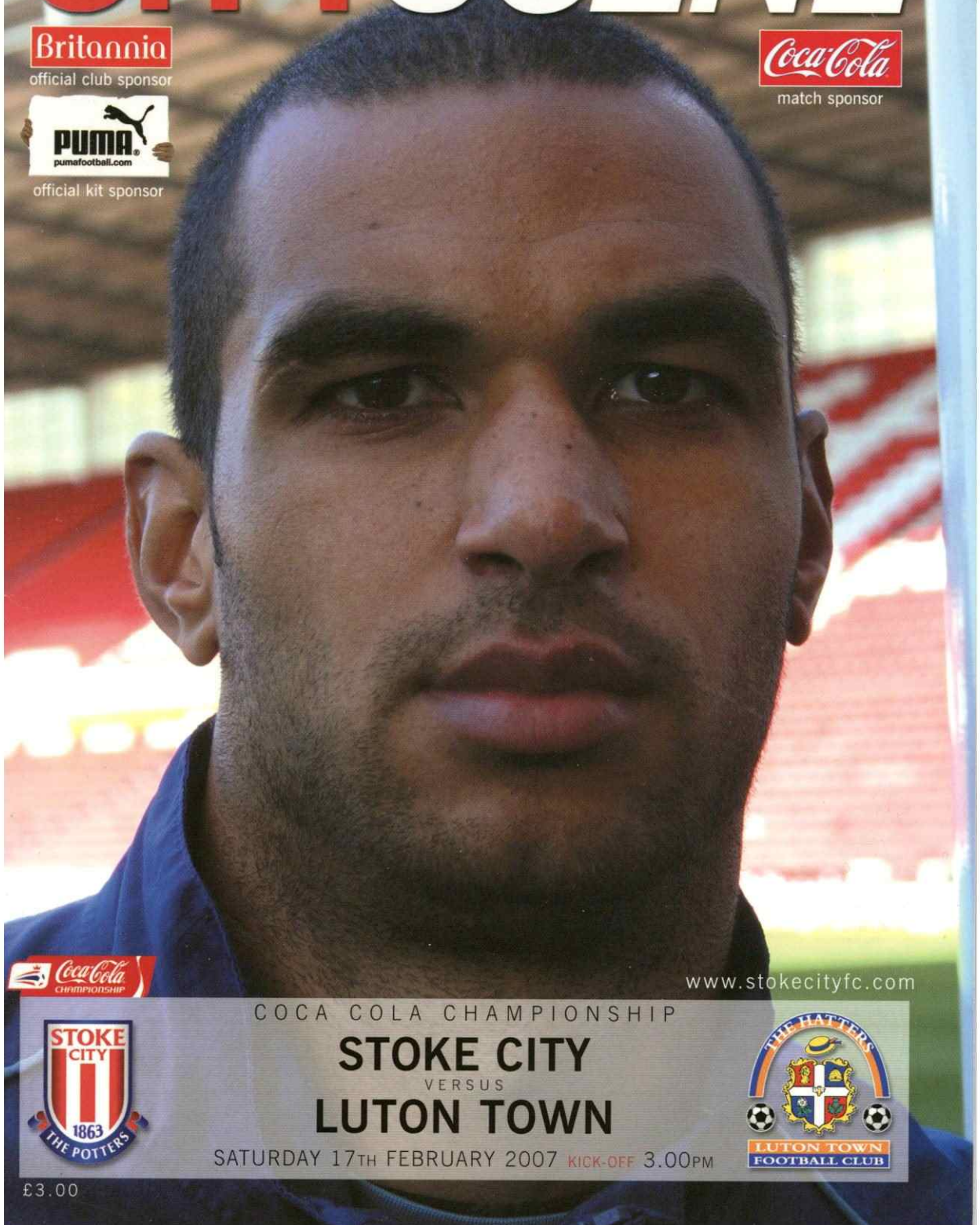

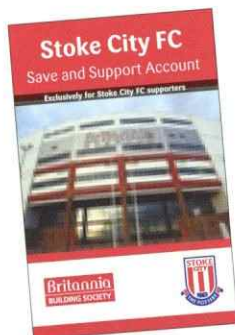

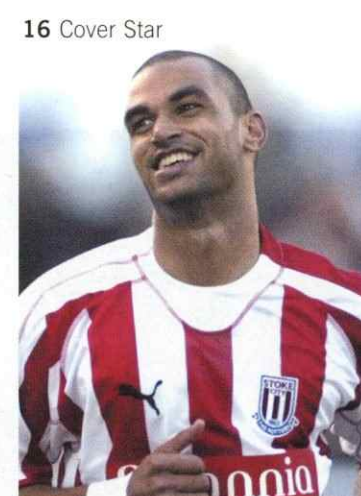

Tony Pulis Manager's Notes

A warm welcome to everyone for another crucial leg in our pursuit of the top six.

We all know results could have been a lot better in recent weeks. But I maintain we haven't played that badly and certainly no-one has outplayed us.

Unfortunately, we've shot ourselves in the foot in front of our own goal at crucial moments, while we haven't quite had that rub of the green everyone needs in front of the opposition goal.

The lads and myself have had a bit of a chat this week and we're all focussed on chasing the same goal.

I have to say the mood amongst the players has been very positive and they all agree we can and deserve to do better than we have in recent weeks.

We've spoken about moving the ball quicker and getting it wider - to create more space and to provide more ammunition for the forwards.

The lads all agree that a new striker is one area of the team we could strengthen for the final push.

But it's not easy persuading Premiership managers to release their better fringe players at this time of the season.

We'll keep chipping away at that one, rest assured, but in the meantime the present players are both determined and capable of pushing things on.

The boys certainly have plenty of confidence in their own ability - and rightly so - because we now have the squad (bar Doobs) that did so well for us before Christmas.



We have to accept that teams will pay us more respect than previously, perhaps, by sitting deep and getting plenty of bodies behind the ball here at the Britannia.

Well, we've just got to be good enough to overcome those problems and take it as a compliment of sorts.

I'm hoping those loan lads returning back to the club will now be that bit fitter and sharper after a game or two under their belts and a couple of weeks of hard training.

But teams sitting deep against us means not only the lads, but also you our fans, will need a lot of patience.

I can only say you've been magnificent for us this season -

home and away - and I'm sure you'll give the lads just the backing they need over this crucial period for us.

Finally, a warm welcome to Mike Newell and everyone associated with Luton Town.

Mike will have his players revved up for this one after a two-week break. I've got the utmost admiration for what he's done at Luton, particularly his ability to get great prices for the many players he's sold.

I hope his chairman appreciates what he's done for that football club.

It really does mean a lot to me personally, particularly as I haven't been here at Stoke that long.

I think the job affects you more off the field because of the extra duties like sorting out tickets for the lads, arranging personal appearances, making sure shirts are signed and all that kind of thing.

I suppose I am the link or the communication between different people and I'm the one generally chasing round after the other lads.

I think it's one of those jobs that will take up more time to start with until it becomes routine.

Sadly, taking over from Doobs hasn't seen results improve as we've drawn at home to Southend and then lost at Birmingham last Sunday.

It's been really frustrating for all of us to see the club slip down the league a bit after dropping those points.

But we are still very much within touching distance of the chasing pack and there's no way the players, management or anyone at the club is chucking in the towel.

There are so many points still to play for and we just need to get back on the kind of run we had earlier in the season.

I think we could also do with that rub of the green everyone needs to turn tight games in victories.

Jonathan Fortune has come in to replace Doobs and I've got to say he's settled in really well alongside me in central defence.

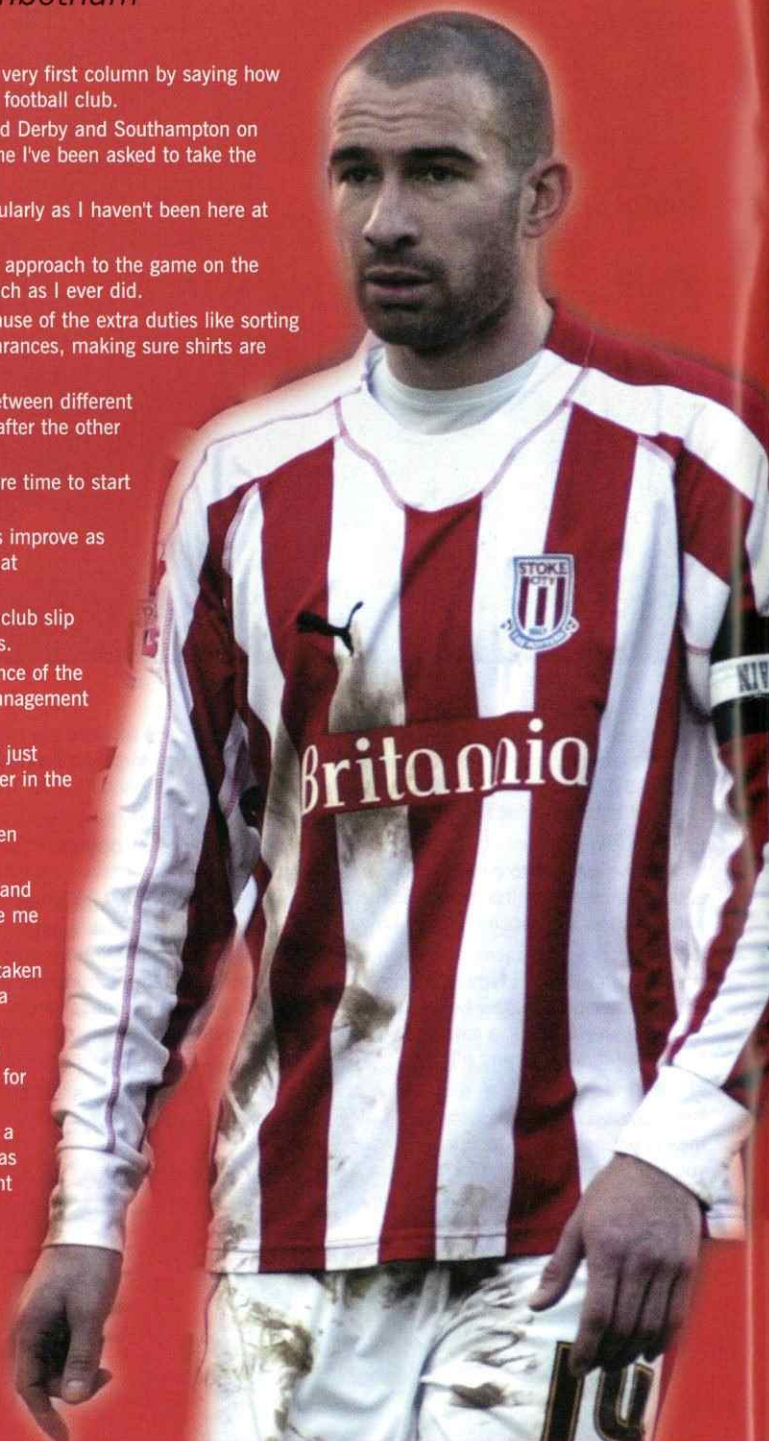
Doobs had been outstanding, but Jonathan has taken on the mantle and even came close to grabbing a late equaliser at Birmingham last Sunday.

