Welcome to Southend United

With victory over Southampton last week and a Carling Cup quarter-final trip to Tottenham on the horizon, Southend go into tonight's encounter on a high, despite languishing at the foot of the Championship table. **STEWART CURTIS** welcomes today's visitors to Kenilworth Road

Essex outfit Southend United visit Kenilworth Road this evening, hoping to build on last weekend's victory over Southampton. League form has certainly been an issue for the Shrimpers, having won just three games this season; they currently occupy bottom spot in the Championship, eight points from safety.

Steve Tilson has performed minor miracles since arriving at Roots Hall, leading the Blues to two successive promotions, and two Cardiff cup finals in 3 years. The first step up the football league ladder came via a League Two play-off victory over Lincoln City, and the second as Champions of League One last season. The 2 Cardiff appearances came in the form of successive LDV Vans Trophy finals. However, Southend were defeated 2-0 on both occasions, by Blackpool and Wrexham, respectively.

The club were in danger of relegation to

the Conference when Tilson took over in November 2003, but having steered them clear, the only way was up from there. A former Shrimper himself, Tilson was now gaining an esteemed reputation in English football, being linked with other vacant managerial positions. A summer of speculative job approaches pursued, but the England Under 21 assistant has stayed to fight the cause with Southend.

Turbulent times off the pitch have seen the club come close to liquidation on many occasions over the years, necessitating the sale of the club's stadium to relinquish funds just seven years ago. However, things seem to be on the up, and according to local press, construction work will begin on the club's new 22,000 all-seater stadium in early 2007.

One of the more active clubs in the summer transfer window, a squad over-

haul has seen no fewer than fifteen players depart, with eleven new faces arriving in the process. Notable signings have seen Alan McCormack arrive on loan from Preston, Jamaican winger Jamal Campbell-Ryce from Rotherham, and former England international Michael Ricketts, although the latter was soon released for being overweight.


Failing to win away from home this season has been Southend's major downfall, collecting just two points from a possible thirty on their travels this season. The club's success in the cup has however been a different tale altogether, defeating Manchester United 1-0 in the last round of the Carling Cup to set up a quarter-final tie away to Tottenham next Wednesday. The goal that night came courtesy of a Freddy Eastwood wonder-strike. This young striker will keep the Luton defenders on their toes during this evening's encounter.


The Manager



Steve Tilson began his footballing career with non-league side Witham Town before being signed by former Southend manager David Webb. During the 1990s, Tilson appeared in just under 250 matches and played in the side that won two consecutive promotions in the early part of the decade. He played continually for Southend, except for a loan spell at Brentford, until 1997, when he signed for Canvey Island, serving as club captain during his four-year spell with the team. In 2002, Tilson moved back to Southend, this time to head a newly created "Centre of Excellence". He also worked to develop Southend's youth until the sacking of Steve Wignall in November 2003. With the club in danger of relegation to the Football Conference, Tilson was named caretaker-manager by chairman Ron Martin and proceeded to take Southend clear of danger. Also in the same season, Tilson led Southend to their first ever national cup final in the club's history, losing to Blackpool 2-0 in the LDV Vans Trophy Final. In March of 2004, Tilson was offered the job of manager on a full time basis, and accepted the offer. The 2004-2005 season started with Southend United again favoured to be relegated. However, Tilson led the side to fourth position in League Two and then promotion after a 2-0 victory over Lincoln City in the play-off final. The 2004/05 season also saw Southend return to the LDV Trophy final against Wrexham, although Tilson's side lost the match 2-0 after extra time. The 2005/06 season saw even more success and silverware as Tilson guided Southend to win promotion in consecutive seasons to the Championship as champions of League One, ending their nine-year absence from the league's second tier.


The Goalkeepers

DARRYL FLAHAVAN (pictured) is a talented goalkeeper who played a pivotal role in Southend's League One title success last season. The former Southampton trainee joined Southend from non-league Woking in 2000, and despite being released three years later, he rejoined soon after to deputise for injuries. Flahavan was named PFA Player of the Year last season and was also named in the team of the season and picked up the players' player award from the club. With a number of commanding performances under his belt, Flahavan was beginning to be linked with a move away from Roots Hall, but recently signed a new contract which will tie him to Southend until 2008. Waiting patiently in the wings is **STEVE COLLIS**, who signed a two-year contract to become Southend's first signing ahead of the new season in the Championship. The 25-year-old goalkeeper arrived on a free transfer from Yeovil Town, where he played 24 games during the last campaign.



