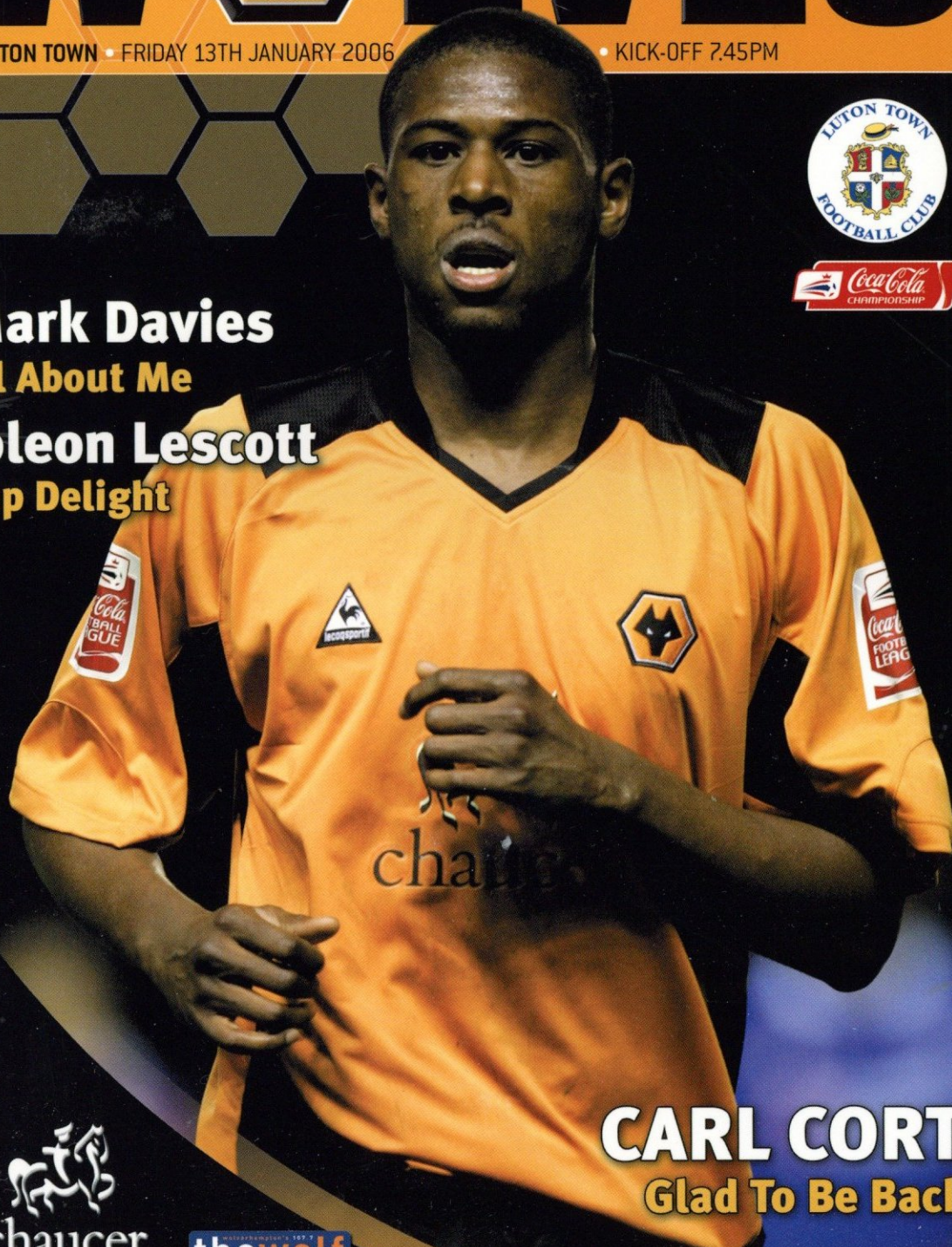

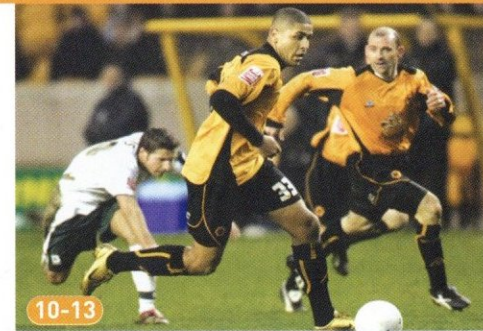

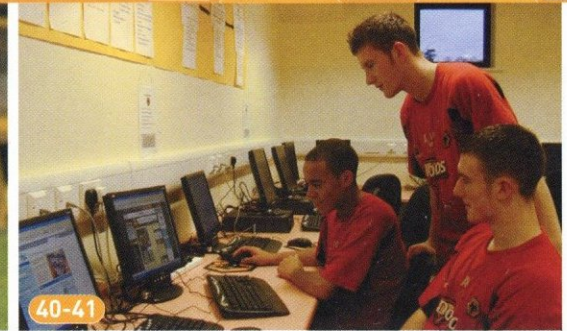

Although Maurice Ross had played all of his football north of the border, prior to his brief spell with Sheffield Wednesday before joining Wolves this season, the defender has already locked horns with Premiership giants Manchester United.

In the 2003/04 Champions League campaign, Rangers came up against Wolves' likely FA Cup fourth round opponents but, as Maurice says, it wasn't the happiest of occasions for the Glasgow giants. The Reds came out on top in both the home and away legs.

"I featured in both games but we lost 1-0 at Ibrox and then 3-0 at Old Trafford," he said. "United are probably the most famous football team in the world so, potentially, it's a really good draw for Wolves. But we mustn't be disrespectful to Burton Albion even though the odds against them winning up at Old Trafford will be massive. I thought they did really well last Sunday."

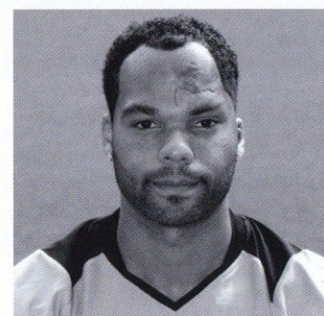
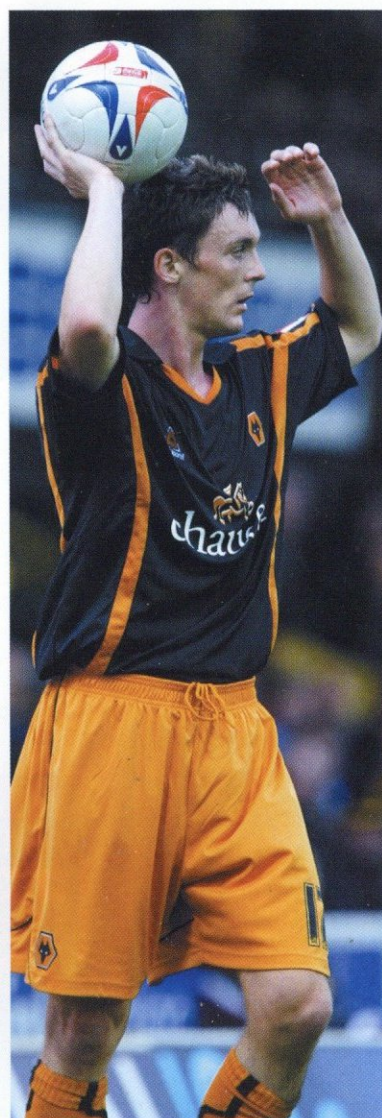
Just 24 hours before Burton and United met in the brewery town, Maurice completed his first full game for Wolves in the FA Cup victory over Plymouth Argyle. It was only his third game in the club's colours,

having also started in the League encounter with the Pilgrims on New Year's Eve and in a second-half substitute's appearance at Watford back at the end of October. Now, nothing would give Maurice more pleasure than to come up against United once again.

"Obviously I would love to be involved against them if the gaffer gives me the chance," he said. "You are in football because you want to play against and be tested by the biggest and best. And they don't come much bigger than United do they?"

"The set up here at Wolves is, in my opinion, one of if not the best in the Championship. I've enjoyed myself in training and it was good to get my boots on in the two games against Plymouth."

"The boys here have been great to me and they have really helped me to settle in. It goes without saying that I would like to stay and help the club achieve its goal of Premier League football. The Cup-tie against United, if they beat Burton, will be one of the highlights of the round. But we need to be in the Premier League playing against clubs like them every week."

It has been just over two years since Wolves were the talk of the Premiership when a goal from Kenny Miller gave them a surprise victory over Manchester United at Molineux.

Depending on the result of the Red Devils' FA Cup third round replay with Burton Albion, then Wolves could have the opportunity of creating another upset – and this time Jo Lescott wants to be part of it.

"I missed our last game with Manchester United because that was the season I was out through injury," says the central defender.

"One of the big things for me that season was that I didn't get the chance to play against the likes of Manchester United, and so when the draw for the fourth round of the FA Cup took place on Monday, I was really hoping we'd get them."

"Quite a few of the other lads were hoping for the same as well, and so when it came out there was a big cheer. No disrespect to Burton, but I do hope United come through the replay so that we get to play them."

"If Burton do pull off a shock next week then it will still be a big game, but it just means that we are the big club, not the underdogs. There would be the potential for a banana skin if that happens, but we can't dwell too much on ifs and maybes until we know for definite who our



opponents will be.

