Good afternoon and welcome to today's match.

Firstly, I have been asked by the Bedfordshire Deaf Children's Society to pass on their gratitude to everyone that supported them with their bucket collection at our last home match and raised the magnificent sum of £666.58

Welcome to Preston North End

Following back-to-back play-off failures, Preston fans are hoping Paul Simpson is the man to make it third time lucky as the Deepdale club look for promotion into the Premiership. JAMES MARSH welcomes today's visitors to Kenilworth Road.

Preston arrive at Kenilworth Road as league leaders following a six game unbeaten run. Despite their last two games ending in slightly disappointing home draws against QPR and Coventry, the point secured on Tuesday night against the Sky Blues was enough to see them overtake Cardiff at the top of the table. Having reached the play-off final in 2005 and the semi-finals last term, the Lilywhites will be hopeful of going one step further this season.

After taking over from Billy Davies in the summer, manager Paul Simpson has got his side playing the same neat, penetrative football which categorised his own career. Much of the impetus for their excellent form has come from down the right flank, where youngster Simon Whaley has been a real menace. A good crosser, Whaley also has a ten-

cious shot on him and has already netted six times this season to put him joint top scorer with pacy striker Patrick Agyemang. Whaley will be supported in midfield by Paul McKenna, who is now in his testimonial year for the club and a real fans favourite thanks to his prodigious work rate and spectacular strikes from distance.

Alongside Agyemang up front will be David Nugent, one of the division's most highly-prized assets. The England under-21 international has been coveted by a host of Premiership clubs and his explosive pace and clinical finishing marks him out as an outstanding prospect. Nugent headed his fifth goal of the season in the 1-1 draw with Coventry and, with the veteran Danny Dichio available to come off the bench and add an aerial dimension to the forward line, Preston


have not been short of goals this year. The men from Deepdale will be captained today by right back and former Hatter, Graham Alexander. Filling in at left-back will be former Leeds man, Danny Pugh, whose probing left foot has caused a number of teams difficulties this term, not least his former club Leeds, against whom he netted in a 4-1 thrashing back in October. The following game saw the Lilywhites beat the Hatters 3-0 in a match in which Town keeper Marlon Beresford was given his marching orders. With that result still fresh in both teams' minds, today's contest should be competitively fought as the visitors look to secure their fourth away win of the season and stay at the top of the table.


The Manager



Paul Simpson was named as the successor to the departing Billy Davies on June 16th 2006. Simpson's first job in the managerial world came at his hometown club, Carlisle United. Simpson arrived at Brunton Park initially as a player in 2003, before taking over from Roddy Collins as manager in September of that year. Despite losing his first 12 league games in charge, Simpson fashioned a remarkable turnaround in fortunes which almost saved the club from relegation out of the Football League. In his first full year in charge, Simpson guided United to promotion via the play-offs and as well as guiding the club to another promotion the year after, he also took them to the final of the Football League Trophy. It was his success at Carlisle that prompted the Preston Board to take bring Simpson to Deepdale to pursue their Premiership ambitions. As a player, Simpson had spells at Manchester City, Oxford United, Wolverhampton Wanderers and Derby County (where he captained the team to promotion to the Premiership). It was at Derby County and Oxford United where Simpson made a name for himself as a player, making over 100 appearances for both clubs. During his playing career, Simpson enjoyed loan spells at Sheffield United and Walsall, before moving to Blackpool and Rochdale (where he was their player-manager from May 2002) and Carlisle United. In addition Simpson represented England at under 21 level.

The Goalkeepers

If you ask Preston's defenders what the secret of their miserly success is, they'll probably tell you it's good defending. However, **CARLO NASH (pictured)** will point to his seven clean sheets so far this season and stake his own claim for the reason why the Lilywhites are such realistic candidates for promotion. And standing at 6'5", not many of his back four would argue with him. Carlo has played in all of Preston's league and cup games so far this season, and will be hoping to emulate last season's record of 53 appearances in all competitions (48 league, 4 FA Cup, 1 league cup). It hasn't always been sweetness and light for the Bolton-born shot stopper. To play at the highest level, Carlo's generally had to play second fiddle to other goalkeepers at his two previous clubs, Middlesbrough and Manchester City. Despite clocking up appearances at an alarming rate for Preston since he signed a permanent deal in March 2005, Carlo has still played even more games for Stockport County, for whom he played from June 1998 until January 2001. **CHRIS NEAL** is currently on loan from Shrewsbury.



The Defenders

GRAHAM ALEXANDER was fondly remembered at Kenilworth Road until he slammed home the penalty in Preston's 3-0 win over the Hatters four weeks ago. Only joking, of course. The Coventry-born Scottish international put in a good shift at Luton between 1995 and 1999 before financial constraints forced his sale for a bargain £50,000. Just three league clubs share his nearly 800 league and cup appearances since he made his debut for Scunthorpe United in 1991. **SEAN ST LEDGER (pictured)**, a £225,000 summer signing from Peterborough, has been a consistent member of the Preston side. Although playing in League Two during the last campaign, St Ledger's talents were not such a hidden treasure, as he scooped up every Posh player of the year award going at the end of last season. St Ledger's form has been exceptional this season, and should be appreciated even more due to the fact that he has stepped up not one, but two divisions. **LIAM CHILVERS** was an Arsenal trainee who was carefully nurtured by for four years in a variety of loan deals that saw the Chelmsford-born defender do time at Northampton, Notts County, Beveren (of Belgium) before gaining a free transfer and doing a two-year stretch at Colchester United. Then, whilst spending the summer as a free agent, he signed for the Lilywhites on another free transfer and has not missed a game since. **DANNY PUGH** made his name at Leeds United having served his apprenticeship, like so many others, at Old Trafford, before having to move on to find regular first team football. After impressing at Elland Road he joined Preston for £250,000 in June this year.




The Midfielders

Starting off the midfielder section with **PAUL MCKENNA** is taking a risk if I want the Preston fans to read on. As their longest-serving player, Lilywhites fans will already know everything about him, so you may skip to the next paragraph and no offence will be taken. McKenna is another of this season's ever-presents, and his manager must have thanked his lucky stars when he took on a squad with players like him in it. Ha, fooled you, I'm still talking about McKenna. Paul is a rarity in football – a one club man. Having signed as a trainee in 1992, it was February 1997 before he made his goalscoring debut in a 2-1 League One victory over Wycombe Wanderers. His next league outing the following week provided a much sterner test, as Preston crashed to a 5-1 away defeat at Luton. Still just 29-years-old, McKenna is already long past his testimonial year and must be wondering what else there is to achieve at Deepdale. This would explain his tenacity on the pitch as he drives his team towards the Premiership. Sometimes, the trouble with playing in the Championship is that there are too many big clubs with too many famous players in them. **CHRIS SEDGWICK (pictured)** is another one of those unsung heroes that grafts away up

and down the right-hand track of the pitch without getting too much praise or recognition from the general footballing public.

