Welcome to the players, staff and supporters of Luton Town Football Club for their first visit to the Fitness First Stadium.

Our LDV game against Yeovil Town proved as difficult as we thought it would be. Having seen them play pre-season and scouted their last three league matches we knew that we had to play at our very best to progress to the next round. Although disappointed with our overall performance we were quick to give credit to Gary Johnson's side that on the night deserved to come out on top.

What was more disappointing was the vitriolic abuse we had to suffer from our so-called supporters who must think we have a divine right to win every football match we partake in.

Yeovil Town possess a very compact and neat stadium, are debt free and the vast majority of their players earn comparable or better wages than our own. They may be just out of the Conference but financially are in a far more capable position than the vast majority of lower league clubs.

Gary Johnson rang me in midweek to cancel a reserve fixture scheduled for the previous Wednesday as he has only 22 professionals to call upon and could not field a team, which raised a smile amongst the staff. We may be the more established club but in many ways they are in a far healthier position.

The injury to Derek Holmes compounded a miserable evening and we learned later that week he had unfortunately torn his cartilage and will be missing for at least 6 weeks. His attitude since he arrived at the football club has been exemplary and I'm confident he will take this latest set-back in his stride.

With any setback you must try to come out of it stronger for the experience and that was the message we tried to impart to the players after the game.

Our clash with the league leaders four days later was the perfect challenge the team needed to show their new found maturity and I thought all the squad responded magnificently and they thoroughly deserved their 1-0 win.

The Cherries went out of the LDV Vans Trophy at the first hurdle, losing 2-0 at Yeovil. The large Cherries following in the Southern Section's biggest crowd left disappointed as the home side put in an excellent performance to deserve their progression in the tournament. Yeovil took the lead on 74 minutes through Jake Edwards and sealed the win with four minutes left through a Gavin Williams penalty.



Luton went through thanks to a late, late goal from Matthew Judge at Stevenage. Other sides to progress to the second round from the Southern Section were Colchester, Peterborough, Plymouth, QPR, Southend and Wycombe. In the Northern Section, Blackpool, Carlisle, Doncaster, Chesterfield, Hull, Halifax, Lincoln, Stockport, Oldham, Scarborough, Scunthorpe and Wrexham went through.


In the LDV Vans Trophy Southern Section, Boston, Rushden and Dagenham & Redbridge went through whilst in the Northern Section, Sheffield Wednesday and Barnsley were successful.

SATURDAY 18 OCTOBER 2003

The Cherries moved up to fifth in the table with a superb display against league leaders Brighton & Hove Albion at the Fitness First Stadium. Warren Feeney netted his fourth goal of the season early on before having to go off with a facial injury and Bournemouth were unlucky not to have extended their lead on a number of occasions.

Luton lost for the first time in five matches as they went down 4-2 at Brentford. Adrian Forbes grabbed both of the Hatters goals.

Plymouth moved up to second in the table with a 5-1 thrashing of Port Vale at Vale Park to bring their league goal tally up to 11 goals in two games. QPR dropped to third after they were held to a goalless draw at Peterborough and Sheffield Wednesday also dropped one place after they were held to a 0-0 draw at home against Rushden & Diamonds.




Chesterfield gained their first league win of the season with a surprise 3-0 home success against Swindon. Wycombe lost 2-1 at home against Barnsley and replaced the Spireites at the foot of the table.

In the other games, Blackpool beat Hartlepool 4-0, Grimsby beat Colchester 2-0 and Brian Little celebrated his first league match in charge of Tranmere with a 2-1 win over Oldham. New Stockport boss Sammy McIlroy saw his new team gain a point with a late equaliser in a 2-2 draw at home against Notts County and in the division's other game, Wrexham were held to a 0-0 draw at home against Bristol City.



The draw was made for the next round of the LDV Vans Trophy with Luton facing a trip to Rushden & Diamonds in Round Two. Yeovil's reward for beating the Cherries is a home tie against Colchester.

The Cherries Under 19's beat Exeter 2-1 at Chapel Gate whilst the Under 17's drew 3-3 at Bristol Rovers.

from the boardroom

The Council are preparing to close all but one Park entrance on matchdays from December. If they go ahead, all traffic using the stadium car park and the public pay and display car park beyond, will be forced to enter and exit from Holdenhurst Road. I met with the Council's 'Policy Advisory Group' last week, and they all agreed that their proposed actions are ludicrous, but reluctantly they are likely to go ahead anyway.

The impact is obvious. There will be huge tailbacks of traffic, possibly backing up on to Wessex Way, and it may take up to two hours after each game for cars to get away. It is not only our supporters who will suffer. Park users and local residents will be seriously inconvenienced, noise and air pollution will increase, local shopkeepers will lose trade as fans switch to parking in for example the Sovereign Centre, policing and safety will be compromised, and our disabled supporters who have little choice but to park close to the stadium will be particularly inconvenienced. Even the tiny coven of malice that started this affair, the so-called Friends of Kings Park, will be worse off.

So why is it happening? The Council have taken legal advice, and the opinion they have received is that if they keep the Park open they may be subject to legal challenge by the

Charity Commission. The football club does not agree with this legal opinion, and we need your help to fight this.

There are at least three grounds for challenging the legal opinion.

