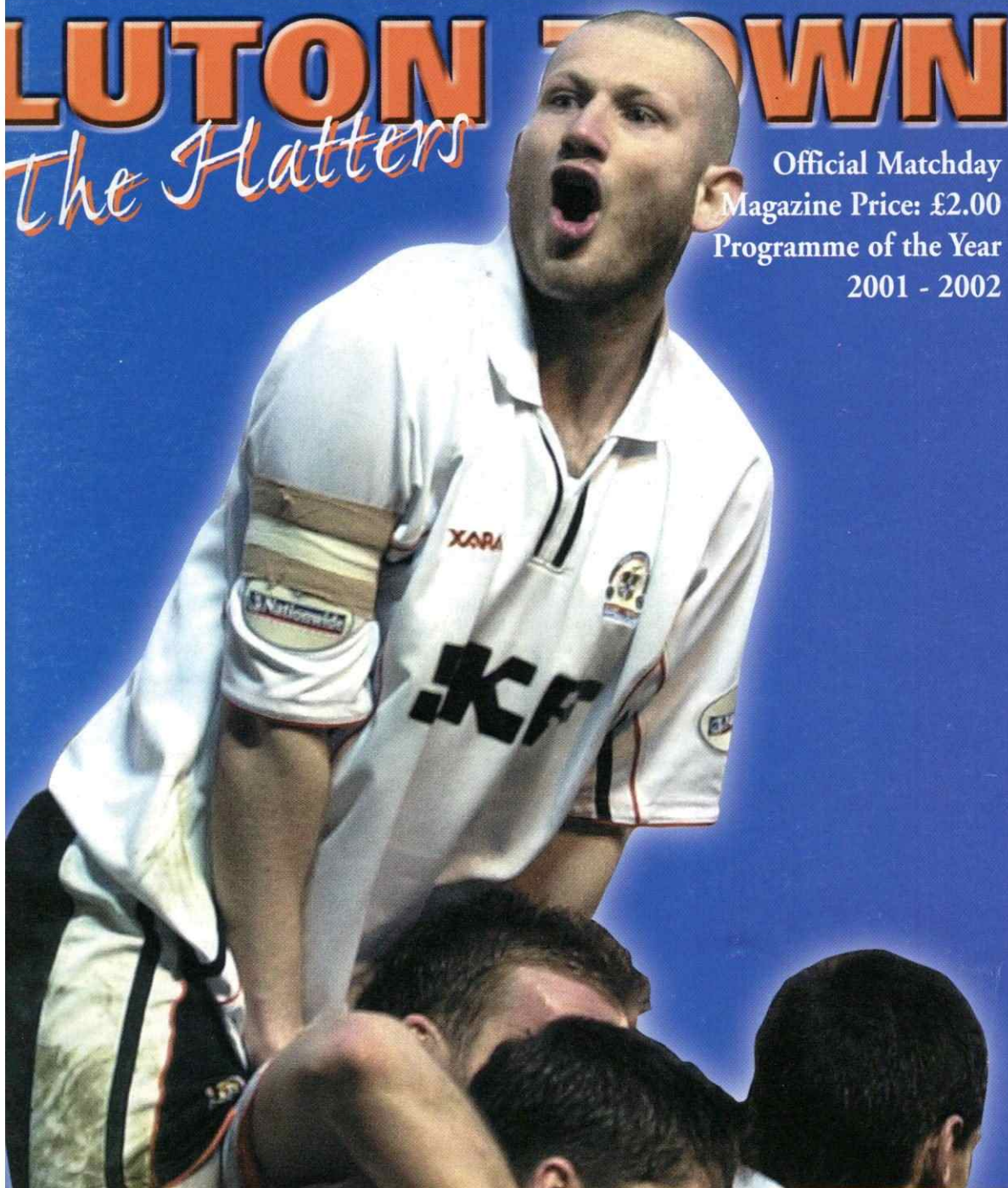

Inside Forward

CLUB chairman Mike Watson-Challis delighted a full house in the Eric Morecambe suite on Wednesday when he headed a boardroom panel for an "Any Questions?" session with supporters.

It was a two-hour grilling for the chairman, and for his deputy Eric Hood, and Yvonne Fletcher, the fans' representative on the board, and at the end of it they were given an ovation.

The night's topics were wide-ranging, headed by questions about plans for the new stadium, team-building prospects, and, inevitably, money.

Luckily for Luton Town, Mike is a long-time fan himself, and is putting in £4.5million a year to cover current losses. Like most clubs in the Nationwide League gate receipts are well short of running costs – in the Town's case the shortfall during the season is £500,000 per month.

After taking control in the summer of 2000, the chairman and his colleagues mapped out a five-year plan for the club. It envisaged being back in a secure First Division place, and in a new stadium, with a chance of then being able to balance the books, and perhaps make a profit.

The plan included a budget, with the chairman knowing that he would have to cover a lot of losses before his dream of walking into the new stadium became reality. The club, he said, was being run within that budget.

The push for a return to the First Division was on target, but Eric Hood, who is in charge of the relocation project, admitted that the stadium scheme had "slipped a little."

Even so, it might well keep to the final schedule. More paperwork has to be done, and discussions are ongoing with various parties who might be part of the project to help funding. There might also be a ground sponsor, with the chairman, taking a swipe at a previous owner, promising that it would certainly not be called the Watson-Challis!

The plan is for a ground with a capacity of 15,000 to start with, but capable of being increased to 20,000 or 25,000 seats later. Other uses would enable it to earn revenue day by day, instead of being a once-a-fortnight operation. Building costs would be around £15million, but there would be other expenditure involved with groundworks and so on. For instance, to move the big electricity pylon on the site, near junction ten, will add £1.5million to the bill. But the club expects to receive a grant of around £2million from Sport England.

Mr Hood said he hoped that the planning application would be ready for submission to Luton Borough Council by Easter, but the Highways Authority would have to be consulted, and the application would automatically be referred to the Secretary of State. At the worst, Whitehall might need six months to think it over, at best a couple of weeks. Actual building work would take a year, and if all goes well the stadium could be ready for use two years from now.

Fans were concerned about reports that Joe Kinnear did not have funds to strengthen the team. Cash is available, said the chairman. A supporter shot back: So why didn't we sign Cedric Berthelin for £20,000? Said the chairman: Joe will have money for another goalkeeper. At the time he wanted to sign Cedric we didn't have the money, and had two keepers under contract. Who's heard of a Second Division team with three goalkeepers?" Mr Hood added that the deal would have cost £150,000, not the £20,000 quoted. The smaller sum was for a contract to the end of this season, but the goalkeeper would not accept that, and wanted a deal for the following season as well, and the board rejected that idea.

Mr Watson-Challis said he would not allow huge increases in the wages bill, which was why Matt Taylor went to Portsmouth. There he could earn £10,000 a week, and the Town were not willing to match that, much as they wanted to keep the wing-back.

He believed the current squad would win promotion again this season, and had already planned for that. The team that gets you up might have to be strengthened to stay up, and allowances have been made for that. "It's no good getting back into the First Division and then coming straight back down again," said the chairman. "I would look for us to be eighth or tenth in the First Division if we get promoted."

He also confessed that he dropped a clanger when he appointed his first manager, but made up for it by hiring Joe Kinnear – "the best thing this club has done for many years."

The boss's contract runs to the end of next season, but within three months, said the chairman, talks will be organised to try to persuade Joe to sign an extension to the deal.

And the chairman summed up why he has so far put £17million into the club: "Luton Town is a wonderful club to follow, and I am proud to be here, and to be a supporter of Luton Town. We are confident we can be in the First Division next season."

"I want to walk up the steps to a new stadium before I die, and I want this club to be successful."

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Manager's View



THIS being our first home game of 2003, I would like to wish everyone a very Happy New Year, with the hope that all our wishes are granted, especially when the final league table is compiled in five months time!

