



WE'VE had more than our share of injuries and illness over the last few weeks, but that's life - we just have to get on with it.

It's what happens in football - everything comes all at once. It rears its ugly head and there's nothing you can do about it.

How many times have you read about injury crises at clubs? Sooner or later, we had to taste it. Yes, we've always had a sprinkling, but always at the proper time and not too long, not the severe stuff.

We just seem to have picked it up big time these last two weeks. Even our physio has been off with the flu and sickness bug that's going around.

But that's what we have a squad for. Our squad will now be tested. I've got a squad of players that was selected to do a job and it's up to the people that come in to do that job.

One or two have had their chances over the last couple of weeks and none of them have let themselves down.

I couldn't fault the players' attitude at Brentford last Saturday. I was a wee bit disappointed that Brentford got on top for a spell and had a lot of half-chances off long-throws and corners, and I was disappointed with the goal we gave away, but it all worked out the right way. We got a result under difficult circumstances.

We had to mix and match - we played a system we'd never played away from home before and had players in positions they hadn't played for a long time - so I was very pleased with the way it worked out in the end.

We needed to get off the mark away from home and, to be fair, that three points has made our start to the season look quite good. Hopefully, we'll start climbing the league.

Peter Gilbert got his chance for his league debut and I thought he was very steady, didn't let us down in any way. I was a wee bit worried that we finished up with two very young, inexperienced, full-backs, but Paul Connolly came on and did his job as well.

Lee Hodges did well, too. He's moulded himself to be a full-back this season but went to left midfield for the first time in 18 months and did a sterling job.

I'm pleased that our two strikers got the goals, too. Every ball that went up to Mickey Evans didn't come back, which is a key to a good centre-forward. He runs the line very well, he holds it up and flicks it on to Stoney - I think the two of them did very well together.



Ballymena Joy for Capaldi



COVER star Tony Capaldi helped Northern Ireland Under-21s to a rare victory this week.

The Pilgrims' summer capture from Birmingham won his 14th cap as the Irish came from behind to beat Armenia 3-1 in a European Under-21 Championship qualifier in Ballymena.

Capaldi, who has played on the left side of Argyle's midfield since leaving St Andrews' in May, played the full 90 minutes at left-back as goals from Warren Feeney, substitute Terry McFlynn and Hugh Davey secured the win.

It was Northern Ireland's first competitive victory in 35 months, and their first win in seven Euro qualifiers. Before the

win, the Irish had picked up just one point.

The welcome triumph followed a 1-0 defeat last Friday against the Ukraine in Donetsk, in which Capaldi also played the full 90 minutes, winning his 13th Under-21 cap.

His international call-up meant that he missed the Pilgrims' 3-1 victory against Brentford at Griffin Park last Saturday.

Watched by senior manager Sammy McIlroy, Capaldi won rave reviews for his performance in which the Irish played with plenty of spirit and did not look like a side that had only won one game in two years.

Substitute Sergiy Danilovskiy scored the goal which separated the two sides.

ARGYLE are taking part in the World's Biggest Coffe Morning on Friday, September 26. Pilgrims' celebrities will be among the guests at the charity event, being held in the club's marquee between 9-10.30am. All are welcome to drop in for coffee and biscuits.

TICKETS are not available for Argyle's next two away games, at Peterborough on Tuesday, and against Wrexham next Saturday - both matches are pay-on-the-gate games. Seats for the match at Peterborough are £16 for adults and £8 for senior citizens, students and children; terrace prices are £11 and £8. Students must show proof of identity at the gate. Wrexham's Racecourse Ground is an all-seater, with prices at £15 for adults and £10 for senior citizens and children. There is no student concession rate. Tickets for all Argyle's home matches this season are available from the ticket office, which will remain open until 7pm on reserve-team match-days. Up to 5pm on the day before a match, seating is £15 for adults, £10 for concessions, and £5 for under-16s; standing is £12 for adults, £10 for concessions, and £5 for under-16s. After 5pm and match-day prices are: Seating - £17 adults, £11 concessions, and £5 Under-16s; standing £13 adults, £11 concessions, and £5 under-16s.

