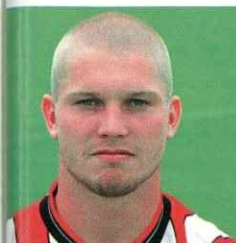

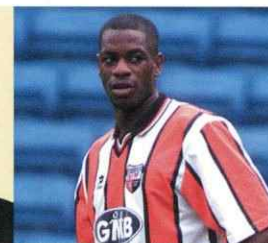

Whats The Ground Like? Anyone who visited the old Dean Court, will not now be able to recognise it, as it has been completely re-developed. In a matter of months the old ground was completely demolished and a new stadium built. The stadium currently comprises of three new stands, which are of roughly the same design and height and are quite smart looking, with the Main Stand having a row of executive boxes to its rear. The pitch has also been rotated by 90 degrees, from its old position, so if you visited the old ground ground, you can play a game trying to figure

Getting to Bournemouth By Car & Where To Park Approx 100 miles. M3 to M27 to A31 to A338; Follow the A338 towards Bournemouth. The ground is situated on the left of the A338 in the outskirts of Bournemouth. If you keep looking up to the left as you go into Bournemouth you will eventually see the tops of the ground floodlights. At this point take the next exit off the A338 and turn left towards the ground. There is a large car park located at the ground. Alternatively, there is a council run car park, on the opposite side of the dual carriageway, which is handy for getting away quickly after the game.

route, that there is a speed camera not long after the Travellers Rest pub on Storeton Rd. Alternatively, rather than turning down Thornton Rd, you can continue along Storeton Rd, until you are within sight of the second set of t/lights, and Woodchurch Lane as mentioned below, is the last road on the right. Parking is less restricted in this area. If you turn up Prenton Rd West, left at the first set of lights, there is plenty of street parking. You can then walk down Prenton Rd West, over the lights and down to the ground.

Junction 3 - Follow r/about round to the exit past the m/way slip road, 3rd exit. This takes you to a tricky slip road onto Woodchurch Rd which you are turning left onto. (beware Speed cameras) Travel along this road until you come to a main junction of t/lights, with The Halfway House pub to your right. Turn right into Storeton Rd, and then immediately left into Woodchurch Lane, and The ground can be found at the end of this lane. To get to the club carpark, take the right lane at the bottom of this road.

Car Parking: Parking is not as easy as it could be, as there is a lot of residents parking round the ground and on matchdays the traffic wardens are out in force. If you get to the ground early enough,

then there are places in the official car park which will cost you £3.50. There is also a car park near the Technical College on Borough Road (heading back towards Birkenhead) which fills quickly, and in the roads above it. Generally a ten minute walk back to the ground.

By Train: **BIG PROBLEMS!** There is a series of ongoing engineering works on the West Coast line up to Merseyside and the North West; to make the journey to Birkenhead would involve departing St Pancras, changing at Leicester, again at Nuneaton, and again at Liverpool Lime Street, so probably not advisable. **For latest situation: National Rail Enquiries 0845 7484950.**

The closest railway stations are Rock Ferry and Birkenhead Central, which are served by Liverpool Lime St. Both stations are a fair walk from the ground. (15-20 minutes).

Car parking: Much of the parking on matchdays is by residential permit parking only. The Main Car Park is situated in the Athletics Stadium on Leckwith Road and the entrance is accessed 0.4 miles after leaving the A4232 (see above directions) on the right hand side of the road.

Travel by coach: Coaches leave Layton Road Car Park at 3pm. The cost will be £17 (£15 for Lifeline Members, Season Ticket holders, members of the Football Club, BIAS) with Concessions of £1 off. To book for coaches call into the Sales & Marketing office or phone 020-8941 0425

Travel by Train: Not worth it as the last train from Cardiff Central departs at 2130 at that also means changing at Bristol Temple Meads.

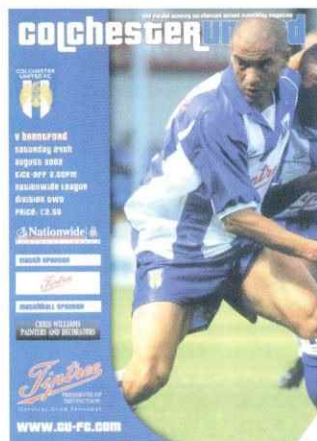

A special welcome to you all here at Griffin Park this afternoon, whether Bees fans or Luton Town supporters. The two clubs meet here today following a one year's absence. The last meeting between the two clubs was on the 3rd May 2001, which was a Thursday evening.

Congratulations to Wally for being named as the Nationwide's Second Division Manager of the Month for August. He was presented with his trophy at a luncheon last Wednesday.

On Tuesday next we travel to take on Third Division AFC Bournemouth in the First Round of the Worthington Cup. The match kicks off at 7.45pm. Should the match prove indecisive at the end of ninety minutes there will be 30 minutes extra time. Again should the scores remain level, penalties will decide who goes through. Admission prices are Adults: £13, Concessions £5.00. Although the game is not All Ticket, Bournemouth have sent us the tickets for supporters to purchase in advance as tickets cannot be



purchased on the turnstiles on the evening. Instead supporters have to queue at the ticket office to purchase tickets and this can take some time.

Oli Gottskalksson who has recently had a reoccurrence of the injury he sustained towards the end of last season, saw a specialist a couple of weeks ago who advised him to seek surgery. Oli thus went into hospital two weeks ago and underwent an operation on his shoulder. The operation showed that the injury was more severe than first anticipated. It was known that there was a tear in the muscle tendon, however up to two thirds of that area had been torn. The operation allowed for the removal of latent matter in the vicinity of the tendon, and softened the bones. It is now expected that Oli will require up to six weeks to recover before he visits the specialist again for an update on the situation. We wish him a speedy recovery.

Meanwhile Oli's former teammate Ivar Ingimarsson has picked up two bookings for his new club Wolves. When we spoke to Ivar about this having gone the whole of last season without receiving a yellow card, he said

that it must be the water in Wolverhampton. He sends his best wishes to all Bees fans.

Talking of Ivar (and this is most remiss of me), I have omitted to tell Brentford Supporters that their Player of the Year last season was Ivar. No doubt that doesn't come as a surprise to anyone, but the announcing of the winner was held over because of the tension in our end of season matches last season. The Trophy was eventually awarded to Ivar at our Sporting Dinner last May.

Congratulations, from his daughter Lisa in particular, to Mike Scoates who celebrates 50 years of watching the Bees this month. Mike has been a good supporter and Sponsor of Brentford over the years.

We regret to report the passing of Season Ticket holder and former BSA Committee Member Trevor Garner. He was also a local referee and a Manager of the Junior Bees for five years. We extend our condolences to his wife Tina.

