

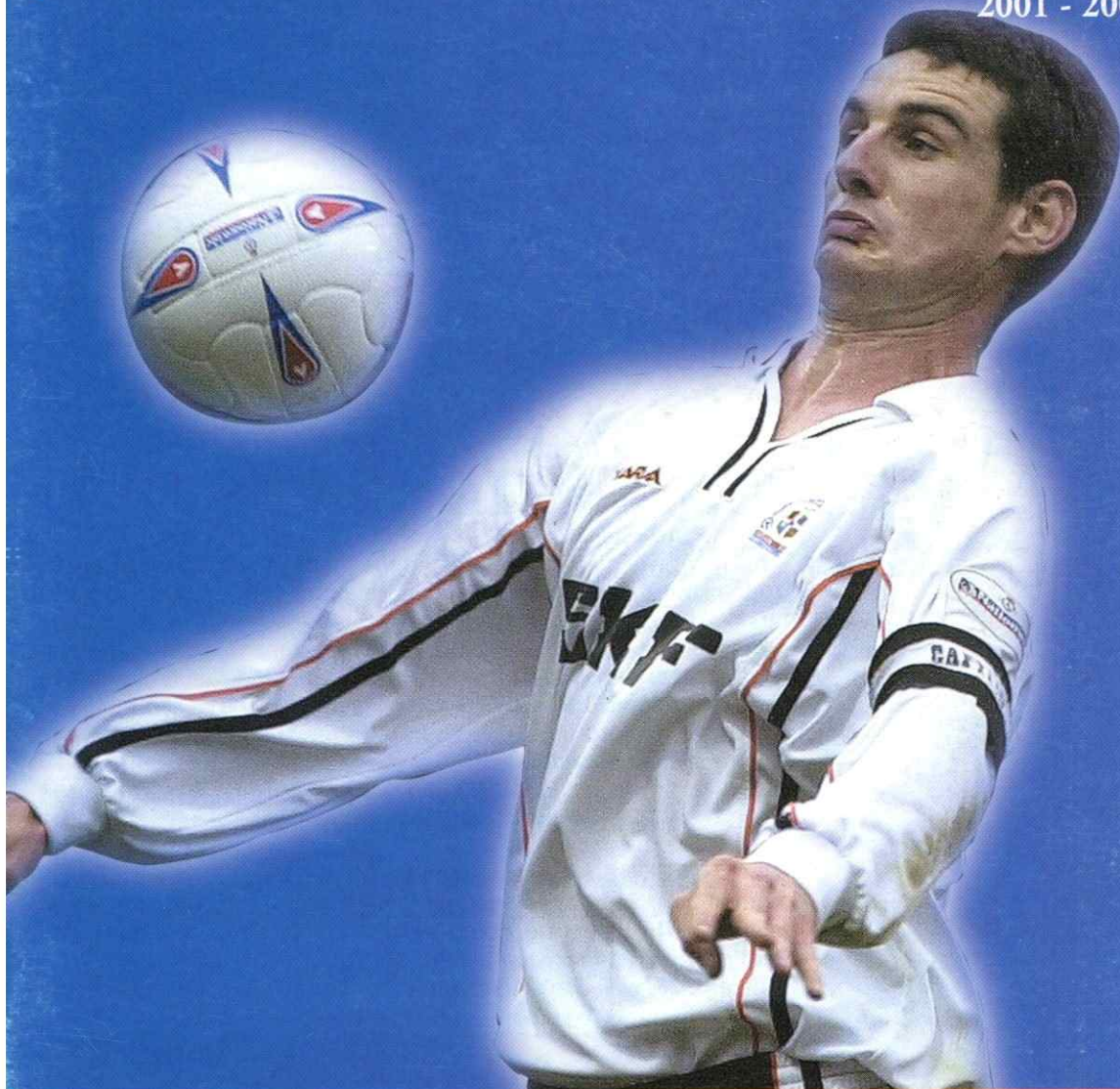

Inside Forward

AFTER the recent horrendous run of injuries decimated the squad, lady luck has evened things out to some degree this week. Matt Spring has to miss this afternoon's game through suspension, having been a very capable captain in the month during which Kevin Nicholls was ruled out.

But Nicholls has timed his return to fitness perfectly, and is ready to lead the team this afternoon for the first time since the 3-0 home win over Swindon on September 28.

The influential midfielder missed eight games because of an Achilles injury, but sailed through 90 minutes of reserve team soccer last week – and bit hard enough in the tackle to collect a booking! – and made his league comeback at Northampton, as a sub for the last 12 minutes.

He has suffered no adverse reaction, and is ready to return to the team, today, if selected. His comeback match in the Avon Combination victory over Cambridge also saw the returns of Alan Neilson and Paul Hughes and they too are now back in the pool of fit first team players.

Others are not so lucky, and Andrew Fotiadis and Dean Crowe's injuries leaves the boss short of options in attack. It is one of the reasons he has not yet decided on the strength of the side he will send to Stevenage on Tuesday for the LDV Vans Trophy game.

The Town will go there to win, but the manager admits he will have to think hard about team selection. He opted for a lot of youngsters at Woking, having decided they could do the job. They did, impressively, but no-one doubts that Stevenage pose a tougher test, so we can expect to see a stronger Town side fielded at Broadhall Way. But, said Joe, would it be right to risk the inclusion of Steve Howard and Tony Thorpe if they are still the only two fit senior strikers available?

New Deal Agreement Close

NEGOTIATIONS on a new contract for Steve Howard are nearing completion, and hopes are high that an agreement will be reached shortly. "The talks are going well, and I hope to have a happy ending within a few days," said Joe.

Howard, 26, was Joe's first signing for Luton when a bargain fee of

And as a memento, he presented a ship's crest to the Town, which was accepted with thanks by Mick Harford.

£50,000 was paid to Northampton on deadline day 18 months ago. Howard's strike rate has been remarkable, and stands today at 36 goals in 73 Town appearances.

His current contract expires at the end of this season, but the new deal will add two more years to that.

IT WAS probably inevitable that when Mick McCarthy resigned as manager of the Republic of Ireland this week Joe Kinnear's should be one of the first names to feature in speculation as to his replacement. The Town boss was born in Dublin, and won 26 caps playing as a full-back for his country.

For the record, the FAI have not approached Joe, nor the Town, about the job, and he said: "I have certainly not applied for it. I have more than two years left on my contract here with Luton. I like the job, and intend to see it through."

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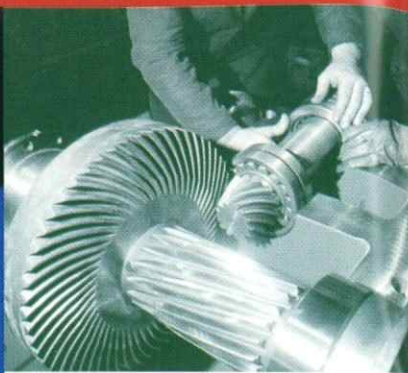
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Manager's View



WE SUFFERED a little setback at Northampton a week ago, but we return to Kenilworth Road today in good heart and determined to kick off another winning run. You can't expect to win every game, try though you might, but I still believe we are capable of winning enough to force our way into the play-off zone before the season ends.

There are no excuses for the defeat at Sixfields even though I thought Northampton benefited from the run of the ball, including a deflection that led to the crucial first goal.

They also had an inspired goalkeeper, particularly when he denied Tony Thorpe from a chance that could have pulled it back to 2-1. If we had got that goal I have no doubt we would have gone on to take at least a point and extend our excellent run to eight league games without defeat. Instead, we gave them the easiest goal they will score this season, and that summed up our day.

On the bright side, the players had done a terrific job in putting us into the league's top ten after our poor start to the season, and their achievements through last month - four wins and a draw from five league matches - were all the more remarkable when you consider how many first team men were ruled out by injuries.

