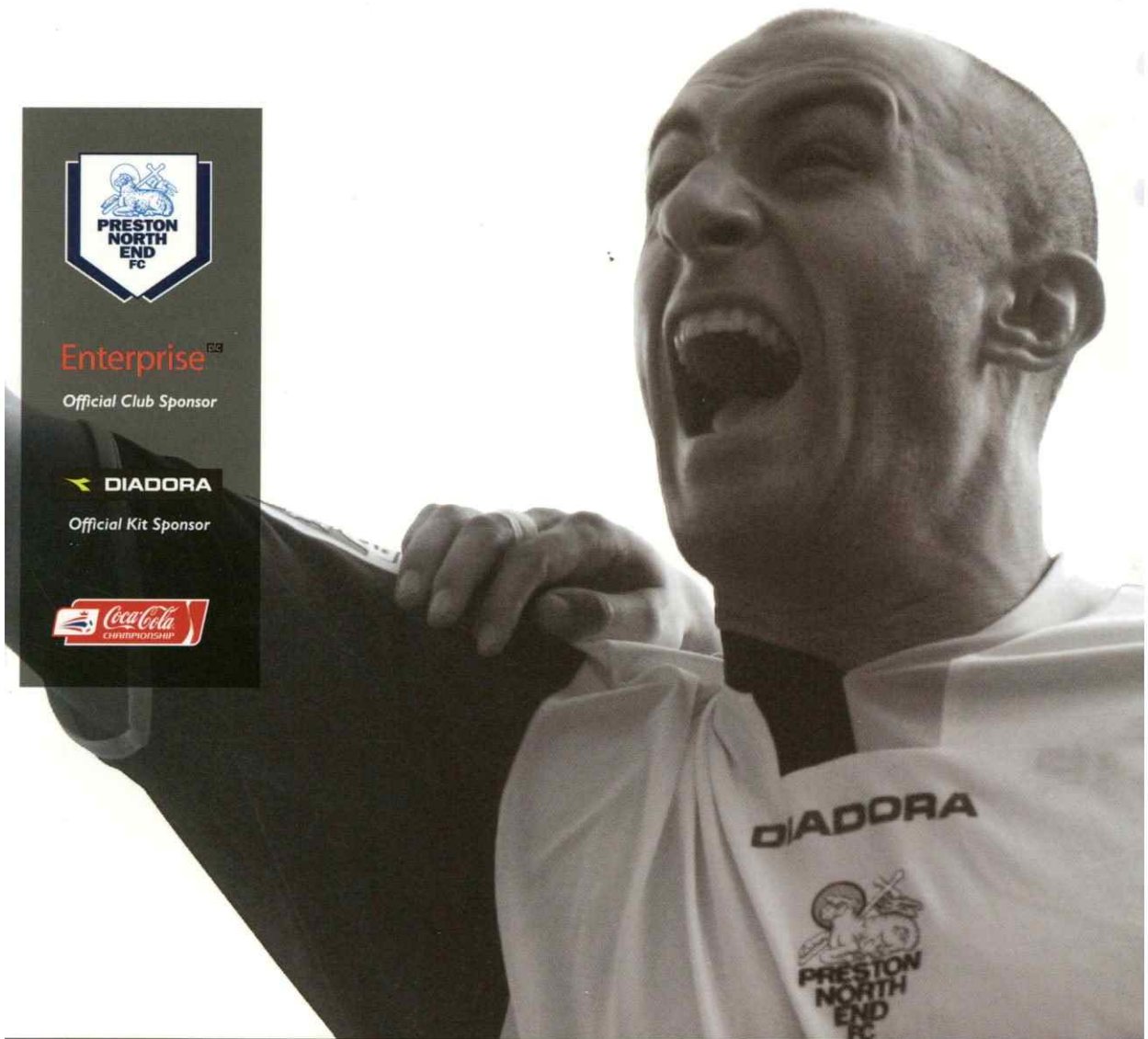

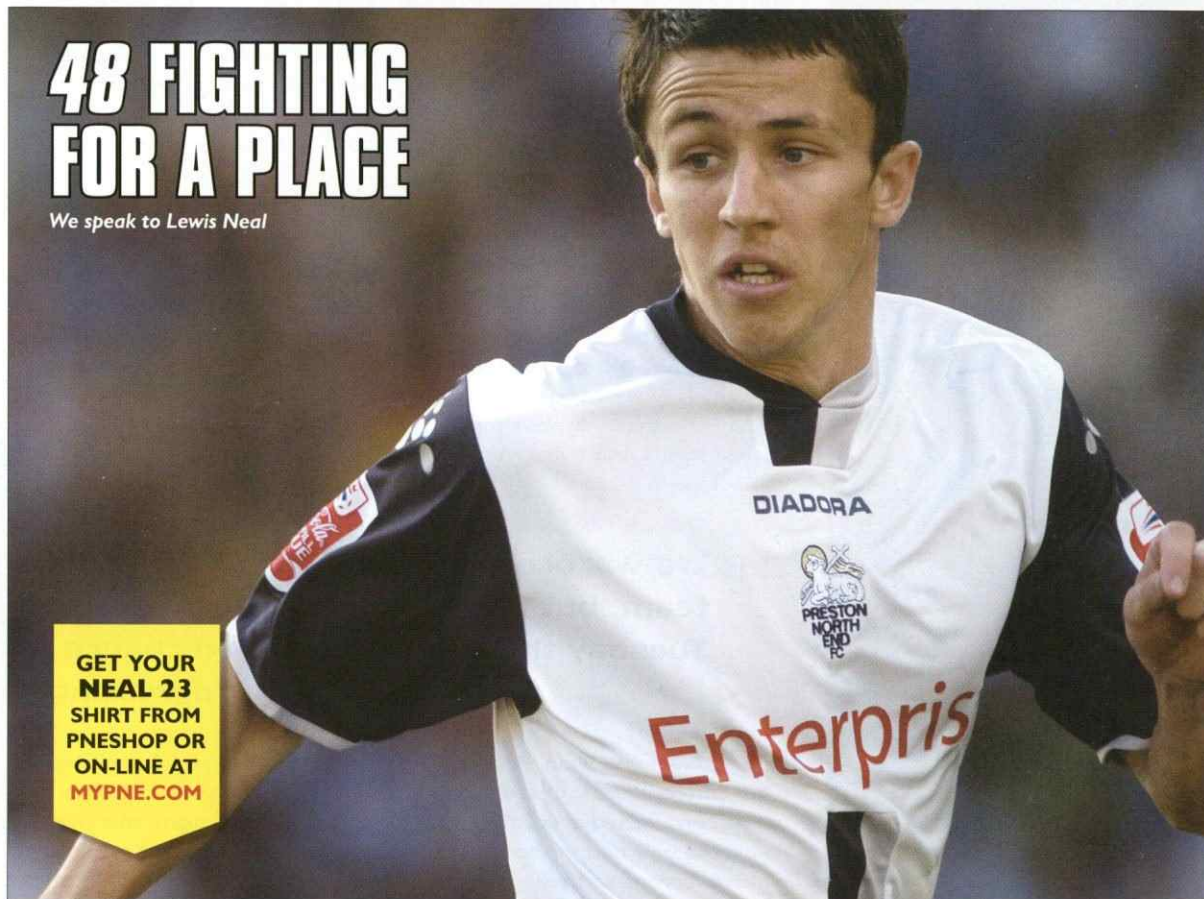

If the latter is the case then surely questions should be asked about his motives and what he really wants from his players. What will they be thinking if this afternoon if he again goes back to rotating the squad?

