





Now is the time when we are approaching the business end of the season.

Geoff Horsfield joins us for the season on loan from Sheffield United and brings with him a wealth of experience which will be invaluable to us in the coming months.

We have also taken Mark Yeates on loan from Tottenham for the season, and we also welcome Luigi Glombard from Cardiff on a month's loan. All three players will bring extra impetus and competition for places in our squad. They also



New Kids On The Block...

It was a busy Transfer Deadline Day for the Foxes with a trio of players arriving at the Walkers Stadium in time for this afternoon's crunch clash against Luton Town. And here the matchday programme gets up close and personal with City's new recruits...

ON MOVE...

"I am delighted to be here and help Leicester City.

"Johnno (Andy Johnson) definitely played a part in me coming here. I spoke to him when I found out that Leicester were interested and asked him about the set-up, the manager and the players.

"He said it would be ideal for me to come in and add my experience.

"He said it was a great club with a fantastic stadium and fan base."

ON TARGETS...

"I've seen the Championship close up this season during my brief time with Leeds and it's a hard division – anybody can beat anybody.

"But if we can go on a run and quickly secure two or three wins then that will help us.

"My main aim is to score goals and also help the side both on and off

the field.

"I'm fighting fit. I haven't really played many matches but the gaffer is aware of that. Hopefully I can get match fit and help get us out of this situation.

"I will put myself about and let the centre-halves know that I am here. Believe me – I am going to do just that. You have got to when you are in a scrap.

"You have to come out fighting. It's not about playing football and being entertaining and I think the fans have got to realise that.

"When I cross the white line I always want to win. Sometimes I take it a little bit too far but that is the way that I have been brought up. It's a man's game.

"There is plenty of desire left in my body."

ON LUTON AND BEYOND...

"We find ourselves in a situation where we have got to get those points on the board as quickly as possible, starting against Luton.

"If we have to do that by fighting and scrapping then so be it.

"It's tight down there. If we can win two or three games then that would move us up four or five places at this stage of the season.

"But if we lose two or three then we are in a relegation dog-fight. That is what we are trying to avoid."

"Director Greg Clarke has also resigned from the club's board of directors.

"The board again wishes to record its appreciation for the tireless work undertaken by Greg over many years and for his key role in helping bring the club out of administration in 2003. "The board's ongoing discussions with Milan Mandaric regarding his investment into the football club remain unaffected by the changes at board level.

"The board remains entirely committed to reaching a satisfactory conclusion with Mr Mandaric."


Birmingham Fixture Rearranged

The pie had broken one of my teeth. It seems even a lump of inanimate minced meat and pastry



Bob Wood, aka Bocadillo (but that's a long story), 56

Where are you based and how long have you been living there? Sandwich, East Kent. I moved to Sandwich in 1992 but have lived in East Kent since 1973.

I have never lived in Leicester or Leicestershire.

How did you come to support the Foxes? I went to Villa Park with a City-supporting friend in 1966 for the FA Cup game. Many City fans had this infection which caused them to raise their right arm and bay "Dooog" whenever City's No.9 went anywhere near the ball.

One of them must have passed it to me.

How often do you get back to the Walkers Stadium and how many miles is your average round trip? I usually only miss one or two home games a season, but am an ever-present so far this season. It's about 370 miles there and back.

What is your preferred method of transport? I let the train take the strain although I do usually walk across London from Charing Cross to St Pancras.

I remember when I used to enjoy driving to games, but there are too many hold-ups nowadays.

How many people do you usually travel to games with? I travel with the London Branch of the Supporters Club for the last part of my journey; there are usually around a dozen of us who come by train to home games.

Do you wear your City colours in your home town and if so what is the reaction from the locals? I used to have a shirt with a City badge and 'Leicester City Supporters' Club, Sandwich Branch' emblazoned on it.

I wore it proudly and it caused much comment.

I now only usually wear a replica shirt on match days.

The milkman, the postman and other early risers usually ask, "Where is it today?", as they shake their heads in disbelief. (The postman says he's a Wolves fan, but I have been to Molineux more than he has!)