If you were here for our last home game, I think you

will agree that we proved against Wigan that we can live with the best in this division. It was an excellent football match, between two very good teams, played at a high tempo. Wigan showed why they are favourites for promotion, and we demonstrated that we are capable of being serious challengers.

I felt two emotions at the end - delighted with our team performance, but disappointed to see two home points slip away to a late goal that should have been prevented. You may have noticed that Wigan's players greeted that equaliser as though it was a cup final winner. They knew they had got out of jail and salvaged a point that looked unlikely until the final five minutes.

For us it was a reminder of the need to concentrate on our jobs for every minute of the game. One moment of slack marking cost us the goal and denied us a home victory which would have been very sweet.

It was, therefore, all the more satisfying to go to Crewe and come home with another clean sheet and three more points against another team who were in very good form, and in the top six.

We put in an excellent team performance in all departments, and while it was a close contest I felt we deserved our win. And it was a nice moment for Steve Howard, getting the late

winner a few days after I had asked him a pointed question or two about the marking when Wigan's centre-half stole a point for them! It was a pity we could not carry the Gresty Road form into the game at Sixfields, but there was no point in going over the top at our first league defeat in eight league games. We have lost six of our 17 league games so far, and as four of those defeats came in the season's first four matches it is obvious that we have got things right since the middle of August.

My advice to the players in the dressing room after the game at Northampton was to get over this disappointment as quickly as possible by embarking on another winning run. Footballers are human beings, not robots, and our squad have shown that they are capable of doing well. If they would like to win seven matches in a row, and then lose one, before repeating the sequence from now until the end of the season, I'll settle for that. It would probably make us champions.

Aiming high? Perhaps, but there is a determination to do well running through all levels of the club, and I hope you will see it bring another good result this afternoon. Keep the faith, and enjoy the game.

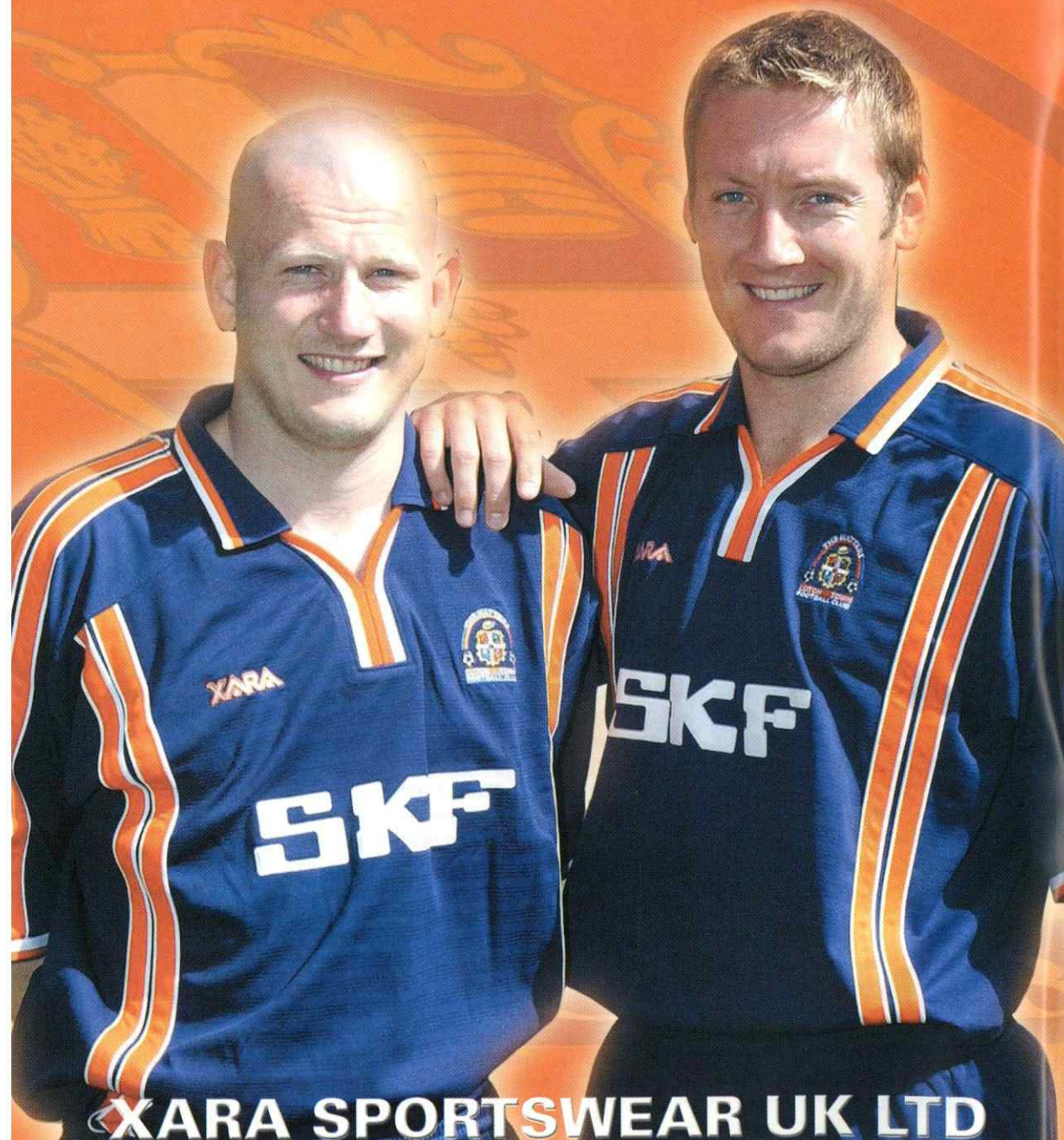

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Captain's View



I AM well pleased to be back in action after my injury, with a full game in the reserves last week and a shorter run-out as a sub at Northampton on Saturday. Mind you, I would rather have sat on the bench for 90 minutes at Sixfields and seen the lads get another result.

The end of our unbeaten run was a big disappointment, and, as is so often the case, a bit of a mystery when we try to work out why it happened.

I have to give credit to Northampton for the way they approached the game. They knew all about the problems Steve Howard could pose, and they were all over him like a rash. But we were poor on the day.

It was all the more disappointing because we had done well against Wigan and Crewe, teams much higher up the table. I thought the game against Wigan was full of good football, and it was heartening to see that for half the match at least we were a better side than the promotion favourites. It was just a shame we couldn't get a second goal, and then conceded an equaliser in the last few minutes.

Incidentally, well done Aaron Skelton, not only for his goal against Wigan, but for the way he has come into the side to do a job.

The lads were all delighted with the way it went at Crewe. That was a great win, and if we had played that well again on Saturday, particularly defensively, we would have brought back the points from Northampton as well.

Sixfields has never been one of

my favourite grounds. I never had much success when I played there for Wigan, and as you can imagine I did not enjoy going back there last week.

Northampton were a different kettle of fish compared to Wigan and Crewe. As a general rule, the top sides concentrate on playing their football, which is what we like to do. Others mix it a bit more, using a more physical approach, and work hard to pressurise you. It worked for Northampton, so I am not complaining about it, but I felt the biggest problem was that we didn't defend as a team as well as we can. Certainly Northampton were keen to make sure we had no time on the ball, and on the day they did their jobs better than we did.

My contribution was fairly minor, but I felt good, having proved my fitness, alongside Alan Neilson and Paul Hughes, in the reserves game a couple of days earlier. It was good to be in a winning team, and I enjoyed the match. Thankfully, yellow cards in reserve games don't count this season for first team matches!

