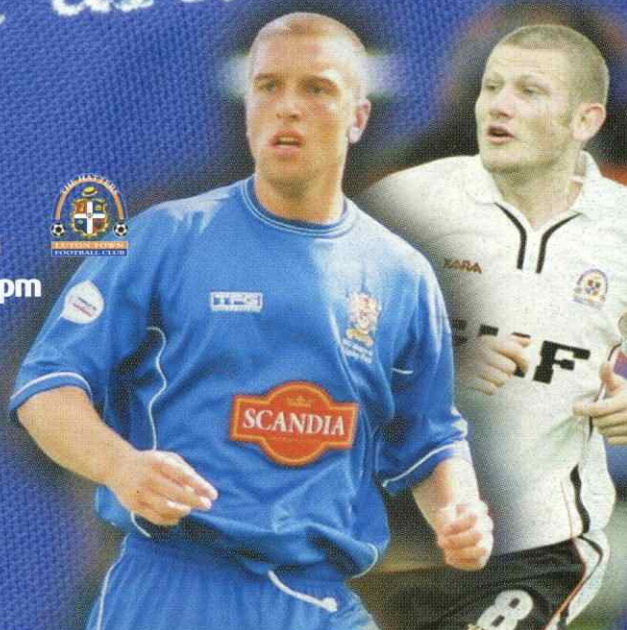

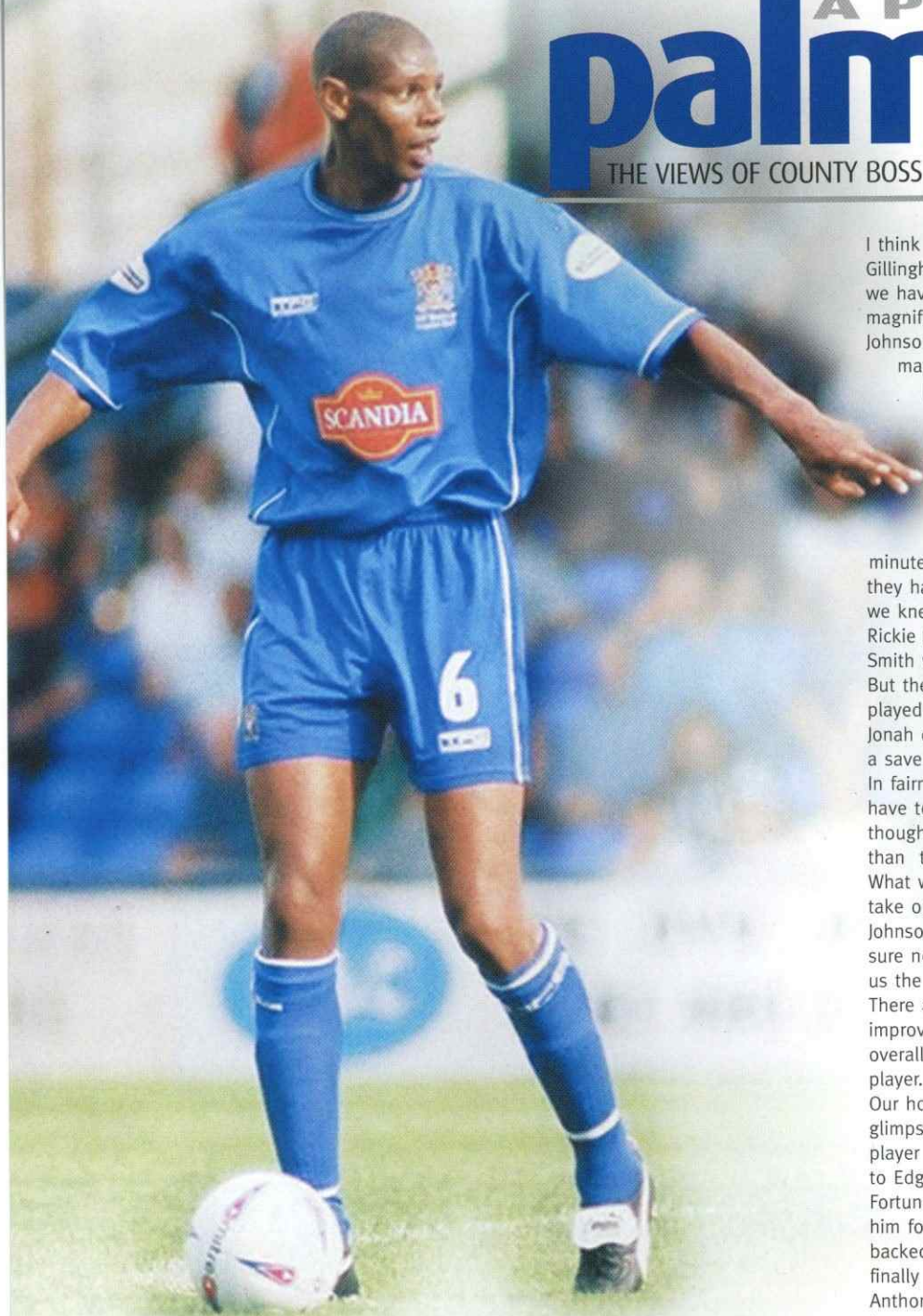

THE VIEWS OF COUNTY BOSS CARLTON PALMER



I think the game against Gillingham showed just how far we have come. It needed a magnificent strike from Tommy Johnson to beat us, but he's made his living doing that.

Jim and Lee both apologised to me afterwards but I told them there was no need to because it was a wonder goal.

I thought over the 90 minutes we just shaded it. Sure, they had a lot of possession but we knew that it we played Rickie Lambert Gills' skipper Paul Smith would get on the ball. But they never hurt us. They played backwards or square and Jonah didn't really have to make a save.

In fairness their 'keeper didn't have to make a save either but I thought we put in better crosses than them.

What we didn't do, though, was take our half chances like Johnson did. If we had then I'm sure no one could have denied us the victory.

There are still things we need to improve on, I know that, but overall I was proud of each player.

Our home fans got their first glimpse of Anthony Tonkin, a player I've been trying to bring to Edgeley Park for a long time. Fortunately, and I'd like to thank him for that, the chairman has backed my judgement and we've finally got our man.

Anthony will only get better and become a major player for Stockport County.

