A VIEW FROM THE MANAGER'S PERSPECTIVE

FROM THE DUGOUT

I would like to welcome Mike Newell and Mick Harford, and everyone connected with Luton Town to York Street. Luton have had a fantastic start to the season, with a 100 percent record from their first four games. Tonight's match will undoubtedly present us with a difficult task, but I demand from my players that Luton Town leave here tonight, knowing that they have been in a cup-tie.

I would like to commend the passion and effort displayed on Saturday by each and every player who took to the field against Macclesfield. We would quite easily have got the three points, however, it was good to claim a point after falling 1-0 down so late in the game. I was delighted with the reaction of the players and it was good to see Jason Lee get his first goal for the club. Their keeper made the difference between us winning and drawing the game, while we were also guilty of some bad finishing at times.

Tonight's match is the start of a busy mini-sequence of games for us, with two Coca-Cola League encounters due to unfold over the weekend. We travel to Cheltenham Town on Saturday, before hosting Chester City here at York Street on Bank Holiday Monday. The cup match today is important in terms of revenue reasons, and it would be fantastic for the club as a whole if we could make progress to round two.

Unfortunately we will be missing the services of David Noble this evening, who will be out for about three weeks. We were forced to substitute Nobes on Saturday, and I believe that he was having his best game for the club since the end of last season.

Given our performances in the opening matches, I believe our points return should have greater, although I'm fairly happy with the way things are currently going. We could have claimed all three points against Grimsby and Macclesfield, although we were really poor at Yeovil, and deserved nothing from the match.

We are currently working hard to strengthen our squad ahead of the Bank Holiday weekend. The games against Cheltenham and Chester will push our squad, and I would like to add a couple of new faces ahead of those games. However, if we are unsuccessful, we will go with what we have got, because I have every faith in our current playing squad. It has been a very busy week, with us covering various matches in our quest for new players. Paul Raynor and Paul Gascoigne took in the reserve match between Wolves and Manchester United yesterday, while our unpaid chief scout Gee Evans watched Sunderland versus Chester last night.

I have also been busy personally, watching Leicester City reserves against Norwich City reserves, where Zema Abbey was in action. I followed this up by watching Colchester take on Cheltenham last night. The above commitment to finding players demonstrates how keen we are to improve the squad, and our quest will continue over the coming weeks. In my opinion, we are not far away from assembling a squad who can realistically challenge for a play-off spot, but I will not make signings that do not add that much-needed quality to what we already have in the dressing room.

May I conclude by asking you, our supporters, to get behind the team this evening and hopefully we may be able to cause an upset.



The Manager: Mike Newell

Mike Newell was appointed as the Hatters boss in the summer of 2003, returning to the club he had previously served as a player in the mid-eighties. Newell has been in football for more than 20 years, beginning as a striker at Crewe before joining Wigan. After three years at Springfield Park he moved to Luton for £80,000 in January 1986. He was recruited as a replacement for Mick Harford, who was on the injured list. Luton were then in the old First Division, now the Premiership, and Newell flourished at top level, with 19 goals in 68 matches for the Hatters. He racked up a succession of big money transfers after that: £350,000 to Leicester, £1.1 million to Everton, £1.1 million to Blackburn, where he won a Premiership winner's medal, and £900,000 to Birmingham. West Ham, Bradford, Aberdeen, Crewe again, and Blackpool were also grateful for his goal-scoring abilities before he moved into coaching at Tranmere.

In total Newell played over 500 league games for 14 clubs in a 19-year professional career that saw him compete at every level, he also gained international recognition at England's Under-21 and B team level. In November 2002 he was given his first job as a manager, at Hartlepool. He guided them to promotion a few months later, but surprisingly his contract was not renewed. But Luton fans hadn't forgotten him, and gave him a huge welcome back when he took charge for the first time. It was a nice occasion: on the final day of the previous season,

GOALKEEPERS

ROBERT BECKWITH


Robert made the most of the first-team opportunities that came his way and was rewarded with a two-year professional contract at the end of the 2003-2004 season. Quietly learning his trade in the Luton youth team, he found himself thrust into the first-team picture because of the circumstances the club found itself in but was unfazed by starting last season as the first choice goalkeeper at the age of 18.

MARLON BERESFORD

Mike Newell strengthened his squad with the signing of goalkeeper at the beginning of July 2004 from League One rivals Barnsley. The 34-year-old is a vastly experienced goalkeeper with over 400 appearances under his belt and he returned to Kenilworth Road on a two-year contract after impressing during a successful three-month spell with the Hatters last year.

