round.

This time a 3,500 Dunstable Road crowd saw us make no mistake as goals from Jack Durrant and James Dempsey gave the Town a comfortable 3-0 win. Our cup dreams did not last long, however, as Bristol Rovers knocked us out in the next round. The mind boggles as to how the Cup draw was made in those far off days as in season 1901/02 we were to meet Lowestoft, Watford and Q.P.R. again! Aspley Guise and Bedford Queens were hammered at home before narrow wins at Lowestoft and Watford saw us drawn at home to Q.P.R., again in the fifth qualifying round.

Durrant was on the mark again, ably assisted by John Brown as we ran out 2-0 victors. As in the previous campaign the win against Rangers effectively ended our cup run as we lost to Arsenal in the next round after a replay.

Season 1902/03 saw the Town again occupy a mid-table position and before the cup draw was

made bets were being taken as to whether we would be drawn against Q.P.R., Lowestoft or Watford. Those picking Watford were unlucky as we were drawn away to Q.P.R. in the third qualifying round, winning 3-0, and then beating Lowestoft 5-1 at Dunstable Road at the next stage with two rare Bob Hawkes goals setting us on our way.

We actually won through to the first round proper that season before losing 0-3 to old adversaries Millwall at the Den.

The balls and bag must have been changed that close season as it was not until 1929/30 that we met Q.P.R. again and on that occasion, despite two goals from Jimmy Yardley, we were beaten 2-3 at Kenilworth Road in our first cup outing of the season.

The next meeting came almost twenty years later in 1947/48 when the Town, by then a Division Two side, were paired to play at Loftus Road in a fifth round tie against Division Three (South) champions elect Rangers.

In the third round we had a difficult tie in travelling away to Plymouth but the 34,689 crowd were silenced by a fourth minute goal from Bobby Brennan. Plymouth equalised but a goal from Hugh Billington, just before, and another from Brennan, just after the interval, put the Town in an excellent position. Plymouth pulled a goal back but immediately afterwards Billington notched his second to earn us a comfortable win.

The Town squeezed through 3-2 at home to Coventry in the next round before a crowd of 23,982 and were then drawn to play at Loftus Road against a Rangers side riding on the crest of a wave.

The gates were closed at 1.30 on a then record crowd of 30,564 who saw Rangers win through in style 3-1 with goals from Billy McEwan, Danny Boxhall and Cyril Hatton. The Town's solitary reply was from future Ranger, Billy Waugh.

There was another long gap before the two sides again clashed in the competition but then, with memories going back to the turn of the century,

they were destined to meet in consecutive seasons. In 1986/87 the Town were drawn against League and F.A.Cup double holders Liverpool in the third round where, at a snowy Kenilworth Road, the two sides battled out a 0-0 draw. The replay had to be called off at the eleventh hour due to the Town's inability to get to Merseyside through the snowy wastes of the rest of the country.

When the game eventually took place the Town not only had to face the best team in the country but also a spiteful home crowd and a scornful press. That they managed to fight out another 0-0 draw after extra time showed tremendous fighting spirit with the reward a return to Kenilworth Road for a second replay, on the toss of a coin.

Two days after the first replay the teams did battle again but this time the Town made no mistake and hammered the Reds 3-0 to set up a fourth round tie against a patiently waiting Q.P.R. on the following Saturday.

As this was the Town's fourth game in eight days quite naturally tiredness had set in and in truth Rangers should have won the match at the first time of asking. They had to wait until seven minutes from time to make the breakthrough, however, after Rob Johnson fouled John Byrne in the box leaving Terry Fenwick to net from the spot.

Summoning up one last effort the Town managed an equaliser with only two minutes left after Mike Newell was upended by Gary Bannister leaving

Mick Harford to smash the ball home from the resultant penalty.

Both the Town and Rangers played on an artificial surface at the time with the Town always seeming to hold the upper hand. This proud record finally went at the tenth attempt when Rangers won through 2-1 in the replay. Goals from Fenwick and Byrne had secured a comfortable lead for the home side but after a Harford header reduced the arrears Rangers were made to suffer a jittery final half-hour.

The final game in the series took place at the fifth round stage in the following campaign. We were attempting to reach Wembley on three fronts (Simod Cup, Littlewoods Cup and F.A.Cup) and were full of confidence when making the short trip to Loftus Road.