We are getting to that stage of the season where just about every team has something big to play for and Luton are certainly no different.

People will look at their recent results and fancy a home win automatically, but we know it's never as easy as that and they've picked up some excellent results away from home this season.

FEBRUARY FORTUNE BIDS TO CASH IN

SATURDAY Stoke City's new loan signing Jonathan Fortune hopes to fill the void left in defence by the departure of his friend Michael Duberry.

The 26-year-old centre-back, who has joined City until the end of the season, is eager for first-team action after struggling for opportunities at Premiership Charlton.

City clinched the deal an hour before Wednesday's midnight transfer deadline - the same day that Duberry signed for Reading for a reported £800,000.

Fortune admits he would prefer to be lining up alongside his pal, but he is now focused on helping City maintain their impressive defensive record.

He said: "I know Doobs quite well from when he was at Chelsea and we were both in London, and it's a shame I didn't get the chance to play here with him." (*The Sentinel*)

MISSED CHANCES - TONY

SUNDAY Tony Pulis has demanded his players become more ruthless in front of goal after missed chances cost the Potters dearly against Southend.

Freddy Eastwood's late goal robbed City of all three points and Pulis admits they can't afford to keep missing golden opportunities.

He says: "We have got to have a more clinical cutting edge in the final third, we created so many chances today but again we failed to put them away."

STOKE SET TO STRIKE

MONDAY Tony Pulis is awaiting the all-clear to sign a goalscoring striker to re-ignite Stoke City's stuttering promotion push.

Pulis said the un-named target is waiting for his club to agree to the move.

"We have someone in mind," he revealed, "and I think the player would like to come."

But it's got to be all right for his club first.

"We can control games for long periods, but we are just missing that cutting edge sometimes."

His comments were apt after Stoke leaked a late equaliser to toss two points away in Saturday's 1-1 draw with Southend.

The game attracted the Britannia's highest gate of the season after Stoke teamed up with The Sentinel to slash admission prices to just £5.

"We're absolutely gutted by the equaliser," said Pulis, "and especially disappointed not to get the win in front of such a big crowd and great atmosphere. The performance, especially in the second half, was good."

"We had enough opportunities around the final third to score the second that would have won the game."

"But it was either not the finish or the final pass we needed. I can't fault the players, though. They worked their socks off." (*The Sentinel*)

FEBRUARY INTERNATIONAL HAT TRICK

WEDNESDAY City youngster Adam Vass earned his second cap on Tuesday night as Hungary went down 2-1 against Cyprus.

The 18-year old became City's youngest ever international three months ago when he starred in his country's win over Canada, and followed that up with another impressive 90 minutes against the Cypriots.

And the City manager insists the lack of goals, just one in the last three games, is beginning to worry him.

"I keep saying this every week," he said, "but overall we have done well defending, we just need to get someone to score the goals."

"We have created good chances again, we just haven't taken them and that's frustrating."

"We are disparately disappointed to get beaten because it is a soft goal to concede but they only had a couple of chances all game."

"I'll just have to keep knocking on manager's doors to see if we can get another striker in as soon as possible."

WEDNESDAY John Eustace today issued a heartfelt plea to Potters boss Tony Pulis: "Please let me play for my Stoke future."

Eustace is praying for another crack at securing a regular midfield slot between now and when his current contract expires in the summer.

The injury-ravaged midfielder started and completed his first Stoke match for three years on Sunday in the 1-0 defeat Championship at Birmingham.

And now he says: "I want a contract at the end of the season and I now need to be playing."

"I haven't missed a day's training since pre-season and I've worked hard to get fit, but you only get 100 per cent fit by playing regularly. I need to show people I can play games, as simple as that."

"I want to stay at this club because I love this club."

There's also unfinished business here and I want to repay the fans for staying behind me all the way."

"I heard their support for me at Birmingham and it was much appreciated. It was a big game for me because it was not only a comeback match, but also at my hometown club." (*The Sentinel*)

FEBRUARY NO PROGRESS IN GOALS BID

THURSDAY Stoke City manager Tony Pulis admits he has made no progress in his bid to bring in a new striker. Pulis is eyeing three un-named Premiership players for possible loan deals to boost goal-shy City's faltering promotion bid - they

have scored just twice in their last four Championship games.

But after seeing City's reserves also fail to hit the target during a goalless Pontin's League draw with their Port Vale counterparts, Pulis vowed not to be pressured into bringing players in.

He explained: "Nothing's happened at the moment, but that's often the way it goes."

"We've been making a lot of effort to bring players in, so I don't see it as a frustration."

"We are looking at the same three players as earlier in the week, but we have to wait for their clubs for it to be right for them."

"They are not our players, so obviously we cannot decide what happens to them."

"I don't feel pressured about bringing a striker in because I don't take too much notice of what is being said. We just have to get on with what we have to get on with and see what happens."

"We can't buy anyone at the moment because it is outside the window, so we are just looking for clubs to help us out with strikers." (*The Sentinel*)