DEAN BRILL

Luton-born goalkeeper Dean Brill is another young player of whom big things are expected. Having enjoyed a taste of first-team football last season he will,

along with Robert Beckwith, provide healthy competition for the goalkeeper's jersey and keep Marlon Beresford on his toes. A former pupil of Lea Manor High School, Brill joined his hometown club at the age of nine and has progressed through the Centre of Excellence.

DINO SEREMET

The Slovenian goalkeeper impressed on trial in July 2004 to earn a two-year contract and signed on a Bosman transfer from Maribor Pivovarna Laako. With youngsters Robert Beckwith and Dean Brill recovering from injury he will provide healthy competition for Marlon Beresford for the goalkeeper's jersey.

DEFENDERS

DAVID BAYLISS

Has been looking forward to the start of this season more than most of the squad, he missed a large chunk of the 2002-2003 season with a shoulder injury but forced his way back into the side at the start of last season, only for a ruptured Achilles tendon sustained at Charlton in the Carling Cup back in September to rule him out for the rest of the campaign.

CHRIS COYNE

 The centre-half was playing for Perth Soccer Club when he was selected for the Australian Under-17 squad for the 1994 youth World Cup, and came to the notice of Harry Redknapp, then manager of West Ham. Coyne signed for the Hammers as a teenager, but Premiership chances were few and far between, and after loan spells at Brentford and Southend, Coyne went to Dundee.

CURTIS DAVIES

Central defender Curtis was rewarded with a two-year professional contract at the end of last season after impressing during a spell in the side at the tail-end of the campaign. Having been a solid and consistent performer in the club's under-

19s over the past three years, he made the step-up to first-team level and turned in some encouraging displays when called upon.

IAN HILLIER

No-one was more surprised than the Welsh Under-21 international himself when he made his league debut for Luton in the second game of the 2001-2002 season. The day before he was training with Spurs, where he was captain of the reserves, but a crop of injuries at Kenilworth Road led to Luton taking the young right back on loan and Hillier settled in so quickly that Luton soon decided to buy him for a bargain £30,000 fee and he became a regular squad member.

MAX HOWELL

A solid and reliable defender from Middlesex, Max was handed a first team squad number midway through the 2003-2004 season for the trip to Rushden and Diamonds in the LDV Vans Trophy although he didn't make the squad on that occasion. The youngster's impressive form in the under-19s led to him being offered the third year of his football scholarship at the club.

ALAN NEILSON

Experience and versatility has made Neilson a valuable member of Luton's squad, and he has filled any role asked of him with dependable consistency, anywhere in the back four or in midfield. The former Welsh international was signed from Grimsby in 2002 as part of a cost-cutting exercise. His international career began with appearances for Wales at youth and Under-21 level, followed by five full caps, and he enjoyed a good career in the Premiership, with his first club Newcastle and then with Southampton and Fulham.

RUSS PERRETT

Having signed a one-year contract in the summer he will be looking to make up for lost time this season after a frustrating spell on the sidelines last year. The ex-Portsmouth man was restricted to just six games during the 2003-2004 season but when fully fit the experienced

campaigner is an important member of the squad. He helped Cardiff City win promotion to the Second Division in May 2001.

PAUL UNDERWOOD

Luton Town fought off competition from a number of clubs to complete the free transfer signing of Paul Underwood from Second Division rivals Rushden & Diamonds on transfer deadline day. The Wimbledon-born defender joined Rushden for £50,000 in the summer of 1997 from Enfield and went on to make over 200 appearances for the Northamptonshire club.

MIDFIELDERS

AHMET BRKOVIC

The Croatian midfielder is tidy and hardworking member of the squad, who agreed a new one-year contract in the summer to extend his stay at Kenilworth Road into a fourth season. Believing a move would be good for his career, he refused new terms at Leyton Orient in the summer of 2001, to join Luton on a Bosman free transfer. Orient had signed him on a free from HNK Dubrovnik in the autumn of 1999.

SOL DAVIS

It was a huge disappointment to Swindon Town, and a coup for Luton, when the highly-rated defender decided to leave the County Ground after his contract expired at the end of the 2001-2002 season. Swindon boss Andy King failed in attempts to persuade him to sign a new deal, and Luton swooped for the tough-tackling left back.

