




I have great pleasure in writing my first manager's message since I took over as caretaker-manager just under a fortnight ago and I hope that it will be the first of many.

Everyone is disappointed and frustrated with our recent run of form and results, which I feel is justified, as we have failed to live up to the standards we set ourselves at the start of the season. We're fully aware that our level of performance is not as it should be and we're attempting to implement a number of measures to ensure that we get back on track right away.

Our defeat against Plymouth Argyle last Monday night was a massive disappointment to everyone, because once again, individual errors cost us. It didn't help us that the game was played in appalling conditions, which made it really difficult for both sides to get the ball down and play decent football.

There are aspects of our play which are continually letting us down and that's hard to stomach as they are mainly down to individual mistakes. If it was a collective mistake I think it would be easier to take, as that can be rectified. But it's much harder when players are doing things which are uncharacteristic. We don't expect that and it is costing us dearly. We can't keep coming back to this same old problem.

We signed Irish central-defender Colin Hawkins in the week on an 18-month contract after he impressed during a short trial with us. I've spoken to some very influential people in Irish football and they have nothing but praise for Colin, who was part of the Shelbourne side which won the Eircom League in 2006. We had some great reports of Colin from when he played in the Champions League preliminary rounds against Deportivo La Coruna and Steaua Bucharest and I think that's underlined that he's shown the potential to cut it at the highest level.

It's a little ironic that he's returned to Coventry City almost a decade after being released by the Club as a youngster but football is like that sometimes. It's a great opportunity for Colin to show what he can do and I think it was a little bit strange for him to come into the canteen and see people who remembered him when he was here a decade ago! He may get his chance sooner rather than later because of the injury situation we have at the Club but I'm sure it's an opportunity he'll want to take.

Although I do not want to use this as an excuse, we have been plagued by a number of injuries throughout this season, including the recent one to Elliott Ward. Elliott has been to see a specialist and we are hopeful of some news soon as to when he can return to action, as he has been sorely missed.

I'm delighted that Michael Mifsud got his first goal for Coventry City at Plymouth, which will undoubtedly boost his confidence. I don't think anyone should underestimate what a terrific volley it was in atrocious conditions at Home Park and the great technique Michael showed. His fitness levels are also getting higher after not playing for a couple of months and I think he has shown what an exciting talent he can be.

I'm very proud to hold the position of caretaker manager at present and I would dearly love to take the job on a permanent basis. I hope the supporters will back me in that. I understand that every fan will have their favourite to come in as manager, but with a little bit of luck and a lot of support, you never know where we can go over the next few weeks.

I'd like to extend a warm welcome to Mike Newell and the players, staff and supporters who have travelled to the Ricoh Arena for tonight's game. Like us, Luton have had a sticky run of late, which I am sure won't have been helped by the sales of Carlos Edwards and Rowan Vine, who will be sorely missed. But football moves on, and I know Luton will give us a tough game this evening as both sides try to get back on track.

On a personal note, I'd like to lend my support to Mike for the comments he has made in recent months about agents and female officials. While I do not agree with everything he said, I think it's important to reiterate that we live in a democracy and everyone is entitled to their opinion. I think Mike is very brave to raise his head above the parapet and say what he - and a lot of other people - are thinking.



It is now two weeks since Micky Adams left his post of manager of Coventry City Football Club and I am well aware that many of our supporters are wondering what the future holds for the Sky Blues.

As I said at the time, Micky's departure was by no means a hasty decision that myself and the Board came to after our FA Cup exit against Bristol City. It was a judgement on our form and alarming slide down the table since the middle of December.

Micky Adams gave this position his best shot, he gave it 100% but unfortunately it just did not work. The only judgement on Micky was the league table and we as a Board sometimes have to make tough decisions like this and take a different route. That's what we have decided to do and we'll stick with it. Only the future will tell if it is the right one.

All we wanted the manager to do was to win games. We gave him total support. Every player that he wanted we went out and got for him. We are committed to our three-year quest to get Coventry City back into the Premiership and believe that tough decisions like this will sometimes be needed to fulfil that aim.

There are a lot of managers out of work across football and as a result, we have received a lot of quality applications - over 40 prior to the weekend.



the past, and he has grasped this position with both hands. He has a great relationship with the existing players and a lot of people at Coventry City, and who knows, he might be a huge success.

If we win tonight and that instigates a positive run of results, not only will it put a halt to our poor run of form - something that I and everybody connected with the Club is desperate to see happen - but it will also strengthen Adrian's case to take the job on a permanent basis.

That goes without saying but as we all know, so much can change in football in such a short space of time and during this interim period we will have to wait and see what transpires. I have the utmost faith that Adrian can do a great job in the caretaker manager role. If I didn't, he would not have been offered the position, and let's hope that we can regain our winning mentality very soon.

Over the course of the next week or so I, along with the rest of the selection panel, will be going through the list of applicants to decide a long-list, and then a short-list, of the people we feel fit the criteria we are setting.

We have had long meetings with Sports Consultants to help us decide the exact qualities we require in our new manager. This will be one of the most important decisions the Club makes this decade.

Over the past year we have been restructuring the Club operationally and commercially and we feel that the time has now come to extend that restructuring to the playing side. We have always known that returning to the Premiership as a strong, healthy club would require us to reorganise and modernise the Club in all respects. Only in this way can we be sure that the Club will grow and prosper in the coming years.

We need to build a sustainable 'culture' at Coventry City - one that identifies us and sets us apart from other clubs, one that underpins everything that we do. As we move into a new 'management' era at the Club we now intend to appoint a manager who is willing to work to a common plan for success and is open to exploring new methods of achieving it.

We intend to make more use of scientific methods and best practice policies to support the manager and players. We want to instil a new culture into the fabric of the way we do everything on the playing side of the Club, so we can build sustainable depth, stability and long term continuity for the future.

I hope that as loyal Coventry fans, you will support us in this pursuit of progress and support the new manager and systems that will soon emerge. As always I am keen to hear your views on these matters and I look forward to sharing greater success with you in the coming years.

Adrian is obviously in the hot-seat at the moment and he is certainly someone who will be short-listed for the position. In Adrian we have somebody who has had a few managerial posts in

Micky departs



On Tuesday January 17 2007, Micky Adams and Coventry City Football Club parted company after a run of results which had seen the Sky Blues go eight games without a win, culminating in the 2-0 defeat to Bristol City in the FA Cup Third Round replay at the Ricoh Arena.

Adams had been manager for almost exactly two years, saving the Club from relegation from the Championship during his first four months in charge, and then leading City to a finish in eighth place in 2005/2006. He took charge of 99 games, 33 of which ended in victory, 40 in defeat and 26 all square.

After a massive squad recruitment last summer - with no less than 12 new arrivals before the start of the season, and four more joining since then - Coventry made a solid start to this campaign. Following a 1-0 home victory over Burnley in December, we sat in 10th place in the Championship, having amassed 33 points to sit just three points outside the top six.

A 5-0 away defeat to West Brom on December 16 instigated a bad run of form, which saw City take just one point from a possible 18, leaving the team, at the time of writing, nearer to the relegation zone than the play-off places.

