





From the Board of Directors

Awarm welcome from Kenilworth Stadium to the Sheffield Wednesday directors, players and supporters for tonight's Championship game, an important one for both sides as the season enters its final third.

We also welcome Bjorn Runstrom who we signed late in the January transfer window and is in line to make his home debut. A number of fans questioned our commitment in signing players during the recent window period. The simple facts are the Manager, along with our CEO, continually looked at making signings throughout this period, but simply would not, as Mike Newell consistently states, pay over-the-odds prices for players. Likewise, we had already signed Matthew Spring and Drew Talbot and were keen to add one or two more signings. However negotiations are often complicated and it is hard for us at times to compete with other clubs who currently have better overall facilities to offer. It is one

of the key reasons why we continue to move forward in our relocation plans and the opportunity to genuinely compete on a level footing with most other clubs. No doubt most of you will now be aware of the recent statement regarding the appointment of Rosemount Developments Limited as the preferred developer for the Junction 12 site, which represents a major step forward in our relocation plans.

We are sure most of our supporters also understand that our season to date has been disturbed by a series of chronic injuries that have tested the squad to the limit, with our Manager at times having just enough players available to pick a team from. This was recently highlighted in the local Herald & Post newspaper where they printed two teams, one being our fit and remaining players, the other made up of predominantly injured players accompanied by a couple we have recently loaned

out. It is therefore good to see that many of the injured players appear to be getting close to full fitness and we are confident that the quality in the squad will come through over the remaining months of the season. The many supporters who travelled and got behind the team so well at Leicester and Stoke would have been encouraged by the way the team played and with a number of injured players coming back over the next three to four weeks, we are confident we can look forward to some better times ahead.

Whether you play Sheffield Wednesday at home or away, it is always a good game of football, as witnessed here last season when we drew 2-2. If the sides treat us to the same tonight, we will all be in for an excellent evening.

Enjoy the match and get behind the lads – it certainly makes a difference.



From the Manager

Hello and welcome to Kenilworth Road for tonight's game against Sheffield Wednesday. Welcome also to Brian Laws, his staff, players, directors and supporters from Hillsborough.

They have seen an upturn in results and form since Brian arrived and it will be a difficult game for us.

Saturday's game was eventful if not entertaining. The sendings-off had a big influence on the way we were forced to play in the second half. We have appealed against Sol's dismissal and hopefully for him and for us he

will be available for tonight and the next two games. If not there is a serious problem with the game in this country and the interpretation of the rules that certain referees and officials have.

The report of the incident reads, "the player committed a challenge on an opponent using excessive force and speed".

As far as we are aware using excessive speed is not an offence on a football pitch and there is no rule either as to how much force you can use on a ball.

We are already in danger of losing the art of tackling from the game and on some occasions a free kick is now awarded when a player has to break stride to avoid a shadow. We all know what a bad challenge is and we all know when a player is endangering his opponent, but Sol's eyes were fixed firmly on the ball and he won it. Perhaps the advent of The F.A. academies years ago is to blame.

We were told that we are not blessed with the same technique in this country as they are abroad. The youngsters are therefore namby-pamby for years and consequently some of them have no pain threshold

and think they have a divine right to protection from referees, some of whom it is absolutely clear have a weird perception and understanding of the laws. There is also no question that the influx of foreign players has had a massive influence on the game in this country.

I firmly believe that football in Britain is unique in its honesty and competitiveness.

There must be a generation of supporters who despair at some of the antics of players and also the decisions that are now being made and the explanations that accompany them.

Scrutinising every incident over and over again doesn't help either, especially when the people doing the scrutinising are contradicting themselves from one week to the next. Brian Clough said years ago that over-exposure of the game by television would ruin it. He wasn't one of the best managers for nothing. He knew the game and like all the great managers he could see what's coming.

Enjoy the game and get behind the lads.

Firstly, some information regarding postponed and rearranged matches. With Norwich City no longer in the FA Cup we will play our postponed match against them here at Kenilworth Road next Tuesday February 27 with a 7.45pm kick-off. Tickets for the original match are of course valid for the new date. We had invited youngsters from our Development Centres to the original Saturday fixture, and so they will not be disappointed, we have extended another invitation to attend a forthcoming Saturday fixture.

The Norwich match does displace our reserve match with Oxford United which we were due to play next Tuesday afternoon – Oxford have a backlog of fixtures so no new date has been arranged at the present time. Colchester United have asked us to change our away match with them from Wednesday April 25 to Tuesday April 24 kick-off 2pm and at the time of writing I have still not been able to confirm a new date for our home reserve match with Southend United.

Another postponed match that has been re-arranged is our home Puma Alliance Under-18 match with Portsmouth which will be played on Saturday April 28 at Luton Rugby Club kick-off 11am.

The Under-18s won their Beds FA Floodlit Cup match against Crawley Green 3-0 and a big thank you to everyone who turned out to support the youngsters on what was a very cold and wet evening, it was good to see you there. In the semi-final we play away at Stotfold FC on Thursday March 15 kick-off 7.45pm and again please do come and support the youngsters.

Several supporters have asked about the Transfer Window and what we can and cannot do, so here is a very brief summary. The Transfer Window opened at midnight on December 31 and remained "open" until midnight on January 31. During this time Clubs could transfer players in and out, players could also be loaned as a standard loan which can be made permanent during the closed period. Once the window closed at midnight on January 31 no loans can be made for seven days, after which short term Emergency Loans can be made. The Emergency Loan Window closes at 5pm on Thursday March 22, after which time only goalkeepers

can be signed and only in extenuating circumstances. The window then remains closed until the end of the season. Full details of the regulations can be found at www.thefootball-league.co.uk

Supporters will have seen the press release from The Football League regarding the No Smoking Policy, which will be adopted by the whole of The Football League from next season, so this does mean that with effect from July 1 smoking will not be permitted throughout the stadium or on any of the premises. In announcing The League's new "smoke free" policy Chairman Lord Mawhinney said: "In re-branding The Football League we made a serious, long-term commitment to encouraging a new generation of supporters to our matches.