The postponement of two home games at the start of the month means we will have a very busy February, with four games at home in 15 days, including the two we have in hand over most of the other promotion chasers.

Obviously they must be turned into points, and if we perform as well as we did at Barnsley we will be all right. We looked a little rusty in the early stages, but then settled down to do a thoroughly professional job, despite being down to ten men.

The two-week break from league football was welcome so far as I was concerned. We had been down to the bare bones recently because of our injury list, and needed time to get players back to fitness, to regroup and to recharge the batteries.

The players enjoyed the luxury of a mid-season break, and while I have always been ready to let rip when they have deserved it, they have for the most part performed with great distinction so far this season.

We took a long

time to come to terms with this division, but we have demonstrated that we need fear no-one in our fixture list. Since my last column we have proved the point against Cardiff City, when our victory was clear cut and very well deserved. We followed up with a great win at Wycombe, but then, on New Year's Day, we paid a high price for failings in both boxes, losing a game we know we should have won.

That put greater pressure on us to get something out of the Barnsley game. Once more we made life difficult for ourselves by gifting the opposition a goal, but after that we were by far the better team and scored three well-taken goals, a brilliant left foot strike by Matt Spring which put us back in the game, and two excellent goals by Tony Thorpe to seal it. And here's a question for the anoraks: has any Luton Town side ever scored three goals away from home while down to ten men, or did we set another club record at Oakwell?

The major lesson to be learned from the first half of the season is that we must be more ruthless and kill teams off when we are in control of games. All too often we have let teams off the hook and thrown games away when we have been in wining positions. It is

something we have spoken about and are determined to put right. Even so, we have to be fairly satisfied with our progress so far.

I am confident our squad is capable of mounting a serious challenge. If we have to win promotion via the play-offs, so be it.

Our players deserve every credit for the way they have conducted themselves in the campaign so far, and I can promise you that we are all hungry for success. There is an excellent dressing room atmosphere, and I cannot fault any player on commitment and willingness to work.

We are determined to improve our home record, and if we do manage to bring it up to the level of our away form, which we must aim for, we will be flying.

We need to go through the rest of the season with no more failures on our own pitch. Against Wigan and Cardiff we have proved we can match or beat the best in the division. We now need to be more ruthless against every other visiting side that comes here, starting with today's game. With your fantastic support, we can do it.

Keep the faith, and enjoy the game.

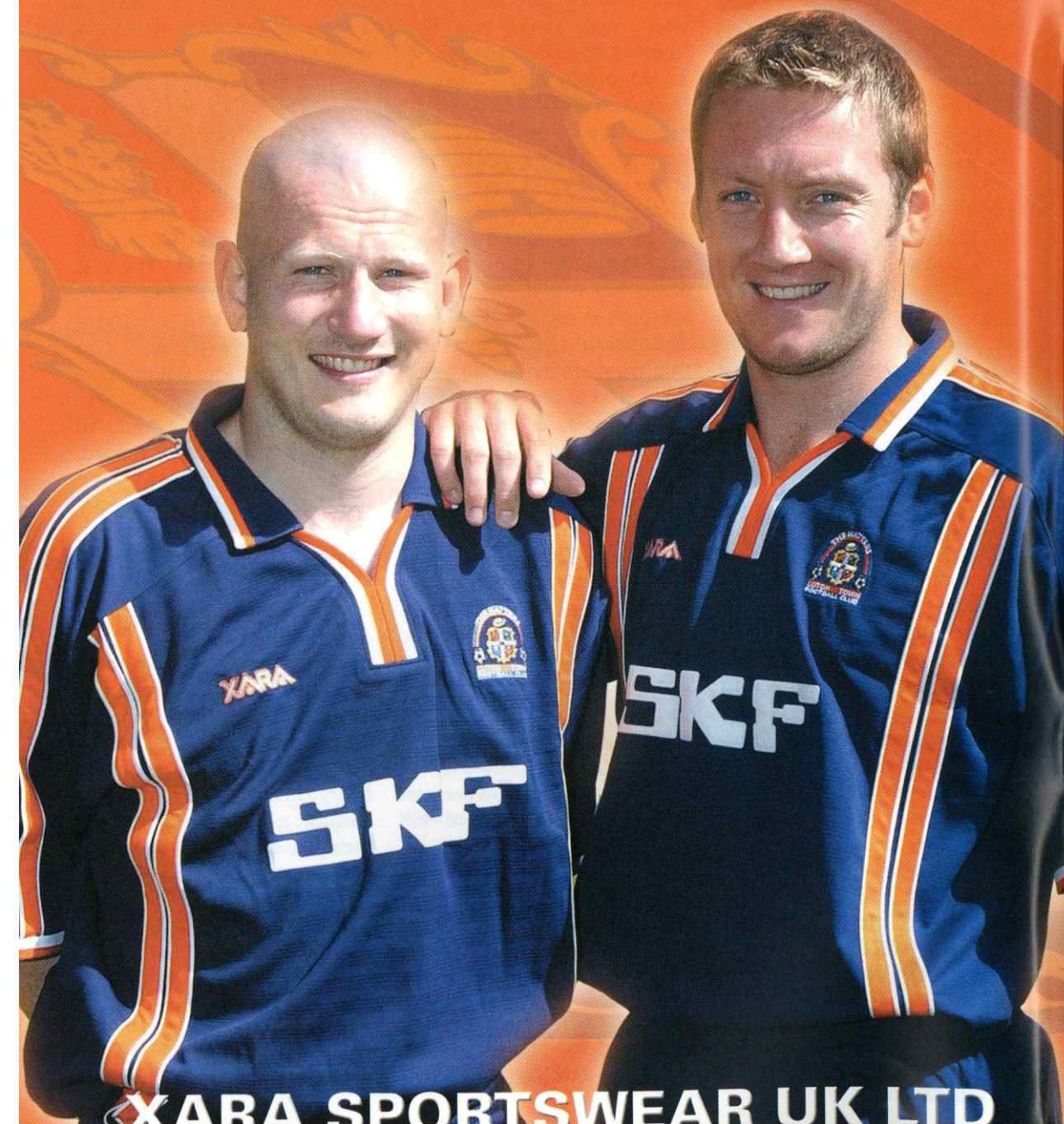

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Captain's View



IF FELT great to be back on a football field again at Barnsley – and our performance in very difficult circumstances made it all the more enjoyable as we came home with a victory which was much needed, and very well earned.

After missing the whole of December because of injury, I was looking forward to returning to league action against Plymouth a fortnight ago, and the postponement was a bitter disappointment. We were all in confident mood, having enjoyed a mini-break the previous week.

That had given several of us the chance to regain fitness, and I had worked as hard as I could to stay as fit as possible while I was getting over my thigh injury. It was a pleasure to be back in full training, but even better to be in the side at Oakwell.

The big talking point, of course, was the red card for Carl Emberson, and that was harsh. The question of whether he handled inside or outside the area was a very tight decision, and Embo was sure his hands and the ball were on the right side of the line. But if it was outside the area, we thought it deserved a yellow card at the most, and not a red.

But it made us all the more determined, and I could sense that everyone was

confident we could get a result. We always look good going forward, and Matt Spring produced a great strike to put us level just before the break. That added to our confidence, and our true character shone through in the second half, even though we were under a bit of pressure in the closing stages.

Other results on Saturday showed how important it was for us to get that win. The two postponements cost us our top six place, and we have a six-point gap to make up on QPR, with two games in hand. We are in a mini-league involving the teams in the top half of the table who all have a chance of a play-off spot.

We need to win again today because if teams around you win and you don't you can soon find yourself sliding down the table. With key players back I see no reason why we should not embark on another long unbeaten run, like we did a year ago. Realistically the play-off is the most likely route to Division One for teams like us. I know that some think the play-off system is unfair, and fans remind me that Luton finished third in the Second Division nearly five years ago, but lost out to a Crewe team who finished fifth. That must have been hard to take, and I don't want

to see it happen again!