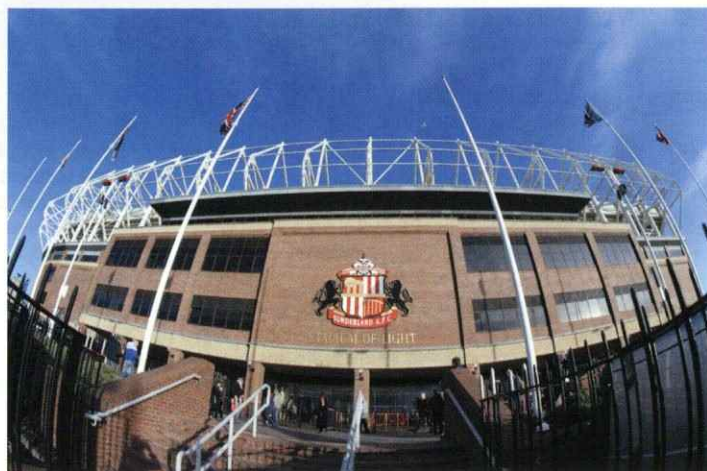

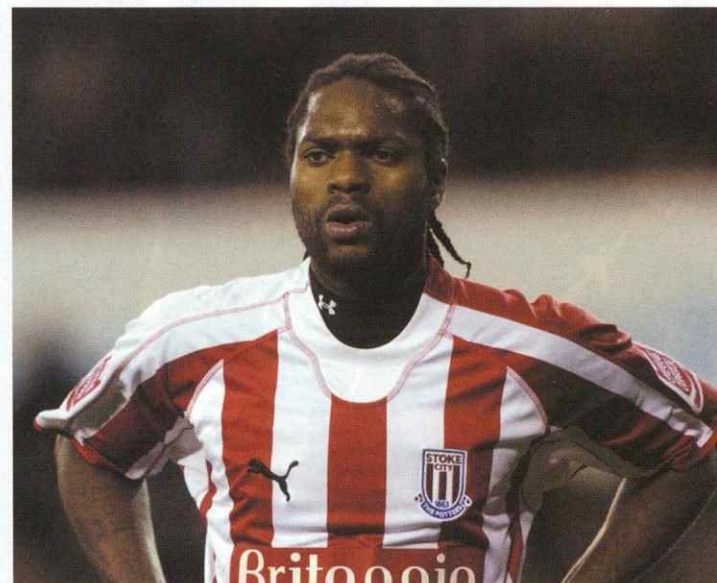

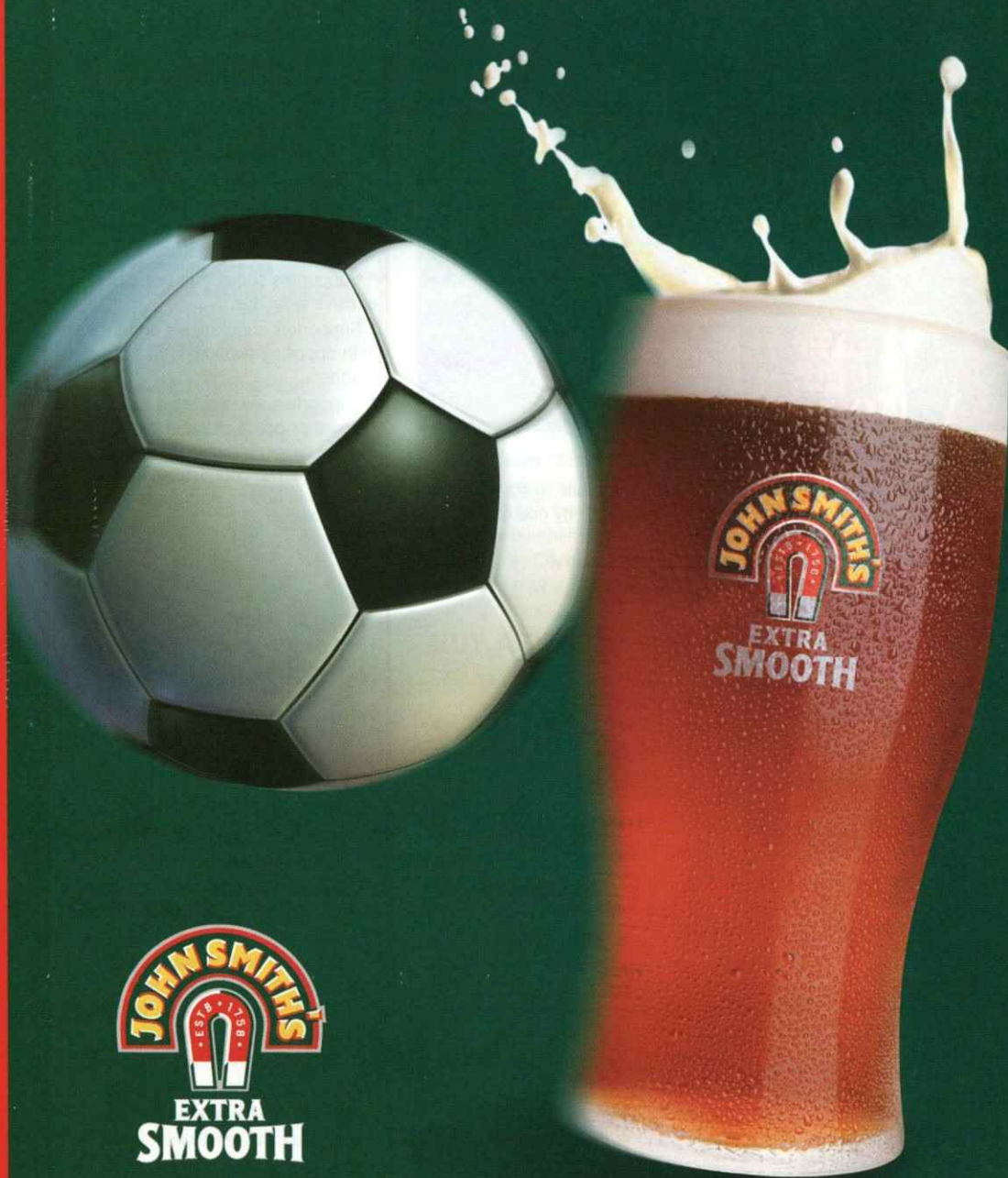

Ricardo Fuller's 8th goal of the season was not enough as Southend rescued at point late on at the Britannia Stadium.

The Jamaican international opened the scoring just after the half hour mark, but Freddy Eastwood's goal with five minutes remaining gave the Shrimpers a share of the points. Southend began brightly at the Britannia Stadium and Eastwood fired an early warning with a spin and shot just wide of the post from 25 yards after three minutes.

City's first opening was created by Lee Hendrie, but Fuller hit the side-netting after running onto the midfielder's pass.

But Fuller eventually gave the Potters the lead with a clinical finish in the 31st minute.

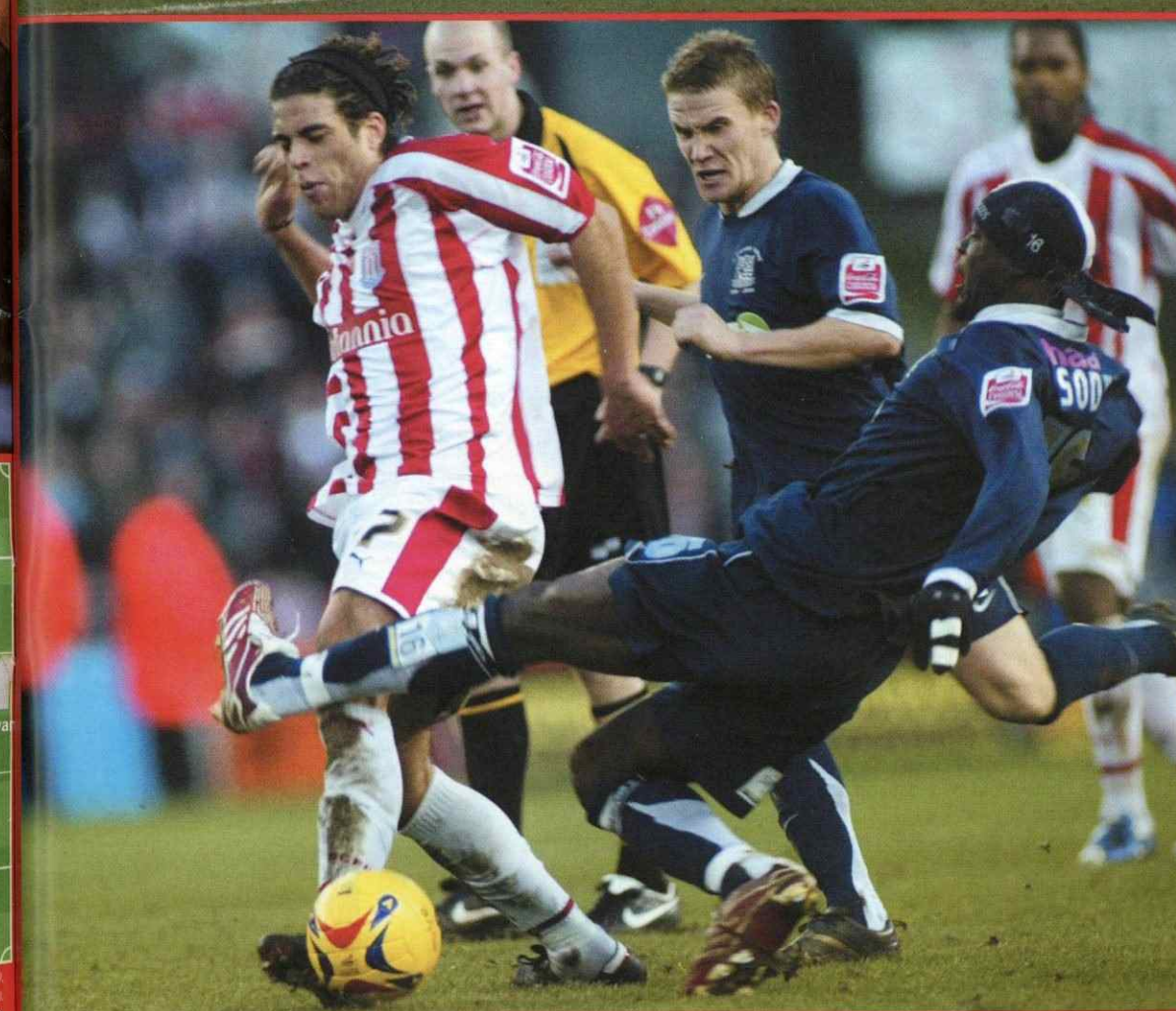
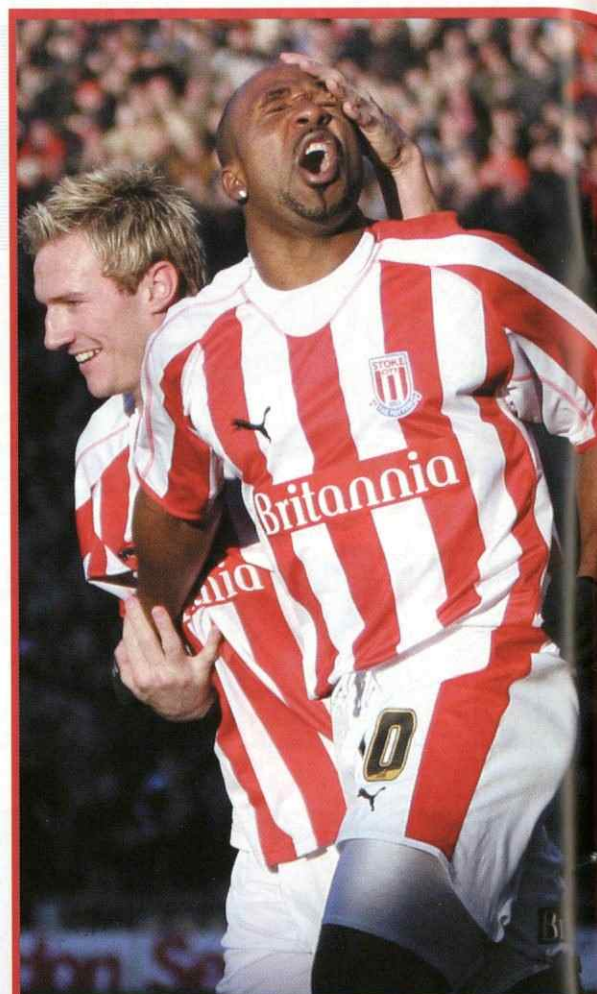
Making his debut after joining on loan from Charlton, Jonathan Fortune lobbed forward, Sidibe flicked on and Fuller raced behind the defence and lashed the ball into the roof of the net.

Sidibe could have added a second but thrashed wide after Hendrie's initial effort was blocked.

After the break, Hendrie dragged an effort just wide after more good play from Fuller, before Ritchie Foran headed wide from Simon Francis' cross.

Fuller continued to carry City's greatest threat and saw a drive deflected over by Foran in the 68th minute.

But just as the game looked beyond the visitors, Eastwood tapped home from six yards out to steal a point.

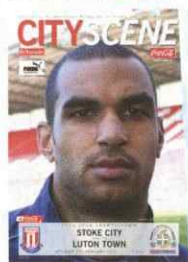

"I would have loved to have played alongside him - not replaced him - but he has got a good move for himself so I wish him well.