The Defenders


SIMON FRANCIS penned a three-year deal after joining Southend for an undisclosed fee from Sheffield United. Francis spent most of last season in League One where he made 17 appearances for Tranmere Rovers. Having signed for the Blades for £200,000 from Bradford City, Francis failed to cement a first team place at Bramall Lane. A loan move to Grimsby Town in 2005 was then followed up by his spell at Tranmere, where he impressed enough to be named in the League One Team of the Year. **ADAM BARRETT** and **LEWIS HUNT** both joined Southend in the summer of 2004 and have gone on to become key members of Steve Tilson's side. Barrett joined Southend after spending the previous two seasons with Bristol Rovers, whilst Hunt arrived from Derby County after initially signing on loan. **SPENCER PRIOR** (pictured) has enjoyed a glittering career, and is now back at Southend for his second spell. The tall and commanding defender rejoined the club in 2004, some 11 years after he originally left to sign for Norwich City for £200,000. After three seasons with the Canaries he moved on to Leicester, with spells at Derby County, Manchester City and Cardiff following. After Southend's promotion from League One, Tilson went about strengthening his defence and secured the services of **PETER CLARKE**, who signed a three-year contract just days before the current season after arriving from Blackpool, and ex-Hatter **EFETOBORE SODJE**, who moved from Yeovil Town. Sodje spent just one season at Kenilworth Road and is a former Nigerian international.



The Midfielders

MARK GOWER joined Southend from Barnet in the summer of 2003 for a fee of £25,000 and capped his first season with the club by being named player of the season. The winger began his career at Tottenham and was a member of the squad that won the Worthington Cup in 1998/99. He had a spell on loan at Motherwell before joining Barnet in January 2001 for £32,500. The winger committed to a two-year deal at the end of the season ahead of the club's move into the Championship. **KEVIN MAHER** (pictured) is Southend's longest serving player and the club captain made his 300th appearance for the club this season. Maher began his career at Tottenham before joining the club on a free transfer in January 1998. Maher has also been capped four times by the Rep of Ireland under-21s. Having joined initially on loan just days before the transfer window was due to close from Rotherham, **JAMAL CAMPBELL-RYCE** proved to be a more than useful acquisition and gives the club further options in midfield. Campbell-Ryce is a nippy winger who has had spells with Charlton and


Leyton Orient. **STEVEN HAMMELL** has been an inspirational signing for Southend after making the journey south to sign a two-year contract with the Blues after moving on a free transfer from Motherwell. Hammell made 38 appearances for Motherwell last season and has represented Scotland at all youth levels, making his full international debut at Hibernian's Easter Road ground in 2004 as a substitute against Sweden. **JAY SMITH** has had to work his way back from a series of injury setbacks that forced him to miss the whole of last season. The diminutive midfielder made a big impact when he first joined Southend from Aston Villa in 2002 after a successful loan spell. After making his debut in August the same year, he became a regular name in the starting line-up, as he made a name for himself in the heart of midfield. **GARY HOOPER** has made an impressive start to his Southend career after signing from non-league Grays after scoring twice in the club's Carling Cup win over Leeds United. The youngster has mainly come off the bench this season, but has put in a number of commanding performances.



The Strikers

When it takes you just seven seconds to score on your debut before you go on to finish with a hat trick, you know you have a special talent on your hands. And that is exactly the case for Southend when they snapped up **FREDDY EASTWOOD** (pictured) from Grays Athletic and saw him tear Swansea City apart in October 2004, collecting the match ball in a 4-2 success. Eastwood is a former West Ham trainee who admitted that he considered retiring from the football profession after he was released in 2002. But a spell at Grays reawakened his desire and since signing for the Blues in October 2004 he has never looked back. He finished with 24 goals that season, including the opening strike in the play-off final against Lincoln. Eastwood ended the 2005/06 season as the joint leading goalscorer in League One with 25 goals. **MICHAEL RICKETTS** is a former Bolton striker who once commanded a £3.5 million fee. The 27-year-old striker signed on a free transfer from Leeds United with the option of a further year. Ricketts spent all of last season out on loan to Cardiff

City where he made 17 appearances and scored five goals before being loaned to Burnley, making a further 13 appearances and scoring twice. A former England international, Ricketts started his career with Walsall as a trainee before making a £400,000 switch to Bolton Wanderers. He went on to score 46 goals in 68 starts before being sold to Middlesbrough in 2003. **LEE BRADBURY** was a last minute signing before the close of the transfer window in January, joining from Oxford United. He once commanded a £3 million fee from Manchester City in 1997 where he scored 11 goals in 40 games before a spell at Crystal Palace followed. Despite being at the London outfit for around a year, his next move to Portsmouth saw him enjoy over four years at the club, playing 106 games and scoring 29 goals. **BILLY PAYNTER** agreed a move from Championship rivals Hull City for an undisclosed fee after signing a three-year contract with the Blues. Paynter began his career at Port Vale where he scored 30 goals in 119 league starts for the club.






View from the Opposition

in conversation with Chris Rivett**


What have new loan signing's Alan McCormack and Arnau Riera added to the squad?




