Playing with a Positive attitude

I am sure everyone who attended last Friday night's game against Rochdale enjoyed the type of football they saw. I think Rochdale are the team that has caused us the most problems which we have had to face for a long time - their top three place was very evident from the start of the game. From our point of view, over the 90 minutes I felt we more than matched them and could have taken the full three points due to our strong finish. Neil Edwards in the Rochdale goal covered himself in glory with five top class saves during the game. The month of November has seen us climb from the bottom of the league to a position where we can challenge the play-off positions. We believe the sooner we can claim

one of those spots the more chance we have of challenging the third automatic position. Self-belief, that's what we are impressing into the players. They have the ability and quality within the squad to progress beyond the play-offs, but only they can do it. I have said, and I repeat once again, the season is a marathon and not a sprint. There are many highs and lows during any team's season, it's all about having the mental strength to handle the lows and that's where Colin and I believe that we are stronger now. A good friend of ours, Paul Gough, always quotes to me that a manager's life is like a roller coaster ride, one minute you are up and another you are down. I see it not only as that, but as it being a good experience for us all. One thing we feel as management and players is that we are all working in the same direction and for the same goal. As a group of players you can now feel the sense

of enjoyment they are getting since the results have reflected their performances. It is with regret that I have to mention in my notes the parting of the ways with Springs Health Club. We feel that together everyone has benefited from the partnership we had with each other, but now that a new manager has moved into the Springs complex this has now ended. The new manager fails to see how the relationship we had with each other benefited both parties. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the staff at Springs Health Club for their support and guidance over the past two seasons.

We are at this moment hopefully tying up a deal with another fitness club in the town and it's pleasing that they see the benefits of helping the local football club. This is something that Mr Hodcroft and I are passionate about - that's local businesses supporting the football club. We both appreciate the help and support that we already receive.

Finally it is with great sadness that I end my notes this week with the news of the tragic loss within our Centre of Excellence of Daniel Stewart, who died last week after being involved in a car accident. Daniel was aged 14 and had played a prominent part in our youth set-up. My deepest sympathies go out to his parents and family, although I realise to lose someone so young, words cannot comfort you.

Six pack carve up!

When Luton contacted us a couple of weeks ago requesting the change of date for today's match, we were more than happy to agree. Unfortunately for both clubs, this change was only possible because we are both out of the FA Cup, yet again before the prestigious and now lucrative second and third Round stages. That defeat at Swindon was our only low spot in what has been a very busy November with seven matches played in all. The month started with a 1-0 defeat at Plymouth, the League leaders, which condemned us to bottom spot although, by the Plymouth Chairman's own admission to the Club at a meeting last week, we played them off the park for the majority of the game. Superb wins against Hull City, Exeter, Halifax and Swansea sent us soaring up the table before last Friday's competitive draw with high-flying Rochdale at the Vic stopped the run. That draw also cost Chris the Manager of the Month award which instead Nationwide decided to give to Kidderminster Jan Molby.

The breaking news story last week, which is potentially of most concern to Hartlepool United and other Third Division clubs centred on the proposed breakaway by the 'Group of Six' to form a 'Premiership 2', eloquently named the Phoenix League. These clubs, two of which have never even been in the Premiership, have even gone as far as putting money into a new company set up to investigate the feasibility of such a break-away and more than likely have held preliminary talks with a rival TV company. Two of these clubs' Chairmen are actually members of the Football League Board and, as such are supposed to be looking after the interests of the League as a whole. However, these clubs appear to be motivated more by greed (they call it fear!).

The main concern to us and other clubs not involved in this proposed new League is that ITV Sport, the Football League's

major investor and source of income, are likely to look at this as a breach of their Agreement and either withdraw their cash or try to renegotiate the deal. Neither option is alluring to us and would severely effect our total annual income. The seriousness of this should not be underestimated as I have no doubt that, without the substantial income from TV money, many clubs will either fold or at best, revert to part-time status. It is important we support ITV Sport and I ask all of you who have Sky TV to call them or write to them asking why Sky will not carry the ITV Sport signal, thus preventing you from getting Nationwide coverage as per their Agreement.

In my last Programme Notes I referred to the PFA situation and the threatened strike. This proposed breakaway League has far more serious consequences than what was argued over last month between the League and the PFA. This could mean hundreds of players and possibly clubs either going out of the game or having to go part-time.

The Club's AGM is on Tuesday 11th December and you can read all about it on our website that very day.

On a final sad note, we send our heart-felt condolences to the family of Daniel Stewart, the young member of our Under 14 Centre of Excellence side, who was tragically killed in a road accident last week. He was a popular lad and a very promising footballer. There will be a minutes silence before today's match.