Sedgwick was Preston's only outfield player to play in every single league game of last season, missing just the second leg of the play-off semi-final against Leeds United, which they lost 2-0. The 26-year-old was born in Sheffield and played over 200 games for his first love, Rotherham United, before Billy Davies brought him across the Pennines for £400,000 in November 2004. **SIMON WHALEY** is an up-and-coming midfield dynamo who is another welcome part of the Davies legacy. Signed from Bury in the January transfer window for £250,000. His goals have come in handy as well, having already netted six so far this season. With a host of clubs chasing his signature, Whaley was influenced in choosing Preston so he could link up with his former Bury youth, reserve and first team buddy, David Nugent. **LEWIS NEAL** is a left-sided midfielder who operates mainly from the bench. His transfer will have raised a few eyebrows amongst the likes of us who used to collect 'Panini' football cards, having arrived from Stoke City in a swap deal which saw Marlon Broome going to the Britannia Stadium.




The Strikers

Preston have a wealth of decent strikers at the club, and there are rumours abound that they may be about to lose their best one in the forthcoming January transfer window. England U21 forward **DAVID NUGENT** is so good that he even got a mention in the Midfielders section of this article. Having attracted nothing but positive reviews from the press since he burst on to the scene at his previous club Bury, Nugent seems to have been around for ages. In fact he's only been at Deepdale since January 2005, when he became one of Billy's bargains in a £100,000 deal. Despite suffering the dreaded metatarsal injury last season, he still took to the Championship like a duck to water, but his miraculous return from injury was in vain as Preston suffered play-off heartache. A fiery character, Nugent picks up more cards than he does goals, with six yellows and a red

already in the bag this season. Nevertheless, he was named the Championship Young Player of the Year at the inaugural Football League awards. **DANIELE DICHO** (pictured) has spent time at some great clubs, including a shock move to Serie A with Sampdoria, only stability has been the missing part of a great career. He's also a bit of a lucky charm, having helped Sunderland and West Brom to promotion to the Premiership in recent seasons.

PATRICK AGYEMANG ended a long wait for Preston North End fans when he finally signed for the club in November 2004. An exciting striker he will be keen to prove that he is a more than capable candidate to fill the striking roles vacated by David Healy and Ricardo Fuller earlier in the campaign. Agyemang joined North End in a deal in the region of £300,000 from Gillingham after spending less than a year at Priestfield.

View from the Opposition


Preston North End's Media Executive, Becky Ashton, in conversation with Chris Rivett

- How have Paul Simpson's summer signings - Sean St Ledger, Neil Mellor, Danny Pugh and Liam Chilvers - settled in at Deepdale?

Sean St Ledger, Liam Chilvers and Danny Pugh have all been ever presents so far this season and have all slotted in to the team with ease. The two centre halves (St Ledger and Chilvers) have made the step up to the Championship with ease and adapted very quickly to life at this level. St Ledger came up two divisions from Peterborough but has really caught the eye, with his no nonsense displays, which have earned him a call up to the full Ireland squad. Liam Chilvers has gone about things a bit quieter but he has been equally as effective helping North End to four clean sheets in their last four matches. Danny Pugh has been another consistent performer following his arrival from Leeds, playing on the left of midfield or at left back but we are yet to see Neil Mellor in action. He was signed knowing that he was still somewhat off match fitness but he suffered a knock to his knee in a reserve game and required an operation to clean things up so we are still waiting for him to make his debut.

- What will new loan signing Tommy Miller add to the squad?

With the retirement of Brian O'Neil there was a need to sign another quality, experienced midfield players and the capture of Tommy Miller was an excellent one. He is a player who has been there and done it at this level and I think everyone is aware of his qualities, especially due to the fact he has scored seven goals against Preston while with Hartlepool and Ipswich and the Manager has bought him in for his goals. At the time of writing this he is yet to feature but he was well aware that he had a tough task to make the 16 with the form Preston are currently in. We have signed him until January and with so many games over the Christmas period it is important to have as many quality players available as possible.



- Who should Luton fans look out for this afternoon in the Lilywhites' squad?



Without sounding too biased there are players all over the pitch who Luton fans should look out for; there is obviously former Luton player Graham Alexander who is always lethal from set pieces and penalties, Simon Whaley (pictured) who has been in excellent scoring form this season especially away from home and then we have four strikers who have all been scoring goals in recent weeks.

- What are Preston's aims for this season?

I think despite losing the manager in the summer and two key players who left to go to the Premiership I don't ever think the aims changed but from outside I think many expected this to be more a season of consolidation than anything else but Paul Simpson came in and has carried on where the previous manager left off and now I think the aim has to be more of the same as the last two seasons.



Five to Remember

Roger Wash takes a look back at five classic encounters between Luton Town and Preston North End

27th September 1958

Luton Town 4 Preston North End 1

Attendance: 23,056

The Hatters started the 1958/59 season in brilliant style, aided by new signing Billy Bingham, and by the time of the visit of table toppers Preston it was quickly worked out that a home win would push the home side into pole position.

The BBC television cameras were present to see George Cummins fire the Town into the lead only for Dennis Hatsell to level before the break. With Gordon Turner, who had earlier missed his first ever Luton penalty, reduced to a limping passenger it was left to mercurial winger Bingham to break the deadlock before Jim Adam netted twice to secure an emphatic victory and top spot in Division One.

18th August 1961

Luton Town 4 Preston North End 1

Attendance: 14,109

Following relegation from the top flight in 1960 the Town had adjusted to life in Division Two by the time of the visit of newly demoted Preston on the opening day of the 1961/62 season.

The Hatters soon introduced Preston to the harsh world of life outside the top division with their all action power display completely overwhelming the Lilywhites defence. With new signing Ron Cope subduing Preston's big money buy Alfie Biggs, play was concentrated at the other end with Alec Ashworth opening the scoring before Gordon Turner gave the Town a comfortable interval lead.

Peter Thomson pulled a goal back but further efforts from Ashworth and John Groves made it a miserable start for Preston.