Who should Luton fans look out for this evening in the Shrimper's squad?

Five to Remember

Roger Wash takes a look back at five classic encounters between Luton Town and Southend United

12th April 1967

Luton Town 1 Southend United 0
Attendance: 4,666

In this, the Town's worst ever season, a mid-campaign mini-revival had petered out and the team was placed just above the re-election positions in Division Four.

Having picked up only one point from the previous five games leading up to the visit of promotion chasing Southend there seemed only one likely winner; but in a bad tempered, bruising encounter the Hatters seemed up for it from the start.

Welcoming back fit again mercurial winger Graham French the Town could not make a breakthrough and the game seemed to be petering out to a draw when newcomer Keith Allen hit a long, hopeful shot that squirmed through the hands of Shrimpers goalkeeper Trevor Roberts and with it two vital points.

27th September 1967

Luton Town 3 Southend United 1
Attendance: 13,322

What a difference a few months made! Luton supporters knew that a new era was unfolding at Kenilworth Road and wanted to be part of it.

Early season pacesetters, unbeaten Southend, were the visitors and revenge was due as the Town's only reverse had been at Roots Hall three weeks earlier.

New £11,000 signing from Derby, Ian Buxton, made his Luton debut but was by passed in a frenetic game that ebbed and flowed.

John Moore opened the scoring for the Town only for Jackie Ferguson to level midway through the second half. Terry Branton headed the Hatters back in front two minutes later and, with Southend tiring, Graham French made the game safe.

19th August 1995



Attendance: 4,630

Terry Westley's managerial career at Kenilworth Road had not started off too brightly with a home defeat at the hands of Norwich on the opening day and so the trip to Southend, where we had not won since 1964, was not treated with great enthusiasm

asm by Luton supporters.

On a sweltering day the Town's chances reduced as early as the tenth minute when Ceri Hughes was sent off for retaliation but the dismissal seemed to spur on the side and they certainly had as much of the play as the Shrimpers.

With the heat taking its toll, both sides made full use of their substitutes and it was one of these, Tony Thorpe, who broke the deadlock on 76 minutes after being set up by John Taylor.

13th January 1996

Luton Town 3 Southend United 1
Attendance: 6,566

Sadly the win at Roots Hall had not galvanised the Town as by the time of the return they were rock bottom, had just replaced their manager and had suffered a 1-7 humiliation at Grimsby in the FA Cup the previous week.

New manager Lennie Lawrence expected a 100% improvement against the mid-table Shrimpers and got it with the Hatters on top from first minute to last. The breakthrough took a long time in coming though, as it took until the stroke of half-time before Bontcho Guentchev hooked in the opener.

In the second period two screamers from Scott Oakes made the game safe, with an effort from Southend's Paul Byrne coming too late to spoil the day.

29th December 2001

Southend United 1 Luton Town 2
Attendance: 5,973

The Town were making a bold bid to escape Division Three at the first attempt and stood in second spot with the best away record in the Football League.

Mid-table Southend had beaten the Town at Roots Hall in the FA Cup six weeks before, and seemed likely to make it a double when Carl Hutchings netted on 51 minutes after winger Steven Clarke had beaten Ian Hillier for pace down the wing.

The Town were made of strong stuff though and Dean Crowe levelled 15 minutes later before Matt Taylor secured all three points smashing the ball home after Kevin Nicholls' free-kick had caused all sorts of problems in the Shrimpers defence.





Stat Attack

Simon Pitts takes a look at some interesting stats between this evening's two sides.

Luton have entertained Southend on twenty seven occasions in the league, and have won fifteen of these. From the eight draws there has been a 0-0, 1-1, 2-2, 3-3 and amazingly a rare 4-4! The visitors have won four times, the last of which was in November 1964. The Hatters have scored 54 goals and conceded 29. Luton are unbeaten in cup competitions at Kenilworth Road against Southend, with three wins in the FA Cup and a draw in the Anglo-Italian Cup!




Southend have only signed two players from Luton since the 1950's and both of these were free transfers in the summer of 2003! Carl Emberson (pictured) made sixty appearances for the Hatters, including during the promotion season of 2001/02 before his move. Emberson only made seven appearances for Southend. Duncan Jupp had a very short spell at Kenilworth Road, and made just two starts at the end of the 2002/03 season. Jupp went

on to 100 league appearances in three seasons at Roots Hall before his move to current club Gillingham, last summer. Bobby Wyldes and Ray Smith both left the Hatters in the 1950's to continue their career at Southend after 27 and 14 appearances for Luton, respectively. Doug Beach and Arthur Purdy had both made 26 appearances for Luton, whilst George Goodyear made just 12, prior to their transfers. Beach and Goodyear moved in the 1940's whilst Purdy was a goalkeeper for the Hatters in the 1925/26 season.