It is with sadness that we note that loyal supporter Mike White died recently. Chalkie was a former steward and a regular for many years on the Spin Kop. He will be missed.

PAUL Sturrock has been in negotiations with Congolese international Eugene Kangulungu regarding a possible move to Home Park.

Central defender Kangulungu, 27, featured for the reserves in their Pontin's Holiday Combination Cup match against Bristol City last week, after which Sturrock confirmed he was talking with the player and his agent.

However, Sturrock was prevented from having a second look at Kangulungu (below) this week, a player with French lower-league side Louhans-Cuiseaux who has been capped twice by the Democratic Republic of Congo, because the player broke his cheekbone against City.


"The boy's injury isn't as serious as we first thought," said Sturrock afterwards. "It's a slight fracture. I've had a talk with the Chairman, and the player and his agent, and we're chatting about things."

Earlier, Sturrock had decided not to make a move for former Real Madrid defender Leo Bermejo after the Spaniard spent a week on trial at Home Park.

He believed that Bermejo, 24, who has also played for Real Jaén and represented Spain at several different age-group levels, has not recovered from a recent injury.

"I feel that his fitness was nowhere near the standards I would expect and I couldn't make a judgment on him," said Sturrock.

"I've told him to get himself away back to Spain, get himself match-fit again and, if he still has a hankering for England, we'll maybe take another look at him when the windows open up again."

If all Argyle fans blew on their mini trumpets in unison at certain times this would no doubt drown out


the Wednesday band. At the very least this should prove most disconcerting for the



TODAY, we host a charity collection on behalf of Derriford's Hospital Radio, which is very important to the station. We all know the cost of electronic equipment - vital to the station's existence - and the cost of music, CDs, licences and computers continues to rise.

Patients in Plymouth's hospitals have been listening to live commentaries from Home Park since the 1950s, when it was pioneered by TOC H.

In 1969 - when Hospital Radio Plymouth was launched - the new comprehensive service of music, local news and event coverage included the live commentaries of all first-team home matches - and the tradition continues today.

Bob Smith, Station Manager of Hospital Radio Plymouth 87.7FM, says "We've

seen Argyle through good times and very bad times, when there was hardly a cheer from the terraces, but our commentators, all Argyle supporters, have also seen the good times return."

Hospital Radio Plymouth transmits to Derriford and to the Royal

Eye Infirmary. In a few weeks time, it will extend to broadcasting in the afternoon.

The commentaries are also relayed to blind supporters of Argyle and the away teams sitting in the main stand.

The station has plans to expand its service to 24-hour operation using computerisation next year.

Hospital Radio Plymouth has also been a notable trainer of talent - perhaps the most well known former volunteer is Phillip Schofield.

"He joined as a teenager and travelled from his home in Newquay each Saturday to present a lunchtime show," said Smith. "He never failed to turn up, an early sign of his dedication and professionalism still apparent today."

Hospital Radio is always looking for volunteers - not just presenters but also technicians, ward visitors, fundraisers and those with admin skills. "People of all ages are welcome," said Smith, "but particularly those in their middle years."





PAUL Sturrock sang the praises of his Brentford strike pairing after Mickey Evans and Ian Stonebridge scored the goals that ensured Argyle's first away victory of their centenary season.

Ian Stonebridge opened the scoring early at Griffin Park but it needed two second-half strikes by man-of-the-match Evans, after Ben May had leveled the score before half-time, to secure the win.


However, it was not only Evans' goals that delighted Sturrock. "Every ball that came up to him didn't come back," said the Argyle manager. "That's a key to a good centre-forward. He runs the line very well, he holds it up and flicks it on to his partner - I think the two of them did very well together.

"He's a key player. There's always been a criticism of him of not scoring goals, but he's top scorer now."

Sturrock was also concerned that his side showed their lately typical tendency to sit back and not get after the game. He said: "We had a wee chat at half-time and I definitely think that, in the second half, we started to get ourselves in the right areas, but I thought, at 2-1, it was going to be the same scenario - we started to give away too many silly free-kicks and played the ball out too close to our box for long throws, and [Brentford] are very good at that.