Now that we have dotted the i's and crossed the t's with regard to a few players contracts, let's tell you a bit about our newcomers this season...

Rowan Vine will be twenty later this month. He has joined us on a season long loan from Portsmouth where he made his League debut the season before last. Originally a defender he was converted to a striker following Peter Crouch's departure in March.

Leon Constantine who is 24, made his debut for Millwall. Last season he

spent time with both Leyton Orient and Partick Thistle before being released by the Lions in the summer. He has signed a one-year contract.

Jamie Fullarton has signed a one year's contract. The 27 year old who won 17 Scottish Under 21 caps, has seen service with St Mirren, Bastia (France), Crystal Palace, Bolton Wanderers and more recently Dundee United.



Leo Roget (25), made over 20 appearances for Stockport last season before being loaned to Reading for their promotion run in. He started out at Southend where he made almost 140 appearances. Has signed a contract which expires at the end of the year.

Ben Chorley (19) has just agreed to an extension of his loan to three months. He played in the same successful Arsenal Youth side as Steve Sidwell.



FROM THE CHAIR



RON SPEAKS OUT

Last weekend saw the introduction by FIFA of transfer Windows for International and Premier League transfers. The Football Association of course has resisted the introduction of Windows and hope to get some consideration and sympathy from FIFA and up to now has had a favourable response to its request. The Football League recognises the financial plight of its Clubs and for some the situation is quite desperate. The introduction of Windows could have been the final nail in the coffin. It doesn't only affect transfers of course, it also affects temporary transfers. The temporary transfer, otherwise known as a player loan, is used by Clubs in emergency situations. They are also used to assess a player before signing and by bigger Clubs to give their players match practice following injury by loaning out to the lower divisions and yearly loans by Premier Clubs of their younger players to help in their development.

Personally I cannot see any logic in Windows, unless it is a vendetta against agents, because fans like to see players in and out particularly when interest and results are waning. Just imagine if FIFA's regulations had come in. We would now have 500 players, some very good - out of work and unable to sign for anybody from last Saturday. Not very cleverly thought out was it?

Why have Clubs got into financial problems this summer? Well it's been creeping up on us for a while now but over the past three years we have seen the demise of player sales by

Football League Clubs to the Premier League. You may see articles by those in office telling you that transfer monies between the two Leagues has risen year by year, but this is a myth. Either they don't understand Clubs' problems or they are misrepresenting the facts. The money moving from the Premier League to the Football League may have increased but only a few Clubs have benefited. We have had three or four moves a season at £3million-£5million at a time but only three or four Clubs have benefited. Previously we had dozens of deals and anyone needing money could always sell one of their better players to satisfy the Bank Manager. What has happened over the past three years is that the EEC requirements for freedom of movement has started to bite. The majority of League Clubs are losing substantial monies annually which they can no longer recover by selling players.

The ITV company should be despised but this fiasco is not the reason for Clubs being in trouble, it just compounded it. After all if your Club is losing £800,000 per annum what difference does another £200,000 make? The situation was desperate before, ITV was irrelevant and Boards of Directors up and down the country will not have the personal money to put in or be willing to make up the deficit. What will they do? Some will go into administration and some will try to buy time. This summer players have been released whose contracts have run out. Valuable and good players have been available on free

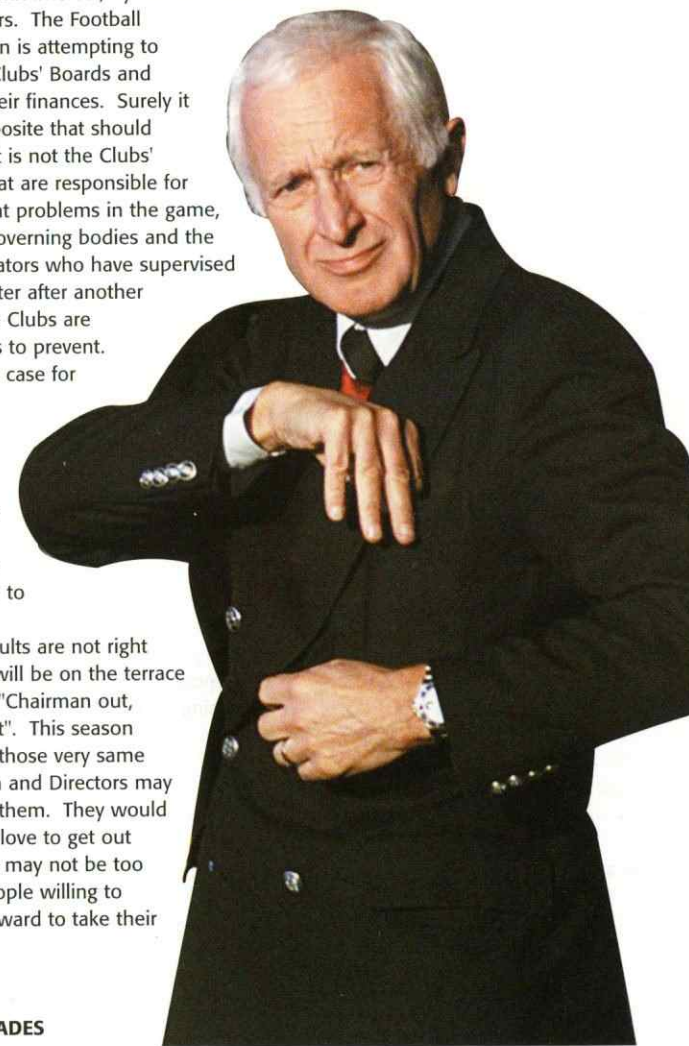
transfers but very few Clubs have taken them on and if they have, it's at vastly reduced wages. Managers have been allowed to leave or their contracts terminated and promotion has been from within. This season teams will contain many more young players, some will be first and second year professionals. It will be a great opportunity for anyone who gets a chance to play or manage for the first time - Ray Lewington at Watford, Micky Adams at Leicester, Wally Downes here at Brentford, Martin Hinshelwood at Brighton, John Taylor at Cambridge, Graham Allner at Cheltenham, Dave Rushbury at Chesterfield, John Cornforth at Exeter, Paul Groves at Grimsby and Ian Britton at Kidderminster all have been promoted from within.

Success in football is often down to being in the right place at the right time and the next generation of successful managers and players may well look back on this summer quite differently from Club Directors. How long will the cost cutting last? Well contracts in the lower divisions are usually two or three years which means it will take at least two years for Clubs to cut their outgoings by reducing wages. New contracts will probably be for one year only. You can expect the trend to continue throughout the season and a repeat next summer of what has happened this close season before Clubs get their income and expenditure columns to balance out which again only happens at the expiry of existing player contracts and their non-renewal.

