Lottery Launch for Youths


The future of this club lies in its youth and in the youth development policy currently underway here at the County Ground.

Fun Lottery Launched

Swindon Town has joined forces with the Evening Advertiser to give you the chance of winning £10,000 in a new lottery launched today.

Hello and welcome to today's home league fixture against Luton Town, a crucial game for both sides and what should be an entertaining encounter.

To say that today's game is important would be stating the obvious, but then we have entered the stage of the season in which every game becomes a 'six-pointer'. Luton are in the bottom four, but under Joe Kinnear have strung three wins together in four games and so will be fairly confident coming into today's fixture.

I said to the lads before the Cambridge game that if we can beat sides that are around us, then we give ourselves every chance of pulling away before the end of the

season. By beating Cambridge, we have managed to drag Roy McFarland's side down into the mire and that can only be a good thing.

I always said that out of three, today's game and last Saturday's were perhaps a bit more important, only because they are against sides quite close to us in the league. However, that does not mean that I am not disappointed with Tuesday's draw against Bournemouth.

I believe that our side has got to the stage where we have set ourselves such high standards in which home draws just aren't acceptable. Since I took over the side, I have always said that my players are good enough to compete in the top half of this league, they just need to have

as much belief in themselves as I do in them. With the sequence of results that started with the 3-0 win against Bury, I believe that they really are starting to have confidence in their ability. If that is the case, then that is half the battle won in the club's fight to stay in the division.

However the form that got us the wins against Bury and Wycombe would appear to have deserted us in the last two games. We were very poor in the first half against Cambridge, but to play like that and get a result is encouraging. We improved in the second half and started to attack them, turn their defence round and use the pace of Michael Reddy and David Duke to our advantage.

That is something we have to really concentrate on again. Against Bournemouth on Tuesday night, we sometimes let them have too much space, too much time on the ball instead of having enough belief in ourselves to attack the opponents. I cannot be too harsh on the lads though, we have worked very hard to make ourselves a harder team to beat and it has shown in our recent run of five games unbeaten. The next step is to go on from there and turn these draws into victories because when you are down at the bottom, three points are your only aim, draws are no good.

Despite Tuesday night's draw, we have to be positive, at the end of the day we are playing better, we are looking like a side who can compete in this division, that is coherent and

solid as a unit. Just look at the last time we played Bournemouth, we lost 3-0 having crumbled under a bit of pressure and could have lost by nine. We are not doing that any more and it is refreshing to have that belief in the squad. Let's not forget that Bournemouth are a very good side. I haven't seen a defence pass the ball around like that this season and it is something we must strive for. We are capable of it and have shown that we are, but the long balls are starting to creep back into our play, the lads just need that bit of composure and belief.

All the talk about Tuesday's game was about Jermain Defoe and Michael Reddy. But when you build up a reputation for yourself like they have, you become a marked man and defenders rise to the occasion of

playing against you which is why it was important for Alexander to put in a cracking performance. Just look at the job Sol Davis did on Defoe, Sol was excellent, but then I would expect that of him because he is a superb man-marker. Matty Heywood did a great job on Steve Fletcher, one of the best target men in the league. May I extend a warm welcome to the directors, management team, players and supporters of Luton Town Football Club. I know that they will be up for this game because they can not afford to lose it. Let's get behind our lads and spur them on to what would be a magnificent victory for the club.

Enjoy the game and keep up your magnificent support.





A striker with excellent pace, Douglas was a 17-year-old trainee when he scored on his league debut for Luton against Oldham in 1995.

He looked set for more than fleeting instant stardom. He was hit by a series of injuries before he could establish himself, but determination overcame all difficulties, and he won a regular place in Luton's league side in the 1998/99 season, flourishing as a marksman and also a creator of chances for his front-line colleagues. Douglas is a persistent striker who can always be relied upon to show plenty of aggression. Will always chase balls and is a valuable member of the squad.




Liam George

Full of pace and nimble footwork, the striker came through the ranks after joining Luton as a schoolboy.



He became a regular member of the Republic of Ireland squad that progressed to the European youth championships final in the summer of 1998. George had made his league debut in September 1997, but suffered a broken leg soon afterwards. He returned in triumph, to complete his first full campaign in the league last season, in which he was Luton's leading scorer (with a total of 15, five of those scored in his first eight games) and also progressed to win Ireland under-21 honours. He is a tireless and gifted player who often twists and turns his opponents into mistakes.