"This is the latest stage in that process. We aim to get more families and more young fans going along to watch their local Football League club. This new policy will ensure that doing so does not have a negative effect on their health."


We have received notification from The Football League that for the last league match of the season all Championship League fixtures will kick-off at 1pm on Sunday May 6.



I think you could see that spirit at Leicester when even though we went a goal behind we came away with a point.


That's the sort of determination we need to show every week now so we can start putting some points on the board and moving up the table.

Welcome to Sheffield Wednesday

When Brian Laws took over the managerial hot seat in November, the former Scunthorpe boss oversaw a miraculous turnaround in form. However 2007 has seen results take a turn for the worse, but as STEWART CURTIS explains, it's not all doom and gloom at Hillsborough this season

Sheffield Wednesday arrive at Kenilworth Road from South Yorkshire this evening looking for their first win in nine games. The Hillsborough fans have seen a mixed season, as Wednesday started with an expected relegation battle, turned into play-off hopefuls, and have now settled comfortably into a mid-table spot in the Championship.

Less than 10 years ago Wednesday were a secure mid-table Premiership side, a position well-deserved by a club who have been crowned champions of England four times, as well as lifting the FA Cup three times. However, relegation from the top-flight saw things turn from bad to worse, as a series of managerial appointments failed to improve the performances on the pitch, only increasing the club's debts. Former Luton favourites David Pleat and Danny

Wilson were among five managers to take the Hillsborough job in those years as the club was again relegated, into the third tier of English football.

The good days finally returned to South Yorkshire when former Plymouth and Southampton boss Paul Sturrock's appointment helped revive the club.

Replacing a struggling Chris Turner during the 2004-5 season, Sturrock sparked a dramatic improvement that saw the club eventually finish fifth behind league champions Luton. Some 40,000 Owls fans made the trip to Cardiff for the play-off final with Hartlepool and saw their team triumph 4-2 after extra-time and earn a return to the Championship.

But the step up was hard and Wednesday took just ten points from

their opening 12 games. Sturrock was surprisingly removed by club chairman Dave Allen, despite many of the fans calling for the chairman himself to leave instead. The man who took over was Scunthorpe boss Brian Laws, who was part of Brian Clough's Forest side during his playing days.


Under Laws, Wednesday climbed to 9th in the table, lifting them well clear of the drop zone. However, they are currently in danger of dropping back into the relegation dog-fight, having taken just one point from their last 18 available.

Their fans will be hopeful, however, that January signings Jermaine Johnston from Bradford and veteran defender Steve Watson from West Brom will help secure their Championship status for next season.

The Manager

Brian Laws is still regarded by many as an up-and-coming manager, so it is hard to believe that he has actually been around so long. He first took over as player-manager at Grimsby Town in November 1994, and it was the Hatters who indirectly brought about his exit from Blundell Park when they beat his Grimsby side 3-2. The infamous Chicken Wings dressing room row that followed left Mariners cult hero Ivano Bonetti in hospital with a fractured cheekbone, and Laws in trouble with the fans, board and dressing room, which eventually led to his dismissal. After a short spell back as a player, Laws was suddenly in charge at Scunthorpe United less than a month after joining them when the Mick Buxton was axed. Laws's managerial talents then began to flourish once more and he led the Iron to promotion in 1998-99.


Although he couldn't keep Scunthorpe up, there was never a dull moment at Glanford Park. They went from play-off heartache in 2003 to just preserving their league status as they finished third from bottom in League Two a year later. During that tumultuous season Laws even temporarily lost his job, only to be reinstated after a boardroom struggle saw Steve Wharton return as chairman. Laws rewarded Wharton's faith by leading Scunthorpe to automatic promotion the next season, and finally ended an unwanted club statistic of not managing to stay out of the bottom division for consecutive seasons in 49 years. Laws ended his spell at Scunthorpe when he was appointed Owls boss in November 2006.

The Goalkeepers

MARK CROSSLEY (pictured) was recruited by Brian Laws almost as soon as he took over at Hillsborough to add steel and experience to the Owls' defence. Laws knows only too well what the former Welsh international can do from their years together at Nottingham Forest during the 1990s. The Barnsley-born keeper made nearly 400 appearances for Forest before moving on to Middlesbrough and Fulham. First team opportunities became limited at Craven Cottage so Crossley was more than happy to join up with his former team mate on loan for the rest of the season.

Support in goal should come from **CHRIS**

ADAMSON, who has been at the club since January 2005. Adamson started his career at West Brom and has since played for Mansfield, Plymouth and Halifax, as well as having spells in Ireland and Sweden.



