





Hello and welcome to Kenilworth Road for today's game against Norwich City. Welcome also to Mick McCarthy, his Staff, Players, Directors and Supporters from Molineux. Mick has done a good job there in a short time without spending fortunes and it will be another tough test for us.

I really felt for the lads on Tuesday night. I don't think even our harshest critics could say that we didn't deserve something from that game.

The outcome was a kick in the teeth but there are a few positives to take out of it. Some of our football was as good as we have played for a while and certain individuals will have done their confidence no harm at all.

We have re-signed Bjorn for another month as we think he is getting better as he gets more familiar. We are also hoping to bring in a couple more in the next week to see us through March.

As you will be aware I was recently fined £6500 by The F.A. for expressing an opinion. After consulting numerous very educated and professional people, I was faced with a couple of options: (1) appeal and take the matter to Court on the grounds of my human rights or (2) pay the money out of my family's pocket towards Sven's wages. The first option I seriously considered until I weighed up the potential costs and came to the conclusion that it

Good afternoon and welcome to today's match.

Firstly, an apology for the delay in opening the gates at last Tuesday's match, which was caused by an electrical fault in the Oak Stand and took some time to rectify, hence the delay in kick-off. Secondly, our thanks to everyone for their patience until we could give you access into the ground.

The end of February brings changes. We go back to playing with a white ball- which must mean better weather is ahead!

There is also the change in the disciplinary cautions procedure for players, which takes effect from March 1.

Last Tuesday we experienced problems with the consumption of alcohol within the stadium. 

First and foremost I'd like to express my delight at the acquisition of our new training ground at Woollam Playing Fields.

The level of facilities that professional footballers use for training may not seem like a big deal to some, but I can assure all our supporters that turning up for work five days a week at a first class complex like Woollam will make a huge difference to the way we prepare for matches.

As Club Captain it's been frustrating for me to sit on the sidelines at such a crucial stage of

the season, but the good news is that I'm now back in full training, although unfortunately today's game against Wolves has come too soon for me.

Our results have been up and down over the Past couple of weeks. After picking up some useful away points at Stoke and Leicester we enjoyed a good home win over Sheffield Wednesday. It was a great game to watch and we played some good football.

Obviously the Crystal Palace match was disappointing and I thought we thoroughly deserved to win against Norwich. Conceding a late goal like that has been the story of our season. We must have dropped ten points this season from last minute goals. We can't put our finger on why it keeps happening, but we're determined to rectify the problem, and that will be done by even harder work out on the training field.

I know it's a cliché but there are always positives from every game, and it was good to see Warren Feeney back in action against Norwich the other night. Feeno was just hitting his straps and notching up a few goals before he got injured so he's been really unlucky.



It was pleasing to see Drew and Bjorn to come in and score a few goals in his absence, though, so we now have four fit forwards to choose from and we all know what they are capable of.

The injury problems at the Club are easing all over the pitch. The Gaffer now has the preferred problem of picking his team from 20-22 players rather than just 16. This creates a lot more competition for places and all of us players are driving each other on to put in the sort of performances that we need to push on.

We relish the visit of Wolves today. They are a very good side on a good run at the moment. It's a big game for both teams but we are up for the challenge and we felt we were very unlucky not to get something out of the game when we played them at Molineux earlier this season.

We must remember that our destiny is still in our own hands and will remain so regardless of today's result, so it's important that we all stay positive and get behind the lads.





At the Training Ground

Luton Town moved to a new, modern training ground this week. Here is our guided tour

Luton Town moved into a modern new training ground this week, when they relocated to Woollam Playing Fields on the Harpenden Road. It gives this players, coaches and management perfect surfaces to train on as well as modern facilities to change and eat in. It is named after Charles Woollam OA (1833-1915), a respected philanthropist and Trustee of the school, as well as being a major benefactor of the St Albans area.

Officially opened in 2002 by HRH The Duke of Gloucester, Woollams is a £10m sports development that covers more than 73 acres of former farm land.

Although Luton Town are the only professional sports body to train there, they share the facilities with not just the Old Albanians Rugby Club but also a multitude of local hockey, tennis, football and cricket teams that cater for all ages and skill levels.

However, with two pavilions, 11 rugby, seven football and one all-weather hockey pitches plus seven cricket squares (with four blocks of practice nets) and there's room for everyone!

The beautifully-landscaped Woollams Playing Fields is owned by and used extensively by St. Albans School, making it officially the largest school sports field in the UK.

Purchased by the school in 1991, work began on the site in February 2000 when an entrance off the Harpenden Road was created and the fields were levelled.

The developers worked fast and the artificial hockey pitch was in use by October 2001. Amazingly, the whole site was in use less than a year later.


Woollams has been covetted by the Club ever since, and Mike Newell and his staff are absolutely delighted that the deal has finally come to fruition.








"The first impressions are very nice. It's good to have somewhere which has great facilities. The training ground is really flat, which makes a difference and the pitches are really nice. There is everything you could need here and I think it will help attract players to the Club."

