Southend United Manager Steve Tilson Brings You His Thoughts



WELCOME back to Roots Hall for tonight's FA Cup clash with Luton Town, which is our fourth home game in quick succession. So far, during that run, the results have gone in our favour and we will be hoping to produce another good performance to try and extend that run this evening.

It's going to be a tough test against Luton though - we all know that because they are a very good side who have made such a strong start to season in the Division above us.

They're top of the League One table right now and have won their last two games quite convincingly so I'm sure they will be coming here full of confidence for what should be a good game in front of another good crowd. It's the hardest game we could have had but we've been playing well lately too and have home advantage which is

always important. We beat Luton last year in the LDV Vans Trophy as well and, although that will count for nothing tonight, it shows that anything is possible in a one off cup tie. We've had six wins in a row here now and that's great because if you're going to have a successful season then it is always essential to win games on your own patch. We didn't start off too well at Roots Hall either but we seemed to have turned that around now and long may it continue! The last of those victories came last Saturday as we beat Oxford United 4-0, with all of our goals coming in the second half.

The first 45 minutes were a bit scrappy, we looked a bit edgy which was strange but Mark Gower netted with a well taken shot just after half time and that settled everyone down.

We went on from there to score three more but what was equally as pleasing was that we man-

aged to keep our first clean sheet since the Kidderminster game in September. That's why I was shouting at the defence right until the very end and made sure none of them went forward for the free kicks and corners we had in the final few minutes.

I really wanted that clean sheet and full credit for Bart Griemink as well because he came back into the side after a few months out with a knee injury to replace Darryl Flahavan who picked up a heel problem against Shrewsbury Town. Flaws was unable to play and nor was Ryan Clarke, who we have on loan from Bristol Rovers still, as he is out with a hip problem. That left Bart as our only senior keeper and we were forced to throw him into the action without having even played a reserve game. That was a bit of a worry to be honest but he came for crosses and looked ever so comfortable between

comfortable between the sticks during a game which saw Freddy Eastwood net another spectacular strike. He has done brilliantly for us since coming in and it was obviously a massive boost for us to sign him on a three year contract - especially when you consider just how much interest there was in him. Loads of clubs were after him but, being a local boy, he wanted to stay at Southend and he's fitted in well. He gets on well with the rest of the lads and, on the pitch, he is capable of getting a goal out of nothing which is always great for any team to have. He has now scored seven goals in six games I think and he is someone I think could go on and play at a higher level - hopefully with Southend United.

Alongside him Wayne Gray has been fantastic too - working his socks off and also working his way onto the score-sheet. He's made a number of goals too and I would have to say he would have been my pick for our player of the month as, since coming

back into the side, he has been on top, top form. As a result, things are looking good for us right now

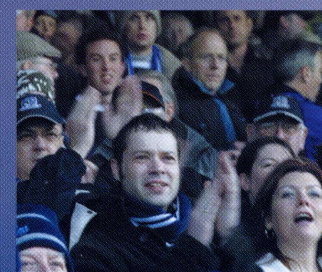
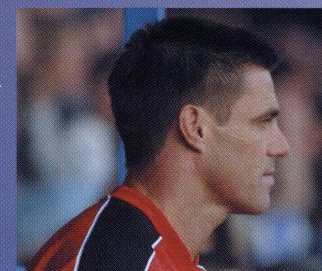
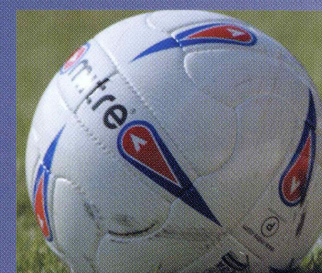
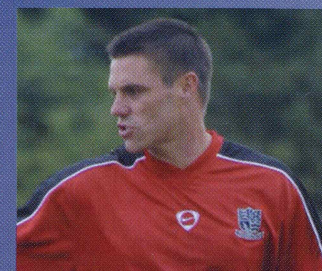
and when you look at the bench as see the likes of Mark Bentley, Tes Bramble, Lawrie Dudfield and Andy Edwards it shows just