KEVIN FOLEY

The emergence of Kevin Foley was one of the success stories of last season for Luton. During the course of the campaign he went from the Hatters youth team to the Republic of Ireland Under-21s. Each time he has comfortably adjusted himself to the level of football and great things are expected of this cultured footballer.

PETER HOLMES

A two-footed midfielder, he came to Luton as one of new boss Ricky Hill's first

signings after impressing Hill while he was coaching at Sheffield Wednesday. Holmes has a good pedigree, he is a product of the FA's School Of Excellence, from the same year as Michael Owen.

PAUL HUGHES

A promising career that began at Chelsea was cruelly interrupted after the gifted midfielder earned the admiration of, among others, Glenn Hoddle, the former England boss. Hughes worked his way up at Stamford Bridge from trainee to Premiership, learning his trade under Hoddle's management, and gained experience on loan to Stockport, Norwich and Crewe. When Hoddle became manager of Southampton he soon recruited Hughes, but a serious groin injury put the midfielder out of football for nine months.

KEITH KEANE

Having made his debut as a 16-year-old last season he went on to enjoy an extended run in the side from February onwards while Kevin Foley was out injured. Such was the contribution he made that the return of Foley didn't signal the end of his involvement at first-team level and he finished the season with 14 appearances under his belt, all this while still in the first year of his scholarship.

MICHAEL LEARY

The London-born central midfielder signed an extension to his contract in the summer, which will tie him to the Hatters until 2006. He has had to wait patiently for his first-team chance but has taken the opportunity with both hands whenever it has presented itself. The scorer of two goals at Hartlepool back in March, in one of only eight first-team starts last year.

LEE MANSELL

The Gloucester-born midfielder arrived on the scene in January 2001 to make a dramatic surprise debut. An injury crisis saw the youth teamer thrown into the team for the FA Cup third round replay against Wrexham in October 2001, when he was called into the side because of an injury crisis.

he scored the opening goal. Luton had looked after him since he was an eleven-year-old, and signed him as soon as he left school.

KEVIN NICHOLLS

 The tough-tackling midfielder began his career as a trainee at Charlton and quickly made an impact after skipping England youth teams at under-18, under-19 and under-20 levels. Surprisingly, Wigan decided to put him on the transfer list in the summer of 2001, for a bargain fee of £150,000, and Luton snapped him up. Charlton had sold him for £250,000 to Wigan in the summer of 1999.

STEPHEN O'LEARY

A player with a bright future ahead of him, he became the third of the three graduating scholars who signed a two-year professional contract in the summer. The skillful midfielder made the most of his chance in the first-team spotlight in the final few matches of last season to show what he could do.

STEVE ROBINSON

Was the first of the out of contract players to agree a new deal with Luton in the summer after enjoying a campaign where he firmly established himself in the Hatters side. Luton snapped up a man who had earned respect wherever he played. They paid £50,000 to Preston North End in the summer of 2002 for a player who had been capped five times by Northern Ireland.

STRIKERS

MATTHEW BLINKHORN

The 19-year-old striker joined the Hatters on a three-month loan deal at the end of July 2004. Blinkhorn has started seven matches for the Tangerines since he made his debut as a substitute against Wrexham in October 2001, when he was called into the side because of an injury crisis.

STEVE HOWARD

 Rarely can £50,000 have been better spent in football than the fee Luton paid Northampton Town on deadline day in March 2001 to prise the bustling striker away from the Cobblers. He has been the Hatters leading marksman in for the last three seasons and is a huge favourite at Kenilworth Road. He was the fans player of the year in 2002, and the players' player of the year 12 months later.

ENOCH SHOWUMNI

 The big striker will be looking to build on his growing reputation this season and continue the good start he made to his professional career, which resulted in a close season call-up to the Nigerian national squad for the Unity Cup, which was staged in England. Enoch soon established himself as popular figure on the terraces and was rewarded with a two-and-a-half-year contract in February 2004. The London-born forward joined the club fresh from non-league football with Willesden Constantine.

ROWAN VINE

The Basingstoke-born striker joined the Hatters on a three-month loan deal from Premiership Portsmouth on the eve of the new season. The 21-year-old front man has enjoyed successful loan spells at this level before when he appeared for Brentford and Colchester United. In his time with the Bees he scored 13 goals in 47 appearances as part of a year-long loan deal in 2002-2003 and last year he spent a similar spell at Layer Road, scoring 10 times in 42 games.

