

Good afternoon and a warm welcome to all our supporters to Kenilworth Road, and to our Championship visitors Leeds United and their Directors, Management, Players and Supporters.

As always, after last Saturday's win against Birmingham City and before leaving the KC Stadium after our draw against Hull City on Tuesday night, I always spend that first ten to twenty minutes after the final whistle scrutinising the other Championship results and the impact they have had on the league table. I am sure it is the same for everyone involved in our national game, from the fans to the players and staff in the dressing rooms, and right up to the boardrooms of the clubs up and down the country.

This season seems even more tense than the last. Whether you are a player or a supporter, the Championship certainly demands your concentration. With such a small gap between many of the clubs, such as only eight points between 16th position and 2nd in the table, the league this season so far is very tight. Conversely, if they go against you it's frustration, although overall it does make for an exciting competition.

Clearly, it is a long season in the Championship, which is already just over quarter of the way through. However, when you take into account

our own share of injuries, it is a great credit to the team and to our Manager that after twelve games we are sitting seventh in the table before today's kick-off.

Also, for the remainder of October our schedule still averages a game every three days, and that includes our exciting Carling Cup Third Round tie at Goodison Park against Everton this coming Tuesday evening.

The Hatters were unable to take the opportunity to play in the UEFA Cup when we won the League Cup in 1988, by beating Arsenal 3-2 at Wembley. This was due to the seven-year ban on all English Clubs playing in Europe.

European football beckons once again for the successful club that wins the Carling Cup, with a place in next season's UEFA Cup the prize.

I'd like to give special thanks to those supporters who travelled to Hull this week, and also to all our supporters who will be travelling up the M6 to Everton next Tuesday. The players always appreciate your support.

As always, the vocal support you give the team does make a difference.

Enjoy the game.

Welcome to

Leeds United

Are these worrying times for Leeds United Football Club? Their current position in the Championship table suggests so. JAMES MARSH looks at the current Leeds United squad, which certainly suggests that this great club can soon quickly turn around their disappointing start to the season

After finding themselves just one win away from a return to the Premiership last term, Leeds have endured a torrid start to the new campaign both on and off the pitch. Kevin Blackwell – despite taking the Elland Road outfit to the play-off final on a shoestring budget – eventually paid the price for a poor run of results and was sacked in September. With the 1992 League Champions second from bottom, and with only one win in seven league games, first team coach John Carver was thrown the caretaker reins.

Although Carver's first match in charge was a thrilling 3-2 win over the then in-form Birmingham City, Bobby Robson's former Newcastle number two has now seen his side lose their last three matches. Home defeats to Stoke and Leicester in the previous weeks have deepened the gloom for Leeds fans, and

Carver will be desperate for a result at Kenilworth Road this afternoon to kick start the club's season.

Despite their current slump, Leeds do have players of considerable quality, not least in the form of Northern Ireland international striker, David Healy. The pacy frontman displayed a master class of finishing in netting a hat trick against Spain last month, and also memorably blasted home the winner against England in a 1-0 win twelve months earlier: Healy – who has been restored to his favoured central striker role under Carver – is likely to be partnered up front by Geoff Horsfield, provided the powerful ex-West Brom target man is recovered from injury.

In midfield, Shaun Derry and Ian Westlake will run all day in the centre, with US international Eddie Lewis and youngster Jonathan Douglas providing

the guile on the flanks. One player that definitely won't figure today is ex-Hatter, Kevin Nicholls, who Leeds had hoped would be a driving force this season. Despite recovering ahead of schedule from a knee injury sustained pre-season, the former Luton favourite now looks likely to be out until December with further mediate ligament troubles.

Leeds do not lack experience at the back, with ex-Spurs goalkeeper, Neil Sullivan, in goal and former Champions League semi-finalist, Gary Kelly, still marauding up and down from right back. Captain Paul Butler also remains a fierce competitor and his young centre back partner, Matthew Kilgallon, is one of the most highly-rated defenders in the Championship. Leeds fans will hope that the 22-year-old is one asset they are not forced to cash in on as they look to move up the table.


The Manager



John Carver was the assistant manager to Bobby Robson at Newcastle United. Following Robson's departure in September 2004, Carver was appointed caretaker manager and guided the team to a 3-0 win against Blackburn Rovers. However Carver had his contract terminated in that month whilst acting as caretaker manager at Newcastle United, when Graeme Souness opted to bring in his own backroom staff. In July 2005 Leeds United appointed Carver as the club's head coach, replacing the departed Adrian Boothroyd, who had left the club to be the new manager of Watford. In October 2005, a mere three months after joining Leeds United, Carver was linked with the vacant Hearts position as assistant to Bobby Robson, who was hotly tipped to be appointed the club's new manager. In June 2006 Carver was again linked with another club, this time Carlisle United, who wanted Carver to be their new manager. However, after much thought and deliberation, Carver decided to stay with Leeds, who rewarded him in July for his loyalty by promoting him to the position of assistant manager, which had been felt vacant following the departure of previous assistant Sam Ellis, in May 2006. September 2006 saw Carver named caretaker manager at Leeds United, after Kevin Blackwell was fired following a disastrous start to the season. Carver celebrated a win in his first game in charge after beating Birmingham City 3-2, although recent results have not been so good, losing three games in succession in the Championship.