This afternoon I would like to welcome Mike Newell and the staff, players and supporters of Luton Town to Deepdale. They have had a traumatic few days and all of football was shocked at the news about Sol Davis and we would like to wish him all the best from everyone at Preston North End. Teams normally react strongly in

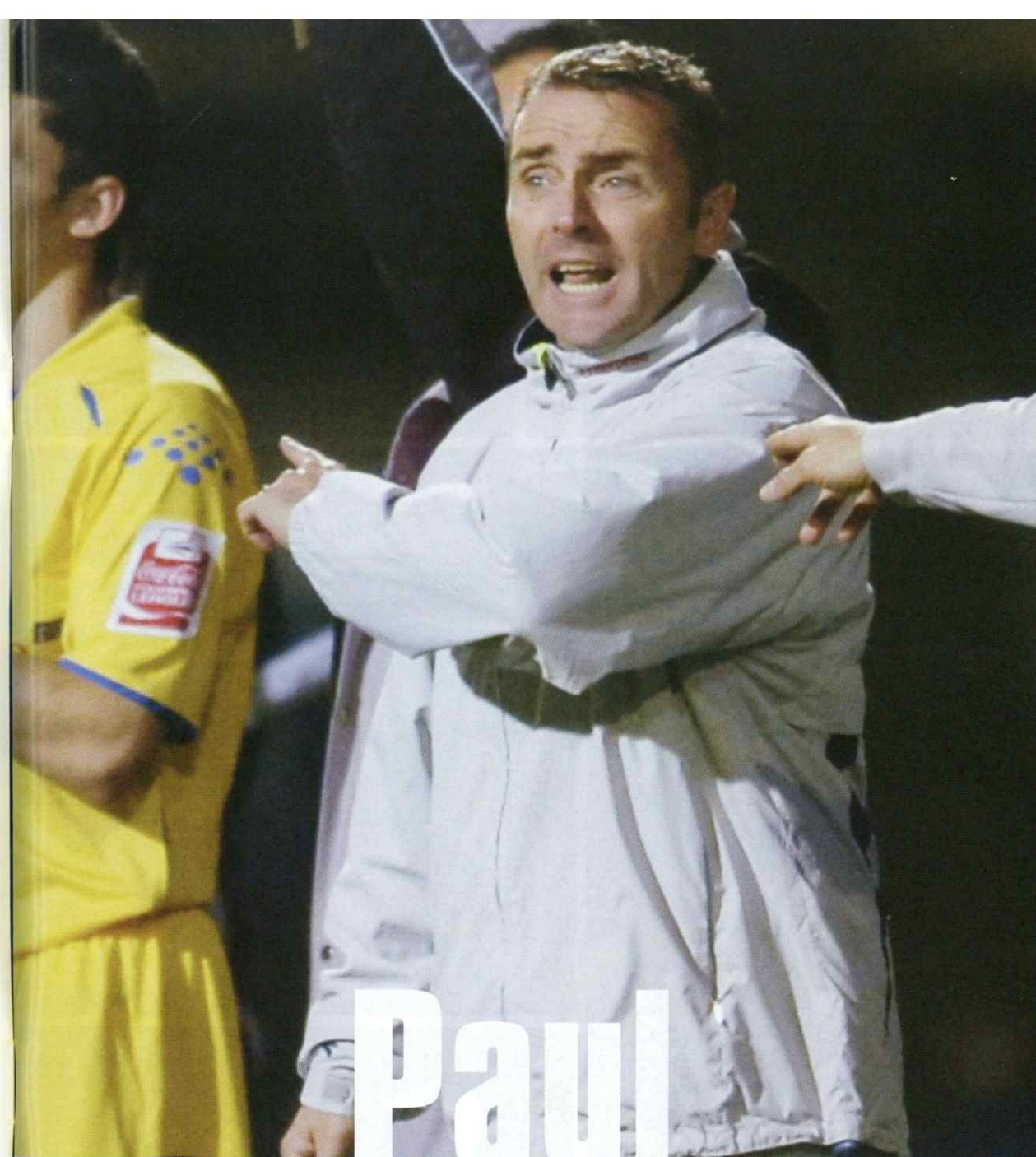
times of adversity like this and that is why it will be a very tough game today against a strong side with plenty of goals in them.

One player we will be without today is Danny Dichio. 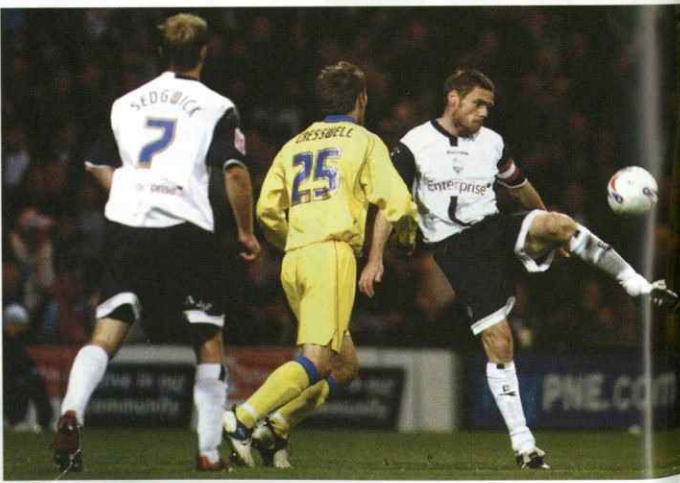
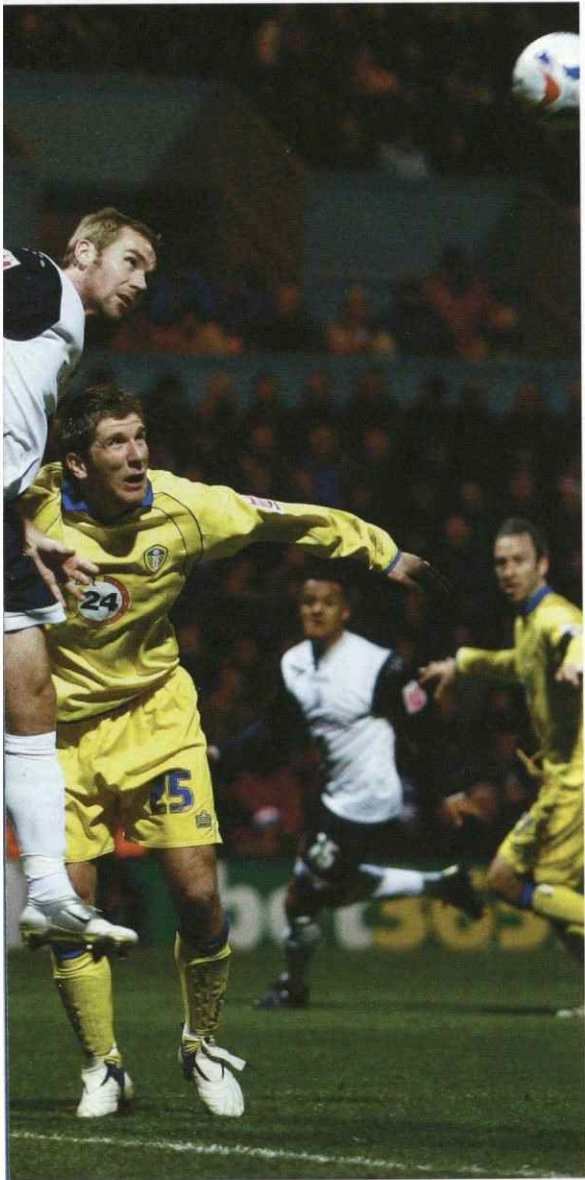

DAMAGE TO SEATING

We have received complaints from Burnley Football Club regarding the damage caused to seating in the John Fishwick Stand during our recent visit to Turf Moor.