But the play-off system has been in force since before I became a professional, and I have no problems with it. In some ways, if you win the play-off final it must be more satisfying than going up as runners-up. It must be a wonderful day out for everyone, especially fans, when you win promotion through the play-off final.

If we are to get there – and we all think we can – we have got to be more consistent, especially at home. On our day, if we apply ourselves properly, we can beat anyone in this league. We have already proved that, by taking points off the likes of Wigan, Cardiff and Bristol City. We were also good value for our win at Wycombe four weeks ago, where the support was, as usual, fantastic. We and you need to do it again today.

With 20 more league games to play our future is in our own hands. While everyone at the club and the fans can do their bit, in the end it is all down to the players. We are all in it together, which was the attitude we had last season. We need to bag three more points today, and as always you can help by giving your noisy backing to the lads.

Treatment Room

THE RESULT was not the only good news from our trip to Barnsley: we came home with no more injuries, and the fortnight without competitive football before that was a Godsend for players previously in the treatment room.

The injury list became shorter than it has been since I got here, thanks to a lot of hard work involved by everyone involved, including the players.

Kevin Nicholls, Matt Spring, Alan Neilson and Alan Kimble were all back in full training, and returned to the team at Oakwell. But Sol Davis collected a thigh strain in training the day before and while he is doing OK he needs

more time to complete his recovery.

Emmerson Boyce missed the Barnsley match because of a stomach muscle problem. It was not serious, but affected his ability to accelerate, which is one of the strongest parts of his game, and he was left out of the side to help his recovery. At the time of writing, on Thursday, I thought he had a good chance of being able to return to the squad today, and Ahmet Brkovic was also hoping to be in with a shout, after having his foot stamped on during the reserves match on Wednesday.

David Bayliss, who made his second appearance as a sub at Barnsley, following a shoulder operation, has suffered a setback. He tore a calf muscle

playing for the reserves on Wednesday, and will be out for a while.

Russ Perrett's return plans have been interrupted by a hamstring pull collected during a private practice game against Arsenal last week, but it is not a major problem, and I expect him to resume training on Monday.

Aaron Skelton and Adrian Forbes continue to do well after their knee operations. The consultant who performed the surgery is very pleased with their progress, and they continue to get better day by day. Forbes is well ahead of schedule after his cruciate ligament injury and is now working to regain his thigh muscle bulk.

FIRSTLY today, a belated but nevertheless sincere Happy New Year to everyone. It seems an extraordinary length of time since we played first team football here at Kenilworth Road, and I am sure, like me, you couldn't wait for today to come.

To confirm the re-arranged dates for the two postponed Nationwide League Division Two matches, we will entertain Blackpool on Tuesday February 11 and Plymouth Argyle on Tuesday February 25. Both games will have our normal kick-off time of 7.45pm, and tickets purchased for the original dates will still be valid. However, if you bought tickets but cannot attend on the new dates, refunds are available by returning your ticket to the ticket office before the relevant match is played.

I know a lot of supporters find it frustrating when Saturday matches are changed to mid-week fixtures. Like you, everyone here would also like to play on the scheduled dates. Both postponements were, of course, caused by circumstances beyond our control. Blackpool's visit was called off because their FA Cup-tie took precedence, while the Plymouth match was postponed despite heroic efforts by the groundstaff to try to beat the frost. Both teams wanted to get the game played, but as you will recall bad weather affected the whole country, and hard though the groundstaff worked the referee had lit-

tle choice but to call the game off. The pitch was bone hard, and would have been a danger to players.

One supporter telephoned to tell me "My back garden is fine." However, the pitch is a great deal larger than normal back gardens, and does not benefit from wind or sunshine on the Main Stand side. And the stadium always seems to hold the cold once it gets in. Our youth team was the first to play on the pitch in 2003, and as you can read elsewhere they are still doing well in the FA Youth Cup, going through to the last 16 after beating Bradford. We will be at home to Barnsley or Middlesbrough in the next round. We do not have a date for that game yet because Middlesbrough had a dispensation to play at Barnsley after the scheduled date because they had a player on international duty. They will play at Oakwell on February 3, and we will not be able to sort out a date for the visit of Barnsley or Middlesbrough until that match is played. As soon as we have it, the date will be advertised through the media and local radio, in the match programme and on the website. And please do come and support the boys - it was good to see so many here when we played Bradford, and it does make a difference to have a good crowd.

Another date yet to be confirmed is the Beds Senior Cup match, away to Bedford Town. It is proving difficult to fit in

due to youth and reserve team games which are to be re-arranged. Again, we will publicise the date as soon as it is known.

Elsewhere in the programme today you can read about problems we are encountering with persistent standing, and the threat that it could lead to some sections of the ground being closed. I would ask all supporters to help us, although I do appreciate the problems that the location of some seats give to some supporters.

The Football Safety Authorities can take stringent measures against us, and have reminded us of that fact. None of us wants that to happen. Geoff Lovell, our Safety Officer, is attending a meeting on the subject of standing with the Authorities and other clubs in London next week, and I have asked him to bring up the question of why at some all-seater stadia it appears to be OK to stand while others, like ourselves, are being targeted to ensure we uphold the regulations. I find it totally frustrating, as you probably do.

Finally today, there is a bucket collection in the ground by the Luton North Rotary Club in aid of Polio Eradication, an organisation dedicated to wiping out a disease which is still common in many parts of the world. I am sure our supporters will give generously, as always.

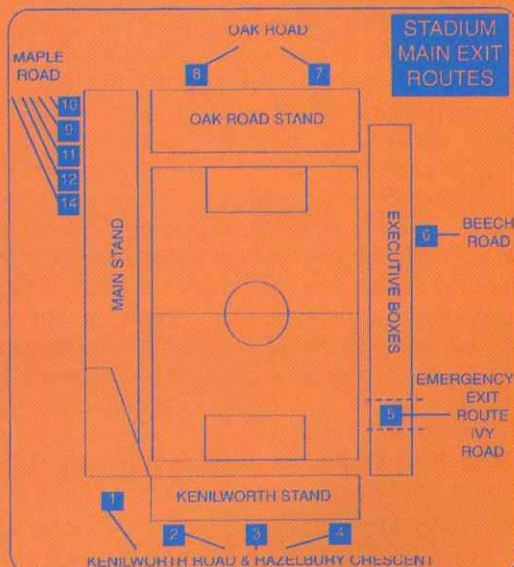

In the event of evacuation from all or part of the stadium, you will receive instructions over the public address system on how you should leave. In an evacuation of the main stand you will be instructed to use the pitch. Stewards will direct you to the nearest exit. It may be that your normal exit route will not be available. On leaving the stadium, you will find some roads closed to pedestrians, to enable swift and unobstructed access for the emergency services. Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.

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Hatters Away

THE TOWN'S hectic February fixture list starts with two successive away games, before four in a row at home. On Saturday we make the short trip to Peterborough and a fortnight today we take on Brian Horton's Port Vale. The Bobbers Travel Club and Town on Tour are both offering their usual services to the games.

Kick-off at Peterborough is at 12noon, so it will be a 9am start from Luton. Town on Tour's service includes a pick-up at Milton Keynes Coachway at around 9.20, and fares are £12 for LTSC members, £10 for junior members and £14 for others. The Bobbers fares are £8.50 for adults and £7 for senior citizens and under-16s.

For the trip to Vale Park the Bobbers departure time from Luton is 11am, and fares are £12, £10 for concessions. Town on Tour will leave Maple Road at 10.30am, calling at MK Coachway about 20 minutes later. Fares are the same as for Peterborough.