Back to today's match and, with so many other sides playing FA Cup ties, this is a great opportunity to steal a rise on teams around us and above and get into a Play-off position with the points in the bag. Get behind the lads again and give them the tremendous support as you have been doing all season.

JOE KINNEAR

It only seems like yesterday that Luton were in the old Division one playing against the top teams in England and winning the League Cup at Wembley. However after a disastrous season last year Luton have fallen to the basement division, a feat that would have seemed so unlikely at the start of the 1990s. Luton finished 12 points adrift and were relegated long before the end of the season despite the attempts of new manager, Joe Kinnear. Kinnear then went and spent £200,000 in the summer on strengthening the squad which included the capture of experienced striker Carl Griffiths. This season has seen much improvement and Luton are well up there with the chasing pack before today's game. Last weeks game at Kidderminster was called off because of a bug going round the Luton team which severely hit the majority of the playing staff. One player who will be out to prove a point today will be Stevie Howard who comes back to play at the Vic for the 2nd time since his departure a few years ago. Stevie definitely proved a point against Pools at Sixfields for Northampton two seasons ago when he bagged a brace and put in a superb performance which saw the Cobblers seal a 2-1 victory. Stevie still has some good friends in Hartlepool though no doubt this will be put aside today (if he plays)

EMMERSON BOYCE

One of the many to come through from Luton's schools and youth development programme. A commanding defensive figure, he was a regular last season, and juniormembers of Luton Town Supporters Club voted him their player of the year.

DEAN BRENNAN

Previous Luton boss Ricky Hill had worked as a youth coach at Sheffield Wednesday before re-joining Luton for a brief and unsuccessful spell as manager in the summer of 2000, and one of his first actions was to go back to Hillsborough for a midfielder he admired.

AHMET BRKOVIC

Believing a move would be good for his career, the midfield playmaker refused new terms at Leyton Orient in the summer of 2001, to join Luton on a Bosman free transfer.

CHRIS COYNE

The centre-half was playing for Perth Soccer Club when he came to the notice of Harry Redknapp, then manager of West Ham.

Premiership chances were few and far between, and Coyne accepted a transfer to Dundee. Luton boss Joe Kinnear had remembered Coyne from his West Ham days, and a £50,000 cheque persuaded Dundee to let the defender move to Kenilworth Road in September 2001.

DEAN CROWE

Manager Joe Kinnear moved swiftly to sign Crowe on loan from Stoke City in late September when an injury crisis decimated the Hatters squad. The striker made an immediate impact: he scored on his debut, at Plymouth, and before his month was up had netted four goals in five appearances, and was the signed on a permanent deal.

STUART DOUGLAS

A striker with excellent pace, Douglas was a 17-year-old trainee when he scored on his league debut for Luton

against Oldham in 1995.

RICHARD DRYDEN

Vastley experienced, the defender has played at all levels of professional football, and accepted his second Luton contract at the end of last season. He had been recruited on a free transfer from Southampton in February 2001.

CARL EMBERSON

Wanting two players to compete for the first team goalkeeper's spot, Joe Kinnear moved swiftly in the summer of 2001 to persuade Emberson to choose Luton instead of Plymouth, who were also interested, when his contract at Walsall ended.

ADRIAN FORBES

After considerable First Division experience, and with an England youth cap to his credit, Forbes was a surprise inclusion on Norwich City's list of players available for transfer in the summer of 2001, and Luton boss Joe Kinnear was delighted to pay £75,000 for a right winger to add much-needed width to his attacking formation.

ANDREW FOTIADIS

A local discovery, Fotiadis chose to stay at school to gain GCSE A-levels before being a full-time soccer professional.

STUART FRASER

Stylish defender and former skipper of the Luton youth team who was given his league debut against Carlisle, in a 3-2 win, on the final day of the 1997/98 season. Within a year he was established as a regular member of the Luton squad.

LIAM GEORGE

Quick, and with tricky footwork, the striker came through the ranks after joining Luton as a schoolboy.

CARL GRIFFITHS

An impressive scoring record - a goal in every 2.5 starts for seven previous clubs - led to Carl Griffiths becoming a major summer target for Luton after relegation from the Second Division.

IAN HILLIER

No-one was more surprised than the Welsh under-21 international himself when he made his league debut for Luton in the second game of this season. The day before he was training with Spurs, where he was captain of the reserves, but a crop of injuries at Luton led to Joe Kinnear taking the young right back on loan, and Hillier settled in so quickly that Luton soon decided to buy him, for a bargain £30,000 fee.