After that game over 270 seats were found to have been deliberately damaged in the upper section of that Stand. Damage also occurred at the same fixture last season, but on a much smaller scale.

This kind of totally unacceptable behaviour reflects very badly on this Club and tarnishes the good name of our loyal supporters. Unfortunately such mindless behaviour could well have serious repercussions for our visits to other stadiums and the way our supporters are policed.

Unfortunately this does not appear to be an isolated incident as at other recent games at Derby and Stoke similar damage has been caused to seating.

Apart from away fixtures we also continue to suffer damage from our own supporters in the home areas of the Bill Shankly Kop. Any PNE supporter found to have committed damage home or away will be immediately banned from the Club and criminal charges may well follow.

We would urge any supporters who witnessed such incidents and can identify the offender (s) to contact the Club as a matter of urgency. Can I remind supporters that they can text the Club at any time reporting incidents of damage or unacceptable behaviour on 07757 826 537.



This afternoon's opponents Luton Town were home for North End skipper Graham Alexander for four years of the middle section of his footballing career and he admitted this week that it was a wrench to leave Kenilworth Road.

"It was a big move for me when I first went there," the 35-year-old said this week. "I was with Scunthorpe in the Third Division and Luton were in the same division as they are now, but I think they had got to the FA Cup Semi-Final the year before and it was a massive move for me to go and jump two divisions."

"Things didn't really work out in my first season because we were relegated, but we got to the Play-Offs the following season and played some decent football. I made some great friends there and it was in my last year there that I started playing right back which I preferred."

He had some great times in Bedfordshire and made some good friends as well before making the move to Deepdale: "In my second year, probably because we'd missed out on promotion they started selling off the experienced players and I found it quite hard to see where we were going to go.

"I was 27 and I wanted to improve in my career, I wanted to push on and we seemed to be getting rid of all of our better players and I spoke to the manager at the time ñ Lennie Lawrence. I said I was going to let my contract run out no matter what was on the table money wise and I was going to look to see what was out there, it wasn't about the money or anything like that I just wanted to improve my career but I left there with some great memories."

Manager Paul Simpson is hoping that the Club's League position in January stops any suitors eyeing his talented squad when the transfer window opens, following a week where newspapers have been rife with speculation that the scouts have been flocking to Deepdale.

Top scorer Simon Whaley was being touted in a possible move as was regular column filler David Nugent and they were joined in the Sunday tabloids by Danny Dichio, who it was suggested was interesting new West Brom boss Tony Mowbray, for a return to the Hawthorns.

However, Simmo was not bothered by the speculation, in fact he found it flattering that so many North

End stars were being talked up as potential Premiership players, suggesting his side could be good enough to get there in their own right!

"It doesn't bother me in the slightest," he said this week. "I actually bought the papers, but left them unopened in my car, but I believe there were stories about Nuge, Simon Whaley and Danny Dichio all leaving so it shows that we are doing things right."

The previous transfer windows, since the introduction of the new UEFA initiative 18 months ago, have meant fingernail biting times for the Lilywhites supporters, who have had to put up with a constant stream of North End related rumour


and gossip for 31 days each time.

"I said at the end of the August transfer window that if come January they are still talking about our players leaving then it has got to mean that they are doing things right for us and long may it continue," added Simpson.

"There hasn't been any enquiries to take any one of the three, but everyone knows that there is a transfer window so we are just going to have to put up with those things and if we are still doing well in January then the hype will get even more, but hopefully we can keep them all right through to the end and we will all be celebrating together."

Media Hype





Liam Chilvers has grown up and learnt his trade alongside some of the biggest names in football after coming through the ranks at Arsenal.

The central defender spent four years as a professional at Highbury and despite all the memories and experience he gained the fact he never featured for the first team still riles the 24-year-old.

"I played a couple of games, I played in David Seaman and Tony Adams' testimonials against Barcelona and Celtic and I was going to be involved in the squad to Chelsea play at Stamford Bridge and that day they signed Inamoto, they held a big press

conference and put him on the bench ahead of me.

"It was always the case, you would train with them all the time and get so close to playing and then something else would get in the way. After a while you just start thinking that you want to play first team football and not just wait in the wings hoping that you get a chance. You can't knock it though, at the time I was obviously a bit annoyed, but looking back you can understand the reasons why he didn't give players a chance.

"They were all internationals and they had all played 'x' number of games in

the Premiership so I had no complaints when there were players like that in front of me, it was more a case of when they were bringing in other youngsters that the majority of the fans didn't know and didn't get close to the first team, there was always another player in your way just to annoy the lads.

"But I got closer than a lot of people and in terms of being at Arsenal I did things that the majority of fans would have loved to have done, so it was a great experience it's just a bit disappointing."

There is so much pressure these days on managers to succeed and so much

money at stake that everyone wants instants success, something that Chilvers sympathises with to an extent.

"At Arsenal the aim was obviously to win the league every season and if the manager was to put in a youngster and he made a mistake which cost them three points then that three points could end up costing them the league and the fans wouldn't be too happy and neither would the directors, so you can understand the reasons for it, but it doesn't make it any easier for the players who are trying to break through.

"We won the FA Youth Cup in 2000 and there were some very good players in the squad, but none of us really made the breakthrough at Arsenal. In the Premiership Moritz Volz is at Fulham, Jermaine Pennant is now at Liverpool and Jerome Thomas is at Charlton, while both Graham Stack and John Halls are at Reading. There was also Jay Bothroyd who is now at Wolves. So we had a pretty good squad and when I was at Colchester the scout there said he used to use it as an example of a good youth set up, a lot of those players came through and are still playing so we had a very good team."

Desperate to play football, Chilvers took the decision to leave the Arsenal fold to go out on loan, going to four different clubs in fairly quick succession.

"The first team I went to was Northampton, they came in and asked to take me over the Christmas period, I went there and did well, we only lost one game in six.

"Next Notts County came in for me, so I went for two months. By then I was 18/19 and I thought if I could do well then maybe I could go back and get a chance. My loan came to an end and I went back to Arsenal and had a meeting with Arsene Wenger, who told me I had done well but that he couldn't guarantee that I was going to play so he thought it was better if I was to stay out on loan. It was disappointing because I had obviously done well, but after that they sent me out to Beveren and in my case I thought it was a case of out of sight out of mind and out of

the three of us who were there, myself, Graham Stack and John Halls, me and John never really got a chance after that so it's fair to say nothing really came of that move.

"Obviously I wanted to play first team football, I had had a chat with Arsene (Wenger) and it was a case of 'yes you can stay here and you will get a chance if someone gets injured,' but the chances of that were pretty small and he would probably have signed someone else. I was at the stage when I just needed to be playing football, Colchester was just down the road from where I was actually living, so it wasn't a massive upheaval but there was always that feeling that I could play at a higher division, but I suppose every player thinks that. But Colchester were a good footballing side, with a good squad of players and I knew I had to take a step down in the hope of coming back up."

And on the face of it it really was a step down!

At Arsenal I had the best of everything, but when I went to Colchester, no disrespect to them, the facilities were nowhere near what I had been used to but I just wanted to get on with playing. I suppose it did make me a bit tougher, it makes you see the other side of the ground. At Arsenal there were players coming in in £300,000 cars and that was definitely not the case at Colchester, there were people running around there in M reg Fiesta's, so I certainly saw both sides and it made me appreciate the good things I did had."

