

Those who made the journey to Hillsborough last Saturday will have seen the best of us but a lot more saw the worst in our last home game against Milton Keynes Dons - but that's football.

They were the ones who said that our season was dead and buried after that performance against a side struggling at the foot of the table.

But as I had been telling the players, there was no better place to go and put the show back on the road than Sheffield Wednesday.

We went there to face a side that were unbeaten in two months and it was New Year's Day when we last came away with all three points.

But as we all know form means nothing in this League and in front of over 23,000 fans we were able to remind everybody just exactly what we are capable of.

Reputations were on line. I kept faith with Paul Henderson after his uncharacteristic wobble against Milton Keynes Dons. I can understand why he was unsettled in that game with all the transfer speculation going round after his name had been

touted about with a move elsewhere.

I have not spoken to any other clubs about him but maybe after his performance against the Dons, the person who has been doing the touting, and in my opinion is bang out of order, may think better in future as it has done nobody any favours.

Andy Cooke is now getting back to full fitness for the English game after his time playing in South Korea.

Last Saturday he gave his best display since joining us early in the New Year and his part in the winning goal should not be underestimated.

It was also good to have Steven Schumacher back from injury. His return added zip and zest and brought legs to the piston-like work-rate of Lee Crooks.

And thankfully at the back normal service was resumed with no hangovers from the uncertainties that had reared their head against MK Dons.

I made the late changes against Sheffield Wednesday as I felt the game was slipping away from us. That is why I brought off Ben Muirhead to be replaced by Owen Morrison. He could

hold the ball for us and give us a bit of breathing space and it was fitting that he got the goal.

The boo-boys were in their element when his first touch simply ran the ball out of play. They weren't crowing about his second though!

It's like Dean Windass said in the dressing room afterwards, "our season starts all over now".

This afternoon we have a score to settle as we face the current League leaders.

Mike Newell has done a marvellous job at Luton and we helped him on his way with one of our worst performances on the road at the back end of October.

We have to put that right today. British summertime was in force when we last won at home and we have to put ourselves in the right frame of mind to ensure it is not back with us before we taste victory on home soil again.

We have given away far too many sloppy goals that are costing us valuable points. Amazingly we have picked up more on our travels.

Supporters can play their part. I have said it countless times but the few hundred who travel to the away games tend to make more noise and keep getting behind the lads than eight

thousand do here at home. Let's try to put it right starting this afternoon as Luton will have a fair number here egging them on and we need the points as much as they do if we are to keep with the pack chasing the Play-Off places.

One down side of last Saturday's victory was the loss just before half-time of Paul Tierney who went off injured with what looked to be a bad hamstring pull. He had a scan during the week and thankfully it is not as bad as was first thought. He will be out for about three weeks which will mean an enforced change round at the back this afternoon.

I signed off last time round by saying that I was looking for fire in the players' bellies. It came a week late. However I am sure they know now what is expected of them this afternoon, a continuation of where they left off at Hillsborough.

Enjoy the game.








LUTON TOWN

Mike Newell is heading for the Championship next season as his League One leaders blaze a trail of glory through the ranks and all credit to him for all was far from golden when he was confirmed as the Luton Town manager in the summer of 2003.

The Club was in total disarray following the sacking of former manager Joe Kinnear and Newell too had been given his cards as the battles for ownership behind the scenes ripped the club apart.

Mike has a long association with the Hatters for it was as a player, two decades before, that he had won the hearts and respect of the Kenilworth Road faithful as a strong bustling brave striker not afraid to put his head in where angels fear to tread and always game to take the attack to the opposition.

Nonetheless, he had hardly sat himself into the managerial chair before the club went into receivership, with debts of some £11 million threatening the club's continuation.

Because of the dire financial situation the Football League immediately imposed a transfer embargo on the Hatters, a drastic blow to the management team as they had already lost eight squad players earlier in the summer whose positions had not been filled.

A tough baptism then for Mike Newell who had no alternative but to make do with the players still at his disposal yet he was lucky in one respect for the backbone of the side was still intact and all credit to them for the Hatters were in contention for a play-off finish last season until dropping away in the final run-in to eventually finish 10th.

This season he has been in commanding form winning the first Coca-Cola Manager of the Month award for August after six straight wins and continuing to set the pace at the top of the table as his team goes from strength to strength.

Newell of course is no stranger to Valley Parade but the Liverpool born manager started off in the amateur ranks as a player before his professional career started at Gresty Road. He played centre-forward for Crewe Alexander, making his Football League debut in a 2-1 home win over Swindon Town on October 8, 1983 in the Fourth Division. He had only played three League games when Wigan Athletic stepped in before the transfer deadline in 1984 and he spearheaded their Third Division attack for almost two seasons netting 16 goals in 24 League appearances in the season of 1985-86, which he didn't complete as Luton Town, then in the old First Division, had swooped to offer him top class

competition as a replacement for the injured Mick Harford.

His move from Springfield Park in January '86 had cost the Hatters £80,000 but it was money well invested as he continued hitting the back of the net - 19 times in 68 matches to be precise.

When Leicester City stepped in with an offer of £350,000 in '87 economics persuaded the Luton management to accept but this wasn't the end of the trail for the big handsome goal getter.


The Foxes realised £850,000 on him when they sold him to Everton and then the Goodison Park outfit cashed in for £1.1million when Mike moved on to Blackburn Rovers where he collected a Premiership Championship winners' medal in 1995.

Birmingham City manager Trevor Francis paid £775,000 for his transfer in July '96 with the expectation of the strong running Newell enjoying a goal feast alongside Paul Furlong. Unfortunately it did not pan out that way Mike asking for a transfer after just 10-weeks citing difficulty in settling at St Andrews.

It was almost like musical chairs after that as he moved around the country first Harry Redknapp took him on loan to try and solve the Hammers scoring drought but he failed to score in seven games for West Ham United, and a similar loan spell here at Bradford City in March 1997 when he also made seven League appearances in our colours, again bringing no reward in terms of goals.

Three goals in 1996-97 represented one of Mike's leanest spells but in the summer of '97 Aberdeen paid £160,000 to take him north and he scored six goals in 32(12) SPL appearances before returning to Crewe on a free in March '99. Three months later he was with Doncaster Rovers and finally Blackpool (February 2000) clocking up over 500 League games for 14 clubs and adding England 'B' and under-21 caps to his Championship medal before moving into a coaching job with Tranmere Rovers.

In November 2002 Mick became manager of Hartlepool United, the scene of his latest triumph on Tuesday night, taking them to promotion upon which his contract was amazingly not renewed and Hartlepool's loss became Luton Town's gain.







WHAT a season this is turning out to be for the Hatters who have led the chase for the Coca-Cola League One championship for most of the season.

Reeling off six straight wins at the start of the season their intentions were clear from the start. Oldham (2-1), Torquay United and AFC Bournemouth (both 1-0) were beaten at Kenilworth Road while maximum points were also taken away at Swindon, Barnsley and Blackpool.

It was at Hillsborough where they lost their 100 per cent record in the seventh game of the season, Wednesday restricting Luton to a goalless draw. Nonetheless normal service was resumed at home where Rowan Vine scored in a 1-0 win over Chesterfield.

