THE BOSS

Tuesday's result at QPR was our most disappointing of the season.

We did actually control the game for long periods but at times we found it difficult to cope with their height and pace at set plays.

The loss of Eddie Youds was the biggest blow which forced us to re-shape our back four. It was a major disappointment, again, to witness our inability to take the chances we created.

It had been a similar story at Northampton where we created some good openings but failed to take any of them. On that occasion though we defended very well and came away with one point. Clearly we must improve in front of goal and start scoring regularly if we are to climb up the league table. Obviously, at the time of writing these notes, we look as if we will be going into today's game without our three top central defenders – Youds, Moses and Clarke. So it may provide another opportunity for young Nat Brown to gain some more vital experience at this level. He was in fine form on his debut at Northampton however, although his game in open play at QPR was top class he learned some valuable lessons on what is required of him in set play situations. He is among a number of very good young players we have at this club and that is great for the future. We need to be patient and understanding that they all need time to build their experience and they deserve every encouragement. Apart from Eddie Youds we also have a number of other injury problems at present. Martin Smith has had an injection in his hamstring, which will hopefully alleviate

his problem. Andy Booth was back in action as a substitute in midweek and perhaps he will be ready to start the game this afternoon.

I'd like to welcome Joe Kinnear and everyone from Luton. They also lost on Tuesday and will be keen to get back to winning ways, just like ourselves.

I'd like to thank the Towns fans for their first class support again and I know you'll get behind us again today.

FROM THE BOARDROOM



Geoff Headey - Director

The success and potential of our Academy appears to be the flavour of the month. Let me apologise at the outset if you think I'm falling into the trap of waxing too lyrical about the Academy.

I should add though that youth development has been a particular interest of mine for many years. Howard Wilkinson should be applauded for recognising that the Academy structure was vital for football in this country.

In the interest of clarity I would point out that the Academy has responsibility for boys in the age range U9's to U19's, and not as some people think simply the flagship U19 scholars.

This is the fifth season of Academy soccer and Huddersfield Town's fourth year as part of it. We can see the success stories for the club now in the first team. But that is only part of the story.

The education and welfare of the boys is as vital a part of the Academy as the soccer – perhaps more so. Not every boy will become a professional player and for those who don't the Academy tries to ensure

they are well rounded individuals with qualifications and experience to enable them to make a living outside the game.

The boys now coming through here at Town are a credit to Gerry Murphy, his coaches and indeed all the Academy staff. In light of the above points perhaps special mention should be made to Anne Sykes who is our Education and Welfare Officer who as a qualified teacher is admirably suited to the post.

But there is more to life than football and parents realise that if their sons didn't go on to be footballers they will have the foundation they need to succeed in other areas of employment.

It is to the great credit of this club that 18 of the 32 players featured in our pre-season team picture are products of our own youth policy – that includes the likes of Andy Booth, Simon Baldry, Thomas

Heary and Jonathan Dyson from the pre-Academy years.

I believe reserve team football would benefit from becoming an under 21 league, with teams also able to play older players who are recovering from injury. Doing our level best to produce home grown talent is certainly the way forward for this club and, I venture to suggest, the way forward too for England. We won't develop a truly outstanding national team if sides like Chelsea and Arsenal continue to buy so many overseas players, not just at first team level but also in their Academies.

Running a successful Academy is not a cheap option for Huddersfield Town – far from it. It demands a big financial commitment and a great deal of hard work and dedication. We are beginning to reap the benefits and hopefully will do so for many years to come.

Their second goal was a great strike and was a real sickener for us. We were matching them in open play but we got caught at set pieces.



September 21st

With only four victories in 16 matches September 21st is not a good day in Town's history!

It's about time that negative statistic - with seven defeats and five draws was redressed a little, starting today!

1912

The first league game on this date was played at the Molineux ground in a Division Two game which Wolves won by two goals without reply in front of 12,000 fans.

1935

The largest attendance to gather for a Town game on this date, 31,043 at Goodison Park. Town beat Everton 3-1 with goals being scored by Jimmy Richardson (2) and Alf Lythgoe.

1965

Our last win on September 21st was at Gigg Lane, Bury who failed to reply to scores by Kevin McHale and Mike O'Grady in front of a 5,629 Football League Cup crowd.

1993

Town's highest home defeat in recent years was in the Coca-Cola (League) Cup second round tie at Leeds Road against

Arsenal. After being walloped 0-5 at home the Terriers gained some respectability in the second leg with a 1-1 draw at Highbury.