Simple Drive to London Road

PETERBOROUGH is one of the easiest grounds to reach by car, and there is ample parking alongside the London Road stadium.

Bookings for away games travel can be made at LTSC or the Bobbers kiosks in Kenilworth Road, before or after today's match.

Paul Deason on 01234 750996 will take phone bookings for the Bobbers, whose service includes pick-ups at Cranfield, Marston Moretaine, Ampthill, Flitwick, Westoning and opposite the Travelodge Motel in Dunstable Road, Luton, close to the M1.

Town on Tour is an offshoot of Luton Town Supporters Club, and members get the best deals. You can book seats on the phone by calling 07960 567465.

Maple Road car park, which will be stewarded, is available for coach passengers, at £4 per car.



London Road

The best route is up the A1, reached by leaving Luton on the A505 east, through Hitchin and then to Baldock to take the A1 north. A couple of miles beyond Norman Cross junction turn off right on the A1139, which is signposted to Peterborough. This road becomes the Fletton Parkway, which you leave at junction 3 to follow signs towards the city centre. Follow those signs until you run onto the Nene Parkway, and then follow the signs towards Woodston Industry until you find yourself in Shrewsbury Avenue. At the next T-junction turn right onto Oundle Road, and at the next roundabout turn right into London Road and the ground is on your left.

The Road to Vale Park

IF YOU want to drive to Vale Park, it's an easy trip if motorway conditions are OK, and our

recent experience is that the M6 is not too bad on Saturdays.

An alternative route to the one that follows is straight up M1 to near the East Midlands Airport, and then to Stoke via the A50.

The shortest route is north up M1, then M6, leaving at junction 15 to take the A500. The Police recommend that you avoid traffic congestion in the centre of Burslem by taking this route: follow the signs to Stoke on the A500 dual carriageway for nearly four miles, before leaving the



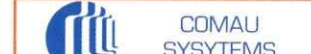
Vale Park

A500 where it is signposted to Newcastle-under-Lyme and Leek on the A53. At the roundabout turn right, signposted towards Leek and Stoke, and where the road divides keep right, on the Leek Road, the A50. Continue for just under four miles after crossing a fly-over and the ground is signposted. There is ample parking space at the ground.

Mileage from Luton: About 145.

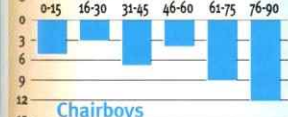

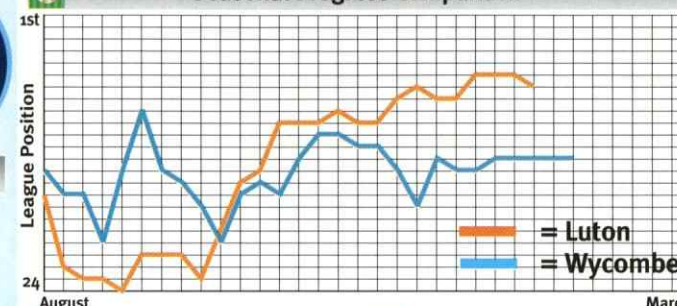

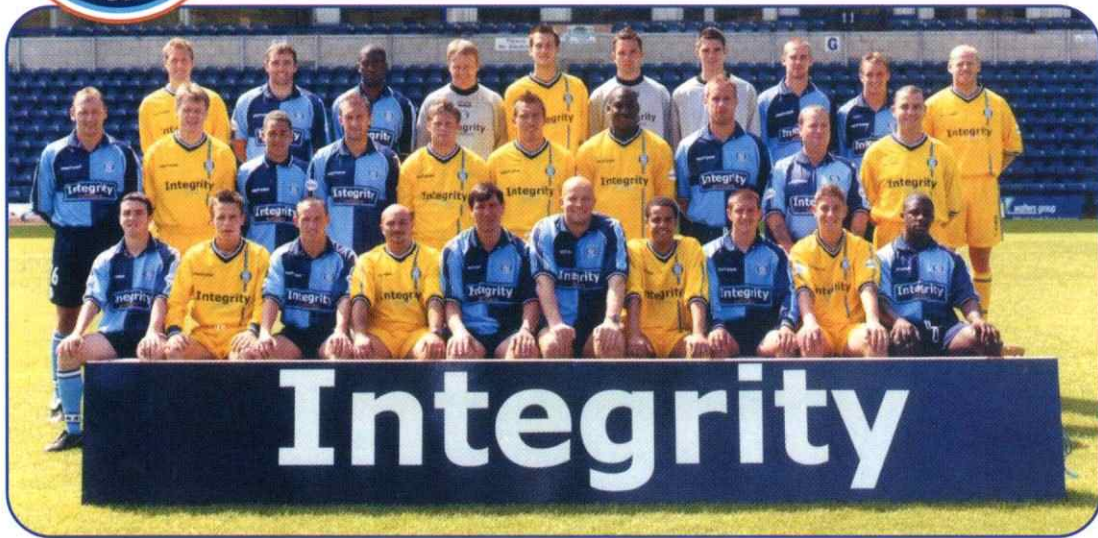

MANAGER

LAWRIE SANCHEZ

Started his career at Reading playing in the Third and Fourth Divisions. Moved to Wimbledon for £30,000 just before Christmas 1984 when Dave Bassett was Manager. In the 10 seasons at Wimbledon he played 317 games and scored 35 goals. Had a knack of scoring vital goals, got the winner against Huddersfield that took the Dons into the First Division (now Premiership) and the winner against Liverpool in the 1988 F.A.Cup Final. Went to Swindon for a short period before managing Sligo Rovers. Took Sligo into Europe in the Cup Winners Cup before losing to F C Bruges. Lawrie was enticed back to

Wimbledon by Joe Kinnear to manage the Dons reserve side. He won the Football Combination in his second year in charge, the only time Wimbledon have won the competition. He was appointed first team Coach in 1997-98. He played for N. Ireland. His Mother was from Belfast and his Father from Ecuador. Lawrie is 41 years of age and was appointed Manager of Wycombe Wanderers on 5th February 1999.

GOALKEEPERS

1. MARTIN TAYLOR BORN TAMWORTH 9.12.66

Started his career with Mile Oak Rovers and after two seasons joined Derby County, where he made a total of 140 league and cup appearances. He made his

debut for Wycombe, whilst on loan from Derby County, at a home match vs Shrewsbury on the 29th March 1997. Kept 18 clean sheets during his first season and has now made over 150 appearances. Won the 'Player of the Season' award for 1999-2000. Scored the winning penalty at Selhurst Park when Wanderers defeated Wimbledon to reach the quarter finals of the F.A. Cup in 2001.

Martin collected the 'Player of the Season' award for the third successive season in 2001-02. He was the only player to appear in all 63 of Wanderers matches in season 2000-01.

13. MARK OSBORN BORN BLETCHLEY 19.6.81

Highly promising young goal-

Wycombe Wanderers



keeper now a full time pro signed from the YT ranks. Made his Football League debut against Cambridge United on 9th October 1999. Had a loan spell with Marlow of the Rymans League for a month in January 2000, and then spent a month with Hampton & Richmond in September 2000. Has gone on loan to Farnborough Town for the entire season.

22. FRANK TALIA BORN MELBOURNE 20.8.72

Arrived on a three month loan deal in August 2002 as cover for Martin Taylor. The former Blackburn Rovers, Swindon, Wolves, Sheffield Utd and Reading keeper was out of contract at the end of last season. Made his first team debut for the Blues when Martin Taylor was out injured, earlier this season and continued with a run of good performances. Had his contract extended to mid February 2003.

DEFENDERS

5. PAUL MCCARTHY BORN 4/8/71 CORK

Joined from Brighton & Hove Albion for £100,000. He has 10 under 21's Caps for the Republic of Ireland. Started last season in fine form but was side lined with an ankle injury that kept him out for two months. Returned to the side but suffered further niggling injuries right to the end of the season. Was the leading scorer in the F.A. Cup run of 200-01 with five goals, also the leading goalscorer that season with a total of eight. Paul is the current captain of the side now starting his sixth season.