Stockport away, then Peterborough at home, were the next to succumb to the Luton tide as they swept into October in poll position.

Here they lost their momentum while maintaining rank, taking just seven points from the next 18 and suffering three successive defeats, at home to Huddersfield Town 1-2 then at Walsall and Hull City. Had the wheels come off the Luton band wagon?

Not flipping likely for next into the Kenilworth Road camp it was the Bantams brimming with confidence on the back of five successive wins but we were well and truly plucked to the tune of 4-0.

An Ahmed Brkovic brace and strikes from Steve Howard and Paul Underwood secured the league leaders a comfortable win and our miserable day was completed with a red card for Dean Windass.

Having put four past us Luton then hit Wrexham for five but visiting Doncaster Rovers held their own in a 1-1 draw.

A 2-0 defeat at Brentford was a timely reminder that this Luton machine was not invincible but the Hatters again responded positively with three back-to-back wins followed by three successive draws, home to Colchester United, Sheffield Wednesday then away at Peterborough United, a sequence that saw them relinquish top spot.

Brentford stung them again in the FA Cup with a 2-0 third round win at Kenilworth Road but Luton were back on track again after a 3-0 victory over Stockport County.

Three more draws followed, 0-0 at Colchester, 1-1 home to Tranmere Rovers and 1-1 at Huddersfield Town leading up to last Saturday's top of the table clash with Hull City.

It was as tight as anticipated with the game still locked at 0-0 with 80-seconds of normal time left on the clock. Then drama as Ahmet Brkovic met Steve Robinson's cross to head past Myhill and leave the Tigers stunned. Luton were back on top with 15 games to go.

Then on Tuesday night, as if to emphasise their quality, they became the first side this season to win at Hartlepool, beating their promotion rivals 3-2 in a thriller.

The Squad:

Marlon Beresford - Goalkeeper

Signed last July from League One rivals Barnsley. The 34-year-old is vastly experienced with over 400 appearances under his belt and he returned to Kenilworth Road after impressing during a successful three month spell with the Hatters last year. A trainee at Sheff Wednesday Marlon joined Burnley for £95,000 in 1992, then went to Middlesbrough for £500,000 in March '98 and has had loan spells with Bury, Northampton and Crewe. Arrived at Valley Parade on a free in September '93 and did an excellent short-term job for us in five League games when both our regular custodians were injured. Now number one at Luton he has played in all but nine games this season.

Ahmet Brkovic - Midfield

The Croatian midfielder joined from Leyton Orient in the summer of 2001 on a Bosman free transfer - Orient had signed him on a free from HNK Dubrovnik in the autumn of 1999. He was bitterly disappointed when Orient failed in the play-offs to win promotion to the Second Division, and

played an important part, mainly on the right flank, to help Luton return to the Second Division at the first attempt. Has scored in the last two games and has 12 goals all told.

Chris Coyne - Central Defender

Was playing for Perth Soccer Club when he was selected for the Australian Under-17 squad for the 1994 youth World Cup, and came to the notice of Harry Redknapp, who signed him for the Hammers. Limited to just one Premiership game Chris joined Dundee, after loan spells at Brentford and Southend. £50,000 persuaded the SPL club to let Chris move to Luton in September 2001.

Sol Davis - Defender

Swindon boss Andy King failed in attempts to persuade him to sign a new deal, and Luton swooped for the tough-tackling left back. Davis had joined Swindon as a trainee in the summer of 1998, and made rapid progress through the youth and reserve teams to become a regular in the Nationwide League.

Curtis Davies - Central Defender

Having been a solid and consistent performer in the club's Under-19s over the past three years, Curtis has been almost ever-present in the first team this season. Previously with Wimbledon as a schoolboy, Curtis initially joined Luton at 16. Mobile and strong in the air and on the ground.

Kevin Foley - Defender

One of the success stories of last season for Luton, during the course of the campaign he went from the Hatters youth team to the Republic of Ireland Under-21's. Made 33 League appearances last season and is now established as the regular right-back, rounding off a great performance on Tuesday night with a goal at Hartlepool.

Peter Holmes - Midfield

A two-footed player, Holmes has an impressive pedigree as a graduate of the FA's School Of Excellence, from the same year as Michael Owen. He found first team opportunities limited when he first arrived. After initially being released in the summer of 2003 as a result of the club's financial situation he continued to train with Luton and agreed a fresh deal to stay.

Steve Howard - Striker

Rarely can £50,000 have been better spent that's what Luton paid Northampton Town on deadline day in March 2001 to

prise the bustling striker away from the Cobblers who had invested £120,000 to take him from Hartlepool two years prior. Steve has been the Hatters leading marksman for the last three seasons and tops the chart with 18 goals this season. Howard exploded into his first full season with Luton, his 24 goals making him the Third Division's top league marksman as Luton won promotion. By the end of last season he had moved up to seventh in Luton Town's list of leading post-war goalscorers, averaging a goal every two games for the Hatters and he's carried that form into the new season, picking up the League One Powerade Player of the Month for August, after he netted five times in the opening five matches.

Keith Keane - Defender

Having made his debut as a 16-year-old last season the Republic of Ireland Schoolboy international went on to enjoy an extended run in the side from February onwards whilst Kevin Foley was out injured. Such was the contribution he made that the return of Foley didn't signal the end of his involvement at first-team level and he finished the season with 14 appearances. Has made 11 appearances this season and was on the bench last week.

Alan Neilson - Defender/Midfield

Experience and versatility has made Alan a valuable squad player, for he plays anywhere in the back four or in midfield and was left-back last week. A former Welsh international signed from Grimsby in 2002 as part of a cost-cutting exercise his international career began with Wales at youth and Under-21 level, followed by five full caps. Alan enjoyed a good career in the Premiership, with his first club Newcastle United (42 app) and then with Southampton (53 app) following a £500,000 move in '95. Fulham signed him for £250,000 in November '97 but in four years he made only 29 League appearances for the Cottagers.



Stephen O'Leary - Midfield

Made the most of his chance in the first-team spotlight in the final few matches of last season making his full League debut at Wrexham and didn't have to wait long to open his goalscoring account, netting against Sheffield Wednesday a week later. Spotted playing for Barnet Schools he has been with the club since he was 13.

Steve Robinson - Midfield

Was the first of the out of contract players

to agree a new deal with Luton in the summer after enjoying a campaign where he firmly established himself as a regular. A hard working midfielder who topped the Hatters assists chart last season Steve has added experience to a young midfield department. Robinson has earned respect wherever he has played and the £50,000 Luton paid Preston in the summer of 2002 for a player who had been capped five times by Northern Ireland was an astute business move. Steve had made his name at Bournemouth after joining the Cherries on a free transfer from Spurs, where he had been a trainee. He hit 60 goals in 286 midfield appearance for the Dean Court club his form persuading Preston to invest £375,000 for him. But he failed to make the same impact in two years at Deepdale, and jumped at the chance to get his career back on track with the Hatters for whom he made his 100th appearance at Huddersfield on Feb 5.

