Get behind the lads again this evening and let's hope the game can live up to the fixture between these two sides here last season!









FLASHBACK

THE VISITORS

Luton Town's game with Pools here at Victoria Park last season went down in the history books as a bit of a classic. The two sides tussled for a full ninety minutes with Adam Boyd keeping his nerve to fire a decisive last-minute winner from the penalty spot.

Since then Luton have managed to reduce the deficit and, following the current side's victory over Neale Cooper's team earlier in the season, have now beaten the North-East Club seven times, compared to Pools' six victories over the years.

Therefore, tonight's match offers Cooper's men the opportunity to even out the scores - a target that has been boosted by the exclusion of ex-Pools frontman, Steve Howard.

Games with these two sides always seem to produce goals in recent seasons though they have not come up against each other too often through the years.

The latter part of the 1960's was the period when the two teams met most frequently and this marked an era when Pools enjoyed their best successes against Southern rivals, Luton.

Five wins compared to The Hatters' three, highlighted Pools' superiority, although in many of these matches there was only a one-goal difference to separate the two sides.

Hopefully this exciting trend will continue again tonight in a game that promises plenty of excitement, passion and indeed, goals.




LUTON TOWN

Luton Town are looking to take more League One points at Victoria Park this evening.



CALVIN ANDREW

The young striker has made an explosive start to this current season, scoring an incredible eight goals in three games for the Under-18 side, including hat-tricks against Northampton and Rushden. He was rewarded with a first-team squad number and a place in the travelling party for the Hatters' trip to Sheffield Wednesday at the start of September. A tall, powerful and direct front-man, Calvin possesses a lightning turn of speed and the ability to score goals with his head and on the ground.



DAVID BAYLISS

Has been looking forward to the start of this season more than most of the squad, he missed a large chunk of the 2002/03 season with a shoulder injury but forced his way back into the side at the start of last season, only for a ruptured Achilles tendon sustained at Charlton in the Carling Cup back in September to rule him out for the rest of the campaign. Signed in November 2001, Bayliss soon became a regular in Luton's team which secured promotion from Division Three in 2001/02.

ROBERT BECKWITH

Along with Curtis Davies and Stephen O'Leary he made the most of the first-team opportunities that came his way and was rewarded with a two-

year pro contract at the end of the 2003/2004 season. Quietly learning his trade in the Luton youth team he found himself thrust into the first-team picture because of the circumstances the club found itself it but was unfazed by starting last season as the first choice goalkeeper at the age of eighteen.

MARLON BERESFORD

Mike Newell strengthened his squad with the signing of 6'1" goalkeeper at the beginning of July 2004 from League One rivals Barnsley. The 34-year-old is a vastly experienced goalkeeper with over 400 appearances under his belt and he returned to Kenilworth Road on a two-year contract after impressing during a successful three month spell with the Hatters last year. The Lincoln-born goalkeeper picked up the Umbro Isotonic Division Two Player of the Month and twice received the Travel Extras Player of the Month during his first spell with Luton.

DEAN BRILL

Luton-born goalkeeper Dean Brill is another young player whom big things are expected. Having enjoyed a taste of first-team football last season he will, along with Robert Beckwith, provide healthy competition for the goalkeepers jersey and keep Marlon Beresford on his toes. A tall, commanding goalkeeper standing at six foot three, Brill is a great organiser whose voice

will always be heard throughout a game.

AHMET BRKOVIC

The Croatian midfielder is tidy and hardworking member of the squad, who agreed a new one-year contract in the summer to extend his stay at Kenilworth Road into a fourth season. Believing a move would be good for his career, he refused new terms at Leyton Orient in the summer of 2001, to join Luton on a Bosman free transfer - Orient had signed him on a free from HNK Dubrovnik in the autumn of 1999. He was bitterly disappointed when Orient failed in the play-offs to win promotion to the Second Division, and decided he might have a better chance if he joined the Hatters.

