

In Charge Moore The Merrier

First and foremost let me say what a disappointing result and performance it was for all concerned against Brentford here on Tuesday night.

We knew what sort of game it was going to be because Brentford are not a footballing side but play very direct and it is certainly a system which suits them. What made it harder to take was the fact that in our previous three games while myself and John Breckin have been in charge we had given ourselves a lot of hope.

There was a good display with a 3-0 win over Port Vale in our first game and we could and should have taken something from the two outings against Wrexham. It was also bitterly disappointing to go down like we did in front of our home crowd.

The owners, directors, myself and Breckin all want to take this club forward but one or two players didn't have the show character and commitment and perhaps they should look themselves in the face and do a little bit more to earn the money they are being paid.

We have got into their ribs and I fully expect to see a lot more desire this afternoon.

I was a bit disappointed with some of the crowd who had a go at our directors after the Brentford game because they really are trying to do their best, there is no doubt about that.

It is a refreshing change to have people in charge who are ambitious; I was at one club for nine years where they were happy just to stay as they were.

I have again spent the week trying to bring in a striker and a midfielder and I was hoping to add them to squad to face Luton.


One of my targets was **Gary Jones**



(below) at Tranmere but he broke a bone in one of his toes on Wednesday and will be out for six weeks and that sums up the luck we have been having in our player search. It has been far from easy, I can tell you.

I got in touch with one club who quoted me a figure of £200,000 and they are in our division! That's ridiculous money. Even on the loan front it has been just as difficult. **Neil Warnock** (below) has nine strikers at Sheffield United but he won't let any of them go.


I am not making excuses but I must have been in touch with sixty clubs now and I am still trying. Some of them agreed to share wages only for the player to say he wasn't interested in a move. A lot of them seem to be happy playing reserve team football rather than get involved in



a relegation dogfight. Perhaps they feel it might damage their reputation. Perhaps we might have to take a gamble and pitch in with a little more money. I am not talking behind players' backs - they all know my feelings - but we are a little soft-centred, too brittle and not mentally cute enough.

We need to do something because we have to make sure we are playing at this level next season. We face another tough encounter this afternoon and we welcome **Mike Newell** (above right), his players, directors and all the travelling fans to Boundary Park

Luton have had a terrific season and Mike, a Liverpool lad I know well, has done a tremendous job. They have been up there all season and I hope he achieves promotion, but only after we take three points off them this afternoon. But I we won't make the mistake of thinking it will be anywhere near easy.



Luton are a big, strong side with quality players in the right areas and a good mix of youth and experience. They can also play a bit.

If we produce the form we displayed in the three games before Brentford then we are in with a chance.

There is not a great deal between the top and bottom in this division but we must get our formation right, be organised and, above all, show desire, then this is a game we can win. To update you on the injury front, Rodney Jack is still not right and will continue his progress in the reserves next week while Danny Hall has decided to have electrocis treatment on his knee to try to avoid surgery that could keep him out for up to 18 months.

We are still talking to **Jermaine Johnson**

(below) and working towards a deal that would be on a pay-as-you-play deal.

Having a fully fit JJ in the side would be a massive boost. There are still some big games to come and I can understand the frustrations following the display against Brentford.

I urge you all to get behind the players and give them as much backing as much as you can, every little helps.

The gaffer didn't pull any punches in the dressing room after Tuesday night's defeat by Brentford and he let us know exactly what he thought of our performance.

He also had us in the following morning to watch a video when he again gave us his thoughts. It will come as no surprise to anybody that he was far from happy.

Yes, we are in the mire and that game has gone. We have to put it behind us and make sure we go out this afternoon against the league leaders and give it everything we have got. As I have said before, we are all in this together and no blame is being laid at anybody's feet. We were in a similar position last season and with more or less the same players we dug ourselves out of a whole with some great performances, notably against Plymouth and Swindon.

We have to do it all over again and there is no reason why we can't.

There are nine games left for us to get out of the mire and we all know we will have to do much better than we did against Brentford. It will be far from easy this afternoon against a side that has been on top of the division for most of the season, but we need to show

what we are made of. We know what we have to do and it is no good just talking about it, we have to perform to the best of our abilities out on the pitch.

We do it in training and we have to take it into games. I know the fans weren't happy.

They pay their money and are entitled to voice their opinions but I would urge them to stick with us because we need them behind us more than ever as we go into a make-or-break stage of the season. Not one player wants this club to go down and we will be working as hard as possible to make sure the unthinkable doesn't happen. Every game from here on in is going to be like a cup final and although it has been a difficult season for our supporters, I just hope they stick with us through this difficult patch.

If we can recapture the form that knocked Manchester City out of the cup there is no reason why we can't beat off the threat of relegation and that means everybody involved with the club has to give their all and help each other out.

There is no point getting on people's backs when things aren't going so well.

Other teams will be watching us losing games at home and we have to show more willingness and start grinding out results.

People are doubting us but it is only a few games ago that we put in an encouraging performance here to beat Port Vale 3-0.

We have been under-achieving, we know that, but nobody goes out to have a bad game. You won't hear anyone in the dressing room even remotely suggest that we are throwing in the towel. Far from it.

The most important thing on our minds is to stay in this division.