"I watched most of the game on Sunday and it was a great encounter. United didn't play their strongest team but the Burton players were still up against great players and a great club, so for them to get the draw was a big deal. Plus, they got to play against Ronaldo and Rooney when they came off the bench later on."

"Hopefully, if United do get through, then they will play a strong team against us and then we'll be able to pit our wits against some of the best in the country, which is something that any footballer wants to do. You

judge yourself when you get the opportunity to come up against some of the best players in the game, and that's why I was so excited to see who we've potentially got."

"I'm sure there will be a big crowd at Molineux no matter if it's United or Burton, and that will make it all the more special."

"But, we've got a couple of League games between now and then, so we can't get carried away. We know it's important to get back to winning ways in the League, as promotion has to be our main aim, and so we'll be working hard to get the win we need tonight."

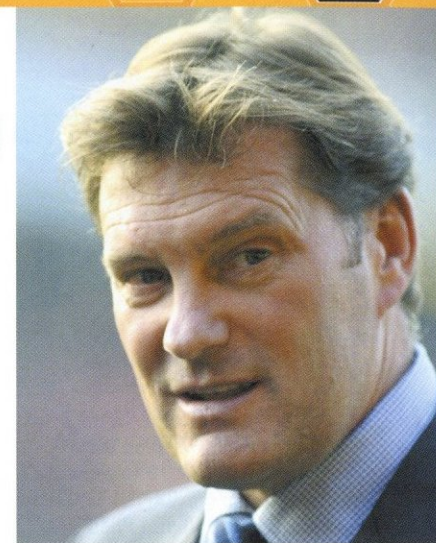

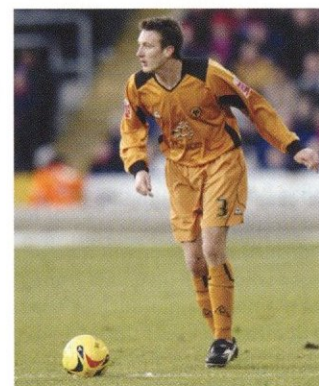

Molineux set for 'giant' Cup tie

I said in my last notes that good Cup runs not only provide important finance for clubs but are also great morale boosters. I think I was pretty much spot on with that comment!

The forthcoming visit of either Manchester United – one of Europe's giants – or indeed Burton Albion (a European giant killer?) is something we are all eagerly looking forward to.

We were made to sweat though during Monday's draw as we were the last tie out of the hat. The reaction from the players and staff was very upbeat when it was announced we would be at home against Burton or United. I know our supporters feel the same.

Home advantage is going to be crucial but I'm in no doubt that our fans will raise the roof for this tie. Whoever we play, the game will get a lot of attention – especially as we will be live on Sky TV – and it's our chance to show just what we can do.

I'm sure we all remember that fantastic game during our promotion season when we put Newcastle out of the Cup. And, should we be entertaining Manchester United, we will take some confidence into the tie knowing that the last time we played them here at Molineux we won 1-0 thanks to a Kenny Miller goal.

The Cup – especially when you get a draw like ours – is a nice diversion from the League. But it must not and will not deflect us from the main task at hand – winning promotion. This is our

priority.

Getting a place in the play-offs is now the only realistic way of achieving top flight football this season, therefore we must concentrate on winning this evening's match against Luton Town.

Our League form over the holiday period was disappointing but we remain in seventh spot and are still in a strong position to mount a challenge in the second half of the season. But it's all about winning matches and we must find a formula for doing this more consistently.

The transfer window is occupying a great deal of our time at the moment. We have already done some good business with Gabor Geyres, Denes Rosa and Stefan Postma and are, as you know, trying to get Tom Huddlestone until the end of the season. However, this may not be possible if Spurs get injuries or sell one or two of their other midfielders. If this happens I expect they will recall Tom back to White Hart Lane.

We want to bring in at least one more new player, probably a striker. As always, these things take their time but we have been working hard on a few deals on the past two to three weeks and I will bring you news of any signings as soon as I can.

Finally, a message to season ticket holders: as we are having to wait for the Cup replay between Burton Albion and Manchester United before we can issue ticket sales information for our fifth round match, we are

encouraging all season ticket holders to sign up to our Cup Tie Scheme. It's free to join and means you will be sent your ticket automatically without having to call or queue at the ticket office. This will apply to any subsequent Cup games or a play-off home leg.

Members can return their ticket within a certain time frame should they decide they do not want to attend any of the fixtures. Once registered it is the simplest way to obtain Cup tickets.

Now to some of your questions...

Now Tottenham are out of the FA Cup, is it possible we can play Tom Huddlestone in our FA Cup clash with Man Utd (or Burton)?

It's a good question but at the moment Tom's loan is due to expire before that game. We are hoping to persuade Spurs to let us keep him until the end of the season and if they agree then yes, he would be able to play.

Will the true supporters who purchased Plymouth Cup tickets get first refusal on the Man Utd/Burton game or will it go to those who clock up points from the glamour games such as trips to Sheffield United? Once again the simplest way of rewarding fans has been missed.

It doesn't seem to matter if you give your money for our

home fixtures, i.e. Chester or Plymouth. A voucher could have been handed out to those at Plymouth to take priority for a big game behind season ticket holders. Instead we reward people for paying money over to our away clubs.

Phil Kirby, Derby

Phil I'm somewhat baffled by your comments. Surely fans who travel away to support their team should be acknowledged, valued and rewarded if possible? It's true Wolves doesn't profit financially from those games (unless supporters are using our Travel Club) but the team benefits from having a good following of fans at away games.

However, to answer the question, tickets will be sold in this order: Cup tie scheme members (free to join if you are a season ticket holder) and season ticket holders will be guaranteed their seats, then it will be on the basis of loyalty points before general sale of any remaining tickets. Loyalty points, as you know, are awarded for attending home and away games.

Is it true Dave Jones was only given £3 million when Wolves were promoted to the Premiership?

No, we spent approximately £6.75mil in transfer fees in our Premier League season, and this figure excludes wages.

I've been trying to find a copy of the Sherpa Van Trophy win over Burnley for ages, but it doesn't seem to be available. Are there any plans to make it available on DVD?

Our DVD partners are currently trying to source footage of this

match with a view to releasing it later this year. Keep checking the website for details.

Can you tell me why the Wolves board show little or no loyalty to their fans? Charging £18 for a ticket to watch Wolves v Plymouth in the Cup after the awful match with them the week before was too much. Surely a full ground would be better than 11,000 and that could have been achieved if you had made it, say, £5 for season ticket holders. Come on Jez give us suffering fans something back – we've already paid £450 for a season ticket.

N. Whitehouse, Northbank Season ticket holder

Firstly I should say that although the League result against Plymouth was disappointing, the prices for the Cup match were set well before that fixture was played. The £18 cost of a ticket for season ticket holders represented a £5 reduction compared to non-season ticket holders. This discount was arrived at in consultation with Plymouth whose co-operation was required under FA rules. We also included in our offer – again with the agreement of Plymouth – a 'kids for a fiver' ticket anywhere in the ground. We appreciate that cost is a major consideration at this time of year but we felt the discounts on offer were reasonable under the circumstances.

Why have we given Kenny Miller a choice whether to go to Sheffield United or not? We should be big and brave to say £1.5 mil is on the table, sorry Kenny but you have got to go. We all know he is on his way sooner or later. Get the money then we have got £3.5 mil to spend instead of £2mil, then go and get

Jez, don't tell all the fans that the club and Kenny are keeping their options open. The only option for Kenny Miller is the timing on 'when' he goes not 'if' he is going.

Nick Drew, a true Wolves fan from West Bromwich.

I'm sorry Nick but that is not the way football transfers work. A transfer can only be completed if there is co-operation from all parties involved.

We signed Kenny until 30 June 2006 and, like every other contract we enter into, we have to honour that. But just as we can not sell him to a club he does not want to go to, likewise he can not leave us until his contract expires unless we agree for him to do so.

Welcome to everyone from Luton. Please enjoy tonight's game.

Leon Clarke's close range finish after 26 minutes of a dour affair against Plymouth Argyle was enough to put Wolves into the hat for the FA Cup fourth round draw.

Paul Ince returned for his first start since August to captain the side and also back were Maurice Ross, Seol and Mark Davies. Missing from the team that started against Coventry were Darren Anderton and Rob Edwards who were named as substitutes, Tom Huddlestone who was cup-tied, and Jody Craddock.

Carl Cort was back in the squad following his near three-month injury absence and he also took a place on the bench.

The snow that had fallen for

two hours before kick-off had stopped and the pitch was clear as Plymouth kicked-off attacking the North Bank end of a stadium that was less than half full.

Inside the first minute Argyle keeper Romain Larrieu was forced into action when he had to dive to prevent an own goal after Hasney Aljofree had made a mess of an attempted clearance from a Ross centre.

Davies was wide with a chip after he had fastened on to a nod down from Colin Cameron and then the 17-year-old midfielder ran from the edge of his own area to within 25-yards of the Plymouth goal before slipping a pass through for Kenny Miller that carried just a little too much pace allowing Larrieu to collect.

Gabor Gyepes got a vital touch to get the ball back to Stefan Postma as Micky Evans tried to latch on to a long clearance but the pressure was soon back on the Plymouth goal with Larrieu tipping over a 25-yard drive from Ince.