Managing Director Paul Fletcher explained that the decision for Adams' departure was by no means a rushed one.

"This is a decision that the Board of Coventry City Football Club has not taken lightly," said Paul.

"Everyone at the Club has supported Micky 100%, but unfortunately, results have not gone as well as we all anticipated given the substantial investment in the team."

"We are committed to our three-year quest to get Coventry City back into the Premiership and believe that tough decisions like this will sometimes be needed to fulfil that aim as is sadly the case today. I join the Board in wishing Micky all the best for the future."

On the same day that Micky Adams left the Club, his assistant Adrian Heath - who has managerial experience with Burnley, Sheffield United as well as taking charge of three matches for City in January 2005 - stepped into the caretaker manager's role, stating:

"When they asked me if I'd take the job on for the foreseeable future I thought I'd give it a go. Like most people who work in football I want to be as high up the ladder as I can be, and being the manager is the ultimate job."

"This is an opportunity for me and one that you don't get too often. It's a big club, with a proud history in the Premier League. It's fallen on hard times a little bit over the last few years but it's a great opportunity for me."

"I'd like to place on record my thanks to Micky because I've certainly enjoyed working with him these last couple of years. Obviously we're all disappointed because a couple of years ago I was in the same boat when Peter Reid decided he didn't want to carry on."



"It was only about six weeks ago that we were on a five-match unbeaten run and on the verge of the play-offs. It shows how quickly football changes. We've gone from looking at our next five fixtures wondering if we can push on and make it into the top six, and ended up looking over our shoulder behind us. That's obviously culminated in Micky losing his job."

"This is a very good football club, we need to start winning some games and if we do that, who knows what can happen?"

Reserve team manager and first team coach Alan Cork also parted company with the Sky Blues, having been brought to the Sky Blues by Micky Adams in January 2005.

Paul Fletcher said: "We thank Alan for his hard work over the last two years and we wish him all the best in the future."


Mac's back

David McNamee made his comeback from injury in City's last outing against Plymouth, playing the entire 90 minutes against the Pilgrims after being sidelined for more than three months with a torn hamstring.

Signed in the summer from Scottish side Livingston, the full-back suffered the injury in the game against Wolves in October and his return is a timely boost for Coventry, who have been short of numbers in defence after the departure of Matt Heath and Mikkel Bischoff and an injury to Elliott Ward.

The 26-year-old played in the first three games of the season but was injured against Cardiff and was forced to sit out six matches. His comeback was shortlived though and after only another four games in the side - a spell broken up after he was sent-off against Crystal Palace at Selhurst Park - he was forced to endure a lengthy spell in the treatment room when he suffered a bad tear to his hamstring at Molineux.


Andrews loaned to Robins

Wayne Andrews has joined Bristol City on a month long loan.

The striker only returned to Coventry on January 1 after a loan spell at Sheffield Wednesday but with first-team opportunities limited, the former Crystal Palace man has linked-up with Gary Johnson's Robins.

The 29-year-old has made a positive start, scoring two goals in his first two games for the League One outfit. He was on target on his debut in the 2-0 win against Oldham, and then found the back of the net again against Brighton in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy.

First goal for Mifsud



He is yet to start a game for the Sky Blues, but Michael Mifsud has shown enough in two brief substitute appearance to let City fans know he could be a very useful addition to the playing squad.

On a deeply disappointing night at the Ricoh Arena in the FA Cup replay defeat to Bristol City, Mifsud's fleeting substitute appearance was one of the few bright points, as he demonstrated an excellent touch as well as giving a glimpse of his powerful shot, which he used to full effect against Plymouth.

Entering the game with half an hour left on the clock and City trailing by three goals to one, the Maltese international played in a wide right role, and took only nine minutes to find the back of the net and give the Sky Blues hope of staging a comeback.

And although his effort did not ultimately earn City any points, the quality of his strike - a sweetly struck volley from 15 yards - demonstrated his technical ability and eye for goal.

Mifsud could be in line for his full debut this evening if named in the starting line-up against Luton.

Thornton back in the frame

Kevin Thornton has made a timely comeback from injury, the young midfielder coming on as a substitute in each of City's last two matches.

Thornton is one of the many players who has been struck down this term, with a knee injury sidelining him since late October.

The Irishman - who has scored one goal this season, the winner against Hull back in August - gave an industrious performance in midfield as a second half substitute against Bristol City, and also played the final half an hour against Plymouth.

As his match fitness improves Thornton could well play a more prominent role in City's games in the not too distant future.

It is extremely common for clubs at this level to sell their best players and Luton are the latest Championship outfit to have seen supposedly "bigger" clubs - albeit ones in the same division as them - come and tempt some of their most exciting prospects away in recent weeks.

It is an inevitability, not just in football but in life, that the cream will always rise to the top and with the domestic transfer market now seemingly flourishing once again after its collapse during the early stages of the 21st century, many clubs at this level and below have no choice but to cash in on the prized assets.

And as Luton's Directors revealed following the sale of Carlos Edwards and Rowan Vine to Sunderland and Birmingham respectively, they did not want to let their top scorer (Vine) and an international calibre midfielder (Edwards) go, but had little choice and had to do what they perceived to be the best thing for the Club.

"Following the recent sales of Carlos Edwards and Rowan Vine there have been a number of supporters questioning the ambition of the Club," read an official statement.

"At no time have we wanted to sell any players or put any pressure on our management to do so. The simple facts are that in the modern game external influences play a key part in determining player's futures. In both cases we had offers for the players concerned, which are first given to our Manager to determine if they meet his valuation.

"The initial offers were turned down for the very reasons given, that we did not want to sell and in any event the prices offered were not acceptable. In both cases further offers followed, and as we all know from various reports in the national press other people - external to the Club - were trying to influence the outcome at the same time.

"We then have the modern day dilemma, the prices being offered meeting the Manager's valuation and the players are informed accordingly. Thereafter it is very much in the hands of the player and his agent.

"The only positive point from the Club's perspective is that we are now in a position to ensure no player is sold cheaply, as has happened in the past."

Indeed, you do not have to rewind the clock too far for a period when Luton were in a much worse position than the one they find themselves in now. They spent one season in the basement division in 2001/2002 and came out of a spell in the hands of the receivers in the summer of 2004.

In his second season in charge of the Club Mike Newell led them to the summit of League One and following their promotion as champions of that division in 2004/2005, the former Blackburn striker helped them towards a good first season in the Championship last time out, finishing tenth after prolonged spells inside the top six.


The Liverpudlian was supportive of his Board's decision to sell Edwards and Vine for £1.4m and £2.5m respectively, stating:

"It's very difficult when you have to sell players. It's a fact of life that we are in that position. As I said when I came here three-and-a-half years ago, if we can bring in players and they eventually move on for a profit then in the long run - and I know it's hard to swallow for a lot of supporters at the moment - then it will make the Club stronger."

"If it doesn't then there's something wrong, but it will do. It's impossible to stand in the way of players when they can earn three or four times what they can earn here and play in front of 20,000-plus fans every week."

What the immediate future holds for Luton remains to be seen but already Newell has re-invested in his squad, bringing defender Matthew Spring back to the Club.