Dino Seremet - Goalkeeper

The 6' 4" Slovenian goalkeeper impressed on trial in July 2004 to earn a two-year contract and signed on a Bosman transfer from Maribor Pivovarna Laako. With youngsters Robert Beckwith and Dean Brill recovering from injury he made his debut in an LDV defeat at Swansea before playing in the next five League games in October.

Enoch Showunmi - Striker

The big striker will be looking to build on his growing reputation this season and continue the good start he made to his professional career, which resulted in a close season call-up to the Nigerian national squad for the Unity Cup. London-born Enoch joined Luton from non-league football with Willesden Constantine – the same side that nurtured the early years of Barry Hayles career - after completing university. He has had four starts this season and scored the goal in a 1-0 win at Chesterfield and Luton's second in Tuesday's 3-2 win at Hartlepool.

Paul Underwood - Midfield

Luton Town fought off competition from a number of clubs to complete the free transfer signing of Paul Underwood from Second Division rivals Rushden & Diamonds on transfer deadline day. The Wimbledon-born defender joined Rushden for £50,000 in the summer of 1997 from Enfield and went on to make over two-

hundred appearances for the Northamptonshire club. During his time at Nene Park he was a regular in England's semi-professional squad as Diamonds progressed up the non-league pyramid and in 2002-03 he led the club to the Third Division Championship and was named as Rushden's Player of the Season. Unfortunately a hamstring injury sustained twenty minutes into his Luton Town debut against QPR ruled him out for the rest of the season but having regained full fitness he has missed only a couple of games this term, forming a formidable partnership with Sol Davis on the left hand side

Rowan Vine - Striker

The Basingstoke-born striker initially joined Town on a three-month loan deal from Premiership Portsmouth on the eve of the new season but that arrangement was extended in September for the whole campaign after he had made an impressive start to life as a Hatter. His performances during that month were recognised when he was named as the Powerade League One Player of the Month. The 21-year-old front man has enjoyed successful loan spells at this level before when he appeared for Brentford and Colchester United. In his time with the Bees he scored 13 goals in 47 appearances as part of a year long loan deal in 2002-03 and last year he spent a similar spell at Layer Road, scoring 10 times in 42 games. Ironically, he scored both goals in Town's 2-2 home draw with Colchester and comes into this game on seven goals.

Other players include goalkeepers Robert Beckwith and Dean Brill; Defenders David Bayliss, Ian Hillier, Max Howell and Russell Perrett; Midfielders Paul Hughes, Michael Leary and Lee Mansell and striker Calvin Andrew.

LEADING BY EXAMPLE by Colin Benson

HATTERS midfield star Kevin John Richard Nicholls is a skipper who wears the captain's armband with pride and now in his fourth season with the Kenilworth Road club he is focussed on leading Luton Town to the Coca-Cola League One championship title.

He says: "The Hull City game last week is the sort of game you look forward to. Top of the table clashes are usually cracking games because they are so important to both sides and to come out on top is just tremendous.

"With a third of the season left we are at the top and this is where we intend to stay. As far as I am concerned if you want to win the league you have to do the business, just as we did in the first thirty-games or so.

"As skipper it is my job to make sure that the lads know what it is all about and that it is time to kick on and win this league."

Kevin is set to make his 174th League appearance here this afternoon in a career that started down in London.

Although born in the West Ham United territory of Newham it was south of The Thames, at Charlton Athletic, where Kevin signed up as a trainee in 1995.

Gaining plaudits as an England youth international he was eventually given his League baptism in the 1996-97 season when he made six appearances. His debut was from the bench in a 2-1 defeat at Ipswich Town on September 20, 1996 and three days later he was given his first start in a Coca-Cola Cup tie. He then had to wait until mid-December for another sample of League football with an introduction from the substitute's bench, this time at home to Port Vale.

On February 15, 1997 Kevin made his first Football League start in place of Mark Kinsella on the left flank and what a start! He scored with a spectacular long-range shot in the opening minute in a 2-2 home draw with Barnsley and twelve games later he started in the

number four shirt to enjoy his first League victory, a 2-1 home win over Portsmouth.

Given six more outings in the following campaign Kevin found himself down the pecking order in 1998-99 when he made four League appearances for Brighton & Hove Albion on loan.

Having made only spasmodic appearances in Charlton red Kevin was signed up by Wigan Athletic manager John Benson in June 1999 for £250,000.

Although six-feet tall Kevin always showed great skill with good tight ball control and as an excellent passer of the ball and at Wigan he developed into a tough tackling ball-winner although his first season with the Latics was unfortunately spoilt by injuries, the most serious being a knee problem that required surgery and delayed his debut and restricted him to just eight appearances in his first season.

Unfortunately it took sometime for Kevin to recapture his form and he struggled to make the grade with the Latics and in August 2001 Luton Town snapped him up for a bargain £25,000.

He quickly settled in with the Hatters returning seven goals in 42 League games in his initial season five goals in 36 appearances the following year and two goals in 21 League outings last season in which he started the campaign in a central midfield role but was then hit by a back injury that sidelined him for several months.

Kevin returned to the team in January 2004 and apart from suspension kept his place as indeed he has done for the majority of this season in which his enthusiasm and presence at the hub of the team has been so decisive in Luton's charge for the title.

With four goals this season, all from the penalty spot, against Swindon Town, Boston United in the Carling Cup, Stockport County and most recently in the 1-1 League One draw at home to Tranmere Rovers, Kevin Nicholls is confirming his role as an inspirational captain who leads by example.

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS selects a post-war Luton Town 'Dream Team' with the help of several Luton supporters and club officials.

RON BAYNHAM: England international goalkeeper who was a key figure as Luton Town were FA Cup finalists in 1959. He impressed with Worcester City before moving to Kenilworth Road in November 1951 and contested a first-team slot with fellow England keeper Bernard Stretton as Luton gained top-flight status for the first time in 1954-55. Missing just one match in both 1955-56 and 1957-58, he was capped three times and also represented the Football League. He made 388 League appearances for the Hatters until injury ended his career in May 1965 and subsequently worked as an interior decorator in Bedfordshire.

KIRK STEPHENS: Attacking right-back who was ever-present in Luton Town's 1981-82 Second Division title triumph. Initially with Nuneaton Borough, he helped them finish Southern League runners-up in 1974-75 and followed David Pleat to Kenilworth Road in June 1978. He was voted Luton's 'Player of the Year' in 1978-79 and 1983-84, scoring twice in 227 League games for the Hatters before moving to Coventry City in exchange for Ashley Grimes in August 1984. Later rejoining Nuneaton as player-manager after a knee injury ended his top-flight career, he also had a spell at Barnet and worked for his father's building firm.


MITCHELL THOMAS: Versatile England U-21 international left-back who had two spells at Luton Town. Born locally, he signed professional at Kenilworth Road in August 1982 and starred as Luton reached the FA Cup semi-finals in 1984-85. He followed David Pleat to Tottenham Hotspur for £275,000 in July 1986 and featured in the 1987 FA Cup final,

moving to West Ham for £525,000 in August 1991. Returning to Luton in November 1993, he netted six goals in 292 League games overall for the Hatters prior to joining Burnley in July 1999 and was an experienced figure in their 1999-2000 promotion success.