The requirement for cost cutting is particularly evident in those Clubs relegated from the Premier League. Bradford of course almost sank without a trace with their financial problems and Leicester are desperately giving quality players like Matt Elliott a free transfer and attempting to terminate their financial obligations with Dennis Wise. If there was a transfer market these players would still fetch substantial fees but their salary obligations now cost more than their transfer value. I went to Brussels as part of the Football League delegation to protest at their plans for football telling them it would decimate our industry, damage our Clubs and lead to widespread unemployment, all to no avail. The PFA did not help; they supported the changes because FIFA or UEFA wanted them, possibly because you cannot make progress on FIFA committees by opposing FIFA. I don't know any union who would support changes which would lead to massive unemployment of their members or favour the better off members to the detriment of the less fortunate or less skilled. If our industry had stood together we could have opposed the proposals but in my opinion we broke ranks each for our own reasons. The Premier League thought it would not affect them and the Clubs were concerned about losing their European places. The Football Association did not understand the problem and did nothing, perhaps another FIFA seat was open for nominations. What are the governing bodies doing

now to help the Clubs in trouble? Absolutely nothing. The PFA are making loans to pay their members' wages providing they are repaid, possibly with interest, by a new Board of Directors. The Football Association is attempting to regulate Clubs' Boards and control their finances. Surely it is the opposite that should happen, it is not the Clubs' Boards that are responsible for the current problems in the game, it is the governing bodies and the administrators who have supervised one disaster after another which the Clubs are powerless to prevent. There is a case for Clubs to regulate them, after all they have a pretty bad track record up to now. When results are not right the fans will be on the terrace chanting "Chairman out, Board out". This season however those very same Chairmen and Directors may well join them. They would probably love to get out but there may not be too many people willing to come forward to take their place.

Altogether in excess of £35 million has changed hands in the transfer market, Hermann Hreidarsson topping the bill. He is Brentford's incoming and outgoing record transfer, costing £850,000 from Crystal Palace and moving to Wimbledon for £2.5 million, and then joining Ipswich for £4 million. Tractor Boy's teammate Marcus Bent ploughs a similar furrow (Bees to Palace £150,000, to Port Vale £375,000, to Sheffield United £300,000, to Blackburn £1.3 million, to Ipswich £3 million). And also in the Big League, moneywise, are Dean Holdsworth, his fees totalling £4.3 million, Bob Taylor £3.5 million,

Marcus Gayle £2.5 million, Carl Asaba £1.5 million and Nicky Forster £1.4 million.

MONKEY BUSINESS

When West Ham held Arsenal 2-2 last Saturday week, it ended the Gunners hopes of setting a new League record of 15 straight wins. Having won 14 off the reel Arsenal had equalled the record shared by Manchester United (1904-05), Bristol City (1905-06), and Preston (1950-51). Bristol City, who went on to become Second Division Champions did suffer a defeat during that run when Southern League Brentford put paid to their hopes of FA Cup success by beating them 2-1 at Griffin Park. The visitor's led 1-0 at the break, before "Monkey face" Corbett, a former City player, struck twice to give the Bees a famous victory.

The opposition's failure to penetrate the Bees' defence for the first 376 minutes of the season is a new Club record. The all time record for keeping a clean sheet is held by Reading, who kept the opposition at bay for a total of 1103 minutes in 1979. The team which ended that sequence? Brentford, of course, when Henderson put through his own net in the 2-2 draw at Elm Park on 18th August. In a similar vein the Bees have been party poopers on a number of occasions. Take the 1975-76 campaign when Lincoln strolled to the Fourth Division title and set a record by securing 74 points (106 under the three points for a win ruling) and also a new record of 32 wins and just 4 defeats. You can read about one of those losses in today's "Match To Remember"! Then take the record number of wins in a season in the old Third Division South. Millwall (1927-28) and Plymouth (1929-30) are joint holders on 30, but both took a beating at Griffin Park. Millwall were walloped 6-1, and Plymouth 3-0. Argyle equalled Southampton's record set in 1921-22 of only 4 defeats all season, one of the

Saints' few setbacks coming here when Elliot's penalty earned a 1-0 home win. There is another side to the coin however. In 1924-25 Merthyr finished bottom of the Third South with a new low of 21 points, only two of which were gained away (one in a 2-2 draw at Brentford). The luckless Welshman also beat Brentford 4-0 at home. The following season QPR equalled that points tally and finished bottom, their sole away success coming in a 2-1 victory here.

Brentford may not have lost the services of Sonko and Roget ahead of the transfer deadline last weekend as feared, but the duo's fragile arrangement with Brentford underlines what strange footballing times we are living in. It was good to see Roget sign a short-term contract which may keep him at Griffin Park until December - the former Stockport defender has been in outstanding form - but Sonko's reluctance to do the same means that we should expect to be seeing Arsenal's Ben Chorley strutting his stuff in a Bees shirt sooner rather than later.

Any loss would be a disappointment, with Brentford at the top of the league it would be great if the players wanted to stay and help build on the success already achieved, but with agents working overtime on securing big money deals elsewhere, that looks unlikely. Both players have been heavily touted by their agents in recent weeks (in fact Sonko has two agents, one French, one English working for him) and Millwall are believed to be favourites to land the Senegalese defenders longer-term signature. The reality is that Brentford have to adapt to a very strange transfer climate - where out of contract players come and go while they search for a permanent deal elsewhere. Unfortunately, in the clubs current financial situation, there is little chance of Brentford being prepared to match wages offers from other clubs and a high turnover of staff is almost inevitable.

As fans, perhaps all that we can hope for right now is that these mercenaries play well for the club while they are at Griffin Park and we can use them just as much as they use us. The situation is far from ideal though is it? Thanks to everyone who came down to support Beesotted v Hey Jude last Sunday, the quality of play may not have been up to much, but with almost £10K added to Bees United's coffers it proved to be the biggest single days fund-raiser for the trust. ROGET'S THESAURUS

It's ironic that amongst the scenes of joy for Reading's players and supporters on April 20th after winning promotion at Griffin Park, little did Leo Roget know that TW8 would be his next permanent port of call.

The Brentford centre back was on the bench for The Royals that day, having spent the last two months of the season on loan from Stockport County.

"I played the one game (a 0-0 draw at Swindon in February). By the time I went there I was mentally and physically tired after what went on at Stockport so I never trained to my potential. Having said that I enjoyed my time there and the way they were trying to do things."

