



HELLO, and welcome to Kenilworth Road for today's game with Stockport.

Having beaten Notts County at home, we could only manage to pick up a point at Rushden last week after a very good first-half performance where we could well have been further ahead. In the end we had to rely on a penalty save from Marlon to keep us in the game.

WELCOME back to Kenilworth Road after the Christmas break, which I trust everyone enjoyed, and a very happy and healthy New Year to all. I personally was quite happy to see the back of 2003 and the problems it had brought with it! Speaking of last year, just before Christmas I went to preview the BBC Documentary "Trouble at the Top" which was filmed during the dark days of the close season. It was very emotional to relive those days, and showed the solidarity of everyone connected with the club. The documentary is due to be shown in February or March and I will let everyone know the exact date once confirmed – this is one everyone will want to watch!

The bucket collection for the Mayor's Christmas appeal at the Barnsley match raised £347.65 – thank you once again for your generosity. Banning Orders On Football Criminals

AT LUTON Crown Court on December 11, 2003, 20 people were sentenced to various terms of imprisonment for offences of violent disorder or affray at the Worthington Cup fixture between Watford and Luton Town on September 10, 2002. In addition, they all received six-year or seven-year bans from attending any designated football matches.

We will continue to take the strongest action against people who are convicted of criminal offences related to football.







Clubs Pleased To Host Fans On The Road

THE VISIT of Notts County to Kenilworth Road, to become the first team to meet the Town twice this season, underlined the difference in the travelling support of the two clubs. When the Town went to Meadow Lane in September, well over a thousand fans backed them. County's following, for the second Christmas match, was less than a third of that figure.

Town fans also proved to be more loyal than the opposition's against Rushden. No other club has had better backing than the 2,319 who went to Nene Park on Saturday to help Rushden hit their highest attendance of the season so far. When the Diamonds came to Luton for the first game of the season, they had fewer than a thousand in the Oak Road end.

Bradford City were also pleased to see the Town's excellent travelling support. Struggling at the wrong end of the First Division, their FA Cup attendance would have been pathetic without the Town's big following.

Overall so far this season, the Town have had an average of nearly twice as many fans at away games than visitors to Luton. The figures:







2. DANNY GRIFFIN (DEFENDER) PREVIOUS CLUBS: ST JOHNSTONE, DUNDEE UNITED

Northern Ireland international who joined us in January from Dundee United. Also served St Johnstone.

3. DANNY JACKMAN (DEFENDER) PREVIOUS CLUBS: ASTON VILLA

Danny joined us in December from Aston Villa for £70,000 after a successful loan period.



5. ROBERT CLARE (DEFENDER) PREVIOUS CLUBS: NONE

Robert is another successful product of our Centre of Excellence. He joined County as a 15-year-old and turned professional in January 2000.

The cultured centre-back came to prominence in 2000-01 when he played a key role in our successful bid to avoid relegation.

Captained England Under 20s in May 2002.

6. MARK ROBERTSON (MIDFIELD) PREVIOUS CLUBS: BURNLEY, SWINDON, DUNDEE, ST JOHNSTONE

Mark, an Australian international, has joined us until the end of the season (with an option for another year) following his release from Dundee for financial reasons.

7. AARON LESCOTT (MIDFIELD) FORMER CLUBS: ASTON VILLA,

LINCOLN CITY (LOAN), SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY.

Aaron joined Sheffield Wednesday in October 2000 after failing to make a first-team appearance at Aston Villa.

The former England schoolboy international, older brother of Wolves' defender Joleon, made his league debut and became a firm favourite at Hillsborough with his tenacious midfield performances.

He also made an impression on Carlton Palmer who made Aaron his first signing after taking over at Edgeley Park paying £75,000 to the Owls for the 22-year-old in November 2001.

Following the departure of long-term skipper Mike Flynn Lescott was handed the captain's arm band but a knee injury sustained at Grimsby in February 2002 ruled him out of the rest of the campaign

8. AARON WILBRAHAM (STRIKER)

Alby came to prominence with an impressive Youth team partnership with James Flood.