And with plans to move to a new stadium near Junction 12 of the M1 in the offing, perhaps it will not be too long before the Hatters have their sights firmly fixed on a return to the Premiership and they'll be the club poaching other side's star players.

Need to know

Recent form

Luton's league form has taken an alarming dip following a good start to the season and the Hatters have only won twice in the last 16 Championship fixtures.

They are without a league win since they ran out 3-1 victors against the Sky Blues at Kenilworth Road on December 3, having lost three and drawn two of their last five matches.

As previously mentioned, Luton's start to the campaign was a positive one. They amassed six wins in their first 13 matches and following a 5-1 victory against Leeds in mid-October, they sat in fifth place in the table with a handsome 22 points.

That result was followed by a 4-0 defeat against Everton in the Carling Cup and they subsequently lost their next seven league matches, starting with a 5-0 thumping at Ipswich.

They have collected just nine points out of a possible 48 since October and despite making it through to the Fourth Round of the FA Cup (Luton took on Blackburn on Saturday), Mike Newell will see ensuring Championship safety as a priority.

They have won just two away games in the league this season and have not collected three points on their travels since they beat Barnsley 2-1 at Oakwell at the end of September.

January 24: Luton 1 QPR 0, FA Cup Rd3 replay
Luton won the right to host Premiership Blackburn in the Fourth Round of the FA Cup with QPR man Zesh Rehman putting into his own net with just 10 minutes left on the clock. All the drama came in the last 15 minutes, as Stefan Bailey saw red for a lunge on Ahmet Brkovic before Rehman put Dean Morgan's shot into his own net.

January 20: Luton 0 Barnsley 2

Barnsley secured their first away league win since August thanks to goals from Brian Howard and Martin Devaney. Tykes midfielder Howard broke powerfully into Luton's penalty area in the seventh minute to fire home left-footed into the bottom corner. Howard turned provider in the last minute when his pass set up Devaney and he shot low into the Luton net.

January 12: West Brom 3 Luton 2

Kevin Phillips scored two late goals to snatch victory for West Brom. Jason Koumas opened the scoring for the Baggies before goals from Keith Keane and Warren Feeney then put Luton in front. Phillips resisted several attempted tackles to equalise from 10 yards late on before dramatically heading home a free-kick in injury time.



Ones to watch

Chris Coyne

Age: 28
Nationality: Australian
Position: Centre-back

Coyne first came to the attention of a UK-based manager when he was playing for Perth Soccer Club and was selected for the Australian Under-17 squad for the 1994 youth World Cup. He caught Harry Redknapp's eye and he signed him for West Ham as a teenager.

Premiership chances were few and far between, and after loan spells at Brentford and Southend, Coyne went to Dundee. A £50,000 cheque persuaded the Scottish Premier League club to let the defender move to Kenilworth Road in September 2001 and Coyne rapidly became a crowd favourite in the promotion run that followed.

A whole-hearted performer, Coyne has gone on to become one of the first names on the teamsheet each week and captains the side superbly thanks to his never-say-die attitude and fearsome approach to the game.


Keith Keane

Age: 20
Nationality: Republic of Ireland
Position: Right-midfield

A product of the Luton Academy, Keane made his debut for the Hatters aged just 16 in November 2003 and went on to enjoy an extended run in the side while Kevin Foley was out injured. He finished the season with 14 appearances under his belt, all this whilst still in the first year of his scholarship.

Keane - who has represented the Republic of Ireland at youth team level - joined the Hatters at the age of nine having been scouted in local football.

Appearances have been limited for the 20-year-old this season, but when called upon he has proven to be an extremely adept performer, most comfortable on the right-hand side of midfield - a position which allows him to burst forward to great effect to provide many goals for himself and his teammates.



Dean Morgan

Age: 23
Nationality: English
Position: Striker

Morgan has already proved what he is capable of against the Sky Blues once this season, scoring with a cracking volley to make it 3-1 to Luton at Kenilworth Road last December.

Morgan signed for the Hatters from Reading in July 2005 after seeing his opportunities limited at the Madjeski Stadium and became an instant favourite with Luton fans after his 90th minute winner in the 3-2 victory over Southampton in August 2005.

The former Colchester striker has four goals to his credit so far this season and with the departure of Rowan Vine, his contributions will be increasingly important as we approach the business end of the campaign.

Ahmet Brkovic

Age: 32
Nationality: Croatian
Position: Winger

Another player to have found the back of the net against the Sky Blues last month is Brkovic, although as well as scoring at the right end, he turned past his own keeper as well.

It was always going to take something out of the ordinary to beat an inspired Dean Kiely that day, but the Croatian will be hoping that he only scores at the right end from his point-of-view this evening.

A tidy and hardworking player, Brkovic was in top form during Luton's championship success in League One, scoring 16 goals from midfield.

The 32-year-old is more suited to a right wing role but is equally comfortable playing on the left, a position he filled on many occasions last season.



Window of opportunity

With the transfer window due to close tomorrow, there has been considerable activity down at Kenilworth Road this January.

At the time of writing, it was outgoing deals which had attracted the most attention with Trinidad and Tobago international **Carlos Edwards** joining Sunderland for a fee of £1.4m and top scorer **Rowan Vine** linking up with Birmingham for a reported figure of £2.5m.

The two players will undoubtedly be missed by the Hatters. Edwards was a key creator of goals, with his flying runs and excellent crossing ability providing the ammunition for the likes of Vine to get the goals.

And Vine - who once hit a hat-trick against the Sky Blues during his Colchester days - was showing fine form this term, having scored 14 goals in all competitions to put him right up there with the very best strikers in the Championship - a return which caught the eye of high fliers Birmingham who swooped to add the 24-year-old to their squad with injuries ruling out the likes of Nicklas Bendtner.

Another less high profile departure came with the end of goalkeeper **Dean Kiely**'s loan spell, although any Coventry fans who were at Kenilworth Road just over a month ago, will be grateful that the shot stopper isn't between the sticks again.

The former Coventry trainee's performance was nothing short of world class and a string of fine saves left Micky Adams scratching his head as to how his side had failed to take anything from the game.

Kiely played 11 games during a loan spell from Portsmouth, which expired on January 24.

At the time of writing Luton had made just one signing, although it cannot exactly be classed as new one.

Matthew Spring (below right) has re-joined the Club, signing a two-and-a-half year deal, having left the Hatters to join Leeds in 2004.

"It was an opportunity too good to turn down, really," explained Mike Newell. "I would never have let him go had we not been in administration and had his contract not been up."

"It's an indication of how much he feels for the Club that he turned down at least one other club to come back here."

"Maybe it gives you an indication of what he believes will happen here in the future."

Spring spent just one season with Leeds before joining Luton's rivals Watford but Newell said that was not an issue for him.

"He never mentioned it when I spoke to him, and I didn't see it as a problem. He didn't leave here for Watford, he went there via Leeds."

"I can't influence what supporters are thinking, but if he puts a Luton shirt on and he performs well and starts scoring goals for us then I would imagine that any Luton supporter will back him."

Spring had been at Luton since he was a schoolboy, and signed as a trainee in July 1997. He went on to score 30 goals for the Club in 289 appearances.