From Ince's corner, Gyepes headed towards the corner of the net beating Larrieu only for Akos Buzsaky to clear off the line. But the goal that Wolves deserved finally arrived in the 26th minute.

Cameron's centre from the right skidded through to Clarke who controlled the ball before coolly slipping it past Larrieu from the edge of the six-yard box.

Two minutes later Miller almost made it two when, despite the presence of a defender, he swung a foot at a

cross from Seol only for Larrieu to come to his side's rescue once again.

After a surging run from the halfway line, Davies was robbed just outside the visitors box as

he prepared to shoot, and then Clarke fired over the angle after taking a return pass from Miller.

Just before the break, Cameron hit a firm drive from 20-yards that flew into Larrieu's

Cameron was challenged just as he tried to connect with Miller's short pass into the box as Wanderers began the new half brightly.

But Argyle were inches away from an equaliser after Tony Capaldi's corner had been headed out to Buzsaky who fired on to the roof of the net from 25-yards.

Miller just failed to get a foot to a curling cross from Mark Kennedy who then dropped back in his own area heading clear a dangerous centre from Paul Connolly. Seconds later Gyepes also had to nod clear - this time after Buzsaky had fired over a cross.

Midway through the half Davies latched on to a half clearance and hit an angled shot that drew another fine save from Larrieu.

Plymouth made a double

change in the 69th minute with Scott Taylor and Bojan Djordjic the replacements for Buzsaky and Lee Hodges respectively. Four minutes later, Cort was sent on in place of Seol for Wolves.

Miller was crowded out as he tried to squeeze the ball home from a tight angle after Kennedy had threaded a free-kick into the box.

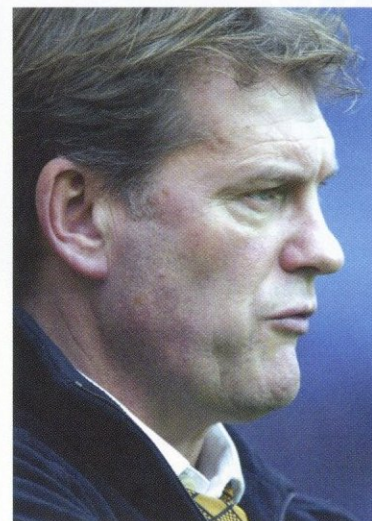
Then an enterprising run by Clarke ended with a pass to Miller in the Plymouth box. The Scot turned and shot for goal but he didn't connect properly and Larrieu got down to save.

Denes Rosa made his home debut when he went on for the final ten minutes as a replacement for Cameron.

In stoppage time Paul Wotton tried a low shot from 25-yards that was well saved by Postma as Wolves hung on for the victory they deserved.

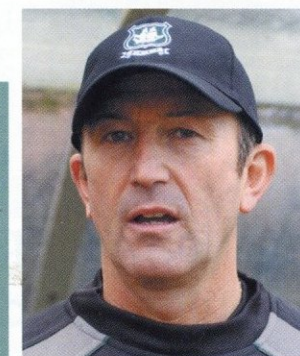

Molineux matchday

A look at some of the off-field people and events that go on to make up a matchday at Molineux...

1 • Nando's restaurant chain mascot Barci presented Wolfie with a cheque for £287.

Nando's organised a balloon launch during the summer, releasing hundreds into the skies of Wolverhampton to raise the money for the Wolves Aid charity, which supports youngsters with special needs, along with disability projects in the Wolverhampton area.



2 • Beacon Centre for the Blind in Wolverhampton officially received their new 12-seater mini-bus from Sir Jack Hayward.

Wolves have donated £10,300 towards the cost of the £30,000 vehicle. The funds came from three sources: a £3,300 donation from Sir Jack's tribute dinner held at Molineux in April 2005. £3,000 from Wolves' share out of the proceeds from the FA Community Shield and £4,000 from the sale of Wolves official wristbands in the club shops.

Ian Ferguson, Chief Executive of Beacon Centre, said:

"Appropriately the mini-bus is branded with Wolves logos and 'Wolves in the Community' strap line which portrays our enduring link with the club.

"Sir Jack is patron of our Centre and 'Wolves in the Community' provides coaching to some of our visually impaired youngsters.

"The Centre provides services to 4,000 visually impaired people in the Black Country and South Staffs. We desperately needed a new mini-



bus to transport our service users to a multitude of activities – including visiting Molineux to support Wolves. We are incredibly grateful to the club."

Sir Jack said: "We are very pleased to help Beacon Centre for the Blind. They provide a great service to our community."

3 • Ten-year-old Josef Bartl had a dream come true when he met his hero Matt Murray. The youngster suffers from a deficiency of the immune system and children's



charity Promise Dreams arranged for him to be a mascot and meet his favourite player. Josef was then treated to a VIP day in the Hayward Suite.

4 • Wolverhampton-born pop opera star Keedie provided a classical opening to the pre-match entertainment. The 23-year-old performed Jerusalem (which was used as England's anthem for this summer's Ashes series) and Nessun Dorma.

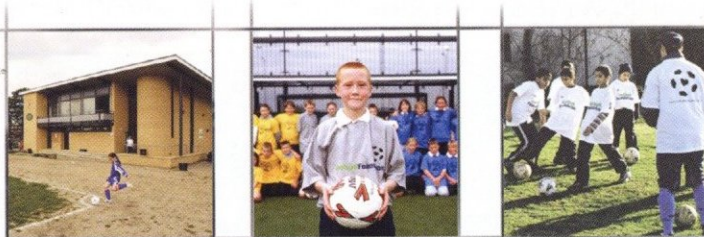

Luton manager Mike Newell is adamant that long-term prosperity for last season's League One champions will not come until the Bedfordshire club is enjoying the benefits of a new stadium but that has not stopped the former Everton and Blackburn striker believing he can emulate his most successful predecessors at Kenilworth Road.

Dally Duncan, Harry Haslam and David Pleat share the distinction of having taken the Hatters into the top flight. An elite side for five years after Duncan achieved promotion for the first time in 1955, they stayed for just one season after Haslam guided them up again 19 years later but held their own for a decade after Pleat had steered them to the Second Division title in 1982.

The enduring memory of their time in the top division is Pleat's joyful jig across the pitch at Maine Road when Luton's last-day win over Manchester City saved them from

immediate relegation but the 1980s were by far Luton's most successful decade.

After Pleat joined Tottenham, his successor, John Moore, took them to a highest-ever seventh place in 1987 before the late Ray Harford led them to their first major trophy, a dramatic 3-2 win over Arsenal at Wembley in April 1988 enabling captain Steve Foster to lift the Littlewoods Cup.

After much leaner times in recent years, including two periods in receivership, the idea of being back among the wealthy higher echelons of English football might have seemed fanciful.

But with new owners and a new manager, the Hatters were runaway winners of the League One title last season, finishing 12 points ahead of nearest pursuers Hull City. And they began this season by beating Crystal Palace and then Southampton, two of the sides relegated from the Premiership, and held their own so well that by the end of October they

were looking an established top three side.

Recent results have been less consistent, undermined by a run of eight without a win away from home, and a 3-0 win at home to Brighton has been their only win in seven Championship games all told. But after the stirring performance against Liverpool in the FA Cup there is renewed optimism.

"I've been confident we can reach the play-offs all season," Newell said. "We've had a bad month and a half but that can happen to any side and if we hadn't had that bad patch we'd be in the top two now. We're still getting used to playing in a new division against better sides.

"I don't want the season to fizzle out now. We are a good side who play good football and gave Liverpool a real game. Now we can concentrate on the League and achieve our objective."

"WHEN YOU ARE NOT BLESSED WITH A BIG SQUAD, IF YOU ARE HIT WITH INJURIES AND SUSPENSIONS, IT IS BOUND TO TAKE ITS TOLL."

No one felt the disappointment of Luton's FA Cup defeat against Liverpool more keenly than Kevin Nicholls - and not only because he is the club captain.

It was Nicholls who despatched the second-half penalty that gave the Hatters what their fans hoped would be an impregnable 3-1 lead, calmly beating goal-keeper Scott Carson only minutes after Djibril Cisse had failed

with a spot-kick at the other end. "After being 3-1 ahead, we were disappointed not to win," he said. "But we never felt we had them beaten. They are third in the Premiership and the current European Champions and they are not those things for nothing. "But I think we deserved credit for the way we played. We smothered them, gave them no time on the ball and the way we played gave a glimpse of what

we are capable of. We want to get to the Premier League and it was good to test ourselves against that standard of opposition."

First, though, there is the matter of winning promotion. Having kicked off with wins against Crystal Palace and Southampton, both freshly relegated from the top flight, Luton started the season looking like they could follow their runaway success in League One by sweeping through the Championship as well.

With eight wins and only three defeats in their first 14 games, Luton were third at the beginning of November, sending out the message to leaders Sheffield United and Reading that despite their early success the automatic promotion places would have another contender.

However, a run of four straight defeats put paid to any thoughts that the rest of the season would be a cakewalk and the Hatters have struggled for consistency since, slipping down as low as 11th on Boxing Day.

But Nicholls hopes the performance against Liverpool might be the catalyst for a revival.

"To begin with, we did not find the step up from League One to be that big a jump," Nicholls said. "We had a winning mentality last season and that was down to the manager. He doesn't even like to lose at cards on the team bus and he had instilled that attitude in the team."