The Goalkeepers

Leeds swooped to sign **TONY WARNER** (pictured) on loan from Fulham in August 2006 after number one choice goalkeeper **NEIL SULLIVAN** was injured earlier in the campaign. Warner started his career at Liverpool, but despite spending almost nine years at Anfield, the Trinidadian goalkeeper never made an appearance for the Merseyside club. Several loan moves transpired whilst at Liverpool, but it was at Millwall where he made a name for himself, making 200 appearances, although the shot-stopper was ruled out for the Lions' 2004 FA Cup Final appearance at the Millennium Stadium. After making 26 appearances for Cardiff, Warner then moved to Fulham where he has been in and out of their starting line-up. Sullivan is an experienced goalkeeper who began his career with Wimbledon. Although born and brought up in England, his Scottish ancestry enabled him to play for their national side and has gone on to make nearly 30 appearance for his country.



The Defenders


GARY KELLY (pictured) is Leeds' longest serving player, having made over 500 appearances for the club. Leeds is Kelly's only ever professional club, and after making his debut in the 1991-92 season, he has more or less been a regular in every subsequent season for Leeds. As a result, he was rewarded with a testimonial match against Celtic in May 2002. Kelly also won 51 international caps playing for the Republic of Ireland before his retirement from international football, representing them at both the 1994 and 2002 FIFA Cup. **STEPHEN CRAINEY** is a left back who has been capped at under-21 level by Scotland. He was signed from Southampton for £200,000 in August 2005, having joined them from Celtic in 2003. **ALAN WRIGHT** is currently on-loan at Leeds United from Sheffield United. Alan has played over 500 League games for six clubs, including a eight-year spell for Aston Villa. He has also played for Blackburn Rovers, Blackpool and Middlesbrough. **PAUL BUTLER** is probably the first name on the Leeds United team sheet. He was made captain at Leeds shortly after signing. He has also played for Rochdale, Bury, Sunderland and Wolverhampton Wanderers and joined Leeds United in July 2004. His greatest achievement to date received was when he won the Division One championship medal with Sunderland in 1999. **SEAN GREGAN** is a player who has had a distinguished career has played in all of the top four leagues in England. He started his career with Darlington, where he played for five years before, joining Preston North End. He captained Preston to the Division 2 title. He then moved to West Brom, before completing a move to Leeds United in 2004.



The Midfielders

JONATHAN DOUGLAS made his debut in the Football League of Ireland for Monaghan United aged 16. He first joined Blackburn after having been a trialist at Celtic and made his debut against West Ham United in the Worthington Cup on October 31, 2000. In March 2003, he was loaned to Chesterfield and then to Blackpool for three months. However, with Blackburn struggling in the league, he found himself returning to action on a regular basis, and shone for the team, before he was transferred to Leeds, initially on a season long loan. **SHAUN DERRY** (pictured) and **STEVE STONE** are two players who have enjoyed inspirational careers. Stone won nine caps for England and spent most of his domestic career at Nottingham Forest, where he helped establish them as a Premiership club. When Forest were relegated, he moved to Aston Villa. Despite impressing the manager John Gregory, he was soon transferred to Portsmouth after failing to shine under Graham Taylor. Stone


then moved to Leeds, where he featured in the Club's play-off semi final win last season. Derry is known for his hard-tackling and aggressive midfield style and is a firm favorite at Leeds. Derry started his career at Notts County as a trainee before being bought by Sheffield United in 1998 for a fee of £700,000. He was then sold to Portsmouth in 2000 for £300,000, then to Crystal Palace in 2002 for £400,000. He helped Crystal Palace in their return to the Premiership in 2004, making 44 appearances including an appearance in the play-off final. He struggled to get into the team during the 2004-05 season, prompting Leeds to sign him for an undisclosed amount in February 2005. **KEVIN NICHOLLS** will miss the return to Luton this afternoon through injury, and Leeds strengthened their midfield recently by acquiring **ADAM JOHNSON**, on-loan from Middlesbrough. **SÉBASTIEN CAROLE** signed on a free transfer from Brighton in the summer of 2006 and previously played for AS Monaco whilst **FRAZER RICHARDSON** and **GYLFI EINARSSON** have both been struggling through injury in recent weeks.



The Strikers

Luton will have to keep a close eye on Northern Ireland international **DAVID HEALY** (pictured) this afternoon. Although Leeds have been struggling this season, the striker has already scored four goals this season, and scored a hat-trick in a recent European Championship qualifier against Spain at Windsor Park. Healy started his career at Manchester United, making a handful of appearances before signing for Preston North End, where he made a real name for himself. In 2000-01, Healy scored ten goals in 26 games and ten more in 49 games in 2001-02. It was that scoring form that prompted Leeds to sign him in 2004. Healy is famous for scoring Northern Ireland's winner against England in September 2005. **GEOFF HORSFIELD** is currently on-loan at Leeds United from Sheffield United, and has already scored twice in nine games so far this season. Horsfield has scored plenty of goals wherever he has been throughout his career, particularly at Halifax Town, Birmingham

City and Fulham. **IAN MOORE** began his career at Tranmere, where he made over fifty appearances. He then made his first big-money move to Nottingham Forest under Frank Clark but failed to make a significant impact. Stockport County would be the next team to take a gamble on the goal-shy striker and signed him for a then club record fee of £800,000. To some extent the gamble paid off and Moore gave a goal return of almost 1 goal in 4 games - netting twenty times and becoming the club's leading scorer. This rapid improvement in form brought the attention of neighbours Burnley and Moore moved to Turf Moor for £1million in the winter of 2000, before signing for Leeds. **ROBBIE BLAKE**, who started his career with Darlington, is a tricky player with good ball control and quick feet, and most importantly for a striker, a prolific goal scorer. He had two long periods at Bradford City and Burnley, before moving to Birmingham City. Leeds then moved in for Blake in 2005, and has since scored 12 times for the Elland Road club.







