Inside Forward

THE faces of the rival managers said much about Saturday's unwelcome shock as the Town went down to their second home defeat in three games at the hands of a make-shift opposing team that had not won since last year. Wally Downes of Brentford radiated happiness, having seen his side win for the first time in seven attempts, and score for only the second time in their last five games. The quality of the goal, an absolute peach by Rowan Vine, added to his pleasure.

Joe Kinnear, by contrast, was in a mood varying from anger to bewilderment as he tried to work out how so many players could be so far below their normal form. Knowing that Brentford came into the game with three of their normal back four unavailable added to the sense of frustration as the Town failed miserably in front of goal. It was their first blank in 13 games, since nine men held QPR to a draw in November.

Steve Howard was much missed, and the boss was scathing about the chances wasted long before Vine struck a wonderful 50th-minute winner. The manager's harshest criticism was for Dean Crowe, particularly for a 20th-minute miss. A poor goal kick went straight to him, giving him a clear run down the middle towards goal. With defenders in his wake, the striker opted to set up Tony Thorpe rather than take on the keeper, and overhit his pass so much that the ball ran out for a goal kick before Thorpe could catch it. Crowe was subbed at the interval.

Brentford adopted the obvious tactic against a team they respected. "They worked hard, hassled us, and closed us down," said the Town boss. "But our performance was very disappointing, very flat, with too many players having an off day."

He expands on the subject in his column on page 5 this evening, and he had some sharp words in the dressing room on Saturday night before ordering the players in to work on Sunday, to make them watch the video nasty of the game.

A rare moment of brilliance sent the Town to their sixth home defeat of the season, with Vine taking a long ball in his stride, controlling quickly and then lashing a tremendous 25-yard drive into the top corner.


Before then the Town, without being anywhere near their best against mid-table opposition, had passed up enough chances to have settled the game. Kevin Nicholls, one of the few to hit form, was unlucky with an early 25-yard free kick – the keeper did well to see the curling shot at the last minute and tip it round the post.

Thorpe, always threatening and willing to run at defenders, had one shot saved by the keeper's legs and put another over the bar as the Town enjoyed the better first-half openings.

Just before Brentford scored, he so nearly gave the Town the lead that might have settled them, but after jinking his way into an angled position, his shot drifted inches wide of the far post.



Manager's View



WELCOME back to Kenilworth Road, for a match which takes on even more importance than I had anticipated. Our performance on Saturday has put more pressure on ourselves, and you can be sure that as manager I let the players know that what we saw against Brentford was unacceptable.

I couldn't believe how many were below par, and there is no real explanation for it. Perhaps a little nervousness is creeping in at home games, because of expectation, but I will not accept that as a valid excuse.

I saw February as a golden opportunity to push our promotion claims. Four home games on the trot were an open invitation to rise into the top six. Now, having lost two of the first three, we have to play catch-up. I give credit to Brentford for the way they went about their game plan, and the goal that beat us was a tremendous strike. But the disappointing result was more about Luton Town falling well short of what is acceptable, and also below what we are capable of.

There was a frank exchange of views in the dressing room after the game, and again on Sunday when everyone reported back to Kenilworth Road for further discussion on what went wrong. We have a good bunch of professionals, and they are all ambitious to play at a higher level. They are capable of achieving that ambition – but not if they turn in many more displays like Saturday's.

Hardly any department of the team emerged with credit. It is concerning that we have kept only one clean sheet

since the turn of the year. At the other end of the field we were firing blanks against Brentford, and not for the first time this season the lack of ruthlessness in front of goal was costly. We couldn't do much about the goal that beat us, because it was one of the best we have seen from a visiting side this season. But it certainly should not have been worth three points to Brentford.

We had more than enough chances to have buried them long before they scored, and the players knew it. But we didn't work their goalkeeper hard enough, and too many efforts were off-target.