6th April 1974

Luton Town 4 Preston North End 2

Attendance: 11,806

Although still in second spot in the old Division Two, Luton were showing signs of struggling having lost their two previous games and were looking to get back to winning ways against a Preston side that was on a four match losing streak.

In an entertaining contest, compared to the dour 0-1 home defeat

to eventual champions Middlesbrough a week earlier, Preston twice drew level but it was left to Barry Butlin to net his first hat-trick in League football with all the goals being scored with his head.

'All six goals were down to goalkeeping errors', moaned a churlish Luton manager Harry Haslam afterwards!

13th December 1980

Luton Town 4 Preston North End 2

Attendance: 7,874

It had been a very inconsistent season up to this point but buoyed by a double victory over promotion certainties West Ham, the Town were now pushing up the table, although they would have to take on struggling Preston without the influential Tony Greathouse and Steve White, both injured the previous week.

Into the breach stepped the talented but frustrating Godfrey Ingram and making a welcome return after two broken legs, Lil Fuccillo.

An end to end contest developed with David Moss eventually opening the scoring from the spot just before the break and then doubling the lead on 48 minutes. Future Hatter Steve Elliott then reduced the deficit before Fuccillo brought the house down with a rasper, with Ingram completing the Luton scoring. An effort from Preston's Alex Bruce came too late to influence proceedings.

22nd February 1997

Luton Town 5 Preston North End 1

Attendance: 6,896

Following a win at Gillingham on Boxing Day which cemented the Town's position in second spot in the Division Two table, a succession of injuries and games lost to the weather, coupled with a string of draws, meant that other teams were now breathing down their necks.

The visit of Preston to Kenilworth Road coincided with a return to a full strength team and how it showed, with David Oldfield bagging a perfect hat-trick in a 15 minute spell in the first half – a header, followed by both a left foot and a right foot shot.

The final 5-1 win proved that the Town were now back to their best form.





Stat Attack

Simon Pitts takes a look at some interesting stats between this afternoon's two sides.

The Hatters have played host to Preston 20 times previously in the league, with Luton winning eight and the away side seven. The Hatters have found the net on 37 occasions, with Preston scoring 30 goals. There has never been a goal-less draw at Kenilworth Road, and the sides have never met in a major Cup competition.



Even fewer players have moved from Luton to Preston, the first was Ted Smith in 1931 after 33 appearances in two seasons. The only other player to have made the move is likely to be featuring in the match this afternoon, Graham Alexander. £100,000 was needed to purchase Alexander from Scunthorpe United in 1995, but only half that amount was the fee nearly four years later when he

moved onto Preston after 183 appearances for Luton. Alexander now has over 600 league appearances, and 700 career appearances, with his 100th league goal being scored against Luton in the 3-0 win last month.

The first meeting was back in the 1949/50 season, which ended in a 1-1 draw, with Preston scoring both goals! In fact all five of the draws in this fixture have ended 1-1, during 1956/57, 71/72, 79/80, and 98/99 seasons. Mick Cullen scored in the fixture in 56/57, having scored the last time Preston had been the visitors, in a 2-1 win. Peter Anderson achieved a similar feat, having scored in 71/72, he then scored the only goal of the game the following season. Not to be outdone David Moss scored penalties against Preston in both 79/80 and 80/81! Jimmy Adam and Billy Bingham are other players who have scored in consecutive matches at home to Preston. Adam managed three goals in two games during 1958, with Bingham also scoring in the second game, and then again in November 1959.

Luton have only bought three players from Preston North End. Frank Beresford was the first back in the 1930's, he made 15 appearances for the Hatters and scored three goals before a move to Crystal Palace. It was nearly 50 years later before another player made the move South and it was Steve Elliott. Playing only in the 1984/85 season, Elliott appeared 15 times and scored six goals, including three FA Cup goals in just three appearances! In the summer of 2002, £50000 exchanged hands as Northern Ireland International midfielder Steve Robinson (pictured) moved from Deepdale to Kenilworth Road. Robinson has recently passed 150 appearances for Luton Town, and has scored 11 times.



Two players can boast they have scored hat-tricks in this fixture. Barry Butlin scored three headed goals in the 4-2 win in April 1974, adding to a goal from Jimmy Husband. After a 16 year gap in this fixture, David Oldfield wasted no time in ensuring maximum points for the Hatters in the 1996/97 season, netting a 15 minute first half hat trick. It was the "perfect" treble, as it was a goal with each foot and a header! Further goals from Gary Waddock and Mitchell Thomas ensured a comfortable 5-1 win for Luton. The Hatters have hit four goals on three other occasions. Jimmy Adam scored twice in 58/59 in a 4-1 win, a feat repeated by Alec Ashworth in 61/62 again in a 4-1 victory. David Moss also netted a brace in this fixture in 80/81, with further goals from Lil Fucillo and Godfrey Ingram ensuring a 4-2 win.

Luton have only failed to score in two fixtures, and both ended 2-0 to the visitors. September 1962 was the first of these matches, and the other in November 1999. The latter date also saw the lowest attendance for this fixture of just 5124! Luton have only kept a clean sheet on two occasions as well. The Hatters won 1-0 in August 1972, and then last season, courtesy of goals from Warren Feeney, Ahmet Brkovic and Steve Howard, as Luton were 3-0 up at half time!



The Rams striker struck his eighth goal of the season on 75 minutes as he added to Jonathan Stead's strike, scored three minutes earlier.


Howard said: "It was nice to come back here and it was nice to win, and the way in which we did it, I think we thoroughly deserved it.

"There was no way I was going to celebrate the goal. I wanted to, but I was never going to do it because I've got some friends here, and I didn't want to do that in front of them."


Luton had opportunities in the first half, but caught goalkeeper Stephen Bywater in inspirational form as the former West Ham shot-stopper made a string of fine saves.



Opposing View

After leaving Luton Town in 1999, Graham Alexander has become Mr Consistency at Preston North End. Lilywhites skipper has played a pivotal role in driving the club towards promotion this season, and after a back-to-back play-off heartache, Alexander is hoping it will be third time lucky this time around

Graham Alexander has more experience of playing at Kenilworth Road than most after spending four years in Bedfordshire prior to his move at Deepdale in 1999.

The popular full back arrived from Scunthorpe in July 1995, with former boss Terry Westley splashing out £100,000 for the Scottish international's services.

In a side that generally struggled under Westley, Alexander was one of Luton's more consistent squad members, making 35 league appearances that season in a side that finished at the bottom of Division One.

However, it was under Lennie Lawrence that Alexander began to show his true potential. During a season which culminated in Luton's first, and so far only, play-off experience, the defender was virtually an ever-present the following year, as the Hatters finished third in Division Two.