"The training ground is superb. The pitches look fantastic. The boys seem very happy and this is a great step in the right direction for the Club. It's a fantastic surface for the lads to train on and the facilities are first class facilities. Seven players have made the permanent move from Wolves to Luton, although the last of these was Andy King (pictured) in 1985,

however he only played three times in the 85-86 season. King had returned to his home town Club having previously played in the seventies. In his two spells King fell just short of fifty appearances for the Hatters, and scored nine goals before a transfer to Aldershot. Mark Burke joined Luton on loan in 1993-94, and made a substitute appearance in a 0-0 draw at West Ham in the FA Cup quarter-final. Two players made their first appearances in the 1935-36 season having moved from Wolves, Mark Crook and Jack Nelson. Crook only played a handful of times, whereas Nelson went on to make nearly 150 appearances. Arguably the most notable signing was England inside-forward Jesse Pye, in 1952. Pye scored an amazing 28 goals in 43 appearances during his first season, but unfortunately fractured his ankle in December 1953. Pye's last match for Luton was a goalscoring one against Derby County in October 1954, they were obviously impressed as a transfer to the Rams followed.



Luton played Wolves during the Hatters' first-ever season in the top flight, 1955-56. Despite Wolves finishing seven points, and seven places higher at the end of the season it was Luton who took maximum points from both games. Bob Morton (pictured) and Gordon Turner both scored twice in a 5-1 win at Kenilworth Road with Mick Cullen netting the other, in front of the largest attendance for this fixture, 27,911. Later in the season Ron Davies and Tony Gregory scored a 2-1 victory. Morton scored again the following season in a 1-0 home win, with another Turner brace and a goal from Cullen again, earning a 3-1 win in 1957-58.

As well as the 1955-56 season Luton also achieved the double over Wolves in 1976-77, and 1983-84. Jimmy Husband scored in both games in 76-77, in a 2-1 away win and a 2-0 victory at Kenilworth Road. Dixie Deans and Lil Fuccillo were the other scorers. Paul Walsh repeated Husband's feat in 83-84 when he netted in a 4-0 home win, and scored a late overhead kick winner in a 2-1 victory at Molineux. Brian Stein, David Moss and Brian Horton scored at Kenilworth Road, while Gary Parker had opened the scoring early in the away game.



Five to Remember


Roger Wash recalls five classic encounters between Luton Town and Wolves

November 5, 1955 Luton Town 5 Wolverhampton Wanderers 1 Attendance: 27,911

The Town made a reasonable start to their first ever season in the top flight but with the goals drying up, the decision was made to move Bob Morton into the forward line.

This move coincided with the visit of mighty Wolves, the glamour side of the day, and a record League crowd turned up to see Morton net after only four minutes. Wolves levelled through Johnny Hancocks but from then on it was all Luton as Morton gave centre-half Billy Wright, the England skipper, the runaround.

Two goals from Gordon Turner, and further strikes from Mike Cullen and Morton made it a day to remember and set up the season for some more memorable displays.

August 26, 1956 Wolverhampton Wanderers 5 Luton Town 4 Attendance: 46,781

The Town had successfully survived their first season in Division One and by the time of the game at Wolves were sitting in top spot after three straight wins.

The absence of skipper Syd Owen did not seem to faze the players as Mike Cullen and Gordon Turner put the Town two-up in the first ten minutes. Wolves then levelled and by the interval were 5-3 in the lead after a half of pulsating entertainment. Turner narrowed the scoreline in the second half but despite laying siege to the Wolves goal the Hatters could not manage an equaliser.

'The best game I have ever seen,' said Daily Express sports reporter Desmond Hackett afterwards.

December 28, 1974 Luton Town 3 Wolverhampton Wanderers 2 Attendance: 19,642

The Hatters were rock bottom of the old Division One and the only glimmer of light was the late decision by manager Harry Haslam to introduce youngsters into the side. This had resulted in wins over future champions Derby and table toppers Ipswich over Christmas, and a holiday crowd turned

up to see if the Town could make it three in a row. Wolves crept into the lead in the 23rd minute but then the young Futcher twins took over with Paul finding Ron with amazing accuracy for him to level.

Ron headed number two from a John Aston cross but when Barry Powell equalised it only served for the Luton players to re-double their efforts, leading to Ron heading the winner with five minutes to go.

March 5, 1977 Luton Town 2 Wolverhampton Wanderers 0 Attendance: 19,200

Following a defeat at Bristol Rovers on New Year's Day 1977, the Town were languishing in mid-table but then came an amazing run of seven straight victories. Looking back, there was no particular reason for such a run leading up to the visit of high-flying Wolves, but having a settled side did help.


Wolves, who had gone 12 League games undefeated, were in second spot while we were up to fifth, only four points behind and although the away side had most of the opening play it was the Hatters who made it a sensational half with two goals in a minute.