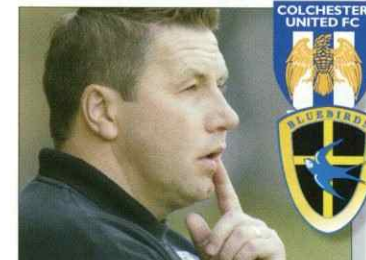

CHRISTIE, David

PNE Lge Apps: 1 + 3

First signed for North End as a Youth Trainee and he was one of several promising youngsters coming up through the ranks at the time. Christie was finally given a full contract in July 1991 and it was Les Chapman who gave the player his first team baptism. Events at the Club then had a bad affect on the young wing forward and after John Beck arrived Christie was released, moving to Halifax on a free transfer.

CLARK, Clive

PNE Lge Apps: 72 + 1 (9 goals)

With Preston struggling at the bottom end of Division Two in January 1970, manager Bobby Seith paid £20,000 to QPR to bring the vastly experienced Clive Clark to Deepdale. He had had a fine career for QPR and WBA and he won an England U23 cap whilst at the Hawthorns. Clark was a real character and the North End fans soon took the nippy winger to their hearts. Sadly, he could not prevent Preston being relegated at the end of that season, but he did put in some excellent performances. The following year, under Alan Ball Senior, Clark was outstanding as Preston won the 1970/71 Third Division Championship. Nicknamed 'Chippy', Clark had some brilliant games and he played a huge part in the success. He will always be fondly remembered by all those who saw him

play at Deepdale.

CLARK, Jonathan

PNE Lge Apps: 107 + 3 (10 goals)

This former Manchester United schoolboy had an eventful few years at Deepdale. He was signed for Preston from Derby by Tommy Docherty in August 1981, having already won U21 caps for Wales and showing a good pedigree. Surprisingly it was a free transfer, but Clark was soon a first team regular with his aggressive midfield play. Unfortunately Docherty was soon gone and Clark was unlucky to play in such a poor North End side, but it was often said that he was the best player in the team during this dark period. He deservedly won the Player of the Year award at the end of the relegation season of 1984/85. The following season saw everyone struggling at the Club, and Clark was no exception as Preston tried to avoid the ignominy of having to apply for re-election. To cap it all, when Brian Kidd resigned as manager in March 1986, Clark took on the unenviable role of caretaker/player-manager. As ever he put his heart and soul into the job but realistically he was never in line for the task on a permanent basis. That summer John McGrath took over and decided to sweep the place clean.

CLARKE, Tom

PNE Lge Apps: 3

When Tom Clarke came to English football from his native Scotland he

joined Carlisle from Airdrie in July 1970. In his five years at Carlisle he was understudy to the very consistent Alan Ross, so in July 1975 he joined Preston on a free transfer to try and make more league appearances. This time though he found himself as cover for Roy Tunks, who was almost as consistent as Ross! After just the one season at Deepdale, Clarke was given a free transfer.

CLEMENT, Neil

PNE Lge Apps: 4

In David Moyes first season as manager of Preston North End he had a problem with the left-back position. Injuries forced him into the loan market and he signed Neil Clement from Chelsea. The new player did not have the best of starts, being sent off in his debut match, at Colchester, but Moyes still looked to sign him more permanently. The deal didn't happen though, and instead Clement, a quality player, joined WBA and helped the Baggies to promotion to the Premiership.

COCHRANE, Ian

PNE Lge Apps: 3 + 2 (2 goals)

Ian Cochrane first joined Preston as an apprentice, signing professional forms in February 1977. He did well in youth and reserve team games and in the last game of the 1976/77 season he made his first

but. He scored from a header in a 2-1 win and also won the Phoenix Young Player of the Year award that season. But after that his career did not follow the path he would have liked and in the summer of 1979 he left Deepdale and league football.

COLEMAN, Gordon

PNE Lge Apps: 248 + 21 (25 goals)

A gifted sportsman who excelled at several sports but chose football as his career. Coleman was signed by Bobby Charlton in September 1973 from Padstow Youth and Amateur Club. A month later he was making his first team debut and by the 1976/77 season he was a regular in the team. He was originally a forward but he later developed into a superb utility player who could play as a winger, in midfield or even at full-back. He stayed at Deepdale throughout a myriad of ups and downs and eventually topped 300 league and cup appearances for North End. At one time he was Club captain and was a big favourite with the fans. In the summer of 1983 he decided to move on and he was transferred to Bury.

COLEMAN, Tony

PNE Lge Apps: 5 (1 goal)

This former Stoke City apprentice took an unusual route to success in football. Preston paid £10,000 to

Tranmere for his signature in May 1964 and there was little doubt that Coleman was a big talent. Unfortunately his mind was often on the many other attractions open to a young football star and he only played five times for the club. In the end North End reluctantly freed him and he dropped down into non-league football with Bangor. But in 1965 he signed for Doncaster and soon afterwards moved to Manchester City. This was the start of something big for Coleman and he went on to win a League Championship and FA Cup winners medal with City. It was an amazing turnaround for a player who could so easily have made it with North End much earlier.

CONNOR, Dave

PNE Lge Apps: 29

In January 1972, Preston North End were looking to strengthen their squad and they made a double swoop on Manchester City. They bought Neil Young and Dave Connor for a combined fee of £90,000, with Connor costing a reported £40,000. He was a cultured defender who never quite showed his best form whilst at Deepdale. Connor probably suffered through not having a settled role in the team and he usually filled in for different players when injury or suspension took their toll. The

CONROY, Mike

PNE Lge Apps: 50 + 7 (23 goals)

Preston paid Burnley £85,000 for experienced Scottish striker Mike Conroy in August 1993. He proved a good target man, who suited John Beck's long ball game. He was never a prolific goalscorer, but actually had a very good scoring record in North End's colours, almost averaging a goal every other game. However, as with many players under Beck, Conroy was often left out of the team. Coupled with some niggly injury problems the striker then took up an offer to play for Fulham who signed him for £75,000 in August 1995.

COOPER, Robert

PNE Lge Apps: 3 + 2

Some players are always remembered by the Deepdale fans, but others, like Robert Cooper are very hard to recall. This little known midfielder was signed by Tommy Booth on a temporary contract in December 1985. Cooper's arrival coincided with a very poor period in North End's history and, with the greatest respect to him, he was one of the many 'cheap options' tried by the management at the time. Alas, he failed to improve things and although no better or no worse than other players at Deepdale during those dark days, he disappeared from the scene almost as quickly as he appeared.