Leo, born on the 1st August 1977, hails from East London and was educated at Valentines High School in Gants Hill. His first introduction to football however, came at the tender age of six. "I first went along to a training session for a team called Redbridge United and I played there for seven years, and when I was thirteen, I moved to Waltham Forest".

"I wrote for trials to six or seven different League clubs and I got a response off Southend and Cambridge. I played one game in the midweek and on a Sunday and they said they were interested and I was there for the next eight or nine years".

It's hard to believe Leo is just twenty-five, as he seemed to have been patrolling the defence at Roots Hall for a long time.

"I got into Southend's team in the First Division when I was eighteen, so I've been around for a little while. In all honesty, from when I was about twenty

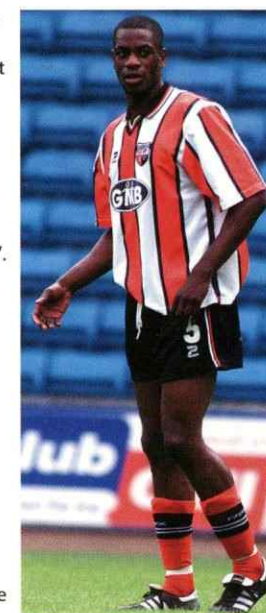
to about twenty-two, it was a little bit disappointing. I was out for nine months with a back injury and when I got back, they were in the Third Division. It took me a while to adapt to the Third Division, to get my head round it mentally".

His move to Stockport County in February 2001 was meant to be the kick-start to Leo's football career but things didn't turn out quite as planned and he left not long after Carlton Palmer's appointment as Manager.

Leo takes up the story "We had fourteen games left and we were third from bottom and in a relegation dogfight and managed to stay up with two or three games left. We were optimistic for the next season but things started badly. We were getting beaten by the odd goal - then the manager got sacked. At first when he (Carlton) came in, we got on well for about three weeks but after that it just got to a stage where I didn't want to be there."

In the summer, County paid Leo's contract up and he joined the many band of footballers looking for employment after the collapse of ITV Digital in May.

"There are so many players out of work. I've spoken to players that have played



thirty or forty games in the Second Division and they can't even find a Football League or Conference club. They're having to find a Ryman league or Doctor Martin League, which is not being disrespectful but if you've had a good season in Division Two, you should at least expect to be at a Football League club. It's a major reality check for football."

So the hunt for a club was on. "I trained for a couple of weeks at Southend, as its ten minutes from my doorstep plus I knew the manager from my playing days."

After this, Leo got a chance at Oxford United and played in five or six pre-season friendlies before Wally Downes gave him a last minute call up for the game at Millwall.

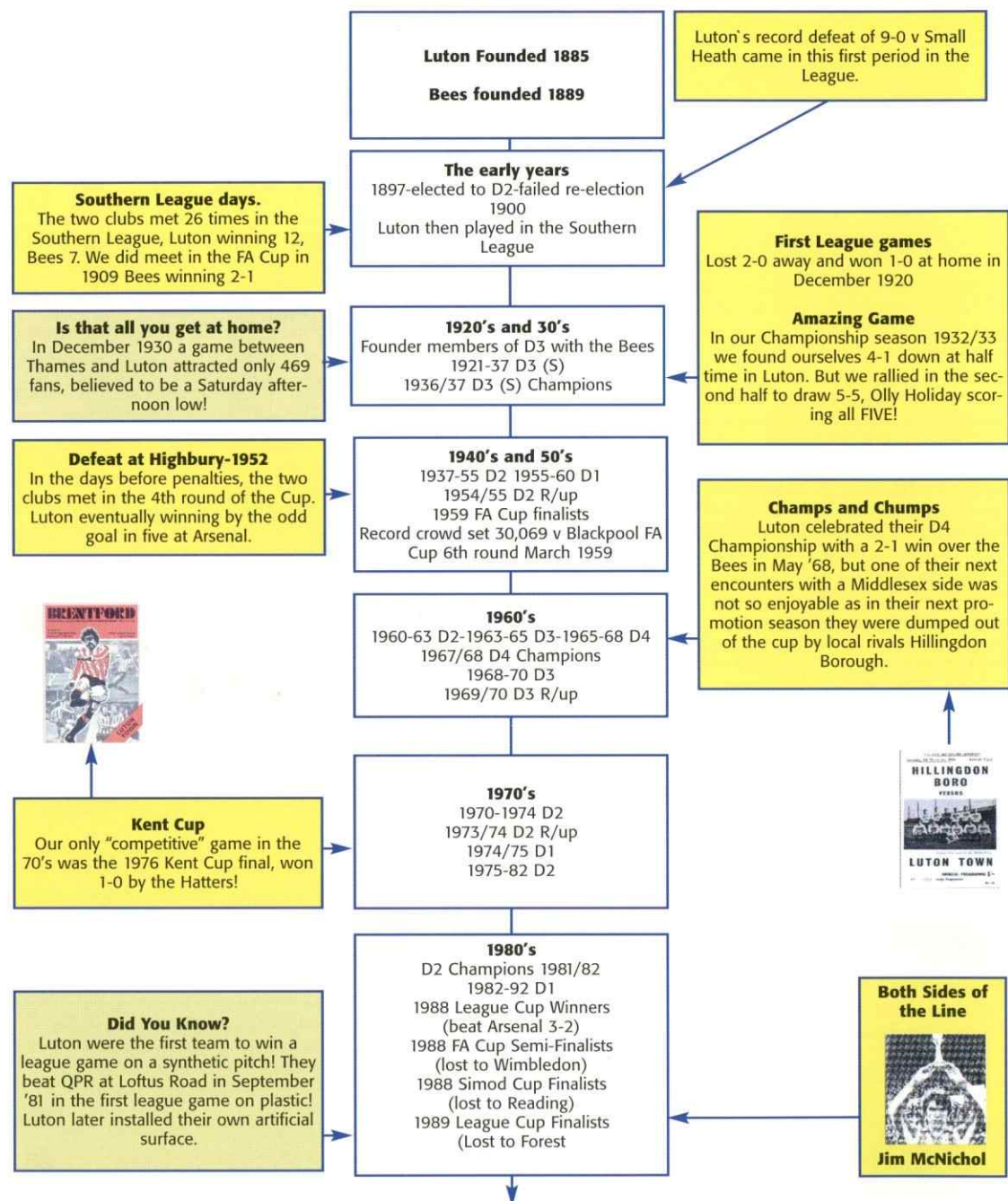
"I finished playing (for Oxford against Southampton) and at quarter past ten in the evening, I got a phone call from my agent saying that Brentford wanted me to play in a game tomorrow afternoon! I wasn't best prepared for the match but it was a case of going out and doing your best".