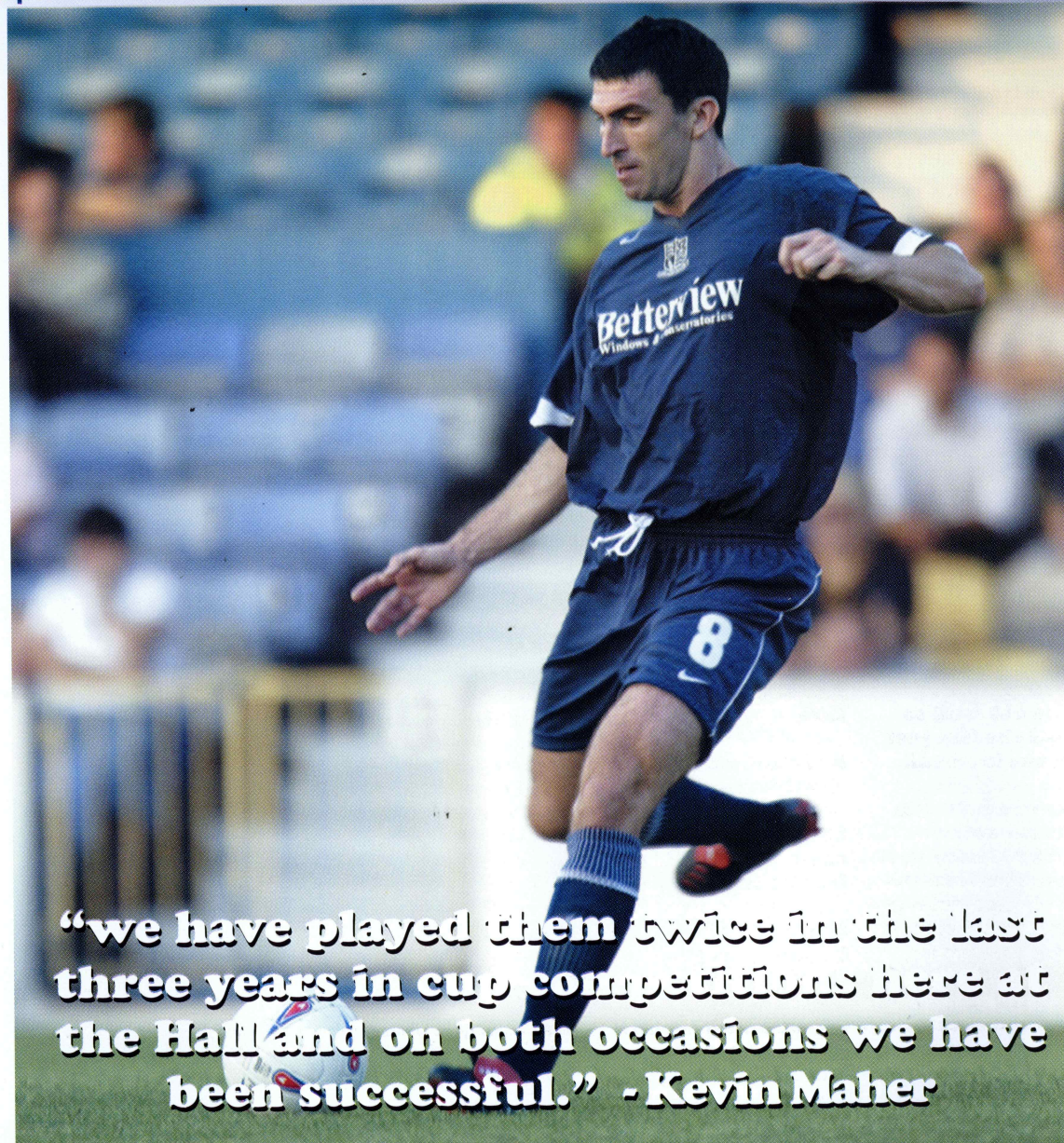

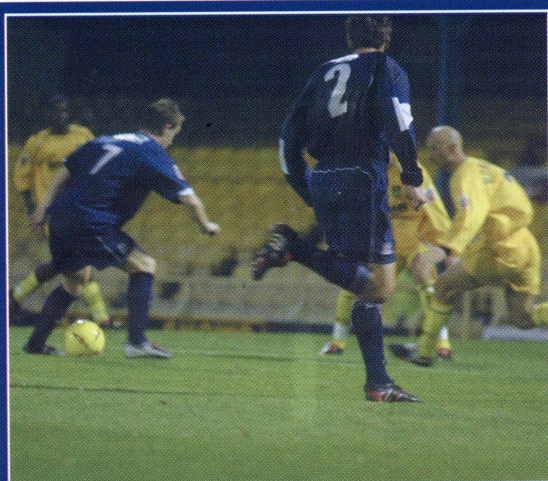

Southend United jumped two places to fifth in the League Two table as they overpowered Graham Rix's Oxford United side with a magnificent second-half display. Despite putting pressure on the Ox's throughout in the first-half the Blues were unable to break the deadlock, but just two minutes into the second period the Blues burst into the lead through Mark Gower. Steve Tilson's side continued to enjoy the majority of possession, but Oxford slowly began to put pressure upon the home side. A fantastic individual goal from new signing Freddy Eastwood extended the Blues advantage and began a spectacular final fifteen minutes in which Adam Barrett netted his sixth goal of the season before Lawrie Dudfield slotted home a ninetieth minute penalty kick. Despite an impressive 4-1 victory over Shrewsbury in

mid-week, Steve Tilson returned to the same starting line-up that faced Northampton Town last week excluding goalkeeper Darryl Flahavan who was forced to watch from the sidelines due to injury with Bart Griemink making a return to the first team. The Oxford United side contained three former Southend players with Leo Roget lining up in the heart of defence, whilst Tommy Mooney beating Mark Rawle to a place in front-line with the latter taking up a position on the substitute's bench. The game began slowly and it wasn't until the twentieth minute that the first chance on goal saw former Blues favourite Roget's header strike the crossbar from Matt Robinson's corner. Ten minutes later the visitors were forced to replace the impressive Steve Basham due to injury and this seemed to unsettle the

unsettle the U's formation.

Soon after Lewis Hunt went close with a header and sixty seconds later new signing Freddy Eastwood skipped past Robinson before delivering a low cross which 44 year old Oxford keeper Alan Judge could only palm into the path of Mark Gower. Unfortunately for the Blues winger his first effort was blocked by Roget and his second went high and wide of the target from seven yards.

Even though the Blues were beginning to take control of the match, it was Oxford who nearly went into the break with the advantage. The dangerous Robinson faced Blues custodian Bart Greimink one on one and slid the ball goalwards past the on rushing keeper. Fortunately for the home side Che Wilson had read the situation and was able to clear off the line. Just two minutes into the second-half the Blues were finally able to take the lead as Wayne Gray's shot was blocked at the near post by Judge allowing Duncan Jupp to collect the ball on the right-wing. Jupp delivered a cross from deep that was met by the head of Dave Mackay, but the Oxford United man was unable to make sufficient contact with the ball as his attempted clearance fell to the feet of Mark Gower. Gower controlled the ball before sending a drilled right-footed effort into the bottom-right corner of the

net leaving Judge helpless in the Ox's goal.

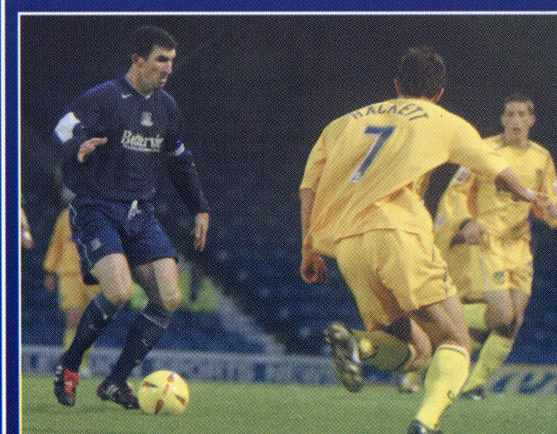
From then on it was one way traffic and even former Blues forward Mark Rawle couldn't alter the scoreboard. It was no surprise when the Blues doubled their advantage with one of the goals of the season. Freddy Eastwood, who had signed a three year contract two days previous, appeared to be dribbling away from the goal as he held off three Oxford players to race from the left-side of the Oxford penalty area to the right. As Eastwood entered the penalty area he turned quickly to push the ball onto his left-foot before unleashing a phenomenal strike that flew into the top-left corner of the net leaving Alan Judge stranded in the Oxford goal.

In the eighty-fifth minute Adam Barrett headed home his sixth goal of the season from a Kevin Maher free-kick and in injury time, Lawrie Dudfield, who had replaced Eastwood only minutes earlier, won and converted a penalty to make the scoreline 4-0. Oxford's Jon Ashton was sent off for two bookable offences including one for the penalty incident.

A tremendous victory for the Blues that has seen them rise to 5th in the table their highest League position of the campaign.

Following a 2-2 draw in normal time, the scores remained the same throughout extra time, and in the dreaded penalty shoot-out, Max Porter and Billy Bignall were the unfortunate Southend players the visitor's, whose Senior side plays in the Nationwide Conference South, ran out spot-kick victors, 7-6.

Boss Ross Maclaren had to field a weakened side with Stuart Williams, Ben Price, Joe Ilett, David Bryan and goalkeeper Nick Morgan all ineligible as third year scholars. Morgan's place between the sticks was occupied by trialist Mark Mason whilst James Lawson took Price's captain's armband.

It was the home side who started the brightest, Lawson firing a free-kick into the arms of Chris Sinclair before Tommy Byrne was denied by a superb Luke Adams block, whilst Joe North zipped an effort off target after a neat run.

However, it was the visitor's from Surrey who grabbed the lead on 13 minutes. A perfectly flighted Grant Hearne

free kick picking out the head of Steve Douglas who confidently nodded past Mason. (0-1)

Southend were back level within a minute however. Speedy wide-man Kurt Husnu raced down the left flank before delivering a low cross which was stabbed home by North from close range. (1-1)

Southend began to dominate as they looked to go ahead in the tie, and Byrne fired straight across the face of goal from a tight angle before Lawson's dipping 20 yard free kick dropped just over the top.

Young striker Marcel van Rensburg saw a fierce effort blocked by Alex McCay before Mason was called into action to push a 25 yard Douglas free kick over the bar.