A fierce volley from Warren Neill on the hour, however, knocked the Town back a peg or two but Harford, so often the saviour, headed the leveller to bring the tie back to Kenilworth Road.

The replay was a dour affair with Rangers sitting back in defence hoping for a goal on the break. The deadlock was broken after 58 minutes when Neill, under pressure from Harford lobbed his goalkeeper, David Seaman, for a peach of an own goal to add to the one that had gifted three league points to the Town at Kenilworth Road the previous season!



HISTORY is repeating itself today, because Luton and QPR were paired in the FA Cup in four consecutive seasons between 1899 and 1902, with the Town emerging victorious on the last three of those occasions.

Since then we have met 78 times in the Football League, which still makes Rangers our most frequent opponents in this competition.

Numerous players have turned out for both clubs, with the most expensive being Roy Wegerle, who went from Kenilworth Road to Loftus Road for £1million, then a record for both clubs, just over 11 years ago.

The South African-born striker was featured, along with the rest of the Town's first team squad, in the Sun's 1989/90 Soccer Sticker collection.

Wegerle was recruited by Ray Harford for a bargain fee of £75,000 from Chelsea in the summer of 1988, soon after Luton's Littlewoods Cup triumph. He was surplus to requirements at Stamford Bridge after making only eight starts for the Blues in a season which ended in their relegation from Division One, now the Premiership.

Born in Johannesburg in March 1964, Wegerle had a brief spell with Manchester United before going to the USA for a university education. He played for Tampa Bay Rowdies in the NASL before becoming a professional at Chelsea in the summer of 1986. He made a dozen league appearances in his first season, and by co-incidence his first goal was against QPR on New Year's Day, 1987. Despite his obvious skill and pace as a front runner, Wegerle failed to hold down a regular place in a struggling side the following season, and spent a period on loan at Swindon.

After arriving at Kenilworth Road he went straight into the Town team for the opening fixture of the new campaign, a 1-0 defeat at Sheffield Wednesday, but then found himself on the bench for the next few weeks.

However, after getting back into the side for the home draw with Arsenal in late October he enjoyed

a long run as first choice in the No. 8 shirt. A few fans were frustrated by his tendency to be over-elaborate, but the majority enjoyed his undoubtedly talent, which was best utilised with direct running at defences down the middle.

He scored some memorable goals, both in the run to the second consecutive Littlewoods Cup final, where he appeared in the defeat against Nottingham Forest, and also in Luton's successful fight against relegation.

Wegerle continued in the same vein the following season, and began to attract the attention of other clubs. When the bid from QPR was tabled Luton felt they could not afford to turn it down, and he went to Loftus Road after 57 first team appearances and 17 goals here.

He enjoyed two good years at Rangers, scoring 18 goals in the league in 1990/91, before linking up with Harford again at big-spending Blackburn Rovers in March 1992.


After just over a year at Ewood Park - six goals in 36 outings - it was on to Coventry City, where he ended his career in this country in 1995. The previous year he had been in the USA squad for the World Cup finals held in the States, having decided to throw in his lot with his adopted country when it came to

international football. He was also in the initial squad for the 1998 tournament in France, without getting to the finals. By then he was playing in the indoor leagues which were flourishing in the USA at the time. He also played for Tampa Bay Mutiny, and is now a soccer pundit on EFTN, the US equivalent of Sky Sports Television.

Wegerle and other Town stars from the 1989/90 season appearing in the Sun's collection can, in common with most other football stickers from this era, be easily obtained from dealers such as Matchday Cards, PO Box 8, Brigg, North Lincs, for just a few pence each.

Action Replay

Luton Town 0 Wigan Ath 2 (HT 0-1)

ONE of the best footballing sides we have seen at Kenilworth Road this season completed the double over the Town, to underline the difference between top and bottom of the Second Division. Anyone not knowing which team was which would soon have seen the difference, said Town boss Lil Fuccillo - "We have been beaten by the better side."

It was Bruce Rioch's second happy return to Kenilworth Road as a manager, having brought a Bolton team here to win 3-0 six years ago. He later took the Wanderers into the old First Division, and few would bet on the Wigan side he has organised so well winning promotion at the end of this season. The Town were a little unlucky to lose 2-1 at Wigan in August, but the final game of the year was a different matter. The visitors were fired up for the match - an unexpected Boxing Day defeat at Oldham had ended an 18-game unbeaten run, and Rioch was determined to start the next one rapidly. Wigan had an extra quality and power about them, and a vein of confidence from back to front which enabled them to become the eighth visiting team to go home with three points.