View from the *Opposition*

How has Kevin Nicholls settled in at Elland Road?

It has been a nightmare start for Kevin who suffered a serious injury in his first training session. That kept him out for the first seven games before he came off the bench in the 3-0 defeat at home to Sunderland. He started the next game at Coventry and after also playing against Barnet in the Carling Cup, Nicholls was outstanding alongside Shaun Derry against Birmingham. Leeds looked to have discovered a genuinely decent midfield partnership only for Nicholls to suffer another injury at West Brom the following week.



Who should Luton fans look out for this afternoon in the Leeds' squad?

Leeds have an abundance of potential in the squad, but most are out of form. David Healy is the star turn after his international exploits this season with his superb hat-trick against Spain being followed by the winning goal against Latvia. A great talent and, thankfully, a player that has been restored to playing up front rather than out wide.



What are Leeds' aims for this season?

At the start of the season, the aim was to go one better than last season and win promotion back to the Premiership. Now (and these notes are being written before the Leicester game in midweek) such a scenario seems unlikely with some fans even fearing a winter spent battling against relegation.

Five to Remember

Roger Wash takes a look back at five classic encounters between Luton Town and Leeds United

5th April 1952 Luton Town 2 Leeds United 1 Attendance: 11,460

For the first time in three seasons the Hatters were approaching the end of a campaign playing open, relaxed football without fear of relegation, and with Leeds still clinging to an outside chance of promotion a close contest was anticipated.

Latecomers must have been kicking themselves with the Town two up in the first four minutes, with Bernard Moore netting both goals. Moore then continued to give the great John Charles the runaround and it was only a mixture of good defending and indifferent finishing that prevented the game from turning into a rout.

Ray Iggledon pulled a goal back with three minutes to go to give the scoreline an unrealistic look.

4th November 1961 Luton Town 3 Leeds United 2 Attendance: 10,341

The Hatters had not beaten Leeds at Kenilworth Road in the League since 1952 and it looked likely that the run would be continued with early pressure forcing Luton goalkeeper Jim Standen into some brilliant saves.

It was the Town, though, who took the lead when Roland Legate headed home, only for Don Revie to fire in an equaliser. Jim Fleming then put the Hatters ahead with a dipping shot just after the break, but Leeds fought back and levelled once more when Billy Bremner slotted home a controversial penalty.

Legate won the day with another header, and this time Leeds were unable to conjure up a third equaliser after going down to ten fit men in the final quarter, in the days before substitutes.

22nd March 1975 Luton Town 2 Leeds United 1 Attendance: 23,048

The Town had fought hard to win promotion back to the top flight in 1974, but by the following Christmas it looked likely that their stay in Division One would be short lived.

By the time of the visit of mighty Leeds though, the Hatters had pulled themselves off the bottom of the table with a series of good results, but it was still a major surprise when John Aston and Peter Anderson fired the home side two up in the first twelve minutes.

Champions Leeds were shell shocked and could not find a way back until 87 minutes when Joe Jordan netted a scrappy consolation. A crazy result in an amazing season!

2nd November 1988 Leeds United 0 Luton Town 2 Attendance: 19,450

Littlewoods Cup holders Luton faced a tough third round trip to Second Division Leeds without three first choice players. Despite Leeds pressure the Town took the lead after 29 minutes when Danny Wilson fired in a 25-yard shot past a bemused Mervyn Day.

The game was as good as over with David Oldfield's surging run and shot from a Roy Veegerle pass, but there was still drama to come when 18-year-old Julian James, on his full Luton debut, was sent off for a professional foul with five minutes to go, with manager Ray Harford following him for protesting too long and too loud!

8th September 1990 Luton Town 1 Leeds United 0 Attendance: 12,576

Newly-promoted Leeds signalled their intentions when Vinny Jones clattered into Luton goalkeeper Alec Chamberlain in the first minute, but the Town had first blood when Kingsley Black nodded in a perfect cross from Lars Elstrup after five minutes.

A powerful and intimidating Leeds then threatened to swamp the young Hatters side, but a man of the match performance from Chamberlain kept the points at Kenilworth Road.

'The Leeds of old' said Luton manager Jim Ryan after seeing another foul by Jones send little David Preece to hospital with concussion.



Stat Attack

Simon Pitts takes a look at some interesting stats between this afternoon's two sides.

The two sides have met 19 times previously in the league at Kenilworth Road, with the Hatters winning seven, and the visitors taking maximum points on only three occasions. Amazingly there has been nine draws, and three of each of the scorelines 0-0, 1-1 and 2-2!!



Leeds have also only bought three players from Luton over the years, and two of these have come in the last three summers! Matthew Spring (pictured) moved on a free transfer in July 2004 after making 289 appearances and scoring 30 goals for the Hatters. Two years on and Leeds once again bought a midfielder; this time £750k exchanged hands to secure the services of Kevin Nicholls. Nicholls made 187 appearances, and scored 33 goals, after joining from Wigan in 2001, and captained the Hatters to two promotions, including, of course, the League One title in 2004/05.