ELSEWHERE IN THE WORLD ON SEPTEMBER 21st

1915

Stonehenge, one of the world's most famous ancient monuments, was purchased at auction for £6,600 by a Mr C H Chubb.

1933

President Roosevelt orders 75 million dollars to be spent on clothing and feeding the unemployed during the winter.

1956

Suez talks in London end with agreement on setting up a Canal Users' Association, leading to petrol coming off ration.!

1975

Crowd behaviour at league football matches shows improvement, not one arrest on a day with a full programme.

Anyone who saw Nat Brown's debut at Northampton last Saturday would have assumed he had played as a centre-half for most of his 21 years.

But the Sheffield born player has, until recently, tried to make a name for himself as a striker. Manager Mick Wadsworth rated Nat's performance as a 9 out of 10 and also praised the youngster's partner at the back, Eddie Youds.

Nat's performance in defence this season for the reserves have also been excellent - once more helped by playing alongside the highly experienced Jonathan Dyson. "The manager told me that if I kept working hard and showed the right attitude I'd get my opportunity," said Nat. "The injury to Adie Moses gave me that chance and I just want to make the most of it.

A couple of days before the Northampton game the reserves played a friendly against Leeds and I was up against Michael Bridges. We lost 3-1 but I thought I did well and I was just hoping I'd be involved at Northampton.

Mick Wadsworth told me I'd be playing on Friday and I was determined to enjoy the experience."

Although the debutant came under some early pressure he maintained

his composure and had a superb game. "I told myself not to get ruffled and as the game went on I got more and more confident. It was a shame we didn't get all three points but it was still great to get another clean sheet and come away with one point."

Nat was also quick to sing the praises of Eddie Youds. "He's a good talker and a very good player. It was great to make my debut alongside someone like him who has played at the very highest level. His positional play is brilliant and I'm determined to learn as much as I can from him and people like Jonathan Dyson and Adie Moses."

Manager Wadsworth is in no doubt that central defence is Nat's best position. He said, "Nat deserves a lot of praise because he was excellent. He'd never played in the first team before and he hasn't played that many reserve matches as a centre-half, but that is his position. He has three vital attributes - great pace, strength in the air and quality on the ball. He also showed great composure and that's a vital quality for any defender. If he continues to work



OUR ACADEMY



Huddersfield Town 0 Manchester City 1

This was the Academy side's first defeat of the season but it was an unfortunate result after a good performance which had deserved at least a draw. Town certainly had much the better of the first half but failed to make the most of the openings their attractive build-up play created. Academy Director Gerry Murphy described it as a "fantastic" game, which Town looked well on top for long periods.

In the first 45 minutes Andy Holdsworth's raids down the right caused City's defence problems and it was from one of Holdsworth's crosses in the 15th minute that Town might have taken the lead. Anthony Lloyd met the ball with his head at the far post

but, with the goalkeeper beaten, the goalbound effort struck a City defender on the back of the head just in front of the line.

Then, on 21 minutes, Holdsworth's brilliant strike was kept out by a superb fingertip save by the City keeper. Town's neat passing kept them on top and the only scare before half-time came when the visitors Irish international winger Flood forced Andy Jeffrey into two saves.

Flood was to prove the match winner in the 61st minute. Town lost possession on the half-way line and when City broke down the flank they produced an excellent cross which Flood hit home.

The goal changed the cause of the game as City gained in confidence and Town struggled to match their first-half style.

Lee Padgett came desperately close to forcing an equaliser but saw his shot, following a corner, strike the post.

Greg Kelly

This is a big year for Huddersfield born Greg Kelly. The versatile attacker is in his third Academy season and hoping to win a professional contract. Greg, a former pupil of Salendine Nook High School who used to play for the YMCA, first joined the Terriers when he was 11. But after three years with the centre of excellence he was told he wouldn't be offered a schoolboy contract and returned to the YMCA. His second chance came when he was invited back for trials when he was 15 and this time he made a big enough impression to be offered terms.

A naturally left-sided player he can play anywhere on that flank, as a wing back, midfielder or attacker. As a youngster he had been a striker and during pre-season he was encouraged to play in the front role again. He scored a couple of goals in the build up games but then got injured in a friendly against Brighouse Town. "At first I thought I had broken my ankle but fortunately it turned out to be ligament damage," he said. He hasn't played since but plans to return to training this week with a view to regaining a regular place in the Academy line-up as soon as possible.