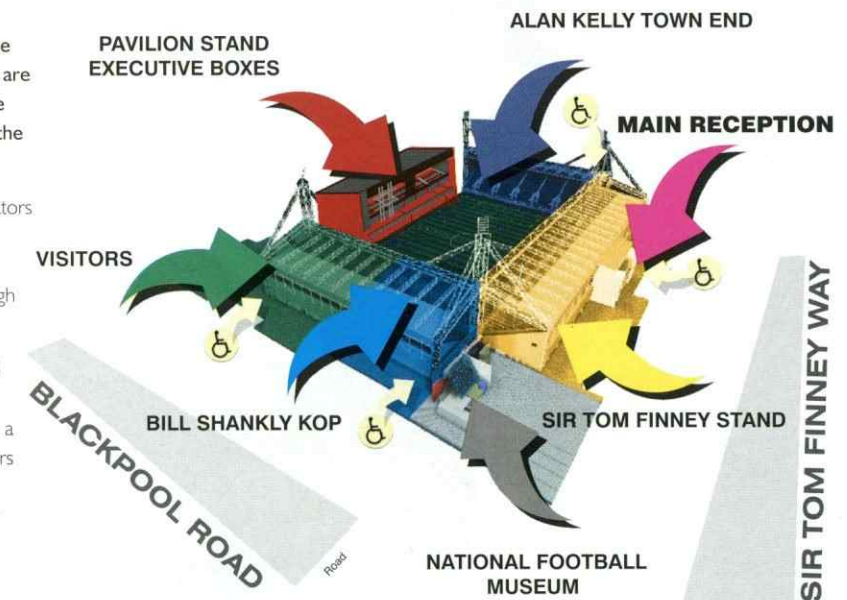

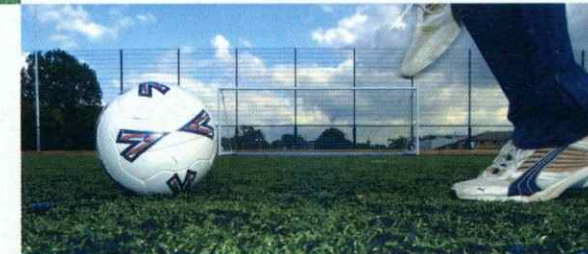
In the event of an emergency at Deepdale requiring evacuation of the ground in part or whole, spectators are requested to remain where they are and listen for announcements over the public address system

The announcement may direct spectators in a specified area of the ground and require evacuation through exit gates to the outside of the ground or through perimeter exit gates onto the pitch.

Club Stewards and Police Officers will assist in directing spectators to the safest locations. If requested to vacate a specified area of the ground, spectators should do so as calmly and quickly as they can to assist in a safe and speedy evacuation.

28th May 1994

This wasn't the most memorable game for the result but it was the first time I'd ever been to Wembley and expectations were high, a super day out for the 24,000 PNE fans that made the journey. Two classy first half goals from Bryson and Raynor. I'll never forget the bicycle kick that Bryson scored, it was absolutely unbelievable.

Favourite Kit

It has to be the 1994/95 yellow and blue striped Coloroll kit. We used it in the 1994 Play-Off Final and then for the full season following. I remember thinking it looked horrible when I first saw it but it very quickly grew on me and what can I say but it was fantastic. I did have the pleasure of owning one, but it got destroyed unfortunately.



Goalkeeper

ALAN KELLY: I never had the pleasure of watching him play, but from what I've been told there couldn't have been a more influential goalkeeper than Kelly as he bossed the defence.

Defence

SEAN GREGAN: If a player got past him once he made sure that they wouldn't do it again. One of the most influential captains the Club's had and I'm sure he'd be welcomed back at Deepdale today.

MICHAEL JACKSON: An uncomplicated no frills defender who only cost the club £125,000. Jackson made 180 appearances and I can honestly say I cheered him for every one of those.

RYAN KIDD: What can I say other than this is definitely one of Preston North End's most famous sons. Kidd had 259 league appearances before he was forced to retire.

MICK BAXTER: This was another player I never had the pleasure of watching, but anyone who could pull in a transfer fee of £425,000 in 1981 must have been pretty good.

Midfield

DAVID EYRES: If only someone could invent a youth formula I'd ask for Eyres to be the first one to be given it so that he could come back and show us some more of that magic.

MARK RANKINE: He wasn't the fastest of players, but he was one of the proudest to pull on a Preston shirt and his tackling and passing were second to none and just to top it off he made 214 appearances for the club.



IAN BRYSON: An excellent passer of the ball, but also a player who could find the back of the net quite often. Only played 151 times for the Club, but is certainly a player who all PNE's fan know the name of.

LEE CARTWRIGHT: What can I not say about Cartwright. He was another of Preston North End's favourite sons and he pulled on a Preston shirt no less than 363 times.

Forwards

TONY ELLIS: Signed in 1987 for £23,000 then in 1989 sold for £250,000 (excellent business). Came back to Preston in 1992 for £140,000 and sold to Blackpool for £165,000 so all in all he made the club £253,000. Pretty good!

ANDY SAVILLE: Cost the club £100,000 and sold for £125,000. We are pretty good at business deals aren't we. Imagine this strike partnership banging them in now. It'd be a case of 'Who's Chelsea?'

Manager

JOHN BECK: Who can forget John Beck. The long ball game that still comes back to haunt us today. The cold showers in the away dressing room, the sand piled up in the corners of the pitch!

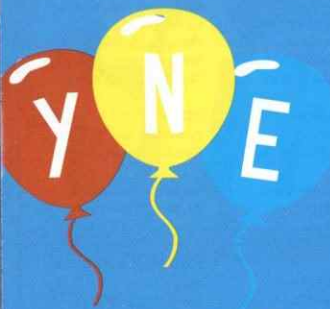

YNE Press Packers Day

Budding journalists joined in the YNE activities on the PNE versus Hull City game to learn the skills involved in media work. The youngsters signed up for the YNE Press Packers Day to discover what it felt like to be a journalist for the day.

Each Press Packer received a welcome pack which contained the important journalists tools - a pencil, pen, note pad and programme - as well as an autograph book, should they meet any players.

After a full ground tour, including all the areas normally off limits to the press, the youngsters went to research the days' teams in the ITC suite in the Learning and Community Centre. To assist with this, the Press Packers had access to the PNE and Hull City websites along with the official press pack given to the journalists attending the match.

After researching the teams it was time to prepare questions for any players and the Manager. This is where the research came in really useful. Once the questions had been prepared there was just time to grab some lunch before first team players Joe Anyinsah and Alan McCormack popped round to be interviewed. It was obvious that the players were impressed with the quality of questioning.

With just an hour to go until kick off, there was time to visit the



Media Suite where the other journalist would be waiting for team news before going up to the press box. The Press Packers arrived just in time as the Press Steward arrived with the team sheets.

On hand was Matt Morris, PNE's Media Manager, who gave the budding journalists some advice on journalism and how a matchday works. He explained how important it is that the journalists receive the team sheet then they know the names of the players on the pitch.

What was the first cd you bought?