It's 28 home games since the Hatters last failed to score, and that was the 0-0 draw against Leeds at the beginning of last season. At the time of writing it was also the last time that Luton have finished a match 0-0 in any competition, a run of 59 matches prior to the trip to Hull City.

The two sides met every season from 1947/48 through to 1962/63, except for Luton's solitary season in the top flight in 1955/56. There were five victories for Luton, two for Leeds, and eight draws during this time. The next time they met was during Luton's second solitary season in the top flight in 1974/75, when the Hatters won 2-1 courtesy of early goals from John Aston and Peter Anderson. The Hatters were ultimately relegated at the end of the season, finishing just a point from Tottenham Hotspur and safety, but incidentally above Carlisle and Chelsea!

Only three players have made a permanent move from Leeds to Luton, and two more have come to Kenilworth Road on loan. In 1991/92 Luton boss David Pleat raided the Elland Road Club three times! First to arrive, and the only permanent of the three moves, was Chris Kamara (pictured), who went on to play 54 times for the Hatters, although he failed to score! Imre Varadi on the other hand took only 27 minutes of his debut to score the equaliser against Wimbledon. Varadi made a further 5 appearances whilst on a months loan at the end of the season, but was unable to help the Hatters from avoiding relegation. As Varadi arrived from Leeds, loan keeper Mervyn Day had returned to Yorkshire, having played four times, and keeping one clean sheet, but never experiencing a win in Luton colours!



The first meeting between the two sides came on Boxing Day 1947 with the Hatters winning 2-0 at Leeds. The very next day the reverse fixture took place at Kenilworth Road and the Hatters were 6-1 winners! Although Luton have won on three further occasions at Elland Road this is the only time, to date, that they have completed the "double" over the Yorkshire side!

The biggest attendance for this fixture, 25,775, also saw a goal less draw, during the promotion season of 1954/55. Whereas the lowest crowd, 8916, were treated to a 2-2 draw in 1962/63! Gordon Turner scored for the third consecutive game, and Brendan McNally scored the second of the game, which turned out to be his third and final career goal for Luton.

Luton replaced Leeds in the top flight for the 1982/83 season, and it wasn't until the Yorkshire Club returned in 1990/91 that the sides met again, and a Kingsley Black goal was enough to give the Hatters maximum points. The following season saw Luton relegated from Division One, (to the "New" Division One!) and Leeds took all six points with home and away 2-0 wins.




Rowan Vine converted the kick, and then added a second moments later. A corner eventually

found the in-form Luton striker, who scored his eighth goal of the season with ease.







On the Website

CHRIS RIVETT looks at some improvements that have been made to the Hatters World site.

If you are a Hatters World subscriber and you have logged on to the website recently you may have noticed some changes relating to the viewing process for match highlights and TV features.

Match commentaries have also been affected by the introduction of Digital Rights Management (DRM) technology to our popular audio subscription website.

The tried and trusted Windows Media DRM has been implemented to prevent unauthorised users accessing the Club's multimedia content. Subscribers will notice that you are now asked to download a license before viewing video clips or listening to online match commentary.

Licenses are issued separately for match highlights, video interviews

and audio commentaries and last for one day, which means you will only be asked to download a license every 24 hours. Downloading a license is totally safe and takes just seconds to do.

If however you do experience any problems please send an email to customerservices@premiumtv.co.uk with as much detail as possible to allow the most efficient response.

They will require the following details: name; contact email; username and details of your operating system and browser (e.g. Windows XP Home and Internet Explorer 6.0).

This technology works in a similar manner to the way in which you are able to download music for your MP3 player and will be something you may already be familiar with

without realizing it.

This sort of thing normally takes care of itself in the background but at a time when you need to be conscious of threats to your PC's security, if you are alerted to anything, as long as it is line with what I have described above, it will be safe to authorise.

DRM works with Windows Media Player version 9 or greater and Internet Explorer version 6 or greater. Firefox and other non-Windows browsers will be added early in 2007.

Unfortunately, though, this service is not currently available for Macs but we will keep you posted with developments on these fronts so keep an eye on the website and future programme notes for more information.

Thank you to everyone who has contacted us with positive feedback regarding the recent launch of the desktop news alert system and the mobile internet site.

We are pleased that you have found these developments beneficial as we strive to ensure that Luton Town's Official Website remains at the forefront of the latest internet technologies.

Southend block Norwich talk


Southend United have revealed that they have denied managerless Championship rivals Norwich City permission to speak to their boss Steve Tilson.

Crystal Palace chairman Simon Jordan has purchased the freehold to the club's Selhurst Park stadium.


Jordan, who has been at the Eagles helm for more than six years, paid £12m for the freehold to former chairman Ron Noades through an intermediary.

Jordan revealed the process of securing the freehold was similar to the manner in which he landed the club in July 2000.


"I have used the structure - unbeknownst to Ron, I suspect - to purchase the freehold, which we exchanged on Friday last week," added Jordan.

The charge, which Parkinson admitted, related to Hull's 2-1 home defeat by Derby at the KC Stadium on 12 August.


Parkinson was unhappy at both of the opposition's goals, and vented his fury at the referee at the entrance to the tunnel after the game.


Chambers can play on either flank and is an attack-minded full-back, liking to get forward and link up with play.