The Defenders

TOMMY SPURR is enjoying his first run in the team as a senior professional. After making his debut in the Championship against Reading last season, the 20-year-old has had to be patient in breaking through to the first team, but has featured regularly under Brian Laws. Leeds-born Spurr excelled at youth and reserve level since signing for the Owls as a trainee, and can play at left back but prefers central defence. **FRANK SIMEK** (pictured) has quickly become a favourite with the Wednesday fans after signing on a free transfer when he was released by Arsenal in July 2005. He made just one League Cup appearance for the Gunners, but was in good company as he played alongside Vieira, Fabregas, Aliadiere, Hoyte and Kanu on that night in a resounding 5-1 victory over Wolves. Although born in Missouri, USA, Frank came to England to gain experience in two loan spells at Bournemouth and QPR before securing his move to Hillsborough. His role as a no-nonsense, tough-tackling right back has cemented his place in the Wednesday line-up. The highlight of his career so far was scoring a controversial winner at Millwall last season – after a breakaway move when some of the Lions players had stopped because they thought they'd scored at the other end. The vastly-experienced

STEVE WATSON may also feature today after signing on loan from West Brom for the rest of the season. Watson has had a career at the top and shows no sign of letting up as he seeks regular first team action at Hillsborough. After coming through the ranks at Newcastle United, he went on to play for Aston Villa and Everton. Hatters fans have already seen him twice this season, playing for the Baggies in the 2-2 draw at Kenilworth Road and 3-2 defeat at the Hawthorns.



The Midfielders

Northern Ireland international **CHRIS**

BRUNT (pictured) is Wednesday's leading scorer this season, chalking up eight league goals in 28 starts from midfield. Regarded as Wednesday's dead ball specialist, Brunt has scored some spectacular goals, although five of his strikes this season were in vain as his team still went on to lose. Having come through Middlesbrough's youth academy after nearly signing for Glasgow Rangers, Brunt's crisp range of passing and his powerful left foot have led to him being talked about as a future Premiership player. His last international appearance was in the recent 0-0 draw at Windsor Park against Wales, where he earned his fifth cap. **KENNY**

LUNT spent almost 10 years at his previous club Crewe Alexandra, clocking up more than 400 appearances for the Railways after making his debut as a 17-year-old under Dario Gradi. Lunt is an attacking midfielder who can spray passes around the pitch. He also has a reputation as a bit of a dead ball

expert, although he is still awaiting his first Owls goal. **GLENN WHELAN** is an ex-Manchester City trainee whose career never really took off until he crossed the Pennines to sign for Wednesday in July 2004. Since then, he has become a regular in the centre of the Owls midfield, even captaining the side on occasions, and scoring a crucial goal in the 2005 League One play-off final. Whelan's other claim to fame is a UEFA Cup appearance for Manchester City when they made the trip to Wales to play Welsh side TNS.

WADE SMALL moved north to Hillsborough from Milton Keynes Dons for a nominal fee last summer. Apart from making marauding runs down Wednesday's right, Small is also a useful striker or left midfielder. After a bright start, he lost his place in the Wednesday side after he was sent off at Coventry last November, but he is now back in favour with Brian Laws. Midfielder

JERMAINE JOHNSON moved across Yorkshire from Bradford City in January 2007, signing a three-year contract with the Owls after spells at Bolton and Oldham.



The Strikers

Striker **MARCUS TUDGAY** scored for Derby County against Sheffield Wednesday at Hillsborough in November 2005, and the then Owls boss, Paul Sturrock, moved in to sign him in the next January transfer window for an undisclosed fee. He has since scored 11 goals for Wednesday – including one against his old club Derby on the final day of last season. **STEVE MACLEAN** wears the number nine shirt at Hillsborough, and has been banging in goals since he moved from Glasgow Rangers in July 2004. He became the first Owls player to score 20 goals in a season for over a decade in his first campaign, which won him the Player of the Year award.

Wednesday's first season back in the Championship was a nightmare for MacLean, though, as he broke his leg in pre-season, which kept him out until February this year when he played a bit part in the Owls' run-in, scoring two goals. His ratio of a goal every

two games has played a major part in getting Wednesday out of League One and keeping them in the Championship. Jamaican international **DEON BURTON** has plenty of experience behind him and will be looking to hit double figures in the league for the third season running. He already has seven Championship goals this season and has scored at Kenilworth Road before on his last visit here while at Brentford in April 2005. It was still a good day for the Hatters, though, as they clinched the League One title in that game. Deon's last international match was against England at Old Trafford in June this year, when he played most of the second half as England won 6-0. **LEON CLARKE**

became Brian Laws's first permanent signing when the Owls took him from Wolverhampton Wanderers for an undisclosed fee in January 2007.



View from the

Opposition

Sheffield Wednesday's Communications Manager Steve Chu in conversation with Chris Rivett



■ **How have Brian Laws's recent signings Leon Clarke, Jermaine Johnson and Steve Watson settled in at Hillsborough?**

Very well. We have a good bunch of lads in the dressing room and new arrivals are made to feel welcome. Leon is putting pressure on the front lads and Steven MacLean and Deon Burton have responded to his arrival by scoring regularly.

Jermaine will be chomping at the bit tonight after having to wait nearly a month for his debut, while Steve is an experienced pro who added stability at the back at Burnley.



■ **How have Sheffield Wednesday found the first half of the season?**

It's been another rollercoaster season at Hillsborough, and in some ways our fortunes have been the opposite to Luton's. We suffered a string of injuries early on - we had no fit striker when we won at Plymouth, and we had 14 players out for various reasons when losing to Wrexham in the Carling Cup. Not surprisingly we struggled but after Paul Sturrock left we went on a fantastic run, losing only twice from mid-October to the end of 2006. We've tailed off slightly over recent weeks but the basis of a good side is in place.

■ **What are Sheffield Wednesday's aims for this season?**

The chairman made it very clear at the start of the season that a mid-table finish is the goal, and that's exactly where we are at present. Although, obviously, if we were to embark on another tremendous run to sneak into the play-offs that would be welcome.



■ **Who should Luton fans look out for this evening in the Owls' squad?**

I'm sure the two sets of supporters know a fair bit about each other's side from recent meetings. Deon Burton is on a run of goals at the moment, while Chris Brunt is our top scorer even though he specialises in 30-yard thunderbolts rather than tap-ins.