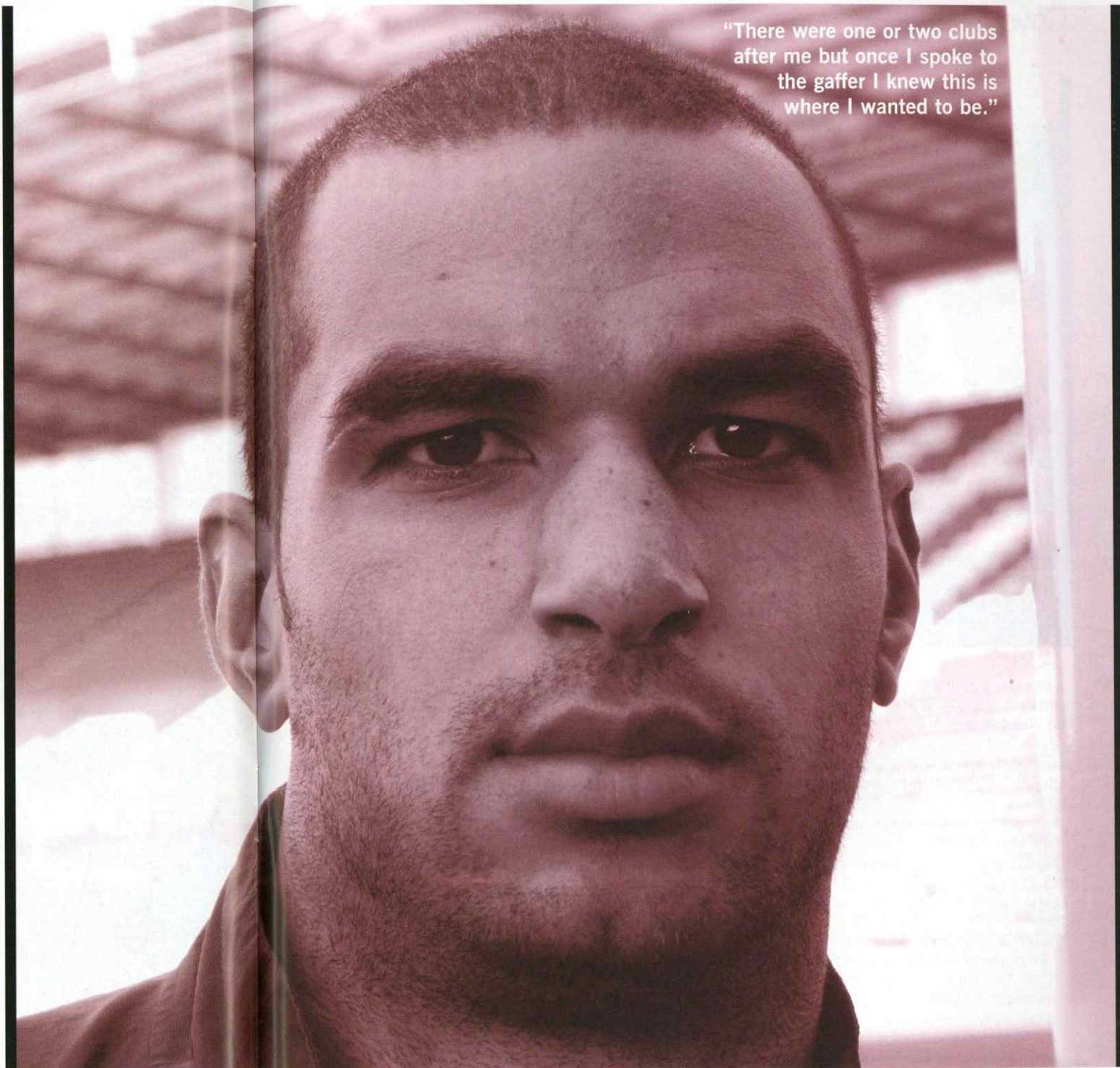
"It's a big shirt to fill and a big presence in the dressing room to take over, but I am up for the challenge.

"I haven't spoken to him since he left. I think I will leave it for a few weeks because he will give me some stick now I have replaced him.

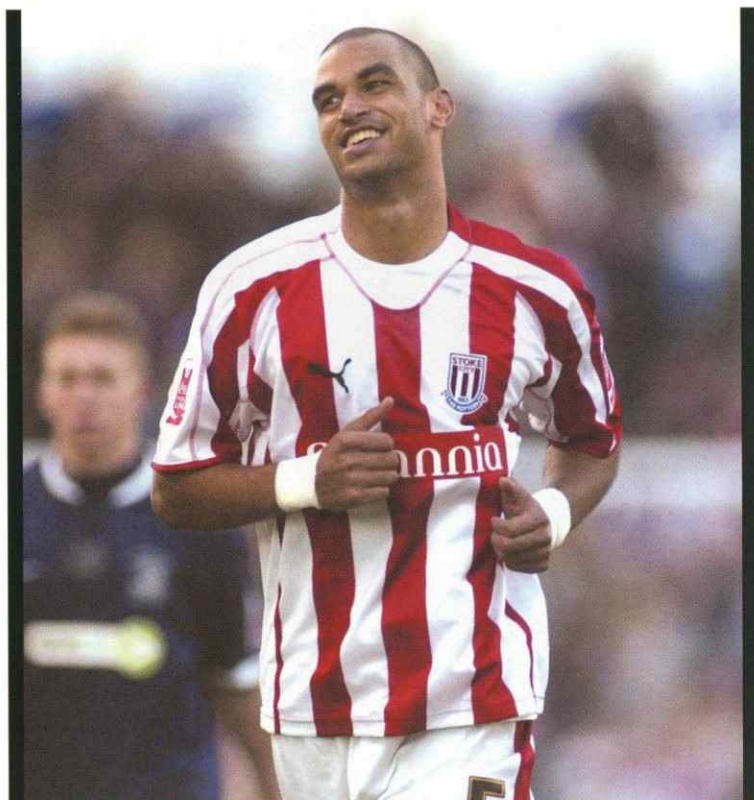
Despite the 26-year old being desperate for the move to City, an eleventh hour change of heart from

But the move was resurrected and he subsequently signed on the dotted line with just one hour of the transfer window remaining.

"The move was on one minute and then off the next," he adds.

"Charlton were playing at Bolton on the eve of the window closing and I travelled up with them thinking I would be joining Stoke.

"Then all of a sudden it was called off, but I had a word with Alan (Pardew) and told him I wanted to go because I was desperate for the games.

"He saw my point and eventually agreed to let me go, Stoke sent coach Mark

O'Connor to the game and we finalised everything there."

The deal for the Islington-born defender brought an end to a hectic month of transfer activity for Tony Pulis, and Jonathan admits it was the hard work and ambition of his new manager which persuaded him to move to the Britannia Stadium.

Says Jonathan: "I was aware of the clubs interest in me for a while and there were also one or two other clubs who had enquired.

"But it was Tony's hopes for the future and the fact that he made me feel really wanted that made my mind up.

"He wants this club in the Premiership and when he said that to me I had no hesitation.

"He also chased me for a long time and made me feel wanted and that is something I haven't felt for a long time."

"There were one or two clubs after me but once I spoke to the gaffer I knew this is where I wanted to be."

After progressing through the youth ranks in south-east London, Jonathan has gone on to make over 100 appearances in the Premiership for the Addicks, and says he hopes to add some more experience to the clubs push for promotion.

"Obviously I came here because I wanted games but the most important thing for the club is to get them in the top division."

"I haven't come here to sit around and mess about I want to push this club on."

"I feel that we definitely have a good shot at reaching the play-offs and I'm very excited about it."

"I have gained quite a bit of knowledge from playing in the Premiership and hopefully I can take that on the pitch with me and play my part."

Moving nearly 200 miles away from home could be considered a daunting challenge but City's new defender says it has been made a lot easier thanks to the help of his new team mates.

"All the players are great they have made me feel really welcome," smiles Jonathan.

"I have settled in well and I feel like I have been here a while, all of the lads have a good laugh and I enjoy being part of it."

"Danny Higginbotham has been a big help, I have played alongside him twice now and he is a good lad to play with, hopefully our understanding will continue to develop over the next few weeks."

Jonathan arrived at the Britannia Stadium tagged as a classy but solid centre half and both of his performances over the past two weeks justify this billing.

But he is adamant there is still a lot more of him for the fans to see.

"My first two games have gone ok," he admits. "I feel I have done pretty well but I felt my legs a bit after the Southend game, but I know I will get back to how I feel I can play in a few weeks."

"The fans haven't seen the best of me yet, I have more to offer and like I say in time that will show."

"The two results have been disappointing but we feel we can bounce straight back from them against Luton and get back on track."

The talented defender has been hotel bound since his arrival, but his home sickness has been eased by the close proximity of a close family member currently plying their trade in the north of the city.

"I think I have spent my time in about four or five different hotels since I arrived here."

"But my cousin Clayton Fortune plays for Port Vale so I have spent a lot of time recently at his house and knocking about with him so that has been good."

"We have a bit of banter now because of the rivalry and stuff but its all good fun."

Making over 100 appearances in the Premier League is no mean feat, however finding regular football this season has been difficult and has left him scratching his head regarding his future.

But the on loan defender says he just wants to show everyone what he is capable of and will sit down with his parent club during the summer.

"I don't know what will happen at the end of the season, I am still contracted to Charlton so it will be up to them."

"We will see what the future holds, but my immediate future is here and I just want to help the club and show everyone what I can do."

Visitors Luton Town

Luton's habit of making a flying start to their season was again in full swing this campaign - but a disastrous last three months has seen their fortunes reversed.

Eleven points from the opening six games saw the Hatters sitting in the top six, however they hit a torrid spell in October and November and lost eight games on the bounce.

Their season has stuttered ever since and they currently find themselves hovering precariously above the drop zone.

But if anyone can help them retain their status as a Championship club, then manager Mike Newell is the man to do it.

The outspoken Luton boss is a folk hero at Kenilworth Road after masterminding back to back promotions during an extremely successful last four years, and he will be determined to get the club back on track starting today.

The players picked up vital Championship experience on their way to a 10th place finish last season and they will need to find that feel good factor, which was evident during the last campaign, if they are to pull away from the bottom six.

The task of following up last season's impressive top half place with something even better this season was made more difficult by the summer sales of star striker Steve Howard to Derby and key midfielder Kevin Nicholls to Leeds.

And add the fact that influential winger Carlos Edwards moved to Sunderland in the January transfer, it's not difficult to see why they have struggled.

Those departures, together with last season's sale of Curtis Davies to West Brom, meant a £5m windfall, while outlay has been modest in comparison with £125,000 going on Rushden's David Bell over a year ago and £500,000 for Hartlepool's top scorer Adam Boyd last July.

But with the likes of Boyd, Sam Parkin, Warren Feeney and new £250,000 signing Drew Talbot, there could yet be enough goals in the squad to steer them away from trouble.

Parkin (pictured), a summer buy from Ipswich Town has a



proven goal scoring pedigree after scoring nearly 80 goals in three seasons with Swindon Town, however he has found life a little more difficult in the Championship but he could still be a saving grace over the final few months of the season.

Boyd is another player to have struggled in the second tier of English football following an extremely successful spell in the lower leagues, just one goal has been his return so far and Newell will be expecting a lot more from the 24-year old.

Fans favourite Matthew Spring returned home in January following spells with Leeds and Watford, and his experience could be invaluable if the Hatters are to retain their spot in this division.

Richard Langley, Ahmet Brkovic and the on-loan Fulham midfielder Bjorn Runstrom all add quality and bite to the team and Newell could call on them as he aims to pick up a much needed three points this afternoon.

Markus Heikkinen and Russell Perrett form the heart of the defence, with the highly rated duo of Kevin Foley and Sol Davis taking up the role as full backs.