He had a schoolboy spell at Manchester City before joined the club as a trainee. He broke into the first team in March 1998 and in the last couple of season's has been established as a first choice player having returned from a loan spell in Norway on loan.

He was the club's leading goalscorer in 2000-01 but a niggling back injury forced him on the sidelines throughout the second half of last season.

Surgery during the summer has corrected the problem and 'Alby' returned to first-team action at Bristol City in January.

9. LUKE BECKETT (STRIKER) PREVIOUS CLUBS: BARNESLEY, CHESTER CITY, CHESTERFIELD

Sheffield-born Luke served his apprenticeship at Barnsley but, despite being a prolific scorer for the Tykes' reserve side, failed to make a first-team appearance at Oakwell.

He joined Chester City in 1998-99, scoring 25 goals in 74 games, before moving to Chesterfield and helping the Spireites to promotion last season thanks to a return of 16 goals from 41 games.

With 8 goals under his belt in Division Two Carlton Palmer made Luke his second permanent signing at Edgeley Park when he paid the Derbyshire club £100,000 for his services in December 2001.

His hard-working performances soon endeared him to the Edgeley Park faithful and he ended the campaign as the club's top-scorer after scoring 7 times from 17 starts.



10. RICKIE LAMBERT (MIDFIELD) PREVIOUS CLUBS: BLACKPOOL, MACCLESFIELD TOWN.

Rickie moved to Edgeley Park in April 2002 from Macclesfield Town for £300,000, a record fee for our Cheshire neighbours.

Lambert joined the Silkmen in the 2000-01 season after serving his apprenticeship at Blackpool and, after a slow start, emerged as a midfield player with enormous potential.

The Liverpudlian also holds another Macclesfield record – the first player to score a hat-trick for the team since they won promotion to the Football League in 1997.

12. JIM GOODWIN (DEFENDER) PREVIOUS CLUB: GLASGOW CELTIC.

Jim moved to Edgeley Park in May 2002 on a Bosman-free after rejecting a new contract at Celtic.

The Waterford-born defender joined the Scottish giants as a 15-year-old but despite progressing to captain the Republic of Ireland Under-21 team he found opportunities limited at Park Head. Just one first-team appearance, against Dundee United in May 2000, prompted his decision to move south.

Gained his first full Irish cap when he replaced Robbie Keane against Finland earlier this season.

13. JAMES SPENCER (GOALKEEPER)

James joined our Centre of Excellence in 1999 and signed YT forms 2 years later. He was still just 16 when he became the club's youngest-ever goalkeeper last April when his terrific save late in the game helped us beat Watford 2-1.

Also turned in a man-of-the-match performance when he replaced the red-carded Andy Dibble inside the first minute of our final game of last season at Norwich.

14. FRASER MCLACHLAN (MIDFIELD) PREVIOUS CLUBS: NONE

Fraser joined the club's Centre of

Excellence in 1995 and signed professional forms in July 2001.

Following his debut at Sheffield United last March the 19-year-old became a permanent fixture in the County midfield and scored his first League goal, a 20-yard volley, against Watford in April.

15. KEVIN ELLISON (MIDFIELD) PREVIOUS CLUBS: LEICESTER CITY

Kevin burst onto the non-league scene with Altrincham in 1999-2000 and quickly became a target for a host of league clubs.

Leicester City gave him his big opportunity when they paid £50,000 to the Cheshire club in February 2001.

But, despite making his Foxes debut in

front of 67,000 fans at Old Trafford, the Liverpool-born winger found himself well down the pecking order at Filbert Street.

Following the appointment of Colin Murphy as County's Director of Football in November 2001 Kevin had no hesitation in following the former Leicester assistant manager to Edgeley Park when the clubs agreed a £55,000 fee a couple of weeks later.

18. JOHN HARDIKER (DEFENDER) PREVIOUS CLUBS: MORECAMBE

John became the first club to join Morecambe's academy, in 1998, after failing to win a YTS contract at Bury.

making his debut as a 16-year-old John made around 100 appearances for the Lancashire club.