The gaffer and John Breckin have had their say. We listened, took it on board and went home to think about it. I have watched the game and Brentford didn't create much, but neither did we.

We knew they were going to come at us but we weren't getting stretched all over the place and they were both soft goals to give away.

That has been the story this season and the pressure is now on for us to deliver. We have to go out fighting and mental toughness will play a big part. I am sure teams below us would like to swap places and be in our position.

They are relying on other results going for them but our destiny is still in our hands,

They say that the Premiership is the best league in the world, only in England's top flight could the top team rip apart most of the top ten and the struggle to a 1-0 win against the only team nearly certain to be relegated. West Brom also had a disallowed goal to take back to the Hawthorns with them. Although the title is, in many peoples opinion, out of the reach of anyone below Chelsea, the rest of the Premiership can gain confidence from the fact that the Blues are not as indestructible as they once seemed and next season we could see a much more open title race, between the top three of course.


A top three which, once again, Liverpool are not part of. **Jose Mourinho**'s claims that Chelsea have already got Steven Gerrard from Liverpool looks like even more bad news for Kop fans as they struggled on Tuesday to a point against a weary Blackburn. The unacceptable result came WITH their inspirational captain in the side, and the Reds may as well enjoy the Champions League run while it lasts. Speaking of the Champions League, Everton are



looking increasingly likely to be representing England next season and so will need to dip into the transfer market so as not to be humiliated. As well as looking to make Mikel Arteta's loan from Real Sociedad permanent, they will try to bring in Darren Fletcher from Man Utd, Luis Boa Morte from Fulham and Freddie Kanoute from Spurs, if they can keep Mido permanently.



Iain Dowie has admitted he is 'flattered' to be linked with the vacant spot at Manchester City, although he is happy at Palace. The Crystal Palace boss still lives in the north west after his time at Latics and has done very well at the jobs he has had. At the same time **Gordon Strachan** is still many people's favourite, although the decision wouldn't be popular with Man Utd fans. Whoever is (un)lucky enough to be given the job, they might have to contend with losing Shaun Wright-Phillips as he is being chased by Liverpool and Arsenal and City could hardly reject a £20m+ offer. Even worse for the new boss, Steve McManaman isn't yet retiring.





of the season, the crew from Molineux wanted an immediate return to the Premiership and Hoddle, whose contract runs out at the end of the season, can't be too confident of retaining his current post, however when the alternative is Kevin Keegan...

The Championship has now got only eight games to go, and after the top three all won on Tuesday there are still only three points separating them. Despite an amazing goal difference, Wigan are only level with Sunderland, and Ipswich, certainties for promotion three weeks ago, are trailing the top two but have the 'easiest' run-in. Certainly more entertainment than the Premiership is providing. Also, the play-offs are looking very interesting this year, along with one of the top three, Derby, Preston, Reading, West Ham, Sheffield United and Stoke will fight it out over the remaining games in order to try and win promotion to the 'promised land' of the Premiership.

At the bottom Ronnie Moore's former club Rotherham are going down, or, they still stand a mathematical chance of staying up, if you want to soften the blow. Notts Forest are also looking like major relegation candidates, they are four points from safety and have a tough run in which could just be enough. If it is, they will be joined by one of seven clubs.

Only four points are between Gillingham, in the final relegation place, and fifteenth placed Watford. The group includes such big names as Leicester and Crewe, who were not long since after a play-off place. The only lacklustre part of the league is the mid-table battle for nothing. Leeds, QPR and Millwall will all still fancy their chances of a play-off place and so only Wolverhampton Wanderers and Burnley have to endure the mediocrity of an inane end to their seasons. Not good news for **Glenn Hoddle**, who was brought in to turn Wolves' season around. He has turned them into draw specialists and while this might suffice for Chelsea at this stage

In the must-see match of midweek, the appropriately named new Boston United signing Jermaine Easter scored a brace in the 4-0 demolition of Notts County at York Street. As both teams now have nothing to play for the result was futile, but interesting all the same. Yeovil are in a similar position to Chelsea in a couple of ways, firstly they both have a 'Terry' brother stiffening up the back line, and secondly, only they can throw away the chance of finishing top. Scunthorpe should join them and the last automatic spot should be filled by Macclesfield, Southend or Swansea. Interestingly, at the bottom of the League, Cambridge have an unimpressive goal difference of -18, however one place above them, in the last relegation position, Kidderminster have four more points and a goal difference of -34. Only in England!

Club Connections

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS focuses on four players who have appeared for both clubs.



FRANKIE BUNN

Striker Frankie Bunn played for Oldham Athletic in the 1990 Littlewoods Cup final at Wembley.

A former Luton Town apprentice, he turned professional at Kenilworth Road in May 1980 and made his League debut in the Hatters' 2-1 defeat at home to Derby County three months later. He was a

member of Luton's 1981-82 Second Division title squad but struggled to secure a regular first-team slot and scored nine times in 59 League games for today's opponents. Reuniting with Brian Horton at Hull City in July 1985, he was ever-present and leading marksman for the Tigers in 1985-86.