1 Mark Ovendale



When Mike Watson Challis made more money available for Luton's manager, he moved swiftly to secure 26-year-old goalkeeper Ovendale from Bournemouth for a substantial fee. Previously with Wisbech, Northampton and Barry Town, he was immediately given the No. 1 shirt.


4 Matthew Spring

A competitive midfielder, Spring was a driving force in the Luton side which reached the FA Youth Cup semi-finals in 1997. Spring made his league debut at just 17 but he soon became a regular in Luton's Second Division team.

6 Marvin Johnson

Johnson is arguably the most popular member of the Kenilworth Road staff with his colleagues and with the fans. Always cheerful, the defender is in his 13th season as a first-team regular at Luton, his only club, and skipper of the team he joined as a schoolboy.

12 Adam Locke



The midfielder joined Luton on a free transfer from Bristol City to add experience to a predominantly young squad in the summer of 1999. He began as a schoolboy with local club Crystal Palace before moving on to Southend, Colchester and Bristol City.

7 Peter Thomson

Luton signed Thomson from Dutch club NAC Brada for a fee of £100,000 having scored several goals in the top flight. Started life at Bury but left Gigg Lane for neighbouring Chorley and then ambitious rivals Lancaster who received a huge return for the striker.

14 Andrew Fotiadis

Another local discovery, Fotiadis chose to stay at school to gain GCSE A-levels before becoming a full-time professional. He won England Schools caps at under-15 and under-18 level with his old-fashioned style, powerful, robust and with a good physique. A prospect for the future and popular among Luton's fans.

15 Matthew Taylor



Another youngster who came through as a result of Luton's financial restrictions. When Luton were in receivership in the summer of 1999, players had to be sold or given away to save money, therefore the club looked to players like Taylor who at 17, was given his chance and immediately settled to become a regular in the team.

17 Emmerson Boyce

One of the many to come through from Luton's schools and youth development programme, the defender was signed as a YTS schoolboy in the summer of 1995. Following his debut in the Auto Windscreens Shield in 1999, he made the breakthrough to the league squad last season.

30 Petri Helin

Ricky Hill had been tracking Helin for months before clinching his transfer, beating off competition from several other clubs. Helin had also captained his club, Jokerit of Helsinki to runners-up honours in the Finnish Premier League.

32 Lee Mansell



Was signed by Luton at the age of eleven before an injury crisis thrust the young midfielder into a dramatic debut FA Cup-tie and he was an instant success. He was just 58 seconds into his first professional game against Queens Park Rangers when he scored his first senior goal.

33 Richard Dryden

The defender answered the call from an old friend when Lil Fuccillo signed him on a free transfer from Southampton in February. Town fans will know all about Dryden's capabilities who spent a period of just under two months at the County Ground having played for Northampton earlier in the season.

39 Keith Rowland

Fuccillo tracked the former Northern Ireland international midfielder for several months before persuading him to move from Queens Park Rangers to Kenilworth Road on a three-month loan agreement which began on January 27 this year. Capped 18 times by his country, Rowland has added experience to a young squad.

But I digress, whatever happened to the days when we played God's game on pitches that weren't flat? Didn't it use to add to the game - in the same



wins. Against Bournemouth we didn't really have the chances. Gary Alexander and I worked our socks off all night, but we had to contend with a lot of high balls and although Gary did well to hold the ball up and flick others on, it is not the best way for us. Previously we had been passing the ball and getting the ball in from the wings but have stopped doing that so much recently. No doubt we will work at that and look to put it right today.

A series of articles by the Editor of **PROGRAMME MONTHLY & FOOTBALL COLLECTABLE** magazine, describing how programmes have changed over a century and a quarter of Association Football.

No. 22 Inserts and Supplements

Attempts at producing a syndicated football programme have arisen in many decades. In the inter-war years 'The National Football Programme' sold on matchdays, had rather more success with its Scottish version than south of the border where fans would have had better value for money from the excellent club programmes.