With Luton in receivership at the end of the 1998/99 season, it was little surprise that Alexander would be quickly snapped up, with Preston beating off competition from other teams, paying the Hatters a bargain fee of £50,000.

"I owe a lot to my time at Kenilworth Road," Alexander said. "Luton gave me a massive break. I'd played in Third Division football for a few years and I was looking to step up and Luton gave me that chance. I had stepped up two divisions."

"I got back to playing in what I call my natural position, right back, and that gave me the chance to go on to Preston and to better things. I made a lot of good friends at Luton and I always look forward to playing them."

Alexander didn't enjoy the best of returns to Kenilworth Road last season, having been on the wrong end of a 3-0 defeat.

Warren Feeney, Ahmet Brkovic and Steve Howard were all on target in the first half that night as Luton dominated the game from start to finish.

A heavy defeat by Luton would probably not stand out to be a significant result in any season, but following that miserable evening under the floodlights of Kenilworth Road, Preston went 25 games unbeaten and surged into the play-offs.

It was a fixture and a turning point that Alexander remembers particularly well.

The full back continued: "I remember we were 3-0 down quite early on, we were terrible that night and it was on of those nights when things didn't go well for us.

"However, I think the aftermath of that, and what was said at half-time and after the game stayed with us and the hurt from that spurred us on.

"We went 25 games unbeaten after that so it probably did us a bit of a favour and kicked us out of the slump we were in. It proved to be a bit of a turning point for us. Hopefully we won't need that turning point this season."

Preston arrive at Kenilworth Road on the back of another tremendous run of results, having lost only twice in the league all season.

However, Alexander knows how tough of a job he and his team mates have this afternoon.


"It is a hard place to go," Alexander added. "When I was at Luton we had a decent home record and that has been the case over the last few years, and maybe the ground is a reason for their success over the last few seasons.

"When you go to tight grounds it is always easier for the home side to play. The crowd are very close to the pitch and they get behind the team. When there is a good crowd at Kenilworth Road it can be a hostile place, but Luton are a good club and they have a good tradition of playing good football."

Today's match will also pit the wits of two of the Championship's brightest managers, and Alexander believes there could be plenty of goals in this afternoon's match.

"I think Mike Newell is probably a similar thinker to our manager, Paul Simpson, in that he likes attacking football. So it should be a good game."

"Mike Newell has done a brilliant job at Luton because of the resources, and the limited capacity of the ground. To get to where they have got to in the Championship is fantastic."

Barnsley have sacked manager Andy Ritchie, six months after he led them to promotion to the Championship.


Earlier in the week, Ritchie had said he was disappointed that the Oakwell board had refused to discuss a new contract with him.

But despite winning promotion through the play-offs in May, the Tykes are second from bottom of the Championship.


A lengthy statement on the club website said the decision to terminate Ritchie's contract with immediate effect was taken "with regret".

The comments were made in the aftermath of the 3-1 victory over Colchester.


"We almost played like Pele's Brazil for a good hour," said Ward, "and then came the other side of us where we dropped off a bit."

Sunderland manager Roy Keane says he is fed up dealing with potential signings more interested in money than playing.


Keane bought several new players as soon as he took over as manager but says he is unlikely to be bringing in anyone before the window shuts today.

The Orient Express

He came from Croatia via Leyton Orient and his wife is English, although she has a Croatian father who runs an Italian restaurant so she's really half-Croatian, but her father is not Italian or even half-Italian, but his kids are English and they all live in Essex. Confused? You won't be after reading this. Now, let me check all that again....

"All your football career you are learning," opens Ahmet Brkovic. Never a truer word said, I feel.

Ahmet, along with his team mates, has learned how tough life can be in the Championship at times this season, but he has never been more determined to do everything he can to help push The Hatters back up the table.

Life has been interesting enough for Ahmet since he was processed by the same football federation which oversaw some of Croatia's, and indeed Europe's, finest footballers entering the world stage.

"I started playing football for my local club HNK Dubrovnik when I was nine. I passed all the kids, the schools and the youth categories and I was working really hard because I just loved football.

"Football was everything to me, and I started playing for the first team when I was 17.

"I played against Prosinecki, Boban, Slaven Bilic – who is now manager of Croatia and was playing for Hajduk Split – and Alen Boksic. They are all really good lads, they all talk to you."

Brkovic's progress led to him gaining attention from some of the bigger clubs in his homeland, with the up-and-coming Varteks taking a particular shine to him, snapping up Ahmet to bolster their assault on qualification for Europe.

"I then signed a new contract. I was really loving it, but then when I was 22 years old I moved to a better club called Varteks Varazdin, who were the fourth best team in the league that year.

"But I have really good, happy memories there. I played in the quarter-finals of the UEFA Cup Winners Cup. I made loads of friends, some of whom are still playing football in Croatia, that I still keep in contact with."

Varteks' defeat in the last eight of the Cup Winners Cup in the 1998/99 season denied him a two-legged semi-final meeting with Chelsea.

Having played out a 0-0 draw in the home first leg against Real Mallorca, Varteks were beaten 3-1 in the Balearic Islands in the return match. Mallorca went on to beat Chelsea in the semi-final, before losing 2-1 to Lazio in the last ever Cup Winners Cup final, which was held at Villa Park.

Ironically, Varteks were to taste European victory at the Villa three seasons later when they beat the 1982 European Champions (at the time managed by John Gregory) 3-2 to knock them out of the UEFA Cup, although by that time Brkovic had moved on.


Despite his love of the beautiful game, Ahmet is a man who has set out his priorities, and always puts his family first. At the peak of his career, his wife suffered some complications as she was expecting their first child, and he had some tricky decisions to make.

"My wife is English but her father is Croatian. We were neighbours in Croatia. I met my wife when I was 21, and after three years together she got pregnant. But she was having a really bad pregnancy and she got epilepsy.

"In Croatia the football season starts in August and finishes in January and you have a winter break before Christmas. You get four weeks off. In that time she was really ill and she decided to go back to England to see some doctors to see what was happening.

"In the meantime I had offers to go to Switzerland, but I came to London with her and to see her parents in Essex."

With his wife's health problems becoming a prolonged concern, Ahmet made a life-changing decision - a decision which would ultimately impact on his career.



"I then decided to have a chat with my chairman and I told him that I would like to stay in England. At that time I wasn't even thinking about football. I was just thinking about my wife and my kid. I was really very nervous."

Hanging around a place like London can go one of two ways, as the streets are not always paved with gold.

