

What made it worse was the fact that we'd worked so hard all week on training pitch trying to put things right, and we then go and turn in an awful performance like that.

Some of the things that happened in Bristol you wouldn't see in the local Sunday league.

The players don't mean to put in a performance like that and I feel sorry for all our supporters who travelled to Ashton Gate – despite the result they were absolutely magnificent and were still singing when the game was clearly beyond us.

HOME TRUTHS

The players lost their day off on Sunday as we had them in at Manor Farm. As you can imagine the session wasn't pleasant and a few home truths were

told. The players had a chat between themselves and, to be fair, they know where we are going wrong. Being honest, though, we all do. We have a soft centre at the moment and it doesn't matter who we are playing. If we had put the Berlin Wall up at Ashton Gate Bristol would still have got through.

We have got a very young squad and one or two of the lads need to be taken out of the firing line to give them a breather, but at the moment we don't have too many options.

I have been working tirelessly all week to try and bring in an experienced central defender to try and bolster the squad but a couple of deals we had lined up fell through at the last minute, which is very frustrating.

CONFIDENT

However, we'll keep trying and I remain confident that we will be able to announce the signing of an experienced defender by the middle of next week. To compound matters today, though, both Mark Robertson and Jon Daly, who missed last week's game through injury, are still a little way off from returning.

We'll juggle one or two things around but it's clear to everyone who has watched us recently that several players are lacking confidence.

We face a very, very tough game against a Luton team that are absolutely flying and, if we are to kick-start our season, we need you right behind us. The lads are apprehensive and a little nervous in possession so, if they make a mistake, please encourage – we must all stick together.

STRONG

We must all remain strong, on and off the pitch because that's the only way we'll turn things around. You are fantastic supporters and I know you are hurting at the moment, but those that know me know that I'm hurting just as much as you.

This is the hardest situation I've ever faced in football, including Northern Ireland, but I'm determined to sort it out.

If we all stick together I'm certain we'll soon start climbing the table.

UNLUCKY





FIFA WORLD FAIR PLAY DAY





Climbing the Pyramid

Arsenal's unbeaten record in the Premiership is quite incredible and it brings into play similar records from the wonderful world of football.

Arsenal's 3-0 win over Fulham last weekend takes them to 45 but they are still a little behind the British record held by Celtic of 62 between 1915-17. Steaua Bucharest hold the European record with 104 between 1986 and 1989 whilst the world record appears to be held by a team in the Gold Coast between 1989 and 1994 with 109 games unbeaten. 


There was also a shock at Weymouth where chairman Ian Ridley resigned after he thought his job had become non-existent. Martyn Harrison had bought a majority shareholding in the club and Ridley, who had revitalised the club with the appointment of Steve Claridge, has reluctantly stepped down. Weymouth are a very ambitious Conference South club with a good crowd base and the highest paid manager in non-league. Even so, it is a puzzle why Claridge remains there despite receiving many offers from higher up the ladder. Stalybridge Celtic are having a bit of a torrid time so far this season. Last season wasn't much better either but manager, former County defender Dave Miller, cited injury problems as the root cause. He may run out of excuses this time round with Woodley manager, another former County player, Tony Hancock a possible candidate. How's this for a transfer with a difference? Hornchurch wanted £5,000 for their goalkeeper Danny Gaye but Braintree could only afford to give £4,000. Desperate to get away, Gaye decided to pay the other £1,000 himself!

The Isle of Wight are apparently short of referees. County FA official Keith Stroud decided to advertise and said in the job description that refereeing was fun and very rewarding! Where's the fun in being spoken to by players in an abusive manner or glared at as if the mother-in-law has suddenly turned up at the front door.



This afternoon we go back in time to the days of Division Three (North) and Division Three (South).

In the 1950s one of the highlights on the fixture calendar was the representative game between the best players from each section.

And, on April 2, 1957, it was the turn of Edgeley Park to host the attractive North v South clash.

The attendance at EP underlines just how important this game was for supporters - a bumper 12,743. A quick glance at the two teams shows two County stars, Bill Holden and Ken Finney, in the Northern side with Bournemouth's Reg Cutler - who would move to Edgeley Park 5 years later - playing for the South.

Also appearing for the Southerners was Ted Phillips whose 161 goals in 269 Ipswich appearances helped the Suffolk side win Division Three (South) in 1957, Division Two (1961) and Division One, 1962. After a spell at Leyton Orient he joined Luton in February 1965 scoring 8 goals for the Hatters in just 12 appearances before finishing his career with Colchester United

The Northern trainer on the night was also a former County favourite - Billy Newton.