"I was worried in case we were going to get a sucker punch again, but we got the third and I think, in the end, we deserved the victory."

In the absence of the injured Jason Bent and

internationally-committed Tony Capaldi, Sturrock handed a league debut to on-loan defender Peter Gilbert at left-back, releasing Lee Hodges to play at left midfield for the first time in a season and a half.

He was pleased with both men, and with youngster Paul Connolly, a second-half substitute for the previously injured David Worrell.

"[Gilbert's] first game was a

game from hell - Colchester, when nobody really played well - and, unfortunately for him, the team's not been losing since.

"He got his chance today and I thought he was very steady, didn't let us down in any way.



EVERYTHING added up for Paul Sturrock after his side's back-from-the-dead draw against Brighton.

"Ten goals scored, one game won – it just tells you everything," was the Argyle manager's summation of the season after the first five games.

David Friio's late equalizer rescued a point for the Pilgrims after Brighton had taken advantage of some familiar defensive failings to lead 3-1. Their first was an own goal by teenager Paul Connolly, deputising for the injured David Worrell, which Graham Coughlan quickly equalised.

Goals from Guy Butters and Leon Knight, either side of half-time appeared to have won the game for Brighton, but Ian Stonebridge celebrated his

22nd birthday with an 81st-minute header and Friio finished things off, although Lee Hodges so nearly had the last word with an injury-time drive that thudded back off a post.

"To score ten league goals and only win one game is quite scary," said Sturrock. "I was hoping we'd bottomed off with it but here we go again – incredible decision-making by individuals cost us dear.

"You cannot – no way – lose three goals and expect to win games. First one, everybody sees; the second one, one of my players doesn't position himself where he should normally be; and the third one, I've got one of my players

making a decision for offside when the others are running back.

"We've gone away a bit and scratched and shown great mental attitude, but the longer this goes on, the more opportunity we have to lose belief in ourselves.

"I just feel that every decision an individual is making, there is a right one and a wrong one and they are making the wrong one. It doesn't much how much coaching you put into them, how much shape-work you put into your back four, if an individual in the back four makes a decision that's the wrong one, you pay dearly.

"We've prided ourselves that we don't normally make the wrong decisions, but it's coming







SIGNED in November 2001, from Rochdale, Bayliss soon became a regular in Luton's Division Three promotion campaign of 2001-02, but injuries cut down his chances last season. Ironically, an injury crisis led to the defender joining the Hatters, when then-manager Joe Kinnear had 24 players unavailable.

QUIETLY learning his trade in the youth team, the teenager became the seventh goalkeeper Luton used last season after a crippling run of injuries. He did well in four appearances, and in the summer found that, at 18, he was the senior 'keeper on the books after their two senior

CENTRE-BACK Coyne signed for West Ham as a teenager, but after loans at Brentford and Southend, Coyne went to Dundee before £50,000 persuaded the Scottish Premier League club to let him move to Kenilworth Road in September 2001.

17 Emmerson Boyce

Born: Aylesbury

September 24 1979

ONE of the many to come through to Luton's schools and youth development programme, the defender was signed as a YTS boy in the summer of 1995, and made the breakthrough to the league squad at the age of 19, midway through the 1999-2000 season. After occasional appearances following a debut in the Auto Windscreens Shield in January 1999, he became a regular at right-back, with a liking to attack on the overlap, and signed a new contract in the summer of 2002.



34 Dean Crowe

Born: Stockport, June 6, 1979

THE striker was signed from Stoke City in September 2001, after making one substitute appearance for the Pilgrims earlier in the season - against who he scored on his debut.

24 Sol Davis

Born: Cheltenham, Sep 4, 1979

SWINDON boss Andy King failed in attempts to persuade Davis to sign a new deal and the end of the 2001-02 season, and Luton swooped for the tough-tackling left back.

7 Adrian Forbes

Born: Ealing, Jan 23, 1979

AFTER considerable First Division experience, and with an England youth cap to his credit, Forbes was a surprise inclusion on Norwich City's list of players available for transfer in the summer of 2001, and Luton were delighted to pay £75,000 for a right winger.