RON BAYNHAM

England international goalkeeper who was a key figure as Luton Town were FA Cup finalists in 1959. He impressed with Worcester City before moving to Kenilworth Road in November 1951 and contested a first-team slot with fellow England keeper Bernard Stretton as Luton gained top-flight status for the first time in 1954-55. Missing just one match in both 1955-56 and 1957-58, he was capped three times and also represented the Football League. He made 388 League appearances for the Hatters until injury ended his career in May 1965 and subsequently worked as an interior decorator in Bedfordshire.

KIRK STEPHENS

Attacking right-back who was ever-present in Luton Town's 1981-82 Second Division title triumph. Initially with Nuneaton Borough, he helped them finish Southern League runners-up in 1974-75 and followed David Pleat to Kenilworth Road in June 1978. He was voted Luton's "Player of the Year" in 1978-79 and 1983-84, scoring twice in 227 League games for the Hatters before moving to Coventry City in exchange for Ashley Grimes in August 1984. Later rejoining Nuneaton as player-manager after a knee injury ended his top-flight career, he also had a spell at Barnet and worked for his father's building firm.

MITCHELL THOMAS

Versatile England U-21 international left-back who had two spells at Luton Town. Born locally, he signed professional at Kenilworth Road in August 1982 and starred as Luton

reached the FA Cup semi-finals in 1984-85. He followed David Pleat to Tottenham Hotspur for £275,000 in July 1986 and featured in the 1987 FA Cup final, moving to West Ham for £525,000 in August 1991. Returning to Luton in November 1993, he netted six goals in 292 League games overall for the Hatters prior to joining Burnley in July 1999 and was an experienced figure in their 1999-2000 promotion success.

BRUCE RIOCH

Influential midfielder who was capped 24 times by Scotland after leaving Luton Town. Signing professional for Luton in September 1964, he starred in the 1967-68 Fourth Division title triumph and netted 46 goals in 149 League games prior to joining Aston Villa for £100,000 in July 1969. He was a key figure in their 1971-72 Third Division title success and moved to Derby County in February 1974, helping to win the League Championship in 1974-75. He played for Everton, Derby again and Torquay, since managing Middlesbrough, Millwall, Bolton Wanderers, Arsenal, Norwich City and Wigan Athletic.

SYD OWEN

Long-serving England international centre-half who skippered Luton Town in the 1959 FA Cup final. Signing professional for Birmingham City in October 1945, he moved to Kenilworth Road in June 1947 and featured prominently in Luton's 1951-52 FA Cup run, 1952-53 promotion near-miss and 1954-55 promotion success. He was 'Footballer of the Year' in 1958-59 and netted three goals in 388 League games

before becoming Luton's manager for a year in May 1959. Subsequently Leeds United's chief coach until October 1975, he then coached at Birmingham City, Hull City and Manchester United.

MAL DONAGHY

Northern Ireland international central defender who gained a club record 58 caps while at Luton Town. He moved to Kenilworth Road from Larne in June 1978 and was ever-present as Luton won the Second Division title in 1981-82 and were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85. Voted "Player of the Year" in 1985-86, he was an FA Cup semi-finalist again in 1987-88 and starred in that season's Littlewoods Cup final triumph. He netted 16 goals in 410 League games for the Hatters prior to joining Manchester United for £650,000 in October 1988, then returned on loan before moving to Chelsea in August 1992.

RICKY HILL

England international midfielder who was "Player of the Year" when Luton Town won the Second Division title in 1981-82. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in May 1976, he was "Player of the Year" again in 1982-83 and starred as Luton were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85. He featured in two consecutive Littlewoods Cup finals including the 1988 Wembley triumph and netted 54 goals in 436 League games before moving to Le Havre in July 1989. Reuniting with David Pleat at Leicester City in August 1990 and later as a coach at Sheffield Wednesday and Spurs, he briefly rejoined Luton as manager.

BRIAN STEIN

England international striker who scored twice in Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Edgware Town in October 1977, he was leading marksman in Luton's 1981-82 Second Division success and also starred as they were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88. He joined Caen in July 1988 and moved via Annecy back to Luton in July 1991. Voted "Player of the Year" for the second time in 1991-92, he netted 130 goals in 427 League games overall for the Hatters before joining Barnet in August 1992. His younger brother Mark also played for Luton.