■ **Who do you think will get promoted to the Premiership this season?**

Birmingham look to be just the sort of side to grind out results week after week. I'd fancy them to be joined by two out of Southampton (the best footballing side we've played), fast-improving Sunderland, or Derby - Billy Davies has done a great job there in a short space of time. They were terrible in September, even though they beat us, but they looked very well-organised last month.



Stat Attack

Simon Pitts on stats, players and previous meetings between this evening's two sides.

Luton have played host to Sheffield Wednesday 27 times, winning 11 times and drawing ten, with the Hatters scoring 43 goals and conceding 34. The sides have never met in a Cup competition at Luton.



Four players have moved from Luton to Sheffield Wednesday after making more than 550 appearances for the Hatters between them. Wallace Birch only contributed 16 of those appearances along with three goals during 1929/30, the one season that he was at Kenilworth Road. Danny Wilson made more than 100 league appearances, and scored 30 times between 1987-1990 before his move to Hillsborough. Wilson later went on to become the Owls manager after a stint in charge at Barnsley. Scott Oakes and Paul McLaren (pictured) both hit the 200 appearances mark for Luton before their moves north. Oakes went in the summer of 1996 for £425,000, whereas McLaren joined on a free transfer five years later.

One league match between the sides has actually been "lost" to the record books as the season was cancelled due to the outbreak of war. Luton won 3-0 on August 26, 1939 with Hugh Billington netting twice and Reg Stockill also scoring. Stockill played in all three of the matches that "season" and scored twice, but they were to be his only appearances for Luton. After the war the fixtures were repeated, so Wednesday came to Kenilworth Road again on the opening day, but were still beaten by three goals. Mel Daniel scored the only hat-trick of his Luton career, and Bill Waugh scored the other in a 4-1 win.

Two other players have scored hat-tricks for Luton against Sheffield Wednesday. Malcolm Macdonald and Vic Halom. Macdonald's was scored at Hillsborough in October 1970, with Don Givens netting a brace in a convincing 5-1 win. Halom's only hat-trick of his Luton career came on April 1, 1972 in a 3-1 win.

Nine players have moved from Hillsborough to Kenilworth Road, with the most recent – Drew Talbot (pictured) – just a couple of weeks ago. John Lamb and Stewart Littlewood moved south in the 1920s, although they made fewer than 40 appearances between them. Tom Mackey played more than 200 games and scored twice for Luton between 1932-38 following his transfer. Allenby Driver and Doug Beach both made their first league appearances during the 1946/47 season. Hugh McJarrow made 15 appearances and scored ten goals for Luton in the early 1950s after his move south. In the summer of 2000, Ricky Hill, who was then Luton manager, brought two players from Hillsborough, Dean Brennan and Peter Holmes. While Brennan moved into non-league football just two years later after only a handful of appearances, Holmes is currently one of the longest-serving players at Kenilworth Road, and has more than 100 appearances for the Club. Mike Newell recently bought young forward Drew Talbot from the Owls for £250,000. The 20-year-old had been on loan at Scunthorpe before his move to Kenilworth Road.



Luton have scored only three penalties against the Owls, Gordon Turner, David Moss and Danny Wilson converting spot kicks. Turner scored his in a 2-0 win in October 1956, with Roly Legate netting the other. It was 24 years before the next when Moss opened the scoring from the spot shortly after half time. He added a second before Steve White completed the scoring and wrapped up the victory. Roy Wegerle was brought down in August 1989 and Danny Wilson put Luton 1-0 up before turning provider for Kingsley Black to complete the scoring.



Five to Remember

Roger Wash remembers five classic encounters between Luton Town and Sheffield Wednesday

October 10, 1970

Sheffield Wednesday 1 Luton Town 5
Attendance: 15,189

This game will always be remembered as the one which made Malcolm Macdonald. In our corner of Bedfordshire we all knew that Mac was mustard but his goal-scoring exploits in Division Three had not received extensive media coverage.

Now that the Hatters were in Division Two, cameras were more likely to be present which was the case at Hillsborough where newly-promoted Luton were up against the recently-relegated Owls.

By the interval the Town were 3-0 up, with Mac banging in two scorers, and by the end he had completed his hat-trick in a 5-1 mauling. The nation watched on ITV the following day... life at Kenilworth Road would not be the same again...

April 1, 1972

Luton Town 3 Sheffield Wednesday 1
Attendance: 9,121

After a narrow failure to win promotion for the third time in four years, the 1971/72 campaign was always going to be an anti-climax.

Vic Halom was the cut-price replacement for the new hero of Tyneside, Malcolm Macdonald, and Halom, along with the other forwards, found goals hard to come by as the Town drifted around in mid-table.

A bored crowd turned up to see a fairly meaningless clash with the Owls, who took an early lead and then shut up shop. It took the Town until the 76th minute before Halom levelled and then the new goal machine netted twice in the final five minutes to give the scoreline a completely unrealistic look.

November 1, 1980

Luton Town 3 Sheffield Wednesday 0
Attendance: 12,092

The Town had got off to a poor start to the campaign but had shown a hitherto unseen fighting spirit in winning 3-1 at Cambridge United with only 10 men the week before the visit of high-flying Sheffield Wednesday.

Surprisingly the Owls pulled everyone back behind the ball and

the system seemed to be working until just after the interval when Ricky Hill was upended in the box leaving David Moss to net from the spot.

The game now opened up and the Match Of The Day cameras were treated to a superb Moss chip and an end-to-end move that finished with an exquisite Steve White shot to cap a memorable afternoon.

