

IT WAS not terribly pretty, but the point the Town ground out on Saturday prevented one of their relegation rivals extending the gap between the two clubs, and the second clean sheet in six games since Joe Kinnear's arrival was a welcome change - our first at home in the league since the 0-0 with Walsall in September, and only our fifth in 32 league matches.

Suspensions and injuries restricted team selection, underlining why the manager wants to bring in extra players, although he made the point again that he was not just looking for bodies, but for men who are sure to go straight into the first team.

It was a pleasant occasion for Nathan Abbey, recalled in goal because Mark Ovendale was injured. Julian Watts was back in defence, for the first time since new year's day, enabling Paul McLaren to move up into midfield to replace suspended Matthew Spring.

Defences of both sides were too good for not very impressive attacks, but Abbey made saves when he had to, and when he was caught out midway through the second half. Watts came to the rescue by flinging his body, at considerable personal risk, into the path of a drive by Steve Foster which might have brought a goal.

For Abbey Saturday redressed the balance after he suffered a bit of a nightmare the last time Rovers came to Luton, and won 4-1.

Jason Roberts and Jamie Cureton were the visiting scorers that day, and having sold them Rovers are not the attacking power they used to be. But the visitors worked like demons in defence and midfield to deny the Town space, and to take their run to five games without defeat.

With the Town equally determined not to give anything away, there were only two clear chances in the whole of the 90 minutes. Watts, unmarked to meet a left wing cross from Liam George, put the ball into the crowd six minutes after the interval, and on 68 minutes a left wing corner routine by Rovers ended with Scott Jones heading home from close range, with the goal disallowed by an off-side flag.

Otherwise the only scares for either goalkeeper came when McLaren clipped an early shot onto the top of the bar, and Nathan Ellington had a shot deflected to suffer the same fate.

Garry Thompson, in his first game since being confirmed as manager of Rovers following the sacking of Ian Holloway, was content with the draw, but unable to agree with the decision that chalked off Jones's goal. The view from both camps

was that the referee did not have a brilliant match.

The Rovers manager claimed: "We did exceptionally well, and played some great football, and this is not a team that is at the bottom of the table - it's a team that is going places.

"We deserved to win - we were the only one that looked like scoring, and I thought we moved the ball better."

Joe Kinnear said he had to be pleased to see a patched-up team do the best it could on a day when it was important not to lose. He was concerned that Rovers were quicker to the ball in midfield, and he admired their workrate. But the Town, he added, did a good job themselves to earn their point.





The Manager

I SAID in my notes for Saturday's programme that I

expected the Bristol Rovers game to be tight, and so it proved. In the end I was pleased to see the team scrap for a point, because it was very important for us not to be beaten. Obviously a win would have been more to my liking, but I could not grumble about the result.

I was certainly pleased with our attitude. It was, as I expected, one of those games where we had to tough it out. It was always going to be a match where one goal either way would settle it, with very few clear-cut scoring chances created.

The clean sheet was very welcome: if you get your defence right you are half way there, and I thought our team showed commendable willingness to battle it out.

Give Bristol Rovers credit - in midfield, particularly, they were very useful, and we did well to hold them in that department. We had to defend hard, and dig in to get something out of a game we might easily have lost. I was not disheartened that we did not win because I felt the players did the best they could, which is all any manager could ask. If we did not create as many scoring chances as usual, that was down to good play by Bristol Rovers, rather than our own shortcomings in terms of effort and commitment. I think the game also underlined the lack of depth in our resources, with Matthew Spring and Lee Mansell both ruled out through suspension. We missed them, but of course they are available to me this evening, and could well play a part in the game.

After half a dozen matches in charge, I now have a fair idea of what needs to be done to give this football club a better than evens chance of pulling away from the relegation

zone. It is no criticism of the players we have to say that our squad needs to be stronger. The board have given me the freedom to do what is necessary, but I will not waste money, and players I am trying to bring in will all be ready-made for first-team football. I want, in particular, to have a larger squad of genuine first team players. Our subs bench needs to be stronger. Bristol Rovers are not a wealthy team, but as you may have noticed their first substitute was an international, and a very handy player to say the least.