Joe Royle paid £90,000 for him in December 1987 and he quickly impressed, helping Latics take Everton to a Littlewoods Cup third round replay in 1988-89. He netted a record six goals in Oldham Athletic's 7-0 Littlewoods Cup third round victory at home to Scarborough the following season, scoring 26 times in 78 League outings until a serious knee injury. Moving to Stalybridge Celtic in July 1992, he then played for Radcliffe Borough and was Wigan Athletic's football in the community officer.

DARRON McDONOUGH

Versatile defender Darron McDonough was a young member of Joe Royle's squad at Boundary Park. Born in Antwerp, he grew up in the Manchester area and signed professional for Oldham Athletic in January 1980. He scored on his League debut in Latics' 2-0 victory at Notts County eleven months later and played alongside Kenny Clements, also featuring in midfield and, attack. Netting 14 goals in 183 Second Division games for Oldham Athletic, he moved to Luton Town for £87,000 in September 1986 and was unlucky to miss their 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph due to injury.

He was an FA Cup semi-finalist in 1987-88 and played at Wembley in that season's Simod Cup final as well as the 1989 Littlewoods Cup final. Scoring five times in 105 League outings for today's visitors, he was Kevin Keegan's first signing for Newcastle United at £80,000 in March 1992 but suffered a catalogue of injury problems while at St James' Park and was forced to retire in April 1994. He subsequently built his own house near Oldham and helped out at his wife Ally's sandwich and tea shop.

STEVE TAYLOR

Much-travelled striker Steve Taylor was Oldham Athletic's leading marksman in 1977-78. A former Bolton Wanderers apprentice, he turned professional in October 1973 and made his League debut in their 2-1 defeat at Bristol City in September 1974. He was a League Cup semi-finalist in 1976-77 and moved to Boundary Park for £38,000 in October 1977, scoring twice on his Latics debut to clinch a 2-1 victory over Notts County. Playing alongside Alan Young and Vic Halom in attack, he netted 25 times in 47 Second Division outings prior to joining Luton Town for £50,000 in January 1979. His solitary goal in 20 League games came in the Hatters' 4-1 victory at home to Burnley two months later and he was sold to Mansfield Town for £75,000 in July 1979. He joined Burnley for £35,000 in July 1980 and starred alongside Billy Hamilton in their 1981-82 Third Division title triumph, moving to Wigan Athletic in August 1983. Subsequently with Stockport County, Rochdale, Preston and Burnley again, playing in the 1988 Sherpa Van Trophy final, he then had a spell as Mossley's manager.



PAUL WILKINSON

Former England U-21 striker Paul Wilkinson played for both Oldham Athletic and Luton Town on loan. Signing professional for Grimsby Town in November 1982, he topped their goalscoring charts in 1984-85 and was sold to Everton for £250,000 in March 1985. He featured in their 1986-87 League

Championship success and moved to Nottingham Forest for £200,000 in March 1987. Joining Watford for £300,000 in August 1988, he was leading marksman in three successive seasons and moved to Middlesbrough for £550,000 in August 1991, starring in their 1991-92 promotion campaign.

He was Boro's top scorer in consecutive seasons and helped win the First Division title in 1994-95. Moving to Oldham Athletic on loan in October 1995, his solitary goal in four League games came in the 2-2 draw at home to Port Vale. He was loaned to Luton Town in March 1996 and made three League appearances for today's visitors. Joining Barnsley in July 1996, he helped them win promotion to the Premiership in 1996-97, then played for Millwall and Northampton Town and is now coaching Cardiff City.





SCOTT VERNON

Latics striker Scott Vernon may have been out injured for the last few weeks... but he is thankful for a narrow escape.

Scott could have suffered major damage to his eyesight when he was booted in the face against Stockport last month. The injury was bad enough as he sustained a fractured eye socket and, in the immediate aftermath, was in tremendous pain. Yet, although it was a grisly incident, Scott realises he was lucky.

He admitted: "I complain all the time about being injured, but I also think myself pretty fortunate.

"You never know what might happen if someone kicks you in the face, and it could have had some long-term effects on my eyesight.

"The incident was just one of those things because the ball came across and I had to go in for the header.

"Unfortunately the Stockport defender was trying to kick it clear at the same time... and he got me instead of the ball.

"There was some bleeding and my right eye swelled up immediately, but things seemed to be settling down when I was back in the dressing room.

"Then, when I was in the shower, the bleeding started again. My eye was completely closed and I ended up in hospital.

"I had an unbelievable pain in my forehead, so for a while I thought that was the area with the injury.

"For a few more days I was suffering with bad headaches, but thankfully I have been pain free for a while now."

Latics initially thought Vernon would be out for a couple of

weeks, but doctors re-examined the scans and came back with bad news... they had found a fracture on the orbital wall below his right eye.

Happily, Scott is now recovering well and hopes to be ready for action in the next ten days.

This is his second injury setback of 2005 as he also missed two games in January with a slight muscle strain.

But Scott said: "Touch wood, I have otherwise been pretty lucky. Before the thigh problem, I went three years without any injuries at all."

Vernon can still make a big impact for Latics before the end of the current campaign.

His tally so far is ten goals, plus another three while on loan at Blackpool, and he intends to better last season's total of 15. Scott said: "There are lots of incentives to come back quickly because I want to help the team get out of trouble and also, from a personal point of view, impress the new manager.