Ever-dangerous front-man Byrne had already fired into the side-netting shortly after the restart, before the Shrimpers stole the lead on 56 minutes, Lawson's cheeky 35 yard shot some squirming beneath the dive of Sinclair and into the net. (2-1)

Maclaren's men then created chances to double their advantage. Oliver Stroud slid a shot inches wide of the upright and Stroud's header from a North corner almost found its way in, but James Hamsher managed to bundle the ball clear

off the line.

With 69 minutes played however, the U's were mightily unlucky not to grab an equaliser when Douglas's driven shot crashed back off the post before Russell Newbery could only hit the rebound against the other post.

The leveller did arrive on 82 minutes though, a loose ball falling to Dalziel, who made no mistake in smashing the ball home from eight yards. (2-2)

Following the equaliser, there were few chances for either side to win the tie, but Southend's best chance fell to Bryne who shot wide from a tight angle having taken the ball past Sinclair.

Evening Echo's Chris Phillips chats to

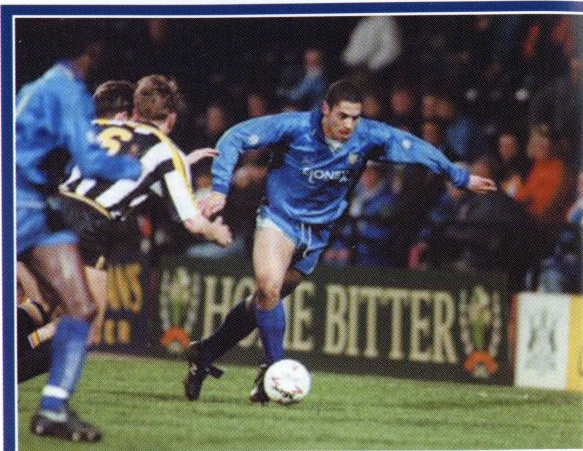
HIS colourful and controversial career may well have endured a number of turbulent twists and turns but for many Stan Collymore remains the greatest ever Southend United striker. 18 goals in 33 games during the early 1990s secured Division One status for a resurgent Shrimpers side.

And, having virtually saved the Seaside from relegation single handedly, Collymore's spectacular goal-getting antics also won a place in the hearts of the Roots Hall faithful as he embarked on what proved to be a rocky road to the very top of the Premiership. "I look back at being with Southend with such fondness - for a few different reasons," admitted Collymore. "It was the first club where I had a real opportunity to play in the first team and I scored twice on my debut against Notts County. Right from day one the fans were

so supportive towards me and there was just such a feel good factor around the whole place." As a result, Blues soon began to see the very best of Collymore as he continually terrorised opposing centre backs with his immense pace and power.

"It was a great, great chapter of my life," said the former England International. "Southend isn't obviously a Manchester United - there are no expectations of winning the Champions League every year but, in turn, I think that brings genuine appreciation when the club gets some success - like when we managed to stay up on the last day of the season against Luton."

Another impressive display from Collymore saw the Shrimpers triumph 2-1 against the Hatters that May afternoon in a game which, to this day, remains one of the striker's favourite



ever matches. "It was one of the biggest highlights of my whole career," he said. "We had been living on a knife edge to avoid relegation for most of the season and had been playing catch up to make sure we didn't go down. We had to beat Luton to stay up though and we did, three to four thousand fans ran onto the pitch and I will never ever forget the looks on their faces. "It was a lovely spring day and the match meant more to them than a top side winning the Premiership. I've seen both ends of the spectrum in football so I'm

entitled to know and realise that that was a very special day." But, 11 years on, Collymore was again treated to a hero's reception last weekend as he returned to Southend to promote his newly published autobiography - titled "Tackling My Demons." "The reaction I got was really amazing," he said. "So many people came up to me to say thank you for my contributions towards Southend - which, when you consider I was at the club for half a season, is great. "People came in with shirts from when I

"People came in with shirts from when I played in pristine condition and hopefully that's a sign of how fondly I'm regarded at the club. "It's not just about what I have done for them though because the affect they've had on me will last a lifetime as well."

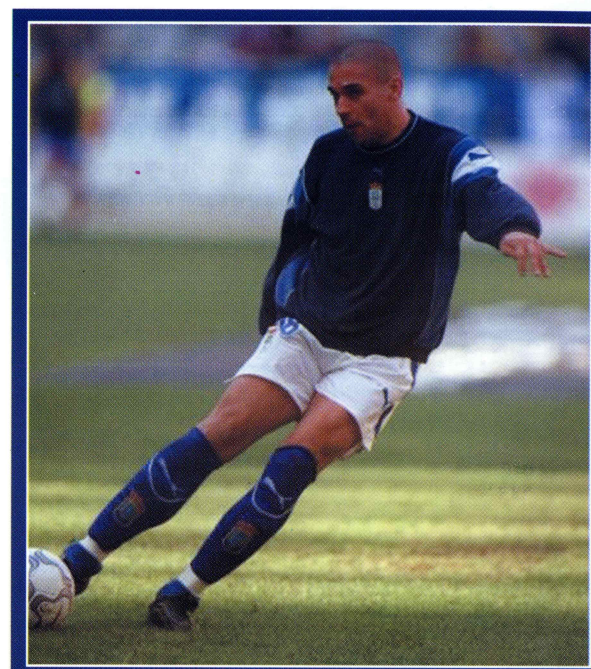
And that enthusiasm for the Essex outfit is what catapulted Collymore into contention for the vacant Roots Hall hot-seat at this stage of last season following the dismissal of Steve Wignall.

"I still look out for Southend's result every week, of course I do and I'm so glad they are doing well again," he confirmed. "Last year at one point, it looked a bit worrying and that's when I decided I wanted to help the club. It wasn't just the manager's job I was interested in though - it was just important that Southend stayed in the League and I want-

ed to help them in any way I could. In fact if they asked to me to come down and be a cheerleader for a couple of hours I think I would have done it." But, despite being eventually overlooked in favour of his former Southend teammate Steve Tilson, Collymore revealed he was not angered by the Blues' board decision.

"I wasn't disappointed I didn't get the job because I just want the club to be moving in the right direction and I think they are now," said the 33-year-old.

"We had several meetings with Ron Martin and he was up for it, but they went for Tilly in the end - a local lad and someone who had been in and around the club for quite a while "I don't have any desires to be a manager at all really to be honest though. My hair is still fairly dark and that's how I'd like it to stay. It was only because it was Southend that I was interested but I



guess it wasn't the right time for me."

However Collymore - who added Steve Walsh and ex Shrimpers midfielder David Martin would have made up his managerial team - is still keen to comeback to the coastal club after pursuing another of his ambitions. "After the book tour is over I am going over to the States and I want to give acting a real go. I

have a coach lined up who has worked with a number of big names," he said. "But I must say I would be very disappointed if I didn't come back to Southend one day in some capacity to help try and move the club forward."

RON BAYNHAM: England international goalkeeper who was a key figure as Luton Town were FA Cup finalists in 1959. He impressed with Worcester City before moving to Kenilworth Road in November 1951 and contested a first-team slot with fellow England keeper Bernard Streten as Luton gained top-flight status for the first time in 1954-55. Missing just one match in both 1955-56 and 1957-58, he was capped three times and also represented the Football League. He made 388 League appearances for the Hatters until injury ended his career in May 1965 and subsequently worked as an interior decorator in Bedfordshire.

