

PETER RIDSDALE



At the end of a difficult week I must start by welcoming our guests from Luton Town and our new manager Paul Hart.

Luton have been making steady progress in recent weeks and Mike Newell must be delighted by the way his team have climbed into the promotion play-off positions. Not too long ago we were enjoying similar rewards but we have endured an alarming slide since Christmas, a decline that led the board of directors to face up to some tough decisions this week.

In very testing circumstances, with takeover bids in the offing and the club in administration, Gudjon Thordarson was appointed as manager last summer. At short notice he threw together a squad that surpassed the expectations anybody connected with the club could have had.

I've worked very closely with Gudjon and Noel Blake since our takeover bid was completed in October. I have a high regard for both of them. They are honest, hard-working men.

But professional football is a results-driven business. Telling Gudjon on Thursday morning that we were terminating his contract was one of the toughest decisions of my working life. Yet as soon as I had uttered the dreaded words Gudjon reeled off the statistics of just one win from our last thirteen games, eight points collected from a possible 33.

In addition, in recent weeks against five of the Second Division strugglers we had taken just two points. He recognised the route that had led us to the awful moment when we had to make the change. After last Saturday's disastrous 6-1 thrashing at Grimsby, Gudjon privately accepted he needed to provoke a collective response from the team for Tuesday's game against Peterborough United. Unfortunately, it didn't happen.

Once Gudjon's future had been decided we had to attract his successor. We had a short list of one and I'm delighted that man has agreed to join the Oakwell cause. Paul Hart may have lost his job at Nottingham Forest last month but people in football recognise the role he played in saving the club from financial ruin by initially preserving their First Division status, throwing his home grown kids into the side and reaching the promotion play-offs last season.

This season Forest have either sold or released, to prune overheads, half of the team that Paul led to the play-offs so a downturn in fortunes is hardly surprising. I believe we have exploited Paul's availability at a critical moment in our history.

Nobody in English football has a finer record at developing young players. The evidence is there in the shape of Harry Kewell, Jonathan Woodgate, Paul Robinson, Alan Smith, Jermaine Jenas and Michael Dawson. Paul has also enjoyed success as a manager with Forest and Chesterfield, in reaching promotion play-offs, so I am optimistic he will achieve great things at Oakwell.


Paul's teams always play attractive passing football. He will need to time to get his message through to the staff he has inherited but I trust everyone will back Paul in bringing success to Barnsley FC.

Introducing Paul Hart

FEW people in professional football can match Paul Hart's sporting pedigree. After all, how many young lads had legendary managers like Sir Matt Busby and Joe Mercer as family friends and close neighbours or were encouraged to sit in the dressing-room and learn from England stars like Colin Bell, Francis Lee and Mike Summerbee.



Hart's introduction to professional football came through his father John. Hart senior played for Manchester City for thirteen years before joining the backroom staff in the Sixties to work alongside Mercer and Malcolm Allison during City's most successful era.

The new Barnsley manager recalled: "They were always Mr Busby and Mr Mercer to me as a lad growing up. I was a Blue though and used to walk home from matches at Maine Road past the Busby's house.

"I used to take a schoolboy's delight in singing the latest City chant at the top of my voice until one day the great man had a word with my Dad and said: 'John, will you ask your Paul not to jump up and sing outside our house when he's been to night matches.' I was just celebrating another triumph."

John Hart actually became City's manager in 1973 but ill-health forced him to stand down. Famed as a demanding taskmaster, John painted a clear picture to his eldest son. Paul realised his father would not tolerate any suggestions of nepotism. Paul had to get out and make his own way in football in his own right. So off he went to Stockport County.

"I joined as a 17-year-old and two weeks later made my debut at centre-back against Lincoln City," Paul said. "I was battered all over the pitch by a centre-forward called Percy Freeman but we won 4-3. Graham Taylor and the late Ray Harford were also in that Lincoln team.

"I had three tough, challenging years in the Stockport team and I averaged a broken nose each season. You don't think



it got this shape without serious help from opponents' heads and elbows."

Blackpool signed Hart from Stockport for £30,000. At Bloomfield Road he was switched into midfield but it was as a central defender that he joined Leeds as a £330,000 record recruitment. At Elland Road he played alongside one of the players he readily cites as a phenomenal performer. "Paul Madeley was a Rolls-Royce of a footballer. A wonderful player and a great man."