BRUCE RIOCH: Influential midfielder who was capped 24 times by Scotland after leaving Luton Town. Signing professional for Luton in September 1964, he starred in the 1967-68 Fourth Division title triumph and netted 46 goals in 149 League games prior to joining Aston Villa for £100,000 in July 1969. He was a key figure in their 1971-72 Third Division title success and moved to Derby County in February 1974, helping to win the League Championship in 1974-75. He played for Everton, Derby again and Torquay, since managing Middlesbrough, Millwall, Bolton Wanderers, Arsenal, Norwich City and Wigan Athletic.

SYD OWEN: Long-serving England international centre-half who skippered Luton Town in the 1959 FA Cup final. Signing professional for Birmingham City in October 1945, he moved to Luton in June 1947 and starred in their 1951-52 FA Cup run, 1952-53 promotion near-miss and 1954-55 promotion success. He was 'Footbally of the Year' in 1958-59 and netted three goals in 388 League games before becoming Luton's manager for a year in May 1959. Subsequently Leeds United's chief coach under Don Revie until October 1975, he then coached at Birmingham, Hull City and Manchester United. He died in August 1998.

MAL DONAGHY: Northern Ireland international central defender who gained a club record 58 caps while at Luton Town. He moved to Kenilworth Road from Larne in June 1978 and was ever-present as Luton won the Second Division title in 1981-82

and were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85. Voted 'Player of the Year' in 1985-86, he was an FA Cup semi-finalist again in 1987-88 and starred in that season's Littlewoods Cup final triumph. He netted 16 goals in 410 League games for the Hatters prior to joining Manchester United for £650,000 in October 1988, then returned on loan before moving to Chelsea in August 1992.

RICKY HILL: England international midfielder who was 'Player of the Year' when Luton Town won the Second Division title in 1981-82. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in May 1976, he was 'Player of the Year' again in 1982-83 and starred as Luton were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85. He featured in two consecutive Littlewoods Cup finals including the 1988 Wembley triumph and netted 54 goals in 436 League games before moving to Le Havre in July 1989. Reuniting with David Pleat at Leicester City in August 1990 and later as a coach at Sheffield Wednesday and Spurs, he briefly rejoined Luton as manager.

BRIAN STEIN: England international striker who scored twice in Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Edgware Town in October 1977, he was leading marksman in Luton's 1981-82 Second Division success and also starred, as they were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88. He joined Caen in July 1988 and moved via Annecy back to Luton in July 1991. Voted 'Player of the Year' for the second time in 1991-92, he netted 130 goals in 427 League games overall for the Hatters before joining Barnet in August 1992. His younger brother Mark also played for Luton.

MICK HARFORD: England international striker who played for Luton Town in consecutive Littlewoods Cup finals including the

1988 Wembley triumph. Signing professional for Lincoln City in July 1977, he had spells with Newcastle United, Bristol City and Birmingham City prior to joining Luton in December 1984. He starred as the Hatters were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88, moving to Derby County in January 1990 and returning to Luton in September 1991. Joining Chelsea in August 1992, he then played for Sunderland, Coventry and Wimbledon before coaching at Luton and Nottingham Forest.

MALCOLM MACDONALD: Ace marksman who was capped 14 times by England after leaving Luton Town. Initially with Tonbridge, he moved to Fulham in August 1968 and moved to Kenilworth Road in July 1969. He was Luton's top scorer in two consecutive seasons including the 1969-70 promotion success and netted 49 goals in 88 League games before being sold to Newcastle United for £180,000 in May 1971. An FA Cup finalist in 1974, he joined Arsenal for £333,000 in August 1976 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1978 before injury ended his career. He subsequently managed Fulham and Huddersfield Town.

PAUL WALSH: England international striker who was capped five times while at Luton Town. Signing professional for Charlton Athletic in October 1979, he starred in their 1980-81 promotion success and moved to Luton in July 1982. He was 'Player of the Year' in 1982-83 and leading marksman in 1983-84, netting 24 goals in 80 First Division games for the Hatters prior to joining Liverpool in May 1984. Helping to win the League Championship in 1985-86, he joined Tottenham Hotspur in February 1988 and was an FA Cup winner in 1991. He later played for Portsmouth and Manchester City until injury ended his career.



And still the home hoodoo goes on .. Everything has been blamed for City's horrendous run at Valley Parade. The crowd, the players, the clocks going back, even the pitch has come in for some stick for not having enough "life" in it.

So perhaps it's the turn of the clothes to come under the spotlight.

I'm not talking about Tim Thornton's dodgy monogrammed Pulse jacket but the change of home kit. Let's face facts, City still haven't won a home game since switching shirts earlier this season.

By my calculations, City first wore the new "half and half" claret and amber jerseys for the Colchester game - the one AFTER they had beaten Sheffield Wednesday. The score was a disappointing 2-2 and the standard had been set.

I don't need to remind anyone that City have not won a home game of any sort since the Wednesday success in October - wearing the previous shirt.

Clearly, we have discovered the true reason of this jinx .

Surely the run has to end sometimes and as any seasoned Bantams fan will tell you, it's bound to happen against one of the big boys.

Compare the home form against sides in the top half of the table with those in the bottom reaches.

MK Dons (and just mentioning that

name sends a shudder down the spine) were only the latest in a long line of "minnows" to emerge from Valley Parade with broad grins and a healthy points haul.

City have hosted five of the bottom six and not beaten any of them.

Stockport are still to come here but we know what happened the last time they arrived at Valley Parade in bottom spot. Just the 4-2 wasn't it?

Conversely, City have the habit of reserving their bigger performances for the bigger games. And none come bigger in League One this season than Luton.

I remember heading for Kenilworth Road full of hope on the back of those five straight October wins that powered City into second spot. Another victory that day would have brought them within one point of top spot.

Of course, it didn't happen and City were soundly beaten. But getting soundly beaten by a side as good as that is totally different to letting in another four at home to a Dons team who had lost their last nine trips away from the concrete cows.

So what a perfect occasion this afternoon to banish the memories of that previous home horror show.

And let's hope City can give short shrift to my shirt theory.

The City fans were in no doubt as they belted out the victory chorus from the Leppings Lane End.

"One team in Yorkshire, there's only one team in Yorkshire."

Six wins and a draw from the seven inter-county scuffles this season prove that their team are the top Tykes.

Saturday's hard-earned success at Hillsborough also demonstrated once again that there are two Bradford Citys.

"I think you've seen the best of us out there," said Colin Todd. "A lot of people saw the worst of us against MK Dons but that's football."

"A lot of people said our season was dead and buried after Tuesday. But as I've been telling the players, there's no better place to come and put the show back on the road than at Sheffield Wednesday."

The Owls were unbeaten in two months. City had not won since New Year's Day at Port Vale - only whipping boys Stockport had a worse record over the previous six games.

And they were coming off a home spanking from the worst travellers in the division.

But this is the Coca-Cola Football League One where form means absolutely nothing.

City's players had it all to prove after Tuesday and another defeat would

have seen the play-off dreams drift away further than ever.

So what a time for the Bantams to remind the doubters exactly what they are capable of.

Reputations were on the line, none more so than goalkeeper Paul Henderson after his uncharacteristic wobble in midweek.