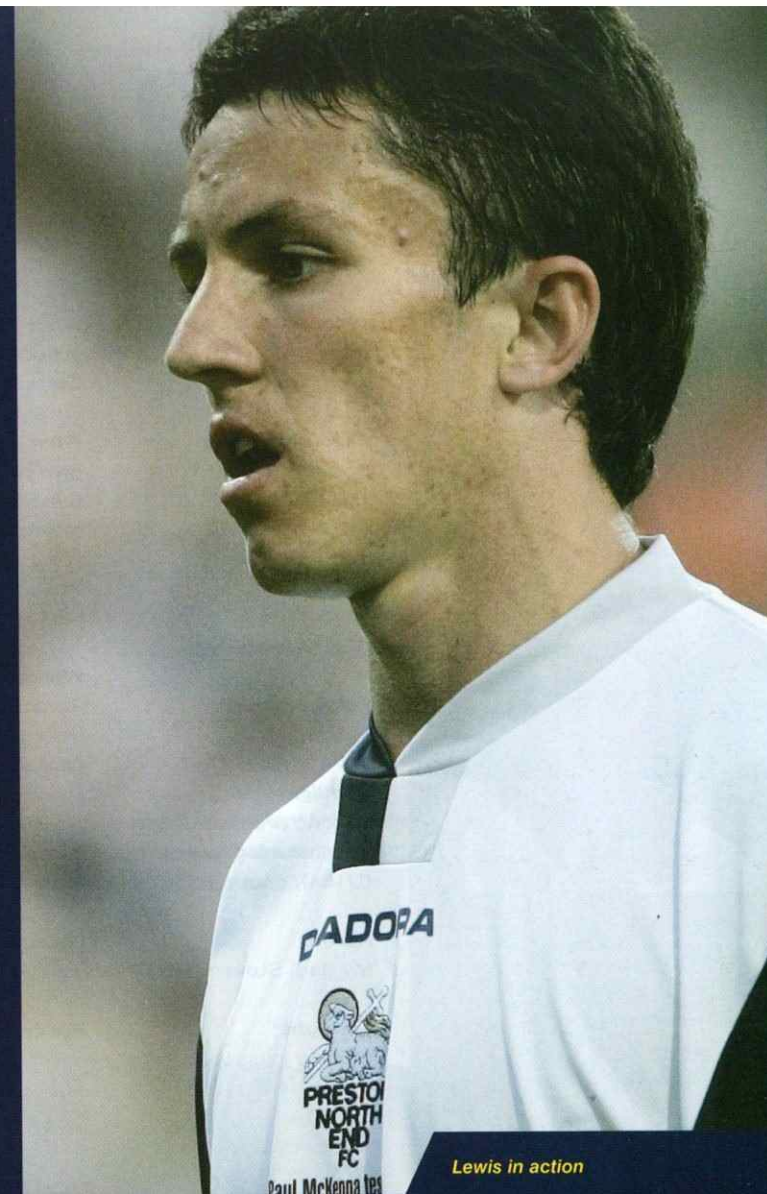



We put the questions to Luton Town fan Kevin Barrett.

How good/bad was last season? For a first season back in the Championship I think most fans were satisfied with the performance last season. We started off like a rocket and if we could have continued that form I think we would have achieved promotion, but a lack of depth in our squad started to show as the season progressed and we dropped off the pace.

What are your ambitions for the coming season? I think that like all fans we would like to hope that we could achieve promotion, probably via the Play-Offs, but I think the size of our squad and injuries which are already affecting us we have to be reasonably realistic and say that a mid-table finish would be acceptable.

What position do you think your team will finish this season? I am going to stick my neck out and say sixth. Any position above 12th would be great, but I think if we can keep the core of our squad together and perhaps strengthen the squad in a few positions during the January transfer window, and avoid any long term injuries then perhaps we can sneak a Play-Off place.

What position do you think Preston North End will finish this season? Preston having been knocking on the Premiership's door for the past couple of seasons and perhaps feel a little unfortunate that they are not already there. I tip Preston to make it this year, so I would say second place.

If you could sign one player from your club's past who would it be and why? Well this could be a long list as there have been so many good players who have left Luton for bigger and better things. Curtis Davies has got to be the obvious choice of recent departures from Kenilworth Road. His defensive ability and reading of the game for one so young was sorely missed at the club when he left.

If you could appoint a former manager to take charge at your club who would you choose and why? In my opinion Mike Newell ranks as the best manager Luton has had in my time supporting the club. The only other manager I can think who I would bring back would be the late Ray Harford who led the town to their only Silverware in 1988, beating Arsenal in the Littlewoods Cup.

What is the greatest moment in your club's history? I suppose the highlight in modern times has got to be winning the Littlewoods Cup in 1988.

What is the worst moment in your club's history? The sale of the club to John Gurney and the ensuing debacle which ended with the club going into administration.

What is your prediction for today's game? It's going to be a tough game, but Luton tend to play better against decent opposition so I am going to go for 1-2 (to Luton).

THE ICON

Carlos Edwards
Midfielder
Carlos Edwards signed for the Hatters at the start of last



season from Wrexham on a free transfer having been a player admired by manager Mike Newell for some considerable time. Newell tried to sign Edwards during his time as Hartlepool manager, but his failure to do so has worked out in Luton's favour and is an exciting prospect for the Town.

Edwards spent five seasons at Wrexham, helping them win the 2005 LDV Vans title against Southend, and is a pacey midfielder who is likely to give Newell plenty of attacking options. In the summer of 2006, Edwards became the first Luton player since Mal Donaghy in 1982 to represent his county in the World Cup Finals and his impressive performances for Trinidad and Tobago linked him with a move away to Kenilworth Road.

The midfielder played a key role in helping Trinidad secure their first ever appearance in the Finals of the competition, but it was his performances in the competition itself that made people stand up and take notice of his ability. Edwards gave a man-of-the-match performance in the country's opening game against Sweden and then gave a solid performance in their match with England, keeping Joe Cole relatively quiet on the left flank.

Edwards' performances in the competition were a bright spot in Trinidad's failure to get past the group stages.

TEACHER'S PET

Warren Feeney
The Belfast-born striker started his career as a trainee at Leeds but failed to



break into the first team before joining Bournemouth, initially on loan, and then permanently after he was released from Elland Road.

He was regarded as a real fans' favourite on the south coast and made over 80 appearances for the Cherries, scoring over 30 goals. Signed for Stockport in a £45,000 deal and despite the club struggling at the foot of League One, Feeney went on to score 17 goals in 32 appearances. He signed for Luton in a £150,000 deal on transfer deadline day on March 2005.

Expectations for Feeney upon his arrival at Kenilworth Road were pretty high to say the least. They were looking for a player to take them over the finish line when aiming for the League One Championship. In his last game for the Hatters of Stockport he grabbed a hat-trick but he failed to find the back of the net in Luton's last six games of the season.

Last season Warren still picked up the international accolades and he was a regular alongside Steve Howard also for the Hatters. He played a key role in the 3-0 demolition job on North End in late September, scoring a goal and running the PNE defence ragged. But since the arrival of Sam Parkin at Kenilworth Road and the goalscoring form of Rowan Vine, Feeney has found himself somewhat down the pecking order and fans feel that things are not going right if Warren is in the starting line-up.

THE HARDMAN

Sol Davis

It was a huge disappointment to Swindon Town, and a coup for Luton, when the highly-rated defender decided to leave the County Ground after his contract expired at the end of the 2001/02 season.



Davis had joined Swindon as a trainee in the summer of 1998, and made rapid progress through the youth and reserve teams to become a regular in the Nationwide League. He scored his first ever goal in professional football during the club's win over Wrexham in November 2004. He scored again later that season, his only other goal to date, in a win against Bristol City in March 2005.

After once again appearing regularly at left-back for Luton during the early part of the 2006/07 season, Sol unfortunately suffered the terrible fate of a stroke on Sunday, October 29th as the team travelled on the coach for a clash at Ipswich Town.

With the players on board the coach and playing a game of cards, Sol suffered the stroke, at the age of just 27, and just 25 minutes after leaving Luton. With his speech and left-hand side affected and paralysed, he was unable to shout out for help. Fortunately, his fellow Hatters players and management team noticed Sol was in trouble, realised the severity of the situation and called for an ambulance, which duly arrived and Sol was quickly rushed to the Luton and Dunstable Hospital before being transferred to the Addenbrooke's Hospital in Cambridge. Our best wishes go to him.

MR CONSISTENCY

Markus Heikkinen

Mike Newell pulled off a real coup with the signing of Aberdeen central defender Markus Heikkinen. Although born in Sweden, Heikkinen is a Finnish international.



Heikkinen has made an impressive start to his stay at Kenilworth Road since being called as a late replacement for Chris Coyne who was injured in the warm-up in the club's opening Championship win over Crystal Palace last season.