The Stockport Express reported the following week: "Even though the North were deserved winners, I don't think anyone would deny that the more cultured football came from the South. The Northern side looked at times like they had never met each other before. Even so, they had the great advantage of getting the first goal. This was a glorious flying

header from County's Bill Holden after Alf Ackerman had chased a through pass, shrugged off a challenge from Parker and crossed a lovely centre from the dead line.

"The South equalised some 15 minutes later when Neil Langman headed past Bob Gray.

"For the rest of the first half, the South looked the more likely to take the lead, but the score remained at 1-1. Then, three minutes after the break, the North missed a penalty after Parker had handled.

"The winner came in the last minute when a free-kick had been headed behind for a corner by Jardine. The flag kick, taken by Crispey, was met by the head of Holden and beat Pickering and might well have scored but Ackerman made certain from a foot out by slamming the ball into the net. Holden was certainly a Northern star, a fact that gave much pleasure to the Stockport people who were perturbed to see one columnist express the view that his selection was only due to sentimentality with the game being played at Edgeley Park.





Luton Town arrive at Edgeley Park this afternoon seven points clear at the top of Coca-Cola League One following a 1-0 home win against rivals, and early-season surprise side, Chesterfield last Saturday. Rowan Vine scored the winner after 49 minutes but the (other) Hatters were helped by red cards to former County defender Shane Nicholson and teammate Steve Blatherwick. Mike Newell's side are now unbeaten in their first eight games. Chesterfield were second but dropped to fourth on the back of this reverse.

Colchester United, however, kept up their good start to the campaign with a 3-1 win against Bournemouth at Dean Court. Craig Fagan and

Gareth Williams gave the U's a two-goal cushion at the break but a Sam Stockley own goal set up an exciting finale. Ben May sealed the win for the Layer Road outfit with a third goal 11 minutes from time.

ANCHORED

Blackpool remain anchored at the bottom after a 2-1 defeat at the KC Stadium against Hull City. Stuart Green opened the scoring after 15 minutes for the home side but former County striker Scott Taylor gave the Seasiders hope with a goal just before the break.

However, Stuart Elliott scored the winner for Peter Taylor's side after 57 minutes to keep the pressure on leaders Luton.

Mark Albrighton scored the winner for Doncaster against Milton Keynes Dons at the National Hockey Stadium to maintain Rover's steady start to the campaign.

Oldham Athletic survived a late scare to beat Hartlepool United 3-2 at Boundary Park. John Eyre and new boy Kevin Betsy put the Latics two up on the hour before Chris Westwood halved the deficit with 12 minutes to play. However, thoughts of a Pool comeback ended a mere four minutes later when Jermaine Johnson netted Oldham's third. There were still more thrills to come for the Oldham faithful, though, as a late own goal from Adam Griffin set up an exciting last few minutes.

HAT-TRICK

Pawel Abbott scored a second-half hat-trick as Huddersfield Town beat Port Vale 3-0 at Vale Park. The Polish forward scored after 62, 67 and 75 minutes to end the game in less than a quarter of an hour and maintain the Terrier's promotion charge, which currently sees them in fifth spot. The defeat saw an end to Vale's 100% home record this season and was their first home defeat since January. It was also the first time in 33 home games that Vale had failed to score – a bad day all round for Martin Foyle's team then!

Down in Devon, Brentford came from behind to grab a 2-2 draw with Torquay United. Stuart Wardley had given the Gulls a two-goal lead three minutes after the break only to see the Bees sting back with late goals from Chris Hargreaves and Sam Sodje.

Sheffield Wednesday were a goal up through Glenn Whelan against Walsall but Michael Standing scored just before the break to secure a point at the Bescot.

An early strike from Dennis Lawrence in the second minute was enough for Wrexham to take all three points against Bradford City at the Racecourse. Steve Jenkins scored the first-half winner for Peterborough United in their 1-0 win against Swindon Town at the County Ground to help end the recent slump for Barry Fry's team. No goals and even less thrills it seems as Barnsley and Tranmere drew 0-0 at Oakwell.

League One runaway leaders Luton Town made it 22 points from a possible 24 last Saturday when they narrowly defeated Chesterfield 1-0 at Kenilworth Road.

IN GOAL

Marlon Beresford arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2004 from Barnsley. The 35-year-old is a veteran in the English game having made over 450 appearances for Bury, Northampton, Crewe, Burnley, Middlesbrough, Sheff Wed, Wolves, York, Bradford and Barnsley.

IN DEFENCE

Kevin Foley has come through the youth ranks at Kenilworth Road and signed professional forms with the club in the summer of 2002. He is still only 19 years old but has already made nearly 50 appearances and great things are expected of this cultured defender. Curtis Davies is a product of Luton's Academy and signed professional forms in the summer of 2003 having been a solid and consistent performer in the club's Under-19 side over the past couple of seasons. Chris Coyne started his career with West Ham although he only ever made one substitute appearance during his time at Upton Park. The Australian centre back, after loan spells with Brentford and Southend, left to join Dundee in March 2000 before joining Luton for £50,000 in September 2001.