What other professional clubs are based in and around your area? As the seagull flies, Calais in the French Fourth Division are the nearest League Club and Southend are the second nearest. If I wanted to get to a match without getting my feet wet, Gillingham would be the nearest at about 40 miles. Charlton do run a bus which calls at Sandwich, but I don't think it would look good in red!

Do you manage to follow City away from home as well? Errr, yes!

Business mentors are volunteers that give two to three hours a month to help the young person focus on their business priorities, facilitating problem solving and just being there for support.


No specific business experience is necessary as full training is given.





But, beyond the fact that **Brett Darby** scored in both Corby Town's unexpected Southern League victories over Maidenhead in the space of a deadline-straddling week, the 'no sooner' quickly run out.

As, apparently, do former-Fox patiences. **Keith Gillespie**'s most recent 15 seconds on the pitch brought him a Premiership-record dismissal for lashing out (twice) at a Reading wind-up merchant before he'd touched the ball, and prompted memorable handbags on the other side of the Sheffield United white line (and also, perversely, heralded a transfer request from the inflammable Irishman); while touchline tantrums from each of Leeds manager **Dennis Wise** (surely not?), table-topping Rams boss **Billy Davies** (two weeks running) and Burnley's **Steve Cotterill** have also seen the FA's

disciplinary procedures exercised. More measured managerial decisions have come from **Peter Taylor** and **Gary Mills**.

The former has stepped down from the England Under-21 supremo-ship to attend to his increasingly difficult housekeeping job at Crystal Palace; while Mills is out to disprove the old 'you-can't-go-home-again' adage by returning to Conference strugglers Tamworth after interim backroom stints at Coventry, Notts County and Alfreton Town.

Movers amongst the playing ranks, now the transfer window has closed (an hour or so ago, as I write), have actually been pretty few and far between.

The aforementioned Mr Cotterill swooped to return **Joey Gudjónsson** to the Championship after his frustrating Dutch stint with AZ; **Danny Thomas** moved on from his brief Shrewsbury sojourn to sign for Hereford United; and **Russell Hoult** suffered for his alleged embarrassing private life exposé with an immediate dropping from West Brom's senior side and a free transfer to Stoke.

Below the radar of such artificial transfer restrictions, former trainee **Neil Ashley** switched registrations from Frickley Athletic to Grantham Town; and two multi-club Old Boys are hotly tipped

to move yet again: **Steve Claridge** being lined up for a Harrow Borough debut today in Ryman League action against Margate, and former youth keeper **Mark Gayle** the target of a projected West Midlands move twixt Halesowen Town and Rushall Olympic. In the scoring stakes, it has been a quiet fortnight.

Two weeks back, **David Connolly** continued his recent streak with a close-range counter in Sunderland's 4-2 win at Sheffield Wednesday, and **Tom Williamson** claimed a late, spectacular Conference equaliser in Grays Athletic's 2-2 draw with former leaders Oxford United.

A week later, other than the aforementioned Tommy

After missing the whole of last season through injury, **Drew Talbot** is just happy to be playing again.

The 20-year-old striker joined Luton from Sheffield Wednesday last week, cutting short a loan spell at Scunthorpe, and was pitched straight into an FA Cup tie with Blackburn.

Talbot was as surprised as anyone when the move came about.

"It was out of the blue. I didn't expect it. I was shocked, to be honest. Luton are a big side."

"I got a phone call on Wednesday saying that they'd accepted a bid from Luton. I thought it was a joke at first," he said.

"When I went up with Wednesday, Luton were easily the best side in the league and they played nice football, so I jumped at the chance."

Talbot made 33 appearances at Hillsborough and

the highlight was scoring a crucial extra-time goal in the 2005 League One Play-Off Final.

Injuries hampered his progress after that but he hopes that's all behind him now.

"I've had every injury you can possibly get, so I'm hoping I've got them all out of the way!"

"For the last few months I've worked really hard to get myself back fit, and the move down here just goes to show that hard work pays off sometimes."

Talbot, who signed a three-year contract, made his debut against Blackburn and started in the defeat at Luton on Tuesday.

"I was thrown in at the deep end a bit, but I prefer it like that. It didn't give me any time to think about things! It was a tough game, though."