I don't know if there will be a new face in the team tonight, but this much you can be sure of: we are in for another tough game, and once more it is likely to be a scrap. Hopefully, we will create more chances than we did on Saturday, and take one or two. We have the talent within the club to score goals, but they will only come if we work hard, as individuals and as a team. We have done that so far since I came here, and I am still confident we can get out of trouble. I thought the supporters were very good again on Saturday, both in terms of numbers and in the understanding of what was happening on the pitch. Good vocal backing is invaluable, and so far it has been tremendous, and I am appreciative of that. We need more of the same this evening, and more of the determination we showed on Saturday, plus a little more luck in our attacking. Cambridge have not had the easiest of seasons, and having just changed their manager we can be sure they will be up for the game tonight. So will we, and I hope it is a result we can enjoy. And thank you yet again for your wonderful support. Cheers - long may it continue...



Captain's Log

I WILL be in the stand again this evening, cheering for the lads, and hoping to see us go one better than we did against Bristol Rovers on Saturday. That was a very tough game, and I was pleased to see us come out of it with a point because in many ways Rovers were the better team on the day. Four or five weeks ago, that was the sort of game we would have lost.

We gave Wattsy a bit of stick for missing our best chance, but I was pleased for him, because I thought he had an excellent game after his long lay-off. He looked comfortable in everything he did, and made a very important block late on when we might have conceded a goal.

I know supporters want to see victories, especially at home, but it was important for us not to lose to Bristol Rovers, to prevent them from moving further away from us in the league table.

The same goes for tonight. Cambridge are higher in the table, but this is the sort of game we need to win. It might well be a bit harder for us because Cambridge have just got a new manager - quite often that gives teams a lift as players react to a new man in charge.

We have seen it here at Kenilworth Road, and it has been noticeable that the crowds have also got a lift since our new gaffer came in. I thought the supporters were first class on Saturday. They were watching their team struggle at times, but I felt an air of understanding about the place. You could see that our lads were trying, that they were playing a very useful team - another one with a new manager! - and it was pretty hard work for the lads.

It was one of those days when you accept that you can't win them all, in which case you have to do everything you can to avoid losing. That point might turn out to be very valuable when

the final league table is compiled at the end of the season.

Our position is much more promising than it was four or five weeks ago. Then, I was looking at the table, and hoping that other teams would fail to give us a fighting chance of getting out of trouble. Now, it is in our own hands.


Naturally I wish I was playing tonight, but I know that I am not match fit yet, after just one reserves game since my neck injury. I am delighted to report that there has been no adverse reaction and I hope to be playing for the reserves at Norwich on Thursday. I can promise you, the anticipation is no less than when I am in the first team, because I am desperate to be involved in the league action as soon as possible.

Tonight though, I will sit and watch, and enjoy meeting some old friends I know there will be a warm welcome for John Dreyer, Scott Oakes, David Preece and John Taylor, as well as a determination to send them home pointless.

With the exception of this game, I particularly hope that Scott Oakes does well. He was a bit of a super-star when he left here nearly five years ago, and the world was at his feet when he signed for Sheffield Wednesday.

Then came a horrific knee injury, a cruciate problem which sometimes ends players' careers. Scott had to endure two horrible years, and it is to his great credit that he is getting his career moving again with Cambridge. He has lots of natural ability, and is probably one of the most gifted players I have seen in my time at Luton. It's good to see him back in football, and I hope he enjoys lots of good times and good results after we have heard the final whistle tonight. By then, I hope I and the rest of the Luton supporters are cheering another good result.

Treatment Room

PAUL McLAREN and Julian Watts took hefty whacks during

Saturday's game against Bristol Rovers, but I don't think either will turn out to be serious enough to keep them out of contention for this evening's game.

In McLaren's case it was probably a mixture of discomfort - he was kicked on the thigh, and was also getting very tired. It was only his second game after being out through injury since before Christmas, and this one was in midfield, where he had to work a lot harder than he had to in his first game back, when he played in central defence at Swindon.

By Sunday he was a bit stiff, but not in any pain, and the signs were that he would be ready to play this evening, if selected. But he will play only if he is 100 per cent fit, and the fact that we have Matthew Spring and Lee Mansell available again after suspension means there is no pressure to play anyone who is not completely fit.

Watts had what you might call a ball injury: he

went down in considerable discomfort after stopping a very hard shot at very close range. He was in desperate pain for a short time, but shook it off, and was able to get through the rest of the game, and I was delighted to see how well he did after his long lay-of. Again I expect him to be available for this evening.