First it is discriminatory. Why is the football club being singled out? There are houses and blocks of flats in Pokesdown that can only be accessed over Charity Commission land, Wessex Way and Queens Park Drive both pass through Charity Commission Land. There is no campaign for these to close. We need to expose the so-called Friends campaign for what it is. A direct attack on the football club.

Second, it is within the Council's power to modify the boundary of the charitable land to take the roadways out and replace them with green parkland. This simple and sensible move should have the support of the Charity Commission and would solve the parking problems.

Third, there are only 30 or so football matches a year. Why don't the Council take police advice and open Gloucester Road gates for a few hours on each of these days in the public interest?

There is also evidence that there is an ancient public right of way across the park and that the Council would be acting illegally to close it.

We must fight a campaign to stop the barmy troublemakers winning. If you agree, please help by contacting your local councillor and the Charity Commission in Taunton.

Appearing in court...

Luton Town

15 years ago, Luton had it all - an established top flight club, winners of the Littlewoods Cup when they beat Arsenal and the future looked bright.

Football since then has changed so much and with an inadequate ground, they could not compete with the big clubs. They just missed the outset of the Premiership and from then it has seen them in decline. That decline continued as they fell to Division Two and in 1999 went into receivership. Having survived that, the next chapter saw them relegated to the Third Division. They gained promotion straight away under Joe Kinnear and enjoyed a good return last season to Division Two and by the end of the campaign, optimism was high at the Bedfordshire club.

Nothing though could have prepared them for the summer of 2003 that this proud and famous club had to endure. The club was sold and immediately Joe Kinnear and his assistant Mick Harford were sacked by a recorded delivery letter. Supporters were up in arms over this and boycotted buying season tickets and sponsors were reluctant to put any money in. A Trust in Luton organisation was formed and when the new owner was removed, they showed their support to the club by buying season tickets in their droves, 3,000 sold in a matter of days.

The club were forced to go into administrative receivership and former Luton player Mike Newell came in as manager with Harford eventually returning to the club much to everyone's delight.

Newell and Harford though have to try and gain success on the field with a club £11 million in debt and a transfer embargo on them. There was genuine doubt that Luton would even be able to kick off the season, yet despite all of this, in the face of adversity, Luton have confounded everyone by enjoying an excellent start to the campaign.

Written off before a ball was kicked in anger, they have done excellently and Newell must be extremely proud of his team's efforts. To show how far they have come, they held Premier League Charlton to a 4-4 draw in the Carling Cup at the Valley before eventually going out on penalties. In the league, they have a superb home record with five wins, a draw and a solitary defeat. Away from home, they have won at Stockport, picked up points at Notts County and Swindon and lost four, including a 4-2 defeat at Brentford on Saturday.

The debt remains at Luton and the need for a new stadium becomes more obvious as time goes on. That is important, but the most important thing is the existence of Luton Town Football Club



The man in the hot seat

Manager

MIKE NEWELL

Mike is certainly unique amongst managers as he was appointed after Luton supporters voted for him in a telephone poll! Mike had been a popular player when he had previously served the club and has proved to be a good choice.

He started his playing career at Crewe, before moving to Wigan and then Luton in 1986. He then moved to a number of clubs for big fees, Leicester, Everton, Blackburn, Birmingham, West Ham, Bradford, Aberdeen and then back to Crewe before finishing his playing career at Blackpool. He moved to Tranmere as coach and then in November 2002, took over as manager at Hartlepool where he led the side to promotion, but his contract was not renewed in the summer. He had lost out to Rushden for the championship last term, but quickly made up for that by seeing his new charges beat the Diamonds 3-1 in the first game of the season. Despite all the problems he has had to encounter at Kenilworth Road, Mike is doing a tremendous job. He can't bring any players in yet has led the side to the fringes of the play-off positions. Mike was delighted when Mick Harford was brought back as Director of Football and first team coach and the pair can be justifiably proud of what they have achieved so far.

Luton squad at a glance

3 ALAN NEILSON

Former Welsh international who was signed from Grimsby in 2002. He has plenty of experience after spells with Newcastle, Southampton and Fulham. A versatile player who is vital part of the Hatters squad.

4 MATTHEW SPRING

Midfielder who came through the ranks at Luton to sign as a professional and has blossomed into a very important member of the squad. A consistent performer in midfield, he reached 100 league appearances before he was 20 and will be looking to complete 300 by the end of this season.

5 RUSSELL PERRETT

Central defender who comes from Barton-on-Sea. He was spotted by Portsmouth playing in the Wessex League for Lymington and then went on to serve Cardiff City for four years. He joined Luton in May 2001 and was a major factor behind their promotion and is enjoying an excellent campaign this season.



7 ADRIAN FORBES

Right winger who gained plenty of First Division experience at Norwich and also for England youth. He joined Luton for £75,000 in the summer of 2001 and proved to be an excellent buy. Last season though was a nightmare as he suffered injury during pre-season, only returning for the final few weeks of the campaign.

8 KEVIN NICHOLLS

Tough tackling midfielder who was at Charlton and Wigan before joining Luton in 2001 for a £150,000 fee. He soon became club captain and quickly gained the admiration of the Luton faithful with his never-say-die attitude.