"I've not set myself any targets. I just want to get some games under my belt and the more I play the better I'll get," he added.

The 21-year-old has been on loan at Gillingham this season, making eight appearances, but returned last month. His promise was spotted early and he was only 15 when he made his debut for Luton's under-19 side, keeping a clean sheet.

Chris Coyne (28) was playing for Perth Soccer Club when he was selected for the Australian Under-17 squad for the 1994 Youth World Cup, and came to the attention of Harry Redknapp, then manager of West Ham.


The centre-half signed for the Hammers as a teenager, before a £50,000 cheque persuaded Dundee to let the defender move to Kenilworth Road in September 2001.

It was a huge disappointment to Swindon Town, and a coup for Luton, when highly-rated defender **Sol Davis** decided to leave the County Ground after his contract expired at the end of the 2001/02 season. Davis (27) scored his first ever goal in professional football in November 2004.

Kevin Foley (22) is a talented full-back who came through the junior ranks at Kenilworth Road.

He made his debut for the Hatters in October 2002 and has gone on to make over 150 appearances since then.

Defender **Russell Perrett** (33) has been with the club since 2001 after helping Cardiff win promotion to the

He accepted an offer to join Luton and won promotion again with the Hatters.

Leon Barnett made a great impression in his first season of full-time training at the club, making his senior debut as a 16-year-old. A versatile player, his preferred position is central defence, but he can also fill in at a full-back. The youngster scored the first goal of this season, his first senior goal, when his header after eight minutes against Leicester set-up a 2-0 win.

Mike Newell pulled off a real coup with the signing of Aberdeen central defender

Markus Heikkinen. Although born in Sweden, Heikkinen, who joined on a two-year contract, is a Finnish international and in August 2005 he partnered Liverpool's Sami Hyypia during their World Cup qualifying win over Macedonia.

Talented young midfielder **David Bell** signed a three-and-a-half year contract with the Hatters in mid-January 2006 after joining from Rushden & Diamonds.

Bell, who has been capped by Republic of Ireland at U19 and U21 level, can play in the centre, left and right side of midfield.

Ahmet Brkovic (32) scored in Luton's 2-0 win at Leicester last season and was a key member of the Luton side which won the League One title, netting 16 goals.

The Croatian-born midfielder, who joined Luton from Leyton Orient in 2001, is more suited to a right midfield role but is equally comfortable playing on the left.

Having made his debut as a 16-year-old in November 2003, **Keith Keane** went on to enjoy an extended run in the side whilst Kevin Foley was out injured.

The midfielder, now 20, scored his first goal of the season at West Brom last month.

Lewis Emanuel arrived at Kenilworth

Road in the summer of 2006 after deciding to leave his home town club Bradford City, the place where the defender started his career. Lewis is a quick full-back but can also play on the left side of midfield.

Richard Langley signed for Luton Town in July 2006.

A hard working midfielder, he became a firm favourite at Queens Park Rangers and his fine form prompted Cardiff to splash out £200,000 for him and this led to international honours for Jamaica. The 27-year-old was transferred back to QPR in 2005 and he made his Luton debut against Leicester in August.

Stephen O'Leary (21) is a skilful midfielder who spent most of last season on-loan with Tranmere Rovers. O'Leary joined Luton as a 13-year-old and has had limited opportunities this season, but came off the bench in the Cup against Blackburn last week.

Former Tottenham trainee **Steve Robinson** has been with the club since 2002 after they paid £50,000 to Preston North End for his services.

The 32-year-old midfielder, a full Northern Ireland international, made his name at Bournemouth, scoring 60 goals in 286 appearances.

Matthew Spring returned to the club recently after spending time at Leeds and Watford.

The 27-year-old midfielder made 289 appearances in his first spell at Kenilworth Road and has turned out six times for Watford in the Premiership this season.

Luton splashed out £500,000 on striker **Adam Boyd** from Hartlepool United in July 2006.

Boyd (24) - who signed a three-year contract - scored 60 goals in six years at the Victoria Ground where he was once managed by Mike Newell.