Heikkinen is a Swedish international and his signing was a real coup for the club after beating off several higher league clubs to his signature.

Former Middlesbrough keeper Marlon Beresford has been between the sticks for today's visitors over the past few weeks and will be hoping for a clean sheet today.

Games between City and Luton down the years have thrown up plenty of drama - perhaps most famously the 4-4 draw at the old Victoria Ground in the early 1980's.

But last season's two meetings were spicy enough with City nicking it at home thanks to that late Brammer strike and then repeating the dose on Town soil last December when Chris Coyne's bizarre injury-time own goal clinched a 3-2 win.

Earlier this season the Potters came away from Kenilworth Road with a point thanks to strikes from Peter Sweeney and Luke Chadwick.

As football managers go Mike Newell is arguably one of the most controversial.

He has spoken out publicly about transfer bungs, female officials and criticised the influence of foreign players - however he is still regarded as one of the most talented young managers in the game.

But, before turning to management, Mike had a prolonged playing career, spanning thirteen different clubs, and made over 500 appearances, scoring near on 100 goals.

Mike enjoyed spells with Crewe Alexandra, Luton and Everton but it was at Ewood Park with Blackburn Rovers where he made the biggest impression, picking up a Premiership winners medal in 1995 as well as scoring the fastest-ever Champions League hat trick against Rosenborg a year later.

After retiring from the playing side in 2001, his management career began two years later at Hartlepool United.

But despite clinging on to an automatic promotion spot, Mike was eventually dismissed for almost squandering a 16 point lead.

He was handed the Luton Town job soon after and led the club from relegation candidates to table toppers in two seasons.

Last season, as a promoted club in the Championship, Luton were expected to be involved in a relegation battle, but this was not the case as Newell led them to 10th in the table.

His record did not go unnoticed as he was linked with managerial jobs at Leicester City, Derby County and Ipswich Town, but spurned the opportunities to stay at Kenilworth Road.

This season Mike has been in the spotlight for a number of different public outbursts, but despite being threatened with the sack, he has held on to the job and will be looking to guide them to Championship safety.

Veteran keeper Marlon had the most successful period of his career at Burnley in the 90's, where he made over 300 appearances for the Clarets.

He began his career at Sheffield Wednesday though, and despite never playing a game for the Owls, he did have numerous loan spells at lower league clubs.

Following nearly five years at Turf Moor, he made the move to Middlesbrough in 1998 but was used largely as an understudy goalkeeper.

His quest for first team action saw him go out on loan numerous times again before leaving Boro for York City in the summer 2002.

Beresford continued to have short spells at other clubs before signing for Luton in the summer of 2004 after impressing in a previous loan spell. He has made over 120 appearances for the Hatters.

KEVIN FOLEY*Position: Defender**Squad Number: 2**Date of Birth: 01/11/84**Previous Clubs: None*

Born and bred in Luton, Kevin made his league debut for the club in April 2003, coming on as a substitute in the 2-2 draw with Bristol City.

His first league goal came in the following season's 2-0 win against City's local rivals Port Vale. Kevin also has international experience after featuring for the Republic of Ireland Under-21 and "B" squads.

A regular for Luton Town, Kevin can also play on the right of midfield.

SOL DAVIS*Position: Defender**Squad Number: 3**Date of Birth: 04/09/79**Previous Clubs: Swindon Town*

Sol began his career as a trainee at Swindon Town and quickly made his mark in the first team.

When his contract expired in the summer of 2002 though, Sol was tempted into a move to Luton Town by then boss Joe Kinnear.

The tough tacking left back proved a successful acquisition for the Hatters and was awarded the Players' Player of the Year award at the end of the 2004/5 season.

In October of last year, Davis suffered a stroke on the way to Town's game with Ipswich. He lost feeling on the left side of his body and his speech was also impaired, but Davis has since made a return to action and has regained his place in the side.

Aussie defender Chris began his footballing career in his homeland with Perth Soccer Club.

Harry Redknapp forked out £150,000 to take the centre half to Upton Park after he caught his eye in the 1994 Youth World Cup, but Coyne only managed one appearance for the club in a four year spell.

He did complete successful loan spells elsewhere though and did enough to persuade Dundee to sign him on a free in the summer of 2000.

Following 30 appearances for the SPL outfit, a £50,000 move to Kenilworth Road followed in 2001. Since then, he's made over 210 appearances for the Hatters and was named in the PFA Team of the Season at the end of Town's championship season of 2005.

RUSSELL PERRETT*Position: Defender**Squad Number: 5**Date of Birth: 18/06/73**Previous Clubs: Portsmouth, Cardiff City*

Defender Russell made his first ever league appearance for Portsmouth in a 1-0 home defeat to Norwich back in 1996.

After over 80 appearances on the South Coast, he made the move to Cardiff City, he stayed for only two seasons.

Since arriving at Luton in 2001, he's gone on to make over 100 appearances for the Hatters.

Matthew's career has gone full circle after recently returning to the club where it all started.

He joined Luton as a schoolboy and made his debut for the club aged only 17.

He clocked up 100 appearances at only 20 and had made over 280 before leaving the club on a free transfer for Leeds in the summer of 2004.

After an unsuccessful season at Elland Road, he signed for Watford in a deal worth £150,000 and was promoted in his first season with the club.

His appearances were limited for the Hornets this season though and jumped at the opportunity to move back home.

STEVE ROBINSON*Position: Midfield**Squad Number: 8**Date of Birth: 10/12/74**Previous Clubs: Tottenham, Leyton Orient (loan), Bournemouth, Preston, Bristol City (loan)*

Northern Irish international midfielder who began his footballing life as a trainee at Spurs but has made the majority of his appearances at Bournemouth, following a free transfer in October 1994.

He scored over 60 goals for the Cherries and earned himself a big money move to Preston. Due to limited opportunities he moved on again after only 2 years in Lancashire, completing a £50,000 move to Luton in 2002.

He's moved over 160 appearances for Town scoring over 10 goals.

BJÖRN RUNSTRÖM*Position: Striker**Squad Number: 9**Date of Birth: 03/11/84**Previous Clubs: Bologna, Chievo, Fiorentina, Hammarby IF, Fulham*

Swedish hitman Björn signed from Fulham on the final day of the January transfer Window.

He grew up playing for Enskede and Hammarby at youth level before signing for Bologna. He only ever made the bench for the Seria A club, before moving on to Chievo and then to Fiorentina.

He returned to Hammarby in 2004 where he scored 18 goals in 57 games before earning a £700,000 move to England last summer.

Featuring only twice for the Cottagers, Runström joined Luton in the hope more regular games.

WARREN FEENEY*Position: Striker**Squad Number: 10**Date of Birth: 17/01/81**Previous Clubs: Leeds, Bournemouth (loan), Bournemouth, Stockport*

Another Northern Irish international in the ranks at Kenilworth Road, Warren began his career at Leeds United.

He was soon loan out to Bournemouth to gain experience but the move became permanent in the summer of 2001.

Scoring 37 goals for the Cherries in two spells was enough for Stockport to pay £45,000 for his services.

His record there was almost a goal every other game and before his first season there at ended, Luton came in acquired him for £150,000.

He has scored twice for his country, one against Azerbaijan and one against Portugal.

DEAN MORGAN*Position: Midfielder**Squad Number: 11**Date of Birth: 03/10/83**Previous Clubs: Reading, Colchester*

Dean became an instant favourite with Luton fans after his 90th minute winner in the 3-2 victory over Southampton in August 2005.

Morgan moved to Kenilworth Stadium from Reading in July 2005 after seeing his opportunities limited at the Madejski Stadium.

The former Colchester striker scored three league goals in 13 starting appearances for the Royals. Morgan, who once had a trial with the Hatters earlier in his career, came through the ranks at Colchester where he scored six goals in 25 appearances, including a 35-yard screamer against Cardiff City at Ninian Park.

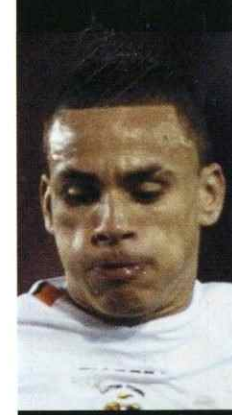

Luton had fought off competition from top London clubs for his signature and during his time with the Hatters he has also been a regular at schoolboy level for the Republic of Ireland

LEWIS EMANUEL*Position: Defender**Squad Number: 16**Date of Birth: 04/10/83**Previous Clubs: Bradford City*

Lewis arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2006 after deciding to leave his home town club Bradford City, the place where the defender started his career.

The 24-year old is a pacy full-back but can also play on the left side of midfield, a position where he started on his league debut for the club. Lewis made over 150 appearances for Bradford in six-years at the club.

Lewis has proved a valuable signing and has gone on to make 28 appearances for the Hatters, scoring one goal.

RICHARD LANGLEY*Position: Midfielder**Squad Number: 17**Date of Birth: 27/12/79**Previous Clubs: Cardiff City, QPR*

Richard signed for Luton Town in July 2006 after being released by former club QPR.

A hard working midfielder, Richard started his career at Loftus Road after progressing through their youth ranks and went on to make nearly 150 appearances for the club. He became a firm favourite at QPR and in the 2002/03 season, Langley enjoyed a magical season, scoring ten goals from midfield, including a hat-trick in a 3-1 win over Blackpool in March 2003.

It was his form that year which prompted Cardiff to splash out £200,000 for the midfielder and which led to him gaining international caps for Jamaica.

At the start of the 2003/04 season, Langley scored for Jamaica in international friendlies against Cuba and Paraguay and went on to score six goals for his new club that season. Unfortunately, Langley couldn't repeat that form for Cardiff in the following season and was transferred back to QPR in August 2005. Last season, Langley made 34 appearances for QPR, scoring three goals.

AHMET BRKOVIC*Position: Midfield**Squad Number: 18**Date of Birth: 23/09/74**Previous Clubs: Leyton Orient*

Ahmet is a tidy and hard working member of the squad who had an inspirational season during the club's championship success in League One, scoring 16 goals from midfield. Believing a move would be good for his career, he refused new terms at Leyton Orient in the summer of 2001, to join Luton on a Bosman free transfer - Orient had signed him on a free from HNK Dubrovnik in the autumn of 1999.

The Croatian is more suited to a right midfield role but is equally comfortable playing on the left, a position he has filled many times this season.