Surprising then that it took so long after the war to resurrect the idea and in 1965/66 Soccer Review first appeared as a supplement to 34 different clubs' programmes. This was quickly adopted by the Football League renamed 'Football League Review' and then 'League Football', running until December 1974 when the high cost of paper and improving standard of programmes made it non-commercial. Many clubs included the official mouthpiece of the League's headquarters. It's full colour finish, good, readable content and photographic coverage greatly enhanced many inadequate club issues. It was not universally popular, but it was certainly readable and its demise in 1974

meant that a number of laggard clubs had to look seriously at improving their previously neglected programme. Specialist printers began to enter the programme printing market in a big way in the early 1980's - displacing the longstanding local printers - and one of their selling points was the inclusion of syndicated inserts. They were free to clubs, provided the firms printed their programmes, with national advertising making them commercially viable. A number of clubs adopted them with relish, largely because they 'padded out' an otherwise inadequate issue. This fashion lasted barely three seasons as the third party publishers began to realise what had dawned on many before - there are no quick and easy 'bucks' in programme production. The most recent attempt was in the late 1990's and it is some surprise that it took so long for a competition sponsor to get involved in such a venture. 'Nationwide Review' lasted just over a season and was heavily supported by the Football League's sponsors. In contents and presentation, this was more a

throw-back to the old Football League Review days, but it was regarded as even more of an irrelevance by modern programme buyers. One suspects that the groundstaff swept up more copies on a Monday than were tucked away in programme collections. Every now and again, a new marketing manager will float the idea of a standard programme for a sponsored League or tournament. This brainwave founders on past experience and the fact that if programme collectors want to read articles about other clubs, they will buy a monthly or weekly magazine at the newsagents. In their match programme, they want to read about their club, and the fixture at hand.



If only Dave Mitchell was still here, then we could fill up our look-a-likes segment every week!

Such is the influence of Australian football these days that several club's now have at least one Aussie on their books, at Swindon we have Danny Invincible. But in the early 90's Australian football had not taken off on the world stage and so to see players like Craig Johnstone and David Mitchell was relatively rare.

An unorthodox centre forward, Mitchell started life as a professional with Glasgow Rangers before joining Feyenoord and Chelsea. It therefore came as a surprise when, having just completed a short loan spell with Newcastle, Mitchell joined Swindon from Stamford Bridge in August 1992. Mitchell, capped 17 times by his country caused many problems for

opposing defences with a combination of pace and power. Playing alongside a number of strike partners, Mitchell bagged 17 goals in the promotion season including the all important second against Tranmere at home in the Play-Offs that effectively killed them off. More famously, he scored a hat-trick for the Town in the phenomenal game against Birmingham City in which the Town came back from 4-1 down to win 6-4. Mitchell even showed some versatility with a defensive role against QPR in the FA Cup!

In 1994 Mitchell left for Turkey to play for Altay Izmir, a clause in his contract allowing him to leave for just £20,000. David couldn't settle and later that year joined Millwall before deciding to go back to his native Australia in a coaching capacity. His managerial career got off to a

tremendous start, together with assistant Lawrie McKenna he secured the Minor Premiership with Sydney United before joining current club Paramatta Power in June 1999. This season Paramatta Power have an outside chance of the play-offs despite having a poor sequence of results in January. Mitchell highlights the problem as their weak strike force that has cost them dearly in recent weeks. Perhaps he should dig out those shooting boots...

Latics Lavish Swoop

Wigan Athletic are looking to secure two big name strikers to help clinch promotion from Division Two.

Latics' boss Bruce Rioch has already snapped up Peter Beagrie from Bradford City and is now looking for additional firepower to finish off Beagrie's good wing work. He has declared that Brighton's goal-scoring sensation Bobby Zamora and Gillingham's highly rated Carl Asaba are top of the list of his JJB Stadium shopping list. Asaba has already rejected a move north after a £400,000 (having previously rejected a move for £750,000) fee was agreed between the clubs and this week Zamora rejected a £300,000 move from Brighton. Zamora cost the club just £100,000 from Bristol Rovers but the Seagulls now rate him at £1.5m.



Preston in for Armstrong

Bury's highly-rated defender is being heavily linked with a move to Lancashire rivals Preston North End.


The 18-year old star has earned rave reviews after just nine first-team appearances for Preece's side including the crucial 3-1 win over Oxford on Saturday in which he scored his first senior goal. Bury's left-back is

out of contract at Gigg Lane this summer and already has an offer of a new deal on the table. Burnley are also interested in the youngster and Armstrong's older brother Gordon is currently amongst the playing staff at Turf Moor. Manchester City have also had scouts watching Armstrong repeatedly, but Preston will hope to steal him before their arch-rivals.

Kemp Links Up with Patterson

Oxford have signed Darren Patterson from York City, a move that re-unites the Northern Ireland defender with former boss David Kemp.