"He has not seen me play yet, so I need to get out on the pitch and show him what I can do.


"He seems a genuine guy and I know he wants us to play football.

"I also want to show I am worth a new contract in the summer. I'm sure the manager knows what I have done for the club, but it is important that I prove myself to him."



Player Talk...

Marc Tierney loved every minute of his three-month loan spell with Conference side Carlisle. The teenager became a regular first-teamer and made the left back spot his own. He impressed so much that manager Paul Simpson did his level best to turn the move into a permanent one.



But the 19-year-old decided his future lay with the Latics and he is back at Boundary Park more determined than ever to break into the side. He insisted: "It was a good learning curve at Carlisle and I have come back a better player. "There is nothing like regular first team football and the standard was pretty good, much better than playing in the reserves.

"Carlisle are the giants of the Conference and the team everybody wants to beat. That's what made it so much better and I will always be grateful for the experience."

The Cumbrian outfit had made several inquiries for Tierney but former boss Brian Talbot had always been reluctant to let him go. But he finally relented and

Tierney recalled: "He left the final decision up to me but said it would be good experience and Carlisle wanted to take me as soon as possible. "I wanted first team football and here was the chance to go somewhere and show what I could do.

"Brian Talbot kept speaking to me on the phone, telling that he was having my progress monitored. "I was given a couple of games in midfield but I managed to make the left spot my own. "I must have been doing something right because they asked me to stay for a second month. "Carlisle attract crowds of seven to eight thousand and I got a great feedback from the fans. "Conference football is very competitive and some teams are more direct than others."

Tierney got caught up in the floods, which devastated the region and when they returned from an away trip some of the players found their cars floating around the club car park

The ground itself was under six feet of water and home games had to be switched to Morecambe. Training was also hit and they had to spend more time in the gym because the conditions outside

were impossible. Tierney finally stayed for the maximum three months and is now back at Boundary Park where he began his career as a 16-year-old after being scouted by Billy Urmson. He explained: "That was always in my plans. I had got the experience I wanted. "Paul Simpson told me he wanted me to stay but accepted my decision. He had been brilliant and really did his best for me. "Brian Talbot had also kept in touch and I am grateful to both of them." I know I have come back a better player and now my ambition is to break into the first team here. "Carlisle look as if they will get promotion but I want to play at the highest level I can and, at the moment, that is in League One with Oldham. "My confidence is good and I am ready to push on. "I have already been in the new manager's squad and I want to impress as much as I can. "I will be out of contract in the summer and I want to earn another. "I love it at Oldham and just wasn't to do the best I can for the club."



Ten Year Itch

1994/95 - Latics, in the season following their relegation from the Premiership, are held at home in a goalless draw in the first match after Joe Royle's departure for Everton. Graeme Sharp was caretaker, but was then appointed permanently with Colin Harvey his No 2. Latics lose 2-1 in the return with Dwight Marshall scoring both Hatters goals, the first after only 33 seconds.

1995/96 - Luton finish bottom of Division One and Latics compound their misery taking four points off them. Stuart Barlow scores the match-winning goal in their 1-0 home win.

1997/98 - Latics' second relegation in three years sees them reunited with Luton. It is hard to believe both were in the top division in 1991/92. Latics again capture four points, Richard Graham scoring both goals in a 2-1 home victory.

1998/99 - Latics only narrowly avoid relegation to the basement division on the final day of the season. They lose 2-0 at Kenilworth Road and pick up a point at home thanks to a Shaun Garnett goal in a

1-1 home draw.

1999/00 - Both teams finish mid-table, but Latics shade the honours with a 2-1 home victory and 1-1 draw in the return. **2000/01** - Another relegation for Luton who have gone from the top to bottom divisions in the space of a disastrous nine-year spell. **Paul Rickers** and John Sheridan score in a 2-0 home victory while the return ends goalless.

2001/02 - It proves a short stay in Division Three as the Hatters win promotion at the first attempt finishing runners-up to Plymouth Argyle.

2002/03 - Latics reach the play-offs under Iain Dowie's stewardship, but struggle against the Hatters who narrowly miss out finishing ninth. Joe Kinnear's side wins 2-1 at Boundary Park, Andrew Fotiades and Tony Thorpe the scorers. Latics' goalless draw at Kenilworth Road gives them a 17th clean sheet for the season, a club record.

2003/04 - There are troubled times for both clubs whose financial plight forces them into administration. Latics' 3-0



success at the end of September was only their third league win of the campaign. They draw 1-1 in the return with a goal from former Hatters player Dean Crowe against the club he had only recently left. **2004/05** - There is no stopping Luton, the leaders of Coca Cola League One. Latics certainly couldn't as they lost 2-1 at Kenilworth Road.







NEWELL'S CHAMPION CREDENTIALS

LUTON TOWN visit Boundary Park this afternoon hoping to take another giant stride towards promotion to the Championship, writes the Advertiser's Carl Marsden. The League One table-toppers currently lie three points clear of second-placed Hull City but crucially are now 13 points clear of third-placed Sheffield Wednesday and Tranmere Rovers.