We missed Steve Howard, of course, and I hope he will be back in the side tonight, hungry for goals after his enforced break from first team football. He would have had a hatful against Brentford from all the openings we created by going down the flanks.

Saturday is now a painful memory, and the bonus of having a busy month is that we get a quick chance to put things right. You learn something from every game, and there was a good response from everyone as we analysed Saturday's events.

We watched the tape, talked it over, and spoke about the task that now faces us in the closing weeks of the season. I have no doubt that Saturday's failure will be a spur to everyone to do much better tonight. There should be a good atmosphere in the ground, thanks to the close rivalry that has built up over the past year or two with Plymouth. It hurt to finish behind them in the Third Division last season, but we had to hold up our hands in recognition of their tremendous

record. Like us they have adapted pretty well to the higher division, but as with last season's tussles with Plymouth we owe them one this evening. Now, as then, we take them on at home trying to avenge a defeat at their place which we felt was scarcely deserved. Just over a year ago we beat Plymouth 2-0 at Kenilworth Road on a day when we played very well. I will be looking for the same level of performance, and a similar result, this evening.

Finally, a word about my ongoing attempts to strengthen the squad. Deals for two strikers fell down for differing reasons, as you may have read in Saturday's programme, but I have my eye on one or two others who might be brought in on loan.

And we have secured the services of Lars Hirschfeld, a Canadian international, on loan from Tottenham. We needed cover for the goalkeeping position because one of our two senior keepers is injured. I am sure you will make the new man welcome, just as you did when I arrived at the club. My promise then was to take Luton Town to higher levels of football, and I am still just as determined to do that as I was then.

So, sorry about Saturday. I heard your reaction and had no problem with it – the players deserved to be criticised, and know it. Tonight, hopefully, we will show you the other side of Luton Town, and get back to winning ways. You don't like to see us lose. I bet you don't hate it as much as I do!

Keep the faith, and enjoy the game

Captain's View



IN ALL my time here, I don't think I have ever felt as angry as I did on Saturday about a Luton Town performance. We let ourselves down, big-time. It seems that some players are switching on for some matches, and not for others. I had my say at the team meeting, after what was probably our worst performance since I joined the club. Losing two of our last three home games has been a tremendous blow, and we are lucky that we still have time to put things right. Against Blackpool I put up my hand, and gave credit to a good team, who had one player who was on fire that day.

On Saturday, the very least we should have got was a 0-0 draw. Without being disrespectful to Brentford, they hadn't won in the league since last year. So what does that make us look like when they go home with a win? We needed the points to close the gap on the top six. But too many players failed to show a hunger for success. I said in my column for Saturday's programme that I would not be surprised if it turned out to be a scrappy 1-0 game. I certainly did not expect it to be 1-0 to Brentford. The goal was a tremendous strike, just about unstoppable, but we had so much of the play and so many scoring opportunities that it was a case of throwing away points.

I can hardly remember a

match when so many in the team were a long way below their best. It's not uncommon for one or two to be off form. But when it happens to five or six, you have got real problems, as we had on Saturday.

You could find fault with all departments of the team, but it is a collective responsibility: we defend as a team and attack as a team. If you're not having a good game, roll up your sleeves and put yourself about for your team-mates. At least look like you are trying to make it hard for the opposition. Playing professional football is not just about skill and technique: attitude and mental toughness is vital. I expect to see 11 winners kick off every match for Luton Town. Very often you have to battle to win the right to play your football.

We had a good team meeting to thrash out where it went so wrong on Saturday. There were some harsh words directed at some individuals, but we don't hold grudges because we all want to get our act together quickly. We must have the right attitude to every game: when we played Cardiff all 11 men were up for it, and no-one in this division would have lived with us that day. Then, within a week, we lost to Chesterfield. I look at the other teams who have beaten us this season, and worry about why so many of them are down in the lower

regions of the table. It's no good coming alive just for the big games. They're all big ones from now on, and we have to beat just about everyone put in front of us, no matter what their league standing.