It would also be a wrench to leave behind the wonderful crisp, blue winter skies of Dubrovnik.

However, if you are in the right place at the right time, then London can be a land of opportunity, even if the December clouds hang as grey and low over the capital as the ceiling of a tube station tunnel.

But then a chance meeting at the family eating house reshaped Brko's future.

"In the meantime I met my agent. He was coming regularly to my father-in-law's restaurant and his office was just five minutes away.

"I'd sent some videotapes of some of my games from Croatia to my in-laws and they showed them to him. It was then that he told me that he could get me a club here. He took them to Millwall and they wanted to sign me but I was still under contract in Croatia with my club.

Brkovic went for a trial at Millwall and joined in a training session. A few challenges later and he had some 'Welcome to English football' messages imprinted on his legs.

"It was a big difference. In my first training session with Millwall the pace of the game was so fast. The tempo was really quick. In a Croatian midfield when you get the ball you can get three or four touches, here someone closes down your space and they just tackle you.

"Luckily for me I adapted really quickly."

Despite the rough stuff, Millwall liked Ahmet and he liked Millwall. However, they didn't like the price.

"HNK asked them for £500,000 –

which in Croatia is loads of money – and Millwall didn't want to pay it, so there was a problem."

Ahmet decided to take a gamble. He picked up the 'phone, and with the swagger of James Bond at a Blackjack table in Casino Royale, he cashed his career in for some chips.

"I said to my chairman, 'If you don't let me go I'll stay here until my contract ends and then I'll be a free agent. In the meantime I'll just work to do anything to provide for my family.'

"He knew I was serious and after a couple of weeks he rang me back and said, 'Okay, you pay us back the money we invested in you and we'll give you your papers'. In the meantime I signed for Orient. Tommy Taylor was the manager at the time and signed me for half a season. I

played well and they gave me another two-year contract, and that's how I stayed here."

Ahmet helped the East London side to march to within inches of promotion from the basement division they had become a permanent feature of. But so near was so far, and he soon became a luxury Leyton Orient couldn't afford.

Joe Kinnear was scouring the lower divisions for a bargain or two, and had spotted the one who would later become known as the Croatian Sensation.

"The year I signed for Luton my contract was ending for Orient. We'd just lost in the League Two play-off final against Blackpool at the Millennium Stadium and they told me they couldn't afford to invest in me any more. So I came to Luton

on trial.

"I scored two goals in a Reserve match and after that game he signed me."

Although Ahmet's career flourished at the Club, it wasn't until the 2004/05 promotion season that he realised his goalscoring prowess, bagging 16 goals as Luton surged to the League One title.

"The only thing with Joe Kinnear was that he was playing me in a more defensive midfield role. Since Mike Newell came I've been playing more as an attacking midfielder, for which I'm really grateful."

Alan Winstone DANIEL

Ashford-born Alan moved to Luton at an early age when father Mel signed on for the Hatters. When Mel left Kenilworth Road the family settled back in Ashford leaving son Alan to be picked up by Bexleyheath and Welling where he played in an FA Youth Cup match against Manchester United, losing 1-11!

Alan was, however, a good defender and was snapped up by the Hatters from under the noses of several clubs, and after working his way up through the youth and reserve sides made his first team debut at West Brom in 1959 as a 19-year-old. A long and successful livelihood seemed assured but, sadly, Alan's football career ended four years later with a wrongly-diagnosed snapped Achilles tendon. Now in retirement, Alan lives in Dunstable.

Melville (Mel) Verdun Reginald John DANIEL

Welshman Mel unfortunately saw the best years of his footballing career lost to the war, and after spells at Llanelli and Swansea was picked up by the Hatters from Ashford Town as the war drew to a close.

Prized for his versatility, Mel scored a hat-trick against Sheffield Wednesday on the opening day of the 1946/47 season but was equally adept in the half-back line and even as a full-back!

Leaving Kenilworth Road in 1949, Mel turned out for Aldershot, Newport and Betteshanger CW before hanging up his boots. A qualified carpenter, Mel later moved back to this area to be near his son, by now at Kenilworth Road, and scouted for the Town in his spare time.

Raymond (Ray) Christopher DANIEL

Local boy Ray made his way up through the ranks at Kenilworth Road before making his Luton debut at home to Sunderland in March 1983 as a substitute.

At home in any position down the left hand side Ray could never carve out a regular place in Luton's top flight side and moved to Hull in 1986, where his career took off. He then enjoyed extended spells at Cardiff, Portsmouth and Walsall over the next ten years, with only a succession of injuries keeping his appearances down. After being connected with various clubs in the Hull area, Ray now coaches the Hall Road Rangers side.

Alexander (Sandy) Grilmond DAVIE

Scottish U 23 international goalkeeper Sandy had enjoyed seven years at Dundee United before being enticed to Luton in October 1968 for £8,000, and his form for the Hatters over the remainder of that season was a revelation.



Keeping 11 clean sheets in 27 starts, his campaign ended at the feet of a Southport forward over Easter 1969, and although he returned to the side the following campaign, he was never quite the same player and it therefore came as a surprise when he was transferred to Southampton.

Sandy only managed one start for the Saints before returning to Dundee United and then emigrating to New Zealand in 1974, where he still lives.

William (Willie) Clark DAVIE

St Mirren forward Willie was attracting scouts from many big clubs but Luton manager Dally Duncan won the day and a cheque for £7,500 plus Tom Kiernan brought the clever player to Kenilworth Road where his goals and 'assists' kept the Club in Division Two in the miserable 1950/51 season.

When a panicking Huddersfield put in a £23,000 bid for the player in December 1951, a record for both clubs, it was too good to turn down and although Willie could not prevent the Terriers from suffering relegation from Division One, they bounced back at the first attempt. After five years at Huddersfield, Willie played for Walsall and Bath City before returning to Yorkshire, where he worked in local hospitals before his death in 1996.

Curtis Eugene DAVIES

Luton Town trainee Curtis Davies showed maturity beyond his years when making his Hatters League debut as an 18-year-old in a 2-2 draw with Stockport in January 2004 and it was only a matter of time before he won a regular spot in the first team.

Almost ever present during the Town's tremendous 2004/05 championship winning season his displays in central defence alongside Chris Coyne quickly caught the eye of Premiership clubs, but it took a massive £3 million to prise him from Kenilworth Road.

A credit to his profession, Curtis moved to West Bromwich in September 2005 where he took to the top flight like a duck to water and it will be no surprise to Luton supporters when he wins his first full England cap.