STEVE HOWARD

Joe Kinnear swooped on deadline day in March 2001 to prise the tall striker away from Northampton for a bargain fee of £50,000.

PAUL HUGHES

Hughes worked his way up at Stamford Bridge from trainee to Premiership, and Joe Kinnear was one of several managers who marked him out as an outstanding prospect. Hughes learned his trade under Hoddle's management, and gained experience on loan to Stockport, Norwich and Crewe. When Hoddle became manager of Southampton he moved swiftly to recruit Hughes, but a serious groin injury put the midfielder out of football for nine months. Southampton, by then under new management, made him available for transfer, and he joined Luton just before this season kicked off.

MARVIN JOHNSON

Longest-serving player at Kenilworth Road, Johnson is arguably the most popular member of the Kenilworth Road staff with his colleagues and with the fans. He is the only member of the playing staff to have appeared in all four divisions for Luton - he made his debut at Goodison Park in 1988.

ADAM LOCKE

Well-travelled in football terms, the midfielder joined Luton on a free transfer from Bristol City to add experience to a predominantly young squad in the summer of 1999.

KEVIN NICHOLLS

The tough-tackling midfielder began his career as a trainee at Charlton and quickly made an impact after skipping England youth teams at under-18, under-19 and under-20 levels. At the time Joe Kinnear, now manager of Luton, was in charge of Wimbledon, and made a note of the young Nicholls, and just before this season started he was surprised - and well pleased - to hear that Nicholls was available for transfer.

MARK OVENDALE

Ovendale arrived from Bournemouth for £425,000 in the summer of 2000. He was previously with Wisbech, Northampton and Barry Town.

RUSS PERRETT

Perrett to join Luton a few days before this season began from Cardiff City. Strong in the air, and with a good first touch on the ground, Perrett began with non-league Lymington before being snapped up by neighbouring Portsmouth in 1995. He did well in the First Division, and moved to Cardiff four years later.

AARON SKELTON

It was a case of going "back home" when the defender, born a few miles from Luton, signed for the Hatters for the second time in July 2001. He had joined the club as a schoolboy, and worked his way up through the ranks to be on the fringe of the league team in 1993.

MATTHEW SPRING

A competitive midfielder, Spring has been at Luton since he was a schoolboy.

KEVIN STREET

The tenacious midfielder seemed set for a good career with home town club Crewe Alexandra as he progressed through the ranks after being taken on as a YTS boy when he left school. In more than a hundred appearances for the Gresty Road outfit he proved to be highly versatile, filling various roles in the side. But the arrival of £750,000 Dave Brammer knocked Street down a place in the pecking order, and in November Joe Kinnear, the Luton manager, took advantage by signing him on loan.




Seasonal Progress Comparison






When Goals have been Scored




When Goals have been Conceded



Gordon Watson (Hartlepool) Top Scorers Comparison Dean Crowe (Luton)





What is your footballing background?

I started with Middlesbrough's Centre of Excellence, and then spent two years at Nottingham Forest as a schoolboy. I used to travel down every week-end and stay at the National Watersports Centre Hotel. When I was getting near the end, they wouldn't give me a decision about offering me a YTS. They kept saying "one more game, and we'll let you know". I went to Lilleshall and played against England and had what I thought was my best game ever, and thought - they must keep me now, but they still said one more game. I wanted to know what was happening, and if I left it any longer I could have been without a club. I had a pile of offers from other clubs, but Billy Horner rang me up, and asked me to come for a trial game. I thought that this would be ideal as it is local - I played in the game and they offered me a YTS straight away. I had two years as a YT and am now in my second year as a pro.

You've just signed and extension to your contract - you must be delighted?

Yes. At one point when I was a YTS there was talk that I might be getting released and to be honest at the time I wasn't playing very well. I got brought in with the First team squad and trained with them more regularly and from there it's just gone on. I got offered a contract and got a run in the team. Unfortunately now I've lost my place in the team through injury and I just want to win it back.

It's great for a lad of your age to be playing First team football.

It is yes. I got a taste for it when I first came into the side, the manager said we'll give you a taste of it, you've done well. Then I was left out of the side but he said it was just for a rest, that he didn't want to over-use me and not to worry about it. He keeps saying - there's plenty of time, you've got time on your side.

So Chris has obviously got faith in you by what he's been saying to you all along.

All along yes. He hasn't said we're leaving you out because we don't think you've been doing well, every time I've been left out it's when I've been doing well which is backing up what I thought because I know myself that I have done well.