KIRK STEPHENS: Attacking right-back who was ever-present in Luton Town's 1981-82 Second Division title triumph. Initially with Nuneaton Borough, he helped them finish Southern League runners-up in 1974-75 and followed David Pleat to Kenilworth Road in June 1978. He was voted Luton's 'Player of the Year' in 1978-79 and 1983-84, scoring twice in 227 League games for the Hatters before moving to Coventry City in exchange for Ashley Grimes in August 1984. Later rejoining Nuneaton as player-manager after a knee injury ended his top-flight career, he also had a spell at Barnet and worked for his father's building firm.

MITCHELL THOMAS: Versatile England U-21 international left-back who had two spells at Luton Town. Born locally, he signed professional at Kenilworth Road in August 1982 and starred as Luton reached the FA Cup semi-finals in 1984-85. He fol-

SYD OWEN: Long-serving England international centre-half who skippered Luton Town in the 1959 FA Cup final. Signing professional for Birmingham City in October 1945, he moved to Luton in June 1947 and starred in their 1951-52 FA Cup run, 1952-53 promotion near-miss and 1954-55 promotion success. He was 'Footballer of the Year' in 1958-59 and netted three goals in 388 League games before becoming Luton's manager for a year in May 1959. Subsequently Leeds United's chief coach under Don Revie until October 1975, he then coached at Birmingham, Hull City and Manchester United. He died in August 1998.

MAL DONAGHY: Northern Ireland international central defender who gained a club record 58 caps while at Luton Town. He moved to Kenilworth Road from Larne in June 1978 and was ever-present as Luton won the Second Division title in 1981-82 and were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85. Voted 'Player of the Year' in 1985-86, he was an FA Cup semi-finalist again in 1987-88 and starred in that sea-

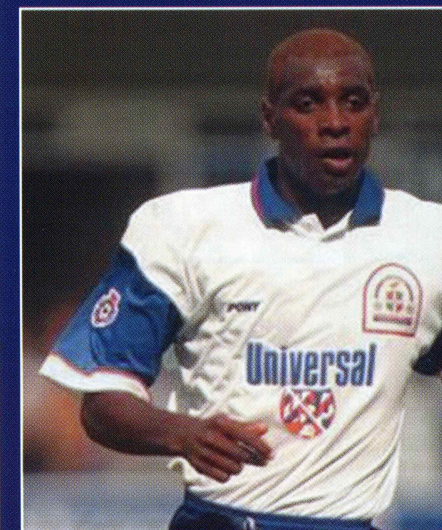

Nick Hart Takes A Look At The 12th November

The Blues first tasted competitive action on today's date 83 years ago and ironically against tonight's opponents Luton Town in a division three south fixture. Let's hope the result is not an omen for tonight as the Hatters triumphed on that occasion 1-0.

Six years later and again in division three south the Blues travelled to Devon to take on Plymouth Argyle. Unfortunately we were again defeated, this time 3-2, with both our goals coming from Billy Hick.

1932 saw a goal less draw at Northampton in front of 6,474 fans and six years later we at last enjoyed success when we beat Bristol City 2-0. Sid Bell scored both United's goals in front of 5,957 fans at the Stadium. The Blues did not taste action on today's date for another 11 years when again they were victorious. The 1949 visit of Torquay saw a 2-0 home success with another two-goal hero, this time Freddie Morris.

The run of wins continued in 1955, the Blues' first season at their new and current home Roots Hall. Southampton were the visitors and 14,000 fans saw United win 2-1 thanks to goals from Kevin Baron and John McGuigan in a division

three south encounter.

1960 saw United in action again this time in a division three game at Roots Hall against

a win. Six years later and a comfortable 3-0 win over Lincoln City was enjoyed at Roots Hall, Ray Smith (2) and Derek Woodley the scor-

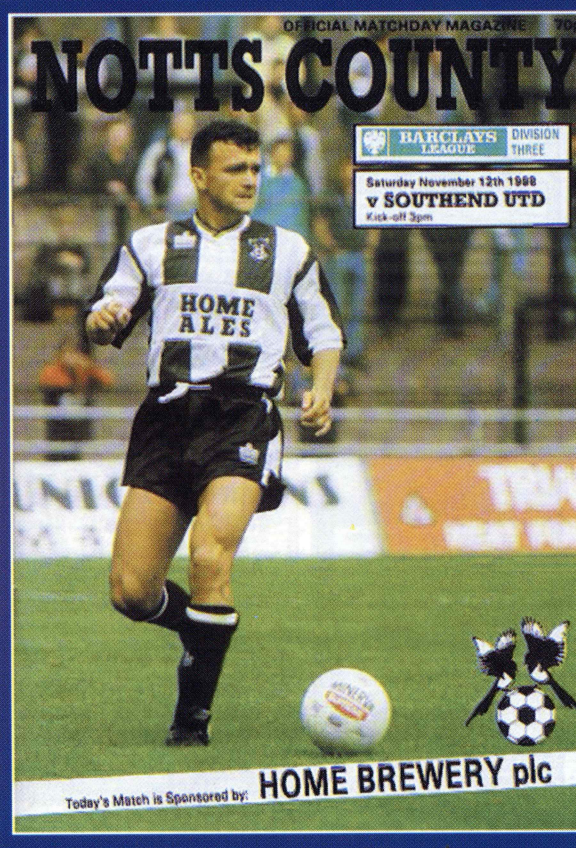
game in 1971 in a season that would see Southend promoted. Bill Garner (2) and Gary Moore scored in front of 10,107 fans at Roots Hall.

1976 and another emphatic home win. This time 4-1 against Bradford City with Stuart Parker grabbing a hat-trick and Steve Goodwin adding a fourth goal. A year later and our good run on today's date came to end when we lost 2-0 up at Darlington in front of only 2,337 fans at Feethams.

Gary Mills scored for the home side while David Crown scored our goal from the penalty spot though the season would end in relegation from division three. Six years later and we were in what is now known as the Championship. A visit to Vicarage Road saw Watford beat us 1-0 thanks to a Lee Nogan goal.

Our final action was five years ago when in a division three match the Blues, under Alan Little, lost 2-1 at home to Hull City with Mark Beard scoring our consolation. 4,940 fans saw the action.

A look at the Blues Second string

Southend United were left without a fixture this week as the build-up to the Essex Senior Cup third round tie withy Brentwood Town continues.

The Shrimpers face the Essex Senior League outfit, who have battled their way through two rounds, including a hard-fought win over Saffron Walden Town in round two, at Roots Hall on Monday night, and just two days later tackle Crawley Town in a rearranged fixture, also in southeast Essex.

Two days ago you may have been expecting to see Blues facing Reading at Roots Hall, but a complete deluge of encounters on the hallowed turf, including the FA Youth Cup first round game, has meant that this Pontin's Holidays Combination fixture has had to be postponed for the time being. News of the new date will appear in this column as and when it

is announced.

You may remember that the last second-string fixture was over a fortnight ago, and it was a first win in the Combination for over eighteen months. The game was also important as it saw Jay Smith's first appearance in a Southend shirt for nearly nine months. Smith completed 84 minutes, but will be hoping to go six better against Town in three days time.