Patterson can play at either right-back or in the centre of defence and has played under U's boss Dave Kemp at Crystal Palace. Kemp was extremely pleased to be linking up with him again: "I'm extremely pleased to have secured the services of an international defender of Darren's quality. He is good on the pitch and a good influence in the dressing room." Patterson added that he hopes to use his experience to stem the flow of goals that the bottom club are conceding.



Foreign Market for Moore

Rotherham boss Ronnie Moore is set to look abroad and the Scandinavian market in particular in a bid to strengthen his side's push for promotion to Division One.

After conceding that there is a lack of quality in England, Moore has decided to go further afield in search of quality players. He said:

"A left sided centre-half is the priority. But they are very, very rare in this country. "We'll have to look to places like Norway or Denmark because there's more chance of someone there adapting to this country. But it is difficult to go abroad and have a look at players so we'll have to invite them over here instead."

Pirates Eye-eye McKeever

Bristol Rovers' caretaker-boss Garry Thompson has revealed his desire to sign loan star Mark McKeever on a permanent basis.

The Rovers boss is keen to secure new blood in order to climb away from the relegation zone and the Sheffield Wednesday winger has impressed the Pirates temporary boss. Thompson is also keen to stamp his authority on the club in order to secure his job on a more permanent basis after the departure of Ian Holloway. He said: "We think McKeever is a talented player and obviously if the chance came up we would like to bring him here permanently. But he is a Sheffield Wednesday player and we will have to see how things go over the next month."

Stoke Supporters Singled Out

A further 23 supporters have been charged by police following an incentive targeting trouble caused on April 30th.

The clashes in and around the Britannia Stadium resulted in 27 people being injured and damage to the local area and a high profile operation entitled 'Operation Javelin' targeted the main trouble-makers. More than 100 people have been arrested now for the trouble caused between Stoke and Cardiff City fans and the most recent arrests have been charged with violent disorder and will appear before magistrates in Stoke-on-Trent on February 26th, 28th and March 2nd.



Matches From Memory

The country was still in the grips of the big freeze when, on January 26th Swindon lined up against Luton Town in the FA Cup.

Mounds of snow piled up around the Kenilworth Road pitch contrasted with the dark beneath the cavernous stands.

Luton was without gas and electricity so the kick off was advanced to 2.30pm and the players changed by candlelight. Swindon had earned a place in the Third Round following victories over Reading at home and Yeovil away and now joined the big boys of Divisions One and Two. Luton's team had been in the Cup Final only four years earlier when their team had lost to Nottingham Forest. With the bad weather having meant fixture chaos the draw for Round Four had already been made and the winners of the match knew a juicy home tie with the reigning League champions, Everton, awaited them.

The pitch had been covered in tons of sand to make the icy surface playable and the lines were marked in an unfamiliar blue. Swindon opted to wear the basketball boots that helped them to a five nil victory over Queens Park Rangers in similar conditions. Within seven minutes Swindon were a goal up. A long throw-in by Booby Woodruff was headed on by centre forward Jack Smith and Cliff Jackson showed great agility in getting up to volley past Ron Baynham in the Luton goal. After twenty five minutes hesitation by Brendan McNally proved fatal when

Hang on they did and the papers were full of praise for Bert Head's young side. Joe Hulme picked out Ernie Hunt as the Swindon star singling out his ability to "put his foot on the ball and give his rushed

his attempted clearance rebounded from the shins of Jackson. Swindon's former schoolboy international reacted quickly and ran on to take the ball around Baynham and run it into an empty net.

Luton emerged for the second half with most of their players having changed into rubber soled boots and this made them a more effective outfit. Mike Turner was frequently brought into action. Danny Clapton and Bob Morton both shot narrowly wide for the Hatters and Gordon Ridditch missed a golden opportunity. The second half became very much one-way traffic and Town's right wing pair of Hunt and Summerbee became auxiliary defenders as Swindon strove to hang on to their lead.

returns so that he doesn't any more permanent damage.



Football Traditions

Despite entering a modern age that is enshrouded by commercialism and greed, football has still managed to maintain some of the traditions that have stood the test of time, much like Stuart Pearce. Here are five of the best...

5 Bucket Over Head

This old trick used to be a familiar sight in dressing rooms all over the country following a dramatic victory.