Sol Davis started his career at Swindon where he made 128 appearances. He was out of contract at the end of the 2001-02 season and decided to join Luton on a Bosman free transfer. The highly-rated left back has since made nearly 100 appearances for Town.

IN MIDFIELD

Ahmet Brkovic is a Croatian midfielder who has been at Luton since October 2001 after they signed him on a Bosman free from Leyton Orient. The O's had previously brought Ahmet to England on a free transfer from HNK Dubrovnik in August 1998.

Kevin Nicholls is a tough tackling midfielder who began his career at Charlton and skippered England's Under-

18, 19 and 20 teams. He later joined Wigan who later, surprisingly, placed him on the transfer list; Luton snapped him up for a bargain £25,000 in August 2001. Steve Robinson is a Northern Irish midfielder who started his career as a trainee at Spurs, making two appearances. He joined Bournemouth on a free transfer in October 1994 before Preston paid £375,000 for him in May 2000. He left Deepdale in the summer of 2002 when Luton paid £50,000 for his services.

Paul Underwood started his career at Enfield before Rushden gave him his first chance of league football when they signed him for £50,000 in August 1997. He joined Luton on transfer deadline day last season when they fought off competition from a number of clubs to capture his signature.

IN ATTACK

Rowan Vine is a Portsmouth striker who joined Luton on a three-month loan deal on the eve of the new season. The last two seasons have seen Rowan spend season-long loans with Brentford, scoring 13 goals, and then Colchester, scoring 12 goals.

Steve Howard joined Luton for £50,000 from Northampton in March 2001 and has certainly repaid that transfer fee scoring 71 goals in 148 appearances. The powerful striker picked up the Fans Player of the Year award in 2002 and then the Players' Player of the Year award in 2003.

IN CONTENTION


Michael Leary is a midfielder who has come through the ranks at Kenilworth Road, signing professional forms in the summer of 2002.

Opponents Luton Town may share our nickname but that's where the comparisons end when considering our respective starts to the season.




Whilst County initially suffered some ill fortune in the early games of the season, the lethargy and crass defending of late, allied to the paucity of supply up to our forwards is really concerning.

A mistake is only a mistake if lessons are not learnt from it, but the self belief of the players needs to be rapidly re-ignited. Ralph Waldo Emerson the 19th century American philosopher when talking about ability stated that "what lies behind us, and what lies before us are tiny matters, compared to what lies within us" – food for thought for the players.

Thought for the day over, even the most optimistic Luton fan could not have predicted their start to the season which has seen them pick up 22 points from the first 24 on offer. This has enabled them to establish a seven point gap over their nearest challengers Colchester United and our next opponents Hull City and leaves them standing a massive 18 points above County.

At Kenilworth Road they have picked up maximum points, winning all their four games to date. All have been tight encounters and low scoring affairs won by a single goal. The opening day of the season saw our neighbours from Boundary Park make the trip down to Bedfordshire and Will Haining gave

Oldham the perfect start with an early goal. Steve Howard however, continuing his rich vein of form for Luton from the end of last season (5 goals in the last 5 games), levelled and Kevin Foley, a player who has come through the Luton ranks, struck what turned out to be the winner midway through the second half.

FIRM


The other three home games have seen the Town defence hold firm and this has been sufficient to generate nine points with a trio of 1-0 wins. The first of these wins came against Torquay United, another Steve Howard goal midway through the first 45 minutes being the only activity for the scoreboard operator to register.

Next up were another coastal-based team, previous employers of our very own Warren Feeney, Bournemouth, who were in town on August Bank Holiday Monday. The game appeared to be meandering towards a goalless conclusion until Kevin Nicholls breached the Cherries defence on the 81 minute mark and, last Saturday, another solitary second half strike was sufficient to beat surprise package Chesterfield. On-loan Rowan Vine was the man on target to maintain Luton's 100% start to the season on home soil. Vine had already hit the woodwork in the first half, his shot from the right of the area coming back off the inside of a post. Chesterfield struggled to gain a foothold in the match early on with few problems being posed by the Spireites front two of veteran Wayne Allison and Tcham N'Toya. A couple of penalty appeals for Luton were waved away and older County fans might be surprised to hear of the good form shown by former Hatter Carl Muggleton. Goalless therefore at half time, it appeared that the Derbyshire side might return home with at least a point but Luton were not to be denied and after 49 minutes Vine was rewarded for his perseverance, the 21-year-old latching on to a Chris Coyne pass to fire home past the advancing Muggleton. The afternoon ended somewhat acrimoniously as Chesterfield saw defender Steve Blatherwick dismissed for a professional foul and before the final whistle he was joined in the early bath by colleague and former County man Shane Nicholson, back at Chesterfield following his departure from Tranmere Rovers.