Saturday's display was a real shock to us all. Fortunately, we have not suffered as badly as we might have in terms of the league table, thanks to results elsewhere. So it's not entirely doom and gloom. A few weeks ago I had hoped we could go on a long unbeaten run. Our best so far this season was seven in October. Now we have to treat every match as a six-pointer, knowing that if we get back to our professional best we can gather in enough points in the 14 remaining games to force our way back into the play-offs.

One good thing about this season is that, except for the first month, we have bounced back with a good performance after every defeat. We have had some good games with Plymouth in the past couple of years, and you can be sure we are most certainly up for it tonight, to put one over our old rivals, and to help bury the memories of Saturday's game.

Treatment Room

I AM afraid that this column is in danger of being a little repetitive, because once again I have very little news to give beyond what has been mentioned already in my reports from the treatment room in the past two or three weeks.

But it is a case of no news is good news, with only five members of the first team squad needing my attention, just as it was when Saturday's column was written. The Brentford game produced no extra injuries of note, so my "customers" are the same as before, Carl Griffiths, Aaron Skelton, Emmerson Boyce, Adrian Forbes and Mark Ovendale.

Boyce missed the Brentford game because of a lower

abdominal problem, which restricts his running ability. He has been responding to treatment, but will probably not be available this evening. He was due to be seen yesterday by a consultant, and the next stage of his treatment will depend on the report we get from him.

Adrian Forbes is just about clear of the treatment room after his long fight to get over his knee injury, and he is going well in training. He is building up muscle strength, and has worked hard to put himself in a position where he can be considered for a return to the league squad before too long.

Mark Ovendale is making good progress after a hip injury, and is doing well enough to be able to think about resuming running this week. He has

worked well in the gym to aid his recovery.

Another who has worked with a will to overcome injury is Aaron Skelton. He is getting over his knee problem, and as I said on Saturday can now see light at the end of the tunnel.

Carl Griffiths should be running at full pace this week as he gets over a calf muscle injury, and it will not be long before he is in contention for a place in the squad.

Finally, disappointing though the result was on Saturday, it was pleasing to see Sol Davis back in first team action for the first time since New Year's Day, and also to see on the bench Russ Perrett, who has not played league football since mid-November.

FIRSTLY tonight I have some fixtures news. The under-19 youth team has progressed into the Football League Youth Alliance Merit Division Two South, and the full fixture list can be found on Page 51 of this magazine. They were due to be at home to Oxford on Saturday, which caused a problem for the under-17 squad, who were due to be at home as well, against Gillingham. We are grateful to Gillingham for allowing us to use their ground for the match.

The under-17 game with Brighton and Hove Albion on January 18 was postponed because of bad weather, and that has now been re-arranged for Saturday March 8 at Luton RFC, Newlands Road, kick-off 11am.

The big game for the youth team, of course, is on Thursday, when they try to reach the quarter-finals of the FA Youth Cup. They will play Middlesbrough at Kenilworth Road, and I hope the boys get the good support they deserve. Turnstiles will be open at both Kenilworth Road and Maple Road Bridge, and admission is £3 for adults and £1 for senior citizens and under-16s.

If we get through, we will face another big game at home. It will be against Tottenham Hotspur on Wednesday March 5, kick-off 7pm. Turnstile arrangements and prices will be as for the Middlesbrough

game. If the boys get through, it will mean that we will have to postpone the Reserves March 5 game against Crystal Palace.

We have been approached by a supporter who raises a lot of money for Cancer Research UK, and are pleased to help her with her latest effort. She has a Tottenham Hotspur youth shirt signed by Glenn Hoddle and the current players, and a Liverpool FC shirt signed by Gerard Houliar and his current team. Both have been professionally framed, and she is looking for offers to raise more money for cancer research.