Into the Leon's Den

Just a little over a year ago, a young defender broke into the Hatters first team and was instantly thrust into the harsh world we call The Championship. Having overcome some of the toughest obstacles the league could throw at him, Leon Barnett took the time out to talk exclusively to today's matchday programme. And he has a message for you: Don't call me Curtis!

Last season a slightly built teenage defender from Stevenage made his Championship debut for the Hatters, coming on for the last few minutes to shore up a defence which was hellbent on closing out a 1-0 win at Hull City.

Luton fans had not seen much of Leon Barnett, just the odd cup game here and there, and with three vital points at stake they were desperately hoping he wouldn't be a lamb to the slaughter in a ground where the opponents were known as The Tigers.

No sooner had he got his boots dirty the final whistle went, and the league debut Leon had been dreaming about since signing as an apprentice in August 2002 was all over.

The countless scenarios and permutations that Leon's imagination had conjured up over the years may not quite have materialised as he'd imagined them to be, but he was off the mark and three days later he started an important Carling Cup game at Reading.

It was clear that the management and coaching staff were bleeding him.

Leon was ready.

"I remember we were away at Woking and we were winning 2-0. I know it was only the last five minutes but I was still quite nervous.

"I remember coming on for Marvin Johnson who is a bit of a legend, so most people remember me coming on for that. But other than that I done well and I took it from there, really.

"I think that was Marv's last game but it's good to tell people that I've come on for Marvin Johnson."

It was indeed the last game Marvin Johnson started for Luton. It wasn't really a case of out with the old and in with the new, however, as a brief appearance in the LDV Vans

Trophy is merely part of a young footballer's education. Leon would have been under no illusions from the coaching staff that his first team career was about to start.

It was to be his only appearance of the season and his learning was done from then on in with the Marvin and Co on the training ground, punctuated with the odd Mickey Mouse cup appearance.

"Marv's been here for 20 years so he knows what he's doing and I take a few notes from him."

Leon's elevation to the first team squad was achievement enough, but after establishing himself as a mainstay on the bench in the early part of the season, Leon's first Championship start finally came on the first day of November last year.

It was Sheffield United away, and Leon was in the lion's den. The Hatters were cut to ribbons by The Blades, losing 4-0.


Leon, however, excelled in the heart of the Hatters defence alongside Chris Coyne, playing with a cool, confident head.

Realising that he had a player on his hands, Mike Newell decided that Leon's time had come and he was going to have to play him to give the young defender the games he needed. A stretched, injury-hit squad avoided any too awkward selection dilemmas, but there were tougher times ahead for Leon.

Curtis Davies had gone to West Brom for £3m, and many Luton fans had high expectations of his replacement in the squad. This just wasn't fair on Leon, as players develop at different speeds and Curtis had excelled mainly in a division lower than the one Leon was playing in.

"When Curtis went everybody was thinking the next youngster's got to be as good as him. There were big expectations. I tried not to get caught up in the hype, but





just to do as well as I can. I don't want to be named as 'The New Curtis', I just want to play as good as I can."

More assured performances followed but were tainted with the odd mistake, and very occasionally, the odd 'mare.

Someone forgot to tell Leon that if you're going to cock up, make it on a wet Wednesday in Wolverhampton when there aren't many Luton fans around, not in front of a packed house at Kenilworth Road against the league leaders when it's live on Sky Sports.

Reading were the visitors. They hadn't lost for ten years and were top by fifty points.

To be fair, Leon was a bit unfortunate, but wasn't quite alert enough to deal with Reading's instant attack from the kick-off.

"I was kind of nervous, as you could see at the Reading game when I made a mistake in the first few minutes.

"I slipped and then the ball went under my foot, I'd just lost my concentration and I remember a few of the players saying 'get your head up'.

"But the lads kept saying 'You've made a mistake but just get over it. There's nothing you can do now.' So that's what I had to do. After the mistake I thought I'd done okay so I took that as a confidence boost."

Luton went onto win the game, anyway, so all was fair in love and war:

"I don't think we got enough credit for that game, really. We were one of only two teams to beat them that season, but the main thing is we won."

Leon played in twenty Championship games last season. Had he envisaged so much involvement at the start of the last campaign?

"No way! I didn't realise that I'd play 20 games. I was well happy with that!"

There was a score to settle on the last home match of the season, though.

Earlier in the season Burnley had visited the town. Leon's task, in just his

second start, had been to mark their powerhouse striker, Ade Akinbiyi - a handful for any defender in any league.

It was a hell of a game for the young defender. Akinbiyi scored a devastating, match-winning hat-trick within the first hour; Leon gave away a penalty and was booked in the process.

When Akinbiyi signed for Sheffield United during the January transfer window, many feared the consequences of combining two of the forces that had put Luton to the sword that season.

By the time The Blades visited Kenilworth Road in April, Barnett had a lot more games under his belt, and was confident of handling his early season nemesis the second time around.

"In away I was a bit nervous playing him again, but I really wanted to show him that I'd had a bad game that day. I had a better game when I played him against Sheffield United plus they were at the top of the League, so I thought I'd done much better than that.

"I knew that some people were thinking 'Oh god, Leon's going to get done again by Akinbiyi', so I had to try my hardest to prove them wrong. And I did!"

"So hopefully, people can see that sometimes you have bad games and sometimes you have good games, and that was one of my good games."

This season, to the delight of everyone at the Club, the fans, and most importantly himself, Leon has matured into a cool-headed defender that can

take the Championship in his stride.