"We want to win every game, home or away, and we have had a dip over the last couple of months that we are not happy about."

"But we still think we can make the play-offs. It is not a matter of other teams having found us out, more a case of us needing to find more consistency, especially away from home. Maybe the

Liverpool performance will give us the kick start we need.

"You can't put your finger on why we have struggled in away games. We lost 4-0 at Sheffield United and 3-0 at Reading and although neither of those scorelines reflected the game we do need to sort it out."

If there are mitigating factors, Nicholls would point to the relatively small size of Luton's squad, which is not helped by the limitations on spending power imposed by the club's continually frustrated efforts to relocate to a purpose-built stadium.



"We have got the quality in the squad, a good team spirit and a nice blend of seniors and young players but we do need to bulk up the numbers," he said. "When you are not blessed with a big squad, if you are hit with injuries and suspensions, it is bound to take its toll."

"The ground situation does not help. It seems farcical that we are one division away from the best League in the world and we are still at Kenilworth Road. If we had a 20,000-seat stadium we would fill it easily."

Whether an away game against Wolves is the right opportunity for Luton to put their season

back on track after eight away games without a win remains to be seen but Nicholls has no doubt his team mates will approach the game with the appropriate attitude.

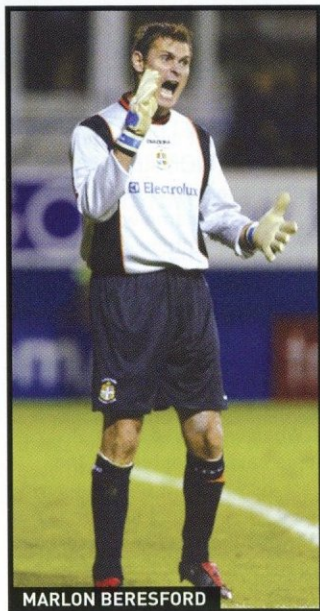
"It will be a tough game but we will be up for it," he said. "They are an ex-Premier League team with an ex-England manager and it will be another big game for us."

"When we played them at home back in September they were very difficult to break down and it will be a test for us again. But we definitely need to sort out our away form and now is as good a time as any."

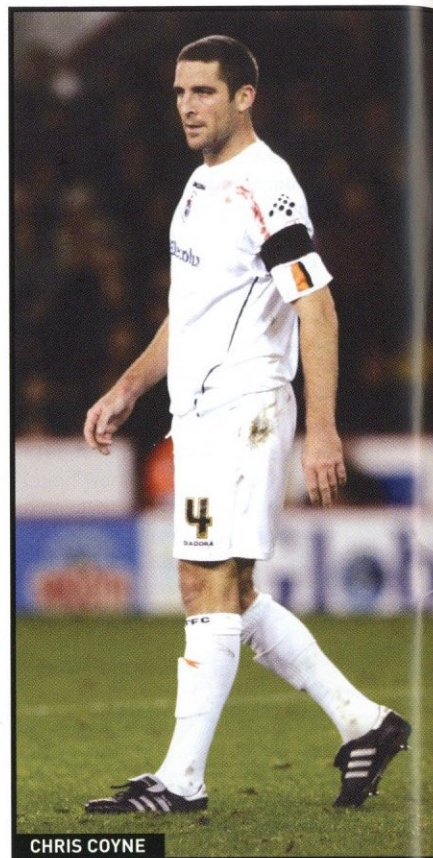

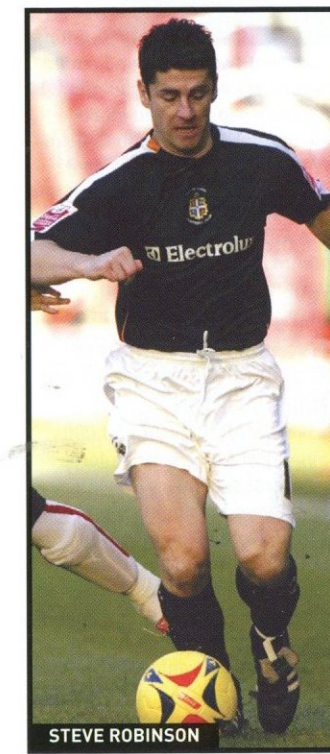

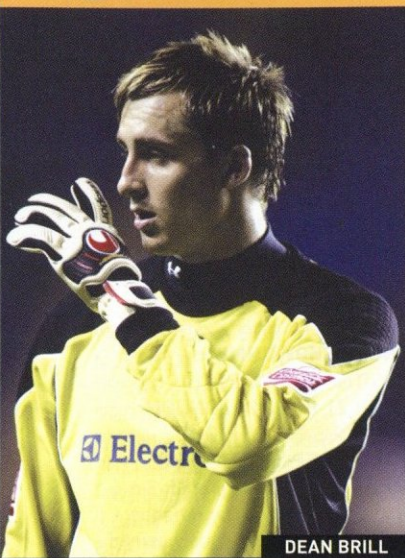

Football fans with a penchant for gazing into crystal balls might like to ponder the following the next time they are passing their favourite betting shop: what price Mike Newell to be Liverpool's manager?

Not in the immediate future, of course. But should the current Luton boss' success rate continue, particularly if his learning curve leads to the Premiership or beyond, it is a potential marriage that would seem to have definite possibility.

What's more, it would be a renewing of his vows. Newell may have made his name as an Everton centre forward but began his career playing in the junior sides at Anfield and remains a committed Reds fan, even to the extent of taking his place among the 20,000 Scousers who witnessed Liverpool's astonishing European Cup triumph in Istanbul in May.

So far as a manager, Newell has

won two promotions in only three full seasons in the job and may yet make it three out of four. Successful at Hartlepool, whom he led to automatic promotion from Division Three in 2003, he was on the mark again last May as Luton romped away with the League One title in only his second year at the helm.

For a while it seemed the Hatters might find promotion from the Championship no less of a stroll as they stuck right on the heels of Sheffield United and Reading. Their progress has been more stop than start over the last couple of months but Newell has seen no reason to revise his target for the season of reaching the play-offs.

Last weekend, of course, Luton gave a glimpse of their ability in the most exciting third round FA Cup tie for years - against Liverpool, of all people. They thrilled all but the Liverpool fans in a TV audience of 8.5 million by

taking a 3-1 lead before the European champions pulled off one of their spectacular comebacks.

Newell was disappointed not to win. "At 3-1 we had them," he said. "But you have got to get people behind the ball. You can't play teams off the park for 90 minutes. It was a bit of naivety on our part."

"To be 3-1 up against Liverpool, playing well, and then to get beaten is very disappointing. At half-time I told my players they deserved to be in front. We had played the better football."

"But I can't knock them. They are an honest bunch. We're a good footballing side and we showed great character."

Newell, 40, whose playing career ultimately spanned 14 clubs and 500 League games, has been concerned with Luton's recent form, especially away from home, but hopes the Liverpool performance can act as a springboard to a play-off place.

WHAT INTERNET SITES MIGHT YOU VISIT TODAY? I read my emails but that's about as far as it goes when it comes to computers.

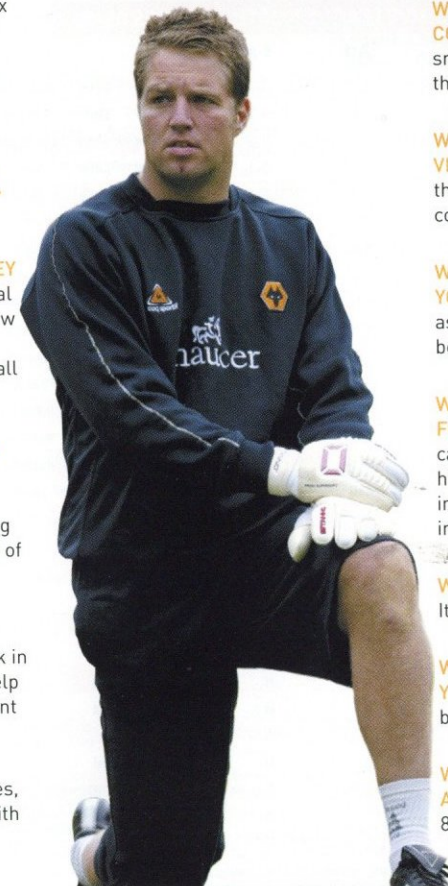
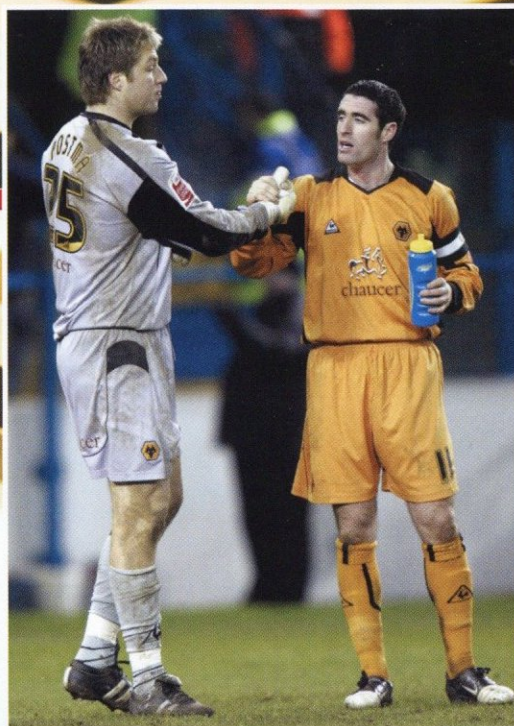

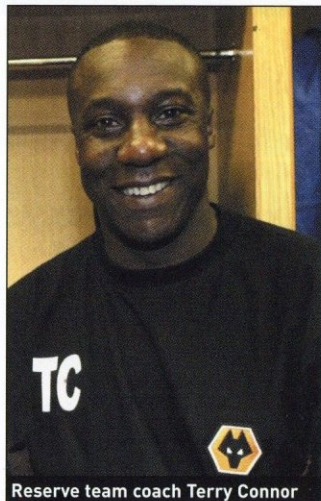

should the manager chose to select them.