I wonder if you have ever thought about how the fourth official at matches discovers how much added time is to be played at the end of each half. The answer is contained in a directive I have just received from the Football League. It stipulates that to standardise the message given out by PA announcers, the message will now read "There will be a minimum of X minutes time allowed."

The procedure is that two minutes before the expiry of each half the fourth official will position himself at the halfway line and establish eye contact with the referee, who will inform the fourth official either visually or verbally, of the amount of time allowed. The fourth official should acknowl-

edge this information, using pre-determined signals between himself and the referee.

At the expiry of each of the 45-minute periods, and not before, the fourth official will display the minimum time allowed, to all points of the ground by using the electronic scoreboard.

Any subsequent injuries, or additional delays, including time-wasting, will result in further time being added on. The referee is responsible for ensuring that the full allowance is made for time lost.

I know I shall be watching the officials a little closer now!

On the subject of officials, I must issue a warning to all supporters after the incident at the Northampton match in which a sweet was thrown towards one of the assistant referees. We appreciate that there was probably no malicious intent, but anything thrown onto the pitch is deemed to be a missile. We have received an official complaint from The FA regarding the incident, so please don't do it.

Finally, this evening, I want to pass on our best wishes to Brian Thompson, who has left after being a very popular security man on our car park. We wish him every happiness in the future.





EVACUATION PROCEDURE

IN THE event of any emergency in the stadium, Luton Town FC and the emergency services have agreed on an evacuation procedure which is designed to ensure the safe and controlled evacuation of the crowd, and to ensure their safe dispersal from the area, to allow the emergency services to carry out their tasks.

In the event of evacuation from all or part of the stadium, you will receive instructions over the public address system on how you should leave. In an evacuation of the main stand you will be instructed to use the pitch. Stewards will direct you to the nearest exit. It may be that your normal exit route will not be available. On leaving the stadium, you will find some roads closed to pedestrians, to enable swift and unobstructed access for the emergency services. Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.

MANAGER

PAUL STURROCK



Paul joined Plymouth in October 2000, less than three months after his shock resignation from Scottish Premier League side Dundee United.

He spent his entire playing career with the Tannadice club, making over 600 appearances and scoring nearly 200 goals, having been spotted by the club's manager

Jim McLean playing for Bankfoot. Paul won several honours with United, most notably a League Championship medal in 1983, as well as helping the club reach the European Cup semi-final in 1984. He was capped 20 times by Scotland, scoring 11 times, having also played nine times for the under-21s.

Having ended his playing career Paul worked as a coach at Tannadice before embarking on his managerial career with St. Johnstone, where he was extremely successful. He returned to Dundee United as manager in 1998, spending a further two years at the club before resigning and soon after taking up the post with Argyle on the South Coast of England.

Paul's first season with The Pilgrims proved to be an incredible success, as they stormed to the Third Division title, earning

the Scot the Nationwide Manager of the Year award for Division Three - as voted by his fellow professionals.

GOALKEEPERS

1. ROMAIN LARRIEU

The French goal keeper came into his own during last seasons success. 26 clean sheets speaks volumes of his skill and ability, although he attributed much of that to the defence in front of him. Despite his modesty he became Argyle's hottest property due to his performances, summed up the night Argyle won promotion at Rochdale, when in the first hour he produced three world class saves.

The question is whether he can continue in this form? Argyle fans reckon he can, then it will be a case as to what will the future hold for the keeper. Last season

23. LUKE MCCORMICK

Young Luke was understudy to Romain Larrieu last season and never got a chance to play. The only game Romain missed, due to the flu, happened at a time Luke was injured and Chris Adams from West Brom was providing cover.

Luke is still only a youngster but made his League debut on the last day of the season before last where he performed well and kept a clean sheet. Luke has earned a full contract and hence the chance to get into the first team

DEFENDERS

2. DAVID WORRELL

David arrived at Home Park on a three month loan spell from Dundee United at the end of 1999. He had been taken to Dundee United by Paul Sturrock while he managed the Scottish club. Paul was delighted to sign the right back for Argyle.