On their travels, the Hatters have the best record in this division with a tally of nine wins, five draws and just four defeats, while only Hull and Sheffield Wednesday can boast more away goals than their current tally of 29.

Mike Newell's side have been a model of consistency since kicking-off their campaign with a 2-1 opening day defeat of

Promotion within touching distance for Hatters

Latics last August. They have lost just one of their last 17 league games - a 3-1 defeat at Port Vale last month - and since hitting top-spot on August 21 for the first time, they have been dislodged for just one week. Newell believes that the key to success this term lies in squad rotation and resting his players at the right time.

"The players sometimes need a rest mentally," he told BBC Sport.

"If they turn up at work day in, day out they get stale.

"We like them to come in and enjoy their training.

"What we're doing now is keeping them ticking over, we don't train for long but we

make sure we train hard and give them plenty of rest during the week." In keeping with that philosophy, Luton arrive today fresh from a two-day break in Marbella following last weekend's 3-1 home win over Swindon Town. And they have also been bolstered by the news that the highly-rated Newell agreed a new two-year deal last week. The new contract will keep him at Kenilworth Road until June 2007 alongside first-team coach Brian Stein, who has also penned a two-year deal.

Chairman Bill Tomlins told the club website: "We are delighted to have secured Mike and Brian's futures."

"This will continue to keep our football management strong in taking this club forward." Ahead of next Thursday's transfer deadline, the Hatters are still trying to strengthen their squad by adding more firepower to compliment first-choice strikers Rowan Vine and Steve Howard. Wycombe Wanderers this week rejected Luton's official approach for Nathan Tyson, who has scored 18 goals in League Two this season. Chairboys' boss John Gorman felt that the bid - reportedly in the region of £100,000 - was derisory and unsettling at a crucial stage of the season. But that might not yet be the end of the matter.




GOALKEEPERS

MARLON BERESFORD signed on a free from Barnsley last summer and has been first-choice 'keeper this term.

The vastly experienced 34-year-old has now made more than 400 league appearances and agreed a two-year contract after impressing in a three-month loan stint last term. Lincoln-born, he spent the majority of his career with Sheffield Wednesday, Burnley and Middlesbrough but has also played for Bury, Northampton, Crewe, Wolves, York and Bradford City. Slovenian understudy Nino Seremet, 24, had a trial with Latics before signing last July. A free transfer capture from Maribor Pivovarna Laako, the 6ft 4in stopper has provided healthy competition for Beresford. Dean Brill agreed a new one-year contract this week. The 19-year-old is yet to make his senior bow but is highly-rated by the club's coaching staff.



DEFENDERS



VERSATILE local lad **Keith Keane** has operated at right-back this term but has played in several outfield positions during his career. The 18-year-old is a club youth product who is strong and brave in the tackle and has appeared regularly for Eire at schoolboy level.

Central defender **Curtis Davies** won himself a two-year professional contract last summer after making his first-team breakthrough at the end of the 2003/4 season. Strong in the air and with good anticipation, he has become a virtual ever-present this term and celebrated his 20th birthday this week. Domineering and cultured centre-back **Chris Coyne** signed for West Ham as a teenager after starring in the 1994 youth World Cup for Australia. The 25-year-old had limited first-chances at Upton Park and after loan spells with Brentford and Southend signed for Dundee before a £50,000 bid from the Hatters was enough to bring him south again in September 2001. Russell Perrett has had a frustrating time with injuries in recent times since signing from Cardiff City in 2001. The 31-year-old centre back was restricted to just six starts last season and has made only four this time around. His career began with non-league Lymington before he joined Portsmouth in 1995 and signed for the Bluebirds for a £10,000 fee four years later.

Tenacious left-back **Sol Davis**, 25, started out as a Swindon Town trainee in 1998 and made exactly 100 league starts for the club. A tireless tackler who also likes to venture forward, Luton spent £600,000 to secure his services in August 2002 and he has been a mainstay of the Hatters side ever since. Kevin Foley won the 'Young Player of the Year' award for the third successive time last season. The 20-year-old Eire U21 cap can operate at full back or in midfield and has progressed through the club youth ranks. Luton-born, he is a cultured and determined performer.

Another local lad, **Leon Barnett** is a promising central defender who made his first-team breakthrough last term after starting in the LDV tie at Stevenage. The 19-year-old is an impressive all-round athlete, having competed at national level in the triple jump.



AHMET BRKOVIC, 30, was awarded a new 12-month contract this week as a reward for an excellent season.

The versatile Croatian midfielder has been at Kenilworth Road since October 2001 when he signed from Leyton Orient after a successful two-year stint. Brkovic's career started out at HNK Dubrovnik in 1999 before moving to the UK, but he refused new terms at Brisbane Road to join the Hatters on a Bosman after experiencing the disappointment of seeing Orient fail in the Second Division play-offs.

Usually deployed on the right, this diminutive and



hardworking player has chipped in with a prolific tally of 14 goals in all competitions this term. He has also entered Luton's late-season run-in showing fine form, netting twice as the club hammered Bristol City 5-0 at home on March 5.

MIDFIELDERS

FORMER Latics target **Paul Underwood** signed on transfer deadline day 2003. The 31-year-old came into professional football at Rushden for £50,000 in 1997 after spells at Enfield, Kingstonian, Molesey, Sutton United and Carshalton Athletic. He can operate in midfield or his preferred position of full back.