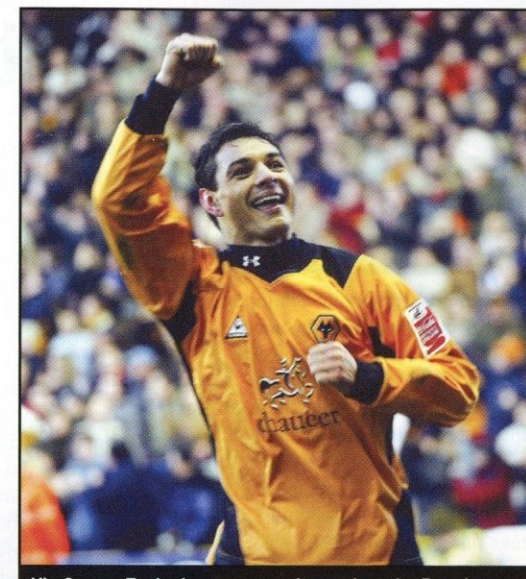
Another matter of note on Monday was that Denes Rosa got his first full game in the club's colours - he worked hard and twice was close to getting on the scoresheet himself.

Comeback can't come soon enough for Carl

Three months on the sidelines are enough to test the patience of any player. But Carl Cort has been licking his lips in anticipation as well as resting his cleaned-out knee since he last started a first-team game at home to Derby in mid-October.

And now a full comeback can't come soon enough for the striker who started 2005-06 with a burst of goals that elevated him to the top of the Coca-Cola Championship scoring chart.

"The way we've been creating chances has made it even harder to be out of the side," he said this week. "We've been so far ahead of many teams in general play and only missed chances have stopped us killing them off and winning a lot more matches. "We have to get back to scoring more goals and, if I can play a part in that, I'll be happy. There might still be such a lot to look forward to this season and I want to do all I can to help."

The 28-year-old scored nine times in the opening two months of his second full campaign at Molineux – as prolific a start as he has ever made.

Certainly, he was on course to make this his best-ever season and has not shelved that ambition despite his latest lengthy absence.

"I scored 16 or 17 goals for Wimbledon in their relegation year in the Premiership and got 16 for Wolves last season," he added.

"My aim has definitely been to

beat that mark and I'm still hopeful I can do it this time. I'm always confident in my ability to score goals.

"We know we need to be more consistent and are disappointed our longest run of successive wins so far is two. If I can get past my target, it has to be a lift for our chances of going up. We need as many players as possible fit and somewhere near their best.

"It has been a big disappointment to miss so many games, especially as I thought I'd put all my serious injuries behind me by having a good solid pre-season and then starting well.

"Shortly before my injury, though, we realised it was going to happen. It was a case of when, not if, because I'd had a twinge in my knee since early in the season."

More recently, it has been business as usual for Carl, in the reserves at least, during his heartening comeback.

His header from a corner in the game away to Newcastle restored him to the scoring groove and he showed his predatory instincts by netting again in the second string's handsome victory over Albion at Kidderminster on Monday night.

As with so many of his first-team 'strikes,' they haven't been the sort to challenge for Goal of the Season awards – but the bread-and-butter variety on which many marksmen feed.

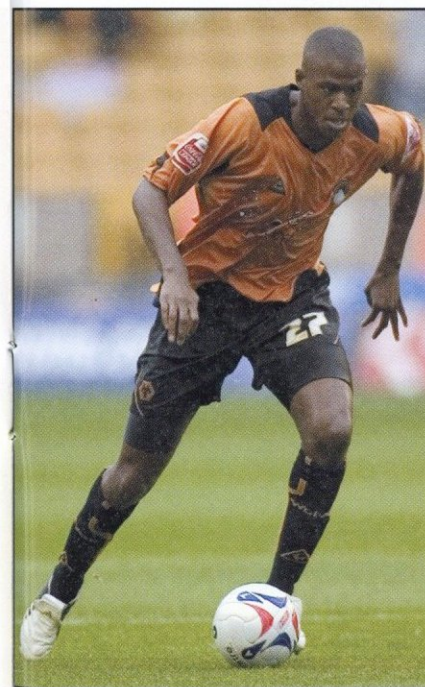
"I have never considered myself to be a scorer of spectac-

ular goals. About seven of those I've scored in the first team this season have been from in the six-yard area for a start.

"I've done a lot of work with the gaffer on making sure I get into the most dangerous areas when crosses are coming in because it's obvious from looking at videos how many times the ball flashes across the penalty area fairly close in."

Cort, a former England under-21 international who is still also available for Jamaica at senior level through his father's birthplace, attributes some of his success to good grooming and could be excused for keeping half an eye on events on the north-east coast as he continues his recovery.

His last club Newcastle are on the brink of a celebration in their difficult season, with Alan Shearer now only one goal short of overtaking Jackie Milburn as Tyneside's leading all-time scorer.

And, down on Humberside, Carl is wondering whether he will finally have the chance to square up to younger brother Leon for the first time when Wolves visit Hull's KC Stadium in six weeks' time.

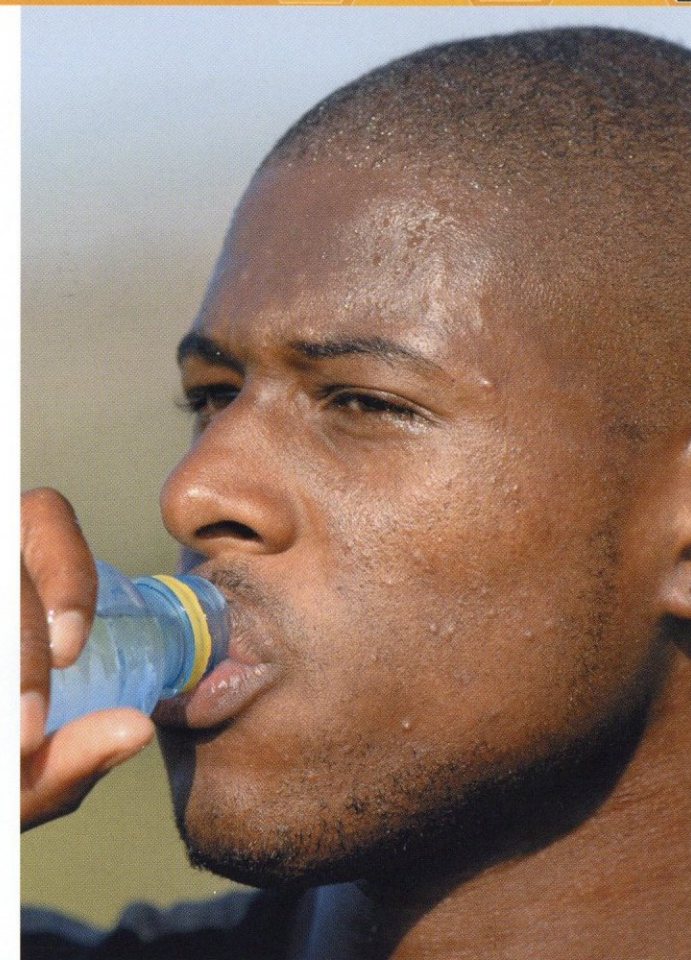
"I still stay in touch with Kieran Dyer and Titus Bramble at Newcastle and was lucky to train with Alan and play some games with him," he added.

"Watching him on TV teaches you so much but it's a bonus to

have had the chance to train with him and partner him on occasions.

"He has been one of the Premiership's top strikers for a long, long time and it seems to have been written in the stars that he would break this record.

"As for Leon, I obviously speak to him a fair bit and I'm glad to see him doing pretty well for Hull. We've never faced each other at any level, so February 25 could be an interesting day for the family."

Transfer window activity begins to increase

Leicester this week signed Walsall striker Matty Fryatt as activity increased in the transfer window.

Despite their three goals against Tottenham in Sunday's memorable FA Cup comeback, the East Midlands have been struggling in the Coca-Cola

Championship for finishing power.

Now manager Craig Levein is hoping Fryatt, signed for three and a half years, can produce the form that has brought him 14 Saddlers goals this season.

The England under-19 international is thought to have cost an initial £300,000 but additional payments will follow depending

on appearances and there will be a further windfall if Leicester sell him at a profit.

Southampton have finally cashed in on Antti Niemi, the Finnish international touted as the best keeper outside the Premiership.

He has joined Fulham for over £1m after the Saints signed Poland under-21 keeper Bartosz Bialkowski from Gornik Zabrze for a nominal fee as replacement for Alan Blayney, who joined Doncaster for £50,000.