Since then, Leo has played in every game and he gave his impression on life at Griffin Park "I like it. I've got on with everybody. The results have been brilliant and I've never been top of the league in my life so it's a first for me".

TIME LINE - LUTON TOWN

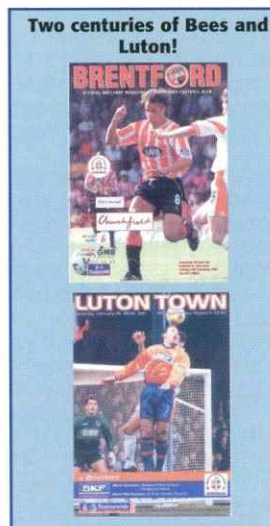

More important than any impressive facts and figures though is the simple truth that Bees Utd represent the best chance, perhaps the only chance, for the future of Brentford FC.

Who are Bees Utd?

Comprising a cross-section of Brentford supporters, with a wide range of talents, the Brentford Football Community Society Ltd, or Bees Utd, was set up under the Government's Supporters Direct initiative. Registered as an Industrial and Provident Society, which means they abide by the legal requirements established for an IPS, Bees Utd is a not-for-profit organisation. Bees United represent a fresh start in a relationship between supporters and Brentford FC. As Andy Burnham, Chair of Supporters Direct and MP for Leigh recently said: "Supporters' Trusts are the right idea at the right time. Fans everywhere are saying they are no longer prepared to be taken for granted. Many are ready to dig deep to help the clubs they love through these hard times. But, in return, they are rightly demanding a proper say in club affairs and seats on boards."

What are the aims of Bees United?

The initial aims were to raise funds for investment and, as result, gain at least one place on the board of Brentford FC. In January 2002, this latter aim was achieved when Bees Utd Chair, John McGlashan, was appointed to the Board. Ron Noades' company Altonwood, has agreed to Bees Utd taking on their majority shareholding in the club. Bees United's option to take control of the club, initially, was due to expire by the end of September 2002, Altonwood have agreed in principle, for this to be extended until September 2003.

What is Bees United's £1m appeal for?

Launched in the Summer the £1m appeal is to raise funds to reduce the current overdraft and implement a viable business plan. Brentford FC needs working capital for the next year; Ron Noades has capped the club's losses at close to their present level, which means the club could soon be in a position whereby it will not be able to pay its way. Money raised by Bees United will be used to invest in Brentford FC, either through the purchase of shares or providing secured loans to the club.

How can I help?

Firstly by joining Bees Utd. However, membership subscriptions are not in themselves sufficient to fulfill the society's aims. We welcome additional donations, either as one off gifts or as regular standing order donations. Standing order donations are particularly welcome as, by ensuring a regular source of income, they enable the society to plan and budget its activities.

How much has been raised?

By September 2002, the Trust had received, or were in receipt of pledges, approaching £300,000. While still some considerable way short of the initial target this does not in any way mean that the appeal has been a failure, it simply means that there are other options with, other partners, to pursue. The more money Bees Utd raises, the more options the Trust has.

What is Bees Utd's position on a new stadium

Central to Bees Utd's Business Plan is the recognition that turnstile and transfer revenue alone can no longer sustain a football club. Income needs to be derived from alternative sources, such as sponsorship deals and other local initiatives. We have to accept that the facilities at Griffin Park cannot cope from these extra demands. Bees United are seeking a partnership with

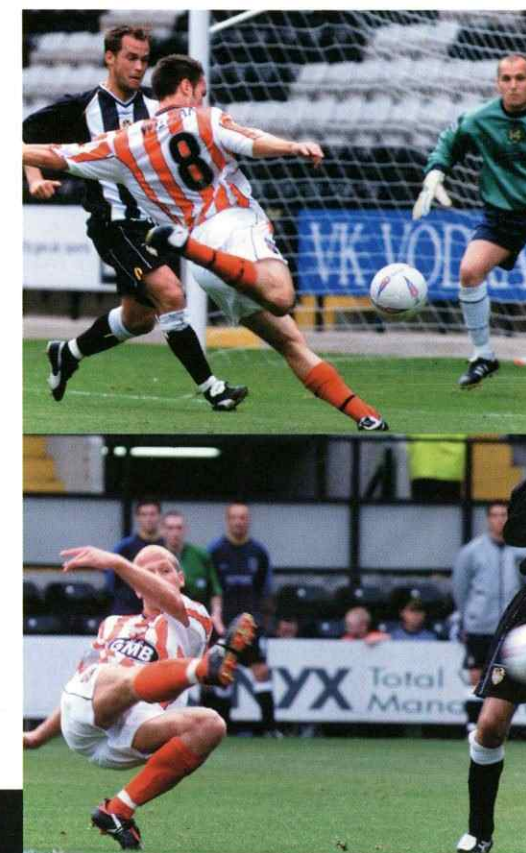

LUTON TOWN

Luton finally got their season off the ground last Saturday with a welcome 3-0 win over Chesterfield. The victory halted a disastrous return to the Second Division which had seen them lose their first four matches.

The opening day of the season saw them lose 3-2 at home to Peterborough, Barry Fry's side's only win so far, and that was followed by a 5-2 hammering at Blackpool three days later. They were then beaten 2-1 at Plymouth and the goals continued to rain in a week later as Barnsley won 3-2 at Kenilworth Road. They stopped the rot with a goalless draw at Cardiff on Bank Holiday Monday, although they slipped to the bottom of the table, before gaining their first three-point haul seven days ago. The results were a far cry from last season when they swept virtually all before them to earn an instant return to this Division by finishing second in Division Three – their first season in the basement since 1968. They were never lower than fifth in the table and gained promotion with four matches still to play following a 3-1 win at Swansea. Their 97 points were five less than Plymouth but a whopping 18 points ahead of third-placed Mansfield. Manager Joe Kinnear had promised at the start of the season that his side would win promotion after arriving too late to prevent relegation the

previous May. By the time he took over in mid-season the club were firmly entrenched in the bottom four and although they won their first three games under his leadership, and five of the first seven, it proved to be a false dawn as a run of 13 winless matches to end the season condemned them to the drop.