I was disgusted by a tackle which put Michael Leary out of the game, but otherwise it was an enjoyable afternoon. The atmosphere is more relaxed than it is in league matches, but I made sure I got a sweat on because I knew I had to test myself physically after my lay-off. I enjoyed playing alongside the good young players we have coming through under the care of Brian Stein. While I was recovering from my injury I spent a lot of afternoons

training with the youth players, and we have some good prospects there as well. My main concern, of course, is about the league side, and getting back to winning ways, especially as we have the chance to do it on our own pitch today, backed by a home crowd. Our mood was subdued after the match at Northampton, but we have talked things over, and the team spirit is still excellent. We enjoy training, and for all the hard work involved, it has its lighter moments too. This week, for instance, because there was no reserve team game, we held a practice match between two sides which were thought to be evenly matched. Mick Harford managed one team and called it Real Madrid and Brian Stein's XI took the field as Barcelona.

Having said that, it was a serious game: we all care about what happens to us this season. We know we have to take the occasional setback, and the boss set the tone for how we approached today's match. One defeat is unwelcome, but not a disaster, so long as we can now begin another run of six or seven games without being beaten. We did it last season, and we have now proved we can do it at a higher level.

This afternoon there will be a real determination to bury the bad memories of a week ago, and put ourselves back on track for the play-off zone. We all believe we can do it.

Treatment Room

THREE of my "customers" returned to football last week, and I am pleased to report that Paul Hughes, Kevin Nicholls and Alan Neilson are all showing no adverse reactions to playing and training.

They all got through 90 minutes in the reserves, and were then cleared for a return to the first team squad. They all travelled to Northampton, and as you probably know Nicholls and Neilson both played as substitutes in that game.

Unless unexpected problems arose during yesterday's training, all three are available to the manager this afternoon.

Getting quite close to a return is Andrew Fotiadis, who suffered a minor hamstring injury at Crewe, and had to miss the second half of that game, and the match at

Northampton.

He was back running again this week, but I doubt if he will be completely fit in time to think about a return to the squad this afternoon. He might, however, be in with a shout for the party to travel to Stevenage on Tuesday. Dean Crowe, unfortunately, has to wait a lot longer as he works to get over the hamstring tear he suffered at Oldham three weeks ago. It is responding to treatment, and he is much better, but it was an extensive partial tear and I expect it to take several more weeks to heal. He is walking comfortably, but a long way from being able to run.

Adrian Forbes, however, is still looking good as he works to get over his cruciate knee ligament injury. He is running well, and the next stage of his rehab work will be to introduce a little twisting


and turning into his routine.

David Bayliss is another who is working hard to regain fitness, following his shoulder operation. There is a good range of movement within the joint, which is very encouraging, and he is doing plenty of running and general fitness work.

The other senior player in the treatment room is Carl Griffiths, who is still making slow but steady progress. He has had another scan, and that suggests there is not enough blood flow through the tissue of his leg, so he will undergo intensive treatment to cure that problem. I have warned him that it means yet more hard work for him, but like all our players he is a very good pro, and ready to do whatever it takes to get back onto the playing field as quickly as possible.

FIRST today I want to ask you to be as generous as you always are for a charity collection taking place inside the ground. The bucket collection is in aid of Mencap, Luton, who are neighbours of ours – their offices are not far from the ground, in Avondale Road.

A reminder that in the interest of safety, the Main Stand Enclosure becomes a no-smoking area from today. Those supporters who need to smoke can use the area beyond the New Stand catering unit, near the exit at the top of Kenilworth Road.

Supporters who attended the Northampton match will have noticed that the orange ball was in use. Once again through the winter months Nationwide League clubs will use the Mitre ISO fluo ball, which is thought to be easier to see on gloomy afternoons. We have to use this ball in all League and LDV Vans Trophy games until February 28 2003.

We would not want supporters to think that nothing is being done about the problems at Watford when we played them in the Worthington Cup. Enquiries are still going on, but the Bedfordshire Police and our hands are tied until the Greater Manchester Police have carried out their investigation, as requested by Hertfordshire Police, into the events on the night.

Several supporters have asked me about our new stadium plans. I can tell you there is a

lot of hard work going on behind the scenes, and progress is being made, and I am sure it will not be much longer before a full announcement is made.

You will probably know of some changes made to fixture lists recently, and a home game for the reserves against Bournemouth has now been re-scheduled for a second time. It was postponed for the first time to avoid a clash with our Worthington Cup game at Aston Villa, and was due to be played on Wednesday. However, the terrible winds recently gave us a lot of problems with the main stand roof, and for safety's sake repair work had to take priority over a match to which the public would have been admitted. The game is now due to be played on January 22, 2003. It looks as though this match could be one of those that is destined to be moved again and again!

Since our last home match dates have been fixed for various other games, details of which came in after publication. You might like to know the full list.

Our campaign in the Bedfordshire Senior Cup begins with an away game against Wootton Blue Cross on Wednesday November 20, kick-off 7.30.

In the FA Youth Cup our second round tie was, weather permitting, played on Thursday at Tooting and Mitcham, and

hopefully by now John Moore's lads will be in the draw for the third round. I am sure you know about the local derby at Stevenage on Tuesday in the LDV Vans Trophy, but can I remind you that it is all-ticket for Luton supporters, with nothing on sale for away fans at Stevenage on the night.

And next Saturday, of course, we have our first FA Cup tie of the season, at home to Guiseley AFC, from Yorkshire. They agreed to admission prices being reduced for this game, including children under 16 being admitted for just £1. Full details of prices are elsewhere in this magazine today, but may I please ask supporters to book their tickets early.

Supporters have asked about details of a possible replay. If one is needed it will be on Monday November 25 (7.45pm), at Valley Parade, Bradford City FC's stadium.

The draw for the second round, incidentally, is to be made tomorrow week, the day after we play Guiseley, with the ties due to be played on December 7. The big clubs, of course, don't come in until the third round, which is scheduled for January 4. If we are involved, it would take priority over our home league game with Blackpool.

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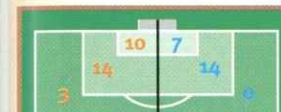

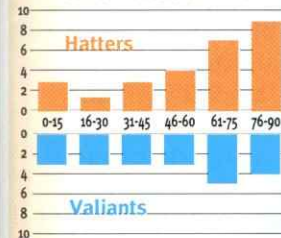
Where Goals Scored

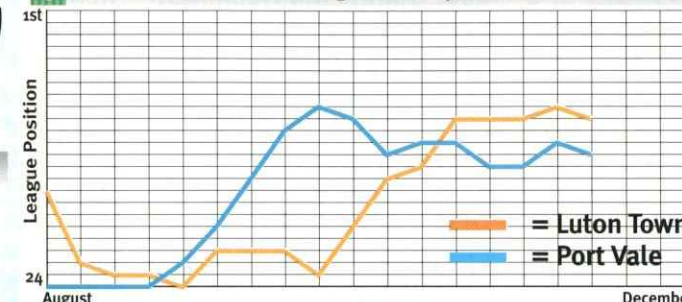

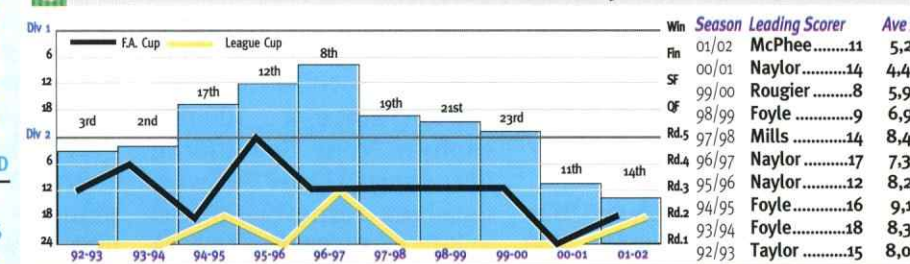

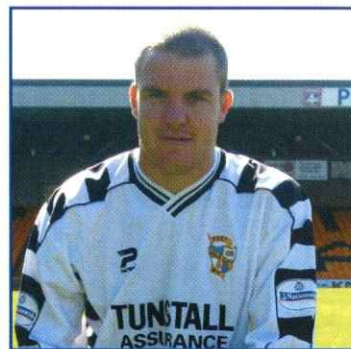

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Blast From the Past

Port Vale have been fairly infrequent visitors to Kenilworth Road over the years with not many of the clashes living long in the memory. There has to be an exception, however, and the meeting towards the end of the 1965/66 campaign left a crowd of 12,054 breathless with excitement as the Hatters went goal mad.