Todd had pondered making a switch for Saturday and bringing in Donovan Ricketts.

But he opted to keep faith with the stopper who has hardly put a foot wrong before Tuesday. It was a powerful response all round. Andy Cooke gave his best display yet in a City shirt up front and his part in the winning goal should not be underestimated.

In midfield, Steve Schumacher's welcome return added zip and zest and brought legs to the piston-like work-rate of Lee Crooks.

And at the back, normal service was resumed with no hangovers from the uncertainties that had reared their head against the Dons.

The tone was set from the opening moments when Paul Tierney galloped down the left flank and caused panic with his cross.

Tierney, recalled at left back, looked sharp from the off and was involved in the move which produced the first goal on six minutes.

His pass from halfway picked out Dean Windass, one of five former Owls in the City line-up. The striker's control was superb as he lured in two defenders before slipping a pass out to

Nicky Summerbee, who drilled the ball first time across keeper David Lucas.

It was also the first time City had struck in the opening ten minutes since Zema Abbey's dramatic start at Brentford. And the performance that followed was arguably the best since that November win at Griffin Park.

Wednesday had their half-chances, with James Quinn jabbing wide from six yards, but City held the upper hand for 45 minutes.

And they could have had a second goal when Lewis Emanuel ripped past two tackles before whipping in a low ball which Lucas just managed to flick away from the sliding Windass.

He dropped back to defensive duties after the break as Tierney, who had hurt his hamstring in stoppage time, was unable to re-appear.

Ben Muirhead replaced him and could, maybe should, have been an instant hero. Racing on to Cooke's well-weighted flick, the winger's shot on the run flew the wrong side of the post by inches.

Wednesday survived and Chris Brunt's arrival from the bench gave them an extra attacking edge.

Henderson parried one skidding shot but had no chance from the free-kick after 70 minutes which led to the equaliser. Brunt's kick cannoned off the underside of the bar and bounced down and back out to where Steve MacLean was waiting to nod it past the grounded keeper.

Glenn Whelan lashed a cross-shot against the far post and David Wetherall's expertly nipped the ball away from MacLean as the supporters howled for a penalty.

Then Joey O'Brien bamboozled Muirhead to tee up Brunt, whose awful side-foot ended up nearer the corner flag than Henderson's goal.

With City on the back foot, Todd opted for a double switch and subbed the sub. Muirhead was replaced by Owen Morrison, with Craig Armstrong also joining him in place of the shattered Crooks.

The boo-boys were in their element when Morrison's first touch simply ran the ball out of play. They weren't crowing about his second, though.

With the game heading towards a draw, it should have been a routine clearance from Lee Bullen as Henderson's long kick descended in the Wednesday half.

But the Wednesday skipper tried to be clever and went to divert it back to his keeper. Cooke had read his intentions and blocked the way, laying it off to Windass, who set up Morrison to scuff the ball into the bottom corner.

The Northern Irishman had made his point - and so had City.

Todd said: "I just felt it was slipping away from us so that's why I brought off Ben and put on Morrison. He could hold the ball for us and give a bit of breathing space and it was fitting that he got the goal.

"It's like Dean Windass has said in the dressing room. Our season starts all over now and we've got another big game next week against Luton that can't come quickly enough."



The super-fast winger is desperate to get back into the starting picture after a run of substitute appearances.

Muirhead has been making regular appearances from the bench since his last start against Bournemouth on December 7.

He found his way blocked by Owen Morrison's arrival and the presence of Paul Tierney and Craig Armstrong has increased competition for the left-midfield shirt.

Muirhead said: "It's always disappointing to be left on the bench. But at least I'm getting on and when I'm on the pitch there's the chance to win my place back.

"When I get 20 minutes here or there I'm desperate to do well and put it in the gaffer's thoughts to bring me back in."

Muirhead made 22 consecutive starts in the first half of the season - a decent run considering he had been released by the Bantams at the end of last term.

The 22-year-old former Manchester United trainee believes he has improved as a player compared with a year ago.

"Having not had a club during the summer, I felt the first half of the season went very well for me. It was great to be playing every match again.

"But maybe I got a bit tired after a while and had a little dip in form in the couple of games leading up to me being left out. Nobody's place is guaranteed.

"All I can do is stay confident and when I do get the chance, make sure I grab it with both hands.

"With Owen coming in and Paul Tierney as well, it has made it extra hard to get a place in the team.

But I know that given the opportunity, my ability can shine through.

"I've had a rest and now I'm raring to go again and help us to get back up the table.

"A lot of people were writing us off at the start of the season and we were favourites to go down. But we have the belief and spirit in the squad to go out there and do well."

There is no more exciting sight at Valley Parade than Muirhead motoring towards the opposing goal at full speed. No defender enjoys facing an attacker at full tilt.

And the player gets just as big a buzz from running with the ball as the City supporters.

"I am in the team to get the crowd going with the ball at my feet," he said.

"I want the crowd on their feet when I get the ball. I know I can do that when I run at defences."

One surge and shot produced a cracking goal in

the 5-4 win at Tranmere in October - Muirhead's only goal of the campaign so far.


He would love to add to that. But his first goal is to make a fresh start.

BRISTOL CITY player-boss Brian Tinnion will retire from playing at the end of this season. Tinnion, 36, will hang up his boots before then if the team start winning games without him being in the side. He said: "I never expected to play so many games this season when I took the manager's job. "I now want to concentrate fully on being a manager because it's a difficult enough job without having to play as well." Tinnion added: "A one-match ban rules me out of Saturday and if the team do well without me I shall not select myself again. "I hope that is the case and it's up to the other midfield players to ensure it is."

Sheffield United have agreed to extend striker Luke Beckett's loan spell at **HUDDERSFIELD TOWN** for another month. The 29-year-old has scored five times in five games for the Terriers. Huddersfield manager Peter Jackson said: "Sheffield have a 24-hour recall on him but I am happy and I thank them for their help. "Luke has been improving and scoring goals and it would surprise me if, when he does go back to Sheffield, he doesn't get into the first team."

MK DONS manager Danny Wilson reckons exciting times lie in store for the club if they can avoid relegation. The Coca-Cola Football League 1 side have won their last two games to move fourth bottom and Wilson said: "If we stay up the future will look far, far better. I think a lot of people raised their eyebrows when I first came down but there is a big catchment area and great potential here. But the priority at the moment is to stabilise and stay in this division." The Dons, in their previous incarnation as Wimbledon, left Selhurst Park for Milton Keynes in 2003, three years after slipping out of the Premier League. Relegation again last year has been followed by another fraught battle against the drop this season - as the newly-renamed MK Dons. When Wilson took over at the club on 7 December he became the third manager of the season after Stuart Murdoch and Jimmy Gilligan.

BRENTFORD manager Martin Allen says he has no plans to leave the club despite being approached by agents encouraging him to move on to a higher level. Allen has guided the Bees into the FA Cup fifth round and a play-off place in the Coca-Cola Football League One. "I have been an opportunity of making a career at Brentford," said Allen. "Agents call


me up all the time saying you will go to the top but I am only concentrating on Brentford and have no intention of moving anywhere."