The sides have been playing at a different level of the league structure in each of the last three seasons they have met! Currently in the second tier of English football, as they were in 1995/96, it was the third tier when they met in 1997/98 and then in the basement division in 2001/02!

Only two players have ever made the switch from Southend to Luton, and strangely they both featured in 13 league matches for the Hatters! Billy Thirlaway appeared at the end of the 1924/25 season after his move from Essex, before he was then transferred to South Shields. Ian Benjamin had played over 130 matches for Southend, before his £50,000 move to Luton Town. Benjamin only made 17 appearances in total for the Hatters, but he will always be remembered for 'that header' against Watford during the 1992/93 season!



Luton were unbeaten in the opening nine league matches at Kenilworth Road against Southend, winning six and drawing three. An amazing 23 goals were scored in just seven games by the Hatters, the other two matches ended goalless, which meant Luton kept seven clean sheets in this unbeaten run. The Hatters scored four goals during four of these matches, and yet have only managed it once since, in 1963/64!

Luton have had two players celebrating hat tricks in this fixture. Syd Reid was the first, on the final day of the 1924/25 season, in a 4-0 win, with John Shankly scoring the other. Gordon Turner was the other to achieve to this feat, in a 4-1 win in October 1963. Jimmy "Jock" Weir scored the other that day, his only career goal for Luton Town!

The sides have only played twice before in December at Kenilworth Road, and these games both ended in draws! It was the remarkable draw in 1923/24, the first of only three 4-4 scorelines seen in Luton's home league history, and then four years later it finished goalless! The sides have never met before on the 15th day of the month!





Luton got off to the perfect start after 70 seconds when a pinpoint cross from Steve Robinson found Vine, who duly dispatched the ball into the net with ease.







Parkinson departs Hull


Hull City have parted company with boss Phil Parkinson after less than six months in charge at the KC Stadium.

He added: "Dave Jones wants me to challenge Neil Alexander for the number one spot and it is certainly something I think I can do.




Wolves' keeper Matt Murray has signed a new three-and-a-half year deal, which will be extended by a year if they reach the Premiership in that time.


Nugent happy with life at Preston

A Northern Soul

Lewis Emanuel may be a long way from his birthplace in Bradford but Luton's recent losing streak would have seemed home from home after his topsy-turvy years with the Bantams. We caught up with the mild-mannered man with a loaded left foot to see how he's settling in at Kenilworth Road.

When then Hatters achieved their great result over the league leaders Preston earlier this month, a stylish win which drop-kicked the disastrous month of November well and truly into touch, Lewis insisted that life on the training pitch up at Luton Rugby Club had been business as usual.

"The training is exactly the same. We did everything the same in preparation.

"It was nice just to get three points and change things around. I'm sick of losing. It does your head in.

"I can't really put my finger on what changed. It just dragged on, and the games got quicker and we just kept on losing. I don't know what it was that changed but we just got stuck in and got a result."

Having arrived at Kenilworth Road during the summer as a trialist, Emanuel quickly impressed the coaching staff in with both his application and aptitude in training.

A string of good performances in the pre-season friendlies did not go unnoticed, and it wasn't long before Lewis was in with the in crowd and had put pen to paper on a two-year contract.

Even if Lewis was not a household name in these parts, he was certainly no stranger to this level of football.

"I've played a fair few games for Bradford at this level, but unfortunately we got relegated!"

A quiet man, and a no-nonsense workmanlike player who just goes about his business on the pitch in a professional manner, Lewis may not write many headlines. However, it's testament to how well he's adapted to life at Kenilworth Road in that it's hard to imagine a Luton team without Emanuel on the team sheet, even though it's less than five months after he signed for the Club.

The first game of the Championship season at his new club just happened to be live on Sky Sports and Lewis

went straight into the team alongside fellow new signing and old foe, Richard Langley.

An impressive debut followed on the left-hand side of midfield, and Lewis showed his versatility by dropping back into his favoured left back position when Sol Davis was forced off with a dead leg.

If the jury was still out for any Luton fans, then they must have been won over when Emanuel grabbed the only goal of the game to secure the points in his second outing at Hillsborough three days later.

Electrifying pace and robust tackling are major assets for any left-sided player, and Lewis has been an able replacement for a recuperating Sol Davis over the past six weeks.

By his own admission, Lewis is not the most prolific of goal scorers, and his winner at Sheffield Wednesday was just his fifth career goal.

Lewis recalls his first ever goal with a big grin. It was almost three years to the day before his solitary Hatters strike.

It came at Ninian Park in a Championship clash against a very strong Cardiff City side containing the likes of Robert Earnshaw, Danny Gabbidon and Graham Kavanagh.

Although it was the season that would ultimately see the Bantams drop out of the division, they had started the 2003/04 season brightly.