Relegated to the basement at the end of the previous season the Town had pushed their way up to the promotion places on the back of a superb home record and the goalscoring talents of a young striker, John O'Rourke, who had been signed on a free transfer from Chelsea two seasons before.

With five games left to play, O'Rourke had scored 29 times in 36 outings, including four hat-tricks, and was being watched

with envy by a good many clubs from the top three divisions. He was the fulcrum of a free scoring forward line that was to hit the back of the net 90 times by the end of a season that had promised so much but ended, eventually, in massive disappointment both on and off the pitch.

In a bid to be different, the Town had decided to play their home game against Port Vale on the Saturday evening of May 14th, only a couple of hours after the end of the F.A.Cup final.

Probably mindful of the number of people who emerge from an afternoon in front of the television watching the cup final to fill the local parks with a heaving mass of bodies trying to emulate the players they had just seen in action, the Board obviously thought that a real live game was guaranteed to pull in

the crowds.

As it turned out, the 12,054 that filled the terraces on a balmy evening was the second highest home crowd of the season and fully vindicated the Directors' optimism and, with appetites whetted by an afternoon of Everton v Sheffield Wednesday, they settled down to a further helping of good football.

Port Vale were making their final appearance of a season which was to see them finish just above the re-election positions while the Town were sitting in sixth position with at least three games in hand on most of the clubs above them. The Hatter's severe fixture backlog had increased the previous Wednesday when, two goals ahead at Sealand Road Chester, the heavy rain that had been falling from the start, turned into a monsoon leaving the ref-

eree little option but to abandon the match.

Still smarting from this disappointment the Town players set about Port Vale with a vengeance and tore great holes in their defence right from the start. After only seven minutes play the Hatters were already two up following strikes from Gordon Riddick and Ray Whittaker and after 18 minutes the lead had doubled after O'Rourke had netted twice in the space of 60 seconds.

Vale player-manager Jackie Mudie switched his young wing-halves John James and Clint Boulton to inside-forward, and pulled back old hands Henry Poole and Terry Miles in an attempt to stem the flow but Riddick headed his second and Luton's fifth after 23 minutes.

Armed with the knowledge that a hard game faced them on the following Monday evening at Halifax, the players were not inclined to take risks after having attained such an impregnable position, with the result that the rest of the game was a bit of an anti-climax. It was probably for the best otherwise the supporters would have had great difficulty in catching their breath!

In the second period what little Vale had to offer up front was easily dealt with by Luton goalkeeper Tony Read, who was making only his second appearance of the season between the sticks after 27 outings wearing the number eight shirt- during which time he had added 12 goals to the cause.

The game ended with O'Rourke

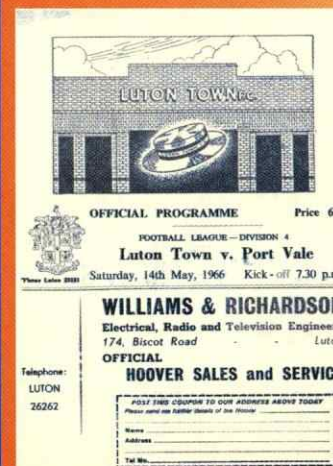
shooting straight at Vale goalkeeper Stuart Sharratt from the penalty spot, thus denying himself hat-trick number five of the season. The crowd went home happy, though, having witnessed Everton 3 Sheffield Wednesday 2 on the television and Luton 5 Port Vale 0 in the flesh. They probably went home to watch the cup final again on 'Match of the Day' to round off the day!

The Town produced their normal 12 page programme for the visit of Port Vale with much of the editorial comment given over to the abandonment of the game at Chester three days before.

With the Town 2-0 ahead and, according to the reports, playing brilliantly in the torrential rain the players were called off two minutes into the second half. Groundstaff were given a chance to disperse the surface water to no avail and to the intense disappointment of both sets of players- Chester also had eyes on promotion at the time.

When the game was eventually played, on the final Saturday of the season, a much weakened Luton side fought out a 1-1 draw when a win would have seen them promoted.

Given the rows over players promotion bonuses as the season drew to a close leaving the squad depleted and many senior professionals leaving that summer one wonders what sort of side the Town would have put out in the old Division Three if the original score had stood at Chester and we had won promotion? We will never know.

The Town went on to struggle the following season, only avoiding the re-election places at the death. One of the many reasons can be seen

from the South East Counties league table shown in the Port Vale programme with the youth team winning only once over the 1965/66 season and conceding over 130 goals in the process! The club's scouting system was obviously struggling at the time.