Warren Feeney started his career as a

trainee at Leeds but failed to break into the first team so decided to join Bournemouth. Feeney, a current Northern Ireland international, signed for Luton in a £150,000 deal on transfer deadline day in March 2005.

Dean Morgan became an instant favourite with Luton fans after his 90th minute winner in the 3-2 victory over Southampton in August 2005. Morgan (23) moved to Kenilworth Road from Reading that summer.



Fulham striker **Björn Runström** has arrived on a one month loan deal and could make his debut today.

The former Swedish Under-21 international has spent most of his career in Italy with Bologna, Chievo and Fiorentina before he returned home to join Hammarby, where he made 57 appearances and scored 18 goals.

Fulham paid £700,000 for him but he has yet to establish himself in the first team making just one substitute appearance in the Premiership and one start in the League Cup.

Ex-Chelsea trainee **Sam Parkin** is a forward with a prolific goalscoring record and joined Luton in August 2006. Parkin (25) scored 73 goals in 142 appearances during a successful spell at Swindon and moved to Kenilworth Road via one season at Ipswich.

Zac Barrett is only 18-years-old and is yet to make his first team debut for Luton. He was on the bench for the midweek game at Coventry. His performances for the Youth team last season earned him a professional contract. He was the only player to be taken on by the club from that level last season.

The Luton Town Press Office were unable to make available a Hatters player to take part in our regular visiting team-mates feature. Grr.



Past history between Leicester and Luton
inevitably promotes discussion of a
number of famous FA Cup clashes in the
past.

Today's archive photo recalls an eight-goal
replay thriller in 1949 that actually is almost
remembered of something of an anti-
climax.

After all the first meeting between the two
clubs, at Kenilworth Road actually went two
goals better, ending up 5-5, with City's final
equaliser coming in the dying seconds of
extra-time.

The Filbert Street clash a week later had
plenty of goals, but was perhaps not quite
the cliff-hanger that the first meeting had
been.

Luton actually found the net in the first
minute, but City were irrepressible for a
time, storming back to lead 4-1 shortly after
the break.

The Hatters then struck twice in two
minutes to make it 4-3 and thoughts were
beginning to turn to the previous week's
drama when Mal Griffiths put the tie beyond
doubt and earned City a quarter-final spot.
This afternoon's picture actually shows the
moment when City might have thought they
were safe, as Jack Lee smashes home a
penalty to extend the Foxes' advantage to
4-1 early in the second period.

At the recent FA Cup game with Fulham, we were joined at half-time by a number of Elvis impersonators

SCORELINES

Any of the older generation of fans who have studied today's "Action Archive" feature elsewhere in the programme may well recall with some affection a pair of FA Cup ties against this afternoon's visitors, Luton Town, which formed an integral part of the Foxes' first ever road to Wembley in 1949.

The replay is featured pictorially in that feature, but it was the original tie, at Kenilworth Road, that really had everyone on the edge of their seats.

Five first half goals saw City lead 1-0, Luton take over 2-1, then City edge ahead again 3-2 as Jack Lee completed his hat-trick.

The Hatters equalised soon after the break and the tie eventually moved into extra-time, as was the fashion with all ties in those days.

City struck first to lead 4-3, Luton stormed back to 5-4 and held on until the last minute of the extra half-hour when the Foxes swung over a corner and Lee rose to head his fourth goal of the afternoon to equal the club's highest ever score draw in that competition in possibly the most thrilling tie that Leicester have ever been involved in.

The previous 5-5 draw in an FA Cup tie was way back in the Fosse era, in January 1914, when the club shared 10 goals with Tottenham Hotspur at Filbert Street. So impressed were Spurs with the performances of Fosse full-back Tommy Clay and centre-forward Harry Sparrow, that they signed both players the day after ousting Leicester in the replay.

But even these two memorable clashes have to take a back seat statistically to a game that still ranks as a record draw in Football League history, in April 1930, when City drew 6-6 with Arsenal at Filbert Street.

The Gunners' reserve centre-forward, David Halliday, hit four goals for the visitors that afternoon, but that was still not enough to earn a place in the FA Cup Final line-up a week later.