Rickie Lambert also got his chance and, against a First Division side, showed what a talent he is. We need to get him fitter but I'm more convinced than ever now that he can play at a higher level.

I was pleased with the way we started on Tuesday. I've brought a new fitness coach in and we talked to the players about what we needed to change. Perhaps I've forgotten that young lads who were reserve team players last season are now in the first team. That's a big change for them mentally. I've been in the game

20 years and I know what I need to do to be ready for the start of the game. Maybe the kids don't know what they need to do to prepare mentally. They've got to get used to being first-team regulars, knowing that they are first-team players and deal with that mental pressure. We made the warm up a little sharper and I think it worked. I thought that we started very well and had they not scored the goal at the time they did then maybe the game would have been different.

I was so pleased that Jon got off the mark on Tuesday. People forget that he is still only 19 but he's doing a great job and I can tell you he's going to be a really good player.

Hopefully Jon can go on and score a few more now because over the next few weeks he's going to have people breathing down his neck.

Ben Burgess may play in the next reserve game and Alby's back jogging as well so there's going to be competition up front.

I also think that we have got good competition for places throughout the squad. Rob Clare was a little sore on Tuesday so I didn't risk him. Jim Goodwin switched to centre-back, which is his position, for the first time

and he did very well.

It means that I've got a selection headache today but I'm not complaining about that. I've told the players that we should have six more points on the board with a game in hand but we haven't.

So we've just got to keep going but what we can't do is come out today and let ourselves down.

We have four home games in the league this month, which gives us a great opportunity to pick up points and climb the table.

Luton, after a poor start to the season, are now just behind us and have won their last two games without conceding a goal. Like us they were knocked out of the Worthington Cup in midweek so I'm sure they'll be working doubly hard to extend a run that has seen them lose just one Second Division game in seven.

Joe Kinnear did a great job leading them out of Division Three last season and they were widely tipped to push for a play-off place this term.

We've got a difficult game on our hands, that's for sure, but with your excellent support, I know it's a game we can win.

a little niggles crept into the game. In the closing stages Elderton and then substitute Danny Campbell both came close to breaking the deadlock but the game ended 1-1. Although the Hatters had one or two anxious moments they had chances to win the game in extra time. But Fraser McLachlan and substitute Jamie Baguley were both denied by Heeps.

The young Hatters thought they'd scored soon after but Elderton's tap-in from Byrnes cross was ruled as offside.

Nantwich burst into action and Anthony Kielthy produced a timely tackle to stop Jon Dawson. County pushed forward again and Holt was unlucky not to score from Andrew Thomas' free kick but former Manchester City star Nigel Gleghorn cleared.

From the follow-up Dave Thomasson deflected Byrne's effort for a corner. Heaps saved from Fradin before the Dabbers were awarded a penalty for handball in a crowded area. James Spencer, though, produced a magnificent save from Gareth Brookes' spot kick.

County retaliated with Byrne firing wide and Fradin forcing another save out of Heeps.

County created more chances at the start of the second half. Byrne burst clear but shot wide and the impressive Heeps made another save from Holt. Somewhat against the run of play the North West Counties outfit took the lead on 56 minutes when Matt Bailey headed home Simon Hackney's cross at the far post.

The Hatters' response was instant. Byrne touched on a ball from Elderton and Holt shot under the 'keeper. Thomas for County and the Dabbers' Martin Packman were both booked as

The under 19's qualified for the second round of the Football League Youth Alliance League Cup after finishing top of group 4. The draw for the second round is Preston North End v York City, County v Tranmere Rovers, Hartlepool United v Grimsby Town, Mansfield Town v Walsall, Swindon Town v Northampton Town, Brighton and Hove Albion v Luton Town, Colchester United v Peterborough United and Cardiff City v Exeter City. As the ties have to be completed by 11 November 2002 County changed their league game last Saturday 28th September with Tranmere to the cup second round. The league game will now take place on 4th January 2003. Tranmere won the game 4-0 to go through to the third round. County beat Rochdale 1-0 in the second group game at Bowlee Country Park, Heywood and Oldham Athletic 3-1 in the third group game at Manor Farm to finish top of the group. The only goal of the Rochdale game came after 12 minutes when Gareth Walsh headed down a Wesley Gollup free kick to David Holt to stroke home from close range. County had further chances from Holt, Danny Campbell, Michael Cartner, Jamie Baguley and 2 long range efforts from Haydn Eames but were unable to add to the scoreline.

Oliver Warrender played a one two with Michael Cartner and from the angle of the 6 yard box volleyed home in the far corner of the net. The second half started with a flourish when David Holt broke into the area and fired wide. He was on target after 50 minutes when a long clearance from James Spencer was met by an Oldham defender who tried to head back to his keeper Chris Grange and Holt nipped in to slot the ball past the advancing keeper. Holt got his second 3 minutes later when Jamie Baguley cleverly beat his marker and played the ball forward to Holt who flicked the ball around defender Paul Armstrong and hit a cracker on the volley into the bottom corner. The Latics pulled a goal back straight from the kick off when a mistake in the

County defence allowed Ashley Win to tap home at the back post. This was the end of the scoring but County had further chances from Holt and Oliver Hilton to increase their lead.

A midfield player who was at Bradford City's Centre of Excellence before joining County in 1999. In his 35 appearances for the youth team he has scored 2 goals and following his reserve debut in the Cheshire Senior Cup at Nantwich Town in September 2001 he has gone on to make 12 reserve team appearances. He showed his versatility against Wrexham when he replaced Anthony Kielthy at half time and played as an emergency centre half for the second half.