Luton Town F.C Golf Day

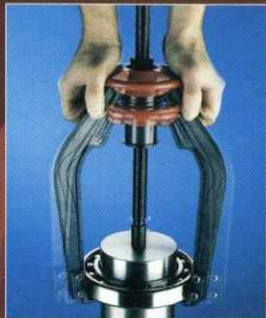

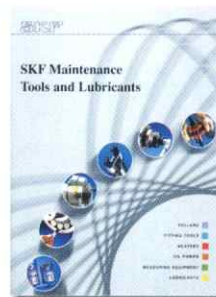

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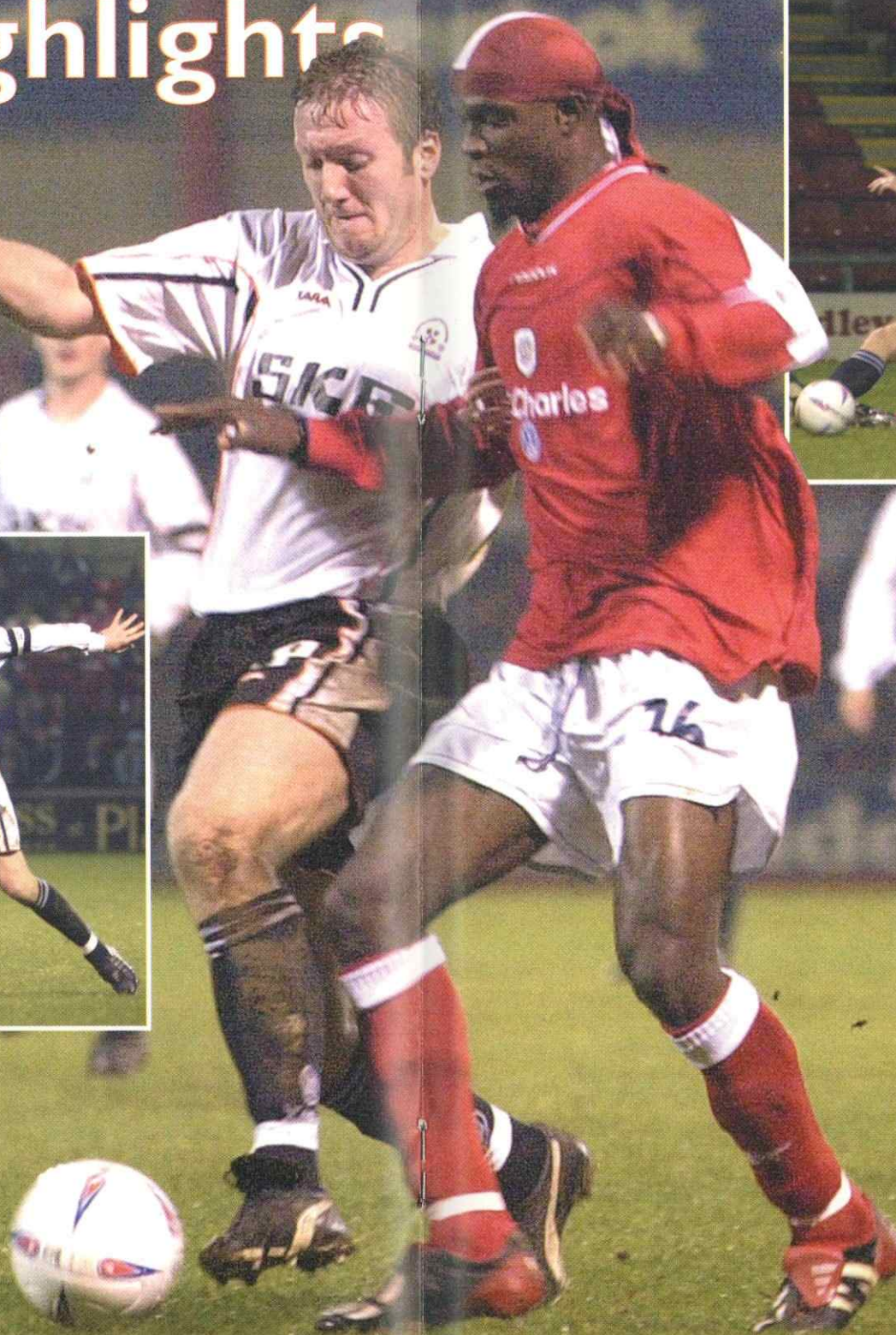
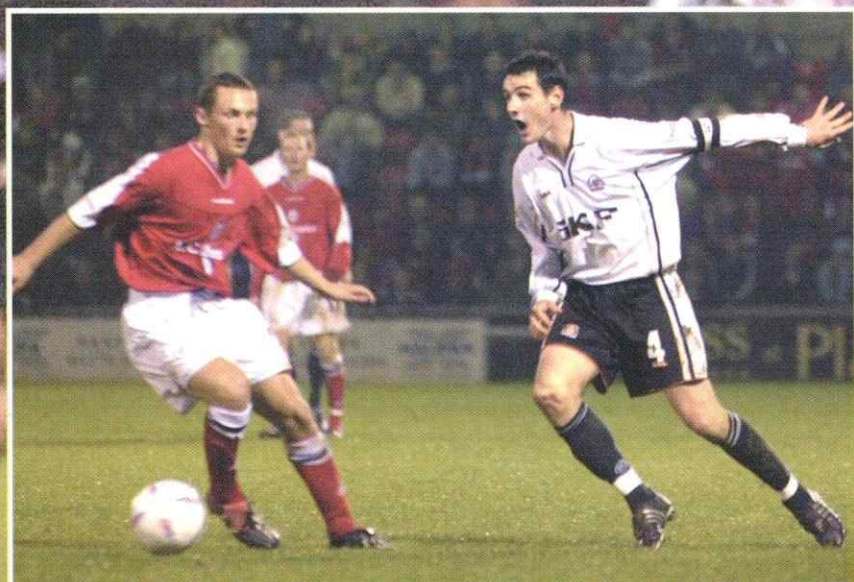

LTFC in the Community

Working in conjunction with Bedfordshire Football Association

I WOULD like to use today's column to tell you about an amazing project that the Community Department has been delighted to help co-ordinate.

About three months ago, during a meeting with Helen Barnett, the Luton Borough Council Manager for PE and Sport, I was asked if I could provide any suggestions as to where Farley Hill Junior School might be able to find the balance of funding required to enable the school to build their new sports complex. It consists of two multi-use games areas, along with floodlights and changing facilities.

At the time I had been in discussions with the members of FLAG, the supporters' organisation formed to help the football club when it was faced by receivership, assisting them in finding a suitable project in which they could invest their money.

It had been specified that the project should be primarily of benefit to the community, as it was these people who had donated the money in the first place.

Sometimes it is truly amazing how two projects that match so perfectly can fall into your lap at the same time. I made the necessary phone calls and arranged the meetings, and everything came together perfectly.

FLAG agreed to donate the necessary £20,000 to complete a project that will provide the communities adjacent to our current ground, and hopefully our new ground too, with a much-needed sports facility.

There is an added bonus with the money being used in this manner. Because the cash is being donated to a project that is aiding sports development, the school will be able to apply for what is called Sportsmatch. This is a government scheme that will match pound for pound

money donated to such projects should they satisfy specified requirements.

We are investigating this possibility and the initial signs suggest that we have every chance of being successful. If we are, the school will have the additional money available to spend on setting up and delivering a variety of coaching initiatives within the centre. The football aspect of these will be delivered by the Luton Town Community Department, the money we receive from this will in turn give us the ability to deliver a wider range of activities. In particular we would extend the volume of free curriculum time school coaching that we deliver. How else will Luton Town benefit? First of all it will give me a free venue where I can deliver a range of courses. This in turn means that our charges will stay at a minimum. In addition, as our project grows, the long term relationship with the school will enable us to instigate educational programmes using sport for children and adults alike.

I can see other benefits. The department, in conjunction with Beds FA and the local councils, is working hard to develop girls' football in the county, and this project in the long term will lead to a girls' Centre of Excellence. The school will provide us with a natural home for this Centre. Also our own ladies team, Luton Belles, are looking for a long term training base and Farley Junior School might well provide the solution.

Finally, I would like to welcome to today's game the players, manager and parents of Stotfold Youth FC, who have been the department's guests for the day at our Match Day Soccer Club. I hope they have enjoyed their time with us.

ALTHOUGH he was bitterly disappointed that the Town gave away a sloppy equaliser to the league leaders two minutes from time, manager Joe Kinnear and his opposite number Paul Jewell agreed that we had seen a cracking football match.

It was full of everything except the two or three extra goals both sides might have had, and on balance of play the result was probably right. Wigan, costing £8million to assemble, were the best team we have seen at Kenilworth Road this season, but despite being at less than full strength, the Town were a match for them. It was just a tad galling that the Town were leading until the 88th minute, three minutes after the then league leaders were reduced to ten men.

Each side had spells when it threatened more than it achieved, and it was ironic that two defenders should be the goal scorers on a day when slick high-tempo football saw plenty of opportunities created for strikers.

Visiting goalkeeper Jon Filan was man of the match by some distance, making several top class saves as the Town had Wigan on the ropes. The Latics had conceded only three goals in their seven

previous away games, and were defending a run of 11 league and cup games without defeat.

They were perhaps a touch lucky to save that record in view of the lateness of their goal, but they had earlier shown why they are favourites for promotion.

For the fans, it was tremendous entertainment, between two excellent footballing sides, with plenty of incident and endeavour, and no quarter asked. Neither manager rated the ref too highly, and even Joe had some sympathy for Matt Jackson, whose return to his first club ended with a red card for his second yellow card offence on Steve Howard.

Wigan had always looked vulnerable to the double spearhead of Howard and Andrew Fotiadis, and might easily have conceded the second goal the Town needed to douse their enthusiasm.

Aaron Skelton slid in to net his first goal of the season from close range in the 24th minute after Pete Holmes slung over a deep cross which Howard headed back

across the face of goal.