Luton's effort in breaching our defence five times in an FA Cup fixture has actually

been quite a rare occurrence in the country's premier knockout competition. In fact, City's biggest ever defeat in that competition came as recently as January 1996, when the Foxes (only) went down 5-0 at Maine Road in a third round replay where Georgi Kinkladze was the undoubtedly star.

This contrasts quite markedly with some of the club's victories in the cup.

Indeed, Leicester's record overall victory came in the Fosse era, in October 1894, when Notts Olympic were dumped 13-0 from the qualifying competition, with David Skea, William Miller and Willie McArthur all registering hat-tricks.

Fosse also ran up double figures in the same qualifying rounds in October 1903, to see off Market Harborough in a one-sided local derby.

Three hat-tricks in the same game is a rare feat in professional football, but Fosse were on the wrong end of one such instance in April 1909, as Spouncer, Hooper and West all did the deed for Nottingham Forest, as Leicester suffered their heaviest ever defeat, a league-record equalling 12-0 reverse on Trent-side.


A subsequent Football League enquiry revealed that already-relegated Fosse had

allowed their players to attend the pre-wedding celebrations of former team-mate Leggy Turner on the eve of this game and that something of a collective hangover contributed significantly to the below-par performance.

The explanation was accepted and no further punishment was forthcoming. The other occasion that Leicester conceded double figures in a league game came in April 1938, when a rampant young Wolves outfit took City apart 10-1 at Molineux, and even Leicester's consolation goal came courtesy of the




home side, when Stan Cullis turned the ball into his own net.

This was something of a contrast to the club's halcyon days in the roaring twenties, when the Foxes registered double figures of their own for the only time in a league fixture.

That afternoon, in October 1928, has long since passed into Leicester legend, as Arthur Chandler equalled the club's individual scoring record with six goals in a game to crush Portsmouth 10-0.

That was the afternoon that five swans flew over the ground just after Channy had netted his fifth goal, and when a straggler followed moments later the crowd latched onto this sign and called for their hero to notch up number six.

Chandler duly obliged and the tale quickly passed into Foxes' folklore. Such spectacular scorelines seem to be very much confined to a different era, as defences rarely capitulate so

spectacularly in the modern game. The last time that Leicester ran up eight and nine goals in a single game both came in the free-scoring fifties, whilst even the six-goal mark is something of a rarity these days.

When Jock Wallace's young team smashed six past Carlisle in September 1982 it took three spot-kicks to boost the scoreline, whilst the 6-1 thumping of non-league Burton Albion in the FA Cup

in January 1985 was materially assisted, according to the FA, by a wooden seat thrown from the crowd that dazed the Brewers' keeper.

The Foxes did legitimately hit Rochdale for six in a League

Cup tie at Spotland in September 1993 though, coming back from a goal down with six different marksmen.

In contrast, City's defence has been hit for seven on a couple of recent occasions, a League Cup tie at Hillsborough in October 1992 and the final league game of that same season, at St James' Park.

Perhaps, though, the biggest oddity in remembering unusual scorelines is the level of coincidence that attaches to them. Twice City have been involved in fixtures that have ended in 8-3 defeats, and both have been at the hands of Aston Villa, whilst Leicester and Burnley have featured in games ending 7-3 on no less than three separate occasions.

And 4-0 away wins do not come along in the FA Cup too often, so Luton fans here today will not thank us for reminding them that City have twice managed such spectacular progress at Kenilworth Road in the past, with even The Birch still able to recall the most recent fixture, in the fifth round in 1974, when Keith Weller rounded off proceedings with a wonderful individual goal.

DINNER TALK WITH NEVILLE FOULGER

Alan Maybury has battled his way back into City's side after being on the sidelines for three months earlier in the season. The 28-year-old Republic of Ireland defender met up with Neville Foulger for a meal and a chat at Fusions Restaurant and revealed why he believes the Championship is such a tough league to play in, looked back on his two years with the Foxes and talked about the importance of today's match against Luton.

Alan Maybury has issued an impassioned rallying call ahead of arguably City's most important home game of the season today.