Greg, who will be 19 next month, says his best assets are his pace and his ability to put defenders under pressure. He has been likened in style to Ryan Giggs and is desperately keen to get back into action. "I realise that this is an important season for me. After I'm fully fit again I want to push for a place in the reserves," he added. "It's great seeing Nathan Clarke, Paul Scott, Jon Stead and Jon Worthington being given a chance to prove themselves in the first team. It's given all the young players at the club a great lift knowing that the door is open if you can prove your ability."

Among Town's encouraging performers was 16-year-old attacker Gavin Huxall who came on as a substitute to make his debut.

Latest injury news: Greg Kelly is almost recovered from his ankle injury. Adnan Ahmed hopes to be back before the end of next month after his stress fracture. Michael Tunnacliffe will soon be back in action, Joe Washington has had key-hole surgery and will be out for two more months and John McAliskey hopes to resume training after his operation in November.



Summed up by one parent "I was extremely impressed at the standard and achievement all the children attained in such a short time".



Footie Fest at the Study Centre

IN TOWN TODAY LUTON TOWN

The Hatters are now appearing more settled in Division Two after making a poor start to the season, following last year's promotion.

They opened the new campaign with a 3-2 home defeat at the hands of Peterborough and lost their first away game 5-2 at Blackpool. Two more defeats followed, 2-1 at Plymouth and 3-2 against Barnsley at Kenilworth Road. That left Joe Kinnear's side pointless and next to bottom of the table.

They collected their first point on August Bank Holiday with a creditable 0-0 draw at Cardiff, though they slipped to bottom. They finished August with their first win 3-0 at home to Chesterfield and began September with another impressive away draw 0-0 at Brentford.

A 2-1 success at neighbours Watford in the Worthington Cup was followed last weekend with a 2-2 home draw with Notts County. Trailing 2-0 with 12 minutes remaining they pulled back with goals from Perrett and Howard to extend their unbeaten run to 5 games.

This season's goalscorers – Howard 5, Crowe 2, Perrett 2, Spring 2, Brkovic 1, Nicholls 1 and Thorpe 1.

Last season was a roller coaster success for Joe Kinnear's side. They were never out of the top 5 and clinched promotion with four games to spare. In the early part of the year they led the Division 3 table on four separate occasions.

When they lost at home to Scunthorpe in mid-February they were 3rd, but then embarked on a truly remarkable run which saw them win 13 and draw one of their final 14 games.

That solitary draw came in their final home game against Macclesfield.

The 13 wins saw them score 35 goals and concede only 6 – three of them in one match – a 5-3 home victory over Mansfield. Promotion was clinched at the end of March when they won 3-1 at Swansea.

Last season's leading marksmen were Howard 24, Crowe 15 and Taylor 11.

HUDDERSFIELD 1 LUTON TOWN 0

Today's visit to the McAlpine Stadium by Luton Town will be their first for six and a half years since Lennie Lawrence last brought his Hatters side for a First Division fixture in the Spring of 1996.

Brian Horton's Terriers had recently slipped to 6th, having been beaten 2-3 at leaders Derby County in their last outing, but at the time Luton were rather more concerned with the opposite end of the table. Held to a 0-0 home draw by Crystal Palace the previous Saturday they stood 20th in the division and only a point away from the drop zone. Avoiding defeat was therefore crucial to both sides and a tight, occasionally scrappy, match watched by a crowd of 11,950 ensued.

Making his debut in Town colours on the right wing was new signing Rob Edwards from Crewe Alexandra, whilst over on the left wing Ben Thornley, on loan from Manchester United, was making only his third appearance for the Terriers. Both players contributed a string of crosses aimed at Booth and Jepson

as Huddersfield created most of the chances, but Luton countered with some dangerous breaks which had the home defenders frequently in action. With Booth uncharacteristically pulling two relatively easy chances wide of the mark, and with Makel having an off day, the home fans were becoming frustrated as the game progressed to a goalless half-time. Surely the second half would bring the breakthrough?

On 57 minutes it was Luton though who almost snatched the lead when Oakes sent Guentchev racing down the middle only for Francis to rush out and bravely smother the Bulgarian international's effort. Francis was the hero again on 70 minutes when a tremendous reaction save beat out Oldfield's fierce volley, but five minutes later the Terriers went ahead with what was to prove the decisive

goal. Thornley found Jepson out on the left and 'Rocket Ron' ran down the wing before sending over a long cross to the far side of the penalty area. Debut man Edwards was there waiting and he flicked the ball up, turned on the proverbial sixpence, and smashed a low volley into the opposite corner of the net to give Huddersfield a 1-0 victory.