CHEER

On their travels the Luton faithful have had plenty to cheer about winning their first three away games and scoring ten goals in the process. Their first away trip saw a visit to Swindon Town and the Hatters shaded an entertaining clash by a 3-2 margin. A Kevin Nicholls penalty and an opposition own goal as against one from Sam Parkin for their hosts saw Luton turn around at half time with a 2-1

advantage. Steve Howard soon gave them a two goal cushion and despite Town reducing the deficit courtesy of Reeves, Luton held on to take all three points. This result was positively tame compared to their next away foray at Oakwell which ended up with a 4-3 final scoreline in Luton's favour. Boulding had given Barnsley an early lead, but by half time it was 3-1 for Luton thanks to goals from Howard, Vine and Ahmet Brkovic. When Steve Robinson hit a fourth for Luton on the 66 minute mark it left the Tykes a mountain to climb and they were unable to

reach the summit despite pulling two goals back thanks to McPhail (72) and a second Boulding goal on the final whistle.

SWALLOW

Their third straight away victory came at County's one swallow in this currently fallow summer – Blackpool. Ex-County targetman Scott Taylor gave the Seasiders a fourth minute lead which they retained until half time. Their defensive frailties were, however, cruelly exposed in the second half when two goals from Brkovic and one from Howard ensured maximum points once again for Luton. The only blemish on an otherwise perfect start to the season came in their trip to Hillsborough which ended goalless, the woodwork saving Luton when Lee Peacock volleyed against the left upright for Wednesday. Boss Mike Newell being realistic about the outcome saying that "We'll take that. We knew the run wasn't going to last forever. We were always going to lose points somewhere. The important thing was that it didn't end with a defeat."

Luton's promotion aspirations will not be hindered by the distractions of a lengthy Carling Cup campaign as they exited the competition at the first hurdle going down to a surprise defeat away at Boston United. An own goal and a Nicholls penalty was matched by goals from Pitt and Lee for their hosts as the match entered the last minute of the regulation 90 minutes. Before full time, however, Showumni had netted for Town and Thompson had scored for Boston, thereby sending the match into extra time. Thompson was on target again for Boston after 94 minutes sending his team through 4-3.

Football historian Leigh Edwards selects a post-war Luton Town 'Dream Team' with the help of several Luton supporters and club officials.


RON BAYNHAM

England international goalkeeper who was a key figure as Luton Town were FA Cup finalists in 1959. He impressed with Worcester City before moving to Kenilworth Road in November 1951 and contested a first-team slot with fellow England keeper Bernard Stretton as Luton gained top-flight status for the first time in 1954-55. Missing just one match in both 1955-56 and 1957-58, he was capped three times and also represented the Football League. He made 388 League appearances for the Hatters until injury ended his career in May 1965 and subsequently worked as an interior decorator in Bedfordshire.

KIRK STEPHENS

Attacking right-back who was ever-present in Luton Town's 1981-82 Second Division title triumph. Initially with Nuneaton Borough, he helped them finish Southern League runners-up in 1974-75 and followed David Pleat to

Kenilworth Road in June 1978. He was voted Luton's 'Player of the Year' in 1978-79 and 1983-84, scoring twice in 227 League games for the Hatters before moving to Coventry City in exchange for Ashley Grimes in August 1984. Later rejoining Nuneaton as player-manager after a knee injury ended his top-flight career; he also had a spell at Barnet and worked for his father's building firm.

MICHAEL THOMAS

Versatile England U-21 international left-back who had two spells at Luton Town. Born locally, he signed professional at Kenilworth Road in August 1982 and starred as Luton reached the FA Cup semi-finals in 1984-85. He followed David Pleat to Tottenham Hotspur for £275,000 in July 1986 and featured in the 1987 FA Cup final, moving to West Ham for £525,000 in August 1991. Returning to Luton in November 1993, he netted six goals in 292 League games overall for the Hatters prior to joining Burnley in July 1999 and was an experienced figure in their 1999-2000 promotion success.

BRUCE RIOCH

Influential midfielder who was capped 24 times by Scotland after leaving Luton Town. Signing professional for Luton in September 1964, he starred in the 1967-68 Fourth Division title triumph and netted 46 goals in 149 League games prior to joining Aston Villa for £100,000 in July 1969. He was a key figure in their 1971-72 Third Division title success and moved to Derby County in February 1974, helping to win the League Championship in 1974-75. He played for Everton, Derby again and Torquay, since managing Middlesbrough, Millwall, Bolton Wanderers, Arsenal, Norwich City and Wigan Athletic.