The Foxes defender believes the visit of 20th-placed Luton has taken on greater significance following last Saturday's 3-2 defeat by Cardiff. And when we met up for lunch and a chat at Fusions Restaurant, Maybury was in no mood for excuses.

It was fighting talk all the way from the 28-year-old Republic of Ireland international.

"We feel we are causing ourselves our own problems at the moment," he says, after ordering a starter of Smoked Chicken Caesar Salad.

"Against Fulham in the FA Cup replay and then again in the match at Cardiff, we were put under a bit of pressure. But we should be able to cope with it better than we are doing. "Yes, they were great finishes by Michael Chopra but he should not be getting those opportunities.

"So Luton now becomes a very big game for us - and we have had a long chat about it.

"We are at home and we need to be a bit more pro-active and take the game to them.

"It seems when we have nothing to lose and the shackles are off, we are not too bad.


"Look at last season. We were staring relegation in the face a year ago and were already looking at the worst that could happen.

"So we said 'What's to lose. Just go out and play'. And it worked.

"Now all the players need to stand up and be counted. Although we have more points this time we are aware that we are by no means clear of relegation.

"We also have another year's experience and we have learned a little bit but not enough.

"When the team are not playing well or we have to make changes, we do not have a big enough squad and the strength in depth to carry people.

"So when you are in the team you have got to step up to the plate, we need to get more from everybody, more often.

"The home matches are going to be very important now and it is up to us to take the game to the opposition and stop shooting ourselves in the foot.

"We have got to draw on what we did at this stage last season and find that resolve again.

"So let's be positive - let's go for

things. You may as well be trying to have a go and do the right things rather than just sitting back hoping you are not the one to make a mistake.


"A bit more from everyone and we will be okay."

Maybury is well aware of the vastly contrasting performances City have given in their first two home games of 2007.


They were beaten 2-0 by Sunderland on New Year's Day but then turned





on the style to draw 2-2 with Fulham in the third round of the FA Cup.

His main course of Peppered Sirloin Steak with Chips and Side Salad arrives, and our talk turns to the problem of City's inconsistency.

"It is just over two years now since I signed for City and, looking back

over that time it has been that sort of inconsistency that has troubled us and held us back," adds Maybury.

"When I first came there were lots of

draws that we couldn't turn into wins. Then we had a bad spell a year ago and the manager lost his job.

"We then steadied the ship and showed some good form. But this season we have again been up and down.

"We didn't start well, then produced some decent form before having a terrible November.


"A few more good results followed until we had a bad New Year with

defeats against Southampton, Sunderland and now Cardiff.

"It is a case of trying to find that level of consistency and where we are really at.

"Maybe part of it is the young age of the squad. You get energy, enthusiasm and hunger but you also get inconsistency.

"It is all about trying to get that balance. But if we can get somewhere in between what we are showing right now, we will be a lot

better off.

"It seems to be two steps forward and one step back at the moment. "So it is a bit of a frustrating time for us. But the Championship is a tough old league. I think you have maybe 15 teams who realistically think they can get promoted or at least make the play-offs. That's what makes it so difficult.

"Because there are not huge sums of money floating around the league, it is quite level and even.

"Everyone is coming from the same direction and trying to wheel and deal. That's why the teams with a bit of money to spend probably end up somewhere near the top at the finish. But you know what you are going to get from the games.

"With the new TV deal that has been signed the financial gap between the Premiership and Championship is

huge now.

"That's why everyone wants to get there and what makes this league so difficult.

"We are looking to kick on as well, but we have got to find the consistency to play at a higher level than we are at the moment.

"The Championship is physical with most teams on a par with each other. It is a fine line between winning or losing games."

Maybury is back in the side again after being on the sidelines for 15 matches earlier in the campaign.

"It was a case of keeping my head down and working hard so that when my chance came I was ready for it.

"You just have to back yourself to come through. I am happy to back in the team again, and my target is to stay in," says Maybury.



On the trail of a valuable "missing" Leicester City nameplate

Tracking down a unique piece of
"missing" Leicester City memorabilia,
worth thousands of pounds, involves a
fair bit of detective work.