Club skipper **Kevin Nicholls** is a dynamic force in the 'engine-room'. The 26-year-old central midfielder has contributed 10 goals so far this season, firmly putting last season's back injury nightmare behind him. A former Charlton trainee, he joined Wigan for £250,000 in 1999 before switching to Luton for just £25,000 in 2001. Right-sided **Stephen Robinson**, 30, made his name in over 250 games for

Bournemouth after leaving Spurs. Preston paid £375,000 for him in 2000 before a switch to Luton for £25,000 two years later. He is a former Northern Ireland U21 cap.

Ex-Sheffield Wednesday trainee **Peter Holmes** operates in central midfield. The skilful 24-year-old joined Luton in 2000 but his progress has been dogged by a series of niggling injuries.

Promising youngster **Stephen O'Leary** signed his first professional contract last summer. The 20-year-old Eire youth international is fast, direct and best deployed in a midfield holding role. **Michael Leary**, 21, is a neat and skilful midfield youth prodigy who is contracted until 2006 but has made just four starts this term.

ATTACKERS


ROWAN VINE is currently on-loan from Premiership side Portsmouth: already the third season-long loan deal in his short career so far.

The Basingstoke-born striker came through Pompey's youth academy ranks and made a handful of first-team league appearances for the club during season 2001/2. In August 2002, the 6ft 1in hitman agreed to join Brentford for the season and made an impressive impact; returning a tally of 13 goals in 47 appearances before returning to Fratton Park.

Last season he was then sent out on a similar basis to join up with Colchester United and came up trumps again with ten strikes from 42 matches.

U's boss **Phil Parkinson** opted to use him more as a left winger but Vine still came up with several vital goals, including notching a stunning hat-trick to dump Coventry City out of the FA Cup.

A powerful runner with a sweet left foot, Luton then



secured his services on the eve of the 2004/5 season, initially for three months. But after the player picked up the Powerade League One 'Player of the Month' award in September with a series of excellent displays, it was no surprise when manager **Mike Newell** opted to extend the deal until the end of the season. Since then, the 21-year-old has continued to impress with a total of eight goals from 34 league starts this term.



HOTSHOT

Steve Howard

STEVE HOWARD tops the Luton goalscoring charts with 18 strikes from 34 starts in all competitions this term. A traditional bustling English centre-forward, this 28-year-old is powerful in the air, brave in the box and a key factor behind Luton's stunning success this season.

The Hatters paid just £50,000 to secure his services from Northampton Town on deadline day March 2001 and he has been the club's top marksman ever since.



Durham-born, Howard started out at Tow Law Town before moving to Hartlepool United in August 1995. He then cost the Cobblers a club record

£120,000 fee 1998 but Northampton reluctantly then had to accept the Hatters' paltry £50,000 offer with the player's contract due to expire in the summer.

Ironically, however, the same thing could happen again this summer with the highly-prized hitman set to become a free agent again.

Burnley boss Steve Cotterill has already admitted holding talks with the player's agent and he is unlikely to be the only one to be showing interest.

MEET THE GAFFER

Mike Newell

MIKE NEWELL has made a tremendous impact since taking charge at Kenilworth Road, burying the personal disappointment suffered when Hartlepool United ditched him in May 2003.

Despite steering Pools to the Third Division runners-up spot that season, the Victoria Park club opted not to award him a new contract and he found himself seeking a fresh challenge.

Newell had been made Pools' boss in November 2002 following Chris Turner's move to Sheffield Wednesday but many fans were unhappy with the club's late-season displays and he paid the ultimate price.

Less than a month later, Newell topped a controversial and unprecedented phone poll organised by then Luton chairman John Gurney to decide the identity of the new Hatters boss.


He beat popular predecessor Joe Kinnear in that vote and questions were raised about the influence of the club's board on the outcome.

Freshly installed in the Luton hotseat, Newell quickly embarked on completing his UEFA coaching qualifications and also began studying a Certificate of Applied Management at Warwick University.

An illustrious playing career saw the Scouse striker rattle up more than 500 league games for 14 clubs and win England caps at under21 and B level.

After starting out at Crewe he had a spell with Wigan Athletic which prompted his first move to Luton in 1986. A total of 18 goals in 63 league games persuaded Leicester City to snap him up for two seasons in September 1987.

A return to Merseyside saw Newell briefly lead Everton's



And it is confirmed that Guy Branston will be suspended for four games after his red card at Wrexham.



Midfielder **Matty Appleby** is in Darlington to complete a permanent move from Latics. Appleby has agreed a settlement on his Boundary Park contract and returns to one of his former clubs.





Kenny Cooper is relishing the opportunity to gain valuable experience by playing first-team football during his loan spell with Latics. The 20-year-old striker, despite an impressive goalscoring record for Manchester United's academy and reserve sides, finds himself well down the order at Old Trafford. That is why Cooper joined Portuguese Super League club Academica earlier in the season on loan and then grasped the opportunity to join Latics for a temporary spell. Here Cooper takes time out - an appropriate term bearing in mind he is American - for today's ten questions which are selected at random from a list of 100 to provide an insight into his life, both on and off the field.