SAM PARKIN*Position: Striker**Squad Number: 19**Date of Birth: 14/03/81**Previous Clubs: Chelsea, Swindon Town, Millwall (loan), Wycombe (loan), Oldham (loan), Ipswich Town, Northampton (loan)*

Ex-Chelsea trainee Sam is a forward with a prolific goal scoring record, and chose Kenilworth Road as the place to further his career in August 2006.

After signing for League One side Swindon Town in August 2002, Parkin set the Football League world alight, scoring 67 league goals in 120 appearances.

Naturally, his goal scoring talents captured the attention of the bigger clubs, and Parkin signed for Ipswich Town in the summer of 2005 for £550,000 - unfortunately, a broken ankle forced him to miss much of the 2005/06 season, although he still managed to score five goals in 17 Championship appearances.

After fees were agreed with both Preston and Luton, 25-year-old Parkin had a straight choice of two Championship clubs, but signed a three-year deal at Kenilworth Road, costing the club £340,000.

ADAM BOYD*Position: Striker**Squad Number: 20**Date of Birth: 25/05/82**Previous Clubs: Hartlepool, Boston (loan), Boston*

Luton splashed out £500,000 on striker Adam from Hartlepool United in July 2006, signing him to a three-year contract.

Adam is a skilful striker who scored 60 goals in six years at the Victoria Ground - Hatters boss Newell knows plenty about the striker having worked with Adam when he was the manager of Hartlepool earlier in his career. His most prolific campaign for Hartlepool was in the 2004/05 season when his 29 goals helped the club reach the League One play-off final however a limited number of chances have hampered his hopes of immediate success at Kenilworth Road.

MARKUS HEIKKINEN*Position: Defender**Squad Number: 26**Date of Birth: 13/10/78**Previous Clubs: Portsmouth, Aberdeen*

Mike Newell pulled off a real coup with the signing of Aberdeen central defender Markus. Although born in Sweden, Markus is a Finnish international and in 2005 he partnered Liverpool's Sami Hyypia during their World Cup qualifying win over Macedonia.

Markus has made an impressive start to his stay at Kenilworth Road since being called as a late replacement for Chris Coyne who was injured in the warm-up in the club's opening Championship win over Crystal Palace last season.

DREW TALBOT*Position: Striker**Squad Number: 30**Date of Birth: 19/07/86**Previous Clubs: Barnsley, Sheffield Wednesday*

Drew signed for Luton Town in a £250,000 deal in January 2007 from Sheffield Wednesday as Hatters boss Newell looked to strengthen his options in attack.

Originally on the books of Barnsley, he drifted out of football after injury but came back with Wednesday's academy in the 03/04 season.

Often coming off the substitutes bench he scored goals in Wednesday's 2004/05 promotion season including one at Cardiff in the League One play off final against Huddersfield.

After his impressive first full season at Hillsborough, he was not to play again until September 2006, where he made a substitute appearance against Derby County in a 2-1 home defeat.

During the January 2007 transfer window, Talbot signed a loan-contract with League One promotion-chasers Scunthorpe United before signing at Kenilworth Road

Right Chris, let's go back to your move into the English game – you joined West Ham from Perth, how did that come about?

It was through an agent getting in contact with West Ham. I was away at the Youth World Cup in South America, and it just progressed from there. I was asked to come over for a couple of weeks and I must have done alright with my trial because I was then asked to sign for three years at West Ham.

It must have been quite a decision for a young lad to move to the other side of the World; did it take much to convince you?

Obviously I sat down and spoke with my parents about it and ironed out the pros and cons, but to be fair it was something I'd always wanted to do since I was a kid, to come over and play in Europe. At the time the Australian league wasn't that strong and I just saw it as a step in the right direction if I wanted to have a professional football career.

You made quite an impact at Upton Park and you were part of the youth team which reached the FA Youth Cup Final, what do you remember of that time?

It was a fantastic time; we also won the South East Counties League a couple of times, which was quite a strong league. It was a good time, obviously West Ham have always prided themselves on youth development and that side of the game, so it was exciting times. Most of the players are playing at a decent level now and have stayed in the game, which I think is testament to the Academy they have there.

You had two loan spells, at Brentford and Southend, how much of a culture shock was it for you to go there with all the trimmings that West Ham held? Initially it was a culture shock, but once you get into the dressing room and you're in that footballing environment, but it's just about the football on Saturday that matters.

You don't seem to be afraid of travelling, you then left Upton Park and it was off to Scotland and Dundee.

Once you've travelled 10,000 kilometres another couple of hundred isn't going to hurt! I thought it was the right thing to do at the time, and I thoroughly enjoyed my time up there. But when you're that far away from home it doesn't really matter if it's ten minutes away or ten hours.

You had one season up there and then it was back south to Kenilworth Road, what do you remember of that move?

I was very pleased it happened because once I'd sat down and spoke with Joe Kinnear and Mick Harford, they sold the club to me pretty much, and what they told me has come true. They said they were going places and when I signed we were in the Third Division, so they were true to their word and they started to take Luton where they thought they should belong and they're now in the Championship, so it's turned out to be the right decision for me.

You've been at Kenilworth Road for five and a half years now, and obviously you've had some great times along the way there.

Yes, in the first year I was there we managed promotion into League One, and then we were fortunate enough to get promoted into the Championship, and that was a fantastic time.

You were also named in the PFA League One side in 2004/2005, which was a great achievement.

Yes, it was a tremendous honour, something I didn't expect, and then when you do get the honour you're in there with five of your team mates as well. It was a great honour, not only for me but for my team mates after the performances they put in throughout the season.

Talking of proud moments, you must have been proud when you were made captain.

Yes. It's something you don't think much of at the time, but it is a privilege to be given that honour and it's something I do cherish. It's just unfortunate I've missed so much of it through injury.

I haven't seen a lot of Luton this season, but what I have seen you seem to be playing some decent football, particularly the rout you did on Leeds, so I'm a bit surprised to find you at the wrong end of the table.

Yes, to be honest we thought we'd be top six pushing for promotion this year with the squad that we've got, but unfortunately when you're missing seven, eight, nine players constantly throughout the year, players who would probably have played week in week out, it's hard and the manager hasn't got that continuity of selection every week. But it's one of those things you have to accept and I think the position we find ourselves in now, it's one of six or seven in such a tight spot to get out of the relegation zone. It's not a position we expected to find ourselves in, but we know with the squad that we've got and the football we do play, then we'll play out way out of it.

I guess the message to the Luton fans is that you'll be fighting tooth and nail to make sure you'll be in this division next season.

Yes, of course. Because we are such a close knit group and we get on so well away from football

as well as on the pitch, I think that's going to stand us in good stead because we all will fight to the death for each other. In successful times it's worked for us, so hopefully it'll happen while we're at the wrong end of the table.

You touched on your injury there; you've been out for a few weeks with a knee injury, what's the latest on that?

It's good news. I had an operation in the summer and then came back from that and was unfortunate to pick up an injury on the same knee, but fortunately that had nothing to do with the previous injury so it was just a matter of a couple of weeks out rather than a couple of months.

You've obviously got relatives and friends in Australia; do you get much chance to travel back?

I try and get back as often as possible. Every end of season I go back because my family are over there and I tend to go over every May or June for a few weeks. I recharge my batteries and catch up with friends and family.

What hobbies do you have outside of the game, Chris?

I don't mind a bit of golf.

On then to music, do you have a favourite band or artist?

I listen to absolutely everything, to be honest with you; None of this girly pop music, but apart from that, I just like listening to anything.

Let's move onto the game then, how do you see it going?

Well, it's hard to say, I watched the game on TV on Sunday and I was impressed. I thought they probably deserved something out of it, but at the same time I think we're playing quite well at the moment without getting results, so now we've taken a point away from home at Leicester, we'll be looking to push on. The Britannia's a difficult place to go to, but at this time of the season it doesn't really matter where we go, we've got to get a result so we'll be looking to do well, whether it's a performance or whether it's a result, either way.

Do you have any memories of games you've played in against Stoke?

No, I haven't actually, because I was injured last year when we played Stoke. That was when my knee problems started.

Finally Chris, neck on the line or sit on the fence, what's the score going to be?

I think it will be 2-1 to Luton!

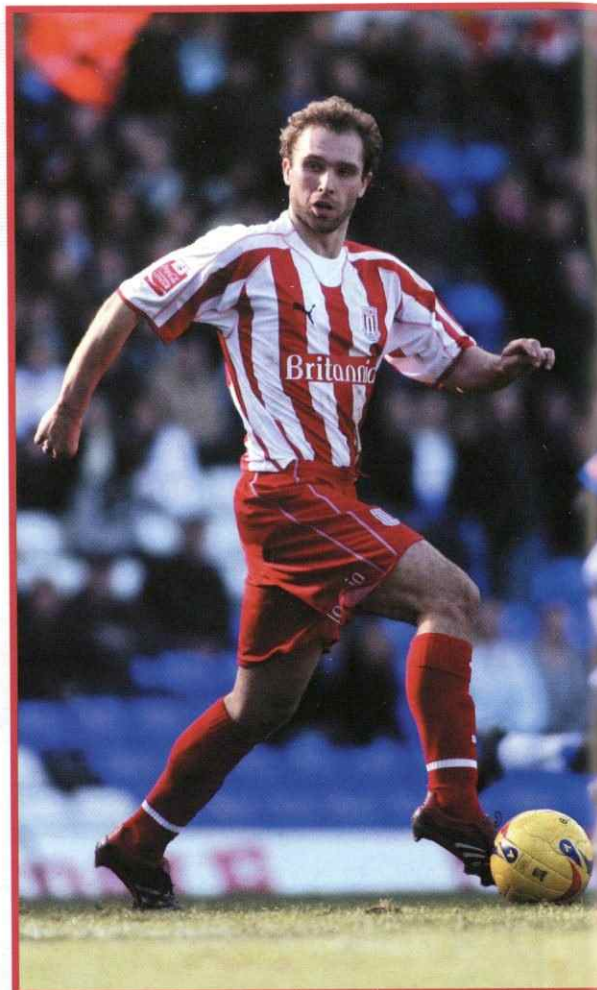

CULT-HERO - JACKIE MARSH

Jackie is second left in the League Cup winning side



City 'Cult Hero' Jackie Marsh saw his footballing career take him onto the World stage.