Leeds' relegation in 1982 saw them selling their stars and Hart was snapped up by 'Old Big Ead' at Nottingham Forest. "Brian Clough must rank as one of the two great influences on my managerial and coaching career alongside Howard Wilkinson," Hart explained.

"Cloughie had brilliant management skills, kept the game simple and insisted Forest stuck to basics. I have always followed his lead in wanting my teams to pass the ball. I can recall Cloughie's mantra. He always kept telling us to pass it or head it to one of our team."

Clough went on holiday in the summer of 1985 believing Hart was about to accept his first managerial role with either Tranmere or Cambridge United. Instead, Sheffield Wednesday lured him to join their newly-promoted team. He made his debut for Wilkinson's men against... Forest.

"It was under Howard I learned about thorough preparation and organisation, the way to develop coaching skills and drills."

Hart stayed 18 months at Hillsborough before moving to Birmingham. His St. Andrew's career lasted 38 minutes before he sustained a double compound fracture of his leg - inflicted by a team-mate! He coached at Notts County, then launched his managerial career at Chesterfield and guided them into the Fourth Division play-off final at Wembley in 1990.

Highly successful spells as Academy Director at Leeds, where he twice won the FA Youth Cup, and Nottingham Forest paved the way for him to become Forest's manager in 2001. He guided the club away from the lower reaches of the First Division, gave his home-grown kids their chance and last season reached the Division One play-offs.

Major sales and wage cuts saw the break-up of that team and he left Forest last month. But the Barnsley job persuaded him to jump back into management. "I'm well aware that Barnsley fans want to see entertaining, passing football. It takes time to get everyone on the same wavelength but that's just what I want from our team and I will encourage our players to stick to those principles," he ended.

FEATURED PLAYER

LEADING SCORER Kevin Betsy has played in almost every game this season and has seen first hand the side's climb to the top of the Division and slip in the last two months.

However, the former Fulham star is desperate to turn the team's fortunes, but is the first to admit the games against Grimsby Town and Peterborough United were disappointing.

He said: "It is not a very pleasant time at the moment, especially after the last two matches. The manner in which we lost the game against Grimsby was simply unacceptable from our standards and to lose at home for the second time this season is just as bad. Our home form has been good this season because we have not been losing games.

"We lost against a team caught up in the relegation battle and we are supposed to be battling for the Play Offs so that is a major disappointment.

"The team were criticised heavily after the Grimsby game, and it was warranted, but we believe in ourselves and wanted to put things right. In the first half against Peterborough we showed a good attitude and created chances. The effort was there and it is a thin line between winning and losing matches at the moment - I hit the bar and we had a perfectly good goal ruled out for offside so if those had gone our way then the result would have been different.

"To be fair I think that I got too much on the header. It was a good cross from Michael Boulding but Guy Branston is a bit of a meathead of a defender and I thought that I would get clattered. I managed to rise above him and although it was a good header, it did not go in. You have to forget about it and try to put that right in the next game.

"We are all disappointed but we have to pick ourselves up, dust ourselves down and concentrate on beating Luton Town."

He added: "Peterborough's goal was a shock because we had dominated the game so much. We were positive and were looking to win the game. If you go into a game on the front foot then you always have a chance to get the points but going a goal down straight after the restart was heartbreaking.



"We did not react to conceding a goal in the way that we would have liked to. We had chances at the end of the game to get something. We have created a lot in games and have been unfortunate that more have not gone in but you make your own luck in this game. Sometimes things have not gone our way but we have to keep our heads up, keep going and it will turn.

"It is frustrating for everybody when those chances do not go in. Some of the new lads have not found it easy to score goals but they are quality players and things will get better. It is hard when so many players come in midway through the season but the new lads have been brought in to improve

the squad. I think we have been a bit unfortunate because the players that have come in are of proven quality and some have a good Premier League pedigree.

"It is difficult because we are not in a good run of form and that makes it hard for the new boys."

He said: "I think the fans' reaction on Tuesday was expected. If my team had been battered 6-1 and then lost at home in the next game then you have every right to be disappointed. They are going to vent their anger at the team but they are 100 per cent behind you when things are going right.

"The supporters pay their money and are entitled to their opinion. We have to be

positive at the moment and cannot allow ourselves to be all doom and gloom. That goes for the supporters too because we need them to get behind us and help us out of this slump. We have to be positive and go for it today.


"If we can do that and the fans can get behind us then there can only be a positive result. We have to do things right.