I am not so sure about Mark Ovendale. He missed Saturday's match after injuring a shoulder when he fell awkwardly during training. He has had a scan which confirms it is not anything serious, but we were planning to have a good look at him yesterday before taking any decision about when he could come back into the team.

Our only other senior players in the treatment room are long-term cases, and for Stuart Fraser, with a broken leg, and Kent Karlsen, with a knee ligament problem, it is a case of being patient, and doing what they can to try to maintain general fitness. Fortunately, they are both good workers and prepared to do whatever is necessary to speed their recovery.

Hatters Away

THE Town go to the New Den on Saturday to meet league leaders Millwall and in view of the traffic problems en route and then major difficulties in parking, our advice is to go by coach. Town on Tour and the Bobbers Travel Club will both be providing their usual reliable services for a hassle-free journey.

The Bobbers start from Cranfield at 11 am, picking up at various villages on the way into Luton, with a noon departure from the ground. If you want to drive, our advice is to allow plenty of time and use the motorway route to avoid going through central London. Take the M1 south from

Luton, then go east on the M25. Leave M25 at junction 27 to join the M11, signposted towards London east and City. After 4.8 miles, at a roundabout, take the third exit onto the A13, still heading towards the City.

Watch for the signs to the Blackwall Tunnel, and go through that and on to the A102(M) for two miles. At a roundabout take the A2, signposted towards central London, through Blackheath, towards Deptford and New Cross.

Go straight on at cross-roads near the George and Dragon pub, over the next set of traffic lights, and then take the right turn filter signposted towards Rotherhithe Tunnel and Tower Bridge, into Deptford Church Street. Go straight on at the first roundabout, then left at the next lights, still signposted towards Tower Bridge, and after just over half a mile you will see a left turn signposted to the New Den.







JOHN BECK - MANAGER

Appointed as new manager of The U's earlier this week, after the departure of Roy McFarland. It is his second time as boss at The Abbey having previously taken United to the Third Division title the first time round.

NO.13 - SHAUN MARSHALL - GOALKEEPER

Promising young goalkeeper who was a product of our successful youth policy. After first being spotted by the Club at the age of eight, Shaun made one appearance for the first team whilst still a trainee and has made good progress ever since. Initially selected following injuries to the 'first choice' keepers, commanding performances over the last couple of sea-

sons have merited selection in his own right.

NO.1 - LIONEL PEREZ - GOALKEEPER

The flamboyant Frenchman became an instant hero at the Abbey when he was signed for last season's run in following an injury to Shaun Marshall, keeping four clean sheets in the last nine games, and contributing massively to The U's survival. United clinched his services during the close season in a deal, United Boss Roy McFarland described as the best signing of his career.

NO.12 - TOM COWAN - DEFENDER

A crowd favourite at both Huddersfield and Burnley, Cowan returned to The Abbey Stadium on a permanent basis in the summer, after impressing whilst on loan towards the end of the last campaign. A determined left-back with the added weapon of a lethal long-throw, Cowan will be hoping the move South

will bring him a change of luck after injuries dogged his time at Burnley.

NO.4 - ANDY DUNCAN - DEFENDER

Central defender signed for £20,000 from Manchester United in April 1998 following a successful three-month loan spell at The Abbey. A solid, consistent player who settled into the heart of the United defence and relished the opportunity of League football. His positional awareness, composure and strength have shown that his transfer fee was money well spent.



NO.20 - JOHN DREYER - DEFENDER

This vastly experienced defender arrived in the summer from Bradford City to end Roy McFarland's long search for an influential head at the back. Dreyer featured 14 times in the Yorkshire sides Premiership campaign last season and, although primarily a centre-half, he has played equally well at left-back and in midfield during a distinguished career at Clubs including Luton Town - for whom he played over 200 times - Stoke City and Oxford United.

NO.5 - MARC JOSEPH - DEFENDER

A classy central defender, who is also quick enough to be a more than capable right back, Joseph proved equally adept when pressed into the left back slot towards the end of the last campaign. A product of the Club's Youth Scheme, who possesses a prodigious long throw, he has attracted the interest of Premier League Clubs.

NO.24 - STEVE MCANESPIE - DEFENDER

Originally a midfielder with a devastating free-kick, former Scottish Youth International McAnespie cost Bolton £900,000 in 1995 and was signed by Kevin Keegan for Fulham for £100,000. His career stalled in West London, and he was snapped-up on a free transfer in August 2000 after impressing in a trial spell during which he featured at right back.