David returned to the Championship side last season after missing the last portion of the previous season with a broken ankle. Dave soon became a mainstay of a highly successful defence for Argyle, always likely to raid down the right to provide an assist for a goal.

3. BRIAN MCGLINCHHEY

Brian was signed from Gillingham, Paul Sturrock's first Argyle signing, where he had been taken by Peter Taylor. He is a former Northern Ireland U21 international and primarily plays at left back but can also operate on the left side of midfield, a hard worker who will keep chasing when others would give in, a little dynamo.

5. GRAHAM COUGHLAN

Graham moved to Home Park in the summer of 2001 and became an instant hit once the season got underway. His no-nonsense approach allied with his scoring abilities has made him a firm favourite.

He had never scored more than three goals in a season previously but became the top scorer last season with 11 goals.

6. CRAIG TAYLOR

Craig suffered a bad break to his foot at the end of the 00-01 season and hence was missing for most of the Championship campaign. He played for 30 minutes in the home game against York City and that was about it.

Craig was born in Plymouth but didn't start his League career at Home Park, but at Devon rivals Exeter City, eventually made a name for himself at Swindon Town.

15. PAUL WOTTON



Plymouth born Paul was proud to Captain the side to the title last season, it was a few scant years since he was in tears after the last game of the season, at Burnley, saw Argyle relegated to the Third Division.

The reverse was now true and he was evermore involved, leading by example and spirit to lift the trophy.

Paul came through the youth ranks to rightfully claim a place in the first team while still a teenager. His strength and determination

brought him to the attention of Sheffield Wednesday, who invited him on trial. Paul carries a lethal shot and proved a major threat with his corners and free kick last season.

18. HASNEY ALJOFREE

Hasney signed from Dundee United at the end of August 2002. Hasney is a 6', 24 year old left back who had been on the Dundee United books since June 2000, when he was taken from Bolton to Tannadice by Paul Sturrock.

Former England Youth international Hasney came through the ranks at Burnden Park/Reebok Stadium. During Season 1998/99 he featured several times on the bench when Bolton were in the Premiership and he made his debut during a 2-1 victory over Blackburn.

Hasney is comfortable on the ball, has an excellent left foot and shows powerful free kick ability.

24. STUART MALCOLM

"Big Malkie" has signed a 12 month contract to prove what he can do.

With his injury sidelining him for so long Paul Sturrock reckons he needs at least 12 months to relax and pick up his career again. The manager reckons he has lost two years development as a player and needs to learn a lot more.

In pre-season friendlies he has impressed with his strength on the ground and in the air.

MIDFIELDERS

4. DAVID FRIIO

The French midfielder signed partway through the 00-01 season and immediately impressed with fine midfield displays and fast became a lynch pin in Argyle's team. He is always likely to weigh



in with a vital goal – particularly with his head.

David is characterised by his battling performances with flashes of Gallic flair.

7. DAVID BERESFORD

David joined over the summer, on the same day as Nathan Lowndes, and has been brought in to add his pace and skill to the squad. Although right footed he is just as happy operating on the left.

An amazing number of assists for the teams he has played for make him a vital member of the team. He started as trainee at Oldham

and after featuring regularly was snapped up by the rising Huddersfield for £350,000. He was eventually picked up by Hull City last summer and made quite an impression but when he became available Paul Sturrock moved in for him right away.

11. MARTIN PHILLIPS

Martin is small, pacey and full of skill. His contribution during the first half of the Championship season was immense, with assists and plenty of goals. Always likely to turn defenders he is exciting to watch.

Martin joined Argyle just before the start of the 00-01 season. "Buster" thrilled Home Park crowds with his skill last year and his wing play will certainly be a feature for Home Park faithfuls to look forward to this season.