So he's handling you similar to the way he's handling Adam Boyd?

Yeah, exactly the same, although Adam's scoring goals! Adam comes to me and talks to me and I confide in Adam, with us both being in the same boat. We keep each other going when we're out of the side. We understand what the gaffer is doing - but like any footballer, you just want to play.

Obviously you're hoping for bigger and better things. Yes. We're flying at the minute - we've had a good run and I just want to be a part of it. Being on the bench is still being a part of it and I just hope we can get that play-off spot or even better - automatic.





England - World Cup Winners?

Okocha, Larsson, Ortega, Veron, Crespo, Kanu. Just a handful of the names England are to likely to face in the Far East summer 2002. It is doubtful whether Sven Goran Eriksson could have hoped for a more challenging World Cup group than the one England have been dealt with for the opening stage of the finals next summer. Every one of the three teams to play England will prove a stern test, none more so than the traditionally hard fought match against Argentina. Of course, the end of England's participation in the '98 World cup against Argentina proved to be David Beckham's wake up call and no other player would be more determined to wipe the slate clean.

There is no doubting that England's opening group is the most difficult of all. World Champions France have been drawn with Senegal, Denmark and Uruguay, none exactly world-beaters; whilst Spain arguably have an even easier task, being grouped with Slovenia, South Africa and Paraguay.

The crux of the England squad is injuries. If the preferred first choice eleven are fit then England stand more of a chance of qualifying for the second stage. Argentina boast a wealth of talent throughout their squad, having some of the best attacking flair players in the World at their disposal. Along with that they have strength in depth. If Ortega is injured, Batistuta, Crespo, Claudio Lopez or young Barcelona protégé

Javier Saviola can replace him. If David Beckham or Steven Gerrard are injured, do we have quality replacements for them? The same scenario can be used for Michael Owen, who is probably the best striker in the world at the moment and really we don't have anyone who can match his form if he were to be injured.

Group F, although Kanu, Jay-Jay Okocha and Taribo West may differ with that conclusion. The Nigerians have undoubted talent, although consistency has been an attribute their players have failed to master over the years.

Providing England do qualify for the second phase (probably in second place behind Argentina), there is a

Argentina's defence is probably the weakest link of their team, although the first choice central defensive partnership of Celso Ayala and Walter Samuel is one of the best in the world, yet again. They don't have quality replacements for these two, but that really is about the only weak link in an Argentine side that is rightly tipped to win the World Cup.

Then there is Sweden. We haven't managed to beat Sweden for 33 years and in Celtic's Henrik Larsson they claim a figure who can turn any match on its head. The recent 1-1 friendly draw proved that we can still find them very difficult opponents and they will be full of confidence after a relatively comfortable qualifying phase.

Nigeria are probably the easier of the sides England will have to face in

likelihood that they may have to face the world champions in the last 16. France are odds-on to finish top of their group and they will prove a very stern test to England's world cup credentials. In my opinion, the French are still the best team in the world, although with the mainly European based players that they have, they will probably suffer from another factor that will affect the English too, the heat.

USA '94 was a very demanding world cup for the players, not just because of the other quality teams they had to face, but because of the incredible heat they had to endure. It will be no different in the Far East and the heat may well prove to be the biggest threat to not just England's world cup hopes, but those of the other European sides as well.

Goals by Ernie Phythian and Cliff Wright gave Hartlepoons United a hard-fought victory over Luton Town watched by 4,896 at the Victoria Ground.

It was Luton's first-ever League visit to Hartlepoons after the Hatters had plummeted from the First Division to Fourth in the space of five years. Luton were forced to make a late change when Graham French failed to report in time to travel with the party and England Youth international David Pleat was brought in at out-side-right.

Hartlepoons had won their previous three home games and made a confident start, with the Luton defence not looking at all steady under the pressure. The Hatters' talented young inside-left Bruce Rioch fell heavily after an early clash with Brian Grant and remained on the field for only a couple of minutes before being replaced by substitute Tony Read.

Brian Clough's side took the lead in the 14th minute when Stan Storton hammered a free-kick across the face of the goal and with Peter Thompson challenging closely, Colin Tinsley only half punched clear and Ernie Phythian

swooped to score from ten yards. Almost straight from the restart Willie Bradley was presented with an equally good chance on the left but he sliced his shot badly.

Most of the aggression was coming from 'Pools and only a fine save by Colin Tinsley from Ernie Phythian's fierce left-foot shot prevented them from going further ahead, then Willie Bradley fired inches wide after a determined run by Cliff Wright. Luton were presented with an opening when John Gill and Stan Storton

into the second-half, the Hatters were reduced to nine men when left-back Fred Jardine was sent-off after clashing with Cliff Wright.