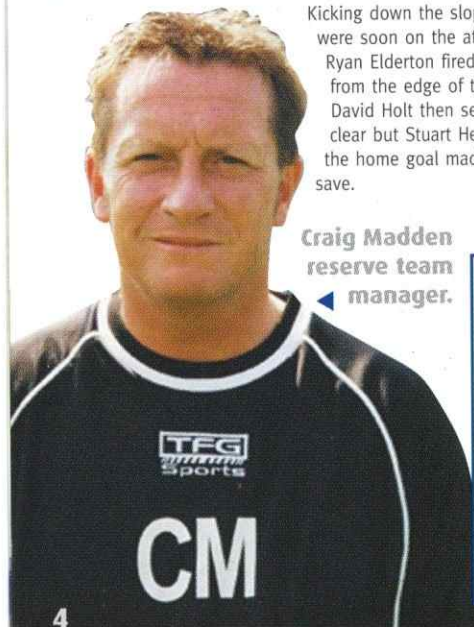
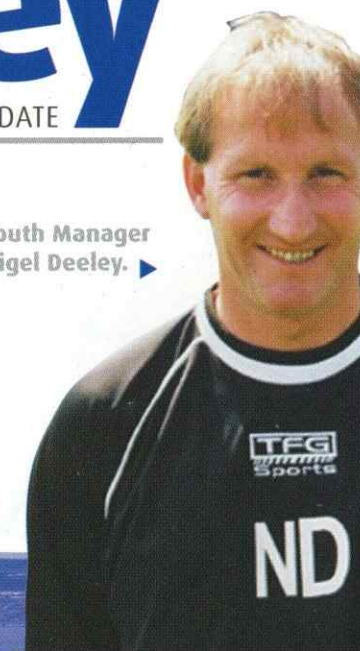

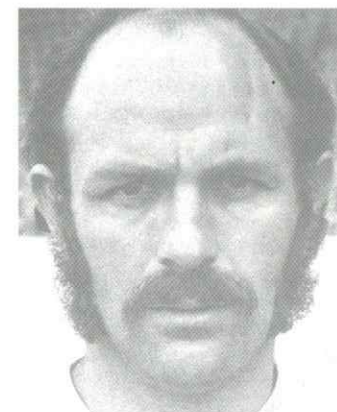
CHESHIRE SENIOR CUP

AN INTERVIEW WITH "JIMMY"

Pupils from two local Stockport primary schools, Springwood and St Mary's were given the unique opportunity to stage their own interviews, with young Chinese Apprentice Professional, Zhang Xiaobin (pictured).

Using state of the art Digi handy cams the pupils used their imagination to change the layout of the Study Centre to resemble a post match press conference (Theatre style chairs, Chinese backdrop on the Interactive Whiteboard, Microphone). With their own ready made press badges and expertly presented questions they set about finding out more

information about County's Chinese recruit.

Seventeen year old "Jimmy", as Xiaobin preferred to be called in the interview, was asked some searching questions. Especially by the young girls such as: Did he have a girl friend? Why did he choose County? What English food did he like to eat? Was he homesick? Who was his favourite player? The experience was very beneficial for both "Jimmy" and

the pupils as it is used to help him to improve his English, and the pupils to improve their confidence. At the end of the interview the pupils felt very proud that they had organised their very own press conference. At the end of their ten-week block at the Study Centre the schools



receive their own uniquely created DVD promoting the kind of work their pupils covered whilst attending the Centre. Each school receives a "Video Diary" edited using the Apple Mac "iMovie" software that covers all the activities and experiences their pupils followed.

The school can then use the finished DVD for promotional purposes, to show future pupils parents and governors the unique experience their pupils had at the Centre. Finishing on a very positive note the Study Centre has just been used as an exemplar for excellent practice by the DFES, for its use of Multi Media. DVD it created which highlighted Stockport County's continued commitment to the "Playing For Success" initiative. Covering "Signing On" and "Presentation Evenings" "Player Interviews" and its involvement with Gifted and Talented summer schools is being used as an example to all Premier League and Nationwide League Football Clubs.

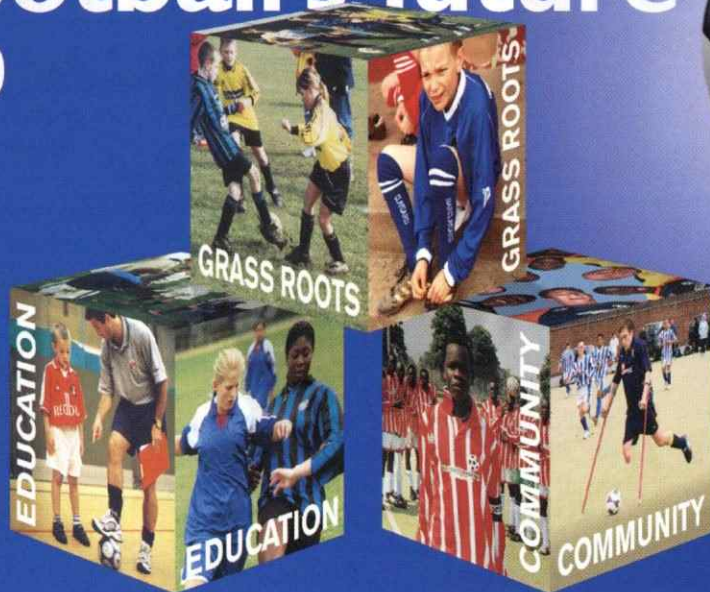

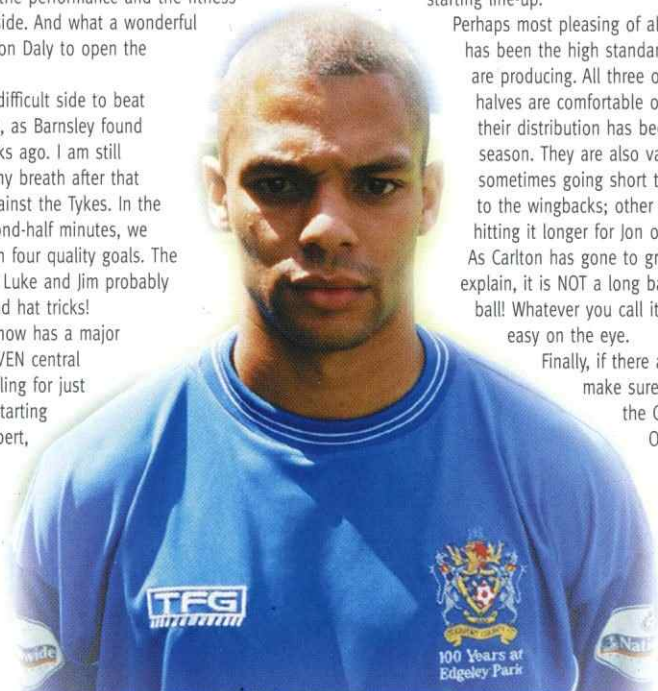
SHEER class

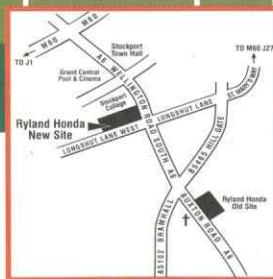

THEY'LL ALWAYS BE AN england

JOHN ENGLAND'S VIEW

"THE NEW WEMBLEY"

So now we have it, the longest running saga in English football is over. The FA (appropriate initials for that august body!) have announced their plans for the "New Wembley". After three years of prevaricating, dithering, stop-starting and down right incompetence English football's controlling body announced last week that the old stadium would be bulldozed and redeveloped. Even then they still made a cock-up over the timing of the announcement and had to delay it for a further day. By comparison they make the Civil Service look slick.