FIVE FASCINATING FACTS ABOUT LUTON TOWN

- 1 – The Hatters smashed four club records in winning promotion from Division Three last season. They claimed 30 League victories, with 12 in a row to beat their previous best run of nine in early 1977. The 15 wins on their travels also set a new club record while their 97 points beat their previous best under the three points for a win set-up of 88, achieved in winning the old Second Division title in 1981/82.
- 2 – Joe Payne etched himself into football's record books when Luton took on Bristol Rovers in Division Three (South) in April 1936. Payne, usually a wing-half, was shoved up front for the first time and responded with 10 goals – an individual record in English football. He showed it was no fluke by hitting an amazing 55 League goals the following season to lead Town to promotion. However Payne's efforts are not a British record as 51 years earlier, Arbroath's John Petrie struck 13 times in his side's record 36-0 Scottish Cup win over Bon Accord.
- 3 – Town appeared at Wembley

three times in four weeks back in 1988. Their first visit came on March 27 when they lost 4-1 to Reading in the Simod Cup final while three weeks later they were beaten 2-0 by Manchester United in the second phase of the League's Centenary Tournament. However just seven days later, on April 24, they were celebrating after two late goals helped them beat Arsenal 3-2 to win the Littlewoods Cup. They missed out on a fourth appearance when eventual winners Wimbledon beat them in the FA Cup semi-finals.

4 – Luton would have had the potential to boast the Second Division's highest attendances this season if former chairman David Kohler had got his way and moved them into the Kohlerdome in the late 1990s. Kohler wanted to build the club a brand new stadium with a capacity of up to 50-60,000 close to the M1 but the plan fell through. The Hatters are still hoping to move to another site close to the motorway, owned by current chairman Mike Watson-Challis, and have applied for planning permission.

5 – Luton were the first club in the south of England to embrace professionalism after paying players for the first time in 1891.

LAST TIME

Luton's last visit in May 2001 was unusually on a Thursday night and was our third game in six days as we caught up following our LDV Vans Trophy final appearance.

A bizarre night saw Town keeper Mark Ovendale sent off in the second minute for a foul and debutant Scott Ward save Lloyd Owusu's penalty with his first touch in League football. Steve Howard and Paul McLaren then put relegated Luton 2-0 up before Scott Partridge and Mark Williams earned us a point. Partridge was also on target in their previous visit in September 1999 as he and Darren Powell struck in the second half to earn us a 2-0 win.

THE MANAGER

Joe Kinnear took over as manager at Kenilworth Road in February last year. Before a brief spell at Oxford, Kinnear had been out of the game for almost two years since leaving Wimbledon after suffering a heart attack just before a game at Sheffield Wednesday. Kinnear was with The Dons for seven years and in that time inspired them to a sixth place finish in the Premiership and semi-final places in both the FA and League Cups. Within a year of him leaving, Wimbledon's 14-year stay in the top flight had ended with relegation. As a player Kinnear won 26 caps for the Republic of Ireland at right-back and spent 10 seasons of his career at Tottenham before finishing off with a short spell at Brighton.

THE PLAYERS

(Squad numbers in brackets) Luton are likely to field an unchanged 4-4-2 line-up following the win over Chesterfield. That means on loan Charlton goalkeeper **Ben Roberts (34)** (ex-Middlesbrough) will play with **Carl Emberson (16)** (ex-Millwall, Colchester and Walsall) on the bench. **Mark Ovendale (1)** (ex-Wisbech, Bournemouth and Northampton) is sidelined after a hip operation. Former junior **Emmerson Boyce (17)** and **Sol Davis (24)** (ex-Swindon) will fill the full-back roles with **Russell Perrett (5)** (ex-Lymington, Portsmouth and Cardiff) and **David Bayliss (22)** (ex-Rochdale) in central defence and former Bees loan player **Chris Coyne (12)** (ex-West Ham and Dundee) returning from suspension to sit on the bench alongside former Welsh international **Alan Neilson (3)** (ex-Newcastle, Southampton, Fulham and Grimsby).

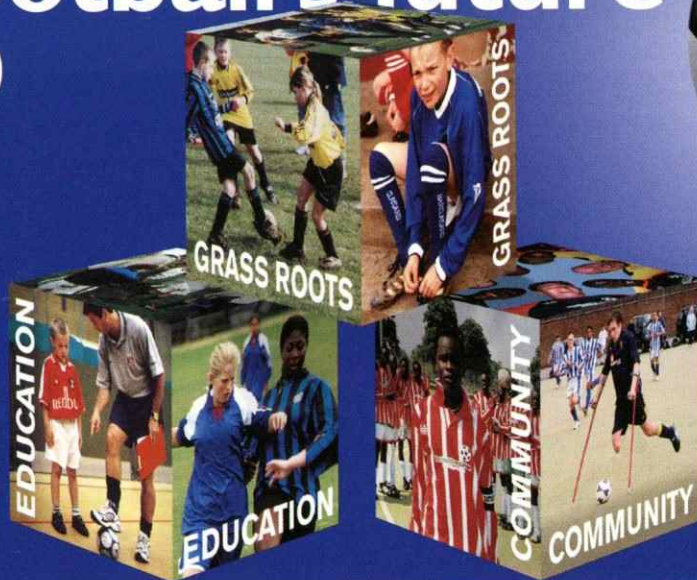

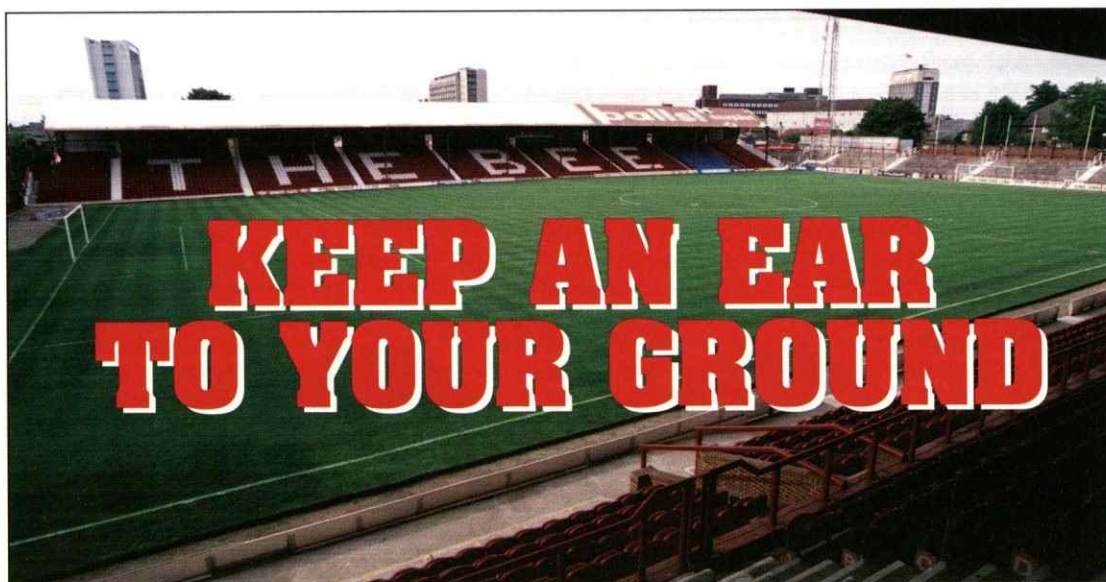

BEES CAST SPELL ON THE IMPS

GRAHAM HAYNES CONTINUES WITH HIS EXCELLENT SERIES IN WHICH HE SELECTS ONE MATCH FROM EACH SEASON AS HIS "MATCH TO REMEMBER"

A candidate for the most amazing Brentford win ever! Consider the evidence!