Not so common any more, the bucket-of-water-over-the-head joke used to be a common element of dressing room banter, particularly when a 'minnow' had just taken the 'scalp' of a bigger club in the FA Cup. Nowadays, dressing room 'gaffs' have become a bit more sinister.

It was commonplace at Wimbledon when the 'Crazy Gang' were in their heyday, that new player's suits would be cut, belongings placed in the shower or other such vicious tricks. The "bucket" as we shall call it, is often accompanied by scenes of jubilation, normally a half-naked side frolicking in the dressing room bath, necking as much champagne as humanly possible. Either that, or the

players would contrive to interrupt a television interview with their 'Gaffer' on pitch side before or after a game.

4 Celebratory Bus Tour

To this day, successful football teams will parade their winnings in front of their fans via an open top bus through the town centre.

The open top bus tour provides those who were not lucky enough to witness the events of the cup/league win unfold live, and provides a perfect opportunity for both young and old to show their appreciation and congratulate their heroes. In 1993, the people of Swindon turned out in force previously unseen before in the Town. The whole community were making up for the injustice of the club's demotion three years previous. Not just fans, but mothers, babies, daughters and even pets came out in droves

sporting the red and white as the team bus went past specific points. It was a street party of gargantuan proportions, with the bus tour making its way from the County Ground through to the civic offices. Of the tour, then assistant manager John Gorman said: "I was overcome, Monday (when Swindon beat Leicester 4-3) was one of the best experiences of my career and Wednesday (the day of the procession) was phenomenal." There was also room for supporters to try and persuade Hoddle to stay at the club, rumours were rife at the time that he was about to leave the club to join Chelsea. Town fans repeated the celebrations, albeit on a smaller scale in 1996 following the Division Two Championship.

3 Time Wasting Tactics

Perhaps one of the most frustrating traditions in football, especially for opposing players and fans, is time wasting tactics (OK, this isn't strictly a football tradition but it has been around for ages...).

Goalkeepers especially have mastered the art of time wasting, with many holding on to the ball for as long as possible or what used to be the case - bouncing the ball several times. Managers especially will do anything to waste a few seconds in order to hold on to a slender lead. Last minute substitutions are still common and how many times has your Sunday League manager told you to go down and feign injury when 'under the cosh'. Nevertheless, my favourite time-wasting ritual is the run-into-the-corner-flag-and-shield-the-ball tactic. Experienced pro's are particularly good at this, dribbling the ball as close to the corner flag as possible

before shielding the ball from the oncoming swarm of defenders. A number of Swindon players exhausted this tactic during the Wycombe win several week's ago, much to the disdain of the travelling supporters!

2 Gentlemanly Conduct

Captains' shaking hands before the game, the swapping of pennants and the shaking hands of players after the game are all elements of gentlemanly conduct that were pioneered by those that used to play the game in the nineteenth century.

Such niceties are still commonplace in the modern game and there are now even more variations. One of those, the giving the ball back to the opposition after a player has been injured, caused one of the most controversial moments of last season. In an FA Cup game between Arsenal and Sheffield United at Highbury. The

score was 1-1 and United's Lee Morris went down with cramp in the Arsenal penalty area. A long clearance had run through to United 'keeper Alan Kelly before he kicked the ball into touch deliberately in order for his team mate to receive treatment. However, when the game was restarted, instead of giving the ball back to Alan Kelly from the throw-in, Ray Parlour threw the ball towards him, only for Nwanku Kanu to latch onto the ball who went on to score, much to the amazement of United's players. Steve Bruce tried to pull off his players and it took over six minutes to calm down both sets of players. In the end, Arsene Wenger had to concede the win and agree to replay the game.

On the other side of the coin, with an open goal at his mercy, Paolo Di Canio caught the ball instead of putting it into the back of the net following a collision between Everton's goalkeeper and a West Ham forward. Di Canio allowed Mhyre to receive attention from his physio, much to the disgust of his manager!



This Week's Winner: Swapping Shirts

1 Swapping Shirts

Perhaps the only thing that keeps players going in the adversity of a good drubbing, is that they can swap their own shirt with a better one (or at least one worn by a better player) at the end of the game.

Most commonly found after European club games or internationals, the swapping of the shirt ritual is a very important one to some players. Ask the majority of players their favourite possessions from their playing days or current

career and most will tell you about when they swapped a shirt with someone they consider to be more illustrious than themselves. Apparently Gillingham's Roland Edge is still wearing Zola's shirt following the club's cup encounter with Chelsea! One of the most famous images from the 1970 World Cup was that of England's Bobby Moore swapping his England shirt with Pele - two of the greatest players to have graced the international scene.