The now-Burnley hitman Andy Gray, who we know all about after his brace of goals earned the Claretts three points here on Halloween night earlier this season, had put Bradford ahead with a stunning 22-yard effort.

Not to be outdone, Lewis pounced on a loose ball outside the Cardiff area and with the time and space afforded to him, set his sights on the Bluebirds goal.





Bang! Left foot. 2-0!

"It felt very good. I can't remember how far, about 30 yards out. Langers was playing (for Cardiff) that day and he remembers it."

Time may have embellished Lewis' recollection of distance, but it was no tap-in.

Lewis is clearly happy to be here, but he is very much a Bradford boy at heart.

Born there, bred there, played there, met his girl there. If Lewis were a stick of rock, the word B-R-A-D-F-O-R-D would read throughout his cross-section in squiggly uneven red lettering.

So it was fitting that when he made his debut for his hometown club in a League Cup match at Macclesfield in August 2001, he was replaced in the 89th minute by a substitute who went by the name of Stuart McCall.

McCall played over 450 games for Bradford in two separate spells at Valley Parade, and is listed on their official website as a Bantams Great.

"He was a legend at Bradford. He was someone I looked up to and someone who always gave me advice.

"I don't think I was supposed to be playing, to be honest. I just got thrown in there and it was a bit of a shock. I just got on with it and I enjoyed it."

McCall's goal in extra time of that match sealed the tie for his team, creating another platform for Emanuel to impress his manager.

Bradford had finished bottom of the Premiership the previous season and were in financial freefall. They had amassed a squad of players that were on big wages, and had not managed to shed them all in time for the Championship season.

It was bad for the Boardroom but great for the training ground, as there were plenty of old dogs around to teach the young pups some new tricks.

Veteran defender David Wetherall,

Lewis' form this season has not gone unnoticed in wider circles. Last month he was called into the Republic of Ireland 'B' squad to play Scotland 'B' alongside fellow Hatter Kevin Foley. Both played 90 minutes of a goalless draw.

who to this day still plies his trade at Valley Parade, became a mentor to Lewis, and is still just as supportive.

"Wethers is still there now and he was always talking to me about my game. During a match when I was playing he'd tell me where to be. Wethers was very helpful.

"We've texted each other a few times, and when we've had weekends off here I've gone back and watched the game and met the lads."

Lewis clocked up another 150-odd appearances for his first love before deciding that, professionally, it was time to move on.

Football careers are short and it was time to spread his wings.

"Bradford did offer me a contract

but I decided to turn it down and try my luck elsewhere. My agent said I could come down here for a trial and things just went on from there.

"It was a league above and the chance to play in the Championship so I just went for that. I'm enjoying it at the minute."

Uprooting the family home can be a traumatic experience. Footballer's wives tend not to be how the TV series and tabloids portray them, and there can be some sensitive issues to deal with before success on the pitch can be achieved.

Lewis had married into Bradford although, fortunately, things are going well with his relocation.

"I didn't have any problems about moving. I've always known that in football you've got to move around

and sometimes you have to move around a lot.


"My missus was a bit unsure because she's from Bradford as well. But she's come down now and she's settled in as well, and my little girl has as well, so it's fine now."

However, when it came to house hunting around the Luton area his wife quickly ruled out south, east and west – just to be that little bit closer to Yorkshire!

"I live in a little village just outside Milton Keynes, so when I get home it's closer to up north!"







Solomon (Sol) Sebastian DAVIS

Cheltenham born Sol signed professional forms for Swindon in May 1998, after coming up through the ranks at the County Ground, making his league debut at home to QPR in November 1997, soon after his 18th birthday.


Forging a reputation for himself as a committed and tough tackling left-sided player, he was brought to Luton by Joe Kinnear in August 2002 soon after the Hatters were promoted from Division Three.

Something of a cult hero at Kenilworth Road his recent illness has shocked all Luton supporters who can't wait to witness the full back's next bone jarring tackle.

Stephen (Steve) Mark DAVIS

Although coming from the North-East, Steve was a junior at Southampton but found first team opportunities hard to come by at the Dell, so accepted a £60,000 move to Burnley in 1991 where he became a crowd favourite, helping the Clarets to successive promotions.

A £750,000 cheque took him to Kenilworth Road in 1995 where his astute reading of the game and power in the air in both penalty areas made him indispensable in over three seasons at Luton. An £800,000 bid from Burnley, and the players desire to return, saw Steve move back to Turf Moor in December 1998. After a spell at Blackpool, Steve is now back at Turf Moor as first team coach.



Mervyn Richard DAY

Goalkeeper Mervyn played almost 650 league games for a variety of clubs over a distinguished 20 year career after coming up through the ranks at West Ham and making his debut in the 1973/74 season. Long spells at Orient and Leeds then followed, and it was from the latter club that he came on loan to Luton in 1992 just as he was coming to the end of his career and the Hatters were about to be relegated from the top flight.