11 STEVE ROBINSON

It's a welcome back to 'Robbo' who spent a highly successful six years here at Bournemouth as a player, making 286 appearances and scoring 60 goals. He joined Bournemouth in 1994 from Spurs before joining Preston in 2000. He joined Luton in the summer of 2002 and his time at Kenilworth Road has been affected by injury, but he has recently made his comeback.

12 CHRIS COYNE

Australian centre half who was in the Australian squad for the 1994 Youth World Cup. He signed for West Ham and after loan spells at Brentford and Southend, moved to Dundee. He signed for Luton for £50,000 in September 2001 and quickly established himself as a crowd favourite.

16 ENOCH SHOWNUMI

Enoch joined up with the Hatters squad last month after previously impressing on trial during pre season. The club had to wait for special dispensation to give him a contract and he has joined from Willesden Constantine, the same club where Barry Hayles started.

17 EMMERSON BOYCE

Right back who came through the ranks at Luton to sign professional forms in 1998 and made his debut the following year. Emmerson is a player who likes to get forward to great effect.

18 AHMET BRKOVIC

Croatian born midfield play maker who first came to England when he joined Leyton Orient from HNK Dubrovnik in 1999. He joined the Hatters in the summer of 2001 and plays a valuable role in the side.



19 STEVE HOWARD

Steve signed on transfer deadline day in 2001 from Northampton for what has proved to be an absolute bargain at £50,000, winning many player awards since joining. He has enjoyed an excellent time with the Hatters and has a superb goalscoring record, including 24 in his first full season.

21 PAUL HUGHES

Midfielder who joined Luton in 2001. He started his career at Chelsea and gained experience with loan spells at Stockport, Norwich and Crewe before joining Southampton. He had a serious groin injury in his time with the Saints and when Gordon Strachan became boss, he transferred to Luton. Paul was quickly snapped up by the Hatters.

22 DAVID BAYLISS

A signing from Rochdale in November 2001, David was a regular in the promotion campaign, but injuries restricted his appearances last season. The defender was Rochdale's longest serving player until he joined Luton and his experience is proving vital.



23 IAN HILLIER

Under-21 Welsh international who signed for Luton at the start of the 2001-02 season, initially on loan, before signing permanently for a bargain £30,000 fee from Tottenham. He settled in quickly and has become a regular member of the squad.

24 SOL DAVIS

Highly rated defender who signed for Luton from Swindon when his contract expired in 2002. A tough tackling left back whose move to Luton has proved to be a major coup.

25 GARY McSHEFFREY

Gary is currently on loan from Coventry City and he has enjoyed a tremendous time at Luton. He has plenty of pace and certainly knows where the goal is. He will be sorely missed when he returns to Highfield Road shortly.

32 LEE MANSELL

Young midfielder who made the transition from the youth team straight through to first team last season and scored after just 58 seconds of being on the pitch against QPR in the FA Cup. Lee has been at the club since he was 11 and his form last season earned him a professional contract.

33 DEAN BRILL

Young keeper who has been on the bench regularly this season and made his full debut in the recent 3-1 win over Wycombe. A local lad, Dean has been at the club since he was a 9-year-old.

34 DEAN CROWE

Striker who initially joined Luton on loan from Stoke in September 2001. He made a quick impact, scoring on his debut against Plymouth and soon made the move permanent. Dean has also served Northampton and Bury on loan.

38 MICHAEL LEARY

With the transfer embargo on Luton, it has given players like Michael the chance to shine and the youngster has joined the first team squad on occasions after his fine form for the youth and reserve teams.

39 STEVEN O'LEARY

17 year old who has represented the Republic of Ireland at Under 26 and Under 17 level. Steven was on the bench for an LDV game last season.

41 KEVIN FOLEY

Defender who is still eligible for the Luton youth team. He was handed a starting role in pre-season and settled in rapidly, ensuring that despite his tender years, he gained a first team place on merit.

43 MATTHEW JUDGE

Young striker who joined the club after having previously been on the books at Spurs. Matthew came on as a sub in the recent LDV match at Stevenage.

44 PARYS OKAI

Young midfielder who has been at the club since he was a schoolboy. Small, but very quick, he made one LDV appearance last season. Parys made his first appearance this season against Yeovil in the Carling Cup.

45 LEON BARNETT

Local lad who is a central defender, but can fill in at a number of other roles. Recently handed his full debut in the 1-0 win at Stevenage in the LDV Vans Trophy.

47 ROB BECKWITH

Rob has only just celebrated his 19th birthday, but has been a regular in goal this season after the club's two senior keepers left in the summer. Despite his age and inexperience, he has performed superbly this season and commands his box well.