NO.25 - MARTIN MCNEIL - DEFENDER

Now in his third season as a professional, McNeil is quietly becoming a very accomplished defender after initially finding himself unexpectedly drafted into First Team action. Another product of the Youth Scheme, McNeil is proud of his Scottish birthright, despite his Norfolk accent.

NO.21 - ADAM TANN - DEFENDER

A young defender who is equally comfortable at right back or in the heart of the back four, Tann won inter-

national honours when making his England Under 18 debut against Switzerland in September 1999. A highly promising player, Tann is another product of the Cambridge United Youth Scheme.




NO.3 - IAN ASHBE - DEFENDER / MIDFIELDER

Became Roy McFarland's first signing when he joined the Club in December 1996 from Derby County, making his debut later that month at Torquay. A strong, versatile player, Ashbee never lets anyone down whether selected in his preferred midfield role or almost anywhere across the back four, where he has proved equally at home.

NO.14 - LUKE GUTTRIDGE - MIDFIELDER

In his final year as a YT Scholar, Luke Guttridge was recently compared to Billy Bremner by Roy McFarland in an interview for the Club's official website. Yet to make his first team debut, he scored his first goal for the reserves at Wycombe at the end of November.



NO.9 - JOHN HANSEN - MIDFIELDER

One of the finds of last season, Hansen is a classy attacking, left-sided midfielder, who is never afraid to have a shot. Signed from Danish Club Esbjerg in February 2000 for a small fee, Hansen made three European appearances in the UEFA and Intertoto Cups whilst playing in his native Denmark.

NO.6 - NEIL MUSTOE - MIDFIELDER

A former Manchester United player signed on a free transfer from Wigan Athletic in July 1998, Mustoe has spent much of his time at The Abbey competing for a midfield slot with Ian Ashbee. A combative player who is popular with the fans, 'Muzzy' represented England Schoolboys and won an FA Youth Cup winners medal during his four and a half years at Old Trafford.

NO.28 - SCOTT OAKES - MIDFIELDER

Experienced attacking midfielder currently on extended trial with the Club. Made his debut at Swindon earlier this season.

NO.16 - DAVID PREECE - MIDFIELDER

Vastly experienced former Walsall, Luton Town and Derby County midfielder who joined the Club on September 6th 1996 after lengthy negotiations for his signature. An excellent passer of the ball, the England B International is Assistant Manager at The Abbey.

Stadium where he is very involved with coaching and scouting responsibilities. Now an infrequent starter, Preecy's only goal for the Club to date, a 25-yard screamer, came in a 3-0 victory at Exeter in March two seasons ago.

NO.11 - ALEX RUSSELL - MIDFIELDER

Russell joined United in August 1998 from Rochdale, and United fans are still shaking their heads in disbelief that he was signed on a free transfer. A natural playmaker, Russell has a good eye for goal and is deadly from set pieces. Russell made a welcome return to the side in the final game of last season, after enduring a campaign dogged by injury.

NO.7 - PAUL WANLESS - MIDFIELDER

The heartbeat of the side, Wanless is a brave, powerful midfielder whose infectious enthusiasm was rewarded when Roy McFarland made him skipper. He began his career as a trainee at Oxford before a short spell at Lincoln, during which time he managed to serve under three different managers. Paul joined United in the summer of 1996 after a spell on loan at The Abbey the previous season. Last season's 'Player of the Year'.

NO.19 - STUART WILSON - MIDFIELDER

Signed just before Christmas 2000, 23 year-old midfielder Stuart Wilson was a product of the Leicester City youth policy, and was tipped as 'one for the future' by

Martin O'Neil. He made one start, but over 20 appearances from the bench for his hometown Club, netting three times.

NO.29 - JONAS AXELDAL - FORWARD

Hardworking former Malmo, Foggia and Ipswich Town striker, Jonas was the top scorer in last season's Avon Insurance Combination League for Ipswich. The Swede made an encouraging debut against Portsmouth in this season's Worthington Cup. Granted the freedom of the City of Foggia after averting a coach crash when playing for the Italian Club.

NO.27 - DAN CHILLINGWORTH - FORWARD

Former England Schoolboy International, local boy Chillingworth looked assured when making his League debut at Oldham in April last season, shortly after signing his first professional contract. One for the future, 'Chilly' is another product of the Club's Youth Development Scheme. Voted as 'Young Player of the Year' at the end of last season.