12. STEVE ADAMS

The young Plymouth lad was moved up from defence to mid-

field by Paul Sturrock and began to earn praise from early on last season. He became stronger and more influential as the season progressed.

Steve came through the Home Park youth set up and has justified his high rating as a player.

He has already begun to show what a prospect he could be in the centre of the pitch with strong tackling, good positional awareness and a deft touch on the ball.

14. LEE HODGES

Lee played a huge part in the success of last season with his contribution on the left side of midfield. His awareness in attack and chasing back to cover enabled the Greens to convert defence into attack and counter wise.

Lee signed in August 2001 but not for the first time, while at Spurs he came to Home Park on loan and impressed when he scored twice in six starts.

17. KEVIN WILLS

Willys graduated through the Argyle youth system and has been given his first real opportunity since Paul Sturrock's arrival. The midfielder celebrated his first League goal against home town club Torquay in April 2001. Kevin will be looking to establish himself this season. He featured in 22 senior games last season and could see this season as the launch pad for his career.

20. JASON BENT

Jason, a Canadian international, has become one of the most promising players at Home Park. Jason seems to have the ability to step up his game to whatever level is needed.

Jason was born in Toronto to Jamaican parents. He was the target of many British clubs in this country but they all failed to gain a work permit for the midfielder. He has played in Europe before for FSV Zwickau in Germany.

22. JOE BROAD

Joe, 20, has burst into the first team last season.

The midfielder, although young, has displayed a deft touch and a cool head beyond his years and made his first League start at Nene Park against Rushden & Diamonds at the end of last August where he won praise from both sets of fans.

25. NEIL HEANEY

Argyle signed Neil Heaney the 30 year old left sided player from Dundee United in December 2001 on a contract that keeps him at Home Park until June 2003. The player was a target, and acquisition, of Paul Sturrock when he was manager of Dundee United but soon 14 days after Heaney's arrival Sturrock left Tanadice!

Ian came through the youth system at Tottenham but was picked up by Argyle when Spurs released him.

Ian very soon came into the first team and with a bang last year. He displayed a lot of strength for a youngster with an eye for goal. His ability was acknowledged with an international call up to the England Under 18 squad within a month of his first senior game, he won his first cap against Switzerland. He went on to be capped three more times and notched two international goals during the qualifying rounds of the U18's European Championships.

19. MARINO KEITH

"Dan" Marino arrived at Plymouth after the start of last season and waited his chance to get into the team. He soon made an impact scoring 9 goals in 13 starts and 10 sub appearances.

Marino started his professional career at Dundee United; he joined them in a £35,000 move from hometown club Fraserburgh in October 1995.

He was sold to Falkirk for £40,000 in the September on 1997. He played over 70 times for The Bairns scoring 31 times.

In July 1999 he moved to rising club Livingston and has featured in 27 games scoring 10 goals.

21 BLAIR STURROCK

Blair is the Argyle manager's son and joined Argyle on a 12 month contract in December 2001, he had been at the club for six weeks trial following his release by Dundee United.

He ended up playing in 21 senior games last season and scored his first goal for a very important 1-0 victory away at Swansea.

29. PAUL BERNARD

Scottish international who has been out for the last 18 months through injury. Plymouth gave him the chance to train with them which he grabbed with both hands and has been offered a contract until the end of the season

FORWARDS

8. NATHAN LOWNDES

Nathan signed this summer, on the same day as Dave Beresford, to add a different dimension to the Argyle strike force.

Nathan started at Leeds United as a trainee but moved to Watford for £40,000 and for his League debut. Paul Sturrock then took him to St Johnstone where injury and managerial changes saw him fighting for a few opportunities to shine.

Paul Sturrock will be looking to build Nathan into a Division Two hot shot this season.


9. MICKEY EVANS

Mickey is a Plymouth lad who made good.