This is as good a time as any to appraise the role of reserve team football in what has so far been a highly successful campaign for the Seasiders as a whole. Che Wilson and Darryl Flahavan have possibly been the most high profile transfers from second-string to first eleven, with both commanding a League Two spot since earning their chance in the team.

However, it is two other players that have made less than a handful of appear-

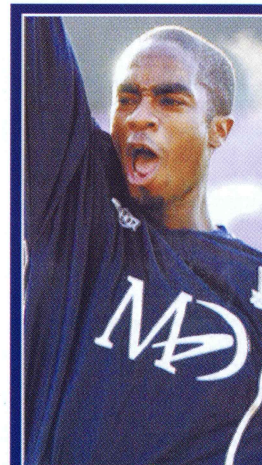
ances in the Combination that have had the greatest success. Adam Barrett was imperious at Worthing in a 1-1 draw with Brighton & Hove Albion, and it was enough to get him a stab at the big time - and boy did he take it! Six goals since then and a strong presence at the heart of the defence have inspired United up to fifth in the table.

But it is the seven strikes in just six games from Freddy Eastwood that have really caught the headlines. Just three Shrimpers supporters saw his first appearance for a Blues representative side, though, against Millwall Reserves at the New Den. He looked sharp then, and scored the predictable goal in a 2-1 before again netting in the match against Hornchurch in a behind closed doors friendly.

The Senior Cup should see the likes of Smith, Nicky Nicolau, Andy

Edwards, Jimmy Corbett, Lawrie Dudfield and Tesfaye Bramble have a chance to shine, as well as the goalkeeper that Tilson chooses to leave out today. Let's hope that whoever plays helps Blues battle through to the fourth round.

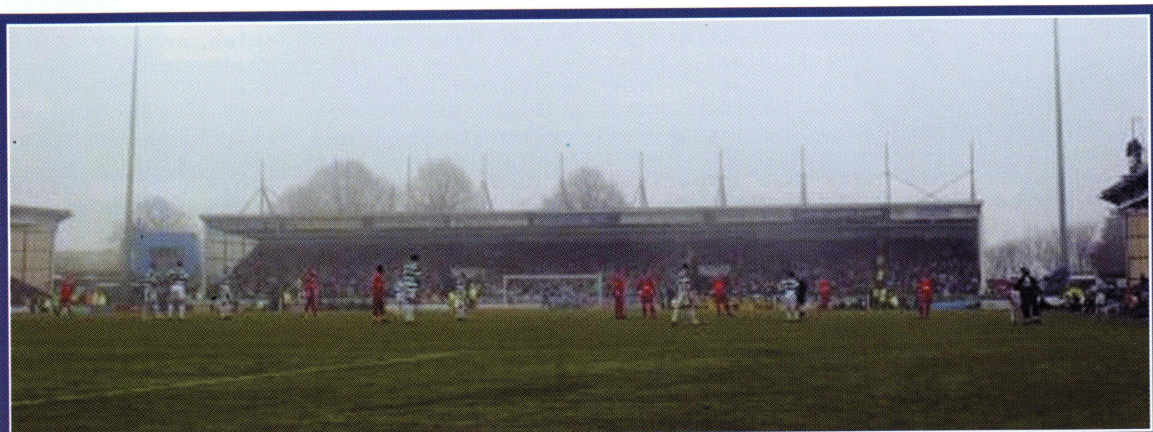

BY ROAD : Take A13 out of Southend to the M25 and head clockwise over the Dartford Crossing and continue to junction 12 (M3). Take the M3 westbound to junction 8 (A303) and follow the A303 past Andover, Stonehenge and Mere to the Cartgate roundabout. Take the A3088 towards Yeovil and continue for about 9 miles until you reach a roundabout on the outskirts of town. Turn left and continue straight on, crossing a number of roundabout. After passing the

entrance to Asda, take the next left for the ground. There is a car-park at the ground (charge : nowt) and plenty of street-parking. Distance : 145 miles - allow 3 hours.

BY RAIL : Services run by South West Trains Ltd. leave London Waterloo for Yeovil Junction and take about 2/ hours. Both stations - Yeovil Junction and Pen Mill Junction - are on the opposite side of town and it's best to get a taxi.

WHERE TO DRINK : A large marquee outside of the ground has been set up as a make shift beer

tent. Away fans in colours are not allowed in but if you are in plain clothes you should be OK.

There are three pubs within about 10-15 minutes walk of the ground, 'The Bell', 'The Arrow' and 'Brewsters'. The Arrow Pub is located in quite a spacious estate, to find this pub, from the ground car park, walk back up the road past the ground to the top of it and turn right. At the end of this road, turn left onto the main road and after a short distance take the first right. Go straight down this road through the new looking residential area and after

about ten minutes of walking, you will see a clearing on your right and just beyond this there are some shops and the Arrow pub in the middle.

WHAT'S IT LIKE : Away fans are situated in the Copse Road open terrace at one end of the ground. This is uncovered, so hope for a dry day. Up to 1,750 supporters can be housed in this area. Additionally around 300 seats are allocated to away fans in the Bartlett Stand. As this stand is covered, this may be a better bet, especially if the weather is bad.

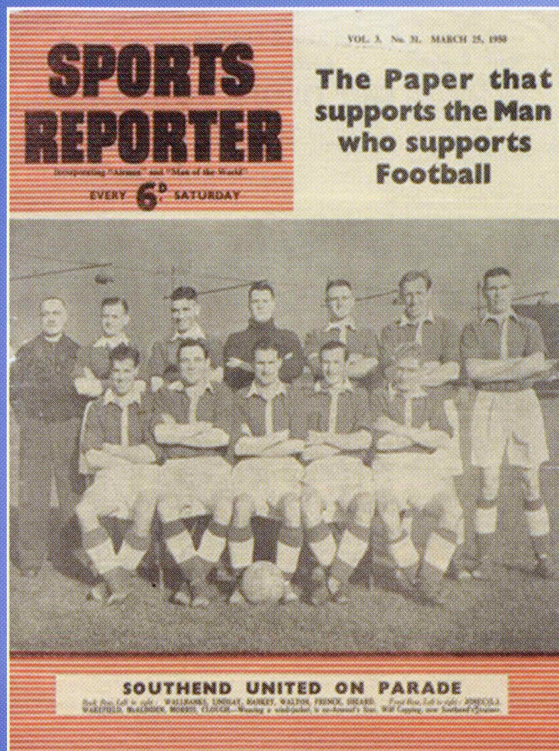
100 years of

Robert Craven Takes A Look At The Man In The Middle's Career

An old friend is back amongst the officials for this FA Cup first round clash with Luton Town, but Mr. T. Kettle has been left 'on the bench' as he acts as the fourth official, with Mr. R. Beeby the main man with the whistle.

Kettle, you may remember, was the man charged with refereeing the First Round encounter with Canvey Island last season, and he was roundly criticised as he sent Mark Warren off for a second bookable offence in a fractious replay at Park Lane. Blues still fought through though, Jay Smith hitting a double, including a last-minute winner, in a 2-1 win.