CHRIS COYNE

The centre-half was playing for Perth Soccer Club when he was selected for the Australian Under-17 squad for the 1994 youth World Cup, and came to the notice of Harry Redknapp, then manager of West Ham. Coyne signed for the Hammers as a teenager, but Premiership chances were few and far between, and after loan spells at Brentford and Southend, Coyne went to Dundee. A £50,000 cheque persuaded the Scottish Premier League club to let the defender move to Kenilworth Road in September 2001 and Coyne rapidly became a crowd favourite in the promotion run that followed. It was a big

boost to the Club when the solid and dependable defender agreed a two-year contract during the close-season.

SOL DAVIS

It was a huge disappointment to Swindon Town, and a coup for Luton, when the highly-rated defender decided to leave the County Ground after his contract expired at the end of the 2001/02 season. Swindon boss Andy King failed in attempts to persuade him to sign a new deal, and Luton swooped for the tough-tackling left back. Davis had joined Swindon as a trainee in the summer of 1998, and made rapid progress through the youth and reserve teams.

CURTIS DAVIES

Central defender Curtis was rewarded with a two-year professional contract at the end of last season after impressing during a spell in the side at the tail-end of the campaign. Having been a solid and consistent performer in the club's Under-19s over the past three years, he made the step-up to first-team level and turned in some encouraging displays when called upon. Previously with Wimbledon as a schoolboy, Curtis initially joined Luton as a trialist at the age of sixteen, and he made the best possible impression with two goals in his first three games to earn himself a scholarship at Kenilworth Road.

KEVIN FOLEY

The emergence of Kevin Foley was one of the success stories of last season for Luton, during the course of the campaign he went from the Hatters youth team to the Republic of Ireland Under-21's. Each time he has comfortably adjusted himself to the level of football and great things are expected of this cultured footballer. He has been brought through the junior ranks at Kenilworth Road and in pre-season game last year he was thrown into

the first-team because of injuries to other defenders.

IAN HILLIER

No-one was more surprised than the Welsh Under-21 international himself when he made his league debut for Luton in the second game of the 2001/02 season. The day before he was training with Spurs, where he was captain of the reserves, but a crop of injuries at Kenilworth Road led to Luton taking the young right back on loan and Hillier settled in so quickly that Luton soon decided to buy him for a bargain £30,000 fee and he became a regular squad member.

PETER HOLMES

Holmes found first team opportunities limited when he first arrived due to a midfield that boasted new signings of the calibre of Nicholls, Valois, Forbes, Hughes and Brkovic but former Manager Joe Kinnear turned to him for an important match against Swansea, where he scored the second goal of a 3-1 win which secured promotion to Division Two. After initially being released in the summer of 2003 as a result of the club's financial situation he continued to train with the club and agreed a fresh deal to stay with the Hatters in November 2003.

STEVE HOWARD

Rarely can £50,000 have been better spent in football than the fee Luton paid Northampton Town on deadline day in March 2001 to prise the bustling striker away from the Cobblers. He has been the Hatters leading marksman in for the last three seasons and is a huge favourite at Kenilworth Road - he was the fans player of the year in 2002, and the players' player of the year 12 months later. Howard had cost Northampton a then record fee of £120,000 when they recruited him from Hartlepool two

years previously.

MAX HOWELL

A solid and reliable defender from Middlesex, Max was handed a first team squad number midway through the 2003/04 season for the trip to Rushden & Diamonds in the LDV Vans Trophy although he didn't make the squad on that occasion. The youngster's impressive form in the Under-19s led to him being offered the third year of his football scholarship at the club. He has been involved with the first team in pre-season, and will be hoping to make the breakthrough this year to earn a professional contract at the end of the season.

PAUL HUGHES

Hughes worked his way up at Chelsea from trainee to Premiership, learning his trade under Hoddle's management, and gained experience on loan to Stockport, Norwich and Crewe. When Hoddle became manager of Southampton he soon recruited Hughes, but a serious groin injury put the midfielder out of football for nine months. He joined Luton at the start of the 2001/02 season and with Kevin Nicholls ruled out at the start of the season with a knee injury Hughes formed a formidable central midfield partnership with Matt Spring before a injury sustained in training revealed a fractured tibia.