- The Bedfordshire club can trace their family tree back to April 1885 when two local outfits, Luton Town Wanderers and a works team known as Excelsior FC, amalgamated to form Luton Town FC. They joined the Football League Second Division in 1897 but then dropped out in 1900 after failing re-election. The 'Hatters' finally returned to the League in 1920 as one of the original members of the new Third Division.

- In April 1936 the Hatters thrashed Bristol Rovers 12-0 in a Third Division (South) fixture during which their centre-forward Joe Payne scored a record-breaking ten goals. What was particularly amazing was the fact that he was merely the club's third choice centre-forward and only played that day due to an injury crisis! The

following season, not surprisingly now installed as the regular N°9, he hit a club record 55 League goals and, before joining Chelsea in 1938, had scored an incredible total of 82 goals in only 72 League games for Luton.

- Following crowd trouble the previous season Luton took the drastic step of banning all visiting supporters from Kenilworth Road for the 1986/87 campaign. The move led to them being forced to withdraw from the Littlewoods League Cup although they were permitted to continue the scheme for FA Cup matches. Not surprisingly their average home League gate fell to just 10,206 but the Hatters enjoyed a successful season on the pitch and finished a club record high of 7th in the old First Division.

- Despite their long histories the two Towns of Huddersfield and Luton didn't meet in a first class match until 11th October 1952 when the Yorkshire club enjoyed a 3-0 success at Leeds Road in the Second Division. Jimmy Watson, Jimmy Glazzard and Alistair Gunn were the men on target before a good crowd of 26,345. For the return match on 28th February 1953 over 25,000 were present at Kenilworth Road to see Huddersfield again take the points winning 2-0 with goals from the prolific Glazzard and also Roy Shiner. Of the 16 League and FA Cup matches played between the clubs Luton though hold the advantage having won 8 games to Huddersfield's 6 and scoring 24 goals against 22.



LUTON TOWN PENPICS

Goalkeepers

First choice keeper **MARK OVENDALE**, nicknamed 'Gloves', was signed from Bournemouth for £450,000 having played 111 times for the Cherries and keeping 40 clean sheets. He had arrived at Dean Court from Barry Town in 1998 for a modest £30,000 fee.

Big and brave **CARL EMBERSON** arrived from Walsall in July last year, on his 28th birthday. He was previously with Millwall and Colchester.

BEN ROBERTS has come to Luton for a second loan spell from Charlton following an injury to Mark Ovendale. He started his career at Middlesbrough and has played on loan for a string of clubs including Hartlepool, Wycombe, Bradford, Millwall and Reading.

16-year-old **DEAN BRILL** is still waiting for a call up to first team duty.

Defenders

Versatile **AARON SKELTON** is in his second spell with the Hatters. He was a trainee at Luton and spent five years with the club before being sold to Colchester. At Layer Road he was a player of the year winner and played a total of 144 games in four seasons. He became Joe Kinnear's first signing at Kenilworth Road when he returned a year ago. He was hampered by injuries last season but his ability to play in midfield, in central defence or at full back makes him a vital member of the squad.

Welsh defender **ALAN NEILSON** was signed in February and has vast experience in the top flights having played for Newcastle, Scunthorpe and Fulham.

Central defender **RUSSELL PERRETT** began his career at Portsmouth and moved to Cardiff before moving on a free transfer to Luton. He played 39 times in last year's promotion season.

MARVIN JOHNSON is the longest serving player at Kenilworth Road – 14 years with the club he joined as a schoolboy. The former skipper is now taking coaching courses in a bid to stay in the game when his playing days finally end.

Australian **CHRIS COYNE** is a centre half signed from Dundee. He won eight under 23 caps for his country and has also played for West Ham, Brentford and Southend.

EMMERSON BOYCE is a local product, who despite all the manager's defensive signings, played 38 times last season. He can play at right back or in central defence.



DAVID BAYLISS arrived from Rochdale in December but was sent off in a game against his old club. He then struggled to regain a place in the starting line-up. Welsh under 21 cap **IAN HILLIER** arrived in the summer of last year from Tottenham, initially on loan.

He can play at right back, in central defence and even performed as an emergency striker.

SOL DAVIS is a new arrival from Swindon. The left-back's transfer fee is to be settled by a tribunal.

Ex Wimbledon favourite **ALAN KIMBLE**, now 36, has over 500 league games behind him – most in the Premiership with the Dons. The former Charlton junior also played for Exeter and Cambridge.

ROBERT GILLMAN is a former captain of Luton's youth team. The young centre half got his senior debut in last year's LDV Vans Trophy game against Dagenham and Redbridge.