6. MARK ROGERS BORN GEULPH 3.11.78

Arrived from Canada in July 1998. Fought his way into the side after good displays in the Avon Combination reserve side. Injuries

to other defenders also enabled Mark to become a regular fixture in the back four. His displays called him into the Canadian squad for the Concacaf Gold Cup held in the USA where they reached the semi-finals. Can play as a right sided defender, but does prefer a central role. Made his Football League debut at Oldham 2nd November 1999 and went on to secure a regular place in the side. Signed a new contract in March 2002 that will keep him at the club until 2005.

3. CHRIS VINNICOMBE BORN EXETER 20.10.70

Started as YTS at Exeter City, before moving to Glasgow Rangers for £150,000 in November 1989. Did not make too many appearances for Rangers before being transferred to Burnley for £200,000 in May 1994. A good left sided defender he made over 90 appearances for Burnley before joining Wycombe on a free transfer in the summer of 1998. Was a regular choice at left back last season and became one of the most consistent performers in the team. Scored his first goal for the club in the very last game of 2000-2001 against Colchester United.

18. BEN TOWNSEND BORN 8.10.81 READING

Came through the club's YTS route, has made a number of appearances in the first team at right back. Debut at Cambridge in the last game of season 1999-2000, comfortable on the ball and can cross a ball well. His performances in 2000-01 earned him a new contract that ties him to the club until 2003. Came on as sub at Selhurst Park and scored one of the penalties in the famous F.A. Cup shoot out win.

17. ROGER JOHNSON BORN ASHFORD 28.4.83.

The 6'3" central defender joined from Portsmouth in 1998 and gave outstanding performances in the youth team. Made his first team debut at Cambridge United in the last game of season 1999-2000. Made his home debut against Reading the following season. Signed a one year pro contract in June 2001.

4. ANDY THOMSON BORN SWINDON 28.3.74

Started his career at Swindon Town but did not get a chance of regular first team football and moved to Portsmouth in December 1995 for £75,000. He spent four seasons at Fratton Park before joining Bristol Rovers for £60,000 in January 1999. Captained the side that went close to gaining promotion to Division One. With his contract up, at the end of season 2001-02 he was released to join Wanderers just before transfer deadline day in March 2002. Made his debut for the Blues at Northampton on 6th April 2002.

MIDFIELDERS

30. STEVE BROWN BORN NORTHAMPTON 6/7/66

Joined in February 1994 from Northampton Town, where he was team captain, for a fee of £40,000 when Martin O'Neill was manager at Wycombe.. Made over 200 appearances for the Cobblers and 240 League appearances for Wycombe. Signed a new 2 year contract in June 98. Scored the important equaliser against Wimbledon at Adams Park in the 2-2 draw in the fifth round of the F.A. Cup. Signed an extension to his contract that will keep him at Wycombe until 2003.

25. MARTYN LEE BORN GUILDFORD 10.8.80

Signed a professional contract May 99 having been a YT at the club.

Diminutive left sided mid fielder who made his Football League debut at Chesterfield 30 January 1999. Continued to impress in the Avon Combination side and played in the final three Nationwide League games of last season. His neat and skillful play earned him a new contract with the club through to 2003. Gave a great display at Grimsby in the Third Round F.A. Cup replay last season. Went on loan to Cheltenham Town at the end of last season and took part in the play off matches that saw them promoted to Division Two.

11. DANNIE BULMAN BORN ASHFORD 24.1.79.



Joined local club Ashford Town at 15 and made first team debut at 16. Spotted by John Gregory when manager at Wycombe and played four games for reserve side. Signed at start of 98-99 season for £10,000 and made first team debut against Bristol Rovers 31st August 98. Scored equaliser coming on as sub when Rovers keeper slammed ball against his backside. Forced his way into the

side during season 1999-2000, became a permanent fixture during 2000-01 with some excellent performances.

8. KEITH RYAN BORN NORTHAMPTON 25/6/70

Arrived from Berkhamsted during the 1990 close season after making some reserve appearances the previous year. A central midfielder who has also played in the defence and up front. He scored on his debut for Wycombe and was an FA Trophy winner in 1991 and 1993, and a Play-off winner in 1994. Made two successful comebacks from serious knee injuries. Played at centre forward in a handful of games in season 1999-2000 and scored 5 goals. Keith has signed a new contract that will keep at the club until the summer of 2003.

28. MICHAEL SIMPSON BORN NOTTINGHAM 28.2.74.

Signed by tribunal from Notts County in January 1997. Began as a YT with Notts County 1992 to 1997. Made his debut for Wycombe v Chesterfield on December 14th, 1996. Had his best season for the club in 1999-2000 with some sterling performances in the centre of midfield, continued his form through last two seasons, and he signed a new three and a half year contract at the start of January 2001 that will tie him to the club until 2004.

23. IAN SIMPEMBA BORN DUBLIN 28.3.83.

Joined Wycombe from school is yet to make his first team debut. At 6'2" he is a dominant central midfielder player who was selected to for the U18 Eire side to tour Japan in June this season. After excellent performances in the youth team he signed a one year

pro contract in June 2001. Went on loan to Woking for three months and became an important part of their Conference survival.

7. DARREN CURRIE BORN HAMPSTEAD 29.11.74.

Signed from Barnet for £200,000 on Tuesday 3rd July 2001. Scored 11 goals for the Bees during 2000-01, still unable to save them from relegation to the Conference. Darren plays wide right and will be looking forward to teaming up once more with former Barnet striker Sean Devine.

14. STUART ROBERTS BORN CARMARTHEN 22.7.80.

Joined Swansea City as a trainee and became a regular in the first team squad season 2000-01. Showed his versatility in a wide role before moving into the middle with real success. Five goals in seven games at the start of 2001-02 brought a £100,000 move to the Wanderers in October 2001. Has become an instant hit with the fans after supplying six assists in the first eight starts. Still only 22 he is a very good signing by Lawrie Sanchez.

35. LEWIS COOK BORN HIGH WYCOMBE

Young left sided player who has come through the youth team ranks at the club. Made his first appearance for the team during pre-season. Made his first team debut coming on as sub against Mansfield Town at Adams Park 17th August 2002. This was followed by two appearances in the LDV Vans Trophy, the second claiming the golden goal against Cheltenham Town. Started against Tranmere Rovers 23rd November 2002 in a Division Two fixture, certainly a future prospect.

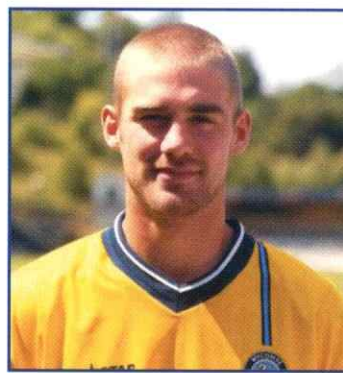


FORWARDS

Signed for Wycombe from Non League Oxford City 5.11.98 on a 3 year contract. Played for Oxford City then moved to Abingdon Town before re-joining Oxford City in 1996. Played for Arsenal in the Avon Insurance Combination scored two goals. Offered trials at West Ham, attracted lots of attention from Premier and Division One sides. Debut for Wycombe at Northampton Town on 7th November 1998. Brought attention to his game after scoring twice against Wolves at Molineux in the Worthington Cup last season, he finished with 12 goals for the season.

9. CRAIG FAULCONBRIDGE BORN NUNEATON 20.4.78



Signed for Wycombe Wanderers 1st June 2002 on a Bosman from Wrexham. Started his career as a Birmingham City junior before commencing his professional career with Coventry City. Had loan periods with Dunfermline Athletic and Hull City before joining Wrexham in August 1999. Craig is a hard working front man who is good in the air and holds the ball up well on the ground.