KEITH KEANE.

Having made his debut as a 16-year-old last season he went on to enjoy an extended run in the side from February onwards whilst Kevin Foley was out injured. Such was the contribution he made that the return of Foley didn't signal the end of his involvement at first-team level and he finished the season with fourteen appearances under his belt, all this whilst still in the first year of his scholarship.

MICHAEL LEARY

The London-born central midfielder signed an extension to his contract in the summer which will tie him to the Hatters until 2006. He has had to wait patiently for his first-team chance but has taken the opportunity with both hands whenever it has presented itself. The scorer of two goals at Hartlepool back in March, in one of only eight first-team starts last year, he will be looking to add to both tally's throughout the course of the new.

LEE MANSELL

The Gloucester-born midfielder arrived on the scene in January 2001 to make a dramatic surprise debut. An injury crisis saw the youth teamer thrown into the team for the F.A. Cup third round replay against Queens Park Rangers and his debut was less than a minute old when he scored the opening goal. Luton had looked after him since he was an eleven-year-old, and signed him as soon as he left school.

ALAN NEILSON

Experience and versatility has made Neilson a valuable member of Luton's squad. The former Welsh international was signed from Grimsby in 2002 as part of a cost-cutting exercise. His international career began with appearances for Wales at youth and Under-21 level, followed by five full caps, and he enjoyed a good career in the Premiership, with his first club Newcastle and then with Southampton and Fulham.

KEVIN NICHOLLS

Snapped up from Wigan in 2001, tough-tackling Nicholls quickly became team captain, and his huge enthusiasm and ferocious tackling soon made him a big favourite with Hatters fans, although opponents did not always view his all-action style with similar relish. Just five games into 2003/2004 season he picked up a niggling knee injury which ruled him out for five months but he returned at the end of January, adding strength and experience to

the right hand side of midfield.

STEPHEN O'LEARY

A player with a bright future ahead of him, he became the third of the three graduating scholars who signed a two-year professional contract in the summer. The skillful midfielder made the most of his chance in the first-team spotlight in the final few matches of last season to show what he could do. His game is a mixture of skill and determination, and he is equally at home going forward or in a midfield holding role.

RUSS PERRETT

Having signed a one-year contract in the summer he will be looking to make up for lost time this season after a frustrating spell on the sidelines last year. The ex-Portsmouth man was restricted to just six games during the 2003/2004 season but when fully fit the experienced campaigner is an important member of the squad.

STEVE ROBINSON

Was the first of the out of contract players to agree a new deal with Luton in the summer after enjoying a campaign where he firmly established himself in the Hatters side. A hard working midfielder who topped the Hatters assists chart last season. Looking to add experience to a young midfield department, Luton snapped up a man who had earned respect wherever he played.

DINO SEREMET

The 6' 4" Slovenian goalkeeper impressed on trial in July 2004 to earn a two-year contract and signed on a Bosman transfer from Maribor Pivovarna Laako. With youngster Robert Beckwith and Dean Brill recovering from injury he will provide healthy competition for Marlon Beresford for the goalkeeper's jersey.

ENOCH SHOWUNMI

The big striker will be looking to build on his growing reputation

this season and continue the good start he made to his professional career, which resulted in a close season call-up to the Nigerian national squad for the Unity Cup which was staged in England. The London-born forward joined the club fresh from non-league football with Willesden Constantine - the same side that nurtured the early years of Barry Hayles career - after completing university.

STUART SINCLAIR

Sixteen-year-old midfielder Stuart was handed a first-team squad number and a place on the bench for the trip to Swansea City in the LDV Vans Trophy just three months into his two-year scholarship at the club. A stylish and technically accomplished footballer, Stuart is happiest in central midfield but can also play on either flank, and anything he lacks in size he certainly makes up in tenacity.