NO.10 - RITCHIE HUMPHRIES - FORWARD

Former England Under 21 International who, despite being a boyhood Sheffield United fan, began his career across the Steel City at Sheffield Wednesday.

Spectacular goals at the start of his time at Hillsborough set the nation talking about Wednesday's teenage discovery, and he was recommended for an

England call-up by one of Glen Hoddle's scouts - a certain Roy McFarland! But a string of managerial changes meant that he found it difficult to fulfil the early promise and he drifted from the first team picture. Signed in February 2001, Humphries sees The Abbey Stadium as the ideal place to kick-start his career.

NO.8 - JOHN TAYLOR - FORWARD

'JT' is a legend at The Abbey, having starred in the successful U's side of the early nineties alongside Dion Dublin, returning 'home' for a second spell in January 1997 when he joined from Luton Town. Originally signed by the U's in 1988 from non-league Sudbury Town, he left The Abbey for Bristol Rovers in a player-exchange deal in March 1992. He enjoyed a successful spell with Rovers before moving on to join Bradford City and then Luton Town. A popular, jovial character he is in charge of the reserve team but still found time to be joint top League scorer two seasons ago, breaking Alan Biley's Club records for total number of League goals and overall goals in the process. Although featuring less frequently last season, he still found time

to combine his coaching role with an extended run in the side for the nail biting last few months of the campaign. During this run he further cemented his place in United's history with a hat-trick in a crucial win at Cardiff, passing the 100 career goal mark for the Club in the process.

NO.30 - DEMBA TRAORE - FORWARD

A Swedish striker in his final year as a YT Scholar, Traore has been tipped as 'one for the future' after showing well for the reserves.

NO.15 - TOM YOUNGS - FORWARD

An intelligent, creative forward player who made his League debut in September 1997 in our 4-1 win over Colchester, almost scoring with his first touch. Youngs, who had his most productive campaign to date last season, is highly thought of at the Club. This borne out by the fact that he was awarded a professional contract despite remaining at school to study for his A levels. Tom has been with us since the age of ten and has progressed right through our Youth Development Scheme.

Blast from the Past

Toffees break the Hatters hearts again

Fifteen years ago this week the Hatters seemed well on course to reach the F.A. Cup semi-final for the second year running but needed to see off Everton, their conquerors in the competition in the previous campaign.

The 1985/86 cup run had started with a potential 'banana skin' game in a visit to Crystal Palace of the old Division Two. The game was postponed on the original Saturday date due to a frostbound pitch but was passed fit 24 hours later when tenants Charlton took on West Ham.

The Town's tie against Palace was re-scheduled for the following day and quite predictably the pitch cut up early on which meant that, although the Hatters were the better footballing side, they were never able to fully stamp their impression on the game.

Brian Stein headed the Town into the lead in the eighth minute from a Mitchell Thomas cross but the defence was made to look uncomfortable on several occasions before David Preece doubled the lead with five minutes to go after being set up by Mick Harford. Kevin Taylor's 25 yard free-kick a minute later for Palace was too little too late as the Luton defence closed ranks.

On the morning following the Palace tie Mick Harford was admitted to hospital for a knee operation that was reckoned to keep him out of the side for between four and six weeks. It was major surprise, therefore, when he took his place in the Town attack only 18 days later for the next step on the road to Wembley, at home to Third Division Bristol Rovers.

Rovers, who had beaten top flight Leicester at Eastville in the previous round, were no match for the Town on the recently installed artificial surface at Kenilworth Road and after Harford put the Hatters into the lead early on there was only going to be one winner. The final 4-0 scoreline certainly did not flatter the Hatters with Brian Stein, at his best, providing the clever foil for Harford with both ably served from midfield by Ricky Hill, celebrating his recall to the England

squad for their forthcoming game in Egypt. The reward for the convincing victory over the Pirates was a home draw with old adversaries Arsenal and all at Kenilworth Road were rubbing their hands with glee at the prospect of record crowd receipts from a game that certainly caught the public's imagination.

Unfortunately bad blood existed between the two sets of players brought about by a very physical confrontation at Highbury in a league game a couple of weeks before.