Luton's depleted side were in deep trouble and Hartlepoons went further ahead in the 52nd minute when a Stan Storton free-kick was hammered home by Cliff Wright from ten yards. The Luton goal had several narrow escapes during the closing stages and both Peter Thompson and Ernie Phythian had efforts disallowed for offside.

failed to clear but Les Green managed to save John O'Rourke's low shot.

Hartlepoons left-back Brian Drysdale pulled down David Pleat as the winger made ground down the touchline and a free-kick nearly produced an equaliser. The wind made it swerve late in the penalty area and Les Green was struggling to cover as inside-right Tom McKechnie sneaked through to put his header narrowly wide.

Peter Thompson twice went close to increasing Hartlepoons' lead before a series of mild clashes climaxed with Luton substitute Tony Read being sent-off in the 40th minute after he appeared to butt Barry Ashworth. Then five minutes

▶ LES GREEN
Small, agile goalkeeper who joined Rochdale in April 1967, then reunited with Brian Clough at Derby County in May 1968. He later played and coached in South Africa, then managed Nuneaton, Hinckley, Tamworth and Bedworth and is now a fleet salesman for DC Cooks in Derby.

▶ BRIAN GRANT
Scottish right-back who made 35 Fourth Division appearances for Hartlepoons prior to briefly joining Bradford City in August 1967. He then moved to Cambridge United and helped them to win the Southern League title in two consecutive seasons, later playing for Kettering Town and Stevenage.

▶ BRIAN DRYSDALE
Popular left-back who starred in Hartlepool's 1967-68 promotion success and scored twice in 170 League games before moving to Bristol City in June 1969. He later played for Oxford United, Frome, Shepton Mallet, Clandown and Hengrove and is now a self-employed carpenter in Bristol.

▶ BARRY ASHWORTH
Right-half who netted four goals in 45 Fourth Division games for Hartlepool before moving to Tranmere Rovers with Stan Storton in July 1966, then played for Chester, Altrincham and Bangor City. He has become a property developer in Bangor and also runs a newsagents in Holyhead.

▶ JOHN GILL
Tough-tackling centre-half who was a key figure in Hartlepool's 1967-68 promotion success and scored once in 204 League games before moving to David Pleat's Nuneaton Borough with Tony Bircumshaw in July 1971, then played for Atherstone. He is now foreman at an abattoir in West Bromwich.



▶ STAN STORTON
Versatile left-half who made 72 League appearances for Hartlepool prior to joining Tranmere Rovers with Barry Ashworth in July 1966, then managed Ellesmere Port, Runcorn, Bangor City, Northwich Victoria and Telford United. He now runs his own office cleaning company in Ellesmere Port.

▶ CLIFF WRIGHT
Long-serving schemer who was an influential figure in Hartlepool's 1967-68 promotion campaign and netted 31 goals in 184 League outings before moving to Darlington in February 1970, then played for Boston United. He has since worked for a leather-making company and is a keen local cricketer.

▶ PETER THOMPSON
Ex-England Amateur international who had two spells at Hartlepool and joined Boston in July 1966, then played for Scarborough. He gained an MA degree in Philosophy and lectured Secondary Teacher Training at Sunderland Polytechnic, then ran the Seagull Inn in his native Blackhall.

▶ ERNIE PHYTHIAN
Former England Youth international centre-forward who was leading marksman in two consecutive seasons and featured in Hartlepool's 1967-68 promotion campaign, netting 51 goals in 124 League games prior to joining Southern Suburbs in June 1968. He settled in South Africa as a car salesman.

▶ AMBROSE FOGARTY
Republic of Ireland international inside-forward who scored 22 times in 127 Fourth Division games for Hartlepool prior to becoming Cork Hibernian player-manager in July 1967. He also held a similar post at Cork Celtic and Drumcondra, then spent 21 years as manager of Athlone Town.

▶ WILLIE BRADLEY
Scottish outside-left who had joined Hartlepoons from Ayr United together with Bert McCubbin and John Milton in July 1963. He created numerous goalscoring chances for Peter Thompson and netted 15 times in 100 Fourth Division games while at the Vic before returning to Scotland.



FITC would like to thank the players for giving up their time for what has proved to be of great benefit and enjoyment to all of the children involved.






I think many Pool fans enjoyed the experience of Friday night football, last week's game against Rochdale was the first Friday game I can remember for years, when was the one before that, anyone know?