It's all going to cost £757 million and evidently the cost is going to be shared by a German Bank (yes really!), the FA, lottery funding and to a lesser degree by the Government and the London Development Agency. Staggering isn't it? When it's completed (whenever that may be – and I'm sure

there's still time for a few more hiccups) it will be the most expensive stadium in the world. It will have cost nearly four times as much as the Millennium stadium in Cardiff and over twice as much as the alternative stadium proposed for Birmingham.

How can such an astronomical amount be justified in today's economic climate? Couldn't the money have been better spent elsewhere? Three years ago it seemed like a good idea to redevelop Wembley. It was our national football stadium, it was famous throughout the world and it was steeped in history and tradition. But things are different now. Football seems to be gradually coming to its senses and our big clubs, with one or two exceptions, no longer throw their money around like confetti. Priorities are changing and many clubs now think little further than survival on a season-to-season basis.

Add to this the fact that England, over the last two years, have played all their home games in different venues up and down the country thus allowing greater and more varied numbers of people to watch their national team. It's been surprisingly successful in a playing sense too and I'm pretty sure it helped us qualify for the world cup after losing that qualifying game against Germany in Wembley's finale. Indeed most England players, when interviewed, remarked on the fact that they felt less pressure when playing in the provinces and consequently performed better. I would have thought that that's a fairly strong argument for continuing to play England games nationwide.

What really grates though is that it all this comes at a time when many clubs are facing bankruptcy and closure and many professional footballers at the lower end of the market are struggling to find clubs. Can't the FA use their money to help solve these problems? Can't they help provide our schools with decent football facilities? How about spending some money in the creation of more regional centres of excellence and thus improve the quality of our footballers.

In short, do we really need the new Wembley?

I'd like to use my column to welcome Anthony Tonkin to Edgeley Park. He was thrown in at the deep end at Tranmere and

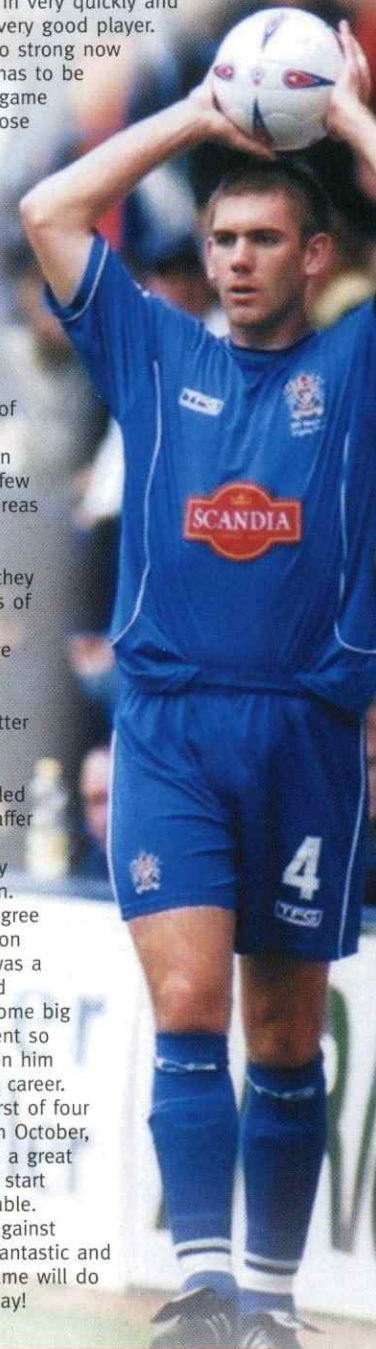
kept his place on Tuesday. He has settled in very quickly and looks another very good player. The squad is so strong now that everyone has to be really on their game or they could lose their place.