"The current run is disappointing for me personally because I desperately want to play back in the First Division with Barnsley Football Club. We were doing so well early on without even hitting our top form so to slip away is disappointing. We cannot throw away all the hard work we put in through pre-season and up until Christmas - we have to make sure that it does not happen and we need three points against Luton."






CAPTAIN'S VIEW Peter Handyside

REDS skipper Peter Handyside is never one to shirk a challenge and knows that the side are facing a colossal stage of the season starting with today's match against Luton Town.

Peter said: "There is no getting away from it - we must win today's game. It is a real six pointer. There are games that you must not lose but we simply have to get a victory.

"We are coming into a crucial phase of the season where we must play virtually all the teams around us so we have to win our games here at Oakwell if we are to achieve anything. That is the bottom line and nothing else will be acceptable.

"We simply must start to win matches. We have to get a victory from anywhere this afternoon and we can go into today's game with no other approach. It will be tough but we have to halt the slide.

"I felt that Tuesday's game against Peterborough United was similar to the Wycombe match in that we created a lot of chances but could not find the back of the net. We did not put the ball away when we had the opportunity and then got hit by a goal that came about from our own mistakes. It was a sucker punch from Peterborough and I believe that we did enough to win the game.

"I think that we would really have a problem if we were going out and not creating chances but

sooner or later they have to start going into the net. The players want to do well and we want to get Barnsley Football Club into the Play Offs and win promotion at the end of the season. We are under pressure today but to be fair we feel more frustrated than pressurised because we have not been winning games.

"We deserved to beat Peterborough here on Tuesday and did enough to get three points against Wycombe last month. We did not and I think the fact that we are desperate to turn things around means that sometimes we have been caught at the back. It can be a problem with concentration when you are so much on top and that is something we have to correct and work hard on in training. We have to work hard and keep believing in what we are doing because we will turn things around.

"We are on a bad run at the moment - there's no getting away from that - and the supporters' frustration is understandable because they want to see us do well. We have to win today's game against Luton Town to repay them - winning matches is the only thing that will put that right. We need everybody behind us right from the off and together we can go on to better things."

European Under-17s Championship heading for Sheffield and Doncaster

ENGLAND'S Under-17 team are heading for South Yorkshire next month when they entertain Armenia, Iceland and Norway in the UEFA European Under-17 Championship 2nd Qualifying Round Group.

Doncaster Rovers, Sheffield United and Sheffield Wednesday have been confirmed as the venues for England's three matches, with Wednesday's Hillsborough hosting the opening match.

England will line up against Armenia at Sheffield Wednesday on the 24th March, kick-off 7pm, before facing Iceland at Doncaster Rover's Belle Vue stadium two days later on Friday 26th March, also kicking off at 7pm. England's final match will be held at Sheffield United's Bramall Lane on Sunday 28th March when they take on Norway (kick-off 3pm).

The forthcoming matches are vital to England's Under-17 team who will need to finish top of the qualifying group to book their place in the UEFA European Championship Final competition, which takes place in May.

GORDON ARMSTRONG

BARNESLEY Football Club are saddened to learn of the death of lifelong supporter Gordon Armstrong.

Charlie Chaplain and the book of Amos

Peter Amos arrived at Oakwell on a three-week trial yet qualifies for a testimonial at the end of next season. Ten years in which he has preached the word of God and acted as a friend and confidante to many members of staff.

Peter may have followed "Charlie Chaplain" into Oakwell yet there are many supporters who don't know about the vital work he does for the club. In the whirlwind world of Barnsley FC Peter reckons there are only about six people who've been here longer than him.

To be precise Peter succeeded Charlie McKenzie, affectionately known as

Charlie Chaplain, eight and a half years ago. He only accepted the Oakwell role at the third time of asking but he is grateful that he was finally persuaded to work in the superficially cut-throat world of professional football.

Amos explained: "I found the initial three week period very hard. I was met by some scepticism and kept at arm's length by some people, but there was enough positive pastoral contact in that time to turn the tide a little.

"Of course it took much longer to become an accepted part of the family. That's the way it is now and has been for a number of years. I feel I'm part of the fabric now."

Peter is unpaid in his chaplain's duties at the club. He was a minister at Ward Green Baptist Church when he accepted the role but moved to Bentley Baptist Church in Doncaster three years ago. He visits the ground at least once a week as well as match days and makes time to speak to every member of staff.

"I'm basically a pastoral safety net," he said. "People are people - whether they're footballers or not. Most of them

have the same issues to deal with - security, love and acceptance rather than rejection.