Morecambe's FA Cup run in 2000-01 brought him national acclaim and his consistent performances persuaded Carlton Palmer to make him the Conference's most-expensive defender when he paid £150,000 to bring him to Edgeley Park.

A goal on his Football League debut at Rotherham, John became an Edgeley Park hero by scoring twice in the final five, pulsating minutes when County came from behind to beat Manchester City in March 2002.

Went under the surgeon's knife in January to correct a hernia problem.

19. ANDY WELSH (MIDFIELD) PREVIOUS CLUBS: NONE

Andy joined County's School of Excellence in January 1999 after writing to the club for a trial.

The former Tameside 800m schoolboy champion made his first-team debut against Millwall in October and was capped by Scotland at under-19 level the following month.

Fifteen appearances by the end of the season underlined his potential and his traditional wing-play down the left touchline made him a firm favourite amongst the County faithful.

A successful spell at Macclesfield earlier this season preceded a series of niggling injuries on his return to Edgeley Park. Now back in the first-team picture fol-

lowing a hernia operation.

20. OWEN MORRISON (MIDFIELD) PREVIOUS CLUBS: SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY, SHEFFIELD UNITED

The Northern Ireland Under-21 international joined us close season after serving both Sheffield clubs.

He turned down the offer of a one-year contract at Bramall Lane in favour of a two-year deal at Edgeley Park.

23. CHRIS WILLIAMS (STRIKER) PREVIOUS CLUBS: NONE

Chris, who has been at County since he was 12 years old, signed YT forms in July 2001.

Later that month he travelled with the first-team squad to Finland and scored against SC Kings after coming on as substitute.

He became the club's third-youngest player to play in a first-team game when he came off the bench at Watford on November 10 2001.

26. ALI GIBB (MIDFIELD) PREVIOUS CLUBS: NORWICH CITY, NORTHAMPTON TOWN

After failing to make the grade at Norwich Ali kick-started his career after joining Northampton in 1995.

Although he made more than 100 appearances for the Cobblers he was not considered as a first-team regular and it was something of a surprise when County paid £50,000 to bring him to Edgeley Park in 2000.

The fee proved to be a bargain, though, with Gibb becoming a firm favourite with the County favourite with his hard-working performances down the right.



Blast From The Past

We welcome again Stockport to Kenilworth Road for only the eighth time during our respective long histories.

When we won the championship of the old Division Three (South) in 1937, Stockport won the Northern section at the same time and by coincidence the two sides clashed at Edgeley Park on the opening day of the following season. Despite the absence of 'ten goal' Joe Payne, who was taken ill on the journey north, we took the lead through Albert Dawes but could not hold on with Stockport netting twice, the winner coming four minutes from time.

By the time of the return, on New Years Day 1938, Stockport were struggling at the wrong end of the table but they made a nonsense of their league position when going in at the interval 4-3 ahead. Fortunately, the Town proved the stronger side in the second half with goals from George Stephenson, Charlie Ferguson and Jack Vinall sealing an unlikely 6-4 victory.

Stockport were relegated at the end of that season and it was not until 1965 that the two sides clashed again, this time in Division Four. We travelled to Edgeley Park only days after our shock home F.A. Cup defeat at the hands of Corby and were then thrashed 4-1 by a rampant Stockport side which included future Luton star Keith Allen who bagged a hat-trick.

When the return game came around the following May we had managed to overcome our mid-season slump and were challenging for promotion. Bruce Riach scored after only six minutes to put us ahead, but we had to suffer several anxious moments after full-back


Fred Jardine went off with an ankle injury, which meant we lost our shape for a while. Heroics from goalkeeper Tony Read, playing his first game between the sticks for the Town after scoring 12 goals as an inside-forward earlier in the campaign, kept us in the game, before John O'Rourke was brought down in the box on the hour with Ray Whittaker netting from the spot.