He was a regular in the side thereafter, and following Davies' £3 million transfer to West Bromwich Albion in August 2005, Markus and Chris Coyne became manager Mike Newell's preferred central defensive duo. One of the first names on the team sheet when available for selection, Markus became an extremely popular figure with the Hatters fans. Making 39 League appearances during the course of the season, Markus netted two goals - both headers - in 2-0 home victories over Crystal Palace and Queen's Park Rangers.

Heikkinen, who joined on a two-year contract, can also play in midfield and enjoyed a short spell with Portsmouth before his move to the Scottish Premiership.

Markus was rewarded for his outstanding campaign with no less than four awards - the Player of the Year trophy, Players' Player of the Season, Internet Player of the Season and the Luton News Player of the Season.

THE WONDERKID

Rowan Vine

The Basingstoke-born striker initially joined Town on a three-month loan deal from Premiership Portsmouth on the eve of last season but that arrangement was extended in September for the whole season after he had made an impressive start to life as a Hatter.



Vine is now a Luton player having signed a three-year contract following his impressive season during the club's League One success. His performances during that month were recognised when he was named as the Powerade League One Player of the Month.

The 24-year-old front man has enjoyed successful loan spells in the Division below, when he appeared for Brentford and Colchester United.

In his time with the Bees he scored thirteen goals in 47 appearances as part of a year long loan deal in 2002/03 and last year he spent a similar spell at Layer Road, scoring ten times in 42 games.

His efforts this season have had the scouts flooding to Kenilworth Road to see him in action, with the goals flying in he has become one of the Division's hottest properties and the North End backline will have to again be at the top of their game if they are to keep him quiet this afternoon.

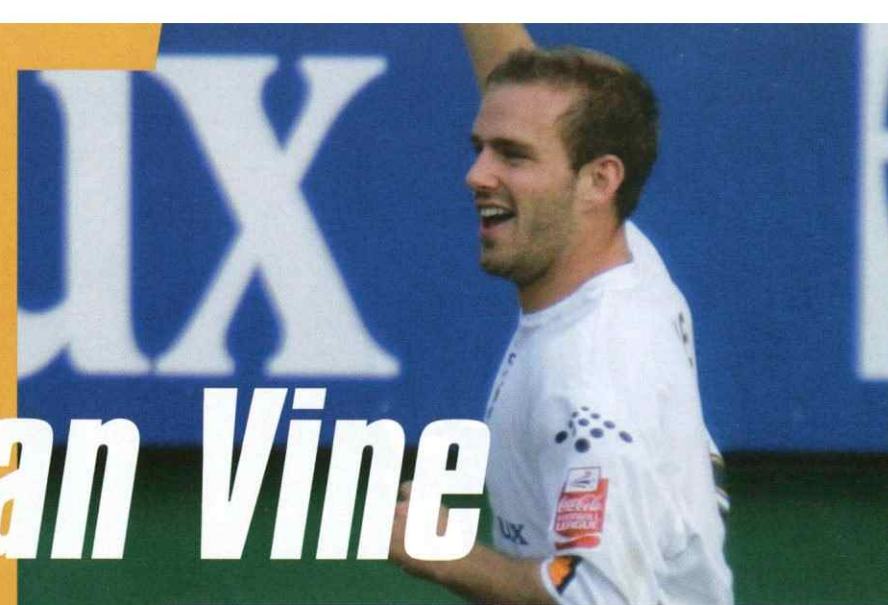

Rowan Vine



As one of the Coca-Cola Championship's top scorers it's no surprise to find that a whole clutch of clubs are coveting the services of Luton's wonderkid, Rowan Vine.

The 24-year-old striker is already close to breaking the ten-goal barrier for the Hatters this season and a few more and he will have beaten his best ever tally in a season for a club, 12 whilst a team-mate of Liam Chilvers at Colchester in 2003/04.

It's a fantastic return to form for a young hit-man who this time last year was wondering if his career at Kenilworth Road had hit the skids just as it started.

Vine signed for Luton on the back of a brilliant season of promotion and goals as the Hatters went up as League One Champions, but as the ink was drying on his transfer deal from Portsmouth to Luton, Vine was struggling with a back

injury that would keep him out of action for some time.

"I'd always had a nagging back problem, stiffness in the back and stuff like that," Vine said of the injury nightmare this week. An injury that would not see him return to Hatters action until late October last year.

"All through the season when we got promoted I was struggling with it, from about Christmas time until May.

"I went back to Portsmouth to try and get it sorted and then the permanent move to Luton came along. I obviously jumped at it, even though I knew I was still struggling. I didn't know the extent of it so I had to see a specialist.

"We'd just won the league and we'd kept the same squad and just added a couple of people.

"You think 'I've signed but I'm injured, but I can't do anything for a good two or three months'. Then you start wondering, especially with the team doing so well at the time, 'Am I going to get back in? If I'm not fit are they going to sign someone

else?"

Fortunately for Vine, Luton's form at the start of last season was more than impressive and that meant that Mike Newell felt no need to strengthen the side and when the young striker finally did come back into the frame, he hit the ground running, finishing with an impressive tally of ten goals in all competitions for the season.

Since then Rowan has not looked back!

"You have to just keep going and when you do get fit just try your best, and that's what I've done since then.

"I got a really good pre-season behind me this time to make sure I was fighting fit and my form's carried on. I'm nicking more goals now so I'm more than pleased.

"Touch wood, I hope I don't get injured like that again."

Happy Hunting Ground

Graham Alexander has more experience than most of Kenilworth Road, after spending four years at Luton prior to joining North End in 1999.

It's not one of the most glamorous grounds in the league but Alexander believes that could be key to the Hatters success.

"I joined in July 1995 and there was a lot of talk about a new ground being built then, but now 11 years on they're still at Kenilworth Road.

"It is a hard place to go though, when I was there we had a decent home record and that has been the case over the last few years and maybe the ground is a reason for their success over the last few seasons.

"When you go to the tight grounds it is always easier for the home teams to play. The crowd are very close to the pitch and they get behind the team and when there is a good crowd there it can be quite a hostile place, but they are a good club they have got a good tradition of playing good football and we all know it will be a tough game.