"Most people have family and friends they will turn to. Often, though, they need somebody else to help them, somebody who is not paid by the club so I don't have to toe a party line.

"Yes, I want to promote Christianity. I believe that to get the best out of life Christianity is the best path to follow through life. I believe Christianity helps us develop mental strength and stability in family life as well as working life. But I only promote Christianity when people take the initiative to ask me about it. I don't force feed any message."

Peter was a sports teacher before going full-time into the Christian ministry in 1979. He was ordained in 1985. A keen amateur footballer he made appearances in the Yorkshire League and East Midlands League and believes his love and knowledge of the game helps him relate to life among the professionals at Oakwell.

"There's a lot of banter in the dressing-room which I'm happy to be part of and I think the lads realise I'm steeped in football," he said. "When I talk to the players on a one-to-one basis they open up and we discuss the real issues."

There's certainly no suggestion of our chaplain living in an ivory tower at

Oakwell. "I've trained with them and been in the gym with them," he went on. "I ran the London Marathon a couple of years ago and also took part in a sponsored parachute jump a few years ago. The players respond to you doing things like that."

Peter is always in mufti when he visits the club. In fact there has only been one sighting of him wearing a clerical collar...and that was on the pitch. He ended: "I agreed to take part in a half-time penalty shoot-out against Toby Tyke and as part of the fun donned my dog collar and a black outfit."





The opposition

They started the season in the sort of turmoil that suggested a battle against relegation lay ahead, yet Luton Town, and their manager Mike Newell, have risen above the madness to push their claims at the right end of the Second Division table.

Plunged into administration by a crazy chairman whose motives in taking over the club remain a mystery to this day, Newell's appointment may prove to be the only sensible change made by the departed John Gurney. The man who wanted to build a new stadium for Luton Town that incorporated a Formula 1 track - no that is not a print error - was clearly a little eccentric and his decision to sack Joe Kinnear and Mick Harford as the club's coaching staff was equally bizarre.

The fans were outraged, while the players and staff at the club were not too happy with the decision to sack the two popular coaches, so Newell faced a dilemma when he took over in their place.

He needed to get off to a flying start and the 3-1 home win against Rushden and Diamonds on the opening day of the season was just what the doctor ordered and despite the odd hic-up along the way, Luton Town have been among the promotion chasers in the months since.

Scoring plenty of goals along the way, Newell's side have played with a swagger that has led many fans to suggest that the new manager has put an extra gloss on the side Kinnear built and he is no longer in a position where he has anything to prove. The challenge now is to push on and make sure the good work put in so far does not go to waste.



Luton's home form has provided the foundation for their promotion challenge and they have an impressive record at their cramped Kenilworth Road ground. They are a tough side to beat on their own patch, but their away form is less convincing.

The 2-1 win at Peterborough last weekend was only their third on the road all term and that is one area Newell will be looking to improve upon in the next few weeks. Yet now that they are into the final few weeks of the season and the prize of a play-off place is within reach, excitement is beginning to build around Luton once again.

This club was a regular top flight team not so long ago and won the 1988 League Cup after a famous victory over Arsenal in the Wembley Final and with a new stadium said to be on the horizon, the hope is the glory days may return in the near future. Getting out of administration was always going to be the first aim and then they could move on with optimism.

If they reach the start of next season as a First Division side with new and ambitious owners, things really will be looking up for Luton Town.





MIKE NEWELL INTERVIEW

It was a case of out of the frying pan and into the fire when Mike Newell swapped Hartlepool United for Luton Town last summer, but the heat is starting to die down at last.

Despite leading Hartlepool to promotion, Newell was hounded out of the club after the fans moved to oust the manager that struggled to follow in the footsteps of Chris Turner, yet he didn't have to wait long to make his return to the game. And he walked into a full blown crisis when he accepted the offer to succeed Joe Kinnear at Luton Town.

Hatters chairman John Gurney claimed Newell had won a phone vote of fans and directors to take over as manager, but that was flatly untrue as Kinnear was the man all associated with the club wanted to continue. Newell had not created the problem, yet the former Blackburn championship winning striker was handed the task of sorting it out as Gurney quickly lost his grip on power at Kenilworth Road.

With Newell not knowing when his stay at Luton would come to an end, he started the season with a point to prove and he has done a fine job in winning all concerned over. "It was very difficult in my first few weeks at the club," he confirms. "I had an agreement with Luton Town, but once the club fell into administration none of us knew what would happen.