23 Ian Hillier

Born: Neath, Dec 26 1979

NO-ONE was more surprised than the Welsh under-21 international when he made his league debut for Luton in the second game of the 2001-02 season. The day before he was training with Spurs but a crop of injuries at Kenilworth Road led to Luton taking the right-back, firstly on loan, and then for a £30,000 fee.

19 Steve Howard

Born: Durham, May 10, 1976

Suspended

RARELY can £50,000 have been better spent in football than the fee Luton paid Northampton on deadline day in March 2001 to prise the striker away from the Cobblers. He has been Luton's leading marksman in each of the past two seasons and is a huge favorite at Kenilworth Road - he was the fans' player of the year in 2002, and the players' player of the year 12 months later. Howard's 24 goals made him the Third Division's top league marksman as Luton won promotion behind Argyle.

THE MANAGER

MIKE NEWELL

Born: Liverpool
January 27 1965

THE former striker is unique among managers - Luton fans helped him to get the job in a telephone poll just before this season began. They had suffered agonies as Luton underwent a change of ownership, which resulted in the sacking of previous manager Joe Kinnear. The new owners enlisted supporters' help in drawing up a shortlist to fill the vacancy, and Newell, who had been a popular player at Kenilworth Road two decades earlier, was installed. He soon discovered he had taken on a huge challenge. The club went into receivership with debts of £11m; the Football League imposed a transfer embargo; and eight players left during the summer. The receiver allowed the new manager to make the major new "signing" he most wanted, when Luton

legend Mick Harford was brought back to be Director of Football and first-team coach. Harford had been sacked two months previously by the new owners. Newell has been in football for more than 20 years, beginning as a striker at Crewe before joining Wigan. After three years at Springfield Park he moved to Luton for £80,000



21 Paul Hughes Born: Hammersmith, Apr 19, 1976

A CAREER under Glenn Hoddle at Chelsea and Southampton was interrupted by injury. Gordon Strachan listed Hughes, who joined Luton at the start of the 2001-02 season.

38 Michael Leary Born: Ealing, Apr 17, 1983

TRAINEE promoted to the senior squad after impressive performances in the youths and reserves.



ARGYLE'S first outing in the Pontins Holiday Combination Cup – a group affair at this stage – ended in defeat, with former Home Park trainee Rob Hulbert scoring a spectacular goal to ice Bristol's victory.

Hulbert netted an audacious curling drive from 20 yards just before half-time to add to Leroy Lita's earlier strike against a Pilgrims side containing Conogo trialist Eugene Kangulungu. Lee McGuire added a scarcely deserved third at the death.

Argyle fielded a line-up which included, in starting-formation order, Gilbert O'Sullivan (Gilbert a loan, naturally), possibly the best pairing for PA announcers since Rhys Wilmot and Kenny Brown were the club's numbers one and two.

Stewart Yetton made the most of his first second-team start with some lively flits and darts in the opening exchanges, and Kangulungu caught the eye, not least of all because he was six foot plenty and appeared fairly useful.



Tuesday, September 2

Lita opened the scoring, sprinting through the middle and putting the ball under the body of goalkeeper Luke McCormick, and Hulbert increased that lead eight minutes before the break, curling the ball in from well outside the penalty area.

Argyle started the second period with a passion. Steve Adams hit the post; Yetton was denied a clean shot on goal by a last-ditch challenge; and Kangulungu almost marked a notable debut with a header from David Beresford's corner that went just wide.


Despite the pressure, and Kangulungu moving to left back (Kangulungu O'Sullivan? No – wouldn't work), it was Bristol who nicked a third to give the result a flattering look, McGuire breaking from deep and capitalizing from some hesitancy by McCormick to fire home.

ARGYLE'S second string suffered a third successive defeat on Tuesday night, when they succumbed to their more experienced visitors.

A single goal by Jason Bowen, direct from a free-kick in the D of the Argyle penalty area midway through the second half, ultimately proved the difference between the two sides, though the Pilgrims should take some credit from the way their comparatively green team matched the Welshmen.