In the following season, the worst in our history, we went down twice to a County side that walked away with the championship. County had recruited what many critics thought were old men (including Matt Woods from the Town) to mount a promotion bid, but they gelled brilliantly as we were to find out.

County had won four games on the trot when we came up against them at Kenilworth Road early in the season and it was 'men against boys' as the visitors ran out easy 3-0 winners with veteran Frank Lord scoring twice.

In the return we went down 0-1, but in truth only the woodwork and a brilliant display from trialist goalkeeper Ron Swan kept the score down.

It was to be only two seasons before we met again, following our promotion to the old Division Three, and when the sides clashed at Edgeley Park in November 1968 we were going through a spell of being invincible at home but returning pointless from our travels.

Hatters and County Clashes Over The Years

A crowd of 13,246 gathered at Edgeley Park, not to watch the Town but to welcome new signing from Everton, Alex Young, the 'Golden Vision'. The Town were forced on the defensive throughout, but any hopes of stealing a point were dashed when Fred Goodwin let fly from 25 yards just after half-time with Bill Atkins heading a second towards the end.

The return was played just before the end of the season when we were desperately clinging to hopes of promotion. Stockport's early season promise had by then evaporated.

We scored twice in a minute early on through Brian Lewis and Riach and were cruising to victory when Stockport were awarded a controversial penalty on the hour.

John Moore caught the ball in the area after hearing a whistle, which turned out to come from someone in the crowd! Young scored from the resultant spot-kick.

Fired by this injustice the Town players rolled up their sleeves and two more goals from Lewis confirmed an emphatic victory.

The final pair of games for many years took place in 1969/70 in a season that saw the Town promoted and County move back to Division Four. Neither game set the pulses racing with Chris Nicholl and Malcolm Macdonald netting during a lacklustre home win while a Matt Tees effort was enough to

earn a point in the return. It was to be 26 years before the sides met again, this time in Division Two in 1996/97 when Stockport and the Town were scrapping away at the top of the table throughout most of the campaign.


After a terrible start, when the first three games were lost, we had gone on a run of only one reversal from the next eight matches before meeting County at Edgeley Park. We went ahead in the first half courtesy of Steve Davis but the home side fought back and scored a deserved equaliser through Brett Angell to leave honours even.

The return match was a carnival occasion at Kenilworth Road with Stockport already promoted and the Town booked for an ultimately unsuccessful play-off spot.

This time Stockport took the lead from the spot but Andrew Fotiadis scored with a clever lob to level when it seemed that goalkeeper Paul Jones was about to be proved unbeatable.

We did not have to wait long before meeting again and clashed again last season when goals from goals from Matthew Spring, with two, and Fotiadis finally ended our Edgeley Park jinx as we registered a 3-2 win and we then followed it up with another victory there in August.




Hatter Abroad On Active Service

Roller Coaster Day Out Is An FA Cup Cracker

Bradford City 1 Luton Town 2

WE WENT through almost every emotion possible before celebrating a tremendous FA Cup success: sheer delight at a sparkling first-half performance, then hope that it was about all over when Adrian Forbes netted his second goal two minutes into the second half, nail-biting tension as Bradford finally got it together and scored; more elation when we were awarded a stoppage-time penalty; dumbstruck as it was saved to deny Forbes his hat-trick; then elation when six long minutes of added time ticked away at last.

Our first trip to Bradford in 13 years was a cracking day out, and even home manager Bryan Robson admitted that the Town were worthy winners. He could hardly believe how comprehensively his team was outplayed in the first half. Bradford were never allowed a sight of the Town goal, while their midfield and defence was on the back foot solidly as the Town's football flowed smoothly.

Steve Howard played a delightful pass for Forbes to net his 12th goal of the season in the 20th minute, and Bradford were lucky to be only one down at the break, with Alan Combe twice extended by Steve Robinson and once by Matt Spring.

Robson gave his men a rocket at half-time. Their performance, he said, was not acceptable for a First Division side at home to Second Division opponents. Perhaps he fired them up too much. A couple of minutes after the restart Paul Evans brought down Howard 30 yards from goal, and Robinson delivered a peach of a free kick. Howard got the knock-down and Forbes pounced to make it 2-0.