Last week Newell was still hopeful of bringing in more players, who could feature against the Sky Blues tonight.

"We will, before the deadline, bring in more players," said the Luton boss. "We are progressing and by the end of January we would hope to have another two here."

"I would never turn down the opportunity to get a good player. We are looking in other areas as well to strengthen but there isn't, at the moment, another Matthew Spring to bring here."

Hawkins comes home



Adrian Heath strengthened City's defence by signing centre-back Colin Hawkins late last week and the Irishman is no stranger to the Club having been a member of the youth set-up here a decade ago.

Hawkins links-up with the Sky Blues once again having spent the majority of the last decade playing in the Irish league for Bohemians and, most recently Shelbourne FC.

The 29-year-old has penned an 18-month contract with the Sky Blues and expressed his delight to be here.

"It's very exciting to be here again," he said. "It's 10 years since I left the City so it's a great opportunity for me and I'm delighted to be here.

"I arrived over here for a two-day trial and I was obviously impressed by the stadium, Adrian Heath and the whole coaching staff so it was up to me to show what I could do on the pitch and luckily everything's worked out and I'm delighted that I signed an 18-month contract."

Hawkins has won Irish League titles as well as gaining considerable Champions League experience with both Bohemians and Shelbourne and says that in just a week of training with the Sky Blues, he knows City have the ability to turn around their current poor run of form.

"It's a great stadium and looking at the teams we've got coming up it's a huge challenge for me personally. I know we have experienced a few defeats recently but having seen the quality in the squad I know it will take just one win to change things.

"There is no reason why we should be down there for too much longer and I'm hoping to play my part in turning things around if the manager gives me a chance.

"I'm coming here to do as good a job as possible. I know there's been a few goals conceded recently so hopefully I can play my part and inspire a few other people around me.

"I've always been known as being a bit of a leader on the pitch - that's what I'm hopefully looking to bring to the team."

Hawkins has not played for over two months since the Irish League finished but says he has been working on his fitness and will be raring to go should he be named in the side against Luton tonight.

"They've done their best to get my fitness levels up. They've tried everything in training and put me right through my paces.

"It was like my first day of pre-season training to be honest on Tuesday. If I'm given the opportunity to play against Luton I'll definitely be up for it."

With so much change at the Club in recent months, let alone over the last ten years, there weren't too many familiar faces for Hawkins when he arrived at Ryton, although there were one or two who were here when he last was.

"I lived at the Sky Blue Lodge for a year which is where we train so there's a couple of faces I still recognise. Ros works in the canteen and Roy and Maria, who used to look after me at the Lodge, aren't too far away.

"Marcus Hall is the only one on the playing staff who was here then. He was just breaking into the first team and he was an England Under 21 international so we all looked up to him.

"It's good to have a few faces you recognise because it helps you settle in."

Club Connections

Over the Years

Luton have not enjoyed the best of fortunes at Coventry over the years. They have won three games here in all competitions but only two in the league on City's turf.

The last time the Hatters came away from Coventry victorious was on New Year's Day 1987 when they won by a solitary goal to nil from Brian Stein during manager John Moore's first season in control of Luton.

The Sky Blues had plenty of shots on goal only to be thwarted by former City shot stopper Les Sealey who was in fine form and received a fair bit of stick from the Sky Blue Army, resulting in the eccentric keeper doing cartwheels at the final whistle.



You have to rewind the clock to the 1930/31 season for Luton's only other league win in Coventry when a Division Three (south) encounter ended in a 2-1 victory for the Hatters.

In all, Coventry have won 22 of the 31 league matches against Luton on their own patch, with six ending in a draw and only three in defeat.

They wore both shirts

Amongst the players to have made the permanent switch from Coventry to Luton is Trevor Peake who, after 334 appearances for the Sky Blues during an eight-year spell - in which time he established a reputation as one of the classiest central defenders in the Club's history - made the move to Kenilworth Road in 1991.

He was snapped up for £100,000 and certainly gave the Hatters value for money as he made in excess of 200 appearances for them, playing his last Luton game in September 1997 at the age of 40. Les Sealey and Graham Rodger have also made the short trip down the M1 and more recently, Coventry lent Luton the services of Gary McSheffrey.

The striker was first loaned out to Kenilworth Road at the start of the 2003/2004 campaign when he netted an impressive nine goals in 19 appearances. He spent another stint on loan there the following campaign, scoring once in five games.

Coventry's last purchase from Luton was Paul Telfer who joined City for £1.15m and went on to make 225 appearances for the Sky Blues between 1995 and 2001, scoring 12 goals.

The last time we met

City travelled to Kenilworth Road in December in search of some festive cheer having suffered a 5-0 thumping at the hands of West Brom the week before.

Changes to the side included Luke Steele replacing the injured Andy Marshall in goal, following his emergency loan from the Baggies. Mikkel Bischoff made his full debut in place of the suspended Robert Page. Stephen Hughes was also recalled to the starting eleven and Leon McKenzie returned after a one-match ban, with Marcus Hall and Darren Currie dropping to the bench. The home side took the lead on the stroke of half time, despite City bossing much of the opening period only to be denied by the superb Dean Kiely in the Hatters' goal.



Ahmet Brkovic found the target for Luton, but he turned past his own keeper to pull the Sky Blues level early in the second half. Mike Newell's men responded quickly and goals from Rowan Vine and Dean Morgan earned the Hatters all three points and left Micky Adams wondering how his side had failed to take anything from the tie.

Last season, City came away from Kenilworth Road with a 2-1 victory in the two teams' first league encounter since the 1991/1992 campaign - the last time that Luton were a top flight club.

Two goals in as many minutes from Stern John and Gary McSheffrey gave the Sky Blues the advantage before Ady Williams' late own goal proved nothing more than a consolation for Luton.

The last time the sides met at the Ricoh, a Dele Adebola goal was enough to earn Coventry all three points in what was City's seventh game at their new home.



40 Years on

with Club Historian Jim Brown

1966-67: A Season to Remember
Part Fifteen: January 1967

To celebrate the 40th anniversary of Coventry City's historic promotion to the top flight under the guidance of Jimmy Hill, official historian Jim Brown looks back on a memorable campaign for the Sky Blues.



With the big FA Cup tie against Newcastle looming the following Saturday Jimmy Hill had to use all his powers to prepare the side for a visit to Ashton Gate on 21 January. Over 3,000 City fans made the trip to Bristol confident the team could continue their nine-match unbeaten run. The Robins were languishing near the foot of the table but had beaten second-placed Wolves in their last home game.

For the third away game running the Sky Blues fell behind. Former Wolves and England forward Chris Crowe was left unmarked at a corner after 11 minutes and volleyed home. City were level three minutes later when George Curtis soared above everyone to head home a Ronnie Rees corner. Bristol bounced back after 18 minutes with Terry Bush taking advantage of some dithering by Dave Clements to make it 2-1.

After 36 minutes City were on terms again with the best goal of the game. Dietmar Bruck, City's man of the match, hit a thunderous shot past Bristol 'keeper Gibson from 25 yards when there appeared to be no danger. That concluded the scoring but it was still a fascinating battle on a strength-sapping muddy pitch. City were on top in the early stages of the second half but had only one chance - a Machin header which Mike Gibson fumbled and dropped behind him. He recovered to fall on the ball on the goal line but Machin claimed it had crossed the line.