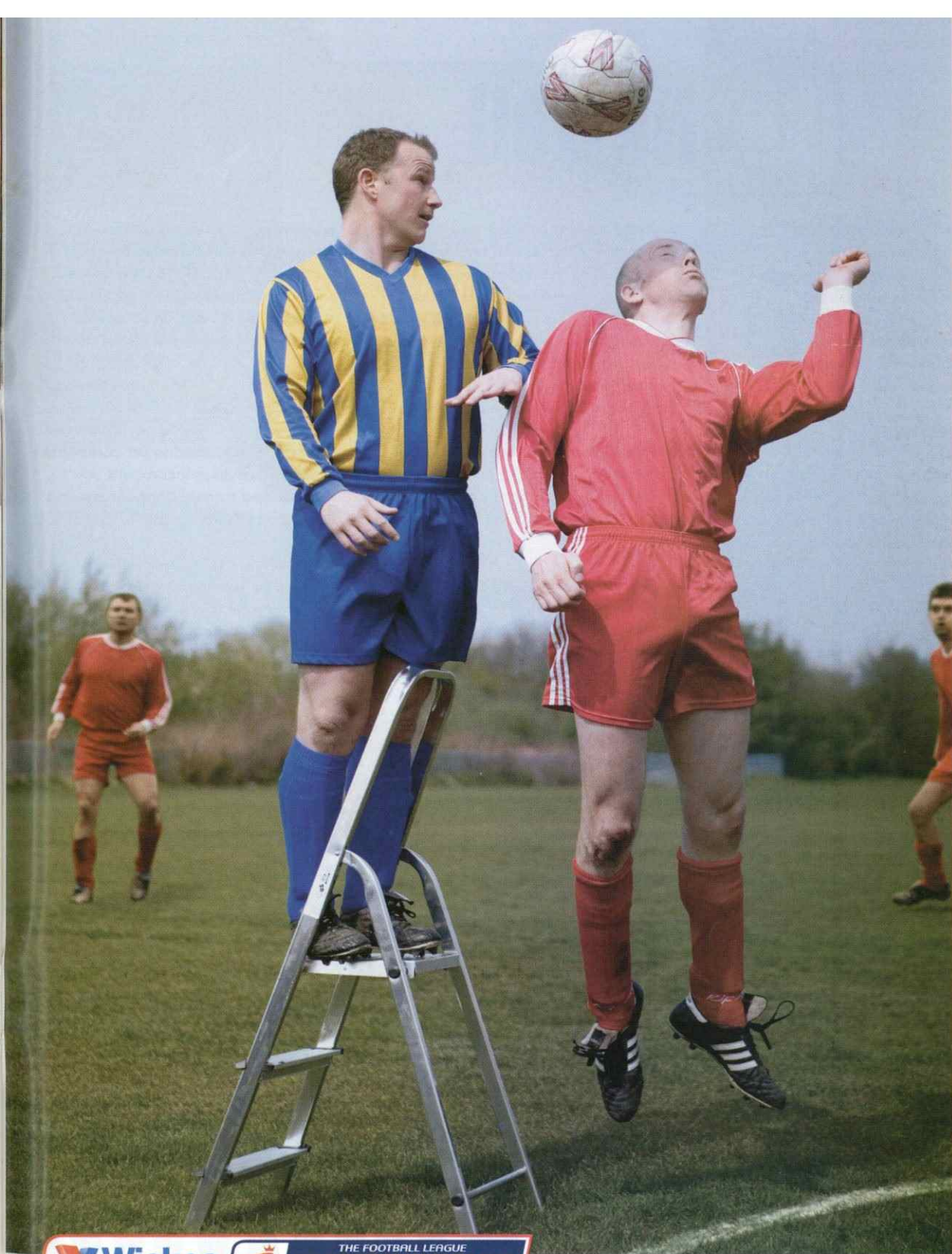
"They are a decent side and they have got some decent players, obviously they have got Steve Robinson, who used to be here. He's a good lad and a good player and they have got a lot of fire power in their team. I think Mike Newell is probably a similar thinker to our Manager Paul Simpson, in that he likes attacking football so it should be a good game and hopefully we'll get the result we got against them

here last season.

"Mike Newell has a brilliant job because it is a limited ground and they really do need to move if the club are to progress, but to get to where they have done in the Championship is fantastic."

Last season's trip to Luton was one to forget as North End fell to their heaviest defeat of the season, one Alexander remembers too well.

"We were 3-0 down quite early on, we were terrible on the night and it was one of those nights when things didn't go well for us, but I think the aftermath of that and was said at half-time and after the game stayed with us and the hurt from that spurred us on. We went 25 games unbeaten after that so it probably did us a bit of a favour and kicked us out of the slump we were in and proved to be a bit of a turning point for us. Hopefully we won't need that turning point this season."

Mike Newell

Mike Newell took to management like a duck to water following a successful player career which included a Premiership title and Champions League experience.

He has already won promotions with two different teams, and a Coca-Cola Football League One Manager of the Year award - and he's only been doing the job for four years.

Newell's playing career began with his hometown club, playing for Liverpool juniors before moving to Crewe Alexandra, where he would return in the twilight of his career. He only made three appearances for Crewe during his first spell, but managed to secure a move to Wigan Athletic where he established himself as a professional.

He signed for Luton in January 1986 and made 63 league appearances for The Hatters, scoring 18 goals before moving on to Leicester in September 1987.

After two seasons with The Foxes, the Liverpoolian returned to Merseyside to play for Everton, before making the move to Blackburn, where he helped take Kenny Dalglish's side into the Premier League and then to the title.

Although he found it hard to dislodge the 'SAS' strikeforce of Shearer and Sutton, Mike made a telling contribution as a substitute setting a new record in the Champions League scoring the fastest ever hat-trick in the competition with his quick-fire ten-minute treble against Rosenborg.

He made the move into management in November 2002, when he was handed the reigns at Hartlepool following Chris Turner's departure for Sheffield Wednesday. The Pool were sitting top of League Two when they

appointed a Newell and they were promoted in the summer, finishing third in the league to gain automatic promotion, but despite the relative success he was not given a new contract by Hartlepool United.

He was not out of the game for long as he topped an unprecedented vote to become Luton Town's new manager on June 22, 2003, beating off competition from the previous incumbent Joe Kinneer and former Cheltenham and Stoke boss Steve Cotterill.

After taking his UEFA coaching badges, as well as completing an LMA endorsed Certificate of Applied Management at Warwick University in the summer of 2003, he hoped to use his brief experience at Hartlepool to good effect as he looked to take Luton forward.

Newell's arrival sparked a revival at Luton guiding them to The Coca-Cola League One title, and promotion to The Coca-Cola Championship, winning him the League One Manager of the Year award 2005.

Last season saw Luton surprise many as they spent the early part of the season in the top six, in the end a small squad proved costly as they slipped out of the promotion chasing pack and finished tenth in the table.

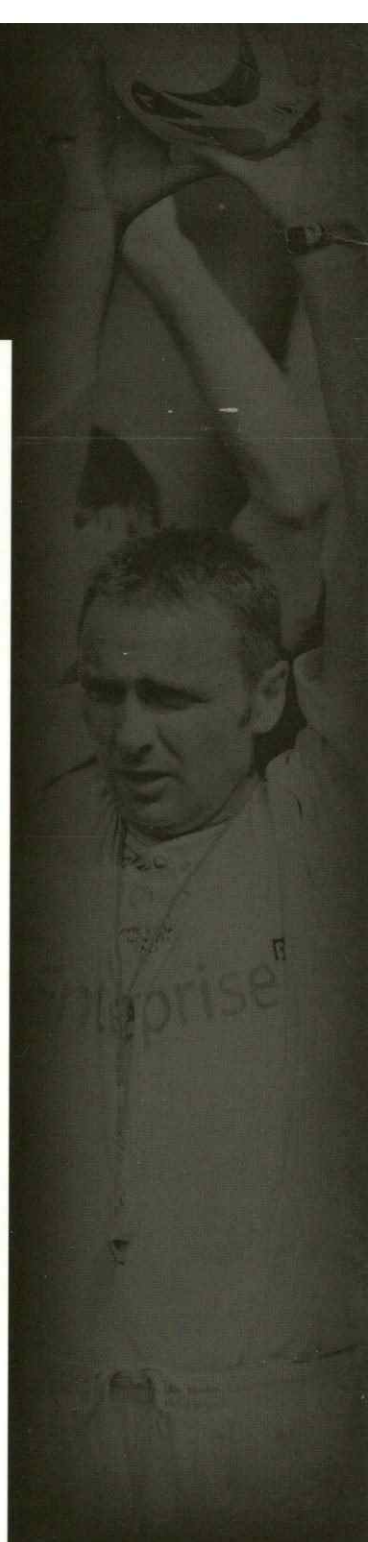