He moved to Southampton from Home Park in a £600,000 move in the spring of 1997 and saved the Saints from relegation with a good run of goals, he was also voted Carling Player of Month in his first month at the Dell.

Mickey is a vital member of the squad, not so much for his scoring ability as the skill he has in holding up the ball and bringing others into play.

Blast From the Past

After a wretched away defeat at Hartlepool in December 1968, the Town's seventh away reversal on the trot, it was revealed by the national press that manager Allan Brown had been interviewed for the Leicester City job.

It was widely thought that Brown was favourite for the position, being regarded as one of the brightest young managers around at the time, but when word came through from Filbert Street that Torquay boss Frank O'Farrell had been appointed instead, the Luton directors acted quickly.

The first words coming from Kenilworth Road were that Brown had resigned, but as the news unfolded it became clear that he had actually been sacked with 'disloyalty' given as the reason. It was conveniently forgotten, though, that Brown had turned down the chance to manage

Plymouth the previous season at, a then, massive salary of £5,000 a year.

Director John Bain spoke for the Board when he said, "Mr Brown knows we were under the impression that his aim was to take Luton Town to Division Two and eventually the top flight. Having applied for the post at Leicester, which he did not get, indicated that his future was not with Luton.

"Mr Brown's notice takes immediate effect. It had to happen quickly. If he had got the job at Leicester we would have been without a manager. It works both ways."

Brown, who had starred for the Town on the pitch in the 1950's, had returned to the club two years before, with the side second from bottom of the old Division Four and with crowds averaging 4,500.

By the time he left, the team was press-

ing for promotion from Division Three with attendances up to 15,000. Brown was not a happy man!

The Town's directors lost no time in appointing a replacement and turned immediately to Alec Stock, who had been axed by Q.P.R. in controversial circumstances a couple of months before.


Stock had guided Rangers to promotion to Division One, but had been forced out before he was given the chance to pick a side in the top flight for the first time in a career that had seen him take charge of Yeovil, Leyton Orient (three times), Arsenal and Roma. Stock was also less than happy.

"I am a man of no opinions until 5pm on Saturday," said Stock on taking control. "It will take two or three weeks to find out what I have got here."

Luton supporters could have told him he had taken on a side that had lost its way. Unbeaten at home with only one point dropped, results away were little short of disastrous with only four points picked up and all those won at the start of the campaign.

The goals had also dried up and the Hatters entered the home clash with Plymouth on 21st December 1968, in eighth position in Division Three, six points away from top spot. The Pilgrims were in eleventh place.

Stock made three major changes to his first side in charge. Firstly, he recalled John Moore who had been out for three months with an ankle injury, then he moved Bruce Rioch to the forward

line where he had not been a huge success before. Lastly, he insisted that the players kept their shirts tucked into their shorts!

After Allan Brown had turned down the advances of Plymouth the previous season, they had recruited one of his old teammates at Kenilworth Road, Billy Bingham, to the position. Bingham's sides were tough tackling, as witnessed by the Southport team that he had taken out of Division Four a couple of years before, but he had inherited such flair players as Norman Piper who was always destined to go on and play at a higher level.

A quite respectable pre-Christmas crowd of 10,971 had turned up, as well as the London Weekend TV cameras and a battery of Fleet Street's finest, to witness Stock's first game at the helm.

They were not disappointed as the Town attacked with a pas-

sion from the start, ably led by a born-again Rioch.

It was all Luton from the opening whistle and shots rained in from all angles, but Pat Dunne, the ex-Manchester United goalkeeper, stood firm for Argyle. He made countless brilliant saves, throwing himself all around the goalmouth, but it was a mistake by the big Irishman that led to the first Luton goal in the 32nd minute. A shot from Rioch was deflected for a corner with Brian Lewis scoring direct from the flag kick, much to the embarrassment of the Argyle defenders.

The Town went two up a few

minutes later when Keith Allen, who was later to play for the Pilgrims, bundled the ball home from close range and all looked set fair for a rout, the like of which had not been seen since the autumn.