Some players would go to such lengths as to tracking the player they wished to swap shirts with for the duration of the last few minutes


of the game. The ritual can be a huge mark of respect for a player for a fellow professional to ask for his shirt, alternately it can also be a matter of who a player is closest to at the final whistle.

On the other hand, to smaller clubs the swapping of the shirt can be a costly venture, one national team were forced to ask for their shirts back in the dressing room after the game! Under strict instruction from their coach to keep hold of their shirts, the players were taken in by the occasion and had to face the humiliation of asking for them back like a child asking for his football having gone into the neighbours garden.





In a recent column I commented briefly on the relatively poor attendances at this season's 4th round FA Cup ties and this phenomenon was evident again at last weekend's fifth round games.

The Stadium of Light had some 8,000 'un-bummed' seats for Sunderland's clash with West Ham on Saturday and at Anfield, Sunday's Liverpool v Manchester City crowd was some 9,000 plus below capacity. The games at Wycombe, Tottenham, Bolton and Leicester also had unoccupied seats.

So, is the world's oldest football competition losing its appeal? The evidence suggests that it most certainly is. Obviously the implementation of the recommendations of the Taylor Report greatly reduced capacities at most stadia - certainly all of those in the higher echelons of football's pyramid initially but, let's make some comparisons with football's post-war golden years. In the early 50's Arsenal played host to Northampton in the 4th round in front of more than 72,000 fans. On the same day over 67,600 packed St James' Park to witness a 2-2 draw with Bolton and 42,000 were crammed into the Den

for Millwall v Fulham. The examples of huge attendances in those days are myriad, but 50 years ago crowds in excess of 70,000 for cup - and league - matches were commonplace. Obviously those attendances cannot be matched today, but swathes of empty seats at all-premiership 5th round cup ties! - unheard of until recent years. Cup ties once were almost without exception sell-out occasions and, sadly, that cannot be said of the modern competition.

So what's the cause of this trend? The protracted loss of Wembley may be a factor, there is no longer the 'dream of the twin towers' and I doubt that many are dreaming of the sliding roof of Cardiff's Millennium Stadium. Another factor most certainly is the huge demand on the fans' disposable incomes in these days of 7 days-a-week, multi-competition, virtually year-round football. Who could question the decision of a Liverpool fan who had travelled, expensively, to Rome in mid-week deciding to give the visit of Manchester City a miss. However, there are two glaringly obvious differences between the modern tournament and those of not so many years ago. Firstly, all cup ties, all the way to the semi-finals, kicked

off on the same day and, at the same time and, secondly, the plum ties are televised live and every tie is replayed and analysed in enormous depth on television and radio over the following week. Somehow the FA Cup has lost its urgency and has become less exciting and attractive, there is no longer a compulsive, lemming-like urge, or need for that matter, to go to the ground and support our teams in person.

Perhaps the game is being over-played and over-exposed. Competitions are profligate, dates and kick-off times are determined by television companies and the result is wall-to-wall matches, day in day out, week in week out, month in month out. Traditionally the last game of the season, barring unavoidable postponements, was the annual jolly in North London. Nowadays the premiership lumbers along well after the staging of the FA Cup Final. If you get too much of a good thing it inevitably becomes boring and of less importance and interest to all but the most ardent adherent.

Is the writing on the wall?
Only time will tell.

Deja Vu?

I'm sure like almost every Swindon fan out there, I'll be keeping a very close eye on events surrounding Chesterfield Football Club over the next couple of months.

It looks as if Chesterfield, runaway leaders of Division Three will be charged over alleged irregular payments to players - now that does sound familiar!?

In front of 72,000 people at Wembley in 1990 Town were victorious over Sunderland to clinch promotion to the old First Division. However, the celebrations were short lived and Town never played in the top flight until it became the Premier League three years later. Swindon were charged over irregular payments to players and were also subject to an Inland Revenue enquiry. Without going into the finer details, the Football League found the club guilty and were punished by demotion to Division Three, and eventually to Division Two after appeal. It will be interesting to witness the

eventual fate of the Spireites who are now threatened with expulsion from the Football League, in effect, demotion by two divisions (as they now sit comfortably at the top of the third division). The FA had been tipped off about alleged financial irregularities at the club involving the chairman, players and ice hockey club, the Sheffield Steelers. Since Town's demotion in 1990,

Tottenham Hotspur were also found guilty of financial irregularities, however, they did not suffer the same fate as Town. With Chairman Alan Sugar at the helm, Spurs were only fined and had points deducted, although this was reduced to just a fine after appeal.