Beeby, from Northamptonshire, is now in his sixth season as part of the Football League panel, and has booked 35 and sent off six so far this season in just thirteen matches. It will be his second visit to a League Two ground, having booked five in

Yeovil Town's 5-1 win over Chester City. His last match was more mundane a week ago on Tuesday as he went through the game without booking a soul as Cardiff City thrashed West Ham United 4-1 at Ninian Park. Brighton & Hove Albion's 1-0 triumph over Leeds United was a much more tempestuous affair. Clark Carlisle's own goal gave the hosts at the Withdean Stadium the three points against the fallen giants, for whom both Matthew Kilgallon and Paul Butler were dismissed in the last two minutes for second bookable offences.

Southend supporters will have fond memories of Mr. Beeby's last trip to the south-east Essex coastline. Leon Constantine and Duncan Jupp were both placed in the book, but that was no consolation for visitors Queens Park Rangers in the area semi-final of the LDV Vans Trophy in January. Constantine, a Steven

Clark wonder-goal and a Drewe Broughton double handed United an incredible 4-0 win over the Second Division pace-setters. In the year as a whole, 35 matches yielded a round hundred bookings and ten red cards.

Beeby came under intense pressure at the Fitness First Stadium (or Dean Court to older readers) as AFC Bournemouth claimed for handball every time the ball struck a Blues hand in the Third Division match there two seasons ago. Stephen Purches' eighteen-yard header won the game for the Cherries, Gavin Strachan was given his only Shrimpers caution in the game.

SOUTHEND United continued their recent run of fine form with a resounding 4-0 victory over Oxford at Roots Hall last Saturday. A series of fine second half strikes secured another three points for the spirited Shrimpers but it was again the sublime skills of striker Freddy Eastwood which helped Steve Tilson's

side climb even higher up the League Two standings.

The former Grays Athletic goal-getter has transformed the Seasiders into serious contenders for promotion with his awesome abilities in attack – scoring seven goals in six games. And his latest excellent effort secured victory for a Blues

side who are simply buzzing at the moment. Gone are the days of the coastal club failing to convert their chances as, in Eastwood, the Essex outfit currently boast potentially the best striker at this level.

The Basildon based hot-shot continually carves out opportunities of his own in a mesmeric manner which has not been seen in a Southend shirt for many, many seasons.

But, even more encouragingly, it is not just Eastwood who is on song for the Shrimpers right now as Messrs Gower, Maher, Gray and Barrett have produced a succession of stylish and superb performances. Gower and Barrett also worked their way onto the score-sheet against the luckless U's, who twice hit the woodwork, but it was the latter's display at the centre of the Southend defence which played a huge part in helping the home-side keep their first clean sheet for

eight games.

Now the Seasiders must consistently display that solidity as they face a challenging run of fixtures which will sternly examine their chances of finishing inside the top seven sides. On current form though, Blues are capable of brushing aside any team at League Two level as they boast that something special up their sleeves – the Freddy factor!

Following the match against Oxford Echo reporter Chris Phillips spoke to the man creating all the excitement at Roots Hall at the moment.

"I really wanted to get a goal after sorting out my transfer just a couple of days before the match," said Eastwood who has now netted seven goals in six games for the Essex outfit. "So when I scored it was great to see it go in and I'd have to say it was one of the best I've ever got."

And Eastwood added he was thrilled his excellent effort had again helped the resurgent Seasiders secure another three points and a sixth successive home victory.

"The first half was quite tight but the gaffer gave us confidence to play at half-

time and that showed after the break," said the 21-year-old. "We got the first goal quite early but when the second went in we were all over them and could have had a few more. It was great to get a win of any kind though and hopefully we can keep this run going now for the supporters."

The former Grays forward has already

become a firm fans favourite with the Shrimpers faithful and again received a vociferous standing ovation as he left the field.

"The crowd here at Southend are unbelievable," said Eastwood. "They're chanting my name and they seem to like me – at the minute anyway!"

Blues boss Steve Tilson was also quick

to praise Eastwood's performance as the goal-getter immediately began to repay his five figure transfer fee against a U's side who had defender Jon Ashton sent off in stoppage time for a second bookable offence.

"Freddy's goal was absolutely unbelievable," said Tilson. "But that's the type of thing he's capable of and that's why he is a great signing for us. He helped us get a good result – even though we did start the game a bit edgy but we deserved it in the end." And the Wickford born chief added he was chuffed to have kept a clean sheet – the coastal club's first since late September.

"That was another big bonus for us and that's why I was shouting for the defenders to stay back for the free kicks we were getting at the end," he said.

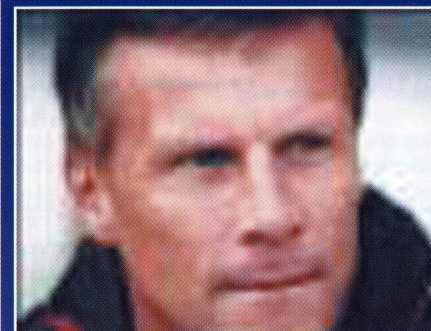

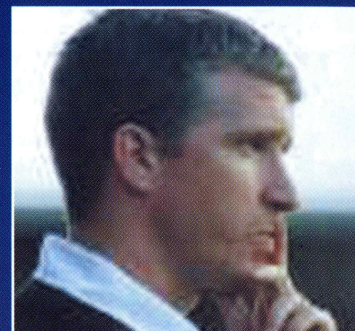

ADAM LOCKE

Fiery, versatile midfielder Adam Locke made a significant contribution as Southend United won promotion in 1990-91.

A former Crystal Palace junior, he signed professional in June 1988 but failed to secure a first-team slot at Selhurst Park and joined Southend in August 1990. He made his League debut in the 1-0 victory at Mansfield Town the following month and regularly featured as a substitute, scoring twice in the 4-1 win at Swansea City in March 1991. Helping Southend to reach the FA Cup fifth round in 1991-92, he netted four goals in 73 League outings prior to joining Colchester United in September 1994 after a loan spell.

He helped Colchester to qualify for the Third Division play-offs in 1995-96 and moved to Bristol City in July 1997. An influential figure in their 1997-98 promotion success, he joined Luton Town in August 1999 but was unable to prevent relegation in 2000-01 and injury problems forced him to miss almost the entire 2001-02 promotion campaign. He scored five times in 62 League outings for today's opponents before moving to Hornchurch in September 2002.

CHRIS TURNER

Central defender Chris Turner was one of several experienced players signed during Peter Morris' reign at Roots Hall.

Signing professional for Peterborough United in November 1969, he was a key figure as they won the Fourth Division title in 1973-74 and was three times ever-present. He also skippered successive Cup runs and moved to Luton Town in July 1978, making a significant contribution as the Hatters reached the League Cup fifth round in 1978-79. Netting five goals in 30 Second Division games for today's opponents, he joined New England Teamen in May 1979.

He returned from the United States for loan spells at Cambridge United and Swindon Town, rejoining Cambridge in October 1980. Moving to Southend in October 1983, he scored twice in 22 Third Division outings while at Roots Hall. He was appointed manager of Cambridge United in January 1986 and laid the foundations for their meteoric rise under John Beck before resigning in January 1990. Becoming manager of Peterborough United in January 1991, he plotted two promotion campaigns and then had a spell as their chief executive.

By the time the Grecians visited Roots Hall for this Friday night encounter 33 years ago the Blues ultimately successful promotion campaign was gathering speed. We went into the game against 17th placed Exeter fourth in the league having won six of the eight league games played at Roots Hall. The most recent of these was a narrow 1-0 victory over Barrow in front of 12,426 fans though our most recent game had seen us lose 3-1 at Workington..