1 January 2001 Division Two

AFC Bournemouth 3

Luton Town 2

There is nothing better for getting rid of a sore head on New Years Day than a good game of football and by the end of the game on 1 January 2001, the last thing anyone was thinking about was a hangover. A crowd of 5,411 came along to see a resurgent Cherries side who had moved away from the relegation zone to mid table comfort and a Luton side who had signed Mark Stein and Mark Ovendale from Bournemouth in the summer, but had struggled badly and were one place off the bottom. The game was going to plan when Steve Fletcher put the Cherries ahead on 39 minutes and the side would have been looking towards their half time cuppa a goal to the good when Luton suddenly turned the game on its head. On the stroke of half time Andrew Fotiadis equalised and straight from the kick off, Luton gained possession and Adam Locke struck home. At half time, head injury victim Peter Grant was replaced by James Hayter and it was to be Grant's last appearance for the first team. In the second half, Luton held firm, keeping close tabs on Jermain Defoe, who was looking to get a record breaking eighth goal in a row. It looked as if it was all going to go wrong for Bournemouth until the side were awarded a penalty with just seven minutes left. Richard Hughes tucked that away past his old team mate Ovendale signalled a frenetic end to the game. Three minutes later as the ball bounced around the area, Defoe was on hand to nudge the ball home to set up wild celebrations in the South End, the last time the stand was used for a league match at the old ground. Luton came to within a whisker of equalising in time added on, but it was the Cherries who celebrated the New Year in style.



the Hatters to take the lead. A Tony Thorpe penalty on 58 minutes gave the home side the lead and he quickly doubled the advantage two minutes later. After that, it was a case of the Cherries keeping the scoreline as it was and many of the travelling support had left long before the referee blew the final whistle. The next month saw Bournemouth gain revenge with a 3-2 win at Dean Court with Steve Robinson scoring twice. By the end of the season, Luton had qualified for the play-offs, losing against Crewe whilst Bournemouth were left fighting for their very existence.

and...the start of an era!

3 January 1925 Division Three (South)

Luton Town 0

Bournemouth & Boscombe Athletic 0

In the mid twenties, the Cherries were a fledgling Football League club and were finding the elevation from Southern League status difficult. On 3 January 1925, the team travelled to Luton Town without a goal in four games and with no wins in eight. Introduced to the players in the changing room was a striker who had just signed from Sheffield Wednesday. The man in question was Ronnie Eyre who in a career that had seen him picked up by Wednesday from Hucknall Colliery in 1923 had made just one appearance for the Owls in that time. His arrival and debut though against Luton was to be the start of an era that helped to establish the Cherries as a Football League club. He celebrated his debut with a goal as the Cherries won at Kenilworth Road 2-0 with Leslie Roberts scoring the other. He went on to score eleven goals that season, 27 the next, 28 in 26-27, 30 the following season, 32 in 28-29 then 23, 24, 19 and in 1932-33, his final season eight. His final total of goals was 202 in the League. He left Bournemouth in 1933 to join Christchurch and settled in the area, passing away in 1969, but his record breaking goalscoring achievements will never be forgotten.




Bournemouth boss Sean O'Driscoll:



HOLDING COURT
Stephen Purches

Born in Ilford in 1980, Stephen was spotted as a footballer at a young age by West Ham and rose through the ranks to be taken on as a trainee and then as a professional in 1998. In his two years as a pro at Upton Park under Harry Redknapp, he progressed to the fringes of the first team squad without making an appearance.

He first came to Bournemouth on trial in 2000, playing against Ipswich in the Combination Cup Final and made an instant impression to Cherries supporters. He signed permanently in the summer, making his debut in August 2000 at Bristol Rovers and apart from a spell out with an injury in his first season at the club, has been an almost permanent fixture in the side and has proved to be a highly versatile and reliable player.

The highlight of his career came at the Millennium Stadium where his run from the heart of the defence saw him latch on to Wade Elliott's cross to vitally put the Cherries 3-1 ahead. It has always been a good omen when Stephen scores because in the nine matches where he has found the net, the Cherries have won every time! Stephen is ever present this season and is at his reliable best.

WEST HAM

"I had been playing for my district side and a scout came over to my dad when I was about ten and said that West Ham would be interested in me going over to train with them to see what I could do. I was still at West Ham ten years after that, which was a dream come true to me because I was a West Ham supporter. I thought they were just messing about when they first told me, they weren't and it was something to be proud of. I made my debut for the reserves when I was 15, so by the time I left, I had a lot of experience at that level. I played for five years at a good level and you can only learn and progress like that especially as I played with some great players. I look back and I was in the first team squad a lot of times, but in all my time at West Ham, I was only on the bench once against Steaua Bucharest. That was a proud moment for me. There is a very fine line in making it there and unfortunately I never got that chance to show what I could do in the first team. Harry saw the potential in me and told me that the only club he really wanted me to go to was Bournemouth as he felt that I would be able to progress there and he was right. In the time that I was at West Ham, there were very few lads that made it through to the first team, in fact no one in my year did. We had a good youth team as well, we won a lot of trophy's and in the time that I was a YT, there is only me, Grant McCann who now plays for Cheltenham and Gary Alexander, who is now at Leyton Orient, who are left in the professional game and it amazes me that out of the very successful team that we had, the three of us are all that's left. It is hard and there is not so much room for young players to move into clubs now."