16. ANDY RAMMELL BORN NUNEATON 10.2.67

Experienced striker who joined Wanderers from Walsall 7th September 2000 for £75,000. Started his career with non league Atherstone United before moving to Manchester United for £40,000 in August 1989. A move to Barnsley for £100,000 in August 1990 resulted in six very successful seasons at Oakwell. Joined Walsall on a free in July 1998 and was a big part of their promotion season to Division One with 23 goals. Has continued to score goals at Wycombe since his arrival, finished season 2001-02 as the clubs leading scorer with thirteen goals.

2. DANNY SENDA BORN HARROW 17.4.81

A young striker who has been converted into a right full back by Lawrie Sanchez. Has played for England U17 side. Made Football League debut against Oldham March 27 1999 from the subs bench. Made his first full start against Chesterfield on 3rd January 2000, scored his first Football League goal for the club at Wrexham Feb 5th 2000. Received a nasty ligament injury in January 2001 but returned to play an important part in Wanderers run to the end of last season. Played most of last season at right back using his pace to push on down the flank.

20. GAVIN HOLLIGAN BORN LAMBETH 30.6.80.

Signed just prior to the start of 2001-02. Released from West Ham during the summer after spending one season at Upton Park having signed from Kingstonsian. A series of injuries kept him out of the Hammers pecking order and he was keen to rekindle a career if football when Lawrie Sanchez

signed him. Has been put on one year contract with a view to improving it if he performs well.

12. RICHARD HARRIS BORN CROYDON 23.10.80

Signed from Crystal Palace where he joined when he was 7 years old. After coming through the YT scheme Richard was a regular in the reserves and made 18 appearances in the first team. Was spotted by Lawrie Sanchez while playing against Wanderers for Palace reserves. Scored in his first appearance for Wycombe against Brentford in the Avon Insurance Combination. Made his debut against Peterborough at London Road on 30th March 2002 coming off the bench to use his prodigious throw to great advantage. Started the next home game against Tranmere Rovers on Easter Monday before pulling up with a ham string injury just before half time. Returned for the last game of the season at Swindon to impress Lawrie Sanchez enough to be offered terms. Signed a one year contract until the end of June 2003, scored his first league goal against Oldham at boundary Park 31st August 2002.

36. JONNY DIXON BORN Mercia, Spain

Another 18 year old who has come up via the youth scheme. Jonny has scored goals for the youth team and reserve side. He is a quick and lively striker who can play through the middle or in wide positions. Made his first team debut coming on as sub against Northampton Town 13th August 2002. Went on to score three goals in four appearances before being injured at Northampton in early January 2003.



Blast From the Past

The Town had done remarkably well to stay in the old Division One for nine seasons but as the clamour for a 'premier' league, with all its promised riches, grew it left clubs like ours increasingly marginalised.

For three years running we had escaped the drop by the skin of our teeth on the final day and as the 1991/92 campaign got under way the loss of Kingsley Black, the promising Matt Jackson and the eccentric Lars Elstrup with no adequate replacements left most supporters fearing the worst as the internal and external pressures grew.

It took the Town 407 minutes to score their first goal and six games to record their first win. Firepower was obviously needed and the return of Mick Harford to the fold gave the crowd a lift and with it a sec-

ond win of the season as he made his second debut in a home game against Oldham. Unfortunately, although Harford was a talismanic figure he was now 32 years old with a history of injury and as autumn turned to winter it became obvious that he could not carry the team on his own. Manager David Pleat tinkered with the side but the players brought in were, frankly, not of top flight quality being either bargain basement buys because of the financial constraints, over the hill or too wet behind the ears. The victory over Oldham, in mid-September, proved to be a flash in the pan as, by 20th December another eleven games had been played with only four points gained in the process.

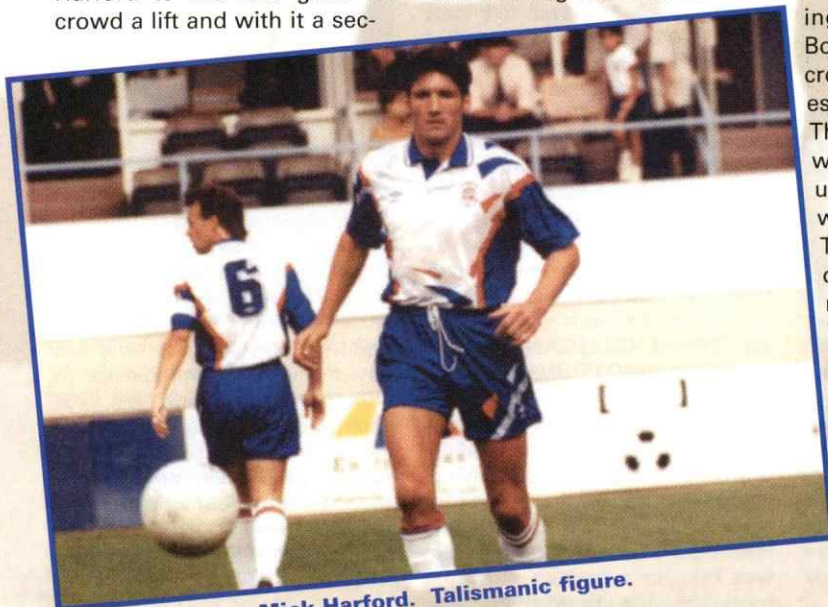
Quite rightly the Town were, by now, rock bottom of the table and needing miracles to

escape the drop. The supporters obviously felt the same and for the visit of Coventry on 20th December, the first of three home games in a row, only 7,533 bothered to turn up.

On a cold night those supporters that did attend were pleased to see that the visitors were truly awful. For a team that had thrashed the Town 5-0 earlier in the campaign opportunities were presented to reverse that scoreline but lacking in confidence and knotted with nerves the Luton players were a little slow on the uptake. Clouds were eventually lifted when Harford took advantage of sloppy defending by the Sky Blues to slot the ball home on 55 minutes and from then on it was plain sailing although last minute panic could have resulted in Coventry getting a totally undeserved equaliser.

Next up was the visit of reigning champions Arsenal on Boxing Day with the all-ticket crowd rising to 12,665 the highest of the season at that stage. The first half was very scrappy with neither side gaining the upper hand but the supporters were heartened to see that the Town were not in any way overawed by their lofty opponents.

With the game entering its final quarter Pleat took the gamble of sending on a fresh pair of legs against the tiring Gunners by introducing Scott Oakes to the fray. Oakes immediately lifted the tempo of the game by running at the Arsenal defence and within four minutes his long diagonal

pass was met on the volley by Harford with the ball whistling past a helpless David Seaman. Arsenal desperately tried for an equaliser but with Trevor Peake holding new scoring sensation Ian Wright the Luton defence held firm to eventually pick up another unexpected three points. "We were rubbish" said Arsenal manager George Graham afterwards, "That was our worst performance for a long time." He failed to point out, however, that the Town had simply not allowed them to play the way they wanted!

Two days later we all trooped back to Kenilworth Road once again with this time much more spring in our steps. Mid-table Chelsea were to be our latest guests together with their most famous supporter, Prime Minister John Major, who was obviously hoping for an easy three points.

Confidence was now flowing

through the Town side and the players were up for the game unlike Chelsea who took a long time to settle. By then they were two goals down and chasing shadows.

Firstly a clever free-kick routine involving David Preece, Paul Telfer and Mark Pembridge left full-back Richard Harvey with a clear sight of the target from 25 yards out and his left foot shot arrowed into the net leaving Dave Beasant in the Chelsea goal flat footed.