Spells in Bulova (Hong Kong), Los Angeles (USA) and of course Stoke-On-Trent enabled him to showcase his talents at every corner of the globe, and his time in America saw him teamed up with arguably the best British player of all time.

The player in question was George Best.

The legendary former Northern Ireland international sadly passed away in 2005, and Jackie says his spell across the Atlantic Ocean was a memory he will cherish forever.

"When I left Stoke I went to Hong Kong for a bit, but probably the best thing I did was when I joined Los Angeles Aztecs in '76'.

"Stoke terminated my contract for three months during the summer and I went over to the States where I played with 'Besty'.

"He was a great bloke irrespective of what the press and papers described him as, and he was a very sincere gentleman.

"I always thought of him as a really nice man who was very sociable, I had a really great time over there and it was good seeing the different lifestyle.

"We had some really good times over there, and George made everything so much easier. He was there to talk to and always had a laugh with you which was good."

A born-and-bred Potter, Jackie was one of a crop of local youngsters who came through the ranks in the 1960's.

He joined City upon leaving school, turning professional in June 1965, after an apprenticeship during which he had the responsibility of cleaning the boots of a certain Stanley Matthews. And admits he never wanted to be anywhere else.

"Stoke was the only place I wanted to be, all I dreamt about as a kid was playing for the club," says Jackie.

"Stoke was my boyhood team, I can remember going down and watching from the Boothern end in the late 1950s.

"Then I signed as a Schoolboy in 1963, served two years and was handed my first professional contract in '65.

"It was an absolute dream come true, to get the chance to play for the club you love is a brilliant

feeling and something I will obviously never ever forget."

A chance to play on the turf of the old Wembley Stadium for the club you support is what dreams are made of and Jackie's dream turned into reality in 1972.

After being part of the squad which ousted West Ham in the semi-finals, a place in the final beckoned and it was as Jackie describes an 'unbelievable experience'.

"It wasn't even in my wildest dreams to play at Wembley with the club I love," says Jackie.

"But to do it in front of all of those Stokies, it didn't seem real it was like a pipe dream.

"The fans had been starved of success for a long time, so to win something for them was absolutely unbelievable.

"There were over 40,000 of them there that day and they drowned out the Chelsea supporters.

"When we scored the entire stadium just erupted and it was a sea of red and white, even in the Chelsea end there were Stoke scarves flying around."

Locally bred players were ripe in the 60's and 70's - and City were no exception.

Tony Waddington mustered a squad together with a large contingent of Stoke-On-Trent based youngsters, and Jackie admits the League Cup win meant as much to them as it did to the fans.

He says: "I was a local lad and so were all of the other defenders, Mike Pejic, Denis Smith and Alan Bloor so we were just as happy as the fans because we were all fans ourselves.

"In those days, lots of players played for the club where they had been

brought up, and it made football more passionate. They wore the clubs' crest with pride."

Following a distinguished career which saw the former City full back make 424 appearances for the club, he eventually hung up his boots in 1984 after finishing playing with Northwich Victoria.

"I think Tony has done a fantastic job this season, a lot of people were skeptical when he first arrived but the players he has got in have given the club a genuine chance.

"The form has dipped a little bit over the last few weeks but they can bounce back and get back on track.

"The Championship is so unpredictable and I believe anyone can be up there, but I don't think Stoke will have many better chances of getting promotion than they have this season.

"Tony has the ability to get the best out of players and I genuinely believe that he can take the club all the way."

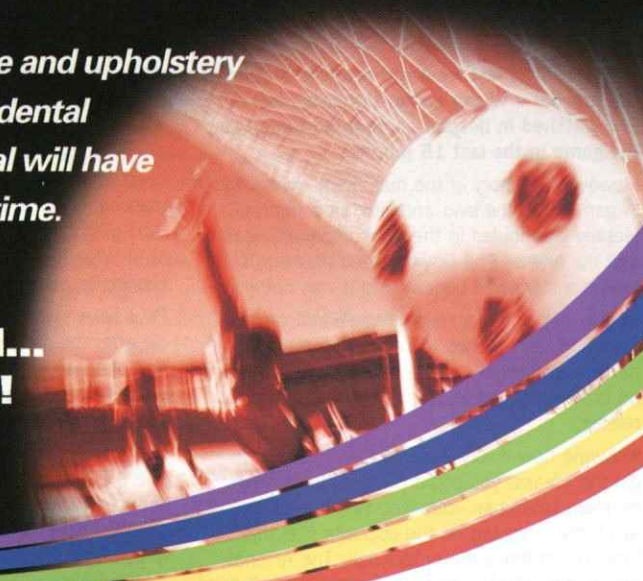

COSTLY DECISIONS, LUCKY ARSENAL, AND AVOIDING THE DROP

The headlines last weekend revolved around the Arsenal v Wigan game. I'm sure most of you watched in despair as poor old Wigan lost the game in the last 15 minutes.

However, the story of the match was that with Wigan 1-0 in the lead and looking comfortable, Heskey was fouled in the Arsenal penalty area and the referee Phil Dowd waved play on. It looked a stonewall penalty and it was not given.

In this instance I feel the referee's assistant or linesman, as we used to call him, was in a perfect position to make a decision. That's what he is there for, yet he was of no help to the referee.

Knowing how 'lucky' Arsenal always seem to get the breaks, you could put your life savings on them getting an equaliser. When it came, again the linesman on the opposite side this time, didn't make the proper call. The Arsenal player was offside when he crossed the ball and the goal should not have counted. Again, the referee was let down by his assistant.

The winning goal was controversial, to say the least. Skoko, who was on loan here last season, was off the pitch getting treatment. The assistant was ready to let him resume, but the

referee let Arsenal take a free kick and Wigan were a man short. You know the rest, Arsenal scored and that victory could seal fourth place in the League and entrance to the Champion's League. The pot of gold, should they be reasonably successful, will amount to about £30 million. However, whichever way you look at it, Wigan were robbed or mugged, whatever expression suits.

Paul Jewell will have to face the FA to explain his after the match comments. Now come the end of season, Wigan will be sweating that those points lost at the Emirates Stadium won't cost them their Premiership status. Big bucks lost, whatever way you look at it.

The 64,000 dollar question is, are the officials accountable for their performances last weekend? It's okay demoting them for a couple of games in the lower Leagues, but that's not punishment.

As we all know, there is a fine line between winning and losing. Sometimes, that applies to managers' jobs. Injuries, lack of money, dwindling crowds, conspire against managers. Sometimes it's beyond their control. Just look at West Ham.



Technology will eventually be introduced into our game. It has to come. There's too much at stake nowadays. I'm not saying it will apply to everything, but contentious decisions such as penalties given or not given. If the referee is in doubt and even though they won't admit it, they give decisions on the spur of the moment, which later they regret. They would welcome help of some description. The time element would just take a few seconds.

As in Rugby, the fans would welcome it too. The law of averages work and over the season teams will find that the system is a fair one. Look at the fear that's now gripping Charlton and West Ham. A new owner comes into West Ham and cannot wait to get rid of the manager. Alan Curbishley comes in and performances are no better. What does that suggest? Last season, with the same players, they qualified for Europe and were minutes away from the glory of winning the Cup. Desire, hunger, call it what you like, is no longer there. Contracts were improved for the players and rightly so. But the job doesn't work like that. The rot has now set in and I cannot see how West Ham will avoid the drop.

As I have said earlier, circumstances can conspire against the manager and this looks a classic case of just turning up for the money. No matter how good a manager you are, if the

players aren't willing to put the effort in week in week out, then I'm afraid there are only casualties in the end. Expect a huge clear out at Upton Park come the end of the season.

Charlton have got rid of two managers in quick succession and after all the years of consolidation in the Premiership, now look doomed to return to the much more competitive Championship division. A relegation battle does age you, as we all know, and I'm not talking about the managers.

Finally, a simple introduction again for referees is the control of time. No fan ever agrees with the amount of added on time. If your team is winning by a single goal, then the dreaded board goes up with four maybe five minutes extra. We all wonder where that's come from, don't we? Now if you're losing, then a one minute or two goes up, and you're flabbergasted. Surely there were more stoppages than that.

Now here's something simple. Every time there's a stoppage, stop the watch. The referee will be guided by an official in the stand with an earpiece. Play resumes, clock resumes. Ninety minutes are up and there's no dissent from anybody. Too complicated? It works perfectly well in Rugby. Then again, our legislators seem loathe to change anything.

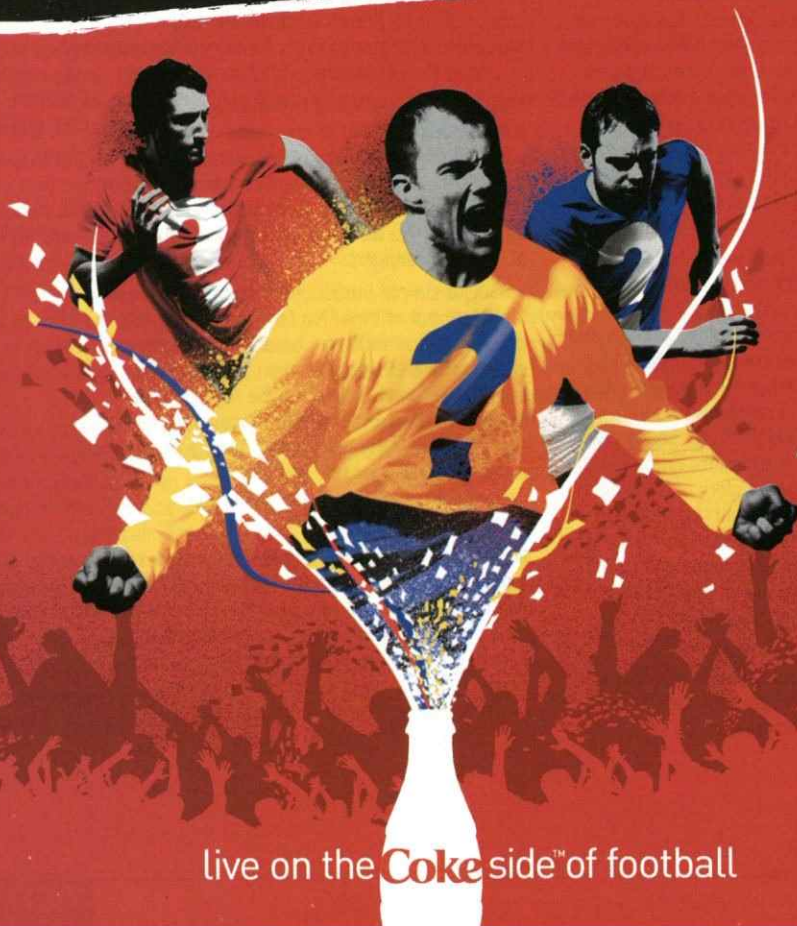

MANAGERS are more protective about the identity of their starting 11 before a game than anything else.