March 1, 1986

Luton Town 1 Sheffield Wednesday 0
Attendance: 10,206

For the first time since the Town's return to Division One in 1982 there was not the stomach-wrenching fear of relegation, and three points against Wednesday would put the Hatters above the magic 50 points mark.

On a day where many games were postponed because of snow and ice, the Town's artificial surface, in its first year of use, was in pristine condition. The Owls lined up with forwards Glyn Snodin and Brian Marwood given orders to stop the wing runs of Luton full backs Tim Brecker and Rob Johnson and the system was succeeding until Mick Harford headed in a David Preece corner.

Although the Hatters could not score again, Wednesday did not seem to be able to alter their style thus making it a comfortable afternoon for the Luton defence.

November 14, 1987

Sheffield Wednesday 0 Luton Town 2
Attendance: 16,960

With only a single away win to their credit that season a trip to Hillsborough, where only one victory had been recorded by the Town in their history, was not high on the list of must-see games for Luton supporters.

Wednesday, with five wins on the bounce under their belts, attacked using strength and power while the Town countered on the break. A fluke cross shot from Mark Stein opened the scoring and when Wednesday missed a spot kick the Town perhaps felt it was going to be their day.

With the Owls attacking furiously it was left to Ian Allinson, who was on the end of a sweeping Town move, to end the contest with ten minutes left.

New Faces

Three new players joined Luton during the January transfer window, two strikers and one face that is more than a little familiar to Hatters fans

A bit of Hatters history was made on a murky September night at Vicarage Road in 2002. Matthew Spring picked up the ball in midfield, 35 yards from goal and hit such a sweet shot that it was still rising when it nestled in the top corner.

No Luton fan who was there for that memorable derby victory or the thousands who have seen the goal since will ever forget the moment, which is why it was so special to welcome Springy back to Kenilworth Road as one of three January signings, the others being Drew Talbot and Bjorn Runstrom.

For **MATTHEW SPRING**, it was a chance to get back to his roots. For Luton boss Mike Newell, just the player he was looking for.

"It was an opportunity too good to turn down," said Newell. "I would never have let him go had we not been in administration and had his contract not been up."

"He turned down at least one other club to come back here, which maybe gives you an indication of what he believes will happen here."

Spring, who signed a two-

and-a-half year contract, originally joined the Hatters as a trainee in July 1997.

He became a popular player at Kenilworth Road, and went on to make 289 appearances in all competitions for the Town, scoring 30 goals, including that screamer against Watford.

He joined Leeds on a free in July 2004, but endured just one injury-plagued season at Elland Road before returning south and joining Watford for £150,000 in August 2005. After signing for a fee of £200,000, Spring admits it's good to be back.

"Nothing has really changed to be honest," he says. "There are a few new faces but I'm really looking forward to it."

Spring's decision to quit Watford was easy. After playing a pivotal role in securing a Championship promotion, a handful of Premiership appearances and outings in the reserves was not what Harlow-born midfielder wanted. When Luton came knocking, Spring's decision was instant.

"I got a call to say that Luton were interested. At the time, I didn't know how interested so I came

down to speak to them. When they came in with a bid, I made my mind up within seconds.

"The move suited me really for a number of reasons. One factor was that it was easy for my family and I wouldn't have to move.

"Then I didn't want to be sitting in the stand each week and not playing, which was what I was doing. I just want to be out there playing football."

"I had a great year last year. Unfortunately things can change in football very quickly and it didn't work out this season. As soon as I knew Luton were interested I wanted to sign."

Spring admits that his time away from the club has helped to develop him into a more mature player.

"I have grown up a lot since I was last here. I have matured as a person and I think that has helped me as a player."

"I'm often asked if I think I should have stayed instead of leaving and I always say No. It was the right time for me to leave the club when I did."

"I feel as though I have been successful in what I

have done in my career and have never regretted any decision I have made. Hopefully I can now help bring success to Kenilworth Road."

The experienced **BJORN RUNSTRÖM** arrived on a one-month loan from Fulham and although only 23, the Swede is much-travelled. Recognised early on as a real talent in his native country, Runstrom was snapped up by Italian side Bologna.

Although he never quite made the first team, he'd shown enough of his skills in Italian youth games for Chievo of Verona to take him on.

Things didn't happen for Runstrom at Chievo and it wasn't long before he was transferred to yet another Italian league side, this time the famous Fiorentina. Then he went back to Sweden to try to get noticed again.

It worked and Fulham boss Chris Coleman forked out £700,000 for the former Swedish Under-21 international last year.

Runstrom said: "When I moved back I was just 19, so I knew that if I did well in Sweden I would have the chance to get to a



bigger league, and it went well. I had two-and-a half seasons in Sweden and then got the move to England."

However, Runstrom found his opportunities limited at Craven Cottage and saw his move to Luton as the perfect way to show his Fulham manager what he can do.

"So far it's been hard because I'm used to playing every game back in Sweden with my old team. It's very important to get regular first team football. I think the Championship is a good league and a high level of football, so it suits me good.

"At Fulham I haven't got many chances so I'm happy to get the possibility to come to Luton and have some first team football.

"Hopefully I can score some goals. I'm just here to try to give the team a hand and I'll be more than happy if I will do that."

Runstrom made an impressive debut at the Walkers Stadium two weeks ago and is now excited by today's encounter at Kenilworth Road.

"The atmosphere in the Championship is great and there are a lot of big clubs in the division so I'm happy to be here and really looking forward to it."

Luton's other recruit was **DREW TALBOT**, a promising striker who despite having a spell of bad luck through injury, was always highly-regarded by Sheffield Wednesday.

Talbot completed his £250,000 move to Kenilworth Road just 24 hours before the Hatters' FA Cup Fourth Round tie against Blackburn. Now he is looking to put a series of injuries behind him after missing the whole of last season with a back problem – and is hoping to shake off the illness that kept him out against Stoke on Saturday in time to face his former club tonight.