Shortly afterwards, Pembridge was pulled down in the area by Beasant and after a couple of minutes protestations John Dreyer, with his famous and heartstopping two step run up, slotted the ball home from the spot.

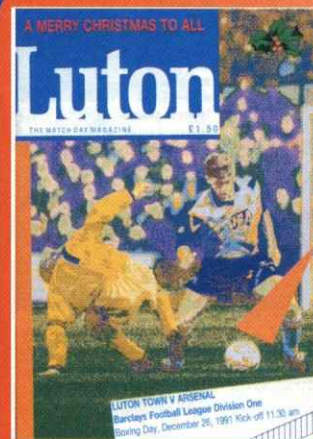
Beasant under newly announced rule changes should have been sent off but he got away with a caution. His colleague Tommy Boyd, though, was not so lucky

when, with fifteen minutes to go, he chopped down Telfer in the area when he was clear on goal and was immediately red-carded.

At the interval Pleat, never happy with Dreyer's penalty taking style, had ordered that Harford should take any further spot-kicks. Harford, therefore, stepped up to take this latest offering and promptly hit the bar with his effort!

Nine points from nine, three clean sheets and finally off the bottom of the table was the Town's Christmas haul but Pleat sounded a note of caution pointing out that there were some tough away games looming on the horizon and with only two points picked up on our travels he was right to be wary.

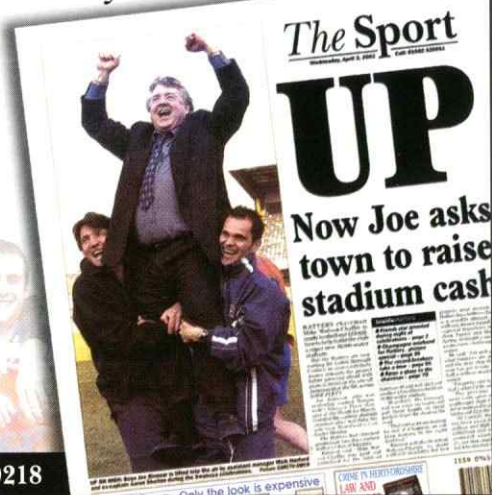
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Please be seated!



LUTON Town today appeals to its supporters to help keep all sections of the Kenilworth Stadium open during games, by abiding by the law that insists all spectators are seated during games.

The Football Licensing Authorities have threatened to close parts of the Main Stand and of the Enclosure if the club is unable to enforce regulations that prohibit standing.

As the club's safety officer, I am determined to head off that scenario, but it needs the co-operation of all supporters.

As we are all aware, the Kenilworth Stadium is an all-seater venue. This is because of an Act of Parliament which followed the Hillsborough Disaster of 1989.

A condition of our Safety Certificate, issued under the Safety at Sports Ground Act of 1975, is that all spectators must sit during any designated football match.

At present we are experiencing difficulties in blocks H and J in the Enclosure, and Main Stand blocks F and G, where supporters persistently stand throughout games. There is also a problem in the away area.

This is a breach of ground regulations, and could result in people being ejected from the stadium. The law is clear. Ground regulation states: "Nobody may stand in any seated area whilst play is in progress. Persistent standing in seated areas whilst play is in progress is strictly forbidden, and may result in ejection from the ground."

The licensing authorities have the power to close sections of the stadium, and they have intimated that they will use that power if standing persists.

Naturally, we do not want this to happen. It could cause a considerable loss of income, and force us to refuse admission to supporters who want to see us play. So we are seeking your help and assistance in ensuring that all spectators observe the regulations and sit during games.

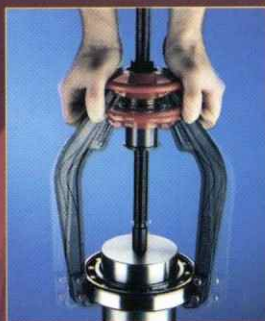
We have met the Football Licensing Authorities, and they have asked us to take measures to deal with the persistent standing issue. We are seeking all supporters' help in ensuring that we maintain the safety standards in the stadium. Persistent standing affects the comfort and safety of others. Once people stand, those behind them cannot see the game, and are themselves encouraged to stand. Young children are encouraged to stand on seats, which is a danger in itself. The gradients of seated stands make them unsuitable for standing. There is no form of crush barrier protection, and there is a

danger of spectators falling forwards onto the heads and upper bodies of those in front of them, which has a potential for causing serious injury.

We appreciate that there are times during a game when people will stand in moments of excitement and in support of the team. That is not a problem, so long as when the excitement subsides supporters return to their seats.

We do not want to see parts of our ground closed, which would mean turning away fans. Nor do we wish to have to eject supporters for refusing to sit down. But safety is paramount, so the message to everyone who comes to football at Luton Town is simple: please help us to maintain our safety standards.

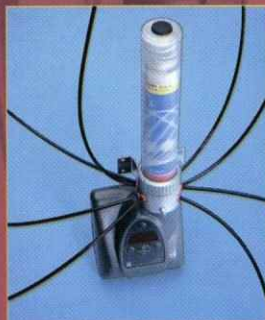

These will be made to three junior football clubs based in Bedfordshire that have recently achieved the FA Charter Standard Community Club Award. They are three of only a hundred in the country to have achieved it so far, so congratulations to Crawley Green Youth, Leighton United Youth and Kempston Colts/Rovers. The award shows they have attained a high standard in providing football for all ages, and both sexes. Our guest of honour will be Richard Robinson, chairman of Beds FA, who will present the awards. The Charter Standard was introduced as part of the Charter for Quality produced by The Football Association in 1997. The Charter for Quality places the players central to all football developments. The Football Association, through its Charter Standard scheme, seeks to establish, reward and encourage good practice at grass roots levels so that parents and children can demand a minimum provision from

schools, clubs and holiday courses. There are Charter Standard awards for Clubs, schools and holiday courses.

To achieve the Charter Standard award, the clubs present today have had to satisfy a number of requirements, including ensuring that all coaches have a minimum level of qualification. Volunteers must have attended child protection and emergency aid courses, and the clubs adopt codes of conduct, and each must appoint a Child Protection Officer.


Senior Football Development Officer for the Bedfordshire FA, Simon MacQueen, said: "By achieving Charter Standard status, parents and children will know that a club has been recognised by the Football Association for providing safe and quality football provision."

"The high quality of applications for these awards was amazing, and all the clubs that achieve them should be immensely proud of their hard work, and the fantastic service that they are providing to local children and their community."

Finally today, welcome to Ampthill Boys under-12 B squad, who are the first winners of the new Beds FA/Luton Town youth fair play award.

Additionally I would like to welcome St.Johns Special Needs School from Bedford who are our guests today. They are involved in the new coaching initiative we have set up in that town.

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

Action Replay

Barnsley 2 Luton Town 3 (HT 1-1)

DELICIOUS irony put the finishing touch to the Town's first game since New Year's Day, when the seventh away win of the season was buttoned up to avenge the home defeat the Town suffered against Barnsley early in the season. On that occasion it was the Town unable to find a way to win against ten men, after Russell Holt was sent off. At Oakwell, Barnsley had to swallow their own medicine as the Town came back from a goal down to win by the same 3-2 scoreline.

Comical defending at both ends contributed to the entertainment, but the loss of Carl Emberson on 36 minutes was no laughing matter. He was red carded after an assistant referee, not the man in the middle, ruled that he had handled outside his area. He had advanced over the line, but then back-pedalled, and seemed to have a god claim that his hands and the ball were inside the area when they made contact even if the rest of his body was outside. The keeper and Chris Coyne had already suffered humiliation and a public falling-out. The game was just 49 seconds old when they misunderstood each other's intentions and allowed a long ball to bounce into space between them to gift a goal to Kevin Betsy. Keeper and defender blamed each other for not going for the ball. Joe Kinnear's verdict was that Coyne should have cleared.