MICK HARFORD

(left) England international striker who played for Luton Town in consecutive Littlewoods Cup finals including the 1988 Wembley triumph. Signing professional for Lincoln City in July 1977, he had spells with Newcastle United, Bristol City and Birmingham City prior to joining Luton in December 1984. He starred as the Hatters were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88, moving to Derby County in January 1990 and returning to Luton in September 1991. Joining Chelsea in August 1992, he then played for Sunderland, Coventry City and Wimbledon. He is now back at Luton as first-team coach.

MALCOLM MACDONALD

Ace marksman who was capped 14 times by England after leaving Luton Town. Initially with Tonbridge, he moved to Fulham in August 1968 and moved to Kenilworth Road in July 1969. He was Luton's top scorer in two consecutive seasons including the 1969-70 promotion success and netted 49 goals in 88 League games before being sold to Newcastle United for £180,000 in May 1971. An FA Cup finalist in 1974, he joined Arsenal for £333,000 in August 1976 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1978 before injury ended his career. He subsequently managed Fulham and Huddersfield Town.

PAUL WALSH

England international striker who was capped five times while at Luton Town. Signing professional for Charlton Athletic in October 1979, he starred in their 1980-81 promotion success and moved to Luton in July 1982. He was "Player of the Year" in 1982-83 and leading marksman in 1983-84, netting 24 goals in 80 First Division games for the Hatters prior to joining Liverpool in May 1984. Helping to win the League Championship in 1985-86, he joined Tottenham Hotspur in February 1988 and was an FA Cup winner in 1991. He later played for Portsmouth and Manchester City until injury ended his career.





A LOOK BACK AT BOSTON'S LEAGUE CUP MATCHES

CARLING CUP FLASHBACK

Boston United's history in the League Cup has been brief, with just three matches having been contested since the Pilgrims' elevation to the Football League in 2002.

Boston won their first match, defeating Bristol Rovers 2-0 in the preliminary round of the 2002-2003 competition, with goals coming courtesy of Steve Burton and Simon Weatherstone.

However, Boston bowed out of the competition in the first round when they were thrashed 5-1 at the hands of Cardiff City. Welsh international Robert Earnshaw was on fire, netting a hat-trick in the first half, while a Tom Bennett own goal and a Peter Thorne strike completed the rout. Paul Ellender, playing as an emergency striker, netted Boston's consolation.

Last season, Boston were drawn at home to Reading, although they succumbed 3-1. Neil Redfearn scored a second-half penalty to draw United level at one stage, but two goals from Nicky Forster and one from Steven Sidwell were enough to send Reading through to a second round tie at Oxford United.



PROFILE ON.....

MARK GREAVES



Defender Mark Greaves started off the new season in top form, but was red-carded at Yeovil Town 10 days ago, meaning that he was forced to sit out Saturday's 1-1 draw with Macclesfield Town at York Street. However, his suspension is now over, and Greaves is hoping to earn a recall to the squad for this evening's cup-tie against Luton Town.

HOW WOULD YOU SUM UP THE START TO THE SEASON?

"We had an excellent start with the victory over Oxford, and it is always nice to get the season under way with a win. It was good to bounce back from a dubious penalty early on and go on to win the match. It took us a while to get into our stride, but we were solid enough and deservedly won the game in the end. At Grimsby, we had a good first half, although we were somewhat under the cosh in the second half, and Nathan Abbey made some great saves to keep us in it. Yeovil was really disappointing, and we had no hiding place for our performance. I know that I lost my head when I got sent off, and I should have stayed on my feet, rather than go diving in. But it was a day better off forgotten in the end. The Macclesfield match witnessed a better performance, and ensured that we got the Yeovil result out of our systems."

AFTER MISSING SATURDAY'S GAME, ARE YOU EXPECTING A BATTLE TO WIN YOUR PLACE BACK?

"It looks like it will be a choice between three centre-halves for two positions, with myself, Greg and Elly contesting those places. With me being banned, it gave Elly the chance to return from suspension and I know it will be hard to win my place back. The three of us are really good friends off the pitch, but we are all hoping to start as many games as possible. Greg and Elly played well on Saturday, so I will have my work cut out in getting back in, but if and when I win my place back, I want to hang on to it."

WHAT SORT OF GAME ARE YOU EXPECTING TONIGHT?