CHESTERFIELD manager Roy McFarland believes his side have to be viewed as serious play-off contenders. The Spirites are seven points away from sixth placed Brentford but have beaten Bristol City and Doncaster Rovers in their last two away games. McFarland said: "We've got to believe that we can make the Play-Offs and we all have that vision and are working toward it. Nobody in this division can say they have had an east game against us."

Like Bantams boss Colin Todd, **SWINDON TOWN** manager Andy King believes his club will suffer from the introduction of transfer windows to the Football League next season. King says smaller clubs like Swindon, who cannot afford huge squads, will not be able to sign replacements for injured players outside the window. "It's going to be a disadvantage unless we can find the resources to improve the squad," he said. "At the moment on the resources I'm working under, we can't do that." The system, which allows teams to sign players only during the summer break and in January, is already operating in the Premiership but it is due to come into force in the lower leagues next season.

SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY have extended the loan spell of Bolton Wanderers midfielder Joey O'Brien for a third and final month. The Irishman had been due to return to the Reebok Stadium after the Owls' Yorkshire derby defeat by Bradford City at Hillsborough last Saturday. O'Brien will now remain with Wednesday until their trip to Brentford on 26 February, report the club's website. The 18-year-old has scored two goals in 12 appearances for the Yorkshire club.

BARNESLEY manager Paul Hart is mulling over a move for Stockport striker Warren Feeney. "It is true that I have spoken to Chris Turner about Warren Feeney," said Hart. "But at this stage there is nothing more to add." Feeney, who has three caps for Northern Ireland, joined the Hatters from Bournemouth for £45,000 in July 2004. The 24-year-old, who started at Leeds, has made 25 League appearances for Stockport, scoring eight goals.



This coming week sees the return of the Champions League and this time it gets really serious, with the commencement knockout stages. With all four English teams surviving the group stages, we have to have a great chance of further progress. It's certainly the priority now for Arsenal and Manchester United with the Premiership title all but out reach barring a Devon Loch style collapse by Chelsea. The round of 16 is seeded, and further manipulated so teams from the same country can't face each other, with it only becoming a total free for all in the quarter finals.

I'll be doing commentary with Alvin Martin on talkSPORT of the Arsenal and Chelsea away games this week, against Bayern Munich and Barcelona respectively. The Gunners ought to progress against the Germans, but they do appear to be the archetypal "flat-track bullies" Look at their recent demolition jobs against Villa and Palace, but compare those performances with that against United. They didn't win away from home in the group stages against Panathanaikos, Rosenborg or PSV, and it does seem when the pressure's on they crack. Chelsea are joint favorites to win the competition, but they're not the same side without Arjen Robben. Jose Mourinho said he hoped for a trip to the Nou Camp, but even his confidence may have been slightly dented.

That tie would have made for a cracking Final, likewise United's clash with AC Milan. United are in unbelievable form at the moment, and with Ruud Van Nistlerooy, Alan Smith and Louis Saha back in the equation now can't be discounted. Fergie's got the sort of selection problems now that every manager craves, but he's got to consider whether to fix something that's not broken. Does he change his shape from a 4-3-3 to a 4-4-2 to accommodate Van Nistlerooy and Rooney together, or continue with Rooney wide. Where then for Ryan Giggs? I think United at the moment are playing as well, if not better than at times during The Treble season, but equally there's more quality for them to come up against this time. When the draw was made, Liverpool seemed to be given the easiest tie of the English sides, against Bayer Leverkusen, who are 6th in the Bundesliga. However, given Liverpool's form of late, directly related to all their injuries, and the fact that Fernando Morientes is ineligible, I can now see the chance of a German double.

I hope not though, and will continue to fly the flag for all our teams. The dream would be all four into the semi-finals, but I think I'd offer odds against that rather than taking them. The further the teams go, the better for English football. I keep hearing about the Premiership being the best league in Europe, but in the last 20 years only United have brought the Cup back. That's something that could change this year.



The Match

In the days before players earned tens of thousands of pounds a week, and could expect to play upwards of a dozen Champions League matches each season, selection for infrequent European or World Selects was regarded as being a particular honour.

There were no phantom injuries or cash demands when UEFA or FIFA asked if you would like to play in a match to celebrate some anniversary - the chance to play with and against the best players in the world was incentive enough to make the trip abroad.

A year after the Football Association celebrated their Centenary in Scotland, the Danish Football Association celebrated their 75th anniversary, and arranged a match between Scandinavia and the Rest of Europe. It is fascinating to look back on the players selected for the game, and to see how familiar faces in British football were regarded on the Continent.

The British Isles were well represented. Ray Wilson of Huddersfield Town, Jimmy Greaves of Spurs and Bobby Charlton of Manchester United were the Englishmen selected. There were four from Scotland - Jim Baxter (Rangers), Denis Law (Manchester United), Dundee full back Alex Hamilton who came on as a substitute, and Willie Henderson of Rangers who was one of the reserves.

Others selected for the squad, who did not play, were Hans Tilkowski of West Germany,

Gelata of Czechoslovakia, and Augusto of Portugal. The Scandinavian select included Norwegian Roald Jensen, who later joined Hearts, and in reserve was the Dane Carl Bertelsen who signed for Morton.

The list of goalscorers has those who remember them drooling at the sheer quality on view that evening - Jimmy Greaves, Denis Law and Eusabio.

The Programme

The Dansk Boldspil-Union issued their usual 16 page A5 size programme, featuring a sculpture of two footballers on the cover, a design that was to feature on most of their programmes for a number of years.


Page three contained an article on the last 25 years of the Danish Football Association, opposite a half page advert and a list of F.A. officials. The article continued onto page 4, where it was illustrated with a photo of Benfica's Eusabio in action against Sporting Lisbon.

Two pages of pen pictures of the Scandinavian squad were followed by the evening's Programme of Events. The centre fold featured team selections, in 2-3-5 formation, with head-only photos of the 22 players and 3 match officials. The top and bottom of the centre spread featured a curious design, of many sets of cartoon eyeballs on a brown background.

There were two-and-a-half pages of pen pictures of the Rest of Europe squad, and another half page advertisement. Page 13 carried head-only photographs of the remaining players in both squads, and what seemed to be a list of internationals played by Denmark since 1906.

An aerial photograph of the Idrætsparken was accompanied by some text, and what appears to be a short poem. The only full page advert in the programme was on the inside back page, for the B.T. newspaper, and the back page featured another poem, the crest of the Danish Football Association, a lucky programme number, and the price - 1 Krone. Upwards of £5 would buy this programme on dealers' catalogues.

Have you noticed how many athletes, and I use that term in its widest term, have been wearing bracelets recently? The first to be exhibited was the yellow live strong band, part of the Lance Armstrong foundation. Armstrong of course overcame cancer to compete and be a champion once again in cycling's most gruelling test, the Tour de France.

We know that racism still exists in sport at some levels. We all heard the chants in Madrid. We saw those sickening pictures from Ewood Park directed at Dwight Yorke. I know wearing a black and white intertwined wrist band isn't going to stop some mindless thug from throwing racist abuse, but it might just stop those seated or standing nearby laughing.