During the 1936/37 season, 25 steam
locomotives, designed by Nigel Gresley,
were introduced onto the railway network.
Each of these locomotives was named
after a football club. They were all fixed
with two nameplates, each containing the
club's name, their colours, and a cast
brass replica football.

One of the locomotives was named after
Leicester City FC.

It entered service in January 1937, a few
months before the Leicester team depicted
here became Second Division Champions.
It was withdrawn from service in April
1959. The accompanying postcard
illustration shows the "Leicester City"
pulling the "Holiday Express" to Bridlington
four days before the start of the 1956-7
season.

That season Leicester were again Second
Division Champions with Arthur Rowley,
shown here, scoring a club record of 44
league goals.

When British Rail withdrew these football
trains between 1958 and 1960, they
donated the first of the two nameplates
from each engine to the named club.
The second nameplates went to private
collections.

Fifteen of the 25 nameplates donated to
the clubs are apparently still on display at
those sides.

However, until recently, the whereabouts of
the nameplate offered to Leicester City
was unclear.

Enquiries indicated that in 1959, LCFC
turned down British Rail's donation of the
nameplate.

Following a trail which led me to John
Ferguson, (the Museum Curator at the
Great Central Railway at Loughborough.)
and to Ian Wright, (an auctioneer in
Sheffield), the nameplate was finally
located.

It is on the South Coast, where for the last
30 years, it has belonged to Roger



Bamber, a life long Leicester City
supporter.

An associate of his came across it at an
auction in Huntingdonshire in the 1970s
and sold it on to Roger.

As for the second Leicester City
nameplate, this is on display (minus the
brass ball) at the Great Central Railway
Museum in Loughborough.

It is on loan from the Leicester Railway
Society, who purchased it when the
locomotive was withdrawn in 1959.



The City Side by Side Project was launched by Patricia Hewitt in December 2005 and the County Project commenced in June 2006.

Key points about the project are:

- The Side By Side Project is a unique volunteer befriending scheme that provides regular weekly (two to four hours) active support for younger people in the early stages of dementia who live at home in both the City of Leicester and the County.
- This is a service being offered to younger people with dementia as an alternative to day care.
- The project aims to provide a service for the younger person with dementia that benefits them by providing stimulation, either mental or physical or both, thus enabling them to maintain links with the community.

therefore reducing their feeling of isolation and maintains independence.

- The project aims to provide periods of regular carer respite during the time the befriending activities take place. Activities currently undertaken include social outings, sporting events, companionship and computer/IT skills.

There has been an increase in the number of younger people in their 30s, 40s and 50s referred to the charity for support. It is estimated that one in 1,000 younger people will be diagnosed with dementia.


The Walkers Youth Academy Under-18s remain unbeaten this year after back-to-back victories.



I am disappointed for the players and the supporters. We knew that it would be a difficult task to come here because they have got a fantastic home record, but I felt that overall we deserved to win the game.


The penalty decision has changed the momentum of the game, and everyone in the ground knew that something like that was coming.

I'm delighted for the supporters who turned out today. The conditions were horrible and the game came at what is an expensive time for people.


People have spent a lot of money following us over the festive period. We have had five games in what is a very short space of time on the back of Christmas and New Year. I'm glad that they got value for money today.

Danny Cadamarteri's last-gasp goal kept Leicester City's FA Cup adventure alive and kicking as it earned his side a 2-2 draw against Fulham at the Walkers Stadium. The Foxes more than matched their Premiership opponents and Cadamarteri's first goal for his new club took the Foxes to a third round replay at Craven Cottage. Patrick Kisnorbo's sixth of the season had cancelled out Brian McBride's opener. But Moritz Volz's well-executed strike six minutes from time looked to have won it for the visitors.

However, City had other ideas and sparked the celebrations as they levelled for a second time with almost the last kick of the match. City registered the first shot off target inside two minutes when Gareth Williams met Levi Porter's deflected cross from the left, but his effort from 20-yards was always rising and did not trouble 'keeper Jan Lastuvka. A minute later Hume's side-footed shot just went wide of the visitors' left-hand upright with Lastuvka beaten. The hosts continued to apply the pressure, earning a succession of corners, and could