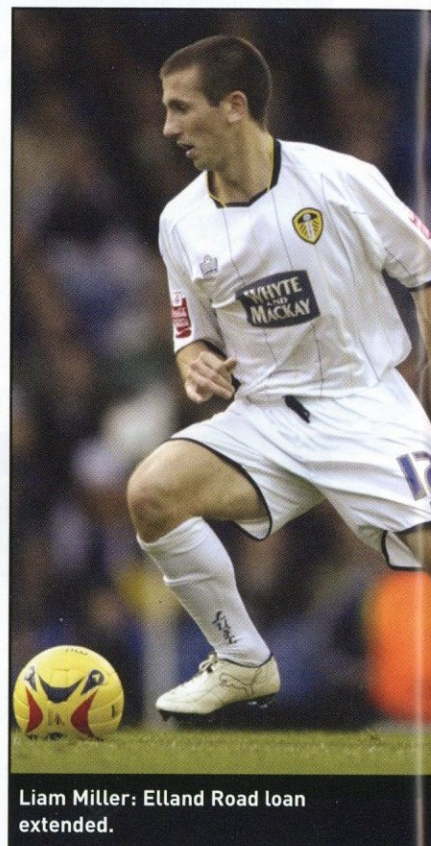
Bialkowski impressed Saints boss George Burley while on trial at Hearts and has signed for two and a half years.

Scotland winger Neil McCann, who cost £1.5m when signed by Gordon Strachan in 2003, has left Southampton by mutual consent but striker Ricardo Fuller turned down a move to Ipswich and vowed to fight for his place.

Ipswich instead signed Cardiff's Republic of Ireland international forward Alan Lee for about £100,000 and told midfielder Kevin Horlock he is free to leave.

Cardiff made moves of their own when landing Rangers striker Steven Thompson, 27, for £250,000, having already signed Darlington's Guylain Ndumbi-Nsundu on a free. The Congo-born striker has scored 11 times this season, including five in five games.

They have failed to sign on-loan Feyenoord defender Glenn Loovens, though, on a permanent

contract.

Brighton have been desperately seeking a striker after selling Leon Knight – scorer of 27 goals in the club's 2003-04 promotion season – to Swansea for £125,000. A sell-on has also been agreed.

The 23-year-old wanted to leave following a series of arguments with manager Mark McGhee.

Preston this week signed Bury midfielder Simon Whaley for an

initial £250,000, having had a bid for Celtic midfielder Stephen Pearson rejected.

Boss Billy Davies said: "It's a tremendous signing. He's a young player with great potential."

Hull, meanwhile, signed Falkirk striker Darryl Duffy for around £250,000 and targeted another forward.

Manchester United midfielder Liam Miller has extended his loan at Leeds until the end of the season while Burnley have lost first-team coach Mark Yates, who has become Kidderminster manager, and replaced him with their former defender, Steve Davis.

Lincoln and Northern Ireland defender Gareth McAuley's proposed move to Crewe has fallen through, although the clubs agreed a £150,000 fee.

But on-loan Manchester United

forward Eddie Johnson has decided to stay at Crewe rather than sign permanently for Hull.

Away from the transfer market, Stoke manager Johan Boskamp says he will leave in the summer if director of football John Rudge doesn't go first.

Boskop fell out in November with Rudge and assistant boss Jan de Koning and says:

"Everyone knows the problems and I don't change my mind. I have my principles."

Sheffield Wednesday have completed the signings of Leicester left-back Peter Gilbert and Derby striker Marcus Tudgay for undisclosed fees and another struggling club, Millwall, were this week poised to send midfielder Sammy Igoe to Bristol Rovers on loan.

Norwich boss Nigel Worthington says selling striker Dean Ashton would effectively end their promotion hopes.

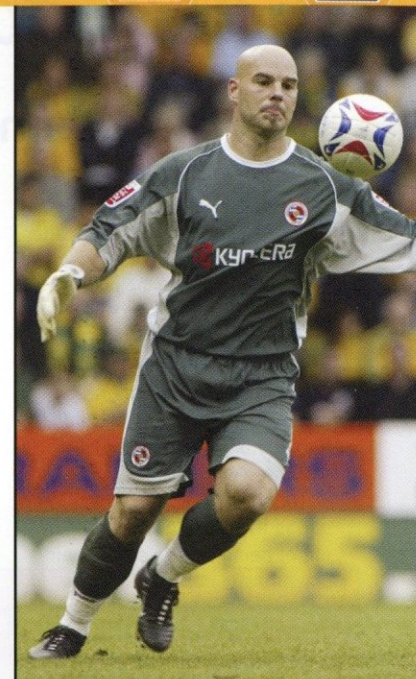
The Canaries have slapped a £7m price tag on Ashton in an attempt to scare off interest in the 22-year-old, who has been linked with several Premiership clubs.

"For us to have half a chance of the play-offs, Dean needs to be at this club," the manager said. "I'm just focussed on the boy being here. He has enjoyed his time here and he still has a lot to learn."

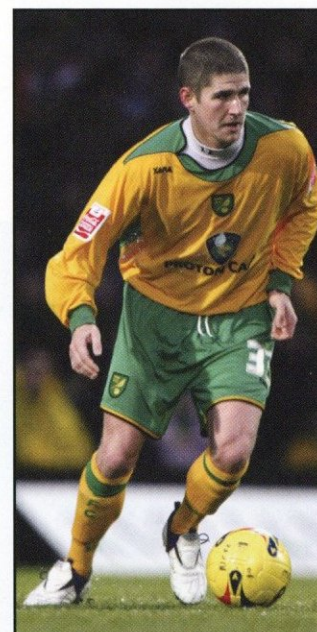
down a bid from Birmingham for ex-St Andrew's hit-man Andy Johnson.

Back to School

New study centre for Wolves trainees

Academy youngsters are getting back down to work after the Christmas break – and that includes hitting the books.

The 15 trainees currently undergoing their two-year apprenticeship with Wolves might be aiming to make the grade as professional players, but education forms a significant part of their weekly schedule.

This term is going to be different as the lads now have the benefit of being able to do all their lessons and course work in a fully equipped education centre based at the Compton Park training ground.

In addition to a hi-tech gym, state of the art medical facilities, top grade pitches, restaurant and changing rooms, the Academy also boasts a study room furnished with the latest computer technology.

All trainee footballers at every professional club follow an education programme and academies are required to employ a full-time officer responsible for overseeing their progress.

At Wolves that role falls to Nick Loftus, a former Physical Education teacher who has for many years also been involved in organising schools football in Wolverhampton.

Nick joined Wolves in April 2004 and it's his job to impress upon the young hopefuls the need to pay close attention to their studies, as he knows that not everyone who makes the jump from schoolboy to youth team level will progress on to the professional ranks.

"Obviously when the boys join us from school they have one ambition and that is to become a professional player," says Nick.

"They have got to have that drive and determination if they are going to make it and it's the job of everyone who works for the Academy to try and help them succeed.

"But we also recognise that not every lad will come through so they are going to need something to fall back on. The last thing we want is for them to leave Wolves after two years with nothing.

"I'm very lucky because everyone at the Academy – Chris Evans (Academy manager), John Perkins (coach) and all the other staff – are very keen to impress this on new recruits. I'm pleased to say the boys have all taken it on board and all work hard.

"They all follow the same course – NVQ level three Apprenticeship in Sporting Excellence – which is the equivalent of two A Levels.

"In general the lads that we select for the Academy are above average academically and some of them have done exceptionally well at their schools. So it's good

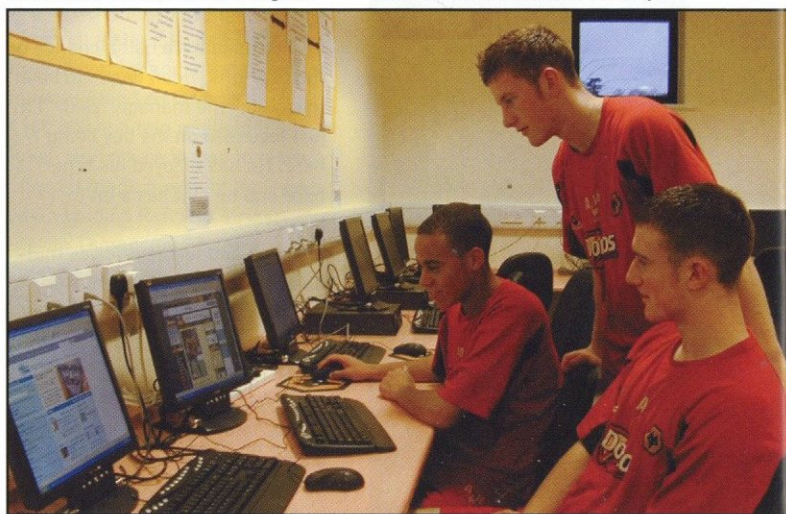
that we are able to let them carry on their education. Even if they do go on to become pros, following the course is good for their personal development.

"The curriculum is very relevant to their career as it focuses on technical and tactical development, physical conditioning, psychological development, communication and lifestyle.