Manager Arthur Rowley picked the following team for the game: John Roberts, Ray Terner, Alex Smith, Dave Elliot, Brian Albeson, Joe Jacques, Terry Johnson, Billy Best, Bill Garner, Gary Moore and Bernie Lewis. Sub: Peter Taylor.

Exeter, who were managed at the time by player manager John Newman, arrived in Essex having only won once on their travels a 1-0 win at Cambridge and had leaked 30 goals

in their 16 league games to date.

A crowd of over 10,000 were inside the ground and the majority were celebrating after just 11 minutes when Gary

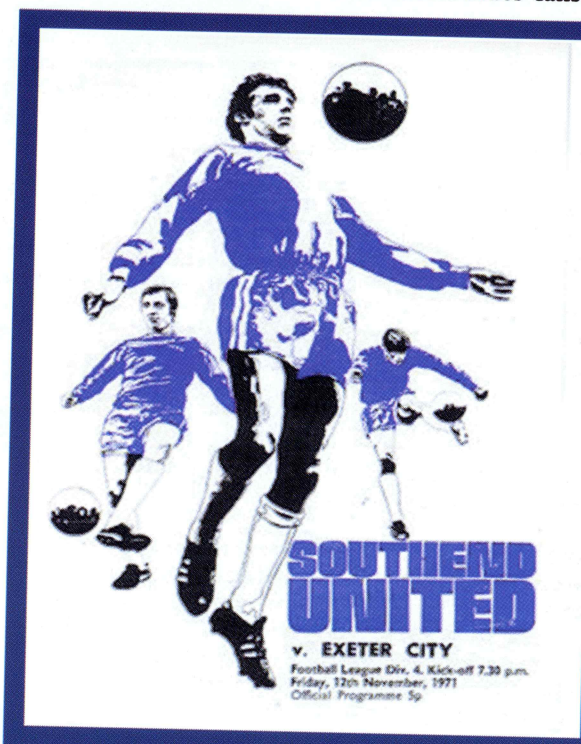
was no addition to the score before the break but already it seemed the points would be destined for Southend.

Despite a number of near misses Blues' fans

had to settle for a point in the return fixture at St James' Park in March when the game ended goal less. That match was followed by a run of six successive league victories during a spell of just two defeats in 20 games. At one point it looked like the championship would be won but a crucial 2-1 home defeat to Cambridge when 'keeper Derek Bellotti broke his collarbone and was replaced in goal by Peter Taylor meant we had to settle for runners-up spot behind Grimsby.

However, the achievement was Southend's first promotion in any league since elevation to the first division of the southern league in 1912-13. Garner hit 25 league goals and Billy Best 19 as we won 18 home league games scoring 56 goals in the process. Aston Villa, who we had knocked out of the F.A. Cup, won the third division title while Derby County were first division champions. Tonight's opponents, Luton Town, finished the season in 13th place in division two.

Steve Tilson's signing of Mark Bentley in January came as a surprise to most Southend fans. The Shrimpers boss paid out a nominal fee to Dagenham & Redbridge, but with Kevin Maher, Jay Smith (although the diminutive midfielder was carrying a knock) and Lewis Hunt all in decent form at the time, many supporters felt that cover in the middle of the park was not as urgently needed as other areas of the pitch.

Indeed, despite making his debut immediately against Doncaster Rovers, Bentley's first few performances in a Southend shirt were fair-

ly ordinary, and before long the former Aldershot midfielder was on the substitutes bench. As it turned out, it appeared that the adaptation to full time football was the reason. When Bentley won his place back in the team following a nasty injury to Smith in February, it slowly became apparent that the energetic Hertford-born man was brought in to do more than just warm the substitutes bench.

Standing at 6ft 2ins, Bentley possessed a physical presence that offered something different to the midfield. It soon became clear that Bentley's game was based around hard running from box to box, and his bursts into the area to

join the attack were a factor in an upturn in form by the Seaside over the last few months of the season.

The 26-year-old had gained a reputation at his former clubs for getting on the scoresheet, and a priceless headed goal against Boston United in early March helped Southend to a crucial win as they pulled themselves away from the drop zone. By the end of the season, Bentley had won the fans over and had cemented his place in the centre of the park alongside captain Kevin Maher.

The only surprise was that he failed to score more often, his willingness to burst forward from midfield adds another attacking dimension to the Southend attack, and this became more evident still at the start of the current campaign.

Surprisingly left on the bench for the opening day after sustaining a knock in pre-season, he came back into the side for the trip to Lincoln and was the pick of the visiting side as they earned a 1-1 draw. Bentley's performance in the Carling Cup defeat against West Ham was amongst his finest for the club thus far, and he came within inches of scoring what would have been a sensational equal-

ising goal when his shot struck the side netting in front of the massed Southend support behind the goal.

His second goal for Southend followed shortly against Wycombe, a glancing header from a right wing cross, but a sending off against Colchester, which remains one of the most mystifying decisions I have ever seen, was incredibly upheld, and he was forced to miss the matches against Boston, Swansea and Scunthorpe, two of which ended in victory and all of which saw Lewis Hunt adapt seamlessly into a midfield position.

Hence, rather unfortunately for Bentley, the number 9 has been on the bench ever since. Even a fine sidefooted strike against Shrewsbury in the LDV Vans Trophy last week was not enough to win his place back from Hunt, who has grabbed the opportunity with both hands.

It is testament to the strength of the Southend squad that a player of Bentley's ability is being kept on the bench. What Steve Tilson will do when Jay Smith returns is anyone's guess, but as the manager himself will admit, it is a nice problem to have.