As such the scene was set for a full blooded cup tie with no quarter given and at the end of 90 breathless minutes the score remained level at 2-2. All the goals came in the first half with Hill turning Arsenal defender Martin Keown prior to firing home the first before the Gunners stormed back to take the lead through future Hatter Ian Allinson and David Rocastle.

Harford levelled before the break and although the second half lacked more goals it certainly provided pulsating excitement for the crowd of 15,799 with the only sour notes an injury to Brian Stein that would keep him out for two months and a post-match tirade from Arsenal manager, Don Howe, when he accused the Town of 'bludgeoning tactics.'

The replay was delayed for over two weeks because of the icy weather and the failure of the Highbury under soil heating system. On a freezing Monday evening the two teams then battled for two hours on a ridiculously dangerous surface to reach a 0-0 stalemate. The only bright spot for the Town, who were under the cosh for most of the game, was that they won the toss of a coin to take the second replay back to Kenilworth Road. In order to prevent disruption to the quarter-finals, which were due to be played on the following Saturday, the second replay against the Gunners had to be fitted in only two days after the Highbury clash.

It was therefore remarkable that at such short notice a crowd of 13,251 turned up at Kenilworth

Road to see the marathon re-commence. Those inside the ground, though, were treated to a Luton performance that was as good as anything witnessed within living memory.

Arsenal were not just beaten, they were swept aside by a Hatters side where every player was at the top of his form and the 3-0 final scoreline did not due full justice to the overall superiority in every department. Mark Stein, recalled from a loan spell at Aldershot, had a tremendous game and forced Arsenal defender, David O'Leary, into conceding an own goal as well as scoring the third. The first had been hammered home on the half volley by skipper Steve Foster after being set up by Andy King who had recently returned to his home town side after an absence of nine years.

Arsenal manager, Don Howe, had little excuse for his sides complete humiliation and resigned soon afterwards.

It was therefore a weary set of players that prepared for a quarter-final tie only three days later. For their fourth game in eight days the Town were to take on Everton who were current league champions and were sitting proudly at the top of Division One once more.

They did not come any more tougher than that but the Town had a score to settle as the Toffees had broken the hearts of everyone in Bedfordshire by controversially winning the previous years semi-final clash between the sides.

Again, the logistical exercise of organising an all-ticket crowd at Kenilworth Road at short notice was overcome and 15,529 were present to see the Town sweep into the lead through Harford after 21 minutes.

When Mark Stein slotted home number two, just after the hour, the Luton supporters could have been forgiven for thinking that a semi-final appearance for the second year running was on the cards. Unfortunately a mixture of tired legs and remorseless pressure from the best team in the country soon brought everyone back to reality.

Goals from Graeme Sharp and Adrian Heath levelled the scores and it was only a couple of glaring misses from the normally deadly Gary Lineker just before the end that prevented the Toffees from snatching the tie.

Unfortunately, this story does not have a happy ending as in the replay, the following Wednesday, a massive Goodison crowd of 44,264 saw Lineker make up for his earlier misses by scoring the only goal early on after outpacing both Mal Donaghy and Steve Foster. The same man also saw a penalty saved by Les Sealey but the Town made a fight of it and a shot from Ray Daniel thudded against an upright as everyone was thrown forward towards the end.

Wembley would have to wait for another couple of years!







Hatters on Card

ALTHOUGH tonight's visitors only joined the Football League in 1970, there have been quite a few players who have turned out for Cambridge and the Town since then.

One of the most recent is defender John Dreyer, who moved to the Abbey Stadium from Premiership Bradford at the start of this season. Earlier in his career he spent six years at Kenilworth Road, and in 1992 was featured on card No. 40 of Bassett's annual football series, which were given away with their packets of candy sticks.

Alnwick-born Dreyer first came to prominence with Oxford Utd, after joining them as a 20-year-old from non-league neighbours Wallingford Town. After two seasons as a first-team regular, he came to Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1988, soon after the Town's Littlewoods Cup triumph against Arsenal. Ironically, Dreyer had been in the Oxford team beaten by the Town in the semi-final. However, Oxford were relegated from the old First Division that year, and were pleased to accept Ray Harford's bid of around £140,000 for the up-and-coming defender who could play anywhere across the back four.

Dreyer appeared at left back in the Town's opening fixture of the 1988-89 campaign, which resulted in a 1-0 defeat at Sheffield Wednesday, but it was not until after another Littlewoods Cup final, and defeat against Nottingham Forest, that Dreyer got a proper run in the side.