His run in the team continues, and he's taking man-of-the-match accolades and even getting on the score-sheet.

Leon is keeping his feet firmly on the ground, though, and is looking forward to the rest of the season.

"I can't get carried away with it because I'm still fighting for my place even though I'm playing.

"I don't want to relax and then they take my place and I'm out of the team and I have to start all over again. I've just got to keep going!"





David BROGAN

Only a month after signing from Scottish junior club St Anthony, David was thrust into the Luton first team and scored on his debut, a last minute effort in a League Cup tie at Liverpool in October 1960, the Club's first ever goal in the competition.

A clever inside forward, David kept his place in the League side for four consecutive games before the heavy pitches began to tell and he returned to the reserves.

It was while playing for the Town's reserves that he badly fractured a leg which failed to heal properly and he reluctantly had to give up the game.

After receiving a testimonial in 1962, David returned to his native Glasgow.

Allan Duncan BROWN

Allan Brown became a record Scottish export when leaving East Fife for Blackpool in exchange for £25,000 in 1950 due to his pace, power and subtlety in the forward line.

A Scottish international, he was regarded as a major coup by the Hatters in 1957 and became part of the Luton side that won through to Wembley for the 1959 F.A.Cup final making up for the two finals he missed with Blackpool due to injury.

After spells at Portsmouth and Wigan, Allan returned to Kenilworth Road as manager in 1966 and steered the club to the Division Four championship. Following several more managerial posts Allan now lives in Lytham St Annes, in retirement.



Michael (Micky) John BROWN

Slough born Micky joined Fulham from school but played only a handful of games in the Cottagers' Division One side in four years so moved on to Millwall in 1965, where he was a regular in the team which won promotion from Division Three a year later.

Following promotion, Micky found his chances at the Den limited so stepped down a level and came to Kenilworth Road in 1967. A short, solid forward Micky played in four different positions in his first five games for the Club but was unable to stake a permanent place in the side that won the Division Four championship.

After a year at Colchester, Micky played for several non-league clubs before settling in Harrow, where he became a newsagent.

Steven (Steve) BUCKLEY

One of the best left-backs in the Town's history, Steve was signed by Luton manager Harry Haslam from Burton Albion in 1974, and it was not long before his cultured left foot and surging runs down the wing became a feature of the Hatters' play.

Steve was a virtual ever-present in the Luton side until an offer of £165,000 from Tommy Docherty's Derby in January 1978 was too good to turn down.

Becoming just as popular at Derby, Steve enjoyed eight remarkably consistent years at the Baseball Ground before taking up a succession of managerial roles at non-league level.

In recent years, Steve has scouted for older brother Alan as well as working as a lorry driver.



Mark Stephen BURKE

Great things were predicted for Solihull-born Mark after he starred for England Schoolboys and then, after signing professional terms with Aston Villa, earned Youth caps.

Sadly, he failed to establish himself at Villa Park and moved to Middlesbrough, before coming back nearer home to sign on for Wolves in 1991.

Luton Town manager David Pleat, desperately looking to bolster his squad at a time when the Hatters were fighting through to the F.A.Cup semi-final in 1994, took Mark in on a month's loan.

Obviously blessed with wing skills he did not make a good enough impression and finished his League days with Port Vale.

Mark then went on a nomadic career abroad and was last seen playing in Sweden.


Frank (Frankie) Stephen BUNN

Joining Luton straight from school after being spotted playing for his district team in Birmingham, Frankie made his Hatters debut against Derby in August 1980 while still 17 and scored a point saver against Oldham two games later.

Big and strong, Frankie was not a prolific goalscorer and was never able to command a permanent place in Luton's eventual top flight side, so moved down the leagues to join up with his old team mate Brian Horton, by now manager at Hull, in 1985.

After some success at Boothferry Park he moved to Oldham for £90,000 two years later; where his claim to fame was scoring six goals in a League Cup tie against Scarborough, still a record in the competition.

Frankie's football career was cut short by injury and he is now reserve team coach at Manchester City.



Charles (Charlie) Edward BURTENSHAW

After breaking scoring records with his local side, Southwick, Charlie was snapped up by Luton Town in January 1948 but had to wait over a year before making his first team debut at home to Barnsley.

Charlie then enjoyed a good run in the side, mainly on the wing as he was deemed too small to play up front, but was then surprisingly transferred to non-league Gillingham in October 1949 along with his brother, Bill, and Billy Collins for a joint fee of £10,000.

The three players then moved en bloc to Snowdown Colliery Welfare in 1953 where Charlie became player-manager. After hanging up his boots Charlie returned to his native Portslade and was working for Metal Box on his retirement.

William (Bill) Frederick BURTENSHAW

Younger by three years than Charlie, and five inches taller, Bill came to Luton on the recommendations of his brother over the summer of 1948, and was immediately thrust into the first team on the opening day of the 1948/49 campaign.

Sadly, the powerful inside forward did not make any further first team appearances for the Hatters but finished up as leading scorer for the reserves in his first season. The triple transfer of the two Burtenshaws and Billy Collins to Gillingham was big news at the time but the deal ensured that the Gills were treated seriously enough to be re-elected to the Football League in 1950.

Bill stayed in Gillingham after retiring from the game and spent over 30 years fixing meters for Seeboard.