PAUL UNDERWOOD

Luton Town fought off competition from a number of clubs to complete the free transfer signing of Paul Underwood from Second Division rivals Rushden & Diamonds on transfer deadline day. Unfortunately a hamstring injury sustained twenty minutes into his Luton Town debut against QPR ruled him out for the rest of the season and he has made in a Hatters shirt this season now that he has regained his full fitness, forming a formidable partnership with Sol Davis on the left hand side.

ROWAN VINE

The Basingstoke-born striker initially joined Town on a three-month loan deal from Premiership Portsmouth on the eve of the new season but that arrangement was extended in September for the whole season after he had made an impressive start to life as a Hatter. His performances during that month were recognized when he was named as the Powerade League One Player of the Month.

Famous Fan NICK OWEN



Nick Owen will be hoping The Hatters can take the points tonight – he's a mad keen Luton Town fan.

Due to his live tea time TV role in the heart of Birmingham, it is unlikely that Nick Owen will be at Victoria Park for tonight's game. But he does remember paying and visit to a Hartlepool Utd v Luton Town game in 1967 when he swears he was the only away fan in the ground. It was a midweek game, a bleak night and Town were languishing in the bottom four of the lowest division, so not a lot of supporter interest in travelling. And even Nick took the hard road to get there, he was a student at Leeds University and hitch hiked there and back.


Nick is probably best known as one of the pioneer presenters of Breakfast Television but he is also a devoted Luton Town supporter. For the last eight years he has been one of the main presenters of the Birmingham based 'Midlands Today' TV programme. He is very content in this role and sees himself as "an adopted Brummie". Born in Hertfordshire, thirteen miles from Luton he has supported the Hatters for 46 years and remembers his first game clearly, being taken by his father to see his team draw 1-1 with Leeds United in September 1958. His allegiance to the club has shown unbroken support

even through his University years and the demands of working in television. Having achieved a B.A.(honours) in Classics at Leeds University, he opted for a career in Journalism beginning with a job on the Doncaster Evening Post. After a stint on the Birmingham Post and moving into Radio with the forerunner of BBC Radio Birmingham, he joined ATV Network's sports department, covering the 1982 World Cup. When Central won the Independent Television franchise in the Midlands, Nick became a general presenter, teaming up with Anne Diamond for the first time. As early morning television was introduced, he played his part by taking on the role of sports presenter on TV AM. But within eight weeks he renewed his partnership with Anne Diamond as a general presenter to become one of the mainstays of Breakfast TV. The pair presented the show until late 1986 when Nick returned to a sporting role, mainly as the presenter of the ITV flagship programme 'Midweek Sports Special'. And his move to the BBC was again to team up with Miss Diamond to co-present 'Good Morning', which they did between 1992 and 1996. His sporting work has seen him travel extensively but he always looks forward to returning to the home of his favourite football team.

There was one occasion though when despite having his name in lights, he could not get in the ground. " Whenever I walk into Kenilworth Road I always experience a feeling of sheer pleasure and anticipation. Ten years ago I also was very privileged to have one of the Lounges at Luton Town named after me. Imagine my surprise when twelve months ago I arrived at the Lounge door only to find I was refused entry! The steward on the door clearly did not know who I was and told me that the lounge was full. I soon realised that he was so serious that not even the Pope would have got in. As I walked away I looked up at my name above the door in big block capitals and I remember thinking I have commented all over the world including extensively at the 1990 World Cup and I can't get in to see my own team. To everyone there who knew me it must have been very funny and I am pleased to say that I found it funny too."