In the latter stages Bristol went for the winner and Glazier had to be on top form to stop them, tipping a great Peters' effort over the bar. Afterwards Hill expressed satisfaction at the point: 'We keep picking up the points nicely while the others waver.' With Wolves drawing 0-0 at Blackburn, City retained their two point lead over the Wanderers but Carlisle, 2-1 winners over Ipswich, were now level on points with Wolves.

Jimmy concluded transfer business the following Tuesday when he signed Portsmouth midfield player Brian Lewis. The fee was £35,000, but with Ray Pointer joining Pompey, City had to pay out only £20,000. Lewis did not qualify to play against Newcastle and

would have to wait for his City debut. Also leaving the Club was 20-year old reserve goalkeeper Peter Thomas who joined Irish

club Waterford for a small fee. Thomas had impressed at Waterford on loan the previous summer and now made the move permanent. Newcastle arrived for the Cup-tie with a massive following. Black and White scarves were in evidence in the Precinct as early as Friday tea-time and there were an estimated 12,000 Geordies in the 35,748 crowd, which included England manager Alf Ramsey.

In an effort to keep First Division football at St James's Park manager Joe Harvey had spent £140,000 on five new players including Welsh centre-forward Wyn Davies, one of the best headers of the ball in the country, Chelsea's winger Tommy Robson and giant centre-half John McNamee from Hibs. The team however lay in 21st place and relegation looked a distinct possibility.

In one of the most sensational starts ever known at the ground Newcastle scored twice in the first three minutes before City pulled a goal back in the fourth minute. Only a minute had gone when a swift Newcastle counter-attack caught City short at the back. Davies shrugged off George Curtis's challenge and planted a firm shot past Glazier. Number two came from a left wing free-kick which City failed to clear and Bryan 'Pop' Robson ran in to score with an angled shot. McNamee turned a fierce Rees cross shot into his own net and it was 1-2.

After 21 minutes City showed their fighting spirit by levelling the scores. Rees broke on the left-wing, centered, and Ian Gibson running full pelt towards goal got his head to it to steer it past Gordon Marshall in the visitor's goal. The superb goal however came at a price - Gibson injured himself stretching and by half-time was unfit to carry on.

City were now on top and the Magpies defence looked decidedly shaky but out of the blue the First Division side took the lead again. Dave Hillyer bamboozled Mick Kearns on the right and his cross found Davies who scored from short range.

The pace did not slow in the second half but without Gibson, City lacked their cutting edge. Gould however missed a glorious chance to make it 3-3 but miskicked when it looked easier to score. With 15 minutes left Davies completed his hat-trick with a well directed header and then Rees reduced the arrears within a minute only for Gould to miss an even better chance by blasting over from eight yards.

The thrilling game ended as it started with end to end football and drama and Newcastle probably just deserving their win thanks to that extra bit of top division class. Experienced referee Leo Callaghan described it as 'the most exciting Cup-tie I have ever handled' whilst George Curtis said: 'Wyn Davies is undoubtedly a greatly improved player since I last played against him'.

City were out of the FA Cup but many fans weren't sorry, they remembered 1963/64 when City had gone out at the first hurdle and they had been able to concentrate on promotion. Nuneaton Borough meanwhile were still in the Cup after a 1-1 home draw with Second Division Rotherham in front of 17,000 at Manor Park. Paul Cutler gave the Southern League side a first half lead but Chambers equalised for the Millers. Sadly in the replay at Millmoor over 22,000 saw Borough lose 1-0 and go out.

Elsewhere in the FA Cup there were few surprises. The biggest shock was at Upton park where the Hammers were held 3-3 by lowly Third Division Swindon with two goals from Don Rogers. Swindon completed the Hammers embarrassment by winning the replay 3-1. First Division leaders Liverpool drew 0-0 at Third Division Watford whilst the biggest crowd of the day was at Old Trafford where 63,000 saw United beat Stoke 2-0.

This week 40 years ago

In midweek City's youth team progressed to the fourth round of the FA Youth Cup with a 2-1 replay win over Swansea. A crowd of 3,122 saw a Don Peachey brace of goals put Pat Saward's young charges through to an away tie with Port Vale.

In local non-league soccer Lockheed Leamington beat Gainsborough Trinity 1-0 at home thanks to another Ray Holmes goal. City's A Team lost 1-0 at Redditch whilst the B Team slumped to a 10-0 loss at Leicester.

In Rugby Union the touring Australia team beat the Barbarians 17-11 at Cardiff Arms Park. Coventry pulled off an excellent 10-0 victory at Swansea with two tries from Melville.

22-year old local athlete Dick Taylor won the Inter-Counties cross country championship at Leicester beating top runners such as Ron Hill, Bruce Tulloh and Gerry North. It was not good enough to win Warwickshire the county title however, they finished fourth behind winners Surrey.

Peter Thomas



If you mention the name Peter Thomas in the pubs of the Irish town of Waterford few middle-aged males will not know who you are talking about. The Coventry-born goalkeeper played for the local team for almost 20 years and even won two full Irish caps. In Coventry however Peter is largely forgotten - he played just one competitive game for the Sky Blues.

Peter grew up in Coventry and was an 18-year old apprentice electrician playing in goal for GEC in 1965 when he was invited for a trial at Ryton. Bill Glazier was recovering from a broken leg and with his understudy Bob Wesson promoted, Jimmy Hill wanted a reserve keeper. Peter and youth team keeper Martin Clamp shared the duties during 1965-66.

In 1966, with Glazier recovered, Wesson was released to Walsall and Peter was loaned out to Waterford who were managed by an old friend of Hill's. In November 1966 an injury to Glazier forced Hill to send an SOS to Ireland and recall Thomas to Highfield Road, playing his one and only game at the stadium against Cardiff City.

City, inspired by the recall of Ian Gibson, led 3-0 until the last two minutes when a young John Toshack scored twice to put some respectability to the scoreline. Thomas acquitted himself well and appeared for the first team again three days later in a friendly with Scottish club Morton, another 3-2 win.

Four days later at Wolves, Glazier was fit again and Thomas's first team career was over. In January 1967 he returned to Waterford permanently. His team dominated Irish club football for the next decade winning six league titles in eight years and Peter, now aged 62, has wonderful memories of the period.

'We won every domestic honour and represented the country in the European Cup. I played against Manchester United the year after they won the European Cup, crack Hungarian side Ujpest Dosza and Glasgow Celtic. I've got wonderful memories.'

By 1973 Peter had become a naturalized Irishman and was in the full international squad as number two to Alan Kelly of Preston. He won two caps - against Poland in Dublin (alongside City's Jimmy Holmes) and against Brazil in the Maracana Stadium (that sounds like a good quiz question). He faced big names Jairinho and Edu but a brave Irish display kept the score to 1-2.


After retiring from playing he worked in insurance but he is retired now and enjoys his golf and fishing near his home in the seaside town of Tamrore.