Bradford battled hard after that, and the Town survived a lot of heavy pressure. On 84 minutes Sol Davis tangled with Dean Windass, and Andy Gray cracked home the penalty. We sat on the edge of our seats after that, with the tension increased when four minutes into stoppage time Howard was brought down by Jason Gavin. Forbes stepped up confidently to claim his second FA Cup hat-trick of the season. One of his treble against Thurrock was from the spot, but this time Combe denied him, and we were left to sweat and fret until the long-delayed final whistle brought an eruption of joy from the big Town following.

"We have won it on merit," said Mike Newell. "Our first half performance was particularly good. We deserved to be in front at half-time and could have been further in front. The second goal came at a great time, so early in the second half. It was the FA Cup and you don't expect things to be as easy as they were, and then we found out it was never going to be easy. It was a very long last half-hour. You would expect Bradford to have a go, at home although not playing with any confidence in the first half.

"That was to our advantage. They're struggling a bit in the First Division, and we knew if we could get on top of them it would go for us, and that's the way it worked out.

"But they put us under a lot of pressure in the second half, when we didn't keep the ball the way we could have. But we're really pleased to be in the hat for the next round of the FA Cup, and at the end of the day it's all about winning to go through, not worrying about the performance."

He in turn crossed accurately for Peter Holmes to become the Town's 20th scorer of the season - 21 if you count Stephen Purches of Bournemouth, provider of our only own goal of the campaign so far.



Penalty Save Secures Well-deserved Draw

Rushden & Diamonds 2 Luton Town 2

IT WAS uncanny how the game at Nene Park was almost a carbon copy of what we had seen at Bradford – a storming first-half show which should have ensured victory, followed by a falling-off. The point was well-deserved, but only secured when Marlon Beresford pulled off a late penalty save, and was let off the hook in stoppage time when Onandi Lowe wasted a chance that looked harder to miss than accept.

It left Mike Newell wondering why the Town cannot do for 90 minutes what they did so splendidly for 45 or more.

"We're not happy with the draw after our first-half performance," he said. "It was a big disappointment that we could not match it in the second, because we felt that the game was there for the taking. Give Rushden credit because they played a lot better in the second half, but I think that is because we allowed them to.

"If we had matched the performance in the second half we would have won, but that didn't happen. Rushden put us under pressure and it could have been a lot worse if the penalty hadn't been saved." It made for tremendous entertainment for Nene Park's biggest attendance of the season, with a massive Town following adding to the atmosphere.

Rushden were played off the park in the first half. Adrian Forbes knocked in his 14th goal of the season after six minutes, meeting a driven cross to the far post by Steve Robinson. Four minutes later Steve Howard put a free header from Ian Hillier's cross straight to the keeper.

Hillier was deputising for suspended Sol Davis, and was up against Rushden's best player, right winger Paul Hall, who delivered a cross which was headed in by Paul Kitson on 16 minutes, an equaliser completely against the run of play.

Peter Holmes, replacing injured Matt Spring, was a very able replacement, and having driven a cross-shot wide when he might have scored made amends

in the 40th minute to complete a cracking Town move. It started with Howard knocking the ball forward to Forbes, who beat his would-be marker by bending low in the face of a flying boot to head the ball out to Ahmet Brkovic on the left wing. The centre was perfection, and so was the deft header which gave Holmes his first goal of the season.

But in the second half the Town lost their fizz, and Rushden raised their game after a bit of a roasting from manager Brian Talbot.

Hillier limped off with a knee injury ten minutes after the break, and 20-year-old Michael Leary was given the job of marking Hall. The Jamaican international enjoyed an inspired half-game, and Rushden continually fed him to deliver a stream of crosses. Like the Town earlier, Rushden failed to take advantage as well as they should have before skipper and centre-half Barry Hunter went upfield in the 65th minute to head the equaliser from a corner.