SYD OWEN

Long-serving England international centre-half who skippered Luton Town in the 1959 FA Cup final. Signing professional for Birmingham City in October 1945, he moved to Luton in June 1947 and starred in their 1951-52 FA Cup run, 1952-53 promotion near-miss and 1954-55 promotion success. He was 'Footballer of the Year' in 1958-59 and netted three goals in 388 League games before becoming Luton's manager for a year in May 1959. Subsequently Leeds United's chief coach under Don Revie until October 1975, he then coached at Birmingham, Hull City and Manchester United. He died in August 1998.




MAL DONAGHY

Northern Ireland international central defender who gained a club record 58 caps while at Luton Town. He moved to Kenilworth Road from Larne in June 1978 and was ever-present as Luton won the Second Division title in 1981-82 and were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85. Voted 'Player of the Year' in 1985-86, he was an FA Cup semi-finalist again in 1987-88 and starred in that season's Littlewoods Cup final triumph. He netted 16 goals in 410 League games for the Hatters prior to joining Manchester United for £650,000 in October 1988, and then returned on loan before moving to Chelsea in August 1992.

RICKY HILL

England international midfielder who was 'Player of the Year' when Luton Town won the Second Division title in 1981-82. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in May 1976, he was 'Player of the Year' again in 1982-83 and starred as Luton were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85. He featured in two consecutive Littlewoods Cup finals including the 1988 Wembley triumph and netted 54 goals in 436 League games before moving to Le Havre in July 1989. Reuniting with David Pleat at Leicester City in August 1990 and later as a coach at Sheffield Wednesday and Spurs, he briefly rejoined Luton as manager.

Paul Walsh was capped by England whilst at Kenilworth Road



BRIAN STEIN

England international striker who scored twice in Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Edgware Town in October 1977, he was leading marksman in Luton's 1981-82 Second Division success and also starred as they were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88. He joined Caen in July 1988 and moved via Annecy back to Luton in July 1991. Voted 'Player of the Year' for the second time in 1991-92, he netted 130 goals in 427 League games overall for the Hatters before joining Barnet in August 1992. His younger brother Mark also played for Luton.

MICK HARFORD

England international striker who played for Luton Town in consecutive Littlewoods Cup finals including the 1988 Wembley triumph. Signing professional for Lincoln City in July 1977, he had spells with Newcastle United, Bristol City and Birmingham City prior to joining Luton in December 1984. He starred as the Hatters were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88, moving to Derby County in January 1990 and returning to Luton in September 1991. Joining Chelsea in August 1992, he then played for Sunderland, Coventry City and Wimbledon. He is now back at Luton as first-team coach.

MALCOLM MACDONALD


Ace marksman who was capped 14 times by England after leaving Luton Town. Initially with Tonbridge, he moved to Fulham in August 1968 and moved to Kenilworth Road in July 1969. He was Luton's top scorer in two consecutive seasons including the 1969-70 promotion success and netted 49 goals in 88 League games before being sold to Newcastle United for £180,000 in May 1971. An FA Cup finalist in 1974, he joined Arsenal for £333,000 in August 1976 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1978 before injury ended his career. He subsequently managed Fulham and Huddersfield Town.

PAUL WALSH

England international striker who was capped five times while at Luton Town. Signing professional for Charlton Athletic in October 1979, he starred in their 1980-81 promotion success and moved to Luton in July 1982. He was 'Player of the Year' in 1982-83 and leading marksman in 1983-84, netting 24 goals in 80 First Division games for the Hatters prior to joining Liverpool in May 1984. Helping to win the League Championship in 1985-86, he joined Tottenham Hotspur in February 1988 and was an FA Cup winner in 1991. He later played for Portsmouth and Manchester City until injury ended his career.





My first reaction when I saw that Everton's Tim Cahill had been sent off for shirt-lifting (that is, excessive celebrations resulting in him raising part of his shirt above head level) was that the referee was an idiot, and a kill-joy to boot.

How ridiculous, crowded the press, fans and managers, that a player is sent-off for reacting to football's raison d'être i.e. the goal. After all, that is what Tim Cahill is paid to do – score goals. Well, yes he is, and very well he is paid for it. In fact, he is paid in one week more than most people in the ground today will trouser in a year. And that is part of the reason why, the more I thought about it, the more my sympathies started to lie with the referee. So, on the one hand, we have a ludicrous new rule dreamt up by some Zurich pen-pushers who has probably never played a game in his life, still less actually scored a goal. It is a rule fitting for today's football, where all emotion and individuality is subservient to the power of money, the sponsor and the brand. On the other hand, we have Tim Cahill, a professional footballer (note the word "professional", it's important, it implies that playing football is Mr Cahill's sole or main revenue stream) in whose dressing room there is a poster telling him that the removal or partial removal of his shirt after a goal will result in a caution. Despite this warning – which is basically like you or I receiving a memo telling us that the removal of our trousers during working hours in the office will result in us being summarily suspended from work – Tim Cahill, having already received a caution earlier in the game, scored a goal and wheeled away with his shirt being raised so as to cover his face. On yet another hand, we have the referee who thinks that this FIFA ruling is ridiculous, but who knows that up in the stands there is a referee's assessor who can get him chucked off the Premiership list if he should lurch uncontrollably towards common sense and turns a blind eye.