Perhaps it was a case of money talks. Transfer fees paid by Wigan for their squad at Kenilworth Road totalled nearly £2.4million, plus unknown sums in signing-on fees for five Bosmans.

Facing a team going strong for promotion, the Town fielded a squad in which only two players, Mark Ovendale and Peter Thomson, cost fees, totalling £525,000. Ironically Ovendale took the rap for Wigan's second goal, after displacing Nathan Abbey, who was blamed for giving away a penalty against Peterborough on Boxing Day.

Wigan came to Luton to do a job, and did it perfectly, concentrating on playing it tight at the back, and breaking out with speed and menace.

They rate striker Simon Haworth a bargain at £600,000 for his front line leadership and goal-scoring expertise, and he proved it at Kenilworth Road, netting after only ten minutes to give Wigan the opportunity to settle back and frustrate the Town with deep defence.

The Town rarely threatened to break through, with Lee Nogan's drive early in the second half forcing Derek Stillie into his only serious save of the game.

Once Stefan Bidstrup made it 2-0 after 54 minutes, the Town never looked like upsetting confident and well-drilled opposition. "It was no disgrace to lose to a team like that," said a disappointed Lil Fuccillo. "On the day the better team won. But it underlined what I have been saying about wanting a target man - Haworth had an excellent game, and in many ways that was the major difference between the sides."

Action Replay

AFC Bournemouth 3 Luton Town 2 (HT 1-2)

EFFORT, attitude and commitment all came in for praise by the manager after the Town were involved in a pulsating start to the new year at Dean Court. But Lil Fuccillo was most unhappy about an old failing that enabled the home side to snatch a victory that looked beyond them at half-time - the inability to deal with set pieces.

It was another of those days to prove that when you are struggling little things can tip the scales against you. For instance an injury to a key defender, leaving you down to ten men who concede a goal while the sub is still off the field, looking for his shirt.

When he does get on, the sub whose only league appearance so far ended with a handball, a red card, and a penalty goal, is done for hands again to present the opposition with a spot kick equaliser with eight minutes to go. And when a scramble develops after a corner, the ball drops not to a defender, but to an 18-year-old on a hot streak. From 2-1 up on 81 minutes, the Town were 3-2 down at 86, and to complete the misfortunes Matthew Taylor was sent off for swearing at the referee. "Three deadball situations have cost us dearly," said the Town boss. "But the lads worked their socks off. We scored two great goals, and had three or four other chances but did not put them away. Everyone did a proper job except for conceding goals from corners and a free kick."

Bournemouth were the form team, having won eight of their previous nine games, and thought they were on their way when they took the lead after 37 minutes through Steve Fletcher. Julian Watts was being helped away at the time, his game finished by a hamstring injury. Jude Stirling could not go on straight away because his shirt was still in the dressing room. Miraculously, the Town produced a purple patch just before the break. Taylor crossed for Andrew Fotiadis to head the equaliser, and Bournemouth were at panic stations as the Town hit a sustained spell of majestic attacking form. In the first of four minutes of stoppage time Adam Locke scored, and before the whistle brought relief for Bournemouth Peter Holmes, Matthew Spring and Fotiadis all brought good saves from Gareth Stewart.

The interval interrupted the flow, and afterwards the Town were pushed back as Bournemouth tried to blitz Mark Ovendale's goal. It was a bludgeon job, and while the Town dealt capably with the long-ball assault, with Lee Nogan playing a withdrawn role, the defensive clearances nearly always dropped to the opposition.

The Town boss thought his team would stand strong and defiant after Taylor's header brought another excellent save from Stewart.

But Stuart Fraser became another casualty, with a groin strain, allowing Friedrich Breitenfelder his fourth taste of league football.

He conceded a free kick on the edge of the box which led to handball by Stirling and an equalising penalty by Richard Hughes, and a winner from a corner enabled Jermain Defoe to claim a record - on loan from West Ham, he is the first man to score in eight consecutive matches for Bournemouth. Trust us to give the little bundle of energy his place in Dean Court history.