For an extensive read about the Nick Owen devotion to Luton Town FC, you are encouraged to read his recently released autobiography "In the Time of Nick". Before you do here is a precis. Other than the various promotions, his best day as a Town fan was in April 1988 when

the Hatters beat the mighty Arsenal in the League Cup final at Wembley. What made it particularly exciting was how close the game was and the turning point of Andy Dibble's penalty save from which the team went on to overturn a 1-2 scoreline. Not surprisingly his two favourite players, Ricky Hill and Mick Harford were from the same era. With the wealth of talent that has passed through Kenilworth Road over the years including the legendary Malcolm McDonald, why does he single out those two? And given the superb run by the team so far this campaign how does this seasoned supporter rate the club's chances of converting it into a promotion season?

" Ricky Hill had sublime skill and superb vision whilst Mick Harford was your all action traditional centre forward. Both did play

briefly for England and you can't help thinking that if they had played for one of the more fashionable clubs then they might have played even more. The start to this season was very exciting, to have amassed so many points so early on and despite losing Mick Harford a few months ago and drawing quite a few games recently, I am quietly confident. Mick was doing a great job as coach so it is credit to Mike Newell and Brian Stein that they have kept that momentum going so well. This match is very important, we know how strong Hartlepool are at home and it will be disappointing to be without striker Steve Howard, who is suspended. I feel for Steve because he started out with Pool and I am sure he was looking forward to this one more than most."

So as Nick wraps up the evening show in the new BBC studio

in Birmingham, the 'Mailbox', which before conversion was the biggest sorting office in Europe, he will be hoping that Town go on to deliver the points without him (he does get to most home and away games). However he will be kept in touch by his family representatives. Nick and his wife Jill, a Practice Nurse, have four children two of whom will be at the game and all of them have an interest in following Luton Town. "My three lads go to most games but on this occasion just Tim and Chris will be there, Andy is playing cricket in South Africa! And for my daughter Jenny who is now 16 football is not the priority it once was; I am sure you know what I mean."

No SURPRISES

Adam Boyd doesn't think that anyone should be too surprised by Pools' lofty position in League One.

It's not been a bad season for Hartlepool fans so far. Many felt that Neale Cooper's over-achievers would come undone in their "difficult second season" in a higher division. Nothing could be further from the truth as Pools have gone from strength to strength in the current campaign with at least a play-off spot a real possibility come May.

Whilst fans and critics alike may be surprised by the lofty position that Pools currently occupy in the League One table, one person is not in the least perturbed. That's the man who has arguably done most to elevate them to the heights of fifth in the division with close to twenty goals.

"It's going really well for us but I thought we would be up there so it's not a real surprise to me," insists Adam Boyd. "I don't think the teams that came down are particularly strong and there are no runaway leaders and we deserve to be where we are."

The striker has put behind him the negativity of his early years at The Vic, and with a temporary switch to Boston United proving the catalyst for some excellent form the

striker is enjoying his football.

"I am over the moon to be on nineteen goals already this season," he admits. "I set myself a target of twenty at the start of the campaign and once I reach that I will try and push on as far as I can. Maybe I can even get thirty but I will just wait and see!"

just ignore them and get on with things. I enjoy playing football and I think you can see that when I am out there in some of the things I try!"



exercises in the pool. We'll be working him hard over the next four weeks and we'll see how things are at the end of that.



that we are making progress towards our meeting /community room behind the Victoria Lounge. We are hoping to have a start date for this and I will keep you updated as time goes on.






FITC have been working in schools in Hartlepool warning against the dangers of trespass and vandalism on or around railway lines. Encouraging children not to play on the tracks and directing them towards after school activities, holiday clubs and soccer courses. 'The Cool Guide' leaflets have been distributed to children who have attended coaching sessions at the school.

Route Crime Facts

- Every year around 250 people are killed on Britain's railway system.
- Children as young as five years old have been caught putting objects on the track
- Children as young as eight years old have been seen 'playing chicken' in front of high speed trains
- Railway crime costs the industry approximately £150m per year
- Railway crime causes 11,500 hours delay to train services each year
- Trains travel up to 225kph (125mph) and it can take up to 200m (1.25 miles) to stop (20 times the length of your average football pitch).