When the keeper was sent off 35 minutes later, Mark Ovendale went on, with Steve Robinson withdrawn from midfield, and the key to success after that was that the Town's three in that department were more than a

match for Barnsley's four.

But the Town lived dangerously at times, when they looked a touch rusty in the first half. Gary Jones volleyed a good effort against a post, and Alan Neilson cleared off the line from Chris Morgan following Barnsley's first corner, on 44 minutes. Within a few seconds the Town had switched to attack, and Matt Spring hit a peach of an equaliser, a left-footer from 25 yards.

The Town looked more like their old selves in the second half, despite the numerical disadvantage, with Barnsley very kindly conceding a silly goal to Tony Thorpe on 49 minutes. It was almost a carbon copy of Barnsley's opener, with Robbie Williams out of tune with his keeper to let in the striker. The outcome was in little doubt after that. Barnsley are in disarray on and off the pitch alike after being in administration and the sacking of manager Steve Parkin to save money.

Their third consecutive defeat, confirmed when Thorpe struck his second goal after a neat 63rd-minute move between himself and Steve Howard, and the Tykes are now in the relegation zone, five years after being in the Premiership.

They were gifted a second when Jones tumbled over a rash challenge by Alan Neilson. Bruce Dyer tucked away the penalty, but the Town were comfortable on and off the ball alike after that. Barnsley manager Glyn Hodges was scathing about his team's performance, apparently believ-

ing the result was more about Barnsley's shortcomings than the Town's better and more solid football.

Joe Kinnear was pleased that his side's defending was much better in the second half, and was not too concerned about seeing Emberson and Coyne having a go at each other after the opening goal. It was a brief and temporary moment of anger, a welcome sign of how much players care about what happens to the team.

And the excellent performance was despite the absence of suspended Sol Davis and Ahmet Brkovic, and of the injured Emmerson Boyce. The re-shaped defence took time to settle, as did Spring and Kevin Nicholls on their returns after injury, but the longer the game went on the better the Town looked as contenders for promotion.

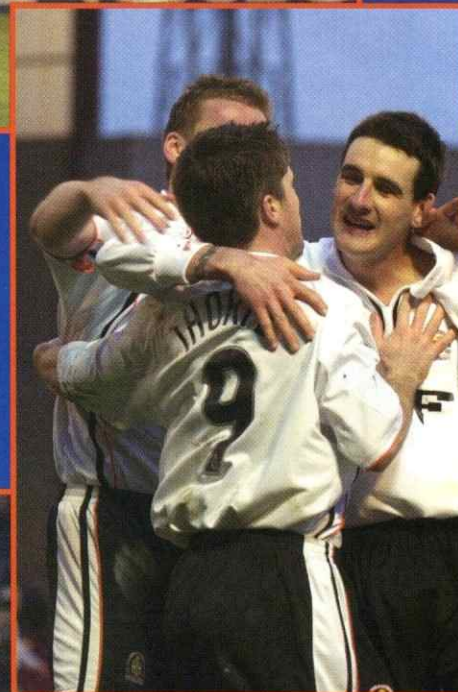

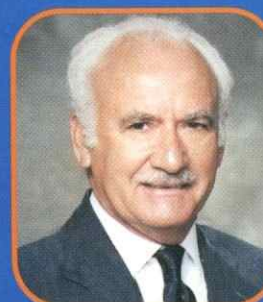
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POLICY STATEMENT - SPECTATOR SAFETY

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Luton Belles



AFTER a break caused by bad weather Belles completed their first league double of the season with a 3-0 away win against Tring Athletic.

Luton's usual flowing style went missing but they still managed to create numerous chances in a first half they dominated. Stacey Connell came closest to scoring, hitting the outside of the post with a deflected shot and it wasn't until the 68th minute that Town finally made the breakthrough. The home keeper failed to deal with a Fay Howell free kick and the ball fell to Rhiannon Morgan, who crashed a 20-yard drive into the bottom corner of the net through a crowded penalty area.

Luton then got a grip on proceedings and it was no surprise when they increased their lead through Vicky Moody as she burst into the penalty area to shoot low into the net with eight minutes left. Rhiannon Morgan made sure of the points after 87 minutes, volleying in a near post cross from Fay Howell.

The Belles are also enjoying success at younger age levels. The under-12 and under-14 Saturday teams were formed as development squads, but within five months a vast majority of the players have forced their way into the reckoning for the Hertfordshire Girls League squads who play on Sundays.

Anne Folan was also looking lively leading the attack, and had almost added to the lead on three occasions before she made the points safe with a well-placed finish.

At the half way point of the season Luton Town Belles hold the proud distinction of topping their respective leagues at under 11,12,13 and 14 as well as the adult team lying third but with games in hand over their rivals for the top spot.

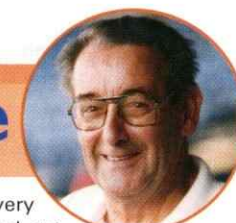

A PLAYER who was influential in embarrassing the Town when Barnsley won at Kenilworth Road in August did us a favour on the day we exacted revenge at Oakwell.

Keith Curle, a 38-year-old centre-half, was trying to win an extension of a short-term contract when he helped Barnsley to a 3-2 victory at Kenilworth Road. But the Tykes hit money trouble, went into administration and Curle was one of several employees, including manager Steve Parkin, who got the boot to save cash.

Curle signed for Mansfield, and at the end of December, with the Stags bottom of the Second Division, became player-manager after Stuart Watkiss was sacked. The major problem for the team who accompanied the Town out of the Third Division was obvious: 53 goals had been conceded, and only four wins had been achieved in their first 20 league games.

Curle set about improving the defence, and in his seven games in charge Mansfield have won 11, drawn one and lost two, and have conceded only six goals, while scoring four. On Saturday they went to Chesterfield, where the Town threw away the points on New Year's Day. The Spirelites needed to win to have a chance of overtaking the Town. Instead Mansfield came back from a goal down to win 2-1, with a stoppage time goal by Liam Lawrence. Chesterfield sub Shane Bradley collected one of the day's six red cards in the division two minutes after going on, and their misery must have been complete when they heard that the Town had won

at Barnsley. Mansfield had every cause to celebrate: they moved out of the bottom four for the first time since August.

The Town's two-week break from football cost them their top six place, and we went to Oakwell in eighth spot. Now it is back to seventh, needing to win the two home games in hand to be reasonably sure of pegging back QPR.

The worry is that there is a ten-point gap between the Town and fourth place, to which Bristol City have sunk. Their 1-1 draw at Tranmere gave them their only point from nine at stake this year, including a 2-1 defeat at Wycombe three days after the Town won there.

The Chairboys have recovered well after losing to the Town. They are unbeaten in their four games since then, including a 5-0 romp at Northampton, which led to Kevan Broadhurst being sacked as Cobblers manager.

On Saturday, Wycombe were close to wrecking Oldham's proud record as the only unbeaten away team in the Premiership or Nationwide League. Oldham had Julien Baudet sent off early in the second half, when they were leading 1-0. Richard Harris levelled on 71 minutes and Steve Brown put Wycombe ahead seven minutes from time. But Tony Carrs saved a point for Iain Dowie's men a minute later, to keep them in second place behind Wigan.

Today's game could be tight, with the Town needing to improve on their home record while Wycombe will be looking to do better on the road to give them a chance of pushing up from mid-table.

In 14 away games so far Wycombe have won three, drawn five and lost six. The victories were 2-0 at Oldham in August, 1-0 at Colchester in October and 5-0 at Sixfields three weeks ago. The draws were 1-1 at Notts County and Barnsley, and 0-0 at Huddersfield, Cheltenham and Mansfield. Defeats on the road were 0-3 at Bristol and Wigan, 0-1 at Brentford and Cardiff, and 1-2 at Stockport and QPR.