The Luton supporters were aggrieved that previous loanee Steve Sutton had not been signed on therefore Mervyn was seen as a poor replacement, but he did little wrong in a four game spell. Mervyn was assistant to Alan Curbishley at Charlton until last summer.

John (Dixie) Kelty DEANS

Dixie was a scoring revelation in Scotland for both Motherwell and Celtic, and bagged a hat-trick for the latter in a Scottish Cup final and six in a league game against Partick Thistle in 1973.

It was regarded as a big coup by Luton manager Harry Haslam when he brought the 30-year-old to Kenilworth Road in 1976, and he did not disappoint scoring six goals in 14 appearances including two on his debut against Sheffield United. Short and squat and the complete opposite of a lithe athlete, Dixie was a bull of a striker and brilliant in the air but indiscretions both on and off the pitch saw Haslam lose patience and he was packed off to Carlisle.

After a time playing in Australia, Dixie settled back in Scotland where he is still a publican.

Peter Robert DENTON

Peter had difficulty in earning a regular right wing slot at Coventry, such was the form of Ronnie Rees, and managed only ten starts in four years at Highfield Road as the Sky Blues moved up through the divisions.

Thoughts that a move to Fourth Division Luton in January 1968 would re-boot his career proved incorrect as he could never hope to displace the mercurial Graham French and he remained, as he had at Coventry, a good squad player who would never let the side down.

After spells with Margate and Canterbury as well as coaching at Kenilworth Road, Peter worked at Vauxhall, is now retired, and still lives in the Luton area.



Andrew (Andy) Gerald DIBBLE

Andy will always hold a special place in the hearts of Luton supporters due to his heroic display in goal during the 1988 Littlewoods Cup final when the Hatters beat Arsenal 3-2.

Welshman Andy started out with Cardiff, before moving to Luton for £125,000 in 1984 but early on in his Hatters career he suffered a bad injury at Manchester United and was from then on trying to get his place back from the remarkably consistent Les Sealey.

An injury to Sealey gave him his Littlewoods Cup chance, but, knowing he was likely to be back on the bench, Andy opted for a £240,000 move to Manchester City, and from there a dozen league clubs in a long career. Andy is now goalkeeping coach at Coventry.

Paul DICKOV

Feisty forward Paul is still giving top flight defenders nightmares at the age of 34 with his 'in your face' displays and total commitment.



Although born in Scotland, Paul started with Arsenal and it was while with the Gunners he came to Luton on loan in October 1993 to gain experience and scored once (a 1-0 home win over Notts County) in 15 whole hearted appearances.

A £1 million move to Manchester City followed in 1996 along with ten Scottish caps and, later on, further transfers to Leicester and Blackburn leading up to a return to the blue half of Manchester this summer.

Kerry Michael DIXON

Kerry became the 'one that got away' with Luton Town rejecting the local lad, and Hatters fan, as a youngster leaving him to make a name for himself at Dunstable Town before moving to Reading for £20,000.

A goal every other game for the Royals earned the big striker a dream move to Chelsea in 1983 where he became a terrace hero, netting 147 league goals and winning eight England caps in nine years at Stamford Bridge before entering into another big money move, this time to Southampton. The move did not work out and Kerry's career then turned full circle with a free transfer to Luton, where he weighed in with 19 goals and an appearance for the Town in an FA Cup semi-final against Chelsea in the twilight of his career. Kerry is now actively involved with Dunstable Town.



Michael (Mike) DIXON

Although born in Willesden, Mike was brought up in Luton, signing on professional terms at Kenilworth Road in 1957. Although a regular goalscorer for the Reserves, Mike managed only three League games up front for the Hatters, although his career was hampered by a fractured kneecap sustained at a Combination game at Southampton.

Moving to Coventry in 1961, Mike had scored 12 goals in 18 starts for the Bantams but a change of manager, with Jimmy Hill taking over the hot seat, and a further injury meant his days at Highfield Road were numbered.


A succession of non-league clubs then followed, including Cambridge United and Dunstable, but Mike drew consolation from son Kerry's later career in the game.

Gary Michael Thomas DOHERTY

Coming up through the ranks at Kenilworth Road the Ireland born but locally raised Gary formed part of a formidable Luton Town Youth side that reached the FA Youth Cup semi-finals in 1997.

Luton supporters could never be sure which was Gary's best position as he was equally adept in central defence and as a striker; and the same could be said after a big money move to Tottenham in April 2000 saw him appear all over the pitch at White Hart Lane.

A broken ankle saw the big Eire international out for a long spell and after returning to fitness he reluctantly accepted a move to Norwich where he has decided to concentrate on defending, becoming a mainstay in the Canaries back line.