Having looked the better side in the first half, the Town were pinned back for much of the second, but just before Jackson was red-carded Howard saw another header brilliantly saved. Matt Spring had brought an equally thrilling save from Filan earlier. Inevitably, the ten men, desperate to preserve their promotion chances, threw everything in for the last attacking effort, and the equaliser was a double disappointment for the Town manager. Russell Perrett, the Town's man of the match just ahead of Chris Coyne, was pulled up for a foul on Neil Roberts which few inside the ground saw. The ref did, to Joe's disgust, and the manager was even more niggled at the failure to defend the set piece. Steve McMillan's free kick went to the far post, and Wigan skipper and centre-half Jason de Vos was given space and time to help himself to a simple header. Wearing a headband over stitches from an earlier game, he looked like a latter-day Steve Foster.

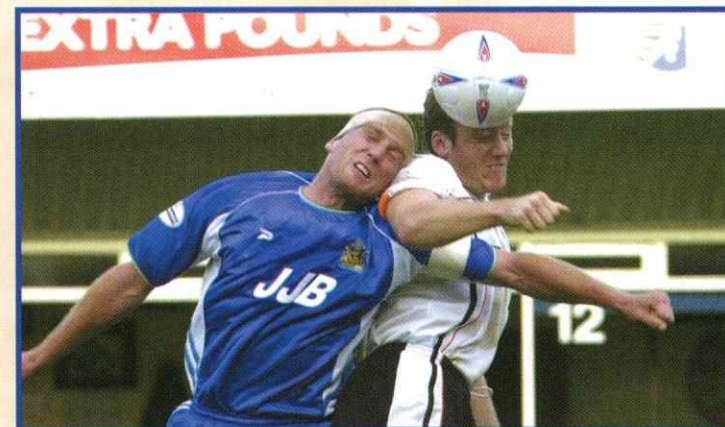

THEY left it late to get the goal, but the Town turned in a highly professional performance at Gresty Road to earn their fourth away win of the season, at the expense of one of the teams in the play-off zone.

They had stars in just about every department, quickly settling into a well-organised unit which never looked like being beaten. All we wanted to make the evening complete was to get a goal on the break, and Steve Howard duly delivered, with his ninth of the season five minutes from time.

Joe Kinnear left out Peter Holmes and replaced him with Ahmet Brkovic to play it tighter in midfield, and it worked a treat. He had to make a change in defence, with Russell Perrett laid low by the groin strain that he had been carrying for some time. Ian Hillier deputised, and he and Chris Coyne were tremendous.

Crewe very rarely looked like breaking through, and neither side was allowed to create too many clear-cut chances. The Town made the best, although former Hatter Efe Sodje brought a good save out of Cedric Berthelin with a header from a corner. The only other time the Town were remotely near conceding a goal was when Kenny Lunt's long-range drive was pushed round a post.

Both those efforts came in a first half in which you could

feel the home side's frustration mounting as the Town took control with ever-growing ease. Howard had one shot saved and put another wide as the Town settled for contain first, attack second.

For once Andrew Fotiadis looked out of sorts, despite being as willing as ever to run at opponents, and was replaced at the interval. Tony Thorpe might have made better of his chance to shine: a superb ball by Matt Spring sent him acing clear, but having done so well to get onto the end of the pass and leave defenders trailing his chip was wide of the target.

As the minutes ticked away the Town looked more and more confident against a team reduced to chasing shadows. And with five minutes to go Spring sent Sol Davis away for a run at the home defence. The defender powered his way through a couple of attempted tackles to reach the edge of the penalty area, and then drove a pass across the face of goal for Howard to come in at the far post and smash his shot into the top of the net.

Crewe boss Dario Gradi could hardly believe it, claiming that a draw would have been the right result. "One goal was always going to decide it, and it was a bit cruel on us that Luton should get it," he said. "I

never thought that Luton were going to open us up, but I have to admit that also we didn't look like opening them up."

Joe Kinnear called it "a great team effort" and found himself nodding energetically as the press questions suggested various contenders for man of the match. Yes, he said, Spring and Skelton were outstanding in the middle. But Brkovic and Robinson played a vital part in that department, keeping the midfield tight. Coyne and Hillier the star men? Yes, they also played well.

The important feature of the Town's performance, said the boss, was that they had worked out their pattern for the game. Players know the jobs they had to do, and did them, and once more Steve Howard had come up with the goods to put the icing on a very palatable cake.

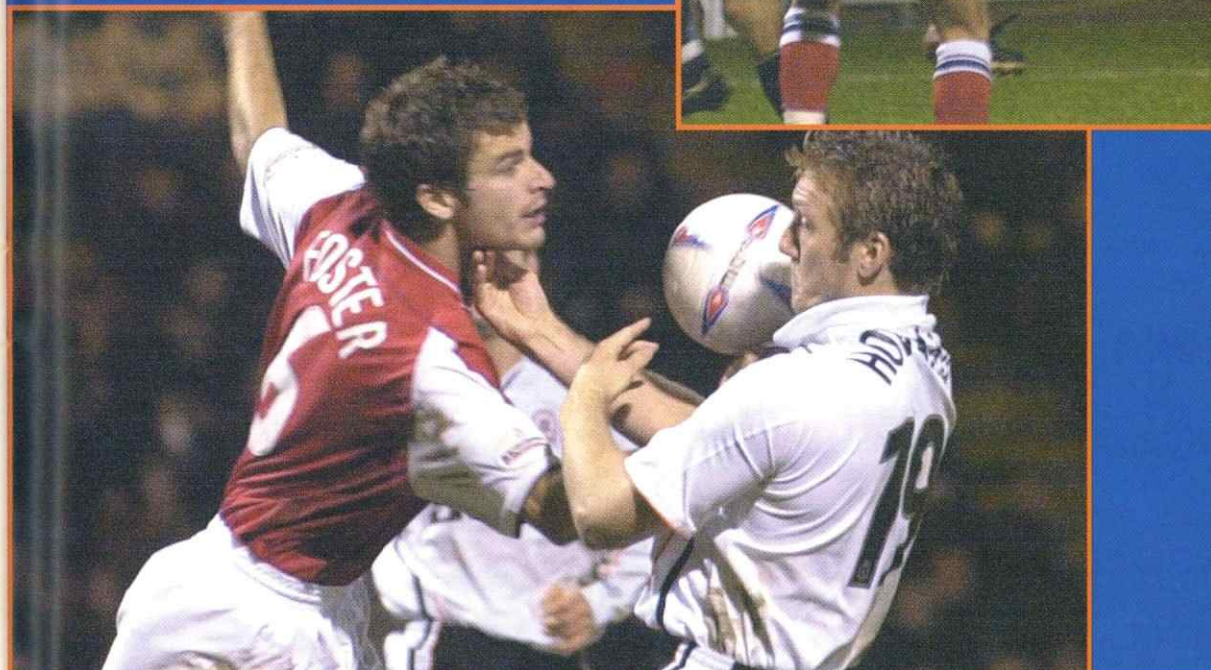
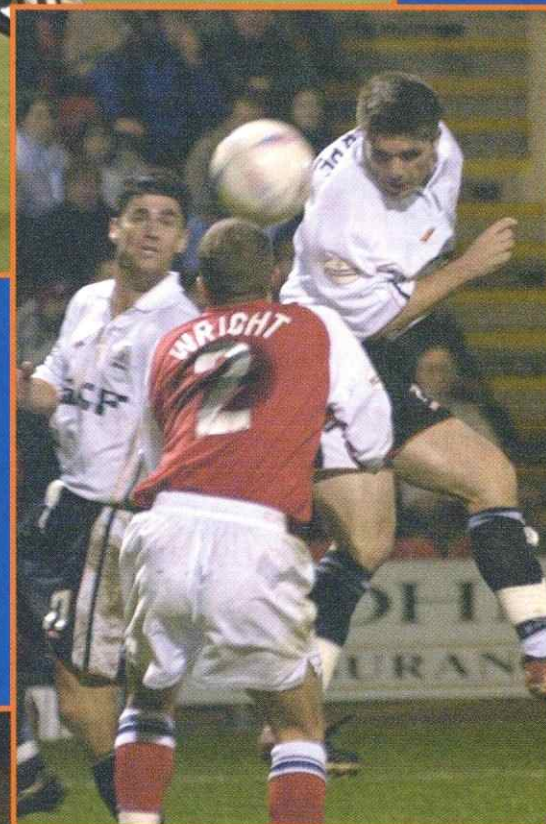

Action Replay

THE END of the Town's magnificent league run of six wins and a draw was a real dampener for their big following at Sixfields. The team that had more than matched top six sides Wigan and Crewe was swamped on a wet and windy afternoon by a side struggling to halt a slide towards the relegation zone after four defeats on the trot.