Previous Encounters



Good afternoon and welcome to Luton Town. It is over thirty years since Luton visited Valley Parade for a league match, but they have made two visits in cup competitions during that time. The Hatters beat us here in the F A Cup last year 2-1. In 1990-91 we were drawn together in the then Rumbelows Cup, following 1-1 draws both at Kenilworth Road and here, City won a thrilling penalty shoot out 5-4. John Dreyer was on target for Luton, but the only player to miss his spot kick was current Crystal Palace manager Iain Dowie.

Looking back as far as the 1967-68 season when both clubs were members of the plainly named Fourth Division. Luton Town were clearly the best team in the division and won the Championship with points to spare. They finished five points clear of Barnsley, but did lose two of their last three matches. Barnsley won six of their last seven games giving some idea of what the points difference might have been. For City this would be a nearly season. They certainly played their part in a thrilling league season. They led the table for a spell in October and then January. They had to overcome the shock resignation of manager Willie Watson when we were top of the table in January 1968, then the sudden and tragic death of their newly appointed manager, Grenville Hair at the ridiculously early age of 36 in March. To finish fifth I suppose was a reasonable return. Two points prevented them procuring promotion. If only they had defeated Bradford Park Avenue or Halifax Town or Brentford all of whom won at Valley Parade during February and March. When Luton came to Valley Parade on Saturday December 2nd 1967, they were third in the table with City fourth with an equal number of points as

Luton (28). City were unbeaten in nine home matches and unbeaten in three in all. Luton had won their previous eight games. The match produced an exciting tussle with City pretty much holding the upper hand. City took an all important early lead when Paul Aimson scored following a defensive mix up after only nine minutes. Luton were second best during the first half and were a little fortunate to be only one goal down at the break. City began the second half as they did the first. In the 47th minute Charlie Rackstraw's shot at goal rebounded from Bruce Bannister, fortunately it rebounded straight back to Rackstraw who then drove it into the net. As the game wore on Luton got back into the game and showed their best form. Debutant Hugh McLeish hit a post and that was the nearest Luton came to scoring. The final whistle blew with City leading 2-0. The teams for this fixture were.

By the time City visited Kenilworth Road on Saturday April 27th 1968 the Championship had been sealed by Luton. They had clinched the title the previous Wednesday evening fittingly at Kenilworth


Road, when they defeated Crewe 4-0. Of their 21 league matches at home they had won 18 previously and were eight points ahead of nearest contenders Barnsley. Their form was awesome their last defeat had been suffered in January at Hartlepools. Since then they had played nineteen matches without defeat. Our own form wasn't bad at all, suffering only one defeat at Rochdale (3-2) in the last nine games. The Luton programme rightly had items from the club itself and their supporters club, congratulating the team on their magnificent performance over the season. The programme notes in previewing the City match reflected that of Luton's five defeats that season two had occurred in Bradford with Park Avenue also beating them in a stirring 2-1 victory in December. Once again City got the best of starts with recent signing Bobby Ham scoring after 11 minutes. Luton were stung into action but spirited defending and some sound goalkeeping kept City ahead at half time. City were forced back onto the defensive after the break and Luton gained a break through when they were awarded a penalty on the hour. Winger Ray Whittaker converted the spot kick to level the scores. City who were fourth in the table and needed a win to stay clear of Hartlepools who had two games in hand on them, poured forward again. They regained the lead in the 73rd minute when centre back Barry Swallow towered above the home defence to score with a header. This time the defending was more dogged than previously as City fought to retain their tenuous lead. In the dying seconds referee David Wallace once again pointed to the penalty spot, but this time it was awarded to City. The result was almost a certainty given Charlie Rackstraw's track record from twelve yards. Despite

any tension present Rackstraw calmly placed the ball past Read and City celebrated a 3-1 victory against the League Champions. Not only that, they inflicted the only defeat of Luton at Kenilworth Road that season, they also completed the only double recorded against Luton. Luton won the Championship with a massive 66 points, also promoted were Barnsley (61 points), Hartlepools (60) and Crewe (58). City finished fifth with 57 points which would ordinarily have been sufficient to ensure promotion. City were promoted the following season so caught up with Luton for the 1969-70 season at the completion of which Luton once again achieved a promotion. The two teams have managed to avoid each other since. The teams for the Kenilworth Road clash were.




been on the field a few minutes and it is uncanny how often players pop up and score against their former clubs.

back many happy memories. City have surely got to string together a sequence of good results at home at some stage this season, and lets hope the winning run here at Valley Parade begins today.



At Bradford City Football Club we want every single person, whether a regular or visiting supporter, to safely enjoy their day with us. The following Safety Policy shows how committed we are to ensuring safety within the Stadium:

STADIUM SAFETY POLICY

Safety for spectators attending events at the Stadium is of paramount importance and with this in mind we make public our Safety Policy which is as follows:

1. Provide an organisational structure for the implementation of safety on matchdays.
2. Provide training for matchday staff.
3. Comply fully with the Stadium Safety Certificate.
4. Undertake to carry out emergency procedure practices during events.
5. Arrange for emergency contingency plans.
6. Maintain records of all events held at the Stadium.
7. Continually monitor and improve Club Safety Systems.
8. Liaise with all other agencies on matters relating to safety and crowd control.
9. Positively encourage spectators to communicate safety issues to the Club.
10. Ensure that spectators are aware of the Stadium emergency procedures.

If you have any queries or suggestions regarding any safety issues please do not hesitate to contact the Club's Safety Officer - Chris Patzelt.

GROUND REGULATIONS

Notice: Entry to the Ground is expressly subject to acceptance by the visitor of these Ground Regulations and the rules and regulations of FIFA, UEFA, The Football Association, The FA, Premier League and The Football League in respect of the relevant competition. The Ground Regulations incorporate the Club's Customer Charter (if any). Entry to the Ground shall constitute acceptance of the Ground Regulations.

"Ground" means this football stadium and all locations owned, occupied or utilised by the Club.

"Club" means this football club.

"Match" means any association football match taking place at the Ground.

1. Permission to enter or to remain within the Ground (notwithstanding possession of any ticket) is at the absolute discretion of the Club, any police officer or authorised steward. On no account will admission be granted to a person who is the subject of a current Banning Order.

2. The Club excludes to the maximum extent permitted by law any liability for loss, injury or damage to persons/property in or around the Ground.

3. No guarantees can be given by the Club that a Match will take place at a particular time or on a particular date and the Club reserves the right to reschedule the Match without notice and without any liability whatsoever.

4. In the event of the postponement or abandonment of the Match, refunds (if any) will be made in accordance with the Club's Customer Charter. The Club will have no further liability whatsoever, including (but not limited to) any indirect or consequential loss or damage, such as (but not limited to) loss of enjoyment or travel costs.

5. All persons seeking entrance to the Ground acknowledge the Club's right to search any person entering the Ground and to refuse entry to or eject from the Ground any person refusing to submit to such a search.

6. The following articles must not be brought within the Ground - knives, fireworks, smoke canisters, air-horns, flares, weapons, dangerous or hazardous items, laser devices, bottles, glass vessels, cans, poles and any article that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety. Any person in possession of such items will be refused entry to the Ground.