He's had a torrid time with injury problems since his arrival at the Club, but David McNamee returned to action last week at Plymouth and reveals here how he is determined to help the Sky Blues get back to winning ways.

You have been out of action since October - you must have been delighted to make your comeback last week against Plymouth?

It was great to be back because unfortunately it's been a while coming. I was obviously just happy to get the ninety minutes under my belt after a few months out of action.

It must have been a really frustrating time for you, being on the sidelines for over three months so soon after joining the Club?

I tore my hamstring against Wolves so the first week after that there was nothing I could actually do on it - I just had to let the muscle knit back together. Then it was a case of getting it strengthened and stretched again. There has been a lot of boring stretching and leg work but it had to be done. Then I got into running and thankfully now I'm back. This time we've gone on the side of safety and any small niggles that I've felt, I've taken a step back. It seems to have settled down now and hopefully that's the end of it.





Was it a new injury to you or have you suffered from hamstring problems in the past?

I've never really had any serious problems with my hamstrings and hopefully it was just a one-off. You never can tell with hamstrings but fingers crossed it's all behind me now and that will be the end of it.

Are you the sort of person who finds it easy to keep his spirits up while out injured?

It's a hard thing to cope with because you see the boys going out to train and you can only watch. It can get frustrating when you just go into the gym every day, trying to strengthen your leg back up. I had my good and bad days but luckily I had a few other lads around me like Don Hutchison, who's always good for a bit of chit-chat and helped keep me going! It helps when you've got other boys around you who can keep you going.

You came back against Plymouth on a very heavy pitch which probably wasn't ideal - did you get through it unscathed?

The pitch was definitely the worst I've played on for a while - it took me back to my Scotland days! I used to come up against pitches like that all the time and I felt quite comfortable most of the way through. Obviously it wasn't a great game football-wise or result-wise. Personally I was happy to just get through the 90 minutes without feeling any problems.

Is it tough to come back into a struggling side?

It was a situation where if the boys had been doing really well and winning every week, I might not have got my chance. In a way, if you've been out for a while, you only tend to come back into a team if it hasn't won in a while. You end up getting your opportunity because of that more often than not. The manager wanted to use me and I wanted to play so I was just happy to get my opportunity so quickly.

Were there positives to take from the Plymouth game?

I think you can take positives from the fact that the team never stopped trying to go forwards as we looked to try and get back on level terms. I don't think we played the conditions particularly well. We tried to play football when maybe that wasn't on but I'm sure we'll learn from it and hopefully not make the same mistake again.

The boys do like to play football and with Inchy taking over as the new gaffer, I think he wants us to play some nice football, but we've got to do it in the right conditions and at the right times. You've got to know when to put your foot through the ball.

We've been talking about stuff like that in training and we'll try to resolve the fact that we're conceding goals. We just want the next game to come as quickly as possible so we can try and get back to winning ways.

How have spirits been in training since the last match?

It's not too bad at all. The lads were disappointed because we've been through a bad run of results recently and nobody's happy about it but the positives are that the boys have all stuck together. There's no animosity between anybody and as soon as we get a victory, confidence levels will change and we can hopefully push on.

What do you expect from Luton? Looking at the league table it's a classic six-pointer.

Recent results have seen us fall down the league and that's not a position any of us thought we'd find ourselves in. It's our home game so we've got to concentrate on what we can do and go out to try and get the three points at the Ricoh. Anything less just really don't do. I'm sure it will be physical but the surface is much better here than it was last week at Plymouth so hopefully we can play a bit more football.

Would you class us as being in a relegation battle?

That word hasn't even been mentioned down at the training ground. We feel that as soon as our confidence levels come back we will start moving up the league and the only way to do that is with a win. We've got a couple of boys still out injured who hopefully aren't too far away from coming back and strengthening the squad a bit more.

How disappointed were you with Micky Adams' departure?

Obviously I was disappointed for him because he brought me into the Club. He showed a lot of faith with me and was always good with me down at the training ground. I also understand that football nowadays is a results business and if the results aren't coming the people upstairs have got their decisions to make for the benefit of the Club. It's just something you have to take on the chin. I'm a professional and I know it's something that could happen again in my career. You just have to get your head around it and get on with things.

Do the players feel like they let the old manager down in any way?

I'm sure all of the boys have felt that maybe if they'd done something differently results might have gone our way and then the manager wouldn't be in this position. That's easy to say in hindsight and there's nothing you can do to change past results or mistakes that have been made. All we can really do is focus on the future and I'm sure all the boys will be behind Inchy just now.

He's taken over and hopefully he becomes the permanent gaffer because we all like him. He's been around the Club a lot longer than I have and since I've been here his training sessions have been really good so I don't think there'd be any complaints from us if he got the job permanently. We'll have to see what happens.

Has Inchy changed much in training?

I'd say most of the things are pretty similar to what we were doing before. There have been a few little subtle changes but nothing major has changed. He has his own ideas, there's no doubt about that, and maybe he would like to bring some players in but we just have to wait and see. Hopefully the ideas he gives us come across and we can put it onto the pitch.

What are your hopes for the rest of the season?

I want to become settled in the position and help us to push up the table. Our main concern is to get away from the bottom and I'm confident we can do it. We've got good enough players at the Club, it's just a case of getting confidence levels back up and pushing on from there. It doesn't matter how we win a game and hopefully that will come tonight.





Championship Comment...

We've all been there. There's nothing quite like receiving an invitation to a party that you really aren't looking forward to. It may have been months since you went to a decent get-together but the hosts aren't really your kind of people. However you still decide to go.

But what would you do if that invitation was then withdrawn? Feel a bit put out? Quite aggrieved?

Well that was the situation that fans of Cardiff City found themselves in last weekend when their team was scheduled to face Wolves.

Controversially the Football League decided to ban all Bluebirds supporters from the match at Molineux, following a previous record of trouble that ensued in years gone by.

A strong decision. And while any trouble at football matches (and in society) is completely unacceptable and should see the perpetrators heavily punished and banned, it does raise the question - can you really tar a whole set of supporters with the same brush?

Granted, Wolverhampton's police, council and the club itself most probably have a completely different viewpoint when their money has to be used for extra policing to ensure a few mindless idiots are well-behaved. It can seem like the best solution.

However to ban all fans in a sweeping generalisation that all Cardiff City supporters are thugs and troublemakers is a facile judgement.

Yes the minority of proven troublemakers should be banned and never allowed to enter Molineux, Ninian Park or any Championship ground again. But the majority of law-abiding fans wanting to go and watch and support their team through a tricky period, (which has seen them go without a win in 14 games), should not be punished.

It may be a case of having better systems in place to identify specific troublemakers so the Football League can then take them

to task and the true supporters can continue to enjoy their team's football.

As with all injustices, a couple of hundred people did voice their feelings to the local authorities in Wolverhampton, marching on the Town Hall to show their exception to the ruling.

Chairman Peter Risdale also displayed his objection to the decision by shunning the Wolves board and opting to watch the match from the away dugout in protest.

Ironically, Cardiff managed to bag three points in a 2-1 win, despite no support in the ground. Debutant Jason Byrne, a £100,000 signing from Shelbourne, came off the bench to grab a dramatic 88th minute winner after Seyi Olofinjana looked to ensure a point for Wolves when he cancelled out Michael Chopra's opening goal.