The formbook counted for nothing as the Town had one of those days when nothing went right for them, against a team which was up for it and hungrier for success.

Failures in both penalty areas were the problem, admitted Joe Kinnear, after seeing the Cobblers become the first league side this season to score three against us with no reply.

As the boss says elsewhere today, it was disappointing, but not the end of the world – win six and lose the next one, then repeat it again and again, and we'll be champions!

Conditions might have been a bit of a leveller – the incessant rain produced a greasy surface where passing weight and timing of tackles was always problematical. On the day, said the Town boss, you could not take it away from Northampton that they had been the better side, with the help of a little luck.

He and home manager Kevan Broadhurst agreed that there were two turning points: one in the first half when Tony Thorpe missed a chance to pull a goal back when the Town were two down, and the other when the next crucial goal was scored soon after the interval. The

Town desperately needed a quick reply after going in two down at half time, but instead wily striker Marco Gabbiadini caught Cedric Berthelin out of position and punished him with an exquisite chip.

The Town had enough chances to have got something out of the game despite being below their best, but the Cobblers also missed a few themselves.

They played it simple and uncomplicated on a day when the Town were, in the word of their manager, poor by comparison with their norm. Two goals in the first 20 minutes gave Northampton a huge lift, with Jamie Forrester the marksman each time. His first was a shot from the inside left position after a diagonal pass by Paul Harsley reached him because Ian Hillier slipped on the treacherous surface when he would normally have made an easy clearance. Forrester's shot took a deflection off Chris Coyne to ensure Berthelin was left stranded. Eleven minutes later a quick attack down their right produced the second goal, Forrester netting from close range after Gabbiadini whipped over a low cross.

Thorpe netted for the Town after 26 minutes, but referee Paul Durkin ruled that Howard had fouled the keeper to make the ball run loose, which ensured that the big striker had to endure a chorus of jeers from his former admirers every time he went near the ball after that.

Thorpe's miss came on 32 minutes: Coyne's clearance down the middle was headed on by Howard, and Thorpe was as quick as ever to latch on to the ball and race clear. But Lee Harper charged out to meet him, and saved with his left leg.

At the interval both managers were telling their team that the next goal would be crucial. The Town had to chase the game, and were caught stretched when a clearance over the top sent Gabbiadini scampering through from midfield, in the inside right channel. Berthelin decided to act as sweeper, but then changed his mind, and was running back towards his unguarded goal as Gabbiadini floated the ball over him to make it 3-0.

The Town never flagged in terms of effort, but the class touch deserted them, and when they did threaten Harper made good saves from Ahmet Brkovic, Thorpe and Peter Holmes.