MOVING SOUTH

"Harry had spoken to me and told me that Bournemouth had watched me a couple of times and were interested and that I should go down for a couple of days and see if I liked it. It couldn't have worked out better because I



came down and ended up playing in the Combination Cup Final against Ipswich and it all went from there really. I knew Bournemouth well and my whole family were going to move there when I was about ten. My grandad has lived here for a while and I have always loved the place because it's a lovely part of the world. You could almost call it fate coming here, it just felt that way because I knew the area so well and it had always been a home from home and I always used to look for the Bournemouth results before I came here. I did some training with the lads and Narada and myself played against Ipswich. It was a bad night because of the weather, but I came off the pitch and I knew that I'd shown what I could do and we also lifted the cup after a 3-1 win. I think I showed how good I was at celebrating a goal as well! I was obviously very excited about playing and when John O'Neill scored, I thought I'd jump on his back, but missed him completely and ended up landing in a puddle on the pitch! That's something I'll never forget. It was a great night though and I was glad to be part of it and it's something I won't forget because it was the start of something very good. I remember at the time speaking to Jason Tindall and he said it was like playing a first team match because of the amount of people at the game and the atmosphere was superb even though it was just a reserve game. After that, Mel Machin wanted me to sign there and then, but I had to go back to West Ham because I was in the squad to play against Derby. It gave me a bit of time to think about it, but I knew it was the place for me. I sorted everything out before the summer, came back down for a week so that I could meet all the lads again, get used to everyone and get ready for the next season."

GOALS

"In my first season at the club, I never got a goal. I'm never afraid to have a shot and I knew that if I kept trying, eventually it would go in. I do get forward as much as I can and although I was getting a bit of ribbing from the lads, I knew it would come. When I did eventually score, there was a bit of relief, but mainly just a great buzz and

to win the game against Stoke as well was a big bonus and gave us hope that we could get out of the relegation fight. Unfortunately it never worked out like that, but it was a game where we showed what we could do and obviously a game that I'll never forget. It's been mentioned a few times now that every time I score a goal we win and it's funny the way that things have worked out. One day, that might change, but at the moment, every time I do stick one in that happens and I'm looking to add to what I've got now! I'm asked which one of my goals is my favourite and because of the coverage, the goal at the Millennium Stadium will always stand out. Peter Grant told me that Sean had to pick his best five goals of last season and he told me that they were all mine, which was nice to hear! The diving header against Southend will probably never happen again, because it was just one of those freak things! Not many people will end up scoring from outside the area with their head. The Rushden goal was a bit special, I just picked it up and then saw it fly in the back of the net and it probably goes down as the best goal I've scored with the most memorable being the goal at Cardiff against Lincoln."

CHANGES

"When I joined Bournemouth, it was Mel Machin who signed me and after one game, he was replaced by Sean O'Driscoll. Sean wasn't the one who signed me so it did put a bit of doubt in my mind as to whether I was going to be the sort of player he wanted. As it has worked out, I've been able to do a job for him. It was a good first year at the club although missing out on the play-offs was a heartbreaking time and I still watch the video of the Reading game, when I had the chance in injury time and still don't know how it didn't go in! The next season saw us playing at Dorchester to start with, waiting for the new stadium. That year ended up in relegation, which made last season massive for us. We'll never forget last season and we will have to use the experience to improve. It ended up being an incredible end to the season for the club and for me personally when I scored at the Millennium Stadium, which was a real bonus. All in all, it has been a roller coaster three years for me and lets hope that this season, we keep going upwards."

VERSATILITY

"I've been asked to play in a lot of different positions since I've been at the club and to be honest, I don't care where I play as long as I'm in the team. At the moment, I'm enjoying it in midfield because you get more involved in the game. I've got a decent engine on me so I can get up and down and I feel I can help both the defence and the attack. If I get called upon to play in another position, then I'm quite happy to do that. The squad is so small that the lads have to be able to play in different positions and that's the way that

it is here. As a squad, we're all fairly young, we've all been together for a little while now and we can all rely on one another in different positions and that has worked in our favour. We all trust each other when we have to do different jobs for the team. I played as a left back for a long spell when I first joined and that was a place that I'd never played before. I'm quite lucky as a player that I can adapt and learn with each position I play in and I did a job there for the team. I always gave 100%, but as a right-footed player, it is always difficult to play on the left. I always felt I did a decent job for the team, but now with Warren Cummings in the squad, I can hand that over to him, hoping that I've improved myself as a player in that role."






"I feel that although we went down in 2002, we became a bigger club. A lot of people came to notice us a lot, as a team we've been allowed to grow together and as a club, I think that everything's moving in the right direction. This season offers a good opportunity of showing what we can do and who knows where we are going to end up. We've had a decent start and as long as the squad stays as fit as possible, we can keep this going. The club is definitely moving in the right direction, it has become bigger each year I've been here. I remember when I first came, crowds were not the best even when we were doing well, but that was because the facilities were poor. The new stadium has seen many changes, there are a lot more kids and families coming to the game now. Everything has changed, not just football and that is why you have to work harder to attract supporters. People can see now when they come to games just how much better it is. The ground is very good for the club and for the future. People say they want a fourth stand and I can understand that, and some of the onus is on all of the players here to help achieve that, by doing well and, attracting support, so that the three stands aren't enough for our crowds and hopefully one day, that will happen. At the moment, the ground still looks lovely even with the three stands and we have got used to that. It is up to us though to keep playing well and hopefully one day, the fourth stand will be built and then we would have one of the best stadiums in this division."