The strength of Cardiff's team, indeed, of Cardiff as a club, was illustrated by their choice of starting forwards: Gavin Gordon and Andy Campbell, who, between them, cost around 60 times the price of Argyle's entire stock of attackers, i.e. the £30,000 paid to Bristol Rovers for Mickey Evans.

As it was, the impressive Matt Villis and Hasney Aljofree coped well enough with the twin menace, and, anyway, Cardiff's main attacking threat came from right-winger Bowen, the man who really should be playing alongside Dennis Lawrence and Chris Llewellyn at Wrexham.

Aljofree tried to make instant amends with a blunderbuss from distance, clutched uneasily by goalkeeper Martyn Margetson, before Marcus Martin gave more credence to the belief of some that he will one day make the break into the first team with a curling, dipping, drive that crashed back off the crossbar.








Argyle Centenary Season Hall of Fame

2003-2004



MALCOLM Allison was twice Argyle manager under the chairmanship of Robert Daniel, between 1964-65 and 1978-79. He initially took over from caretaker Andy Beattie (pictured right, with Daniel) after tuberculosis ruined his playing career. Sacked after disagreements with the directors in 1965, Allison returned 13 years later to Home Park (below), having become a national figure in his time at Manchester City and Crystal Palace. His return inspired the side to avoid relegation. However, in January 1979, an offer to return to Manchester City meant Allison left once again.



I was a member of the David Kemp 'select' side that played against 'Walford Boys' Club' here at the home of football.

Tom was at Griffin Park to present his weekly BBC London football show.

Although a committed Arsenal fan, he does enjoy going to all the grounds in London - in all divisions - so good for him!

From my view in the stand, it appeared that everyone had a great time in the away end.

To me, there's no sight at an away match game as good as a packed away terrace, and 'Trigger' bravely heading the decisive third with the home fans reacting by heading for the exits.

That's what Argyle on the road is all about!

MOSES Russell was an unmistakeable footballer.

The Argyle and Wales legend was known throughout his playing days, not only for his tenacious, committed performances at the back, but also for his startling baldness.

His thinning thatch was the result of a bout of rheumatic fever, and several clubs were hesitant to sign the former Methyr Tydfil player because they did not believe someone who looked so old could actually be in his early 20s.

However, Argyle manager Robert Jack checked Russell's birth certificate in his home town of Tredegar after watching him play for Merthyr and promptly signed him up for a club-record fee of £400.

Russell had already won three caps for his country at this stage and went on to earn a further 20 whilst playing for the Greens, where he became the club captain.

His game was characterised by his unquenchable enthusiasm and gritty determination, providing inspiration to both his club and country throughout the 1920s.

Although Russell's style of play made him immensely popular amongst Argyle and Welsh fans, he was less popular with the followers of rival teams.

The Robbie Savage of his day, Russell was once threatened by a gun-wielding Canadian enraged by his ferocious tackling on his national side's players.

Mounties attending the Canada-Wales game in Hamilton, Ontario in 1929, managed to get their man before he could hurt Russell, but they could not stop a pitch invasion.

In Argyle's tour to South America in 1924, Russell won as many enemies as fans and provoked the now infamous supporters of the Boca Juniors into a pitch invasion after his team had won a



penalty. The fans had already flooded the pitch to carry all 11 players of their team around in celebration of a goal whilst the disbelieving Argyle players had taken shelter in their dressing-room.

When the game resumed, a further invasion was sparked by the penalty decision in favour of the Pilgrims. The travelling players decided amongst them that winger Patsy Corcoran would take the spot kick and miss so as not to inflame the home fans further.

OUR lads maintained their good start to the season with this result at Bristol.


On another warm day, we battled hard to come away with the points.

Enabling the Disabled

WELCOME this afternoon to all supporters and our friends in the disabled community.

Unfortunately I will be away for today's game with Luton as I am doing my Level 3 Football Coaching Certificate course at Exeter - the old UEFA B licence - which is great for me.