"The fans have always been understanding of my position, but they were not happy and I appreciate that they didn't really want me as manager. But we have come through it and hopefully football can be the most important part of the club's future."

Newell's finest achievement in his early weeks at the club - in which he couldn't sign any players due to administration - was persuading Hatters legend Mick Harford to return to the club as Director of Football. It was a move that won great approval of the fans and the team's impressive performances has also helped to win over any doubters.

Promotion challenges were not thought about in that turbulent summer of 2003, but as we enter March there is a real chance that the Hatters could be playing First Division football next season. "We just need to keep winning our home games and pick up whatever we can on the road," continues Newell.

"Our form at Kenilworth Road has been excellent all season, but we know we could have done better away from home. That is why it was so pleasing to pick up three points at Peterborough in our last away game and hopefully we can take confidence from that win when we go to Barnsley."

Nationwide Manager of the Month for February, Newell's against-the-odds success at Kenilworth Road has singled him out as one of the finest young coaches in the game and he is determined to push on from here. "We have been playing some good football in recent weeks and if we can keep going, a top six finish is there for the taking," he adds.



Pat Howard and Luton Town

At the start of the 1967-68 season, Barnsley manager JOHNNY STEELE made what to many was a surprising decision when he selected 19-year-old PAT HOWARD to partner skipper ERIC WINSTANLEY at the heart of the Reds defence. Rookie HOWARD's first team experience was just two games (one in each of the previous two seasons). However, it was a partnership that jelled straight way.

Promotion was won that season with HOWARD an ever present and the two defenders formed a partnership that was the backbone that the team's success was built on.

The following season the transition to the Third Division was made successfully and a top half finish was achieved. At the beginning of the 1969-70 season hopes were high that another promotion campaign could be achieved.

The season started well and when the Reds visited Kenilworth Road on 8 November they had only suffered two defeats in their opening 16 games. Luton were also in the promotion race and, with a free-scoring attack, had lost only once. They were a point in front of the Reds.

Barnsley's preparation was disrupted by an injury to WINSTANLEY and STEELE this time selected veteran forward JIMMY ROBSON to partner HOWARD.

From the kick off Town went for the jugular and the Barnsley defence was stretched to breaking point. After only eight minutes it was breached when the ball was slid home from close range by Town's star young forward MALCOLM MACDONALD. From then on it seemed to be a matter of how many as the siege continued without any sign of ending. However, HOWARD marshalled his troops and somehow they managed to reach half time without further breaches.

8th March 1998. Remember it? Well six years ago this weekend Barnsley's great adventure in the FA Cup came to an end at St. James' Park.

A 3-1 defeat to Newcastle denied the Reds the chance to face South Yorkshire rivals Sheffield United in the semi-finals.

But the memories of that cup run, I'm sure, will far outweigh the disappointment of the defeat on Tyneside.

It all started at Oakwell, a tricky third round tie against Premiership rivals Bolton Wanderers.

The team that day was Watson, Eaden, Sheridan, Moses, De Zeeuw, Redfearn, Marcelle, Tinkler, Hristov, Barnard, Ward.

The game was hardly a classic but Darren Barnard's 26th minute strike was enough to set up a fourth round tie at Tottenham, who were then managed by Christian Gross.

The Reds had lost 3-0 on their previous visit to North London just weeks before, and when Sol Campbell bundled the ball in it appeared a repeat could be on the cards.

But just before the hour Neil Redfearn tucked away a penalty to earn a replay. What a game it turned out to be – not even the silky skills of flamboyant Frenchman David Ginola could save Tottenham on this particular night. Although he did rattle in a free-kick to bring the game back to 2-1 after Barnsley

had gone ahead early in the second half with goals from Ashley Ward and Neil Redfearn. However, it was the quality of the fourth goal scored that night that made this such a memorable game for me. Darren Barnard received the ball out wide from Redfearn, he controlled it with his left boot before smashing into the top corner of the net from the edge of the area. Fantastic! This was already turning out to be quite a story and people were now starting to take notice of the so called 'whipping boys' of the Premiership.

But more heads were turned in Round Five. Manchester United boasting the likes of Schmeichel, Giggs and Sheringham (Beckham was to be introduced later as a sub) were held to a draw at Old Trafford. John Hendrie's goal from Schmeichel's blunder was cancelled out by Sheringham.