In undoubtedly the game of the day between the division's top two sides, it was Preston that started the brighter at St Andrews.

David Nugent hit a post and Brett Ormerod went close before Blues cruelly claimed the lead through former Coventry City striker McSheffrey on 32 minutes.

He then doubled Birmingham's advantage five minutes before the break before Ormerod deservedly pulled a goal back on the stroke of half-time.

Deon Burton (83) then made it two for The Owls before Dion Dublin (85) pulled a goal back in a losing effort for The Canaries.


Finally, Leicester City defeated Midlands rivals Wolverhampton Wanderers 2-1 at Molineux.



Luton Town's Youth Team

Marvin Johnson's Youth Team progressed into the fourth round of the FA Youth Cup following a 1-0 win against Huddersfield

FA YOUTH CUP THIRD ROUND Luton Town 1 (Preston, 68) Huddersfield Town 0

Youth Team boss Marvin Johnson was very satisfied with his team's performance as they edged out a useful Huddersfield Town side in an exciting 1-0 win in the FA Youth Cup Third Round tie at Kenilworth Road, last Wednesday.

Russell Preston's cool finish midway through the second half put the young Hatters in the hat for last Friday's Fourth Round draw, in which Luton were drawn away for a trip to either Burnley or Milton Keynes Dons.

Preston had to be content with a place on the bench for last week's cup encounter, but he overcame his disappointment to deliver the perfect response to his Manager with a goal just eight minutes after coming on as a second half substitute.

Despite scoring during Huddersfield's best passage of play, Luton's Youth Team managed to preserve their lead without

too many scary moments against a side that had knocked out Luton's Puma Youth Alliance League rivals Northampton Town in the previous round.

Marvin said: "We deserved the result in the end. Huddersfield did have their moments in the game but I can't think they can go away too disappointed."

The Hatters' Championship status had delayed their entry into the FA Youth Cup until the third round, and progress beyond the next round would see the boys propelled into the last sixteen, which could pitch Marvin's young marvels in with any of the Premiership's big guns.

Marvin added: "The FA Youth Cup is the only real proper game where the boys will get to sample the life and see what it would be like if they made it as a professional footballer at this Club, with regards to preparation for a game.

"For example, for the Huddersfield game we came in for light training in the morning and then the lads went home

to get some rest until later on in the afternoon, and then reported for the game.

"If you get an away draw, we'd come in early in the morning and travel to where we are going. We'd then stop off on the way and have a pre-match meal, like the first team would do, and then go to the ground and play the game."

The FA Youth Cup also provides a rare opportunity for the players to play at Kenilworth Road, although some of the Premiership clubs still choose to use their academy pitches in order to preserve their hallowed turf.

"If we're going to draw those clubs then it's better to play them at home because you're still in a stadium environment. Playing in training complexes because they are trying to protect their pitch goes a little bit against the grain of the tournament.

"The boys are just happy to be in the competition, though, so they don't mind whoever they get."

It's with great sadness that Luton Town have learned of the passing of former player Peter Small, who was with the Club during the late 1940's.


Small arrived at Kenilworth Road from non-league Horsham in 1947 and made 27 appearances scoring five goals for the club.

The Miller Partnership

With the planning and design stages of the new stadium project well underway, many of you will be wondering who the people behind the scenes at The Miller Partnership are. After all, our future will be shaped by their vision. Our matchday programme staff caught up with senior partners Robert Kennedy and Gareth Yule this week to give them a grilling.

On the face of it, The Miller Partnership's reputation and standing is there for all to see. Just by looking on their website at www.millerpartnership.com their portfolio of successful design projects reveal some of the best sports stadia built in the UK and Europe over the last 25 years.

Having just been appointed by the Club as the architects to drive forward Luton Town's new stadium project, representatives from The Miller Partnership paid us a visit this week to outline their objectives and direction regarding the relocation of the Hatters' new home.

We could tell you all you want to know about the Glasgow-based firm, but we thought it would be better if they told you themselves.

Robert Kennedy (pictured, far left) is the Design Partner, and is mainly involved with the various teams in the early development stages.

Robert commenced: "We started doing stadiums back in 1981 when we developed Ibrox Park for Rangers. Since then we've been working on stadiums from Edinburgh all the way down to Southampton.

"This year we are fifty years old, so we've been around a while. There are five partners in the practice and three of us deal with sports stadia, so it's quite a big section of the practice."

Okay, so they've been around for a while, but can they tell us why Luton Town have put the Club's future in their hands?

Robert answered: "Our stadiums are well structured and they finish on time, which is always important for the clients. We've proven ourselves at developing stadiums and the market has really opened up for us."

Last year was a busy year for The Miller Partnership, as they had many high-profile projects on the go. If results are anything to go by, the year was certainly a huge success.