The Bees made a promising start to the season and by mid September were good value for their third place in the table.

Higher division Brighton had been outwitted in the League Cup and in the next round the Bees led Manchester United at Old Trafford only for two soft goals to hand them victory on a plate.

Unfortunately from them on the wheels parted company with the wagon Big Time, and as the season progressed John Docherty's men became locked in a battle to escape the re-election quicksands.

Meanwhile, Graham Taylor's Lincoln were carrying all before them and by the time they were due at Griffin Park in March, had promotion in the bag a mile clear of everyone else apart from Bill Dodgin's Northampton.

On form it was a banker away win as in 13 games Lincoln had been beaten just three times and were fast approaching a century of goals. That record contrasted starkly with Brentford's a distance behind, and into a miserable run which had seen them pick up only seven points from 13 games.

However, if you were clutching at straws there was a glimmer of hope in that the only success during this period was against Lincoln's running mates for the championship, Northampton.

But even then you would be hard pressed to forecast a Brentford win, especially as it came on the back of successive defeats by Scunthorpe destined to escape re-election on goal average, and Newport County, who were not so lucky. And to add to the air of gloom, Brentford's previous home game, a 0-0 bore draw with Cambridge United, was considered by George Sands reporting on his 1,111th consecutive Bees game for the Middlesex Chronicle, to have been the worst performance he had seen during a sequence which stretched back to December 1953!

Despite this, Lincoln's reputation helped draw in 5,380, an increase of almost 1,400 on the Cambridge game.

Brentford had striker Andy McCulloch, the Club's new record buy at £25,000 from Oxford United, making his home debut, but it was old stager Gordon Riddick, back from injury, who caught the eye.

Replacing Lawrence at the heart of the Bees' defence, he was in the

thick of the action until forced to limp off with eight minutes remaining. In the meantime he was equal to everything Lincoln's strikeforce, led by the prolific John Ward, threw at him and with the rest of the team playing out of their skins, a neutral observer could have been forgiven for thinking it was Lincoln and not Brentford in the red and white stripes.

Brentford attacked with gusto from the off and in the opening period Lincoln keeper Grotier saved well from Roger Cross and Leigh cleared McCulloch's goal bound effort off the line.

When the visitors did push forward they hit a brick wall in the shape of Riddick & Co and after Grotier once more denied the Bees with a breath-taking save from Scales, the goal which Brentford deserved duly arrived in the 32nd minute. The home fans had already warmed to McCulloch and his popularity jumped another notch when he was heavily involved in the move which was rounded off by Roger Cross.

The Lincoln defence seemed ill at ease as McCulloch chased into the box and centred for Bence whose lay off was touched on by Johnson for Cross to nod home.

Brentford were now a team inspired and although numerous chances went begging, Lincoln finished a well-beaten side.

As Graham Taylor observed afterwards: "3-0 to Brentford would have been a fairer reflection of play." So the Bees were now back on the straight and narrow? Unfortunately not!

Midweek they travelled to bottom of

the table Southport and, yes, you've guessed it, lost 2-0!

The Bees eventually finished 18th, just three points clear of the re-election zone (thank heavens for the Lincoln and Northampton wins), while Lincoln were not beaten again and romped off with the championship.

Under the three points for a win ruling the Imps would have notched 106 points, and their home record of P.23 W.21 D.2 L.0 F.71 A.15 is one that only Brentford in 1929/30 (all 21 home games won) have surpassed. Team: Priddy, Bence, Allen, Johnson, Riddick (Sharp), N Smith, Graham, Scales, McCulloch, Sweetzer, Cross.

Times were hard at Griffin Park in the mid seventies and the Bees never really looked capable of winning promotion from Division Four. But while it was hard labour for the regulars, for one fan it was welcome relief from a five-year jail sentence.

His name was Maurice O'Mahoney and in 1974 he had been convicted of armed robbery. To lessen his sentence he turned informer and put the finger on more than 100 criminals, helping to clear up London crimes

involving £2million in stolen cash and goods.

For his own protection O'Mahoney served his sentence in the relative safety of Chiswick Police Station and being a keen Bees' fan was allowed out on match days to attend games handcuffed to a detective.

CONSTABLE DAN

Brentford manager John Docherty was never afraid to give youth its chance and for the match at home to Watford on 15th November introduced Danis Salman as substitute for Gordon Riddick with ten minutes remaining. Danis was 15 years, 8 months and 3 days old at the time, the youngest ever Bee in League football.

The afternoon was significant for another reason as Chairman Dan Tana took the bull by the horns, so to speak, and performed a citizen's arrest on a Watford supporter causing offence with his foul and abusive language.

WALKER TAKES THE BISCUIT

Still on the youth front Bees regular midfielder 17 year old Nigel Smith earned a call up for the England Youth squad and associate schoolboy Paul Walker skipped England schoolboys to a 4-1 win over Wales at Wembley in March.

The previous month Docherty signed Scotland Under 18 schoolboy's captain David Oxley. Although he never made the first team, Walker did and was 15 years, 7 months, 28 days

when he made his debut in a League Cup-tie at Watford on 14th August 1976.

ROGER AND OUT

The month of December saw no less than five players depart for an early bath during games at Griffin Park. Against Rochdale, their keeper Mick Poole and Bees' Gordon Sweetzer and Terry Johnson failed to last the trip and the Yuletide visit of Reading ended ten a side after Cumming went early for a tackle on Roger Cross so late it almost missed the match. Cross was just that, retaliated, and joined Cumming on the long walk down the tunnel. Brentford beat Rochdale 3-0 and won the return as well (2-1), where the crowd of 894 is the lowest authenticated audience at a League game in which Brentford have been involved. We were definitely Rochdale's bogey team as it took our record against them to played 16, won 10, drawn 6.

Two classic strikes from Rowan Vine and protracted goal celebrations following a Mark McCammon goal were sufficient to ease the Bees through against Swindon this afternoon, and in doing so take them to the top of the table.