3 - **What is your first footballing memory?** It was going to watch my father Kenny snr take training with Baltimore Blast for whom he was coach. They played in the Major Indoor Soccer League and for a time it was a huge success with arenas packed. American audiences love to see lots of action and five-a-side provided that and they liked nothing more than seeing scorelines like 10-8.




13 - **What is your most memorable moment in football?** Without question it has to be signing for Manchester United, the team I supported from being a boy. When I was training and playing as a youngster I would dream of playing for them so to achieve that was unimaginable. I was recommended to the club, brought over for a two-week trial and that was two years ago.

4 - **If you could be anyone else for a day, who would it be and why?** It would be my father because I have a lot of respect for him and what he has achieved. He has been a massive influence on my career and I strive to achieve his values. He played for Blackburn Rovers reserves before heading for America at the age of 21 and he is still there 38 years later. He played for Dallas Tornados in the North American Soccer League and has the distinction of being the league's longest-serving player.

10 - **Who would you pick as your toughest opponent?** I have trained a couple of times with Rio Ferdinand and I can see why he is one of the best defenders in the world. What I really respect about him is that he always has time to help you and he would always point things out to me. I have found all the first-team players at United to be like that. They have been brilliant with me and always found time to give advice. Playing in Portugal's Super League and here with Latics is a lot different as I am up against men who are stronger physically and also smarter as they have been in the game longer than boys.

5 - **What hobbies did you have as a child, and do you still have them?** I have always played football and if I am not doing that I watch it on television. It surprises people who think because I am from America I must like their football, baseball and basketball. I played a little basketball at school and I follow American sports and in particular Dallas Mavericks basketball team in the NBA while my American football team is Dallas Cowboys.

2 - **Which sportsman/woman do you most admire?** I have always had a lot of respect for basketball player Michael Jordan. He dominated his sport for such a long time and also won many honours with the Chicago Bulls. He was also a fantastic athlete and some of the things he did were amazing.



27 - **Do you get recognised in the street?** Only occasionally. May be somebody outside the ground will ask for my autograph. That is a contrast to the first-team players at United who are celebrities and the attention they get is unbelievable. That is part and parcel of the game at the highest level and I think it is neat that football is such a passionate game who so many people follow.


45 - **What is your all-time classic football shirt?** It is a shirt worn by Pele when he played for New York Cosmos in the North American Soccer League. My father was playing against him and at the end of the game swapped shirts. It was before I was born, but he has since given it to me. Pele was my favourite footballer when I was growing up and having his shirt is a cherished possession.

44 - **What is your pre-match meal?** I have either pancakes or spaghetti bolognese which are both easy to digest and give you lots of energy. I have always eaten them since I was growing up as a youngster. I eat four or five hours before a match and avoid heavy food.

50 - **Did any of your friends/contemporaries become footballers/sportsmen?** One of my best school friends was a boy called John Wall who is a very good American football player. He is currently at Rice University which is a top team and he is hoping to eventually be drafted by a professional team. He is a running back and we have been friends since the age of 13 and still keep in touch.



Update on the bars...



Magic Moments

Graeme Sharp's goalscoring exploits for Everton made him a legend at Goodison Park, but there was one afternoon with Latics which ranked alongside anything he achieved with the Toffees.

Luton Town were the visitors to Boundary Park in April 1992 when Sharp scored four times in a 5-1 victory which virtually guaranteed their top-flight status for a second season.

Sharp recalled: "I was only recently reflecting on the four goals against Luton on my radio show for Century FM when we were discussing Juan Ugarte scoring five times in Wrexham's 6-4 win at Hartlepool.

"When any striker looks back through his career they generally get one and two goals and the occasional three. It is very rare for anybody to score four or more. "And that was the case for me as I only ever scored four goals twice in the whole of my professional career.

"I scored all four goals for Southampton in our win at Southampton which was a great achievement as The Dell was never an easy place to play at. "Colin Harvey, who was my No 2 when I managed Latics, was in charge at Everton and I can remember it could easily have been six or seven as I also had other chances to score past Tim Flowers.

"What made that feat even more special was that I scored all four goals that day. If you score four and you win by five or six that takes a little bit of the gloss off it.

"The match against Luton came towards the end of our first season in what was the First Division and is today's Premiership.

"From what I can remember we were almost safe while Luton were already down or close to having their relegation sealed.

"It was one of those afternoons when everything turned to goal for me and to get four goals was special bearing in mind I had only ever done it once before.

"Surprisingly I cannot remember any of the goals with any clarity, something which happens to a lot of strikers.

"The only incident I still clearly remember is an alleged foul on keeper Alec Chamberlain for one of the goals.

"Alec was a former team mate at Everton and it was claimed I barged into him before scoring. But as a striker nothing holds you back when it comes to scoring, even if it is against a personal friend.

"When I was at Everton our games against Luton were always feisty affairs as there was no love lost between the two teams so it was especially pleasing for me personally to put one over on them.

"Those goals also took my total of goals for the season to 15 which was the target I set myself before the start. Some managers say 20


goals, but I always looked for 15. "It was my first season since leaving Everton and I also had a point to prove to Howard Kendall is that he was too hasty to let me go.