Rushden then wasted the best chance of the day on 83 minutes. Hall drilled in a low cross and a pile of bodies surrounded the ball. Beresford was flattened, and as Robinson tried to intervene he was flat out as well when he was penalised for handball. "I was on the ground and the ball was hit straight at me," he said.

Robinson was booked, which will cost him a suspension, and Beresford received treatment for three minutes. Ritchie Hanlon didn't need that much time to think about how he was going to take the penalty, and to the relief of more than 2,000 fans at the other end he shot it almost straight at Beresford, who had stood tall until the ball was hit. It ball rebounded off the goalkeeper's legs, straight back to Hanlon, and it bounced off him and out of play for a goal kick.

It prevented a defeat which would have been undeserved, and maintained the Town's mastery over Rushden – the competitive record now is five Town wins and one draw. "We're getting better," said Brian Talbot with a smile.



IT WAS Mick Harford's turn to give the post-match press conference after the Town made it four points out of six over Christmas. And the major point he made was similar to that offered by the manager a couple of days earlier at Layer Road: "It happens a lot down here – we get teams on the rack in the first 15 or 20 minutes but don't kill them off."

Notts County were given a real pasting for the first half hour or so, only to revive and threaten to nick a point before the Town finally finished them off in the closing minutes.

Adrian Forbes lobbed the opener in the fourth minute after Kevin Foley's diagonal cross was headed out by a defender to Steve Howard, who cleverly headed it back into space for Forbes to beat the off-side trap.





Youth Soccer The under-17s



OUR mid-season break was longer than expected, with an away game against championship hopefuls QPR called off before Christmas at their request, and then postponed again on Saturday at ours. We could not raise a team strong enough to do justice to the fixture, suffering the knock-on effect of the promotion of young players up through the ranks - the first team took four of Marvin Johnson's under-19s to Rushden, which meant four of my lads had to step up to Marvin's squad.

We are eighth in the league and at this stage of the season are doing better than I expected, and, more importantly, showing that we are learning all the time. In the two months before the break we won four of our five games, scoring 22 goals and conceding only three. At the start of the season I felt we looked all right defensively, but I was concerned about our scoring ability. But we are currently the third-highest scorers in the league.

My other concern was that I knew we would be fielding very young sides as a matter of policy. We want to use schoolboys, because we are looking for lads who can develop into scholars, so we put out teams which are usually mainly composed of 14-year-olds. We have several under-14s who are regularly in the squad. If you are good enough, you get

your chance at Luton, whatever your age, although we look at the opposition before throwing in 13-year-olds.

Last season we invariably met

teams much older than ours, but it has been noticeable recently that other clubs are following our lead in using younger players. Football at this level is about bringing players on, with results secondary. We take our time maturing players, and you see the results when boys come up through the ranks to become professionals, with Kevin Foley the latest of many to benefit from what Luton Town can offer young players. Most are with us from the age of nine, and we are one of the few clubs who have a separate squad for each age group from under-9 to under-17. Boys who have been here a long time get a feeling for the club and aim to make the grade with us. We are allowed to recruit from an area within 90-minutes driving time of Luton, so there is plenty of competition from other clubs. So far we have not suffered with the arrival of Wimbledon at Milton Keynes. They are not really established there yet, and we have made sure our back door there is secure. Fortunately we are helped by having a fantastic part-time staff of coaches, managers and helpers, who do it more for love of Luton Town than for the money.

Scene On Two: Double Chase

THE TOWN seek their first double of the season this afternoon, against the "other Hatters" who are just as keen to pick up points to avoid relegation. For both clubs, a win could be hugely rewarding in terms of rising up the table: the Town would be in with a chance of returning to the play-off zone while Stockport could haul themselves out of the relegation places for the first time in a month.

The Town were seventh after the Christmas games, and dropped a notch when the FA Cup trip to Bradford enabled Andy King's Swindon to overtake them. On Wednesday another former Luton favourite did us no favours, Brian Horton guiding Port Vale to a home win over Blackpool which lifted Vale six places into the final play-off spot, and dropped the Town to ninth.