Bluebirds boss, Dave Jones, couldn't disguise his delight at the win against his former club, who sacked him two years ago.

Jones said: "It's ironic that none of our fans were here to see us win our first match in 14 games. I've never felt an atmosphere like it - it was dead. Their fans tried to get it going but they needed some banter to bounce off and we got our just rewards."

Special mention must go out to Sunderland manager Roy Keane, who was also very vocal about his feelings towards TV pundits' views of non-Premiership clubs.

The Black Cats' boss spoke out against the BBC's football experts, branding them "ignorant and arrogant" about teams outside the Premier League.

Keane was angry at remarks made by Gary Lineker, Alan Shearer, Alan Hansen and Lee Dixon during and after Birmingham's 5-1 drubbing of Newcastle in the FA Cup. Keane said, "They talked about how bad Newcastle were. Not once did they say that Birmingham had played well. Yet they are so-called experts who are appearing on the box."

A statement which I think all Championship fans can agree with.



How did you come to be at Coventry City?

I was playing for a Sunday league side called Chasewell Park Under 10s and our manager entered us into a tournament in Southampton. I managed to score a few goals in the tournament but at the time I was not playing defence, I tended to play up front or in midfield. I think it was my goals that alerted Ray Gooding and Lol Cairns who were watching on the sidelines. They asked me to attend a trial and I got offered a contract straight after.

How would you describe yourself as a person and a footballer?

As a footballer I am very hard working and always give 100%. I am fairly competitive and I don't like coming second best so some might describe me as a sore loser. Off the pitch, I would say that I am very easy to get along with and I enjoy having a laugh with the lads.

What do you want to achieve this season?

I want to help the team climb up the league table and achieve the highest position possible. Currently we are not doing as well as hoped but we are looking to finish the season strongly. I want to play more in the reserves, I've already played about six or seven times for them and I really enjoyed it. What do you hope to achieve in the next five years?

Next season I would like to do well in the FA Youth Cup, it was disappointing to lose against Reading but credit where credit's due, we lost to a very good side. I really hope that I will get offered a professional contract here at Coventry City and with that I would like to help the Sky Blues get back into the Premiership. I definitely want to play at the highest level possible and achieve an international cap at any level but that's only if I am good enough.

What is the best thing about playing football?

Wining matches is the best thing about playing football. It is hard to explain the feeling that you get when you win but it's amazing, especially when you win important matches. When we beat Southend in the Third Round of the FA Youth Cup, it was one of the best feelings ever - especially as we won on penalties in a very important match. Which footballer do you look up to the most?

Due to the nature of my position I would go for Gary Neville. I am trying to base my game around him and I just think he is has got an all round perfect attitude. As a defender I look up to John Terry as well - he is just awesome.

Which member of the first-team do you get on with the best?

I would say the younger lads in the squad such as Ben Turner and Andy Gooding. They tend to train with us sometimes and they are really good to have around to ask advice and questions.

Who is your best friend at the Club?

Matthew West a.k.a Snowy and Kieran Fitzharris. I have known them both a long time, I used to share a room with Snowy at the Lodge and Kieran was at the trial I attended all those years ago.

The tie was put out of Coventry's reach when substitute Hal Robson Kanu made it 4-0 to Reading with a neat header off the far post. The Royals inflicted more misery on City when 'keeper Belford was caught in possession outside the penalty area by Henry who subsequently finished from the tightest of angles.

Substitute Kieran Fitzharris pulled one back for the Sky Blues three minutes from time when the diminutive midfielder produced an excellent 20 yard free-kick.

FA Cup Memories

To commemorate the 20th anniversary of the Sky Blues' historic FA Cup run, here in the matchday programme we will take a look at each match that City played in the competition in 1987 on their way to Wembley.

Today we focus on the Fourth Round clash against Manchester United, when Coventry got many people believing they could go all the way as they proved more than a match for the very best.

After a relatively easy encounter in the Third Round, when Coventry overcame Bolton by three goals to nil in front of their own fans at Highfield Road, the Sky Blues faced a much tougher test when they travelled to Old Trafford to take on Manchester United in Round Four.

City had already held the Red Devils to a 1-1 draw on their patch in the league earlier in the campaign - a result which led to the sacking of United boss and Coventry manager-in-waiting, Ron Atkinson.

Three months on from that day, the Sky Blues travelled north in high spirits following their 3-0 win over Bolton, although a 3-1 home defeat against West Ham in the league the week beforehand meant they were not arriving at Old Trafford in the best form.

Like the Bolton match, this one took place in freezing conditions on a bone-hard pitch and Keith Houchen - signed from Scunthorpe at the start of the season and with just one goal to his credit in City colours so far - came into the starting line-up at the expense of the injured Dave Bennett.

Alex Ferguson had not been at the helm for long and United had already lost four league fixtures at home that season. Combined with their good performance at Old Trafford earlier in the season it meant that the tie would not only be a money spinner for the Sky Blues but one that they honestly felt they could win.

And 20 minutes into the match, the dream became a reality when Houchen took advantage of his place in the starting line-up with the only goal of the game. He demonstrated great persistence to finally stab the ball home from just a yard out at the third time of asking.

"I've scored better goals than that, but not many which have meant quite as much," said the joyful striker.

While Houchen's name was the only one on the scoresheet, City's defence performed heroics that day to keep one of the country's most feared cup sides at bay for the remaining 70 minutes on a treacherous surface.

Ferguson actually blamed the defeat on the pitch but following criticism from George Curtis after City had taken their foot off the gas when 3-0 up against Bolton in Round Three, Coventry players could be seen throwing themselves into challenges without any fear for their own safety.

For John Sillett, this result marked the day when people really began to class them as serious contenders in the 1987 FA Cup.


"You just sense that we are really starting to get the ball rolling," he said. "It will have the whole city buzzing."

His thoughts were echoed by a former Sky Blues favourite, who plied his trade for United that day.

"I'd love to see them go to Wembley and lift the trophy, and I think they can," said former Coventry striker Terry Gibson following his side's defeat.

In Round Five City were on the road again, this time taking on Stoke.


Happy Keith Houchen climbs to his feet in jubilation after scoring at Old Trafford.




Keith Houchen jumps for joy after scoring the only goal of the FA Cup against Manchester United at Old Trafford.

I must admit that I'm a little sad with what has happened at the Club these last couple of weeks. The main reason I'm disappointed is obviously because of the departure of Micky Adams.

Managers only leave a club when the team is not doing well and I, along with all other fans, have been really surprised with how quickly our form has gone from pretty good to pretty bad.

We've had such a bad run of results over the last six weeks, which has turned us from play-off candidates to a team looking over our shoulders at the other end of the table.

I can see both sides of the argument as to Micky's dismissal. Personally I think that Micky deserved more time but then I can see the other side of things that our results have been poor, and when supporters start to turn against the manager and players, and the crowds start to fall, then the Board has to make a decision.




When a crowd turns as it has done in recent weeks, there is invariably one outcome and whether you like it or not, it seemed like an inevitability that Micky would leave the Club after the Bristol City match at the Ricoh.