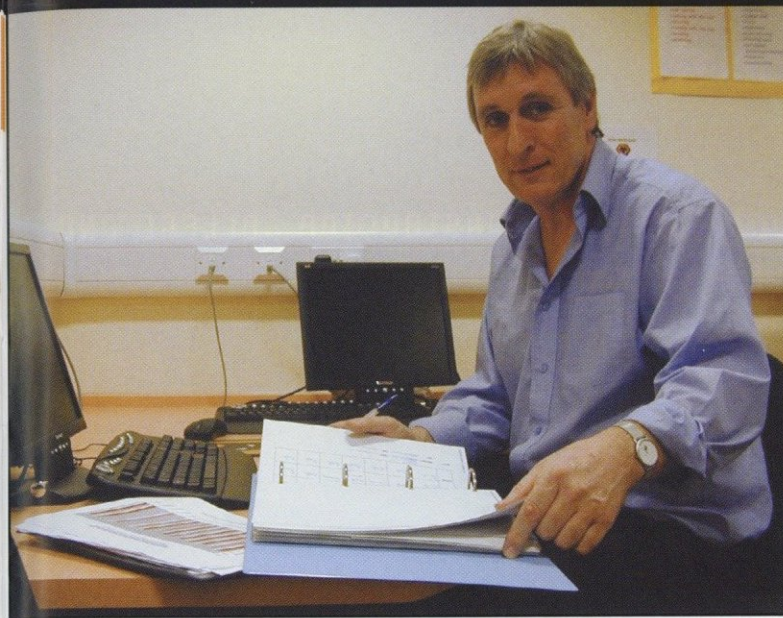
"We are assisted by three tutors and three specialist support staff from Wolverhampton College, who come to Compton on Monday and Friday afternoons, plus all day Thursday, to teach the lads.

"In addition, the youngsters all train to become FA qualified coaches, which helps their understanding of the game and is another qualification for the future if they do not go on to become professionals. This season those courses have been taken by former Villa player Dennis Mortimer and former Wolves midfielder Barry Powell.

"In the past we have used facilities at Molineux or the boys

have travelled to local colleges, but now we have all we need on site.

"When the Sir Jack Hayward Training Ground was being built we were asked what we would need for the study centre and the club has provided it.

"The senior management at Wolves have given us lots of support and what we have now at Compton is admired by other clubs.

"And it's not just the lads who are already here who are benefiting. When we are trying to recruit players of the future it's a great facility to be able to show parents.

"The new training ground has helped the Academy move forward in many ways and this is definitely one of them."

Clubs Help to Kick off Male Cancer Campaign



Testicular cancer survivor and former Football League club physiotherapist, Simon Shakeshaft, has kicked off a 'Ground Hop' challenge in aid of the PFA/FA Male Cancer Awareness Campaign "Keep Your Eye On The Ball". Starting at his last League club

Shrewsbury Town, in early December "Shakey", as he is affectionately known in football, had visited 16 clubs in the first month of his challenge. After starting at Gay Meadow, Simon is planning to visit as many Premiership, Football League and Conference clubs as possible over the remainder of the season, hoping to have visited all 116 grounds within the calendar year. The main aim of the project is to raise awareness of male cancers to players, staff and club supporters.

Simon has been a fundraiser for the Keep Your Eye On The Ball campaign, for which, even before this "Ground Hop" challenge, he had personally raised £41,000. Keep Your Eye On The Ball was set-up four years ago by The PFA, The FA and The Everyman Male Cancer Campaign, after several high profile players were diagnosed with testicular cancer. Its main objective was to raise awareness of male cancer within the football community.

Simon is here this evening on the Molineux leg of his journey. We all wish him well in his quest. with pitch announcer Steve Welch



As a DJ, Steve Welch is well used to playing to the crowd, and the crowd doesn't come much larger than when he plays a gig at Molineux. For Steve is Wolves' pitch announcer, the man whose job it is to warm up the thousands inside the ground before the teams take to the field. Steve – or 'Welchy' as he is known – also oversees any half-time competitions and entertainment.

A supporter since 1966, when his Uncle John took him into the old Molineux Street Stand to watch a game, he has, over the years, had the chance to meet and become friends with some of the players he idolised.

"I have got to know the likes of Frank Munro, John Richards, Bully, Thommo and now the likes of Lee Naylor and George Ndah as mates – which is brilliant," he said. "George is one of the nicest blokes you could ever wish to meet and it's unbelievable the bad luck he's suffered."

Steve is in his sixth season as the 'man in the middle' but his association with the club began before that with his work for local radio station 107.7 The Wolf.

"I had my own show on the station for four years and I was the linkman on matchdays with Bill Hatton and Pete Moody doing the commentary and me in a studio at the ground doing interviews and hosting the post match phone in," he said.

Away from football Welchy works not only as a DJ, but also as a compare at dinners and he is a member of the Wolverhampton Circle of Magicians – whose current president, Steve Evans is, says Steve, a big Wolves fan.

In his work, the Gornal-born entertainer has enjoyed several memorable moments.

He recalls: "When I went on to the pitch at Cardiff wearing gold and black dreadlocks in front of all of those supporters is something that will stay with me all of my days."

What an afternoon that was.

"And I also laugh to myself about when we beat Manchester United two years ago. I think I lost it a bit after we had won telling everyone 'see you in the pub in ten minutes'."

"I seem to have made a bit of a name for myself when I refer to our friends down the road at the Hawthorns as the stripey lot, but it's only meant in fun. And people are always asking me who Chris Turbo is as I give him a mention every match. So I'm going to reveal him today – he's a mechanic mate of mine who sits in the Steve Bull Stand."

Steve – who is absent tonight as he is on his annual winter skiing sojourn – normally arrives at Molineux at noon on matchdays to work out the programme of events with colleague Jason Forrest, who handles the stadium PA.

Steve adds: "If you can make someone smile that's great. If you can make most of the crowd smile, it's even better."

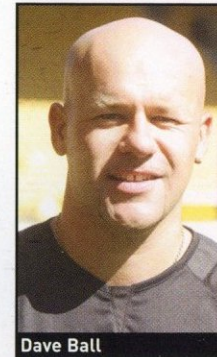
RESERVE TEAM UPDATE

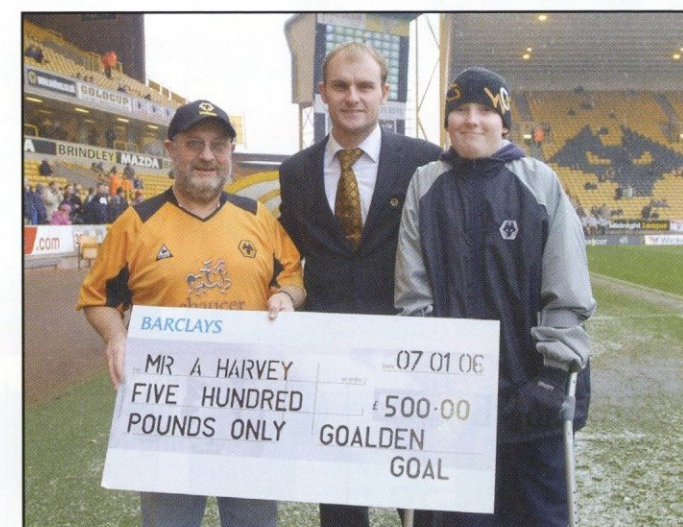

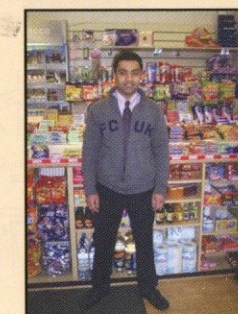

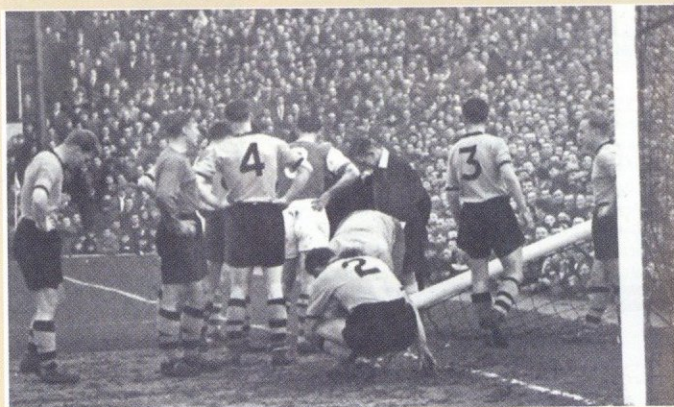

1957 - CHERRIES RIPE FOR SHOCK

Reg Cutler's goal gave Third Division giantkillers Bournemouth a shock 1-0 FA Cup fourth round victory over the following Wolves team in front of 42,011 at Molineux on 26th January 1957. Team: Bert Williams, Eddie Stuart, Gerry Harris, Bill Slater, Billy Wright, Ron Flowers, Harry Hooper, Colin Booth, Joe Bonson, Peter Broadbent, Jimmy Mullen. After only six minutes Reg Cutler had crashed into the goalpost that Wolves were defending and the goal collapsed. It took seven minutes of comic relief to repair the damage and then the game restarted. The Cherries triumphed 3-1 at home to Tottenham Hotspur in the fifth round.