With the league season just past the half-way mark, the top and tail of the table looks well set: Plymouth and QPR are stretching away in the two automatic promotion places, while Wycombe need a miraculous revival to avoid the drop.

Stockport have been flirting with the relegation zone for most of the season, never having risen above 20th place since the Town won 2-1 at Edgeley Park in August. A month after that Carlton Palmer, who had been manager since November 2001, was sacked with Stockport's league record reading one win (at Peterborough), three draws and four defeats.

John Hollins became caretaker, and managed one

win, two draws and two defeats before Sammy McIlroy, formerly manager of Northern Ireland, took over three months ago. Won three, drawn five and lost four is his league record to date.

Their cause is by no means hopeless, and they have a game in hand on their closest rivals. Their match at Tranmere last Saturday was postponed because Rovers were engaged in a determined FA Cup bid to earn a trip to Kenilworth Road next week at the expense of Bolton. Stockport had already been knocked out of the cup, beaten 2-1 at Stevenage in the first round.

While the Town were holding on to eighth place at Rushden, Stockport enjoyed their first win in seven games, in a six-pointer at home to Wycombe. Tony Adams is up against it in his first management job: the Chairboys were bottom of the table when he took over, and they still are, having taken just eight points from the 27 available since his appointment. Stockport won with a penalty by Ricky Lambert, and a goal by Simon Lynch, who charged down an attempted clearance by the goalkeeper.

It was only the second home win of the season for Stockport, the other coming against Bournemouth in November. Their away results have been much better, and they have avoided defeat in eight of their 12 league games on the road. Their away record shows three wins, five draws and four defeats, which is better than the Town's.

The victories were 2-1 at Peterborough in August, and two in October, 2-1 at Swindon and 1-0 at Brighton. Their draws were 2-2 at Sheffield and Rushden in September, 1-1 at Grimsby and 3-3 at Barnsley in November, and 2-2 at Port Vale in their last match of 2003. Defeats were 0-1 at Wycombe, 1-3 at Plymouth, 0-2 Oldham and 0-1 at Bristol City.



MANAGER Mike Newell has to make do and mend as he puts together his squad to face Stockport this afternoon.

The good news is that Sol Davis can return after being banned from the Rushden game. The bad news is that Emmerson Boyce serves a one-match ban this afternoon for collecting five yellow cards, and Steve Howard and Steve Robinson both suffer the same fate next week for the FA Cup-tie against Tranmere.

Ian Hillier deputised for Davis at Nene Park, but had to be subbed after picking up a knee ligament injury. It was not as serious as it might have been, and he was having a fitness check today in the hope that he might be available this afternoon.

Matthew Spring has been hit by a niggling groin strain which forced him to miss the late stages of the game at Bradford. Peter Holmes proved a capable deputy then, and again at Nene Park, where he marked the occasion with his first goal of the season.

The boss said he would not risk aggravating Spring's injury further by bringing him back too soon, but the midfielder has been able to enjoy

a full week's rest and treatment regime, which might enable him to return to the team today. Kevin Nicholls, sidelined since late August by a knee injury and operation, played for an hour in a private friendly against an Arsenal reserve team, but is not fully fit yet, and the same goes for Paul Hughes and Russ Perrett, who hope to resume training shortly.

Keeper Is The Tops – Official

MARLON Beresford, already chosen by Town fans as their player of the month, has been given a similar accolade by the Football League. He won the Division Two Umbro Isotonic player of the month award for December.

"He has been in impressive form all season," said the official notification. "He has helped shore up a defence that had conceded 29 goals in 15 league games before his arrival, and conceded just two goals in December.

"His commanding presence and shot-stopping ability helped save several points during December to keep Luton's promotion challenge on track. He brought valuable experience into the side, and the fact that Luton conceded only seven goals in his first nine league games demonstrates his importance."

Beresford, 34, is still on month-by-month contracts because of the Football League signings embargo, but Mike Newell intends to take the first possible opportunity to settle a permanent deal.