"I enjoyed that season with Joe Royle and Willie Donachie, though it was probably the hardest I had ever trained.

"Those four goals were the most a Latics player had scored since Frank Bunn hit six against Scarborough in the Littlewoods Cup a couple of years earlier. "I still have the match ball somewhere at home - it is probably in the loft - along with the one for Everton's match at Southampton and others I received for scoring hat tricks.

"And my father Jim will have kept the press cuttings about the goals I scored against Luton. He has them from my debut at Everton to last match of my career for Latics and they will be nice to look back on.

"I remember it was sometimes a pain as he would ring asking if I had got the papers on a Sunday so I could send him the cuttings. "He put them in scrap books which he took great delight in compiling. He also has all the medals I won as well as videos of matches in which I played."

There are not many more cutting remarks for a professional footballer than the assumption that a struggling team will probably win their first couple of matches under a new manager.

How often when the boss changes do you hear the media and fans say they expect an immediate improvement as the players try to impress their new gaffer? The hidden meaning behind such a statement is not that the new man in the hot seat is a miracle-worker who will transform the team inside a week but that some of the players were not giving 110 per cent – or even 100 per cent – before he arrived. Certainly I am NOT questioning the effort of any Latics player this season, though clearly everyone at Boundary Park was more than happy with the win against Port Vale.


Ronnie Moore's record at Rotherham United suggests he could be here for the long haul. I doubt if there will be too many grumbles if he matches his performance with the Millers – eight years in the job, including back-to-back promotions. That spell made him the sixth longest serving manager in the League before his recent departure from Millmoor; only Bob Mellor (1934-45), Jimmy Frizzell (1970-82) and Joe Royle (1982-94) have lasted longer at Oldham.

RM's tenure at Rotherham did not get off to the best of starts as the Millers lost his first two matches in the old Division 3 – and the history books tell us that changing the manager does not automatically produce instant results. Strangely, all four of the longest-serving League managers – Dario Gradi (Crewe Alexandra), Sir Alex Ferguson (Manchester United), Alan Curbishley (Charlton Athletic) and Barry Fry (Peterborough United) – lost their first match in charge of those clubs. Excluding caretakers, RM is the eighth Latics boss since Gradi took charge at Crewe in 1983 while Luton Town have employed 10 men in the top job during that time, one of them twice. How many can you name?

At the other end of the scale from Gradi, Bill Lambton lasted three days as Scunthorpe United manager in 1959; despite not being employed as a caretaker manager, he was sacked after a 3-0 defeat against Huddersfield Town. Brian Clough famously clocked up 44 days at Leeds United before leaving Elland Road, complaining of excessive player power. Doubtless everyone here will be hoping RM's managerial reign here is closer to eight years.







When your luck is out - and it invariably is when you are toughing it out at the wrong end of the table - then nothing seems to be going your way.

That just how keeper Les Pogliacomi felt after Tuesday night's defeat by Brentford when the fans voiced their frustrations. It left the Latics with just one win in nine league games and the giant Aussie admitted: They don't want to see the club going down and they have a right to boo, but it is not going to help. "They are obviously not happy at the way things are going but neither are we."

Boss Ronnie Moore had all the players in on Wednesday to watch a video of a well-below par performance.

Pogliacomi said: "He showed us where we went wrong.

"Basically we need to get out on the training pitch and work harder than ever to get things right.

"We will only get ourselves out of this trouble by showing determination and passion.

"There is no point feeling down and sorry for ourselves because that is not going to do anything for us.

"I can only speak for myself but I know I am trying to do my utmost to stay in this division, I am sure the rest of the lads feel the same.

"It is as upsetting for us just as much as it is for the fans.

"The owners want to take this club forward and I want to be a part of that, I am sure everyone else does.

"We have to try our best to fulfil the owners' ambitions and make things happen.

"Nobody is exactly jumping for joy at the moment and it is hardly surprising."

Pogliacomi knows the Latics could not have had a tougher game than this afternoon's visit of league leaders Luton.

But he insisted: "It would be a great time to put things

right. They are up there by a country mile but we showed last season that we could get the better of top sides.

"There is no reason that we can't do it again if we play to our full capability.

"The challenge is on and we need some big results to take the pressure of everybody.

"We will be giving it our best shot."

Pogliacomi believes there could be a better man for the manager's job right now than new boss Ronnie Moore.

He explained: "He has worked with teams that have been at the top of the table and has got them up divisions and into the Championship.

"He is now trying to get us organised and doing the right things.

"If you get good habits you get success and he is drilling that into us."

Pogliacomi has not fully lived up to his excellent reputation this season and added: "My form has been up and down and it does frustrate you.

"I thought I made some good saves in the cup game against Wrexham, but the goal was a sloppy one even though it did take a deflection.

"I feel as though I am not just getting the rub of the green and any mistake is punished.

"Their keeper came for two crossed and dropped them both but got away with it. "We don't seem to get luck like that and it is happening to myself and the team."

Pogliacomi added: "Overall, I think I have done okay, but we do need to stop conceding and I will be working as hard as possible.

"I have another year on my contract and I don't want to be in the bottom division next season."