Where does this all leave us? Well, apparently it leaves us with three hands, but aside from this it leads us to the conclusion that the referee had no option but to send the player off, and that the

highly-paid professional athlete who should know all the rules and regulations of the sport which provides his income, gave the referee no alternative but to brandish the yellow card, followed quickly by the red. I know that if I was on £20,000 a week plus win bonus, I would think twice before embarking on an act that a) looks rubbish anyway b) jeopardises my chances of playing again after my suspension has been served and c) forced my teammates to play nearly a third of the match with ten men. And yet, despite the fact that the problem was clearly self-inflicted, it was the ref who copped for all the flack. Which just goes to show what a thankless job being a ref actually is. I have, through no fault of my own, been coerced into being a referee's assistant ("running the line" as they used to call it) on two occasions. The first occasion was a schools match in which I was participating, in my customary role as loyal, but useless, substitute. (Actually, that is not quite correct...as a substitute I was excellent, cajoling, encouraging, playing hit the bar on an adjacent pitch, pretending to do a proper warm-up etc. It was only when I entered the fray that I became useless.) The actual linesperson had failed to show up and I was pressed into action because, I presume, I just look like an honest upstanding citizen. I called all the off-sides and throw-ins as I saw them...and got the dog's-own abuse from my own teammates who thought I should be awarding every decision to them, and from the opposition players who maintained that I was.

The second occasion was a schools match many years later, at which I was a spectator as my nephew did an exceptional job between the (adult-sized) sticks. Again, I tried to call the shots as I saw them and got a volley of lively and colourful invective from both sets of parents. And also from one 10-year-old fullback who called me a "pooh-faced durr-brain" when I decided that he was playing practically the entire opposition team onsite. Which he was.

And so ended – at least I hope so, as the next time I receive the call I intend to hide behind a corner flag until someone else is collared – my career as a football official. And I can tell you that I would not do the job on a professional basis if you gave me a gold pig. If you haven't done the job yourself, you can only imagine the panic that comes when you have to make a contentious decision, and yet you have only a fraction of a second to come to the right conclusion (unless, of course, you are refereeing an Arsenal match, in which case you make a decision and then change it because the Arsenal players told you to.)

I'm not going to patronise you by telling you not to have a go at the ref. You will shout at him this afternoon, possibly even calling upon him to produce his birth certificate at some stage, and I will be doing the same thing in the heat of the moment. But spare a thought for the honest black-shirted arbiter for whose blood you are baying. He really is doing his best, and even though you think you could do better, you really, really, really couldn't.

I've got one of the best jobs in the world, which allows me to follow the team I love all over the country and get paid for it.

But interviewing Sammy McIlroy in the aftermath of Saturday's 5-0 thrashing at Bristol City was one of the lowest points of my professional career. Watching another human being suffer as much as Sammy did on Saturday evening was a hugely unpleasant experience. And the following day, seeing his quotes twisted and distorted by the national press didn't make the situation any better. Headlines such as: "McIlroy refuses to quit" do nothing to help.

The post-match interview is a horrendous job when a team is struggling and, as I've grown to admire and respect Sammy and Mark Lillis, the job has become even harder. But, as a supporter, I believe it is right for all of us to stand firmly behind the manager and trust him to steer us through our current crisis. During a remarkably frank and honest exchange after the game Sammy was big enough to admit to me: "This is the hardest situation I've ever been in, including my time with Northern Ireland. But we'll battle on through this -

Sammy is experiencing his toughest time in football



I'm going to get it right."

We have witnessed at first hand what can happen when managers are changed hastily, and it's Sammy Mac who has been left to pick up the pieces at Edgeley Park following six seasons of neglect. Successive inexperienced managers have been put in the hotseat and given a brief of achieving success on smaller and smaller budgets.

Sammy will have spent all week analysing Saturday's events at Ashton Gate, but there is no doubt in my mind that the vast majority of supporters would have picked exactly the same starting eleven as Sammy did. Goodwin back in the team, Beckett alongside Feeney, Jackman in the side, Hardiker at the back – on paper, it looked solid. But once those players cross the white line, there is very little a manager can do to influence their performance and the harsh reality is that too many players let him down on the day.