JOHN

"It was a brilliant year for me to have my brother John at the club. He did well when he played for the reserves and when we trained. It was almost like we were back in the garden like when we were kids. He was a sub for the game against Orient and that was special because our dad has always been an Orient supporter. He was on the bench again in the FA Cup against Crewe and that was my birthday, so it's funny how on all the occasions that he was on the bench, it always had something special attached to it. Because of the money situation at the club, we couldn't sign him, which was a shame. Who knows though what will happen, he's not going to give up, and one day he might be back! He's playing for Salisbury City now and they are in the fourth qualifying round of the FA Cup where they play Lymington & New Milton at home, so if they get through that, we'll have our ears glued to the radio for the draw and you could see Purches v Purches!"



POSH NEXT AT FITNESS FIRST - POSSIBLY!

The next visitors to the Fitness First Stadium will be Peterborough United on Saturday, November 15 - unless we are drawn at home in the FA Cup first round on the previous Saturday. Coming to the end of his first month at London Road by then will be Fulham striker Callum Willock, who has joined Posh on loan with a view to a permanent move. Willock began this season out on loan at Bristol Rovers, and Peterborough boss Barry Fry admitted: "His outstanding pace will be a real asset at our level." Another recent signing for Fry's squad has been teenage Australian midfielder Shane Duke, who has just signed his first professional contract after a year with the youth set-up.

McILROY TAKES CHARGE AT EDGELEY PARK

Stockport County have appointed Sammy McIlroy as their new boss, after he resigned as manager of Northern Ireland. McIlroy had been in charge of the national side since January 2000, during which time they won just four out of 28 games, but insisted it was "a big, big decision to leave. I was proud and honoured to manage my country, but I have always missed the day-to-day involvement with club football. Stockport is just down the road from Macclesfield, where I was for seven years - it is a big challenge, but Stockport has great potential." McIlroy replaces John Hollins, who had been in caretaker charge at Edgeley Park since the sacking of former boss Carlton Palmer a month ago.

WARHURST MOVE BOOSTS SPIREITES

Struggling Chesterfield - who picked up their first win of the season last week, against Macclesfield in the LDV Vans Trophy - have signed much-travelled utility man Paul Warhurst on a month's contract, thanks to the sponsorship of a local printing firm. The 34-year-old former Oldham, Blackburn and Bolton star is probably best remembered for the goals which helped Sheffield Wednesday reach both domestic Cup finals in 1993, after he was converted from defence to attack. Spireites boss Roy McFarland said: "Paul brings a wealth of experience, and we're hoping he will help bring the best out of our young team." Extending his stay at Saltergate is Charlton striker Mark DeBolla, who has joined for a second month on loan after recovering quicker than expected from an ankle ligament injury.

BROWN BIDS TO IMPRESS PARKINSON

Former Arsenal forward Jermaine Brown, 20, has earned himself a short-term contract at Colchester United after impressing while on trial. Brown, who was released by the Premiership giants in the close season, will now hope to win himself a longer contract from U's manager Phil Parkinson. However, Parkinson is still bidding to improve his squad, and has taken ex-Watford midfielder Richard

Johnson on trial. The 29-year-old Australian's only appearance for the Hornets this season was our Carling Cup defeat at Vicarage Road, and he was released by the First Division side last month after making over 200 league appearances for them in the last decade. Johnson is likely to play for Colchester's reserves this week.

Peterborough's 3-2 victory over Torquay - which was the first LDV game to be settled by a "silver goal" after David Farrell netted in the first period of extra time. However, Port Vale had an evening to forget as they were the only Second Division side to lose to a Conference side - Scarborough - and holders Bristol City crashed out 4-0 at Plymouth.

EVANS SLOTS IN AT NENE PARK

Rushden & Diamonds have signed South African international goalkeeper Paul Evans on non-contract forms. Boss Brian Talbot, who did not have a keeper on the bench for last month's defeat here at the Fitness First Stadium, has been looking for back-up for number one Billy Turley and has turned to Evans, who has had spells with Leeds and Sheffield Wednesday and has recently recovered from a broken pelvis. Evans made his Diamonds debut in last week's LDV Vans Trophy win at Oxford - when midfielder Ritchie Hanlon made his long-awaited first start for 18 months, following a serious knee injury.

GIBBS LEAVES OAKWELL

Left-back Paul Gibbs has parted company with Barnsley, 19 months after joining them, after his contract was terminated by mutual consent. Gibbs, who is 31 next week, has previously served Colchester, Torquay, Plymouth and Brentford, but his first-team opportunities have been limited since manager Gudjon Thordarson's arrival in the summer. Meanwhile, former Leeds chairman Peter Ridsdale has said that he is near to completing his takeover at Oakwell. He explained: "This deal will be completed or finalised on or before October 24 - everyone is happy that the deal can be completed within the timeframe, and only a couple of minor issues have to be finished before completion."

SATURDAY 23rd OCTOBER 1971, DIVISION 3, BOURNEMOUTH & BOScombe 3 ASTON VILLA 0

MAGNIFICENT BOScombe CRUSH VILLA!