Once again the Bees were unchanged, and they took the game to Swindon direct from the start. Stephen Hunt won a free kick to the right of the area after just ninety seconds which was blocked. But Jay Smith picked up the clearance, played wide to Hunt who saw his rising shot fly just wide of the post.

In the fifth minute Mark McCammon did well to take the ball and play through for Hunt. The ball was played on via Jay Smith to Rowan Vine who underhit his shot straight at the keeper. But two minutes later he was back with a vengeance. Michael Dobson played his centre in to Rowan just inside the area. He took control and in turning on the spot flashed a thunderbolt of a shot into the top left-hand corner of the net. McCammon had half a chance in the



ninth minute but the keeper gathered, while a minute later a terrific centre from Hunt was dropped by the keeper but Kevin O'Connor was wrong footed to seize on the half chance.

The Bees were running rampant at this stage and in the 14th minute came a goal



of the highest quality. Man of the Match Mark McCammon won the ball down by the touchline and, in managing to hold off allcomers, he weaved the ball through to Dobbo who drilled in a peach of a centre which Vine connected with perfectly and sent a brilliant header into the top right hand corner of the net...a goal of the highest vintage.

But two minutes later, the visitors most dangerous player, Jimmy Davis (on loan from Manchester United), ran strong and hard at the Bees defence and on entering the area flashed his shot past Paul Smith into the far corner of the net.

This led to the Bees withstanding a fair amount of pressure.

However in the 21st minute an excellent free kick from Hunt just eluded Dobbo's dipping head at the near post.

Seven minutes later and a poor clearance by the Town defence fell straight to Hunt who played on to Vine whose shot was blocked. The ball ran loose to

Jay Smith who in turn played wide to Dobbo. The skipper whipped in another excellent centre which Mark McCammon headed just wide of the target.

Within the minute it was O'Connor's turn to send over an inch perfect centre which Vine headed just wide of the target.

Swindon then reasserted themselves in the main through Davis who first, in the 34th minute, progressed down the right flank before centring for Sam Parkin who headed wide of a gaping target. A minute later Davis bamboozled three Bees defenders in the area before sending his shot across the face of the goal.

Swindon now had the bit between their teeth, but as has been obvious in each of their performances this season, the Bees do not know when to lie down and having taken the best that the visitor's could offer they started to get right back into the game. With Rowan Vine and Mark McCammon getting a better understanding each game that they play, a goal always looked likely.

In the 54th minute another wayward clearance was picked up by Eddie

Hutchinson who played the ball to the unmarked O'Connor. But Kevin rushed his shot and ballooned the ball over the bar.

The game went a bit off the boil for a period before, in the 70th minute Leo Roget's powerfully struck header, from Dobbo's centre. Swindon decided to bring on Danny Invincible a minute later to bolster their strikeforce.

With 14 minutes remaining Davis was on the rampage again when he took the ball from deep before laying off for David Duke who looked to go clear in the area. But he hadn't bargained on the superbly timed tackle off Matt Somner who seemingly came from nowhere to avert the danger.

Within two minutes the Bees were to



capitalise on the fact that their lead had not been wiped out by extending their goal difference still further. It started with a clearance by Bart Griemink, Leo Roget headed the ball back into the Town half and with Eddie Hutchinson hassling for the ball Stefani Miglioranzi played the ball back towards Andrew Gurney. But the visitors number 6 had not reckoned on Mark McCammon homing in on him, and as he did he took control of it and ran for goal. With Griemink coming out to narrow the angle, Mark slipped the ball through his legs and into the back of his net, and the crowd went wild.

The Bees had chances to extend their lead even further in the time remaining with both Rowan Vine missing a chance to complete his hat trick, and Leon Constantine a late substitute for Mark McCammon missing a chance in the 88th minute.

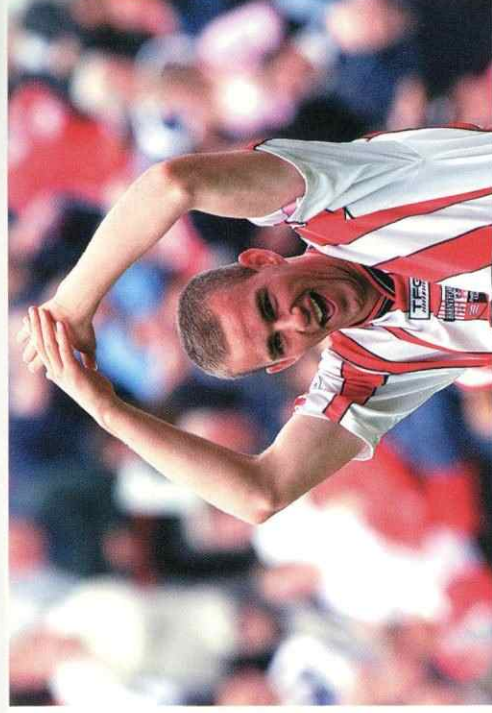

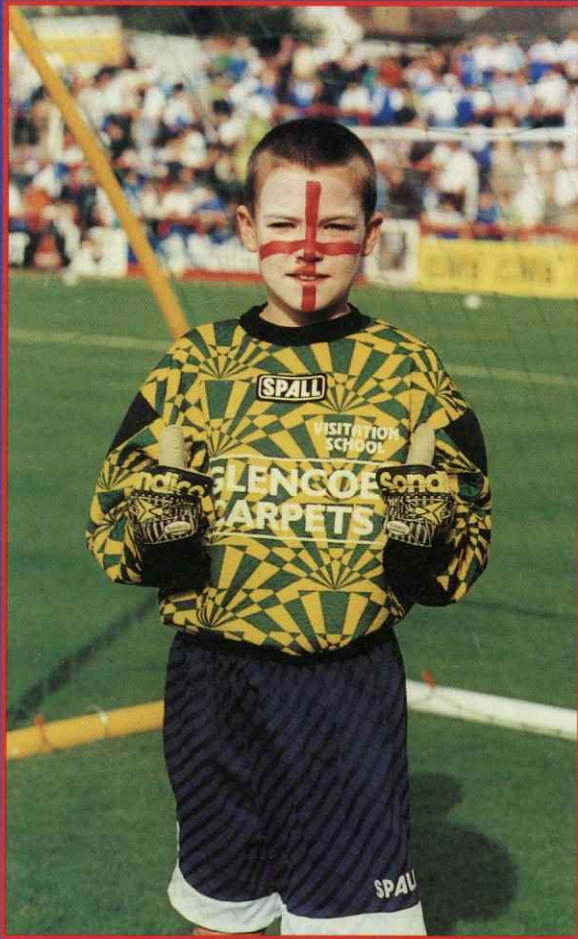