Comparisons with Sale Sharks are unhelpful as the two sports are totally different and Cheshire Sports are entitled to do whatever they like with the oval ball merchants. However, Sammy has identified a serious weakness in his side, at the heart of his defence, and must be allowed to rectify it. Some would argue it is a situation of his own making, but that argument is irrelevant whilst we are struggling at the wrong end of the table.

Ashley Williams has been a revelation since coming into the side last season, but the pressure on his young shoulders is ridiculous. The same applies to Lee Mair who is a newcomer to English football, whilst John Hardiker is still only 21. Sammy won't say it publicly, but he needs a big commanding centre half who can be a leader to the rest of the team (Mike Flynn, circa 1997!). Throwing money at a problem is rarely the right solution, but in this instance a certain level of investment is vital if County are to give themselves a fighting chance of climbing up the table.

So the plea to Cheshire Sport is simple – on this occasion, Back the Mac and let's turn this around. Don't believe rumours that Sammy has lost the dressing room – nothing could be further from the truth – but a dependable experienced campaigner in the side could make all the difference to the mood at Edgeley Park, and Brian Kennedy has the power to make it happen.

If you are very lucky, you will find yourself just behind them as the orchestra strikes up, which is your own fault really as they pitched their tents up a full 48 hours before the concert was due to begin.

In the Albert Hall itself, the professional promenader will be identifiable by being clothed head to foot in the Union Flag, right down to the socks and the revolving bow-tie. They will know all the words, they will sing all the words loudly, and they will know all the little traditional quirks like bringing out a row of handkerchiefs for everyone around them when a sad piece is played. You suspect that they may have been to every Promenade Concert for the past 30 years, and may even reside full time in the Albert Hall. They love singing about having an Empire and stifling rebellions and how Britain is best at just about everything apart from sport. Most of all, they are oblivious to the fact that everyone around them in that great auditorium, and indeed the millions watching at home are not, as they hope, saying "what an outrageous and truly splendid fellow – see his Union Jack hair!" Because we are actually saying "What a prat." Perhaps next year's event could be used to get all such people into the same confined space, and then a humane cull could be arranged. Just a thought.



Flashback

Continuing our occasional trips down Memory Lane we today turn the clock back 12 years to our first-ever trip to Wembley. More than 17,000 Hatters fans travelled to the Twin Towers in May 1992 for the Autoglass Trophy Final against fierce rivals Stoke City.

But, despite turning the famous old stadium into a cauldron of noise, the magnificent fans returned home disappointed when Mark Stein scored the only goal of the game for the Potters. Video evidence later showed that the linesman failed to flag Wayne Biggins offside when Stein netted his 68th-minute winner. County also had a perfectly good goal disallowed when Peter Fox, under pressure from Paul Wheeler, allowed Darren's cross to drop into the back of the net – the referee, incorrectly, ruled that Wheeler had fouled the Stoke 'keeper.

Apart from County's first appearance at Wembley in their, then, 109-year history the game also had two further milestones. Danny Bergara became the first South American to lead an English team out at Wembley and Andy Thorpe – a substitute for David Frain – made his 555th, and final, County appearance – a fitting place to end his glorious EP career.







On This Day in History

261 days into 2004, 104 days until 2005, 98 days until Christmas Day

And exactly 11 years since a memorable 2-1 victory over bitter rivals Burnley kept County in a Division Two automatic promotion place. On paper the game was a home banker; County had maximum points from three games at EP, Burnley had lost all three away from Turf Moor.

It was the Clarets, though, who took the lead on 27 minutes when a dreadful mix up between Neil Edwards and Micky Wallace allowed John Francis to walk the ball into an empty net.

Roared on by most of the 5,122 crowd the Hatters, according to the Stockport Express, "stormed forward in the second half with Edwards a lonely spectator."

A goal had to come and when it did it was a beauty. Darren Ryan ran across field before crossing the ball to Andy Preece who gave Marlon Beresford no chance.

And, with the minutes ticking away, Ryan turned match-winner when, with Burnley

watching County's big men at the far post, he nipped in to nod Peter Ward's cross past Beresford at the front stick.

The victory extended County's record to just one Edgeley Park defeat in 33 games, a sequence they would extend to 37 before a shock 2-0 reversal against Bristol Rovers on November 20th, 1993.

September 18th, 1993 saw Luton Town secure a fine point following a 0-0 draw at Middlesbrough in the (old) First Division. September 18th 1965 was also the date of our record 7-1 away win at Bradford City and, in 1937, a 1-0 victory over Manchester United here at Edgeley Park.

In the week before the United game the Stockport Express reported: "Accommodation will be taxed to its utmost capacity and fans are advised to be on the ground in good time as the gates are expected to be closed before the start of the game."