The issue well and truly hit the national headlines with Dennis Wise's startling revelations of alleged shenanigans at Elland Road.



One of his players, claimed Wise (pictured), leaked the LEEDS UNITED line-up before last weekend's 2-1 defeat by Crystal Palace.

Dario Gradi subsequently came out to insist such information frequently seeps out - particularly from aggrieved players dropped from the side themselves.

And you can imagine an omitted player bumping into someone he knows from the opposition and being asked if he's involved that day.

"Nah," comes the instinctive reply, "he's chucked me and gone for X, Y and Z across midfield instead."

Does that constitute deliberate leaking to undermine your own team, or is it just loose talk an hour before kick-off?

Such leakages are far easier in the age of the mobile phone, of course, when such conversations can take place earlier in the week, verbally or by text.

More serious, however, is the aggrieved player with malice aforethought, after deciding to deliberately stick the knife into a manager having the temerity to drop him.

For him the motive is not only

vengeance, but the chance to offer the opposition an advantage, however small, to bring about the kind of result that might just lead to his own recall.

This is clearly the more serious offence and one that would make an interesting tribunal test case were a player ever to be caught and sacked for footballing treason.

Closer to home and on a less serious scale, meanwhile, we've recently come across the issue of supporters apparently watching STOKE training sessions on the eve of matches and then posting the starting 11 on the internet.

Tony Pulis was made aware of such practices after the Preston fixture when his team, not the result, was the issue because he made six changes that no-one could have predicted.

Fans have hit back by asking how on earth Paul Simpson could possibly have been made aware of one single posting on a fans' message board.

Nobody is presumably claiming that the PRESTON manager spends Friday nights glued to his PC monitor.

But it would be quite easy for a Preston fan to trespass onto a Stoke site, as seems to happen when teams are about to play each other, then post back an alleged 11 on his own message board.

This gets picked up by someone close to Preston and/or their manager and so a trail develops.

As some have argued, there are so many alleged starting line-ups floating around cyberspace so why should he take notice of one in particular?

The point about the 'leaked' line-up at Preston was that it was so different to the norm - how often does any manager make six personnel and positional changes - that it was bound to catch someone's attention and trigger that possible trail back to Preston.

All a bit John le Carre? Maybe, but football managers are a paranoid bunch - and usually with pretty good reason!

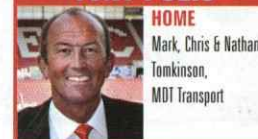

Match of my Life

Saturday 10 March sees the publication of a new book 'Match of My Life' in which sixteen Stoke legends relive their finest moments in a Potters shirt.

Here, in an excerpt from the book, our very own **TERRY CONROY** relives that magical moment in March 1972 when he helped Stoke win the League Cup in their first ever Wembley final.

THERE was a new scoreboard at Wembley and I was looking up at it. But there seemed to be some mistake. It had my name on it, 'Conroy 4'.

I was dazed and confused by this eventuality and was constantly drawn to the words on the scoreboard. It was uncanny. I kept looking round to find the referee as I was sure he was going to disallow the goal, the goal I had just scored at Wembley. Yes, I had scored in a cup final at WEMBLEY!!! I didn't want to wake up.

It was as if the world had focussed in on me and I stood still while everything else kept on swirling around me; the noise of the fans celebrating wildly, some singing my name, the movement of the players continuing on with the game and then, in the midst of all that, I could hear someone calling my name:

"Terry, Terry. Snap out of it."

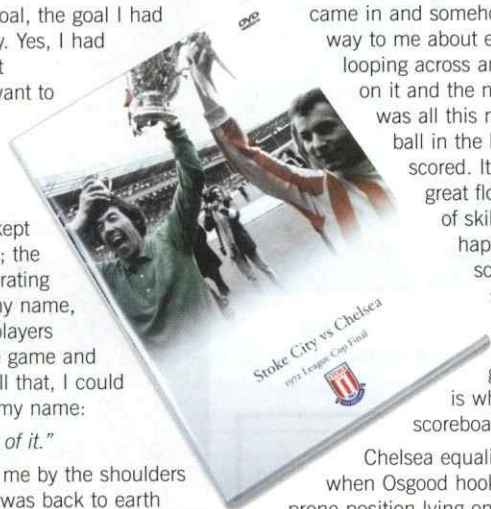
Jackie Marsh grabbed me by the shoulders and shook me hard. I was back to earth again.

There's no room for passengers in a Wembley final and I soon realised I couldn't glory in the moment until we'd actually done the job we'd come to Wembley to do and win the first trophy in Stoke City's long and illustrious history.

Wembley was packed with Stoke fans. It was a wonderful sight. I remember that as we walked up that long tunnel at the old Wembley we could hear the buzz of the crowd growing louder and louder like an enormous swarm of bees.

My goal came early on. It was strange because it was a nothing build up. A long throw came in and somehow the ball found its way to me about eight yards out. It came looping across and I just put my head on it and the next thing I knew there was all this noise and I saw the ball in the back of the net. I'd scored. It wasn't contrived by a great flowing move, or a piece of skill, it just sort of happened in a very scrappy way. But I suppose in cup finals it doesn't matter who scores or how they go in. All that matters is what's on that scoreboard.

Chelsea equalised just on half-time when Osgood hooked the ball in from a prone position lying on the ground when we should have cleared the ball and we trudged into the dressing rooms when we should have been skipping in with a 1-0 lead. I still maintain that Chelsea were the better side on the day and they created more chances, but it was a real end-to-end game all through the



second half. It was up and down for ninety minutes, two attacking teams. There was no lull, no period of stalemate. I didn't feel we played as well and as fluently as we could. But defensively we were superb.

The winning goal came when Peter Dobing knocked a ball 40 yards across to me. I just had it in my mind to attack the blue jersey in front of me and I got by David Webb on the left wing and crossed to the back post where I knew where John would be, he was always at the far post. Ritchie nodded it down to Greenhoff, who was about 12 yards out. Jimmy volleyed it towards goal, but Peter Bonetti pulled off a wonderful save, diving to his right. But he couldn't hold on to the ball and it bounced out to where two Stoke players, Eastham and Dobing were waiting to stick it in the net. George won that particular race to prod the ball home. 2-1 Stoke.

There wasn't long to go then and we knew Chelsea would press us back, but actually the only real chance they had was one we created for them. I remember being right in line with Micky Bernard when he hit this pass back to Gordon Banks. Now in those days keepers could pick the ball up from backpasses, not like today, so Micky thought he was playing a safe pass, but it was short. Just outside the area the Chelsea forward Colin Garland latched on to the ball and was bearing down on goal, but then out of nowhere came Gordon Banks to put in the most ferocious challenge and send the ball to safety. That was a colossal save. It really was. I really sensed then that with the form Banksy was in Chelsea weren't going to score.

My over-riding emotion at the end of the game wasn't so much that we'd won, more that I was so glad I didn't have to run any more. That Wembley pitch sapped the strength right out of your legs and it had been a very quick game and we'd all galloped a few miles. I just sat down. That was my first reaction. Just to sit down because I was drained, both physically and mentally.

We didn't get medals, we got tankards for some reason. And then Peter Dobing picked the cup up as captain and we toured it round the ground. That part of the day went very quickly and is something of a daze to be honest and I remember more about the dressing room afterwards. Of course singing We'll Be With you in the bath lives with me to this day because it was caught on film. I haven't watched that at all I can tell you, but my girls often take the mickey about it as my voice is so high-pitched and I had the mutton chop sideboards.

Then it was back to the Russell Hotel and the party began.

Pride Park



THE GROUND

Opened in July 1997 by The Queen, Pride Park replaced the old Baseball Ground as home to the Rams. The ground was built on a derelict former industrial site to the East of Derby that was once also a military training ground. Fully enclosed, Pride Park has an all-seated capacity of 33,597. Originally of similar design to Middlesboro's Riverside Stadium with a two tier main stand and horseshoe configuration joining the other three stands, Derby's then status in the Premier League resulted in extra capacity being installed by filling in the gaps between the main stand and the three remaining sides. Visitors are seated in the South Stand (Cawarden Construction Stand).

ONES TO WATCH

The pre-season signing of centre-forward Steve Howard (pictured) has proved a master stroke for Derby manager Billy Davies. The former Preston boss made his first move into the transfer market to capture the 30year old ex Luton, Northampton and Hartlepool striker for a £1 Million fee and the Durham born Howard has more than repaid his fee with vital goals, often the only goal and often scored late in games, to net the points as The Rams surged to the top of the Championship.



Supporting Howard is another of those young but very talented Arsenal loanees. Arturo Lupoli joined The Gunners in the Summer of 2004 from Italian club Parma and soon established himself as a prolific scorer at reserve level. On loan at Pride Park this season, this nineteen year old has contributed ten goals in Championship, League Cup and F.A. Cup.

Joining Derby in the January transfer window on a free from Crystal Palace, former Preston and Manchester City striker Jonathan Macken brings a wealth of experience and an impressive goal tally, particularly at this level with Preston.

GAME TO REMEMBER

Back to the halcyon days of the Waddington era and Stoke travelled to the old Baseball Ground for a Division One game against Derby in February 1973. The Rams were current Champions and had already been thrashed 4-0 at the Victoria Ground just two months earlier. The Potters were to complete a memorable double with a 3-0 victory before a crowd of 22,106. John Mahoney, Jimmy Robertson and Jimmy Greenhoff were City's scorers and the team that day:- Farmer, Marsh, Pejic, Mahoney, Bloor, Skeels, Robertson, Greenhoff, Ritchie, Easthan, Conroy.

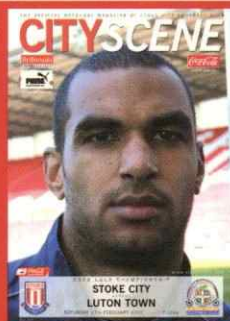