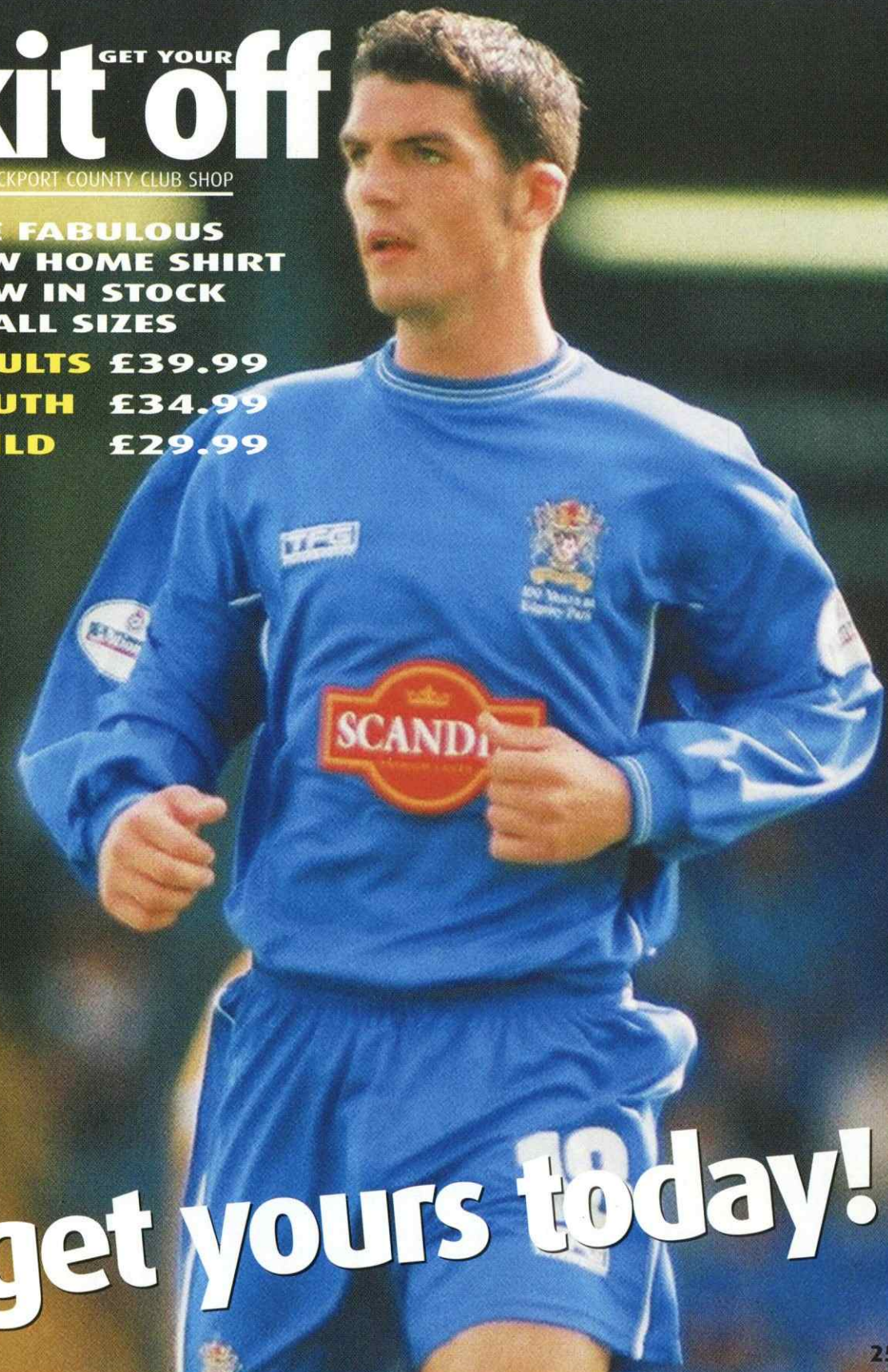

It was just as well for the Bluebirds that they took maximum points, as Queens Park Rangers and Wigan Athletic both maintained their impressive starts to the season and kept up the pressure on the Welshman. QPR beat Colchester United 2-0 at Loftus Road thanks to goals in either half from Karl Connolly and Kevin Gallen (pictured right), whilst Barnsley old boy Andy Liddell set Wigan on their way to a 3-1 away win against his former club. He opened the scoring at Oakwell in the second minute with his seventh goal of the season with Matt Jackson adding a second nine minutes later. Former Terrier Clyde Wijnhard scored twice for Oldham with David Eyres and Lourenco da Silva their other scorers. As a result Iain Dowie's side moved into third above Wigan on goal difference. However, Huddersfield's defeat left them second from bottom as Peterborough United and Notts County both recorded moral-boosting wins.

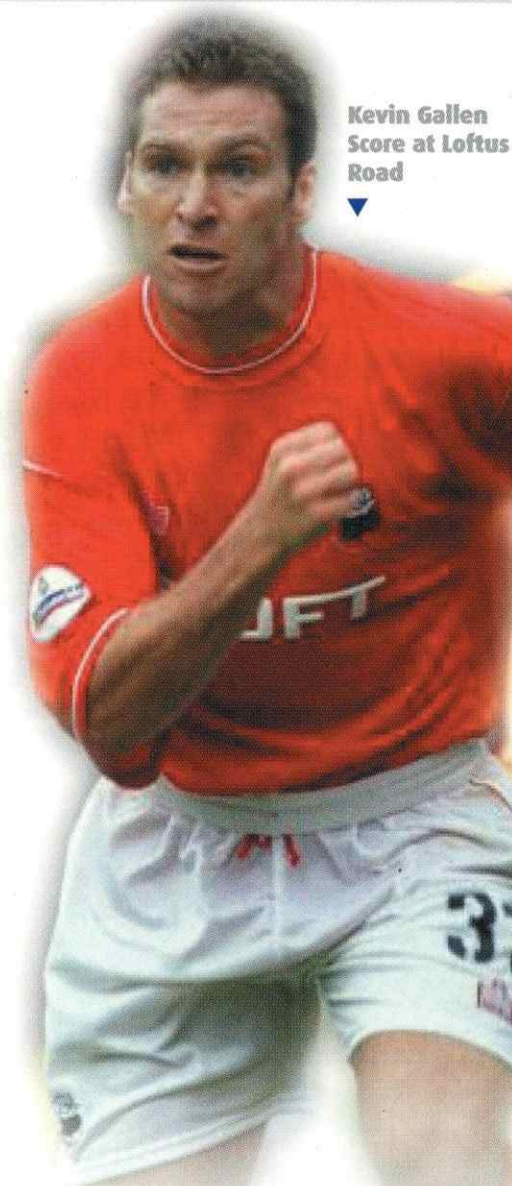
The Posh thrashed Brentford 5-1 at London Road, Simon Rea setting them off to the perfect start with a goal in the first minute. Jimmy Bullard doubled the lead from the penalty spot, Bradley Allen tucked in a third and David Farrell made it four by the 77th minute. Rowan Vine scored an 86th minute consolation for the visitors but Andy Clarke restored the four goal victory margin in the last minute.

Notts County, still to win at home this season, won 4-1 at Cheltenham Town thanks to two goals apiece from Mark Stallard and Danny Allsop, with Julian Alsop scoring the home side's only goal. Mansfield Town continue to struggle at the very bottom, still shipping goals for fun. Saturday saw them lose 2-0 at Northampton Town who won thanks to a third minute Marco Gabbiadini penalty and an 80th minute strike by Paul Trollope.

Chesterfield have started well for Dave Rushbury and moved up three places to fifth with a 1-0 home win over Blackpool thanks to a 49th minute goal from David Reeves.