Ronald (Roy) Alfred DAVIES

Cape Town-born Roy decided to try his luck in the U.K and, after unsuccessful trials at Manchester City, joined Clyde where he soon built up a solid reputation as a quick two-footed winger.

Snapped up by the Hatters in May 1951, Roy went on to give sterling service over the next six years with only a succession of injuries preventing him from being one of the first names on the first team list.

A fast bowler for Bedfordshire and a good golfer, Roy finished his football career with Bedford Town but died tragically young at the age of only 49.

Ronald (Ron) Tudor DAVIES

Ron joined Chester as a £3 a week groundstaff boy and reputedly trained in army boots to improve his already prodigious leaping skills. The Hatters took a £10,000 gamble on the 20-year-old in October 1962 and he rewarded them with 21 goals in 29 League appearances as a poor Luton side sunk to Division Three.

In September 1963 a £35,000 bid from Norwich, against whom Ron had scored six goals the previous season, had to be accepted and his career then went from strength to strength taking in Southampton, Portsmouth and Manchester United along the way.



One of the best headers of a ball the game has ever seen, Ron now lives in Florida.

Simon Ithel DAVIES

Winsford born Simon was taken on by Manchester United as a Youth Trainee, signing professional forms in July 1992, but in five years at Old Trafford was only able to make 11 League appearances.

Even so it was regarded as a coup by Luton Town when they paid £150,000 for the strong midfielder in 1997 but he sadly failed to live up to his reputation and moved on to Macclesfield a year later, inevitably scoring against the Hatters when the two sides met!

After a period at Rochdale, Simon went on to play for Bangor and Total Network Solutions (TNS).




Kelvin Geoffrey DAVIS

Kelvin made his Luton Town debut whilst still a Youth Trainee, appearing between the sticks in a 2-2 draw at Stoke in May 1994, two months before signing a professional contract at Kenilworth Road.

It took some time for Kelvin to claim a regular goalkeeping slot, needing to understudy both Juergen Sommer and Ian Feuer first, but once he became number one choice his shot stopping skills, allied to incredible reflexes, had the big clubs beating a path to Luton's door.

A £600,000 bid from Wimbledon took Kelvin into the Premiership in 1999 and since then his career has taken him to Ipswich, Sunderland and currently Southampton.

Hatters History

Luton Town recently reached a important milestone, when they played their 3500 league match. Simon Pitts looks at some very interesting stats which have been recorded during that period of time.

Not many fans will be aware that on Sunday 29th October 2006, Luton Town played their 3500th league match!

The Hatters played their first league match on 4th September 1897, and it ended in a 1-1 draw at Leicester Fosse (Frederick Ekins scored the goal if you were wondering!). The first win came a week later with a 4-0 home victory over Gainsborough Trinity.

The landmark of 1000 league matches played came on 4th December 1948 following a 2-1 home win over Sheffield Wednesday, although it would only be fair to report that another three league matches had been completed, in 1939/40. However these matches were lost to the record books as "season cancelled" due to the outbreak of World War II.

Of these first 1000 league matches Luton won 410, drew 231, lost 359, scoring 1778 goals and conceding 1571. The biggest win was of course against Bristol Rovers on 13th April 1936, when Joe Payne hit ten goals in a 12-0 win!

2000 league matches were completed with a 3-1 defeat at Fulham on 22nd January 1972. During the previous 1000 matches,

Luton had won 386, drawn 246 and lost 368. The goal difference this time around was much closer with the Hatters edging by 61, as 1546 goals were scored to 1485 conceded.

A rare win for then manager Terry Westley saw Luton notch up 3000 league games when Tranmere were the visitors on 2nd December 1995. The previous 1000 games showed the worst of the statistics though with 348 victories, 278 draws and 374 defeats, with 1308 goals scored and 1343 conceded.

So it was 3500 at Portman Road, and this gives a total of 1344 victories, 885 draws, and 1271 defeats. Luton have scored 5360 goals and conceded 5064. Luton have played in five different levels of league football, although the divisions have all had a name change! Assuming we revert to the initial Division One, Two etc titles, and include Division Three (South) here are the statistics for the 3500 matches.

Division 1 - Played 658, Won 213, Drawn 168, Lost 277, For 863 and Against 1011

Division 2 - Played 1392, Won 511, Drawn 357, Lost 524, For 2086 and Against 2035

Division 3 - Played 552, Won 215, Drawn 149, Lost 188, For 784 and Against 745

Division 3S - Played 714, Won 308, Drawn 175, Lost 231, For 1295 and Against 1038

Division 4 - Played 184, Won 97, Drawn 36, Lost 51, For 332 and Against 235

The most common result is 1-1, which has happened on 396 occasions, this is followed by a 2-1 defeat (266 times), 1-0 win (263) and 1-0 defeat (261).....and the goalless draw, well that's happened 243 times!

For home matches the 1-1 draw is again the most common result with 207 occasions, with both 2-1 and 1-0 wins on 149 times each, with a 2-0 win only just behind with 147 matches finishing this way. The most common defeat is 2-1, happening 93 times.

Luton have scored more than four goals 117 times, with the visitors netting more than four goals on 13 occasions. The Hatters have kept 585 clean sheets at home, an impressive one in three league matches, with the visitors managing this feat 281 times.

Away from home and 1-1 has happened 189 times, closely followed by a 2-1 defeat (173) and 1-0 defeat (172). The most common win is 1-0 (114), with 2-1 registering 104 matches.

Luton have scored more than four goals 111 times, with the biggest win of 5-0 happening twice (Exeter 67/68, Colchester 02/03). The most goals scored in an away league game is six, 6-3 against Southampton during the 1937/38 season, and 6-2 against Brentford in the 1963/64 season. Luton have kept 322 clean sheets, and the home side have done so 589 times.

As far as matches against other Clubs is concerned, Queens Park Rangers are our most popular opponents, 84 matches, closely followed by our rivals down the road with 76 meetings. (Luton have won 32, drawn 19 and lost 25!). Of the current League Clubs, Luton have never played against Accrington Stanley, Barnet, Boston and Yeovil in league action.

Luton are still unbeaten at home against

the following current League Clubs: Blackburn Rovers (18 matches), Chester City (3), Darlington (3), Cheltenham Town (2), and Hereford United (1).

The Hatters have never beaten Wigan Athletic at home in the league, despite five meetings, or Macclesfield with two matches played. Luton have actually never beaten Macclesfield away either!