"It will be a tough game. Luton have had a brilliant start to the season, winning four out of four, but their run can't go on forever, and we are looking to cause an upset this evening. We are under no illusions about how hard it will be, but we need to be positive and try and get a result. Luton have some good players and in Steve Howard they have a big goal threat. I have played against him before, so I know exactly what he's like. They will come here full of confidence, but we will certainly be ready for them."

IS TONIGHT'S MATCH A NICE DISTRACTION FROM THE LEAGUE?

"Yes, but the main focus remains on the league. If we could cause an upset tonight, it would be fantastic, but League Two remains our priority. Over the past two seasons, we have had two difficult games in the first round of the Carling Cup against Cardiff and Reading, and tonight will be no different. Whatever the result tonight, our focus will be switched back to league action on Saturday when we visit Cheltenham."

WHAT PROBLEMS WILL CHELTENHAM POSE ON SATURDAY?

"Cheltenham have lost their opening two home matches, so will undoubtedly be looking to bounce back from that disappointment. They are a big, physical side and we will need to be ready for a battle. We lost 1-0 at their place in February, in a match that could have gone either way, so I would imagine it will be another tight game."


IT has been a very busy week for the youth set-up here at Boston United with the first game for our scholars at under-18s level and a double fixture at Arsenal for the under-13s and under-15s.

The scholars entertained Grimsby Town at the High School on Saturday morning and they worked really hard but were undone by a good side who showed that having boys up to two years older within the team makes a big difference. We knew this with the boys and patience is going to be a very big factor to ensure they get the correct development required. They have to learn from every game they play and take on board the right and wrong things to do, whether it's making decisions on the pitch or executing any technique. The game finished 4-0 to the visitors, which is always disappointing, but it was great to see Paul Raynor and Paul Gascoigne coming up to support the boys before they were involved in a very important first team game in the afternoon. This shows the boys the importance of continuity within the club and it makes them feel even more part of the club.

On Monday, we took two young squads to the Premiership champions to play prestige friendlies against Arsenal's academy. It was great experience for the boys to play against the best of this country and many other countries — Ireland, Africa and so on. They are able to call upon boys from all over the world, such is the pull of Arsenal FC and the money they are able to plough into the academy set-up. An example of this was provided after the game when I was talking to their coaches and they have many immaculate training pitches but their match pitch

was unbelievable. The coach told us that every pitch has a personal groundsman, but they spent £300,000 alone on the one match pitch.

That is a phenomenal amount to be spent on any pitch. I wonder how much Dick has to spend on our pitch this season or any other groundsman in the lower divisions for that matter. But the whole day proved valuable experience for all our boys and probably one they will never forget. Many thanks to Arsenal for giving us the opportunity.





CHRIS COOK REFLECTS ON CRAZY PILGRIMS GOALKEEPERS!

They say you have to be crazy to be a keeper, well believe me United have had loads of keepers during my 20 years with the club, 10 in one season alone, including me! I even managed to keep a clean sheet for 70 minutes against Runcorn in the Conference having replaced the injured Roy McManus in the first 20 minutes, and we went on to win 2-0!

The first keeper I ever played with at United was Scotchman Gerry Stewart who had signed for the Pilgrims from Barnsley, previously he had been with Preston North End. Gerry was a tremendous keeper who somehow represented the English Non-League XI against their Italian counterparts, even though he was Scottish! Regarded as the top goalkeeper in the Northern Premier League in his time with the Pilgrims. He won the "Player of the Year" award in 1976-1977. Gerry was born on September 2, 1946 in Dundee. He was a really nice bloke with a dry sense of humour, who played for the club for five years.

The keeper to step into Gerry Stewart's gloves was southerner Kevin Blackwell signed from Barnet for £5,000 in 1980, which was a lot of money in those days! Kevin's previous clubs included Bedford Town, Barton Rovers, playing for them in the FA Vase Final at Wembley in 1977-1978, and touring representative side Middlesex Wanderers with whom he toured Holland and Indonesia. A bricklayer by trade, Kevin played in our FA Trophy Final at Wembley, where he saved a penalty! He went on to play for Neil Warnock at Scarborough, Torquay United, Huddersfield Town and Plymouth Argyle. Following a successful playing career Kevin went into coaching alongside Neil Warnock at Notts County and Sheffield United, he has now parted company with Neil to go on to bigger things at Leeds United! And he's been getting quite a bit of television exposure just lately. Kevin was born on December 21, 1958 in Luton. Kevin was a great character, not shy to come forward, a typical southerner, full of confidence! He was well liked by all the lads as well as the supporters, Kevin

used to spend many a weekend in Boston celebrating a victory. Not really, he hardly ever had a drink, only on special occasions. His best mate at the time was Jim Kibia, and obviously Jim had to have a driver!