From the Press Box



Look out Second Division here we come! That's was the call from Dean Court after this superb display by the Cherries. As expected Boscombe, the league-leaders, were at full strength with John Benson having recovered from his ankle injury and the teams ran out in warm October sunshine to be greeted by the biggest league crowd at Dean Court for ten years. The pressure was on Villa in the early minutes and Phil Boyer was the man who caused the trouble, just as he had done in the midweek victory against Port Vale. This time he escaped the attention of the Villa defence and turned quickly on a throw-in from Micky Cave to slam the ball across the goal and into the net after four minutes. Soon after, the Cherries defence needed to hold firm as Riach had a shot blocked, Hamilton headed wide and then Lochhead was unable to find a way past Tony Powell and David Jones. In the 21st minute Boscombe broke through on the left and Tony Scott's perfect cross was headed home by Ted MacDougall for his 13th goal of the season. Boyer now came into his own and was a continual threat to Villa and with the crowd cheering he broke on the right and crossed for MacDougall who brought a diving saving from Hughes in the visitor's goal. Soon afterwards Scott cut in from the left and his superb cross hit the inside of the far post before rebounding to safety. This pattern of play continued into the second half, with Villa only occasionally seen in the Boscombe half as the Cherries remained in control. Boyer was brought down inside the penalty area by Turnbull but to the crowds' amazement, the referee signalled for a free-kick just outside the box and soon after MacDougall was the victim of a crude challenge from Curtis, as the visitors' frustration began to show. Eight minutes from time Scott floated a free kick to the far post and the high jumping Tony Powell headed a third goal for the Cherries to complete a most convincing victory.

In the Programme

Despite losing by the odd goal in five at Shrewsbury the previous week, Boscombe were encouraged by a number of complimentary comments from an array of managers present at the game. Ron Greenwood, manager of West Ham, felt the game was 'A tremendous credit and advert for Third Division football,' whilst ex-Wolves and Birmingham manager, Stan Cullis, commented on 'What tremendous prospects there are for the two teams involved'. The defeat was only the team's second reverse in twelve league games and with home attendances averaging around 12,000, Cherries boss John Bond felt the town was beginning to realise the club could push on to greater things. Micky Cave felt that under Bond's guidance his own and the team's self-confidence had risen dramatically as players were encouraged to express themselves, take on opponents and always have a shot at goal. Whilst on the subject of goalscoring, amazingly despite having scored twelve league and cup goals already, Ted MacDougall was not the Division's leading goalscorer at this stage, Alf Wood of Shrewsbury being out in front with fifteen. Somehow you could sense this would be a season to remember!

HAYTER'S JUST FOUR-MIDABLE!

From the Press Box



James Hayter left Gigg Lane deservedly clutching the match ball after netting four superb goals in Bournemouth's rout of high-flying Bury. With no fewer than 18 places separating the two sides, a Cherries victory at Gigg Lane had seemed wildly optimistic, but the unassuming striker carved his name in the record book and ensured a second victory of the season for manager Sean O'Driscoll. Bournemouth made one change from the team that drew with Wigan the previous week, bringing in on-loan left-sided defender Warren Cummings for his Cherries debut, and they made a dream start racing into a two goal lead inside 13 minutes. First Hayter sprang the Bury offside trap before squaring the ball for Claus Jorgensen to tap home his sixth goal of the season. Then Hayter got on the score sheet himself, volleying home a flick from Steve Fletcher just inside the box. Sandwiched between the two goals was a breathtaking save from Gareth Stewart who acrobatically tipped away a thumping header from Jarrett. There was another let off on 34 minutes when Cummings completed a goal line clearance to prevent Unsworth reducing the home side's arrears, but they pulled a goal back straight after the interval when the unmarked Redmond headed home from a corner. It was then that Hayter embarked upon his personal goal crusade, scoring three times inside six minutes. First he rammed a loose ball into the Bury net after 55 minutes before completing his hat-trick with a delightful touch past goalkeeper Kenny and 60 seconds later drilled in his fourth following a dreadful tangle in the home defence. Preece converted a late consolation penalty for Bury but no one could deny it was Hayter's day, the 21 year-old having equalled the Cherries individual goalscoring record in a league match.

The first thing that struck you upon glancing at the Bournemouth content in the match programme was the surprisingly large number of players in the Cherries squad. Spread across two pages there were 40 pen-pictures but closer examination showed that almost half of them had been included twice! It has to be said the programme was a little thin in content and after pausing to recall players who had turned out for both clubs you soon arrived at the stats pages! These revealed that Bury's defence was one of the meanest in the Second Division with only four goals having been conceded at home so far in the 2000/1 season whilst Bournemouth's past results at Gigg Lane showed four wins, three draws and seven defeats, the Cherries last victory being nine years ago. However, Cherries supporters could take heart from reports of the Shakers disappointing 4-0 defeat at Millwall the previous week, although I doubt even the most optimistic amongst the travelling faithful could have predicted what was to follow!



'Robbo' - Returning Hero!

STEVE ROBINSON RETURNS



Tonight sees the return of one of the Cherries favourite sons, Steve Robinson. 'Robbo' joined Bournemouth in 1994 from Tottenham after making two Premier League appearances for Spurs. He joined a struggling Bournemouth side, but made a massive impact in the 'Great Escape' season, scoring two of the goals in that never-to-be-forgotten night against Shrewsbury.