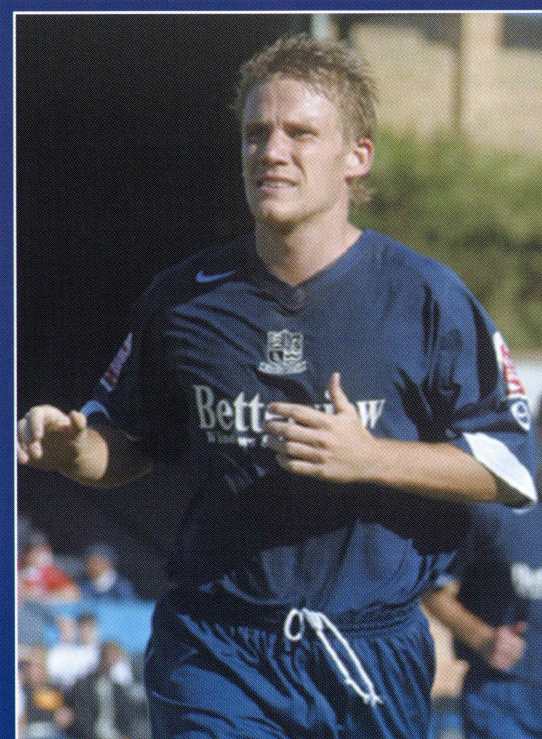

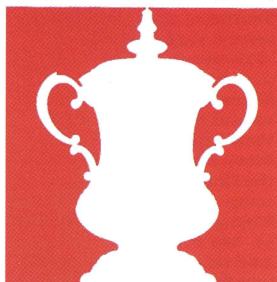

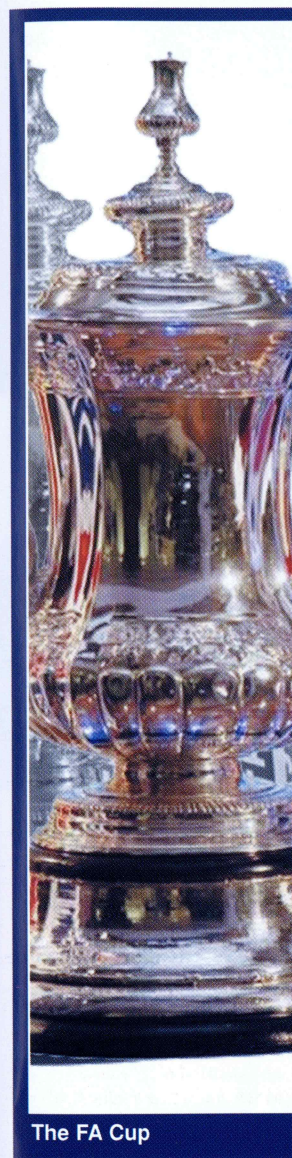

Matt Walker looks back fondly

I will let you into a secret of mine, a brief chapter of my private life: namely, Southend United have mended my broken heart.

Friday 16th November 2001 is not one of my happier days. Although I had been dating a young lady for a month, it had been a turbulent relationship at best. Whilst there was lots of chemistry between us, our personalities were poles apart. And so, that fateful Friday, we met in pub and agreed to call it a day.

Thus, with a heavy heart, I trudged off to Roots Hall in the vain pursuit, so I thought, of something to take my mind off the previous night. The game in question was the first round of the FA Cup, which saw us entertain league high-fliers, Luton Town.

Roots Hall was filled with the sort of crackling atmosphere that one often associates with the Cup and, as referee Barry Knight blew for kick-off, a crescendo of noise rose from all ends of the ground – and promptly stayed at an elevated level throughout the match.

The first incident happened on 36 minutes when, following a fluent

Luton move, Adrian Forbes put the Hatters ahead. The North Bank bellowed its approval; however, the other three stands retorted with a salvo of singing for the Blues – and sure enough, on the stroke of half-time, Mark Rawle pulled us level.

The second half saw Southend attacking the South Bank. Rawle and Bramble were in inspired form and, as so often that season, linked up on 56 minutes for Tes to put the Blues ahead. Although the goal was met with the customary Roots Hall roar, it was clear that Luton were not out of it.

However, Luton's equaliser – through Brkovic – remains one of the most contentious goals I have ever witnessed at Southend. The ball was floated into the area. The 5' 8" Brkovic and the 6' 4" Leon Cort watched the ball sail overhead... until Brkovic placed both hands firmly into Cort's back, pushed him over, and popped the ball into the net. "It is OK," I thought, "he will never get away with that." Alas, in utter disbelief, I saw the referee point to the centre circle. The goal stood.

Suddenly, the emotions of the previous night rushed into my head, as if a dam of reason had broken. With tear-filled eyes, I stared at the ground and (wrongly, I admit) beseeched the good Lord to intervene: "If you are a just God, you will not compound last night's misery by letting them get away with that."

Perhaps He was wearing Blue that day. With 4 minutes left, Southend were awarded a corner. The ball was swung in, it bobbed around, and then it fell to Tes Bramble in space. In what seemed like slow-motion, Tes dropped to the ground, hooked the ball over his head... and it was in the net.

Cue pandemonium. The Luton players wilted, Tes looked heavenwards... and I went bananas, punching the air like a lunatic, screaming myself hoarse. Of course, we held on for a famous victory; but best of all, as I walked out of the ground, I realised that the Blues had mended my broken heart – and that, no matter how glum I had felt when I had arrived at Roots Hall that day, I now felt on top of the world.

Programmes Past From Another Luton Match With Mark Wallis



Southend United v Luton Town 1994-5

SEASON 1994-5 brought United's fourth season in the second flight of English football, and this comprehensive victory over Luton Town was a vital one for the Shrimpers.

Southend had made a decent start to the season, and impressive away victories arrived at Sunderland, and eventual Champions Middlesbrough, as Peter Taylor's side reached

the highest position of 8th spot.

However, following victory over West Bromwich Albion two days after Christmas, Blues went eleven games without a win, and the 2-0 defeat against Reading at Elm Park ultimately cost Taylor, who is currently divided between roles with Hull City and England Under 21's, his job as he was sacked in February.

Steve Thompson took control, and despite defeats in his first two

games, guided United comfortably into fifteenth place and quashed relegation worries.

This victory over the Hatters followed that elusive first victory, a 2-0 win over Oldham Athletic at Boundary Park, with Gary Jones, Andy Thomson and makeshift striker Keith Dublin finding themselves on the scoresheet.

Impressive victories at Tranmere Rovers and Derby County followed as United surged towards safety and Jones, along with goalkeeper Simon Royce, bot of whom were recalled to the side by Thompson excelled as his side comfortably kept their Division One status.

Southend's FA Cup exploits had finished at Southampton in Round Three, Neil Hreaney scoring only ten seconds after kick-off before Matt Le Tissier finished things off whilst a League Cup exit arrived, 0-1 on aggregate, against Watford in the first stage.

SOUTHEND United's healthy 48-page programme cost £1.50 during 1994-95 and was almost full colour throughout, with the rest containing spot blue, white and yellow print.

The well-designed cover was made to look like an old scrapbook, and when possible used a photo from a home and

away match. In this instance Chris Powell is pictured against Sunderland at Roots Hall and Mark Hone against Bolton Wanderers at Burnden Park.

Regular features in the programme were 'About the Hall' (which featured a picture of the brand new Frank Walton South Stand), 'On This Day', 'Past Matches', 'Views On 1' and Buxton's Memories.

Team fixtures and statistics adorned the inside back cover and its predecessor whilst the centre page spread of action photographs as well as the back cover continued the 'retro-scrapbook' theme to good effect.

Unfortunately some of the spot colour and other design deficiencies let the programme down, but there was some very good content and it was generally a good programme to read.

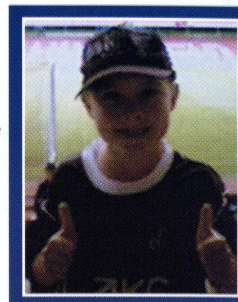

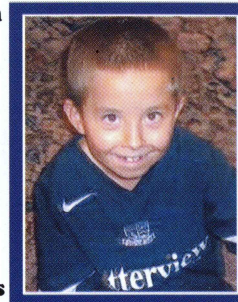
Matthew Francis

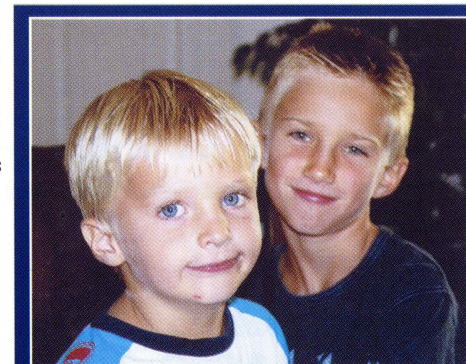


Toby Gibbons