Vivian (Viv) Dennis BUSBY

As a youngster Viv signed on for his home town club Wycombe Wanderers where his goalscoring exploits came to the attention of Luton Town manager Alec Stock who signed him in January 1970.

He did not wait long for his first team chance and by the end of that season had written himself into Hatters folklore by scoring the all-important goal against Southport, which virtually assured promotion to the old Division Two.

A linking up on-loan with his ex-striker partner Malcolm Macdonald at Newcastle did not work and he eventually moved to Fulham, for whom he appeared in the 1975 F.A.Cup final.


After finishing playing, Viv moved into scouting, coaching and managing various clubs, and was with York City last season.

Barry Desmond BUTLIN

Unable to stake a claim to a regular spot in Derby County's Division One side, Barry was tempted to Luton in November 1972. Amazingly the £50,000 fee was a record for the Rams at the time!

Although his first season was cut short by a knee injury, he top scored in 1973/74 as the Hatters won promotion to the top flight. Brilliant in the air and no slouch on the ground it came as a major shock when 'Bullet' was sold to Nottingham Forest for £122,000 in October 1974 with the Town desperate for goals at the time.

Barry played for a variety of clubs after leaving Forest but was never quite so prolific as in his days at Luton. He is now the secretary for the ex-Derby County Players Association.



The World's Greatest

30 of the top footballers in the world are within touching distance to land FIFA's top prize. However, is the World Player of the Year accolade losing its credibility? STEVEN DOVE looks at this year's contenders and gives us his shortlist of the ten men he believes are in the running for this honour

It is meant to be one of the biggest honours a footballer can achieve. However the FIFA World Player of the Year accolade is quickly losing its credibility after coming in for some stern criticism, by supporters and the media.

The powers that be at FIFA recently announced a 30-man shortlist for the World Player of the Year award, to be presented to one lucky player in Zurich on December 18th.

A number of the world's greatest footballers are on the list, but many have argued that, true to form, FIFA have, once again, gone with reputation and selected the 30 most famous men in world football with little real consideration for how well they have played this calendar year.

Even by their own standards, English duo Wayne Rooney and Frank Lampard have been experiencing somewhat indifferent form to say the least, since the advent of the World Cup.

An Englishman has yet to win the World title and Steven Gerrard is likely to be our only hope of picking up the award, which was won by Brazil and Barcelona striker Ronaldinho last year.

The likes of Luis Figo and Zinedine Zidane have enjoyed glittering careers but even they had disappointing club campaigns, and only starred briefly in the showpiece in Germany.

However, there are still plenty of names amongst the 30 who have shone this year, so here is my shortlist of ten men I believe are worthy of this honour.

1) FABIO CANNAVARO

The man-mountain of a centre-half is my first choice based mainly on his amazing displays in Germany, where he single-handedly led the Italians to World Cup glory. The Italy skipper was robbed of the Player of the Tournament award by an errant FIFA and, in my opinion, deserves this accolade instead for his superb show of defensive dominance.

2) THIERRY HENRY

Losing finalist in the Champions League and World Cup, it was a case of so near yet so far for the French superstar. And I believe the Arsenal skipper will again have to settle for second spot, after he finished top scorer in the Premiership, bagged a few goals in the World Cup and has shown just why he is the best forward in the game so far this season.

3) JENS LEHMANN

Barring his dismissal in the Champions League final, the German number one has been the world's best goalkeeper this year, and by some distance too. The Arsenal man was in




sublime form for much of last season, broke the record for the longest period without conceding a goal in the Champions League and saved many a penalty and sure goal with some superb shot stopping.

4) CRISTIANO RONALDO

Despite all the criticism levelled at the winking winger; there can be no doubting that he must be the most dangerous player on the ball in world football. Enjoyed a super second half to last season, should have scooped the Young Player award at the World Cup and has been absolutely outrageous to date this term.

5) MIROSLAV KLOSE

Klose may not be the most skilful striker; but he is certainly the most lethal in world football. The Werder Bremen man banged in 25 goals and registered 16 assists in just 26 games in the Bundesliga last season. And then he slotted home five times in the World

Cup to pick up the Golden Boot award - just for good measure.

6) ANDREA PIRLO

The midfield maestro produced a near faultless display in Germany, overshadowing the more celebrated Francesco Totti as Italy's main creative influence. Pirlo won three man-of-the-match awards, more than any other player at the World Cup, and was awarded the Bronze Ball for his sterling efforts.

7) DECO

Anderson Luis de Sousa - known to the football world as Deco - was instrumental in Barcelona's Champions League triumph, scooped the UEFA Best Midfielder Award and became the first player to conquer Europe twice, having done so at Porto previously. And the pint-sized playmaker also played a starring role as Portugal progressed to the semi-finals of the World Cup.

8) GENNARO GATTUSO

Gennaro has cemented his position as arguably the world's best holding midfielder this year. Dominant in the Serie A and in Europe with AC Milan, his ferocious tackling and tireless work ethic allows Pirlo and others to blossom around him. Covers every blade of grass on the field and won his midfield duel in the World Cup final against both Vieira and Makelele.

9) JUAN ROMAN RIQUELME

2006 was the year the Argentine ace finally began to fulfil his much-promised potential. Riquelme was the heartbeat of the Villarreal side that shocked all and sundry by progressing to the Champions League semi-finals. He was also Argentina's inspiration in Germany and can count himself unlucky not to have progressed further after the shoot out defeat to the hosts.