He firmly established himself in the side, going on to represent his native Northern Ireland and went on to make 286 appearances for the club. In the summer of 2000, he moved to Preston and whilst at Deepdale, joined Bristol City on loan, making an appearance here at the Fitness First Stadium. In the summer of 2002, he joined tonight's visitors Luton where he has recently returned from injury.

With the Cherries promoted last May, a game that he was looking out for was the trip back to Bournemouth, "I can't wait! I was out for nine months and I've just come back and played in the last few games and coming back to Bournemouth is always a special thing for me. I came back a couple of seasons ago with Bristol City, we got a good result and hopefully it can be the same again."

Steve was a major part of AFC Bournemouth from 1994 to 2000 and it is a period of his career that he looks back on with great fondness, "I've got great memories of Bournemouth, I spent nearly six seasons at the club and loved every minute of it. Looking back in hindsight, I regret leaving because sometimes you find your niche in football and Bournemouth was my niche. I had the opportunity to play in the First Division and I don't think anyone would turn down the chance to play at a higher level. I enjoy playing for Luton now though and we have some great lads here. In many ways, it's similar to Bournemouth. It's a good family club and there are a lot of similarities."

Whilst at Bournemouth, Robbo experienced highs and lows, the biggest low being when the club almost went out of existence, a situation that hit Luton in the summer, "The club has been struggling and I've been through it all before at Bournemouth, so I've got experience of being in administration! We weren't getting paid or it would be three or four weeks late, but just like it did at Bournemouth, it's brought all the lads together and we're on a really good run. The same thing happened at Bournemouth because the season after we came out of receivership, we just missed out on the play-offs and got to Wembley, so it can bring everyone together."

Luton have proved many experts wrong this season. Tipped to struggle after all the upheavals of the summer, but as Steve explains, the situation has helped to concretise the spirit at the club. "We always had a squad of 13 or 14 players who were capable of getting out of this division, but we've had injuries and suspensions and we've brought a few young lads in like the two goalkeepers who are only 17 and 18 and have both been fantastic. We have little Kevin Foley who is only 18 and has come in and been brilliant. We have had people playing out of position and have all done really well. We can sign loan players, we have Courtney Pitt and Gary McSheffrey, whose loan spells are up after the Bournemouth game, but we can't sign anyone. We are down to the bare bones, but everyone has pulled together."

Luton supporters have yet to see the best of Steve Robinson due to his injury problems, and at one stage he feared that he wouldn't kick a ball in anger again, but thankfully that time now appears to be behind him, "I had a back operation when I was at Preston and when I came to Luton, I found out I had been diagnosed with the wrong problem, so I was out for eight months after having a major operation and five injections on the wrong place. Finally they have got to the bottom of it and touch wood, the problem has sorted itself out. Two top specialists told me that I'd never play football again and it has been brilliant to prove people wrong and come back and play again."

Robbo played for Bristol City at the Fitness First Stadium two years ago and the one disappointing aspect of day was the reception he got from some Cherries supporters, particularly given his contribution to the club during his time here as a player, but he shrugs it off, although with an air of personal disappointment, "I suppose really, I have to take it as a compliment because if you're a bad player, people don't take any notice of you. I did get a bit of a frosty reception from some people, which was a bit disappointing. I'm very proud of what I achieved at Bournemouth, I made over 280 appearances and scored 60 goals and hopefully helped to give people some good memories. Getting a bit of stick will never change my opinion of my time with Bournemouth, as I said, I loved every minute of it. I won't let a few people booing me affect me, I'm used to getting booed anyway! I can handle that and to be honest, the majority of people were fantastic to me on that day."

Times have been hard at Luton recently and the major stumbling block to them moving forward is the lack of much needed new facilities and when Steve talks of the new Cherries home, he knows what direction his present club need to go in, "It's exactly what Luton need. I would say that Luton are three or four years behind where Bournemouth are now. Bournemouth got themselves together and have now got a great stadium and it's a great set up. I'd pay money to come and watch the sort of football the team play and it's all looking well for the future and hopefully the same thing can happen to Luton. We're desperate for a new stadium and if we can get it, there's a big support waiting to fill it and we need to get someone in to sort out the club and move forward."

It is always a pleasure to welcome an old player back to Bournemouth, particularly someone like Steve Robinson who never gave less than 100% when he pulled on a Cherries shirt. His record at AFC Bournemouth speaks for itself and although it would be going too far to wish him all the best for tonight and the 'Score a goal Stevie Robinson' will not be sung, we can all wish him the best of luck for the future!

Bournemouth supporters also had a small number of seats in the side stand to the left of the away end, a basic seated stand with a good view. Opposite is the home end, which was identical to the away end before a roof was put on last season, which really helps the atmosphere at the ground. The remaining stand is the same size as the seated stand with corporate hospitality also incorporated.

The away support on the night was actually larger than the attendances for many of the first round of this much maligned tournament. Indeed, there were around 200 more than the entire crowd at the Darlington v Hull match - and that was played in a 27,000 capacity arena!

It would be nice to say that every one in the away end just got behind the team from the start, but as all of you who went know, that simply wasn't the case. The vast majority watched, were disappointed, but knew that Yeovil deserved the win, and then went home - a few marred it for everyone.

A good night to 'tick' the ground off the 'seen Bournemouth at' list and it was back home before 11 (unless you were in the car park!)