It was all one-way traffic in the second period, but Dunne proved unbeatable in the

The doubters were won over. The King was dead, long live the King!

Mention is also made of the next three sell-out games, at home to Watford on Boxing Day (which was postponed), away at Northampton (Rioch was to score twice in a 2-0 win in front of over 15,000) and League champions Manchester City away in the F.A.Cup where we went down 0-1 to a dubious Francis Lee penalty.



Action Replay

Luton Town 3 Northampton Town 2 (HT 1-1)

IT WAS a mystery how Northampton were given a real run-around, but went home with only a one-goal defeat as the Town bounced back impressively after the reverse against Blackpool.

Cobblers boss Terry Fenwick, still seeking his first win in seven attempts since taking on a difficult survival job, admitted: "I am really disappointed by our performance. We struggled to get behind Luton's defence, and lacked punch. Nicholls and Spring were excellent in midfield for Luton, and we didn't stand up to the physical battle there."

The Town skipper had a magnificent game, rock solid with his tackling, forceful when driving forward and capping it all with a wonderful free kick goal which even Fenwick lauded.

Both sides were without suspended leading scorers, Steve Howard and Marco Gabbiadini, and the evidence of this game was that the Town have much more in reserve than Northampton, who are fighting a relegation battle.

The absence of Howard led to Paul Hughes being recalled in midfield, with Dean Crowe operating as Tony Thorpe's strike partner.

Hughes cracked in two excellent goals, his first since last March when he scored the winner against Kidderminster before being sent off for two yellow cards. This time there was no such blemish.

Joe Kinnear knew we should have seen more goals, but he was not complaining on a day

of the box by opposing skipper Paul Trollope, and exacted full revenge with a 22-yard free kick which hit the top corner like a ballistic missile.

That should have been that, but two penalty decisions nearly upset everything. First the ref gave a free kick outside the box when Crowe was blatantly body-checked by Burgess, with the Town believing it was well inside the area. Then Willmott was pulled up for hands as he tried to control a bouncing ball. Richard Johnson smashed the penalty into the top corner, despite Carl Emberson's dive to get a hand to it.

Northampton thought they could steal a point after that, but justice was done when Hughes acrobatically twisted to lash in the decider in the 85th minute following a right wing cross by Crowe.



AS WAS reported in Saturday's programme, our 0-0 draw at Cardiff was achieved with a team which included two more trialists, strikers who were hoping to impress sufficiently to be offered contracts.

There will probably be a lot more before the season is over, as we continue to use the Avon Insurance Combination fixtures to try to improve our first team squad.

We run the rule over newcomers, and over our own boys who are coming up through the ranks. Naturally, whatever the make-up of the team, I want to win very game, and in the circumstances our present position in the top half of the table is reasonable, but could be a lot better.

The last three performances have been quite pleasing, but the major problem is one common to many teams, at all levels of the game: a lack of ruthlessness in front of goal, and sometimes the inability to kill off teams when we have the upper hand.

We work to improve our youngsters, and we also demand that our scouts look hard for young and hungry players. Determination, willingness to work, and a football brain are the qualities you look for most.

We have used at least 20 trialists so far this season, and I haven't seen those qualities in many of them. Not one has made it so far, and I have the feeling with many of them that they come into a reserve game thinking it will be easy, and then discover too late how

wrong they are. From within our own resources we look for the next Emmerson Boyce or Matthew Taylor – we need to find at least one a year and our record in that respect is not too bad. And if the players who come through turn out to be goal-scorers, so much the better!

For much of this season I have been pleased with our ability to open up defences and create scoring opportunities. The big search, as always, is for someone capable of converting them on a regular basis.

OUR next fixture in the Avon Insurance Combination is at home to Cheltenham tomorrow, with a 2pm kick-off at Kenilworth Road.