Bristol City climbed to two places to eighth as they beat Port Vale 3-2 at Vale Park. Peter Beadle (18th minute) and Scott Murray (40th) put the Robins in command at half time, but the Valiants appeared to have earned a point when Billy Paynter pulled one back on the hour and Michael Cummins levelled the score in the 89th minute. 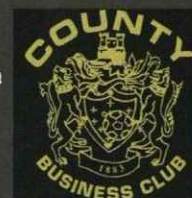

100 Years at
Edgeley Park

One of the most memorable games during this period of Stockport County history was the now famous 'Longest Game' – a Northern cup-tie between County and Doncaster. In the first leg on March 23rd 1946, the two sides drew two-all at Belle Vue. A week later and they played out another two-all draw at Edgeley Park, in front of

Part 5 – Longest ever game, Record League win and the end of the war

12,730 fans, Ken Shaw scoring both County goals. Extra time failed to separate the teams and the rules were clear: 'next goal the winner'. Indeed this was the original 'golden goal rule'. And so, the game went on... and on... and on! After almost three hours of football, Les Cocker finally scored for County – but his goal was ruled out for handball. The two teams played on... and on... it's a fact that some supporters even went home for dinner and came back later to find the game still going on. Eventually bad light stopped play – it was dark, it was almost seven o'clock and the match was now three hours and 23 minutes old. On the toss of a coin, Doncaster won home advantage for the replay, and Rovers went on to win the tie 4-0 in front of a crowd of 13,500. The game at Edgeley Park created a record, which

still stands today, that of 'the longest ever game'. The new record beat the existing time, by just one minute, when during the previous season Cardiff City defeated Bristol City.

This is not the only occasion that Stockport County have entered the record books, with the club holding both wanted and unwanted records. Having already entered the record books with the lowest crowd, when the official attendance had been given as just 13 spectators, for that last day game against Leicester City back in 1921. County saw their name added to the record books again, and once more the number 13 was to play a significant part. As it was 13 years later on 6th January 1934, Stockport County created a Football League goal scoring record that still stands today, by defeating Halifax Town 13 nil. The first half

Percy Downs ► of the Division Three North fixture saw second placed County take a two-goal lead against the fourth placed Yorkshire side.

In an amazing second half the 'Hatters' found the back of the net on a further 11 occasions, with

player to score a hat-trick, with three in just seven minutes, adding a fourth to his personal tally two minutes from time to complete the rout.

With the war coming to an end in 1945, and with no plan to resume League football until the following year, the F.A. Cup was re-introduced, and for the first and only time, the

games were played on a home and away basis through to the semi-final. The new rule didn't affect the 'Hatters', as they were to lose 3-2 on aggregate in the first round to local rivals Rochdale. The resumption of league football saw County kick off with only two players, Jack 'Tiger' Bowles and Jimmy Morris, who had previously played League football for the club.

The opening game of the season saw Halifax Town as the visitors to Edgeley Park; ironically the same club were the visitors on the opening day of the campaign that had been suspended at the outbreak of war. The majority of the 'Hatters' team that day had represented the club in

'regional' football the previous season, and their experience showed as County ran out easy 4-1 winners.

Although the 'Hatters' finished a creditable 4th place in the Division 3 North table, a 3-1 win at runaway Champions Doncaster Rovers the highlight, too many defeats were to cost the club dear. Ken Shaw, in his first Football League campaign, finished the season as the club's top scorer with 16 goals.

The 1947-48 season that started brightly with two wins was to take a dramatic turn for the worst as the team then played 13 games without a win. Three successive wins at

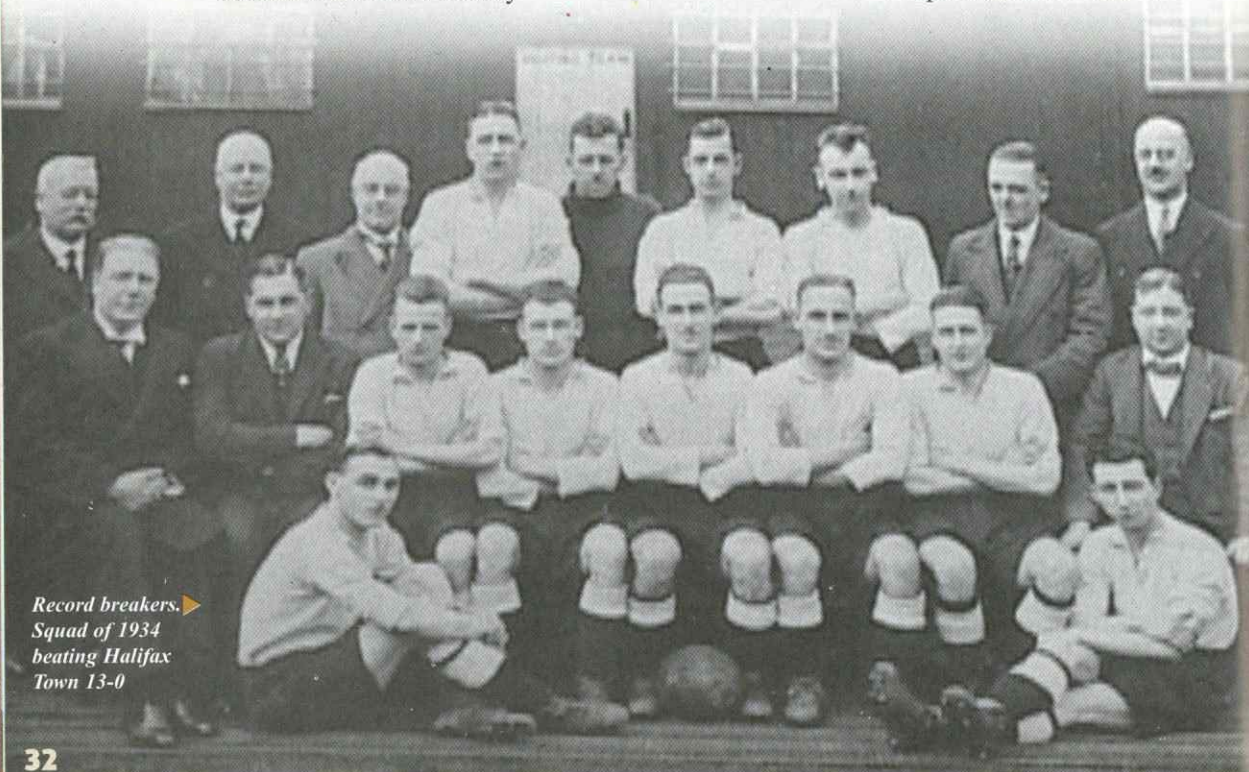
Edgeley Park appeared to have restored some calm, but this was followed by a further run of nine games without a win, which left the team near the bottom of the table. As the season entered its final stages, and with the club in serious danger of having to apply for re-election, manager Marshall signed a number of players, with 36 year old Alex Herd from his former club Manchester City, proving to be a masterstroke. (Insert Alex Herd photo)

County won seven of their last eleven games, and although avoiding re-election, the end of season form was not good enough to prevent the club from finishing 17th, a lowest

ever placing in the Northern Section. The major bright spell of the season was the club's F.A. Cup run. Having defeated Accrington Stanley 3-1 at Edgeley Park in the first round, non-league Shrewsbury Town 3-2 in extra-time in a second round second replay at Maine Road and Torquay United 3-0 again at Edgeley Park. The 'Hatters' travelled to Cup Holders Charlton Athletic, where a near 40,000 crowd saw a brave fight by County, before the 'Addicks' clinched a 3-0 win.