That game was a massive blow for me because not only were we out-played, we were out-fought that night by a team from the league below us. I am not suggesting for one minute that going out of the FA Cup was the only reason that Micky lost his job but I think that was the straw that broke the camel's back.

The main problem this season is that I do not see the Championship as being an exceptional league and it would have been a great year to get out of this division. The Board obviously had ideas in their head as to where they would like us to be and we were not hitting those targets. Football is more of a business now than a game and we have seen many managers lose their jobs when lots of people thought they deserved more of a chance.

We are no different to any other club nowadays in that if results take a dip, the manager is the first one in the firing line. The pressure in the Championship is so huge because the vast majority of Chairmen want to see their club in the Premier League because of the massive financial incentives.



But the decision has now been made and there is no point dwelling on the past for much longer. I don't think anybody envisaged this situation arising at the start of the season but when a week is a long time in football, you can never foresee what will happen in a few month's time.

The main problem that Adrian Heath will have addressed immediately is that the players have not been performing well enough. I am not pointing the finger at any one individual but you cannot escape the fact that players have been making mistakes that they wouldn't normally these last few weeks, and it is only the players who can stand up and be counted.

I've been in this position as a player and all you can do is keep doing the things that you are good at and hope that sooner rather than later you get a win which can get your season back on track.

I have no doubt that the players will turn things around and I am still optimistic that this season will be okay. Hopefully we have been through our worst patch of the campaign and we can start to build again.

With a new defensive signing being made last week, and maybe one or two more on the way, we will hopefully see the number of goals we have been leaking greatly reduce and build from there.

All we need is a bit of a backbone and to start to show a bit of fight again, like we did so well in the early stages of this season. All it takes is one player to spark it off and tonight's match against Luton is the ideal stage on which to do it.

The support of the fans is needed at times like this more than ever so I hope you all cheer the boys on from the first minute to the last, because I know from experience that it can make all the difference.

I'm not very hi-tech at all. I've got a PSP and that's about it.


Any other passions?

How long have you been supporting the Sky Blues?






Who is your favourite ever Coventry player?

Steve Frogatt against Everton a few seasons ago.




What is your worst moment as a Coventry fan?



Coming up - the Black Cats

Coca-Cola CHAMPIONSHIP



Stadium of Light, Saturday February 3, kick-off 3pm, Coca Cola Championship

It's a marathon, not a sprint; it's not how you start but how you finish; it ain't over 'til the fat lady sings - all clichés regularly used in footballing circles and all clichés which look likely to be applicable to Sunderland's season.

Rewind the clock to the opening day of the campaign and there was much hope and optimism at the Club as they travelled to the Ricoh Arena to take on the Sky Blues.

Former striker Niall Quinn headed a consortium which had led a successful takeover bid for the Black Cats, and although there was no manager in place for the start of the season, hopes were high that Quinn was the messiah who could lead Sunderland back to their glory days of the not-too-distant past.

At the Ricoh, the former Republic of Ireland international found himself barking orders from the technical area as he took on managerial duties in the short term, but second half goals from Stern John and Gary McSheffrey gave the Sky Blues a 2-1 victory and instigated a terrible run of early results for Sunderland.

They lost their first four matches to sit rock bottom of the Championship at the end of August, meaning that if Quinn was intending to bide his time appointing a gaffer, the search was quickened somewhat.

And on August 28, the decision was made for Quinn's former international teammate Roy Keane to take his first steps into the managerial side of the game, having retired as a player last season after a glittering career.

The move inevitably attracted a wave of publicity as the media wondered whether the Manchester United legend - famed for his no-nonsense, aggressive style of play - would manage in the same way or mellow with age.

The early signs are that he has tamed the beast within, although what goes on behind dressing room doors is anybody's guess.

Besides, his players have not really given him too much reason to resort to the sort of techniques that Sir Alex utilised on some of Keane's former United teammates when the going got tough.

The announcement of Keane taking over as manager saw an instant upturn in fortunes. He watched his new charges beat West Brom 2-0 the same day the news broke and took control of team affairs for the first time for a 2-1 away victory against Derby.

Sunderland went unbeaten in their first four games under Keane's supervision and have shown plenty of consistency ever since, never losing more than two consecutive games without showing a reaction.

At the time of writing Sunderland sit in eighth place in the Championship, nicely positioned to make an assault on the play-off spots.

They have proved to be strong at the Stadium of Light where they have won eight, drawn two and lost four times, although two of those defeats did come in that early sticky patch. They last lost at home on December 30 to high-flying Preston.

Roy Keane boosted his strike force this week by signing Stern John from the Sky Blues. Other January signings include former Sky Blues shot stopper Marton Fulop who signed permanently from Spurs after an initial loan switch. Luton's Carlos Edwards also made the move north along with young Arsenal striker Anthony Stokes.

Coventry travel to the North East this Saturday, having not beaten Sunderland on their patch in their last 12 attempts. They have only ever won once in Sunderland - a 1-0 victory at Roker Park in January 1977.

Adrian Heath leads the Sky Blues to take on the Club he used to be assistant manager at under Peter Reid, hoping to turn that poor form around and give City a timely boost.



Sharpbites

with Commercial Director Ken Sharp

Carrying on from the last instalment of Sharp Bites, here is a continuation of the summary of how Coventry City has performed commercially during the first half of this season in comparison to the 2005/2006 season.

Last time I focused on two brand new initiatives which fall under the Operation Premiership banner - the Bondholder Proposal and By Official Appointment schemes - as well as a look at how we have improved our revenue through the introduction of rotating advertising boards.

Here we look at three of the most long-running and integral aspects of the Club's revenue along with another Operation Premiership initiative - Private Seat Licences.


Corporate Hospitality

The re-launch of the Vice Presidents Club along with an improved sales strategy for match-by-match hospitality has seen a massive increase in corporate revenues, in what I feel is one of our best performing areas at the Football Club.

With income already exceeding last season's total revenue, we are confident of maintaining that level of sales through the remainder of the season, which should be close to 70% higher than the total revenue generated in 2005/2006.

Retail

By the midway point in 2006/2007 we had nearly hit the figure raised through retail sales throughout the whole of last season. With the Club's first ever Progressive Sale well underway, and offering fans a maximum discount of 50% off EVERYTHING in-store, we can confidently predict that our retail revenue will increase by at least 60% on last season.



Season tickets

Whilst there was only a moderate increase in actual season ticket sales this season compared to last, the introduction of price zoning, along with people's preference to sit in better areas at the Arena has resulted in an 11% increase in overall season ticket revenues.

This was not through simply bumping up the costs of season tickets as we actually reduced the cost of season tickets in numerous areas of the stadium. We were very conscious not to price people out of being able to purchase a season ticket and

rather than there being just one price in all areas - the approach that had been taken in the first season here at the Ricoh - we carefully selected zones and, as such, offered fans the choice of paying slightly more for the areas within the stadium deemed most desirable.



PSLs

While the take-up for this innovative new scheme was not as high as we would have liked, we have still raised a considerable sum of money in NEW revenue. We are certain that this will be a slow burner with our fans and that PSLs will continue to sell steadily through the course of 2007.