Liverpool (14), Mansfield Town (8) and Cheltenham Town (2) are other sides never to have lost at home to the Hatters. In case you were wondering Luton won at Manchester United (well actually it was Newton Heath that they were known by then!) in their first league season of 1897/98!

Luton have never been beaten at Wycombe Wanderers (7), Chester City (3), Cheltenham Town (2), and Hereford United (1). Therefore, as you will have no doubt worked out for yourself, the Hatters are actually unbeaten, both home and away, against Chester (6 matches), Cheltenham (4) and Hereford (2).

Luton have scored, on average, 2.43 goals per encounter with Torquay United, closely followed by 2.33 goals per match against Darlington. The worst scoring record is against Manchester United (and including the six games when they were known as Newton Heath!) of just 0.68 goals per meeting! Wigan Athletic have also restricted the Hatters to less than a goal per game, with just 0.9 goals on average from the 10 league meetings.

At the other end of the field, Hereford United have never scored against Luton, and of the other current league clubs Wycombe have only managed 0.64 goals per game, and Chester City 0.67. Manchester United, as well as having the best defence, also have the best attack, with an average of 2.32 goals per meeting.

Approaching 800 players have featured in these 3500 league matches, and over 440 of these have scored league goals.

Bob Morton holds the, never likely to be beaten, Club record of 495 league appearances, with Ricky Hill (436), Brian Stein (427), Mal Donaghy (415) and Gordon Turner (406) all breaking the 400 barrier. To put these players achievements into perspective, Chris Coyne has the most

appearances for current players, with 189 league appearances for Luton.

A further six players have more than 300 appearances for the Hatters, and 26 players have more than 200. At the other end of the scale there are an amazing 71 players who have only featured in one league match for Luton Town! Of these Walter Catlin, Foster Robinson and Harry Kitchen all hold the unusual record of scoring on their only league appearance for the Town as well!

The goal scoring records are dominated by Gordon Turner who scored 243 league goals from his 406 appearances. Nearly a 100 goals behind is Andy Rennie with 147 from 307, and Brian Stein with 130 from 427. Joe Payne certainly deserves a mention for the unbelievable record of scoring 83 goals from 72 appearances! Of the current players Ahmet Brkovic has 29 league goals, with Rowan Vine rapidly closing the gap, as he is now on 27!

Daily Duncan is the longest serving manager during these 3500 matches, with a consecutive run of 4143 days from June 1947 to October 1958. David Pleat's total time as manager is longer though after having two spells at the Club. From January 1978 to May 1986 saw a run of 3034 days, and this was followed with a further 1465 days


from June 1991 to June 1995. Pleat managed a total of 532 league matches, winning 184, drawing 155 and losing 193. Daily Duncan (474 league matches) has a better percentage of matches won, 38% compared to Pleat's 34.6%, but the best manager for this statistic is Allan Brown with 49 victories from 97 league games in charge, 50.5%.

We saw the most percentage of draws under Ricky Hill 35.3% (six from 17 matches), and the least from Lil Fuccillo, no draws from nine matches. Fuccillo had the worst percentage of defeats, 7 from 9 giving 77.8%, whereas the least was under Alec Stock, 37 from 155 matches is 23.9%. Stock also holds the record for unbeaten matches, 76.1%. If you wanted to see goals then the Joe Kinnear era was the one to watch, 1,679 goals scored per game, whereas the best defence, with an outstanding 0.974 goal conceded per game was again under Alec Stock.

Mike Newell currently has 152 matches in charge, after Ipswich, with 69 victories (45.4%), 40 draws (26.3%) and 43 defeats (28.3%). The Hatters have scored 245 goals (1,612) and conceded 204 (1,342).



Dean Kiely


Geoff Knox catches up with Dean Kiely just before he headed back to his third south coast ground in five days.



The more observant Hatters fans amongst you may have noticed that there's been a new face between the sticks during the last week or so.

Dean Kiely arrived out of the blue (well, out of the blue half of Hampshire, anyway) during last Thursday's loan transfer deadline day on a one month deal from Portsmouth.

The ex-Charlton shot



stopper has been drafted in to add competition for the no.1 shirt currently held by Marlon Beresford.

It was a move that happened so fast that it even took Kiely by surprise.

"I was doing some work down at Portsmouth with the goalkeepers and the coach came out with a message to ring the chief executive."

"Mike Newell phoned me up and asked if I would be interested and it took me ten seconds to say yes. I got the fax through and signed the papers."

"It was good for me because I've been training like a demon and I'm not used being on the bench. I've been a professional for 18 years and for 16 years I've been in someone's first team, so I'm not used to being out of the team."

Kiely is a highly-regarded 'keeper who has made over 650 league and cup appearances for his previous clubs York City, Bury and Charlton Athletic.

Having served as a trainee at Coventry City under the watchful eye of the Highfield Road legend Steve Ogrizovic, the Salford-born 'keeper eventually signed for York City, making over 200 appearances after his league debut in March 1990.

He then spent three seasons at Bury before moving

on to Charlton Athletic for £1m in May 1999.

Kiely is adamant that, despite having just turned 36 years old, he still has plenty of good years ahead of him at the top level.

"Nigel Martyn left Leeds at 35 and went on to play for Everton until he was 40. People questioned him when he was at Leeds and he went on to play for another five years."

"I don't carry any weight, my hunger is fine and my appetite for the games and training is there."

Having slipped down the pecking order at The Valley last season, Kiely moved to Fratton Park in January this year and played out the rest of Pompey's Premiership campaign - playing a major part in their unlikely survival act as they narrowly avoided relegation to the Championship.

However, the arrival of David James during the close season had left Kiely requiring first team action once more.

For this reason alone Kiely has empathy with his new and temporarily displaced colleague, even though Marlon Beresford accepts that business is business when it comes to team selection.

"I know Marlon from a long way back and we've always talked to each other and he even took me to the training ground in his car."

"We've got a good working relationship and I think that's right because if there are problems then it shows in the changing room and on the pitch."


Football League Chairman, Lord Mawhinney, recently published the following article in the Daily Mail



Reading the sports pages of the Daily Mail on any day last week, you could not have missed the coverage devoted to the issues of refereeing and cheating. Personally I am delighted the subject of cheating in football is now part of the public debate. And about time too.

Once again, the role of our sport's independent arbiters is under scrutiny, as is the behaviour of players. When Everton's James McFadden disputed his sending-off against Arsenal on the grounds he had merely delivered a foul-mouthed volley of abuse at the referee, rather than calling him a cheat, it represented a new low.