First team appearances had been few at Hillsborough, with just five league starts since signing as a trainee in August 2004, although he did score a crucial extra time goal for the Owls in the League One Play-Off final in 2005.

"My career started with a bang when I scored in that final, but ever since it's just been injury after injury.

"For the past few months I've worked really hard to get myself back fit, and the move down here just goes to show that hard work pays off sometimes."

Talbot's run of injuries was so bad

that he had to quit playing at one stage, but he is now hopeful that his problems are all in the past.

"I've had every injury you can possibly get, so I'm hoping I've got them all out of the way! I've had two broken legs, a back injury that kept me out for 16 months, a hernia and then a cartilage op pre-season."

Having joined Scunthorpe on loan in the January, Talbot admitted that he was looking to catch someone's eye in the hope of a permanent move away from Hillsborough.

"My manager had said go to Scunthorpe and play five or six games. That's why I went out on loan, to put myself in the shop window, because it wasn't really happening for me at Wednesday."

"I wanted a fresh start. Sometimes you can get into a rut doing the same thing over and over again."

Talbot is optimistic but realistic. "I've not set myself any targets. I just want to play some games and the more I play the better I'll get."

"I'll run myself into the floor until I can't run any more. I'm pretty quick, not bad in the air and I've got an eye for goal if there's a chance there."





Unfinished business

He's been a rock at the heart of the Luton defence for two seasons and is currently propelling Finland to the Euro 2008 finals from his favoured midfield position. Why? Because only Heikkinen can do this, as he refreshes the parts of his team that other players cannot reach.

Hineken may not claim to be the best lager in the world, but many Luton fans rate a similar-sounding Scandinavian export as probably the best defender in the Championship.

Since Markus Heikkinen appeared from nowhere on the first day of last season and inspired the Hatters to a memorable opening day victory at Selhurst Park, the Finnish international has been a crowd favourite at Kenilworth Road.

Lately with a small and injury-ravaged squad, the demands on the key players this season have been such that they only ever get a rest when they are injured.

Markus Heikkinen has just had a five-week break after a turbo-charged challenge from Fabrice Muamba had reportedly snapped his leg in half in the Hatters' gallant 2-2 draw at Birmingham in December.

Thankfully, the initial reports of a compound fracture were not accurate, but as the very conspicuous marks on Heikkinen's leg show it was still sufficiently damaged to require surgery and a long spell on the sidelines.

Markus, now almost fully recovered from his wounding, talked us through the night's events and the process of his road to recovery.

"The blades of the player went through the skin and the muscle and down to the bone. There was a lot of dirt and stuff in there because of the climate that day.

"There was a lot of dead skin and dead flesh, so they needed to remove that and the dirt and then put it back together with stitches. So that was the operation.

"I had the stitches in for 12 days and since then it's been OK.

"After the first two weeks of the operation I was able to start jogging and lifting weights and stuff like that. But of course, it's so different from the footballing side so you can't just jump into a game straight away."

The jury's still out on whether the offending challenge was reckless or not, but Markus is a very laid back kind of guy and hasn't got around to watching the replay yet.

"I haven't seen it, but of course when you get an injury like this it's not the cleanest tackle."

Having arrived at Kenilworth Road in July 2005 as an unknown quantity to all but the most knowledgeable football fan, Markus has been on a mission to make his mark in English football, after cruelly being denied a chance to impress when he'd previously spent a short spell at Portsmouth.


Moving around has never bothered Markus, however, as he was even born in a foreign land. He had to wait until he was of school age before he lived in his own country.

Katrineholm in Sweden is where Markus was born, and he shares his birthday with ex-premier Margaret Thatcher, singer-songwriter Paul Simon and comedy actor Sacha Baron Cohen.

"My parents are from Finland.

"In the 1970s and early '80s it was quite common to go from Finland to work in Sweden because the salaries were so much better there. That's what my parents did. They were there for ten years and I lived there for five."

"But then my father got a good job in Finland so we went



back. The bottom line was that my parents didn't want us to become Swedish, so that's why we moved."

Playing his way up the Finnish football league, Markus soon found himself on the books of MyPa – occasional UEFA Cup entrants who have seen the likes of Jari Litmanen and Sami Hyypia turn out for them – but he would not be truly satisfied until he made it to the very top of his country's player pool.

"HJK Helsinki is the biggest club in Finland, so after the two years in MyPa that was the only place I wanted to go and I was lucky enough to get there.

"I had a good three seasons there. We won the cup and the league and then finished second. Then we played in the UEFA Cup and had some good games.

"I think that's one of the best memories of my football career because it's so different to go from the Finnish football league, where there are crowds of 6 or 7,000 at the most, to Celtic Park where there was 60,000.

"So it was an eye-opening experience."

Having conquered his own back yard, it was time for Markus to move on. For any Scandinavian player, that normally means the UK.

"It all started when I changed my agent for an English one. He had the best contacts in England. Portsmouth were watching me play in my final season at HJK and then they offered me a contract, so I moved there.

"I spent five months there, but I never really got a good chance to show what I'm capable of, which was the only disappointing thing. But otherwise it was good learning from the players."

For a player of Markus's calibre to slip through their fingers is unusual. But then, Rowan Vine also went largely unnoticed at Fratton Park, and Hatters fans aren't complaining.

Markus was soon on his way out and signed for SPL side Aberdeen in August 2003.

"That was my first real taste of what British football was like. The footballing side was pretty good, especially the second season. After that I wanted to

come back to England to see how it was down here because I never really played here properly at Portsmouth." Not making it in England was an obstacle Markus was determined to overcome, and he got his second opportunity when Mike Newell signed him in July 2005.