7. The use of threatening behaviour, foul or abusive language is strictly forbidden and will result in arrest and/or ejection from the Ground. The Club may impose a ban for one or more Matches.

7.1 Racial abuse, chanting or harassment is strictly forbidden and will result in arrest and/or ejection from the Ground. The Club may impose a ban for one or more Matches.

7.2 The following acts are arrestable offences under the Football (Offences) Act 1991, as amended:

7.2.1 The throwing of any object within the Ground without lawful authority or excuse.

7.2.2 The chanting of anything of an indecent or racialist nature.

7.2.3 The entry onto the playing area or any adjacent area to which spectators are not generally admitted without lawful authority or excuse.

Conviction may result in a Banning Order being made.

8. All persons entering the Ground may only occupy the seat allocated to them by their ticket and must not move from any one part of the Ground to another without the express permission or instruction of any steward, officer of the Club and/or any police officer.

9. Nobody may stand in any seating area whilst play is in progress. Persistent standing in seated areas whilst play is in progress is strictly forbidden and may result in ejection from the Ground.

10. The obstruction of gangways, access ways, exits and entrances, stairways and like places is strictly forbidden. Nobody entering the Ground shall be permitted to climb any structures within the Ground.

10.1 Smoking in No-Smoking areas is strictly forbidden.

11. Mobile telephones are permitted within the Ground, provided that they are used for personal and private use only.

12. Under the Sporting Events (Control of Alcohol etc) Act 1985, the following are offences for which a person can be arrested by a police officer and conviction could result in a Banning Order being made:

12.1 Attempting to enter the Ground or being inside the Ground whilst drunk;

12.2 Being in possession of any intoxicating liquor, or bottle, can or other portable container and which could cause damage or personal injury, when entering the Ground or in a public area of the Ground from which the event can be directly viewed.

13. Any individual who has entered any part of the Ground designated for the use of any group of supporters to which he does not belong may be ejected from the Ground either for the purposes of his own safety or for any other reason.

14. No person (other than a person who holds an appropriate licence) may bring into the Ground or use within the Ground any equipment, which is capable of recording or transmitting (by digital or other means) any audio, visual or audio-visual material or any information or data in relation to the Match or the Ground. Copyright in any unauthorised recording or transmission is assigned (by way of present assignment of future copyright pursuant to section 91 of the Copyright, Designs and Patents Act 1988) to the Club.

15. No goods (including literature) of any nature may be offered either free or for sale by any person within the Ground without the express written permission of the Club.

15.1 Tickets are not transferable and may not be offered for sale without the prior written permission of the Club. Any tickets offered for sale may be confiscated by any steward, officer of the Club or any police officer.

16. CCTV cameras are in use around and in the Ground and the Club may itself use or pass to the police or any Football Authority, any recordings for use in any proceedings.

17. At all times whilst present in the Ground, persons must comply with any and all instructions of any steward or officer of the Club and/or any police officer. Failure to comply with any instruction may lead to immediate ejection from the Ground.

18. The Club reserves absolutely the right to eject from the Ground any person failing to comply with any of the Ground Regulations or whose presence within the Ground is, or could, reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to any other person. This could lead to further action by the Club including, but not limited to, the withdrawal of any season ticket (without reimbursement) and other benefits.

18.1 Entry to the Ground shall constitute acceptance of the Ground Regulations.

Is England Coach Sven Goran Eriksson getting too big for his boots in trying to change our national game?

I believe he has far too much to say about the way English football is organised and controlled and that it is about time he put a sock in it and stopped trying to interfere with traditions that have stood the test of time.

The Swede has been desperately striving to persuade the Premier League to introduce a mid-season shut down to give his England players a rest.

He wants our treasured FA Cup competition reduced by eliminating replays in the latter stages of the competition and the suggestion to stage the Cup Final in midweek stems from his proposals to give his players a four-week break before the World Cup Finals.

Instead of interfering with our traditions what he should be concentrating on is fashioning a team that is good enough to qualify for those finals and then make an impression in them and in this department he hasn't done that brilliantly so far.

Yet he continues to interfere in domestic issues his latest being comments on the controversy between Arsenal and Chelsea over the alleged tapping-up of the Gunners and England left-back Ashley Cole.

On the Cole situation Eriksson had this to say: "As a professional football player, it must be your right to listen if there are some other works available. We don't live in a dictatorship we live in a democratic country."

What about loyalty?

"Loyalty, yes, is important, but contracts end and that's life," responded the England Coach. "Normally it's not a problem."

Not for him of course but then I suppose such a view is to be expected from a man who himself while employed by the FA had "social" meetings with Roman Abramovich and Peter Kenyon – Chelsea's chief executive – when the Stamford Bridge club were looking to oust Claudio Ranieri from the managerial seat.

No doubt Eriksson will not have endeared himself to the Arsenal hierarchy, which of course includes Vice Chairman David Dein, an influential figure within the FA. Not only is it wrong for the England Coach to comment publicly on internal matters between clubs but it is downright crass

stupidity and ignorance to flagrantly support someone breaking the rules.

The Premier League has made it quite clear. A spokesman said: "A professional footballer under contract does not have the right to speak to another club without the permission of his current employers. The Premier League rules are clear on that."

In Ashley Cole's case of course he still has two-and-a-half years left on his contract with Arsenal so if the allegations are correct it is far more serious than just testing the waters with a player nearing the end of his agreement.

There is an ongoing enquiry into this affair so was Eriksson trying to pre-empt its investigation and help his friend Kenyon out of a hole?

When challenged on BBC Radio Five Live about a meeting with Cole, Kenyon answered the question with a "no comment" reply which gives one the impression that there had been such a meeting for if untrue he surely would have categorically denied the accusation out of hand.

Whatever the England Coach's motive is in getting involved it is my humble opinion that Eriksson carries too much unsavoury baggage to make him worthy of the office of England Coach.

The sponsorship package involves York City renaming their Bootham Crescent ground KitKat Crescent so if ever you feel the need to have a break from Championship football you now know where to go.

The two-year KitKat partnership is worth £100,000 to the Club securing their short term future which had been in doubt following attempts by the chairman to re-develop the land for commercial purposes.



Having let ourselves down so badly at home to the Milton Keynes Dons the boys bounced back in grand style to end Sheffield Wednesday's 10-match unbeaten run with that historical 2-1 win at Hillsborough last week.

Owen Morrison's stoppage-time winner secured our eighth away win of the season and with three draws to back that up Bradford City proudly boasts the best away record this season in Coca-Cola League One.

Even the Division's leading team Luton Town can't match this and next Tuesday we have a date with Blackpool at Bloomfield Road where hopefully we can stretch our winning sequence even further.

The former England and Arsenal star was deep in the dumps when I last spoke to him following a 5-0 thumping at Colchester United, and seemed to be on the verge of quitting. What had upset him most was the abuse he received from his own fans when he went over to take corner kicks.

It is a great shame when such a gifted player is treated in such a way just because the fans expect them to win. Anyway they picked themselves off the floor with Merson opening the scoring in a dramatic 4-3 home win over Huddersfield Town since when they have drawn 2-2 at home with Wrexham.