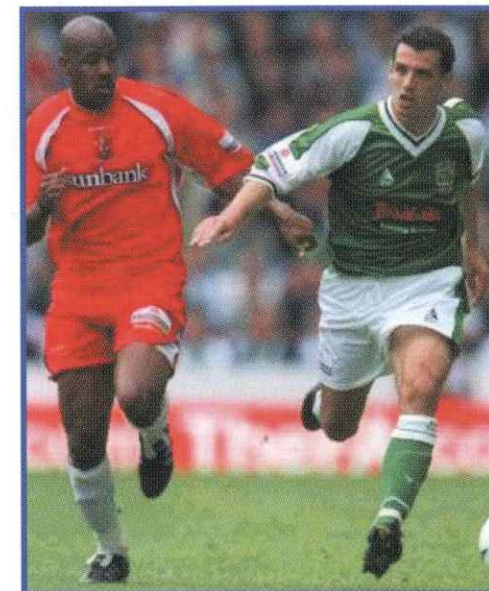

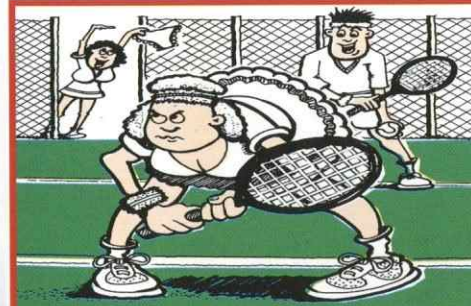

The evening of Saturday, October 12th is shaping up to be one of the club's greatest occasions but, if you are thinking of attending the special dinner to celebrate 100 years of football at Edgeley Park then you are running out of time.

Nearly all of the 350 tickets available have gone and organisers fully expect the 'sold out' sign to be in place by Monday.

Apart from the fans, though, our former players have also been contacting Director Mark Maguire on a daily basis to accept invitations to attend.

"The response has been fantastic," Maguire beamed. "Players attending will span eight decades from George Haigh in the 1930s right through to the likes of Kevin Cooper and Sean Connelly in the new millennium. It's going to be a memorable night"

One thing's for sure, though, no one is likely to travel further to the Edgeley Park bash than Jim Fryatt. The swashbuckling striker, idol of thousands of County fans in the late 1960s, is making the journey from his Las Vegas home to return to the ground where he scored 29 goals just 46 games before a big-money move to Blackburn Rovers.

Mentioning Fryatt to any older fan and I guarantee the name of Bill Atkins would enter the conversation immediately.

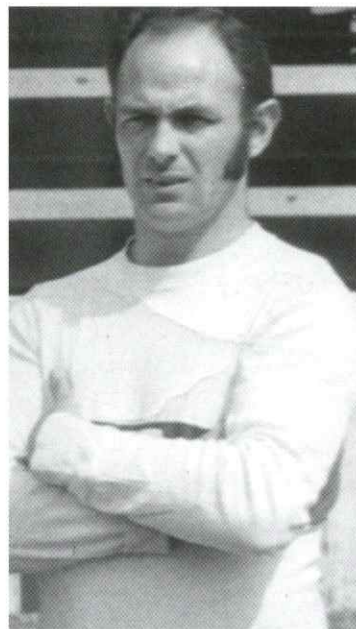
The pair formed one of the club's finest strike partnerships in the halcyon GO GO GO COUNTY era and the untimely sale of their prized possessions is still blamed for the

clubs decline in the 1970s.

We are hopeful that Big Bill will be here on the night but another of Fryatt's team-mates Alan Ogley will definitely be present.

Ogley moved to Edgeley Park from Manchester City in 1967 in the deal that saw Ken Mulhearn make the opposite journey. With County also receiving £18,000 it is without question one of the club's best pieces of business.

Until his acrimonious departure to Darlington in 1975 Ogley developed into not only one of the club's finest players but also one of its most

When he returned as a Darlo player the following season every person in Edgeley Park rose to salute him. At the end of the game he was chaired off the pitch by County fans despite the fact that he'd almost single handedly kept out his old club in a goalless draw!

Terry Park has also confirmed his attendance. The elegant midfielder will always be remembered for his wonderful goal against Manchester United in 1978 on a night when County were robbed of a deserved victory at Old Trafford by two highly controversial decisions by referee Peter Willis.

In 1979 Park, along with Ken Fogarty, moved to Fort Lauderdale Strikers for a combined £100,000 fee. Playing in the same side as Gerd Muller, George Best and the great Peruvian Cubillas the Liverpool-born player was not out of place.

Indeed, Fogarty later remarked that

Park had more natural ability than any player he'd played with.

"You'll never beat Bill Williams" was a regular chant from Pop-Siders on cold Friday nights at Edgeley Park

The song was in response to the majestic performances of defender Bill Williams, a class act in the rough and tough world of Fourth Division football.

Bill emerged from the Dark Age to play a key role in Danny Bergara's renaissance and he appeared in all four of our Wembley games.

Bill will be joined at the dinner by his teammate Chris Beaumont who, at £8,000, was undoubtedly one of Bergara's best signings.

An unsung hero at Edgeley Park, Beaumont weighed in with many vital goals and he became the only player to appear in all ten of our play-off games between 1990 and 1994.

The evening will also be used to honour players who have made a significant contribution to the club's history.

A number of former stars will be invited to enter a new Hall of Fame that will be situated, appropriately, in the Sapphire Suite, now occupied by the Supporters' Club.