Scouser John McKenna signed for the Pilgrims in August 1987 on his return from South Africa, where he had been playing in the National League for Grineckar Rangers and previously for Durban City. His earlier English experience was with Everton and Leeds in the Central League and with Morecambe. John's best line was his experience of a hand grenade going off in a bar during his time in South Africa, that explained all his scars on his face, we just used to think he was just ugly! Macca was a tremendous character that came to live in the town and became a real crowd favourite. He won the Boston United "Player of the Year" in 1987-1988 and 1989-1990. The Pilgrims turned down a £50,000 bid for him from Charlton Athletic in March 1988. He was selected for the England semi-professional squad to play Wales in March 1988, and also played for the touring representative side Middlesex Wanderers. John was transferred to Dagenham and Redbridge in 1992. He collected seven England semi-professional caps in all. He later moved on to Southport, Accrington Stanley and Ashton United. A few years ago he spent a few seasons in New Zealand, even managing! But he is now back in this country. John made his United debut on August 22, 1987 versus Kidderminster Harriers in the GM Vauxhall Conference. He was born on March 21, 1962. John has always remained a favourite of the Pilgrim faithful and would no doubt feature in a lot of fans best ever Pilgrims side.

But in my eyes there has only been one really crazy keeper during my time at United, and he's still playing today! Bazza has great qualities and his biggest is his personality. I could tell quite a few stories of Bazza's exploits, but I haven't got any room left, so I will save them for another day, when they may well take up a page on their own!





NORTHWICH VICTORIA 0-2 BOSTON UNITED

Watney Challenge Shield, August 13, 1973

The Seventies were glory years for Boston United. Not only did they pick-up four Northern Premier League titles and twice reach the third round proper of the FA Cup, but they also won lots of lesser trophies, such as the Northern Premier League Cup, the Watney Challenge Shield, the Eastern Professional Floodlit Cup and the Non-League Champions of Champions Cup. The Watney Challenge Shield was played for in a match between the Champions and the League Cup winners of the Northern Premier League. In 1973 that meant that Cup winners Northwich Victoria took on Champions Boston United. The game was played at Northwich's Drill Field ground. It was going to be a tough match to win. Like Boston, Northwich had been founder members of the Northern Premier League when it began in 1968. In the five intervening seasons Boston had yet to record a win at the Drill Field. Boston had however strengthened their squad over the summer. Their major new signing was 33-year-old centre-forward Matt Tees who had joined the club from Grimsby Town. Tees had begun his footballing career with Airdrieonians, but had soon moved south of the border to play for Grimsby Town. After scoring 51 goals in 113 appearances for the Mariners he was snapped up by Charlton Athletic where he spent two seasons netting 32 times in 88 starts. A season with Luton Town followed where his 13 goals helped them to win promotion to the

Second Division in 1970. He then returned to Grimsby where he maintained a scoring average of a goal every other game. Boston also had another new weapon in their armoury in the form of seven-year-old mascot Andrew Malkinson, who made his debut at Northwich.

Boston attacked from the start and they took the lead after just 11 minutes. Roving winger and player-coach Howard WILKINSON, who seemed to be everywhere except the left wing where he was supposed to be, let fly from twenty yards out and saw his shot hit the back of the net via the post. Six minutes later Boston increased their lead. Wilkinson, this time on the right wing, fired in a high cross that caused panic in the Northwich defence allowing Matt TEES to get in behind Mason and prod the ball home. Despite Boston's midfield strength and dominating defence that was the way the score remained until the end of the game. Boston created more than half-a-dozen chances that could have led to goals, but none materialised. The closest Northwich came to scoring was a Gee shot that hit the bar in the first half and a Vickers shot that hit the post in the final minute. Boston's strong-arm tactics in defence led to bookings for John Moyes and Paul Dolby.

At the end of the game, representatives of the sponsors — brewers Watney Mann (North) Ltd, presented the Shield to Boston. It proved to be the first of three

trophies that United would pick up that season. Another Northern Premier League title and the Northern Premier League Cup would follow. Adding the silverware to their run in the FA Cup that saw them draw with First Division title contenders Derby County at the Baseball Ground, this is arguably the best season that Boston United have ever seen, before or since.