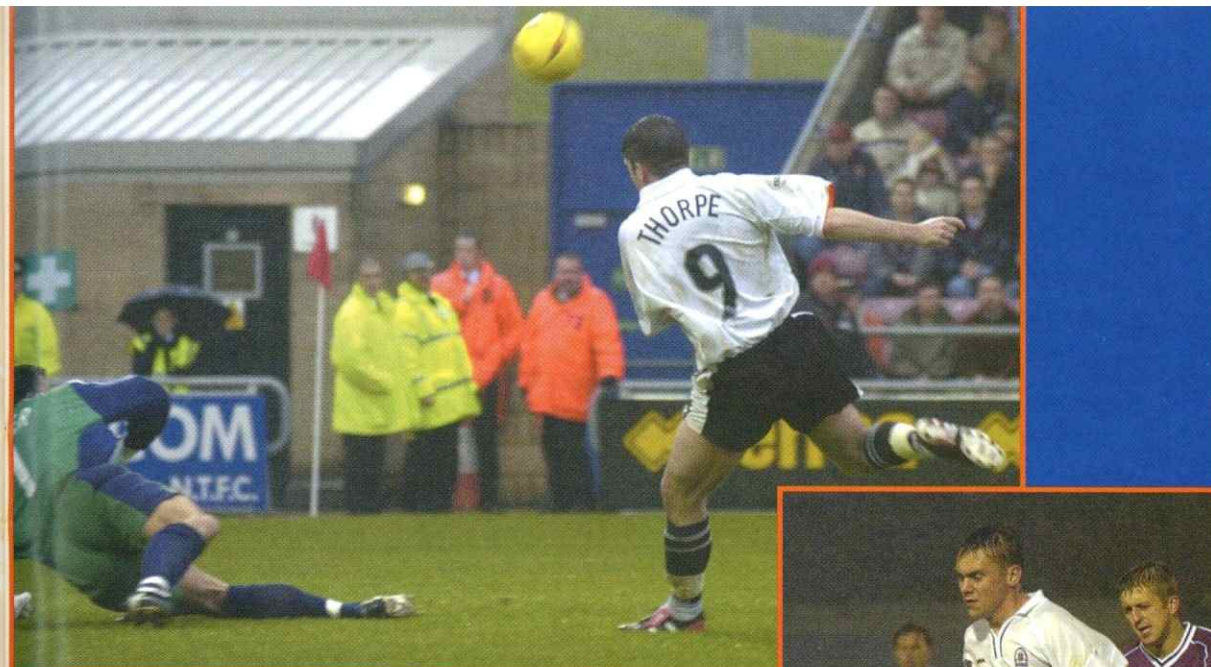

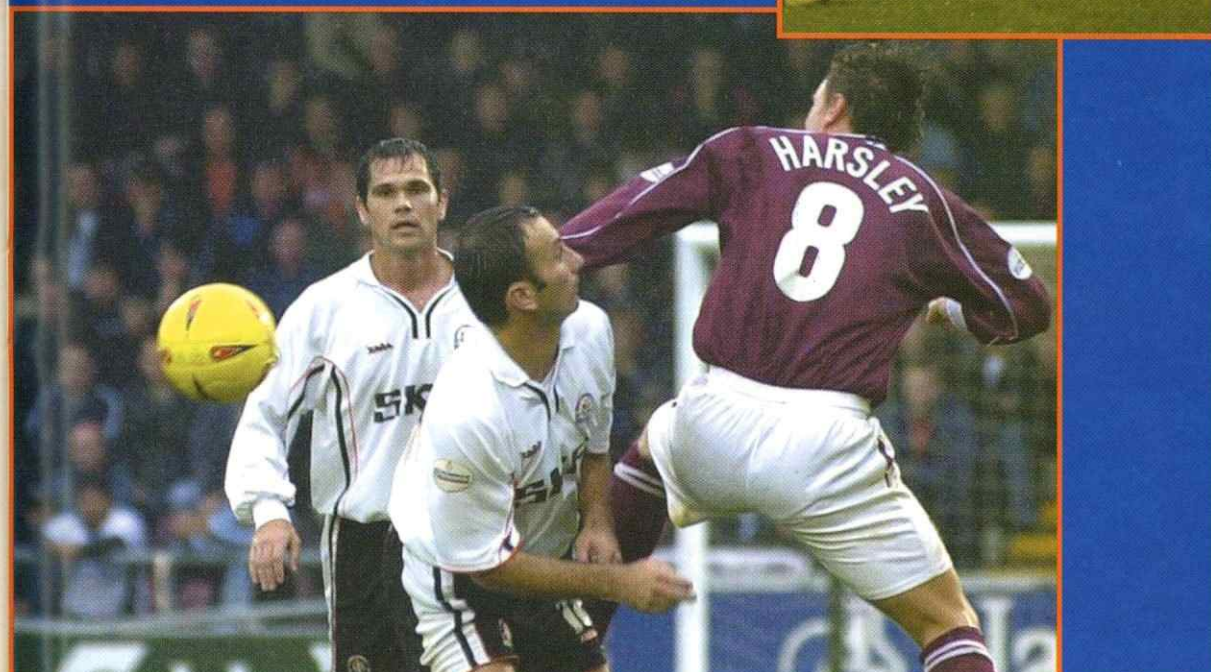
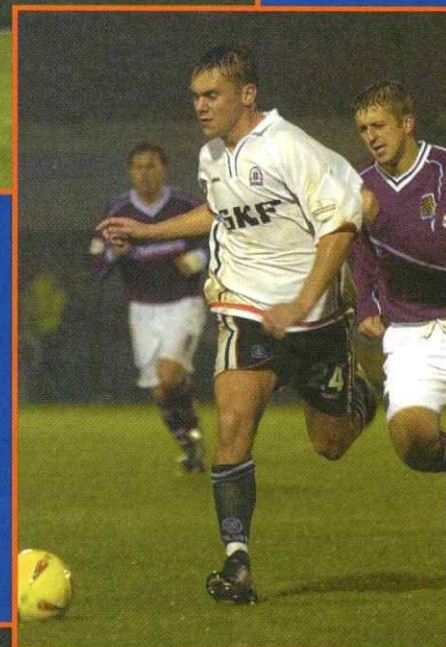

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Luton Belles



THE BELLES returned to league action against Rover Oxford, and came away with a hard-earned 1-0 win in a match that sometimes resembled a battleground. Luton dominated much of the game and restricted a capable Oxford attack to just a single shot during the 90 minutes.

Town finally won the midfield battle, but their efforts were either just wide or kept out by the inspired Oxford keeper. Just as it looked as though Belles would have to settle for a point a stroke of ingenuity from Rhiannon Morgan 12 minutes from the end won all three points. A corner fell to Rhiannon with her back to goal, and she conjured up a back heel which rolled into the net for a well-deserved winner.

This victory proved just how far the young Belles have progressed as they dealt well with the spoiling tactics of an experienced Oxford team. The week before saw the Belles bow out of the FA Cup to Denham United who are two leagues above them in the pyramid. However, the difference was not noticeable. 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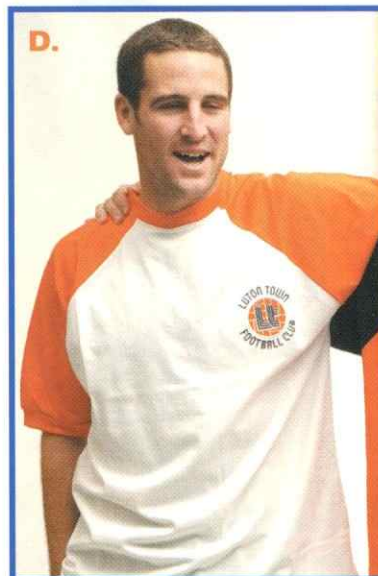

A SLOW start was punished as we conceded a goal after only four minutes, but after that we got into our stride, and eventually were much too good for the visitors. Matthew Judge collected a hat-trick, and we were 2-1 up by the interval. At that stage we should have been doing much better, but the team responded

well to our half-time orders, and persisted with good passing football.

Our marking was at fault when Oxford took the lead: we had cleared a corner, but one of their midfielders was allowed to break forward and lash in a low shot through a crowded penalty area.

Judge equalised on 13 minutes, bending a drive around the goalkeeper, and nine minutes later he did it again, but this time bending the ball the other way. It was disappointing to lead by only 2-1 at half-time, leaving Oxford hope that they might get back into it. But we were rarely in trouble defensively, and the value of chasing a lost cause was illustrated when we made it 3-1 after 58 minutes. Richard Mansell chased a long ball which seemed as though it might go out of play. He got to it just before the line, and put over a cross which gave Tom Freeman an easy close-range headed goal.

Judge completed his hat-trick on 66 minutes, turning down the chance to pass to a colleague in a better position. He had a go himself and potted it – a case of being greedy in the box, which is all right if you score. Eight minutes from time James Osborn completed the scoring after robbing a defender who took too long to make a clearance.

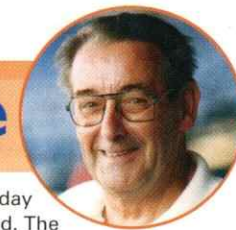

Second Division Scene



THE fourth away win of the season, at Crewe, lifted the Town to ninth in the Second Division, their highest position since February 2000. But the defeat at Sixfields cost a place, as the Town were overtaken by Chesterfield, who edged a 1-0 home win over crisis club Barnsley.

The Tykes, in administration and fighting for survival, dropped into the bottom four for the first time this season. Since their 3-2 win at Kenilworth Road in August Barnsley have managed just two more victories in 13 attempts. They have also lost Steve Parkin, who guided them to the win at Luton having done the same with Rochdale the season before. He was sacked by the administrators to save money, and caretaker boss Glyn Hodges has taken only two points from his four games in charge.

At the top, Cardiff City still look good for promotion, with only two defeats in their first 17 league matches. Peterborough were the latest to be seen off at Ninian Park, beaten 3-0 after having defender Simon Rea sent off after just 15 seconds for a "professional foul" on Robert Earnshaw.

Red cards were the order of the day elsewhere as well, on an afternoon when the Town, for the first time this season, played a game in which neither side received a card of either colour. Thank you, Premiership ref Paul Durkin!

Our old pal Alan White of Colchester was the weekend's

first red card victim, in a Friday night six-pointer with Mansfield. The Stags are still bottom, despite a 4-2 success at Layer Road, only their second win in eight attempts since their surprise victory at Kenilworth Road. Iyeden Christie netted the winner in that 3-2 success, and at Colchester he got all four. White got his second yellow card for fouling the striker, when the game was all but finished. Crewe Alexandra were another team who finished with ten men. Elsewhere today are pictures of Richard Walker in strong defensive mode against the Town. He was again at Wigan, sent off after only seven minutes to give Wigan a penalty from which they took the lead. An own goal made it 2-0 to take Wigan's run to 14 games without defeat.

They still had to settle for third place, because Iain Dowie continues to lead Oldham from success to success, except when he comes up against the Town. Our win at Boundary Park last month is the only reverse Oldham have suffered in their last 12 league games. Today's visitors were involved in another red card affair, in a goal-less draw at home to QPR. Visiting goalkeeper Simon Royce was sent off after 36 minutes for handling outside his area, but Port Vale were unable to make the extra man count.

Brian Horton's men come to Kenilworth Road needing to win by three goals to overtake the Town in the table. Their away record isn't bad - three wins, two draws and three defeats, with 11 goals scored and 12 conceded.

The victories were 1-0 at Wigan in August, 2-1 at Swindon in early September, and 1-0 at Cheltenham two weeks later. The draws were 2-2 at Huddersfield on October 5 and 1-1 at Brentford a fortnight later. The defeats were 1-3 at Cardiff and 1-2 at Chesterfield in August, when Vale went to the bottom of the table for a couple of weeks, and 2-3 at Blackpool seven weeks ago. Vale have lost only once in their last six league outings, at home to Crewe.