17-year-old Luton born full back **KEVIN FULEY** was named the club's young player of the year last season and is a regular in the reserves.

Midfielders

Talented and competitive **MATTHEW SPRING** might have joined West Brom in the summer but elected in the end to sign a new two year deal with Luton. He netted six goals in last season's promotion campaign but was disappointed, having bet his dad that he would score ten! Just 17 when he made his league debut five years ago he has now played over 200 games.

ADRIAN FORBES, who normally plays wide on the right, is a former England youth international. Signed for £60,000 from Norwich, for whom he played 122 times, he began as a


trainee at Millwall,

KEVIN NICHOLLS, the skipper of the side, was described by boss Joe Kinnear as "the life and soul of the club". He was bought from Wigan for £150,000 and plays in a central holding role, winning the ball and setting up attacks. He started at Charlton and also had a long spell with Brighton.

Northern Ireland international **STEVE ROBINSON** arrived this summer from Preston for £50,000. The Lancashire club had previously paid Bournemouth £350,000 for his services – he scored 62 goals in 288 games for the Cherries. He began his career with Tottenham where he played two Premiership games.

Croatian **AHMET BRKOVIC** played 82 times for Leyton Orient and arrived last October, initially on a three month contract. He can perform anywhere across the midfield.

PETER HOLMES has struggled to gain a regular place in the side but never lets the team down. He netted a crucial goal in the 3-1 win at Swansea which clinched promotion last year.



PAUL HUGHES has played in the top flight for Chelsea and Southampton who despite injuries played 23

times in Luton's promotion season. He has also played on loan for Stockport, Norwich and Crewe.

LEE MANSELL is a right-sided player who has failed to win a regular place in the starting line-up.

MICHAEL LEARY is a graduate of the club's youth system.

STEPHEN O'LEARY, aged 17, has skippered the club's youth side and has represented the Republic of Ireland at various age groups.

Strikers

TONY THORPE arrived on a free transfer from Leicester and in one prolific season grabbed over 30 goals for Luton. He moved to Fulham for £800,000 but returned to Luton in a series of loan spells.



CARL GRIFFITHS was a £65,000 purchase from Leyton Orient at the start of last season. He netted seven

goals early in the campaign but the former Welsh under 21 international then sustained a broken leg. Once bought by Manchester City for a million pounds, he has also played for Shrewsbury, Portsmouth, Peterborough, Wrexham and Port Vale.

ANDREW FOTIADIS has been desperately unlucky with injuries, which have restricted him to 106 league appearances in six years at Kenilworth Road. He played for England at schoolboy and under 18 level.



DEAN CROWE arrived last September, initially on loan from Stoke City. He netted four goals in six matches

prompting Luton to sign him permanently.

STEVE HOWARD struggled to win over the Luton fans when he first arrived from Northampton 18 months ago. Now he has become a regular scorer and netted his latest goal last week against Notts County.

JAMES OSBORN joined the club when he was 12 and now captains Luton's youth side.



Footie Fest

(FA Cup 4th Round)
January 30th 1960

Town were involved in some dramatic cup-ties in the 1950's and early 1960's and none more so than this bitter defeat by the previous season's beaten finalists. Having beaten West Ham 5-1 in an amazing replayed match the previous round in the London snow, Town were once again paired with a top-flight club in the Hatters.

A covering of snow made playing conditions difficult as the grip of winter gave the Leeds Road groundstaff a hard task to clear the lines and get the pitch playable.

After end-to-end play Town gained the initiative and should have been well ahead by the half hour with the brilliant Law prompting but, Luton keeper Ron Baynham kept the scoresheet blank at half-time.

Kevin McHale was also in form and when play resumed he set up Massie but the striker lost his footing in the treacherous conditions when a goal seemed certain. According to the

Examiner's 'Longfellow' 'Luton's luck held out in amazing fashion'. On several occasions Law and McHale went close as Luton's defence held out more by luck than management.

With the fog descending (this was Leeds Road's last pre-floodlit season) it was difficult to see the far touchline and with melting snow the conditions were deteriorating quickly.

Just when the tie seemed to be heading for a replay, Luton snatched a dramatic late winner in one of their rare forays into the Huddersfield penalty box. With 88 minutes on the clock Gregory, the Luton left winger forced the ball past goalkeeper Ray Wood after a goalmouth scramble.

In the fifth round Luton Succumbed 1-4 to Wolves, the eventual cup winners of 1960, at Kenilworth Road. A similar result would have been a fair reflection of that dramatic game at Leeds Road.