Old rivalries from the Conference will be renewed on Bank Holiday Monday when Chester City are the visitors to York Street. The newly-promoted Conference champions have had a tricky start to life in League Two, after manager Mark Wright left the club on the eve of the new campaign. He was succeeded by Ray Mathias, who is still currently caretaker manager at the Saunders Honda Stadium. Chester pipped Hereford United to the Conference title last season, and were indebted to the goals of strike duo Daryl Clare and Darryn Stamp, a pair who are both struggling to overcome injuries. In their absence, goalscoring responsibilities have fallen on ex-Everton striker Michael Branch and former Notts County frontman Kevin Rapley.

STAR PLAYER **MICHAEL BRANCH**

The arrival of Michael at the club in the summer made City fans sit up and take notice. Michael is a player who has played his career so far on a higher stage. He made his debut for Everton at the age of 17 and scored three goals in 41 outings, enjoying a loan spell with Manchester City along the way. A big money move to Wolves brought 10 goals in 72 games and further loan spells with Reading and Hull. A former England schools, youth and under-21 international, Michael scored six goals in 30 outings for Bradford City last season and he has found the net several times in pre-season games for Chester.

ONE TO WATCH **STEWART DRUMMOND**



Drummond was a long time target for City who finally got their man in the summer. Stewart progressed through the youth team ranks at Morecambe and signed a contract in June 1995 having made his first team debut in February of the same year. He went on to make more than 300 appearances for the club becoming a regular goalscorer in the process. Stewart is another member of the squad with international recognition at semi-pro level and looks sure to make an impact on the league this term.

LAST TIME OUT **BOSTON UNITED** 0 **CHESTER CITY** 1

The Pilgrims were left empty-handed the last time the two teams met. Mark Beesley scored the only goal of the game as Boston succumbed 1-0 on home soil in their Conference championship-winning 2001-2002 campaign, one of only four home defeats all season.



WHAT'S THE GROUND LIKE?

Whaddon Road has greatly improved since Cheltenham entered the League in 1999, with half the ground being redeveloped. The latest addition is the In2Print Stand, opened in November 2001. This stand sits proudly at one side of the pitch and was built by Barr Construction. It is a covered, all seated, single tiered stand containing 2,034 seats. Part of this stand is given to away supporters. On the other side of the pitch is the UCAS Main Stand, which has seating to the rear and terracing at the front. Straddling the half way line, it does not extend the full length of the pitch, having open spaces to either side. At one end is the small covered, Cheltenham and Gloucester Terrace, while opposite the Whaddon Road End is given to away supporters. This end has a small covering on one side of the terrace. A small police control box keeps a watchful eye on matters from this corner of the ground by the away end.

WHAT IS IT LIKE FOR VISITING SUPPORTERS?

The improvements made to the ground have also benefited away supporters. Seating is now available to away supporters on one side of the covered In2Print Stand where up to 900 seats can be allocated. Entrance to the seated area first involves walking through the away terrace, as there is no separate away entrance to the seated area. Facilities and view of the playing action are good. A further 1,162 fans are housed in the Whaddon Road terrace at one end of the ground. The views of the playing action

HOW TO GET THERE AND WHERE TO PARK

Leave the M5 at junction 10 and take the A4019 towards Cheltenham. Keep straight on through the traffic lights, until you come to large roundabout (there is a McDonalds on the left), at which you turn left. Continue up this road going over a double mini roundabout. Keep going for about 300 yards and then turn right into Swindon Lane. Go over the level crossing and straight over the next roundabout (signposted Prestbury) passing the racecourse on your left. Turn right into Albert Road (signposted Gloucestershire University) and at the bottom at the roundabout turn left into Prestbury Road, (the ground is signposted from here) and then further down Prestbury Road, turn right into Whaddon Road. The ground is down on the left.

There is no usable car park at the ground and nearby street parking is limited. The Parklands Social Club does allow some parking at £3 per car. Otherwise there is a free "Park and Ride" service to the ground operating from Cheltenham Racecourse, which is well signposted around the town. Journey time on the "Park and Ride" service is obviously dependent on traffic, but is around ten minutes on average.

Otherwise there is the Parklands Social Club, where you can also park your car (£3). Simply go down Whaddon Road, passing the ground and the bowling club on your left. Take the first left hand turn and the entrance to the social club car park is a short distance down on the left.