"I had a few opportunities in England and some others elsewhere, but I wanted to come to England.

"Most people in England think that Scottish football is rubbish but it's quite similar. I would say that the Championship is just a little bit better and it's more exciting because there are more teams.

"Once I signed for Luton I'd been playing for three years in midfield in Scotland and Finland. But now it's a bit more difficult because I'm having to get

used to playing in defence in Luton."

Markus's contribution to his national team has also been phenomenal.

Finland currently sit on top of European Championship Qualifying Group A. Below them are the likes of Serbia, Portugal, Poland and Belgium – all seasoned veterans who know what it takes to get through a group of death.

For the first time ever, Finland might be playing in the summer. Never before have they qualified for a major competition.

"I think this time it's realistic, even though there are eight or nine games to go, because we are top of the table.

"The new coach, Roy Hodgson, has brought in a lot of belief. It helps when you are very organised on the pitch

and everybody knows what their duties are.

"So, hopefully, it could be the biggest thing ever to happen to Finnish football because they have never been in a major tournament before."

So, is the constant exodus of talent from his homeland a help or a hindrance to his nation's chances of qualification?

"I think the only way the national team can improve and get into the major tournaments is by getting more and more players abroad in the big clubs, playing regularly."

"It's different for Norway and Sweden and Denmark because they've already done it, they've been in European Championships and World Cups."

Paul FUTCHER

After only 20 games for his home town club Chester, 17-year-old Paul was snapped up by Luton manager Harry Haslam for £100,000 in June 1974 just as the Hatters were about to embark on an ill-fated season in Division One. Making his Hatters debut earlier than the fans expected, Paul proved a revelation playing without fear in the heart of the defence. An international career beckoned but a couple of major road accidents seemed to take the edge off his play although he still commanded a large fee when transferred to Manchester City in 1978. Paul played League football until nearly 40 and then went on to manage a variety of non-League clubs and took Southport to the FA Trophy final in 1998. Now living in Holmfirth, Paul is a sports coach at a Huddersfield college.

Ronald (Ron) FUTCHER

Older by 20 minutes than twin Paul, Ron was signed by Luton at the same time as his brother. Unfairly seen as a makeweight, Ron actually made his Hatters debut before Paul, coming on as a substitute against Sheffield United in November 1974.

His full debut is written in Luton folklore though, as he scored the only goal at table-toppers Ipswich and followed it up with a hat-trick against Wolves two days later. Telepathy with Paul meant that he was always on the end of his long balls out of defence and the Futcher double act graced Kenilworth Road until Ron joined his brother at Maine Road in 1978.


Ron then enjoyed a long League career and is still involved in the game having recently taken up a coaching post in Tampa Bay.

Horace Edwin GAGER

London born but Luton raised, Horace was picked up by the Hatters in 1937 after he had earned rave reviews playing for Vauxhall Motors. Finally making his Luton debut on the opening day of the 1939/40 season, Horace played all three games until war broke.

Horace kept playing during the war years, turning out for Glentoran for a while, but was back at Kenilworth Road when hostilities ended and was virtually ever present until a surprise move to Nottingham Forest in 1948.

A commanding centre-half, Horace made up for the lost years of the war by playing at the City Ground until he was 38. Horace sadly died in 1994.



Douglas (Doug) GARDINER

Another Luton player to span the war years, Doug was signed from Scottish junior side Auchinleck Talbot in 1938. Spending three years as a prisoner of war after being shot down over Germany, Doug finally made his Hatters League debut mid-way through the 1946/47 season in a 1-2 defeat at Chesterfield.

A hard working, tenacious wing-half and occasional skipper, Doug gave the Town tremendous service over the next five years before being transferred to Bedford in 1951 where he gave equally loyal help and assistance in a variety of roles. Doug continued to live in Bedford until his death.

Alan Henry GARNER

Although signing for Millwall in 1969, Alan was frustrated to make only two League appearances for the Lions in two years. A skilful central defender with a tremendous long throw, Alan was trailed by Luton scout Harry Haslam who was surprised to get his man for free in 1971. Alan, though, had to wait patiently until Chris Nicholl was transferred to Aston Villa the following March.

Ever present during the Hatters promotion season of 1973/74, Alan was unfortunate to lose his place to the young Paul Futcher during the following campaign and moved to Watford where he made 200 appearances in a Hornets side moving up through the divisions.

After spells at Portsmouth, Chesham, Barnet and Barton Rovers, Alan now runs a local window business.


David GEDDIS

David was part of the highly successful youth set up at Ipswich and was sent out on loan as a 19-year-old to Second Division Luton in 1977 to gain experience. He scored some vital goals as the Hatters tried to win promotion back to the top flight and his speed, power and enthusiasm encouraged Luton manager Harry Haslam to try to sign him.

Ipswich manager Bobby Robson had other ideas though and David won an FA Cup winner's medal the following season before being transferred to Aston Villa in 1979.

At Villa, David found it difficult to oust Peter Withe or Garry Shaw so he started drifting down the divisions where his strike rate was always excellent.

David has recently left his job as reserve team coach at Leeds.



James (Jimmy) GIBSON

Signed by Newcastle United from Linfield in 1959, great things were expected of the big, raw forward but he found it hard to earn a regular first team spot at St James Park making only two appearances in two seasons.

In those days you could earn more money playing non-League than in the wage-restricted Football League and so Jimmy joined Cambridge United in 1961 with a club house as an added incentive!