It was good advise. The match report in the Stockport Advertiser included this paragraph: "There were about 25,000 supporters but although the ground was by no means full the gates had to be closed well before kick off."

The game itself was settled by a goal 18 minutes into the second half. Bernard Oxley's shot hit a Reds' defender and bounced to Joe Mantle who scored from the rebound. Edgeley Park erupted.

And the win was no more than the Hatters deserved as the Advertiser described: "After the goal the Reds had to fight desperately to keep the score down. Even the most rabid supporter of United could not deny County the rights to the points."

The victory extended County's home record against the Heathens, as they were known in Stockport, to seven wins from nine games. The first game of that 1937-38 season actually saw Luton Town visit Edgeley Park for the battle of the champions – Division Three (North) v Division Three (South).

And those Town fans here today might be interested to learn that their predecessors

turned up in good numbers 67 years ago. The Stockport Express reported: "There was a good contingent from Bedfordshire; a somewhat noisy group on the stand side attired in straw head gear armed with rattles and making their presence felt before kick off."

And the Straw Plaiters were given something to really cheer when Dawes fired them in front after just 12 minutes.

But James Smailes equalised before half time and (Express), "inspired by this success and the roars of the crowd County now attacked almost incessantly."

And the pressure paid off with just five minutes remaining when Oxley scored a quite brilliant goal to secure a 2-1 win.

One of the plusses from our disappointing start to the season has been the form of Warren Feeney following his summer switch from Bournemouth.

Here's what the Northern Ireland striker had to say about his first club Leeds United, his country and all things Stockport County.

What's it like watching the likes of Harry Kewell and Alan Smith end up where they are now? Do you think it could have been you?

There are a lot of other players who I played with that can't find any work at all at the moment. At the end of the day I'm just happy where I am. I still keep in contact with the lads from Leeds and I try and catch as many games with them as I can. They are still good mates and I don't envy them at all.

How did you end up at Leeds?

I just got spotted from across the water. They asked me to come over on trial and I ended up signing a four-year deal.

Did you know that Paul Hart, your youth coach at Leeds, played for County?

I didn't. He was a really tough coach, though, and he played a major part when we won the FA Youth Cup.

Did you come close to playing for Leeds?

I was in the first team squad twice for games against Leicester and Man United but I was playing with a hernia problem for three months and it came to the stage where I couldn't carry on. I just had to stop playing and get the operation done.

Have you come close to scoring for Northern Ireland?

I've played against Spain, Cyprus and Liechtenstein and I've had a couple of chances. Against Spain I was just stood around star-struck, though, and swapped shirts at the end of the game with Fernando Hierro.

Lawrie Sanchez was at Ashton Gate on Saturday. Has he been in touch with you?

Lawrie has got his own ideas and he hasn't spoken to me. I'm more interested in doing well for County, though, and at the minute we all need to dig in ourselves and get us back up where we belong.

Did you watch Wales v Northern Ireland last week?

Yes. I thought the lads did very well, and the fans were brilliant. They did superb to dig in when they went down to nine men and showed a lot of spirit and passion and got a great result.

Do you talk about England and Ireland in the County dressing room?

There's probably more Irish lads than English! The banter is great in the dressing room and we all have a good laugh together.

Will you wear a green shirt at training if Ireland beat England?

(Laughs loudly). We'll just have to wait and see!

Did your superb goal at Radcliffe Borough in pre-season give you confidence?

All goals give you confidence, it doesn't really matter how well they go in. I'm happy with the start to the season I've had although I've hit the bar twice which means I could have been sitting on five goals. I can't complain at the minute, it's always good to get off to a good start, but if we can get the team winning that's more important.

What was it like scoring on your debut in front of the Cheadle End?

I got a superb reception. As soon as the ball came in I knew there was always going to be one winner. I knew I could get my head on it and I couldn't have got off to a better start. Unfortunately we conceded two late goals.

We took 1,500 to Blackpool, and you saw them down at Bournemouth last season as well. What do you make of the County fans?

They're extremely passionate. They wear their heart on the sleeve. We all wanted to get off to a good start but we haven't performed at the minute so we can expect a bit of grief as I used to give to my local team when they were playing badly back home. At the end of the day the County fans want the team to do well – we must all dig in.

A lot of people have said that you're too similar to Luke Beckett. Have you proved them wrong?

Luke's record stands for itself. He's scored goals for fun throughout his career and he still does. I think if we get the ball in the box we'll definitely score goals and I think we've showed that already.

What did you make of your £45,000 transfer fee?

I think Bournemouth wanted £150,000; I was hoping they got £15,000! It's all done and dusted now, though, and I've just got to concentrate on playing well for County.

What are your career highlights so far?





In the closing stages Tompos made a reaction save after a 30-yard Oakes effort took a deflection off Kevin Keigher.