In the case of Swindon the question that must be answered is, did the punishment fit the crime? I believe that if Town had not been demoted in 1990, then we could well be watching a very different looking Swindon Town FC. It was at a time when the gap between the top two divisions was not so vast

and the Robins would have stood a more than reasonable chance of staying up. Town could have been one of the founder members of the Premier League as it was only a year before the 'megabucks' of the Premier League filtered into the top flight. I still feel that Town were made an example of. The punishment was too harsh, especially to the fans that had followed the Town through thick and thin - 35,000 fans were allowed to travel to London and pay for Wembley tickets with the decision on their future still pending.

Will Chesterfield also receive a harsh punishment because they are a small? Spireites Chairman, Darren Brown, refuted any allegations saying: "We have paid no player anything like £30,000 out of contract. No gate receipts have been fiddled at all, and we will defend that to the hilt."

Only time will tell but if Chesterfield are found guilty and let off the hook it will be yet another snub for Town fans.

Alexander scored his fifth goal of the season at the far post by converting Keith O'Halloran's right-wing free-kick midway through the second half. Defoe saw his second minute strike fly into the side netting from 15 yards. Richard Hughes scored Bournemouth's equaliser 6 minutes from time to give Bournemouth a valuable away point but it was Alexander who was smiling afterwards.

He said: "Jermain was a YTS player when I was at West Ham and I've known what he can do for a long time. He's done well since he's been down at Bournemouth and I've seen the goals he's scored on the TV. Swindon manager Andy King said: "I was disappointed with my side tonight because they didn't live up to the standards they set in recent weeks but the defence were excellent in the second half and handled Defoe and Steve Fletcher brilliantly."

Who Are Ya?

Name: Peter Rowe
Job Title: Chief Executive
Year Joined: 12 June 2000

This week we grill club chief executive, Peter Rowe, as we take a look behind the scenes of Swindon Town Football Club.

How and when did you join Swindon Town?

I had been working in football and rugby before I took this job. I had also worked as the director of communications of the Football League. Just before I heard about the Swindon job, I had been working as a managing director of a rugby club in the north of England but I was based in Oxfordshire. My family was not looking to relocate so I looked for opportunities to arise here. I wrote to Cliff Puffett regarding the job, we had a couple of meetings and here I am.

What do you do?

The role of chief executive encompasses many jobs from club secretary to football administrator. I look after the football side of things including fixtures and player's contracts, commercial affairs (including sponsorships), looking for

new businesses and ways to improve the commercial side of the club and liaise with the media. It is important to build a profile of the club through the media and establish a good relationship between supporters, local businesses and ourselves. I also work closely with senior managers from all departments to ensure ground safety and high standards. Other than that, I attend meetings with the Football League, or charity dinners raising the profile of the club.

Describe your average day?

I often come in early morning and start at about 8 o'clock, sometimes 7. I like to look through the days papers and see if there is anything that concerns us and then go through the post with Linda. After that it is basically a case of having to deal with administration matters, attending meetings and sorting out any correspondence. Before and after match days, we have preparation and post-match meetings with the senior managers and ground staff.

What do you do on Matchday?

Matchdays can be very long, but also very enjoyable. I normally start the day at about ten o'clock and take a walk around the pitch. I get together with the stewards and we talk about the day's events and the importance of customer care. Around midday we all make sure the club is ready, from the boardroom to the executive area, the sponsors rooms to the stands. Then it is a case of welcoming the officials, Andy (King) and discussing with the community and youth officers anything they have going on. We become operational at 1.45 which means I link to police control and react to any issues that arise. During the game I like to move between the Chairman and the police unit, that is unless there are any problems around the ground. I usually leave at about six o'clock having gone through the collections and then settle down for a nice pint and wind down!

Most memorable moment at Swindon?

I think the Coventry game was great, despite the result, it was great to see a packed ground full of red and white. It just goes to show that if we can play some better sides and at a better level, we have the support here. I think this club can attract new support and new commercial ventures, from local businesses and schools (seeing so many kids using our IT Centre is great). Other than that I once sat down for a meal with Pele which was phenomenal.


Lowest point at Swindon?