10) STEVEN GERRARD

The only English player who harbours any hope of winning the award. Gerrard has been absolutely phenomenal for Liverpool this year - he scored 23 goals last term, was voted the PFA Player of the Year by his peers and singlehandedly led the Reds to FA Cup glory. Scored twice at the World Cup and was one of the few England players to enhance his reputation in Germany.

John Viefara cancelled out Iain Hume's opener, but the Canadian striker restored The Foxes' advantage after 62 minutes.


However, The Saints hit back through Inigo Idiakez, but Richard Stearman's effort minutes later settled the contest in favour of the home side.

Martin Rowlands' last gasp strike secured a point for QPR in an entertaining 3-3 draw with Norwich at Loftus Road.


Both sides led during the contest with Darren Huckerby giving The Canaries an early lead with just four minutes on the clock.

Efforts from Jimmy Smith and Martin Rowlands put the home side ahead just before the break, however, Norwich, were not about to let the game slip through their fingers.


Dion Dublin levelled matters and Rob Earnshaw's late penalty looked to have given the visitors all three points before Rowlands snatched a late share of the spoils.

"Playing in the league below is hard as well. I'm 21 now so I needed a good run of games. I've got more experience and I've got much stronger since I came back here so that helped me."


Having started the last two games for the Hatters - one at home and one away - O'Leary has no doubts that the atmosphere at Kenilworth Road is more conducive to getting results.

City were unable to deal with the high tempo start and were still trying to come to terms with Town's attack when Kane again crossed to the far post, and this time Daly leapt to powerfully head the ball in off the underside of the crossbar, and it was 3-0 after just 11 minutes. Town kept up their domination and almost added to their tally when Kane headed against a post.

Any impact that a half time Oxford motivational chat may have had was quickly flattened when Luton extended their lead seconds into the second half. Kane beat her player inside the area and her shot was well saved by the keeper, but Lizzie Randall tucked in the rebound for her second goal in two weeks. Luton's goal was rarely troubled and the domination was such that this was probably the most convincing performance that the Club has put in at this level. The fifth goal began with the ball being switched from one side of the defence to the other and then a fine through ball found the run of Micky Taylor, who shot powerfully into the far top corner. Stacey Connell, Taylor and Randall all went close, forcing good saves from the overworked keeper. The scoring was completed when Randall produced a sublime far post cross for Daly to nod in for a well-deserved hat-trick.

The Reserves also turned on the style against established Division One side Hadley, taking the lead when Rebecca Dimmock's shot came back off the post and Emma Leete headed in. Hadley scrambled in an equaliser from a corner, but Town responded positively when Shelley Miller's pinpoint cross was headed in by Nina Hale. The promising Laura Day was introduced at half time and immediately had an impact gliding past the last defender before slipping the ball under the advancing keeper to make it 3-1. She then crossed for Miller to thump home the fourth and Miller returned the compliment when her cleverly measured shot rebounded from the post and Day tucked the ball in. Only the keeper kept the score down as Town's superior fitness told and it was Laura Day who fired home the sixth to complete her first senior hat-trick.

A fine 6-1 win took the Reserves to the top of London Division One and they'll attempt to extend their lead at home to Brentford next week. This is a measure of just how rapidly the Club has progressed, as just two years ago Brentford were at the same level as Town's first team squad.

A spirited Luton performance meant they left the KC Stadium with a hard-earned point against Hull City.


However, the Hatters were fortunate to earn their third league clean sheet of the season after Stuart Elliott had a last minute goal ruled out by referee Graham Laws.

With a Championship manager seemingly losing his job each week, so does the name Steve Cotterill continue to be linked to vacant positions at several clubs.

And it's little surprise that the former Cheltenham Town boss is receiving rapturous applause as he continues his transformation job at Burnley.

The Lancashire club finished last season collecting just ten points from their last 13 games, sunk to 17th in the Championship table and had to contend with a long list of players occupying the treatment room.

But how times have quickly changed, as five months on and the Clarets are now sitting pretty in a play-off position, and have one of the most impressive away records in the division.

Cotterill spent little money in the summer and kept the nucleus of the team that finished last season in a disappointing position in the Championship. So what has changed at Turf Moor?

Well, Cotterill has had a knack of bringing the best out of teams. During his spell at Cheltenham, he turned an unheard of club, scrapping at the bottom of non-league football, into a side that is now well established in the Football League.

However, Burnley's rise up the Championship table has also been down to the form of Andy Gray, who has contributed much to Burnley's early success with six goals in 12 games.

The former Sunderland striker could only manage five goals last term, and went 22 consecutive games without finding the net during a run of matches with Sunderland in the Premiership.

In an interview with BBC Sport, Gray spoke on his enjoyment at his new club after signing in the summer from Sunderland.

The striker said: "I was not really enjoying my football at Sunderland. The way it worked out the whole season was a nightmare for everyone concerned.


"It was not a great place to be. It is a big club and it looks like they are getting back on track but for me it was one of those things.

"I'm now enjoying my football and everything else has seemed to fall into place in recently."

Gray could well be finding himself back in top flight football should Burnley continue their rich run of form.

With only one defeat in their last six matches, and still undefeated on their travels, Burnley have become a tough nut to crack this season.

Luton will know how much of a difficult job they have on their hands when Burnley come to town. They were one of only six teams to defeat Mike Newell's team at home last season, and with the form that Burnley are currently experiencing the next test could be a lot tougher.