On-field behaviour is simply not as good as it should be. I agree with Sportsmail's Paul Hayward who wrote: "The hounding of match officials has become an art, premeditated and coached, on and off the pitch, psychologically and physically". In the worst cases, players' behaviour has descended to the depths of outright cheating. For example, in last summer's World Cup Finals, more than half of the 'injuries' that stopped play were shown

to be fake.

For those of us with responsibilities for the wider interests of the game, doing nothing is simply not an option. The prevailing culture of dishonesty, confrontation and constant questioning of the referee's authority has to be reversed and a new emphasis placed on fair play.

Managers need to give a lead in improving players' behaviour and if they will not do it themselves, club Boards should insist. After all, managers are also employees.

Already this season, in the women's Premier League, we've seen an England international sent off for hurling the ball at a referee, who, for his own safety, was escorted from the ground by the police. One can only imagine what effect the behaviour of our top players is having on the impressionable generation of young footballers just learning the game.

As Football League Chairman, I understand the limits of my areas of responsibility. For instance, we do not set the laws of the game, but we do regulate the behaviour of our clubs. That is why at our summer conference I raised my concerns with the Chairmen of our 72 clubs. I was encouraged that, like me, they wanted to see an improvement in this area.

Solidarity is vital because it is club Boards who must set the tone. Too much of the cheating - and I make no apologies for using that word - that we see on match days appears to have its roots on the training ground. It is surely no coincidence that at most free-kicks we see players taking turns to obstruct the quick taking of the kick. Meanwhile, diving, shirt pulling, stealing ground at throw-ins and elbowing are becoming endemic.

It is therefore up to club chairmen to leave their employees in no doubt that such gamesmanship will not be tolerated. I was encouraged to hear Roy Keane urging managers to take greater responsibility for the actions of their players.

By indicating their support, League clubs gave me a mandate to begin drawing up proposals to promote fair play. This is not empty rhetoric on our part and, just as we have tackled an array of thorny off-field matters - such as payments to agents - we will now turn our attention to these important on-field issues.

We will make clear our support for referees, and their integrity, examining whether the referee's armoury is sufficient to deal with the challenges posed by the modern game.

Again, I stress that The Football League has no responsibility for the laws of the game, but I can ask for referees to be more stringent in their application of those laws in our matches. One suggestion would be a tougher approach to dealing with players failing to retreat at free-kicks, with this offence leading to an immediate yellow card.

Fans should support the rigorous applications of the laws - even against their own team. Cleaning up the game will make it a better spectacle and preserve the true competitive ethos which cheating is designed to distort. Already, I have met with PGMO General Manager, Keith Hackett, and this dialogue will continue.

We should also look at the use of red and yellow cards to see if they are part of the problem or the solution.

Personally, I want to see sin-bins in use in our games and we have written to FIFA twice to offer up our competitions for a potential pilot scheme.

The League is also the only body to have asked supporters for their opinions on this matter. Earlier this year more than 43,000 fans submitted their views and 56% indicated that they would like to see an experiment with sin bins. Tellingly, among fans who are 55 or over - usually the most resistant to change - the figure was as high as 76%. Clearly those with longer memories can remember what it was like when players and managers had greater respect for the referee's authority and football's wider image.

The Clarets then broke the deadlock through Gifton Noel-Williams before former Leeds trainee Andy Gray struck the winner for Steve Cotterill's side.


David Healy scored a consolation for The Whites, but Dennis Wise's side came away with nothing from their trip to Lancashire.

**Stuart Smith brings us the latest news from
the Community Department**



Good afternoon and welcome to this afternoon's game. Today I would like to update you on the progress of our Girls Development Programme and the early overall success of our Academy training and game programme.

Over the October Half-Term, the Luton Town Girls Academy teams played against Norwich City's Development Centres.

The Girls Academy is funded by Trust in Luton and sees the best young female players in Bedfordshire training at Crawley Green every Monday evening.

The Academy is a stand-alone centre focusing on player development. Currently 12 different clubs are represented in our squads and hopefully through the girl's participation in the academy training, and games programme, all of these clubs will benefit by becoming stronger. Consequently the standard of local girls football will also continue to rise.





However, Luton did come out fighting after the break and Russell Perrett's brave header midway through the second half gave them a chance of halting their seven game unbeaten run.


The home side took the lead on 15 minutes when, after Luton failed to deal with a succession of corners, they couldn't prevent Gareth Bale's left

wing cross from finding the head of Baird, who rose highest in the area to power home past on-loan goalkeeper Dean Morgan.







Luton Town v Southend United

Despite recording a memorable victory over Manchester United in the Carling Cup, and with a trip to Tottenham Hotspur on the horizon, Southend have endured a difficult season.

After being promoted from League One as Champions last season, victories have been hard to come by this time around, and the club languishing at the foot of the Championship table.

With only 12 points collected in the league so far to date, these are worrying times for the Essex club as they stand eight points adrift of safety from relegation.

However, it's not all doom and gloom around Roots Hall. Along with their current cup run, the club are confident of moving to a new 22,000 all seater stadium, which will include a hotel and conference facility.

The club also have a number of talented players, including hot-shot Freddy Eastwood, who has been a massive hit at Southend since signing from non-league Grays Athletic.

Scouts continue to swarm Roots Hall as they track the progress of the 23-year-old striker, who recently shone in the victory against Manchester United, striking the winning goal with a sublime 25-yard free kick.

Eastwood finished his first season in professional football with 24 goals and played a major part in the club's promotion from League Two, as well as netting the opening strike in the play-off final against Lincoln.

He followed that up by finishing last season as the joint leading goalscorer in League One with 25 goals and was named as the fans' player of the year.

The Southend striker has been tracked by Norwich, Derby and Sunderland after his impressive start to the season.

With Eastwood out of contract in 2008, the club could be forced to sell him next summer to prevent him leaving for a cut-price fee.

Talking recently, Eastwood said: "I want to play in the Premiership one day and hopefully I will get the chance to do that."

"However there are some big clubs in the Championship and they have the chance to get to the top flight more quickly."

As well as Eastwood, Southend boast more promising talent in the shape of pint-sized midfielder Jamal Campbell-Ryce and goalkeeper Darryl Flahavan, who is another player that seems to be attracting plenty of interest from other clubs.

A familiar name to Luton fans will be that of Efetobore Sodje. The bandana wearing central defender had a difficult time at Kenilworth Road, making only a handful of appearances, before moving to Crewe Alexandra.

And, of course, the other promising talent in the Southend's set-up is the manager, Steve Tilson, who himself has been linked with vacancies at other Championship outfits.