Votes have been flooding in for the likes of Billy Bocking in the 1930s, Jack Connor in the 50s, Len White in the 60s and Kevin Francis in the 90s. What do YOU think, though? 4. Dave Challinor - defender

Fraser, another of our successful trainees, has not looked back since he was handed his debut at Sheffield United in March. 32. Ben Burgess - striker

Luton Town

A CLOSER LOOK AT OUR VISITORS

Luton Town arrive at Edgeley Park this afternoon looking to bounce back from Wednesday's Worthington Cup defeat at Villa Park.

Conceding an early goal to De la Cruz settled Villa's nerves and two Dion Dublin goals ensured there would be no upset.

Defeat, though, didn't dampen the enthusiasm of more than 4,500 Town fans who, much like ourselves in the same competition back in 1995, out chanted the Villa fans throughout the game.

Defeat could also come at a cost for the other Hatters after an injury to Russell Perrett that casts a huge shadow over his chances to play today.

The former Portsmouth and Cardiff defender is a key member of Joe Kinnear's squad and already has two goals to his name this season. Replacing Perrett during the interval at Villa Park was Ian Hillier. The Welsh Under-21 international, who moved to Kenilworth Road from Spurs, dropped into the left-back position with Alan Nielson moving to the centre of defence. Although born in Germany Nielson has figured for Wales at full and under-21 level. The 30-year-old has worked with Kevin Keegan at Newcastle and Fulham either side of a spell with Southampton. The Australian Chris Coyne is likely to partner Nielson. West Ham United gave the Brisbane-born defender his big break in English football but, after failing to make the grade at Upton Park, he joined Luton from Dundee in September 2001.

Emmerson Boyce, a product of Town's youth set-up, plays mainly

at right back. The 23-year-old who possesses pace and tenacity can also play in midfield.

Left-back Sol Davies moved to Kenilworth Road from Swindon days after Town had lost their second-successive game at the start of the season.

The Cheltenham-born defender made 114 league appearances for the Robins, previously his only professional club.

With more than 200 games to his name Matthew Spring is almost an automatic choice in Kinnear's engine-room.

Not 23 until next month the Harlow-born midfielder almost joined West Bromwich Albion in the summer but delighted everyone at Kenilworth Road when he opted for a new two-year contract with Luton.

Alongside Spring Steve Robinson is a Northern Ireland international who moved from Bournemouth to Preston North End for a fee of £375,000 in May 2000.

Strangely, though, he never established himself at Deepdale and he agreed to drop a division to join Luton for what could prove a bargain £50,000. Paul Hughes made seven appearances for County on loan from Chelsea in the 1998-99 season. A midfield player of immense quality his career has, unfortunately, been blighted by injury and the 26-year-old, a former England Schoolboy international, has only 61 league appearances to his name. Four years Hughes' junior Peter Holmes is another midfielder to represent England at schoolboy level.

He joined Town from Sheffield Wednesday in August 2000 but has struggled to hold down a first-team place.

A third England Schoolboy on the books at Kenilworth Road is striker Andrew Fotiadis. After a successful traineeship he turned professional with Town in July 1996.

Like Hughes his career has been blighted by injury. Most of his 113 league appearances have come from the bench with a result that he's only found the back of the net on 13 occasions.

One of the 13, though, was against County in May 1997, the last time the two clubs met.

That game finished 1-1 with the corresponding clash at Edgeley Park ending the same way. Other than 1996-97, though, games between the two Hatters have been rare. The two clubs have only met in six seasons and here at Edgeley Park County remain unbeaten with four wins and two draws.

A significant game took place almost 34 years ago on November 29th 1968. County won the Third Division clash 2-0

thanks to goals from Freddie Goodwin and Bill Atkins.

The match will be remembered, though, for the debut of Alex Young. The former Everton genius joined us from Glentoran for what was then a club record £15,000. Known as the Golden Vision for his blond hair and fantastic ability the Scottish international helped double our previous home attendance to 13,246.

Another much talked about game against Luton came in the FA Cup in 1958. Both teams wore white shirts at the time, so both had to change. County ran out in an Old Gold and Black strip inspired by Wolves one of the dominant forces in English football during the 50s.

The kit proved lucky as County hammered Town, then riding high in the old First Division, 3-0 in front of more than 18,000 ecstatic fans.

Dean Crowe, who replaced Fotiadis after 73 minutes of Wednesday's game at Villa, won't need directions to Edgeley Park. Born in Offerton, the striker slipped through the County net to serve his apprenticeship with Stoke City.

Loan spells followed at Bury, Northampton and Plymouth followed before he agreed a permanent move to Kenilworth Road in September 2001. He proved an inspired signing by Kinnear; 15 goals in 34 games helped Luton to promotion at the end of the season. Steve Howard leads the Hatters' scoring charts this

term with eight goals, testimony to his character as much as his ability.

The Durham-born former Northampton striker has had a difficult time in trying to win the support of the Luton faithful. Early last season he insisted on twice taking a penalty despite advice from other players. He missed both and it seemed that he'd played his last game for the Bedfordshire club. He hadn't and he persevered. Coming into today's game 34 goals from 65 appearances is his reward.

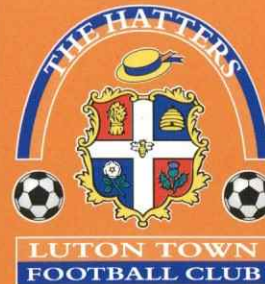

Luton's most famous supporter is now, tragically, no longer with us but Eric Morecambe will certainly live long in the memory as will the legendary Cleopatra sketch where Eric's Roman Centurion displayed his love for the team. Luton can also call upon former Breakfast TV stalwart, Nick Owen and perhaps most surprising of all, purveyors of grunge and all-round top American Indie band Pavement. How did that happen?

Early Days

Luton were formed following the merger of Belgian-sounding Luton Excelsior and Luton Wanderers in 1885. They were the first southern club to go professional with players in 1890

earning 5 shillings a game. They dipped in and back out of the Football League around the turn of the century, although the dipping out was more due to the cost of away travel to the largely northern-based clubs in the league rather than actual relegation.

So who are the true Hatters then??

Luton adopted the nickname Hatters in the 30's replacing their previous nickname of the Straw Plaiters, which aren't proper hats anyway, not like they made up north any road up!! Still we're a forgiving bunch in Stockport and I'm sure every one of us is honoured that Luton were inspired enough to borrow our nickname.