The Town were fighting for their First Division lives at the time, and although they maintained their status relegation dog-fights were to be the norm for Dreyer during his time here. After he won back his place that season he did not miss a league game until after the eventual fall from the top flight in May, 1992.

By then he had established himself as a classy centre-back, forming an effective partnership with veteran Trevor Peake. Before Peake's arrival from Coventry, Dreyer captained the side, and also took

responsibility for penalty kicks. He was usually successful, despite employing an unusual style which involved virtually no run-up to the ball.

Town fans warmed to his whole-hearted gutsy defending, and power in the air, and his nickname Tumble came not from any lack of ability to stay on his feet, but from the dressing room's nickname choice -Tumble Dreyer.

Relegation unfortunately did not mean an end to the seemingly endless struggle at the wrong end of the table. In 1993 the Town survived on the last

day of the season, despite a 2-1 defeat at Southend - other results mean that Cambridge and Brentford went down with Bristol Rovers.

The following season saw more relegation worries last until May, but at least we had a tremendous run in the FA Cup. Sadly, in a Wembley semi-final against Chelsea, Dreyer and his fellow defenders struggled against the aerial power of Tony Cascarino, who set up both goals in a 2-0 win. (They were scored by Gavin Peacock, who came back as a QPR player a few weeks ago to steal an FA Cup draw with a late penalty at Kenilworth Road).

Players' player of the year in 1990, and supporters player of the year in 1993, Dreyer exercised his right to take a free transfer in 1994 and joined Stoke City. Ironically, he was sent off playing for Stoke against the Town a few months later.

He played nearly 250 first-team games for us and scored 15 goals. After a couple of years with Stoke, he moved on to Bradford, and last season he enjoyed his first taste of the Premiership, at the age of 36. He figured in Bradford's heroic last-day survival - his experiences in such situations with Luton obviously stood him in good stead!

Cards from this particular series, which also includes Mark Pembridge in Town colours, are still relatively easy to find, and inexpensive to buy.

Action Replay

Swindon Town 1 Luton Town 3 (HT 1-1)

AFTER a midweek defeat at Walsall which was disappointing but not crucial, everyone knew that Saturday's visit to Swindon was much more important. And so did home boss Andy King, who was left deflated by the damage done to his club's survival hopes by one of his old teams.

"I can't complain. We weren't good enough to hold on to the lead, and in the second half we were second best," he said.

In a six-pointer, the Town showed the confidence of a team you might have thought was steamrollering its way to a title, rather than one fighting to escape the threat of relegation. And confidence is catching - not only do players obviously believe in themselves, the supporters are enjoying being on a roll as well, and more than 1,500 voiced their appreciation of another good team effort.

Paul McLaren was back to play in central defence after nearly two months on the injured list, and Swindon rarely got beyond him and Emerson Boyce and Richard Dryden. With Stuart Douglas injured, Andrew Fotiadis was recalled, but he limped off after only 12 minutes after a heavy collision with Steve Robinson, and Mark Stein took over before he too was subbed. Peter Thomson had only five minutes to impress, but it was enough for him to lay on the third goal.

The Town looked compact and well-organised, although Michael Reddy, on loan from Sunderland, occasionally threatened to do damage. He, like the rest of the Swindon team, faded as the Town got a grip, cancelling out Swindon's opener within four minutes just before the interval.

Swindon had been gifted the lead by a goalkeeper's error, but it failed to unsettle the Town, and it was a huge psychological blow when the equaliser was worked for and taken so quickly afterwards. The Town ran the show after the interval, leaving Joe Kinnear well pleased as Boyce and sub Lee Mansell added goals that were the least the Town deserved.

"We were the better side, and worked hard for the result," he said. "We knew it was very important to come here and get some sort of result. If Swindon had won it would have put more daylight between them and the other teams near the bottom of the table. Instead, we have ensured they are still in the mix, and we are closing the gap."







They were in the bottom four a month ago when they lost at Reading but have crept up to 19th with three wins and two draws since then.

Bury are another team who have set an example we might like to follow: in the middle of last month a run of six games without a win saw them drop to 18th place, but they are now unbeaten in their last six following Saturday's win over Swansea, and have moved up to 14th.

Swansea seem to be in free fall: their 5-3 defeat at Kenilworth Road turned out to be the first of five consecutive reverses and they look doomed, having been in the top ten last September.