I would like to start these notes off by saying a great big 'thank you' to Vospers of Plymouth, who have very kindly sponsored myself a Ford Fusion Car. This has enabled me to reach a lot more disabled schools, colleges and daycentres all over Devon and Cornwall. You can see their new board around the ground, 'Supporting Sport in the Community'.

A support group for football in the disabled community has been set up in the close season, which has the support of Plymouth Argyle Football in the Disabled Community. The group is call the

Special Football Development Trust and consist of Parents and carers of disabled persons. The chairman is Mark Haydon and he can be contacted via myself at the club or on 07801 095637.

This group helps to run the disabled football coaching at Manadon Football Development Centre, St Peters Road, Honicknowle on Sunday mornings, in partnership with PAFC, Plymouth City Council and the Devon County Football Association. It runs from 10-11am and is open to children and adults with disabilities. The first session is free, so, if you are disabled, then why not come along and play football?

I have also spoken to the disability officer at Exeter City Football in the Community, Dick Bedford, and provisionally have booked our first Disability Derby with Exeter's seniors, on Wednesday, November 12, at the Cat and Fiddle (2pm). We will, of course, then offer them a

return game at Argyle. Other clubs who I know are nearly ready for friendlies are Swindon Town, Brighton, QPR, Wimbledon, Everton, Bristol City, Cheltenham and Sheffield Wednesday. The list is growing, which means we are ever nearer looking at starting the FA Disability League.

In the future, we also hope to be able to offer match-day packages, soccer schools, coaching schools in the holidays for the disabled, and, soon, after-school coaching sessions. Telephone for more details.

Reflecting on a Busy Summer



As mentioned in the last programme notes, it was a busy summer school-holiday period for the Community Soccer coaching staff, with more than 800 children taking part on courses that took us to venues as distant as Pendeen in West Cornwall and Holsworthy in North Devon.

Every weekday of the holiday, boys and girls of all ages and a variety of abilities from the towns, villages and hamlets of Devon and Cornwall came together to enjoy one or two days of learning new skills and techniques, played small-sided games based on a World Cup theme, and took part in exciting competitions such as penalty shoot-outs, speed-dribbling, target-shooting and passing and control tests. We were blessed with fantastic weather throughout, enthusiastic children, and warm and friendly hospitality by all the junior football clubs and schools visited.

Arrangements are now well in hand for our October half-term courses (Monday, October 27 to Friday 31). Provisional venues are: St Minver, Mithian, Bodmin and Carn Brea, in Cornwall; Tavistock and Ivybridge, in Devon; plus our regular course at Stoke Damerel Community College in Plymouth. It's a question of 'watch this space'.


One event which took place this summer throughout the country was the Supernova Goal Striker Challenge. Young boys and girls represented their local club in this great new challenge, run and sponsored by Goal Striker. Argyle's four representatives were Elliott Jones, Jack Venn, Joanne Hodges (*pictured standing*) and Kirsty Ward (*kneeling*). All did extremely well, and came away with t-shirts, medals, and adidas goody-bags. Joanne has progressed to the national finals, and will represent Argyle at this event at the City of Manchester Stadium. We wish her well.

The start of the new school term means visits to schools every day. Our schools programme involves coaching children at feeder primary schools to Stoke Damerel, Sir John Hunt, Tamarside and Parkside Community Colleges, as well as the Plymstock area primary schools, and visits to several schools in Cornwall.

Schools are visited for one session a week for a six-week period, when they are coached in basic skills of the game. The final visit involves children of Years 3 & 4 and Years 5 & 6 taking part in a penalty shoot-out competition to determine who will represent their school against other school winners and a chance to progress to a grand final which is held at Home Park before and during a first-team game - a great day out for the children, staff and parents.

Our Match Day Magic visitors today are the children, staff and parents from St Minver School, near Wadebridge. We visit St Minver at least twice a year in the school holidays to do coaching courses, so it is an extra pleasure to welcome them to Home Park for the day. Their day here will consist of a talk on the history of the club, a tour of the stadium, a coaching session, a meal, and watching the game from the grandstand.



From the West (A604)