Happy TO STAY

Jack Ross is happy with things in the North East right now, as Northern Echo Sports Editor Nick Loughlin found out recently.

Jack Ross admits he's content with life at Hartlepool United right now. Three months ago, the defender admitted he was seeking a return to Scotland.

Ross moved from Clyde last summer on a free transfer and had played his part in helping Pool to the upper reaches of the League One table ahead of tonight's tasty encounter with Luton. But a bout of homesickness had him pining for a return home as 2004 came to a close and, with the transfer window open for January, his sights were set on a move home.

"the transfer window is shut and I feel quite content really..."

Now, however, he cuts a different figure and is relishing the chance to steer Pool higher in the table. He admitted: "It has been a difficult time for me, but I always wanted to stay here and play for the club.

"My girlfriend is back in Scotland, but I get the chance to go back up there regularly - after the Chesterfield game I was back up to Scotland for a couple of days which was nice.

"I've been injured for a while dur-

ing my time here as well, so that didn't help my situation.

"Maybe there was a bit of homesickness there for me, but I think I perhaps wanted too much too soon. "I wanted to get playing well straight away and feel comfortable at the club.

"At Clyde I was captain and I had been there a while as well, so I was happy with the situation there, but I wanted to come to England and Hartlepool. "I'm really glad I'm staying here and I'm happy at the club.

"the transfer window is shut and I feel quite content really, and excited about the rest of the season."

And Ross admitted the experience of some friends has helped make his decision even easier. He revealed: "Some of my friends work away and I said a couple of weeks ago that they had told me to get my head down and stay.

"They are abroad for months on end and they've told me to just get on with it as I don't know when I've got it good.

"I was talking to a Hartlepool supporter a couple of weeks back, he had read about it and, at the reserve game he was asking me about them.

"At one time, there was three of

them working away and one of them really had it bad, life was really boring for him.

"It made me think about my situation and if I'm honest, I'm in a position I enjoy and doing a job I love.

"I'm in a position I enjoy and doing a job I love."

"It's a good job and, as I've said, I'm comfortable at the club."

Ross is part of a back line looking more than comfortable, with five clean sheets kept in the last seven away games.

In the previous seven away games, Pool conceded 15 times. He said: "We've kept a lot of clean sheets now in this run we are on and to be honest, I didn't realise how many it was until before the Chesterfield game.

"before we know it, we are approaching the end of the season in a strong position."

"Before Christmas we were leaking goals and, if you want to be at the right end of the league table, you cannot do it.

"But we've stopped doing it now and tightened up - long may it continue.

"We've got a settled back four and a good understanding now. We work well as a unit and the four in front of us do a good job as well.

"They can dig in when needed and Ritchie and Sweeneys have the good engines on them as well.

"They work hard and they don't leave us exposed. But a lot of it is down to the whole team spirit we have here.

"I think it's made a big difference for me personally to come back in fit and I'm enjoying my football - but in this team it's hard not to enjoy it."

Pool have pushed themselves to the fringe of the promotion race. Sitting in fifth spot ahead of tonight's encounter with the long-time league leaders, they have gradually moved into the play-off zone and closed the gap at the top thanks to a storming run of seven wins and two draws from the last nine league games.

While others drop points, Pool are picking them up apace and Ross added: "A lot of the results in the league are going in our favour, other teams are dropping points and we are winning a lot of our games.

"We have a couple of games in hand on teams and, OK, so we might not have the points from them, but it will

make other teams look at us and wonder.

"Chesterfield wasn't a game in hand, but it was another win and another win and another game down the line.

"There seems to be a lot of draws among the other teams at the moment and, before we know it, we are approaching the end of the season in a strong position.

"There's so much confidence and belief in this squad. I commented on that a few weeks ago, I think it was before the home game with Bristol City.

"The feeling before the game among the lads was good and we gave a great performance. "It's not cockiness or over-confidence, it's just a genuine belief in what we do - there is a difference between confidence and over confidence."