1958 - BROADBENT SINKS POMPEY

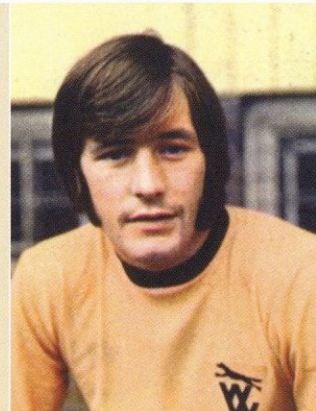
Two goals by Peter Broadbent plus others by Bobby Mason, Jimmy Mullen and Cyril Rutter's own goal gave Wolves a 5-1 FA Cup fourth round victory over Portsmouth in front of 43,522 at Molineux on 25th January 1958. Team: Malcolm Finlayson, Eddie Stuart, Gerry Harris, Eddie Clamp, Billy Wright, Bill Slater, Norman Deeley, Broadbent, Jimmy Murray, Mason, Mullen. It was Wolves' biggest FA Cup win since beating Chesterfield 6-0 in January 1949. Pompey had put five goals past Aldershot in the previous round and it was their heaviest FA Cup defeat since losing 5-0 to Spurs in January 1937.

1960 - EIGHT GOAL THRILLER
Goals from Eddie Clamp, Bobby

Mason, Jimmy Murray and Des Horne gave Wolves a thrilling 4-4 First Division draw against Arsenal in front of 47,854 at Molineux on 2nd January 1960. Team: Malcolm Finlayson, George Showell, Gerry Harris, Clamp, Bill Slater, Ron Flowers, Norman Deeley, Mason, Murray, Peter Broadbent, Horne. Arsenal fielded former Wolves forward Jackie Henderson. Wolves also scored four goals in their next League match at home to Manchester City. It was the first time Wolves had drawn 4-4 in the First Division since they shared eight goals at Middlesbrough in March 1949.

1962 - BLACKPOOL ROCK WOLVES

Four goals by Ray Charnley plus others from Hauser, Perry and Crawford gave Blackpool a remarkable 7-2 First Division victory over the following Wolves team in front of 12,852 at Bloomfield Road on 20th January 1962. Team: Malcolm Finlayson, Eddie Stuart, Laurie Kelly, Bill Slater, George Showell, Ron Flowers, Terry Wharton, Bobby Mason, Jimmy Murray, Peter Broadbent, Alan Hinton. It was the first time Wolves had conceded seven goals in the top-flight since losing 7-0 at Arsenal in December 1934. It was Blackpool's biggest League victory since trouncing Sunderland 7-0 at Bloomfield Road in October 1957.

1968 - MILLMOOR CUP EXIT

Jim Storrle scored to give Second Division strugglers Rotherham United a 1-0 FA Cup third round win over the following Wolves team in front of 14,841 at Millmoor on 27th January 1968: Phil Parkes, Gerry Taylor, Les Wilson, Mike Bailey, Dave Woodfield, John Holsgrove, Mike Kenning, Peter Knowles, Derek Dougan, Dave Burnside, Dave Wagstaffe. It was the first time Wolves had lost to lower division opposition in the competition since the then holders were defeated 2-1 at Huddersfield Town in a third round replay in January 1961. The Millers were destined to take top-flight Leicester City to a fifth round replay that season.

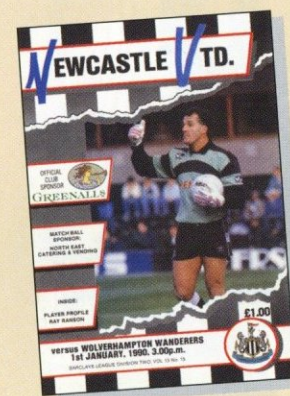
1972 - WOLVES BEAT LEADERS

Goals from Derek Dougan, John Richards and Jim McCalliog's penalty gave Wolves an exciting 3-1 First Division victory over leaders Manchester United in front of 46,781 at Old Trafford on 8th January 1972. Team: Phil Parkes, Bernard Shaw, Derek Parkin, Mike Bailey, Frank Munro, John McAlle, McCalliog, Kenny Hibbitt, Richards, Dougan (Hugh Curran), Dave Wagstaffe. It extended Wolves' unbeaten run to nine League games. Manchester United were without George Best who had not reported for training all week-end was dropped. Sammy McIlroy, his replacement, scored United's only goal five minutes from time.

1984 - WOLVES SHOCK LIVERPOOL

Teenager Steve Mardenborough's

first-half strike gave bottom of the table Wolves a shock 1-0 First Division victory over leaders Liverpool watched by 23,235 at Anfield on 14th January 1984. Team: John Burridge, John Humphrey, Geoff Palmer, Peter Daniel, John Pender, Alan Dodd, Tony Towner, Wayne Clarke, Sammy Troughton, Mardenborough, Danny Crainie. It was Wolves' first win at Anfield since December 1950 and only their fourth victory of the season, while Liverpool lost only one other home League match en route to the League Championship. Wolves remained bottom of the First Division.



1990 - BULL CALLS THE TOWN

Ace marksman Steve Bull scored four times to give Wolves an emphatic 4-1 Second Division victory over Newcastle United in front of 22,054 at St James' Park on New Year's Day 1990. Team: Mark Kendall, Tom Bennett, Mark Venus, Gary Bellamy, Keith Downing (Paul Jones), Floyd Streete, John Paskin, Paul Cook, Bull, Andy Mutch, Robbie Dennison (Paul McLoughlin). It was the first time Bull had netted four goals in a League match since the 6-0 demolition of Preston in November 1988. The England international was leading marksman for the fourth successive season with 24 Second Division goals.

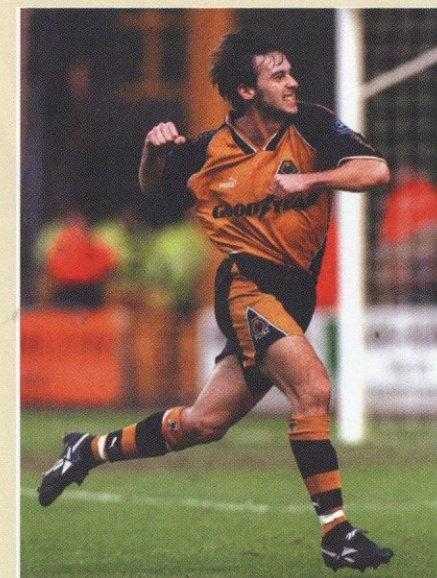
1992 - RANKINE'S MOLINEUX MOVE

Versatile midfielder Mark Rankine joined Wolves from Fourth Division strugglers Doncaster Rovers for £70,000 in January 1992. He had

turned professional for Doncaster in July 1988 and was ever-present for his hometown club in 1988-89. Making his Wolves debut as substitute in the 1-0 victory at home to Leicester City, their fifth straight win, he was destined to feature prominently as Wolves reached the FA Cup sixth round in 1993-94. He also appeared at right-back and scored once in 132 League outings while at Molineux before losing his place to Jamie Smith and moving to Preston North End for £100,000 in September 1996.

1998 - FREEDMAN SILENCES CANARIES

Dougie Freedman's hat-trick plus goals by Robbie Keane and Don Goodman gave high-flying Wolves an exciting 5-0 First Division victory over Norwich City in front of 23,703 at Molineux on 10th January 1998. Team: Mike Stowell, Kevin Muscat, Steve Froggatt, Mark Atkins, Dean Richards, Keith Curle, Goodman (Miku Paatelainen), Darren Ferguson, Keane (Tony Daley), Freedman, Simon Osborn (Carl Robinson). It was Freedman's solitary hat-trick for Wolves and he netted ten goals in 29 League games while at Molineux. Norwich were destined to also lose 5-0 at local rivals Ipswich Town that season.

Stadium History

Following an 83-year stay, Millwall left The Den in 1993. The club moved just a quarter-of-a-mile away, taking up residence at the £16m all-seater New Den. The late John Smith MP officially opened the ground, with a glamorous friendly against Sporting Lisbon marking the start of action on the pitch.

Housing just over 20,000 spectators and built on the site of an old church, many fans were unhappy at the venue originally being marketed as 'The New London Stadium'.

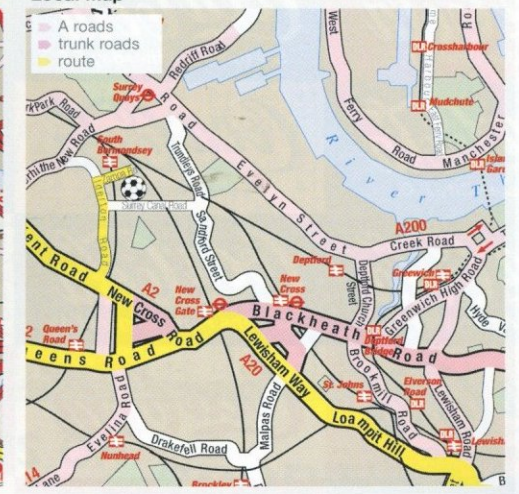

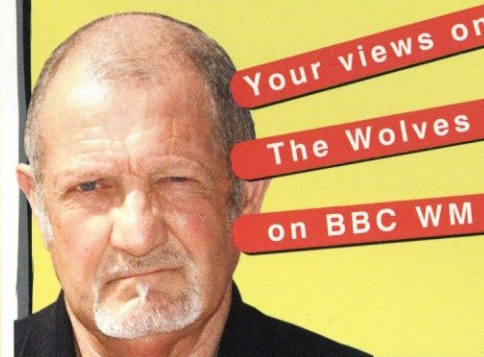