Robert added: "Last year we finished The Oval, the Ricoh Arena and the corners of Manchester United. These were all going on at once so it was certainly very hectic."

Having the vital role of shaping the commercial and operational aspects in the embryonic design period creates its own challenges, but Robert's 15 years' experience in this field stands him in good stead.

"A lot of the clubs learned about how you deal with hospitality and how you deal with the supporters, so we hope with Luton we'll be able to take it another stage further and the quality will be even greater."

Gareth Yule (pictured, left) is principally responsible for the implementation of management strategies and environmental practices. His experience in design, construction and contract administration will enable him to pull the various strings of the project together.

Gareth elaborated on the role he has played thus far: "We have been speaking with the football club and various other people who are now part of the jigsaw. It's quite a complicated development.

"We have started to develop the ideas that we have so far to try and bring an iconic statement, something that people would immediately recognise as Luton Town Football Club, that doesn't have to have a sign on to tell us what it is."


Early computer-generated impressions of the proposed stadium design have been widely circulated, although Gareth was keen to inform us that they are still a work in progress.

"Things will change as we go along as we understand what the football club wants to do, and as we speak in detail with all the people involved.

In a nutshell, then, what is the role that The Miller Partnership plays in the eyes of the Club and its supporters?

Over to Robert, who says: "We build the brief, which is going to encompass the accommodation, the finishes, the structural layouts, everything that the Club will need to put a price to this."

The final word was from Gareth, who stated: "It needs to be a home for the fans that they can be proud of, but it's also got to be able to work commercially on a day-to-day basis and meet the Club's future needs."





David Connolly's second half goal for Sunderland proved to be the match winner as Luton's long trip to the North East ended in disappointment.

Early signs were encouraging as Dean Morgan struck his second Championship goal of the season on five minutes as the Hatters made a lively start.

However, a controversial goal from Daryl Murphy just four minutes later meant Luton's lead was short lived.

To their credit, Luton showed more urgency in the first half, creating a number of excellent chances with Rowan Vine guilty of missing two openings.

Morgan's goal, his third of the season, arrived after he had received a pass from Carlos Edwards on the edge of the Sunderland area. After seeing his

initial effort blocked, the ball fell kindly back to the striker who took one touch to fire an unstoppable shot beyond the reach of Sunderland goalkeeper Marton Fulop.

The Hatters struggled to show the same tempo in the second half as Connolly's neat finish extended Sunderland's unbeaten run in the Championship.

But moments later Sunderland also found the target, although Luton were adamant that Murphy handled the ball in the build-up to his fifth goal of the season. With Leon Barnett trying to loop the ball over Murphy's head, the Sunderland striker seemingly used to his hand to push the ball into his path and strike a shot into the roof of the net from an acute angle.

Connolly grabbed the winner by turning in the box to beat Kiely from ten yards.



TRAVEL GUIDE



By Car: Take the M1 southbound, joining the M25. Take the M25 towards the M11 and exit at junction 28 to join the A12. Leave the A12 before you reach Colchester at the Halstead/Cambridge turn off. Turn right at top of slip road and continue along Essex Yeomanry Way, before turning left at the roundabout into London Road. Proceed for just over 3/4 mile to traffic lights (MFI store on your right). Turn right at lights and follow this road until you reach its end where a pub (Leather Bottle) is on left. Turn left and follow until traffic lights at Boadecia Way, 3/4 mile, where you turn right. Go to its end and then turn left; this is Layer Road and the ground is about 1/4 mile further down on left.

Parking: The club does not have its own parking facilities and there is no street parking on the part of Layer Road surrounding the stadium. Nearby streets have limited street parking, but supporters should allow time to walk back to the ground if they arrive after 2:00pm



The Sky Blues will be making a pre-Christmas visit to Kenilworth Road hoping to keep their current good form intact and collect an early present of three points.

Currently nestled in mid table, but within striking distance of the play-off places, manager Micky Adams is hoping to mount a challenge for promotion.

In a recent interview the former Leicester and Brighton boss has said that he is happy with his squad, which includes four on loan players from Sunderland, Celtic and Peterborough.

Adams is confident that his team can sustain a reasonable run of form after three wins in their last six away matches against Barnsley, Southend and QPR.

The match with QPR threw up a surprise when the coach taking them to the ground managed to get stuck in the North London traffic and the team had to disembark and use the tube to arrive on time for the match.

Luton Town's recent form against Coventry doesn't make pleasant reading for the Hatters, with the Sky Blues doing the double last season. Luton lost 1 - 0 at the new Ricoh Stadium last year with Dele Adebola netting for Coventry.

At Kenilworth Road the Blues again collected all three points winning 2 - 1. Stern John opened the scoring in the first half with Gary McSheffrey hitting the back of the net a minute later.