The replay at Oakwell was simply amazing as we witnessed one of the FA Cup's greatest games. One minute John Hendrie's lifting the ball past Schmeichel, the next I'm getting elbowed in the face in the press box as Scott Jones thumped in his second and Barnsley's third. What a night!

Hope my memories help you give you a lift today as the Reds look for three vital points against Luton.

BARNESLEY'S reserves were held to a 1-1 draw by Walsall on a freezing afternoon at the Oakwell Academy Complex.


Both sides fielded virtually an Under-19 side with Griff Jones and Danny Alcock the only non-scholars in The Reds' starting eleven.

Commentator's eye

Press boxes are strange places and it's not just because of the people that frequent them.

This thought struck me at half-time last Saturday as it suddenly dawned on me I was trapped. The enforced claustrophobia wasn't just metaphorical, having had to sit through the nightmare first half, but was literal too.

I couldn't get out to get a cup of tea or nip to the Gents because the press box was a little compact, shall we say, and was completely full - someone sneezed and knocked two people out of their seats at one point! It's not helped by us radio lads making the floor look like the London Underground map with our wires trailing everywhere. So, cold, thirsty, and with legs crossed, we watched the second half.

It gave me something to think about though as the afternoon wore on – strange press box experiences.

Seeing as we're off to Oldham in a couple of weeks, what about the time when it was so cold at Boundary Park while covering a rugby league game that the four of us in the press box almost got frostbite and the ink in both of my pens froze so I couldn't write anything down.

Sometimes it's the view that causes the problems. As you'll imagine, the essence of football commentary is being able to describe the action for

those who aren't at the match. Let me take you to St. James' Park a few years ago then. The press box was right in the middle of the fans so there's a few funny looks when you start going mad because Barnsley have scored. The main problem though was mid-way through the second half... a cross from the right, Shearer rises for the header... and disappears behind the hundred or so Newcastle fans in front of me who immediately leap up as well. Apparently Shearer scored. My commentary said he scored. But I didn't know for certain how until I saw Match of the Day.

Finally, there was the time at Bury where I ended up having to do reports on a mobile phone because the ISDN line was on the blink. I spoke to the presenter off-air at half-time and was all ready to go when the PA system at the ground started up. With less than a minute to go before going on air I couldn't hear a thing from the studio so panic set in. I jumped out of the press box, ran round the back of the stand and on to the stairs – but the PA was still too loud.

Then a flash of inspiration - I did the whole report from a cleaning cupboard under the stairs.

SINCE I began my 'Have Ballpoint, Will Travel' job as scorer to the world's television and radio stations more than 15 years ago I have been amazed by the way in which cricket spectators have become more like football crowds.

At one time you could go to Taunton or Tunbridge Wells for a county cricket match and hear nothing louder than polite clapping at the end of a maiden over or a round of applause for a century.

Those sober days are long gone and abroad it is difficult to tell the difference between Calcutta and The Kop.



My most vivid memory is of Eden Gardens, Calcutta, during a semi-final of the 1996 World Cup between India and Sri Lanka. A humid day with temperatures touching 100 degrees, a local derby and the belief that India would win the trophy; no wonder it all boiled over when India collapsed.

Spectators in the sub-continent do not hesitate to spell out their anger in vivid capital letters. They

shouted, they screamed, burnt any scrap of paper that was to hand and created so much mayhem that the match had to be abandoned.

One of our posh commentators - public school, university, cut glass accent, never read a tabloid newspaper in his life for fear of contamination, had his Daily Telegraph confiscated by the police because they thought he might set fire to it. Even our plastic water bottles were taken away in case we rioted.

It's been a difficult life compared with my days at C&A as an internal auditor, testing out the security procedures at their stores across Britain. When I met cricket writer Ted Corbett - remember his article on Skinner Normanton a few weeks back - we decided that travelling the world together was our best option.

On our first trip to Pakistan in 1987 the BBC's logistics went pear shaped. "Go and help them with the score," said Ted when he saw a commentator trying to disguise the fact that he could not see most of the playing area. By the end of the day I had a contract for the rest of the series.

Since that happy moment I've been to every Test playing country at least once. That's 180 Tests, about 300 one day internationals and 30,000 chat-ups beginning "Good heavens, you must be Jo King!"

As I have often said, scoring is not easy. All you need is a ball point and a sense of humour.

Oh... and talking about humour... a number of my media mates have told me of the humorous comments that used to flow from the fans standing on the terrace in front of the press box at Oakwell in days gone by. I'll bet it's not as funny now that they all have to sit down!