Jimmy became a goal machine at the Abbey with 65 goals in 145 Southern League games, before Luton signed him in February 1965 as they tried to escape relegation to Division Four. Strangely, the Hatters played Jimmy at wing-half and he failed to score in 32 matches. He left Luton in 1966 to coach in the USA and still lives there.

Daniel (Don) Joseph GIVENS

Limerick-born Don was one of the many boys who travelled over the Irish Sea to join Manchester United but despite making his Eire debut before reaching the United first team it soon became clear that the sheer size of the squad at Old Trafford would make it difficult for him to earn a regular first team place.

Luton scout Harry Haslam, using his United connections, managed to entice Don plus three other players to Kenilworth Road in 1970 just as the Hatters were promoted to Division Two. Don proved an excellent foil to the more forceful Malcolm Macdonald and it was a sad day when the clever inside-forward moved to QPR in 1972.

Don finally finished his football career with Neuchatel in Switzerland well into his 30s and is now manager of the Eire Under-21 squad.



Alexander (Alec) GLOVER

Partick Thistle accepted a big fee from Bradford Park Avenue for their home-grown right winger in 1948 and Alec made an instant impact in Division Two, terrorising defences with his clever ball play.


Having witnessed his ability at first hand, Luton Town manager Dally Duncan paid £8,000 for his services in September 1949 which was a lot of money at the time. Unfortunately, the Town were struggling at that point and Hatters supporters were rarely able to see Alec in full flow as defensive duties were required of him. He moved on to Blackburn in 1951 and then transferred to Barrow three years later. After retiring from the game, Alec settled in the Barrow area and died in Ulverston in 2000.

Edward Lee (Lee) GLOVER

Joining Nottingham Forest from school the Kettering-born forward won Scotland Youth and Under-21 caps but could never quite gain a regular place at the City Ground mainly because of serious injury problems.

When Luton Town sold Kingsley Black to Forest in 1991, Lee came the opposite way initially on loan. Sadly, his only Hatters appearance, against Southampton at Kenilworth Road, ended in injury and the deal was off.

Lee moved on to Port Vale in 1994 but enjoyed his greatest success at Rotherham where he was a consistent scorer. Lee was recently sacked as player-manager of Grantham Town.



Striker Bjorn Runstrom made his debut for Luton after his midweek loan signing from Fulham and played his part in a battling Hatters performance that saw Dean Morgan equalise an early Leicester goal to earn a vital point.

Morgan, an eighth-minute sub for the injured Lewis Emmanuel, powered David Bell's 33rd-minute free-kick from the right into the top-left corner leaving Foxes keeper Paul Henderson with no chance.

Luton had fallen behind early on to another debutant, Mark Yeates, who joined Leicester on loan from Tottenham and opened the scoring after just six minutes. The midfielder was the


first to react to Iain Hume's parried shot, tapping into the unguarded net from the edge of the box after the Canada international had scampered clear of the Hatters' defence.

Swede Runstrom had two good chances to score in the first half. On 28 minutes, he fired over the crossbar from just outside the area, then he volleyed over when the ball fell to him unmarked on the left side of the six-yard box.

Kevin Foley came close in the second half when his flicked header flew inches wide, although the home side came closest in stoppage time with Luton somehow clearing their lines from a goal-mouth scramble.


Luton Town Ladies

TRAVEL GUIDE

By Car: Leave the M25 at Junction 7 and follow the signs for the A23 to Croydon. At Purley bear left onto the A23 at its junction with the A235 (to Croydon). 





Wise claimed an unnamed player would never play for Leeds again after giving team details to the opposition before Saturday's game against Palace.

However, Taylor said: "I'm disappointed and told Dennis. A Leeds player spoke to a Palace player on Friday night but it was a general conversation."

Taylor added: "I had an idea of who would be in the Leeds team at eight o'clock on Friday night but I had no information about team shape."

"As it was, a couple of players I thought would be in the Leeds team weren't. Players talk to players – it's part of life and it's not malicious."

Barnsley capture Derby defender


Championship strugglers Barnsley have agreed terms with Derby defender Lewin Nyatanga for a three-month loan deal.

Ankle surgery sidelines Elliott



With their FA Cup run ending in a 4-0 defeat at Chelsea on Saturday, Norwich boss Peter Grant can concentrate on his side's alarming league position.

Although the club have been celebrating a run to the Fifth Round of the FA Cup, a mini crises has been brewing around Carrow Road for several weeks.

Two wins in their last ten games, combined with serious injuries to striker Robert Earnshaw and goalkeeper David Marshall mean the Canaries face a nail-biting run-in.

Going into tonight's fixtures, Norwich are one place and four points better off than the Hatters – a far cry from the early stages of the season when the club were hotly tipped to gain promotion to the Premiership.

Norwich's poor run of form in September led to former boss Nigel Worthington losing his job, with Peter Grant surprising many to take over.


Grant, who spent two successful years as a player at Norwich, left his job as Alan Pardew's assistant manager at West Ham and endured a mixed start in his new post with wins against Cardiff and Birmingham, but a heavy defeat at Stoke.

However Grant's biggest task in his short managerial spell will be making sure Norwich stay up. He did strengthen his squad when he returned to his former club, Celtic, to sign Marshall on loan until the end of the season.

He followed that up in the January transfer window by signing Sunderland striker Chris Brown, and midfielder Simon Lappin, along with the permanent capture of Luke Chadwick, who had been on loan at Carrow Road from Stoke.

It's been in attack where Norwich have been suffering. Earnshaw's omission means the weight of responsibility is currently on the shoulders of experienced journeymen Dion Dublin and Darren Huckerby, who have scored 15 goals between them this season.

Norwich will be hoping to turn the corner quickly and with games in hand over their fellow strugglers, Grant will want to climb the table as quickly as possible.