First Jim Husband fired in a close range shot quickly followed by a clever Lil Fuccillo lob. Although Wolves upped their game in the second period, they could not breach the Luton defence as we moved up to third spot.

November 5, 1994 Wolverhampton Wanderers 2 Luton Town 3 Attendance: 26,749

The Town were in frustrating mode. Their away record, with four wins on their travels, was the best in the division while five defeats at home was the worst. This meant that they languished in mid-table. Wolves were top and unbeaten at home but the big crowd was shocked when the Hatters moved into a three-goal lead before an hour was up. Goals from David Preece, Dwight Marshall and Kerry Dixon cheered a large Luton contingent but two deflected Marvin Johnson own-goals in the closing minutes made a mockery of the scoreline and took some of the gloss off the performance.



Welcome to Wolves

Wolves are making a late surge for the play-offs and come to Kenilworth Road this afternoon in fine form. STEWART CURTIS looks at today's Championship visitors

Wolves arrive at Kenilworth Road today as the league's most in-form side. Their superb current form has brought them nominations for both manager and player of the month awards, and this run has moved them up to 8th in the table, only out of a play-off spot on goal difference.

Wolves are a club heaped with footballing history, having won the FA Cup four times, and been crowned champions of England three times. They also have a European pedigree, reaching the UEFA Cup Final in 1972 only to be beaten 3-2 by Tottenham in a two-leg tie. Former Luton manager Joe Kinnear played both games for Spurs.

Recent years have seen Wolves consistently push for the Premiership, and they finally achieved promotion by beating Sheffield United 3-0 in the 2003 Play-Off Final. But supporters' hopes of a

glorious return to the top-flight did not last long as the club finished bottom of the table, returning to the Championship after just one season.

The last two campaigns have seen Wolves flirt with the play-offs, finishing 7th and then 9th. Premiership parachute payments, however, have finished this season, meaning less financial muscle in the transfer-market. The board felt that the side had drawn too many games and that it was time for a change of manager, so they replaced former England boss Glenn Hoddle with ex-Republic of Ireland manager Mick McCarthy in July 2006.

Only days into his appointment, Mick was feeling the fans' high expectations, telling reporters: "The initials MM on my top stand for Mick McCarthy, not Merlin the Magician." Mick did, however, begin to work his magic, bringing the likes of Jay

Bothroyd and Jamie Clapham to Molineux.


The summer arrivals didn't quite have the desired effect, and by the end of November, Wolves were already being sucked into mid-table, with another season in the Championship looking likely. With scoring goals seeming the likely problem, McCarthy invested in Andrew Keogh from Scunthorpe for £600,000 and Stephen Ward from Bohemians to help increase their firepower in front of goal. These astute signings have seen a dramatic improvement in form, with Wolves winning five of their last six fixtures.

Whereas scoring goals has been McCarthy's main problem this season, his defence has stood strong, keeping no fewer than 16 clean sheets, including one against the Hatters when Wolves narrowly won 1-0 at Molineux in August.


The Manager

Mick McCarthy is famous for his no-nonsense approach that stems from his reputation as a tough centre-half in his playing days. Born in Barnsley, Mick had a decent playing career that saw him turn out for his hometown club, Manchester City, Celtic, Lyon and Millwall.

Undoubtedly, he will be best remembered for his leadership qualities as captain of the Republic of Ireland, when he led them to a memorable World Cup Quarter-Final clash with the host country in Italia 90. It was his successful stint as player-manager at Millwall that led him to succeed Jack Charlton as Republic of Ireland manager in 1996, but it was six frustrating years before he finally took his country to a major tournament, when they qualified for the 2002 World Cup in Japan and South Korea. His infamous spat with Ireland captain Roy Keane ended with the Manchester United star being sent home without kicking a ball, but the media witch-hunt that followed slowly eroded McCarthy's resolve to continue managing his country. Mick resigned as Ireland manager in November 2002. However by the following March, he was back. In typically robust style, he took on the job of rejuvenating a Sunderland side spiralling out of the Premiership. Although he took up the reins too late to save the Black Cats from relegation, he performed a minor miracle by taking them to the play-offs the very next season, and won promotion back to the Premiership the year after that. His Wearside rollercoaster ride finally ground to a halt in March last year when he couldn't lift Sunderland off the bottom of the league, and after a short break from the game he succeeded Glenn Hoddle at Molineux.


The Goalkeepers

Wolves are blessed with two of the best goalkeepers in the Championship. **MATT MURRAY** (pictured) is current number one choice, and is enjoying his longest run in the side since the 2002-03 season, when he made 48 league and cup appearances. Murray has suffered more than his fair share of injuries, missing huge chunks of the previous three seasons with a crippling knee complaint that has blighted the 25-year-old's career so far. The highlight for him so far is a man of the match-winning performance in the Play-Off Final at the Millennium Stadium, which saw Wolves promoted to the top division for the first time in 19 years. While Murray's subsequent fitness problems ground his career to a halt, **MICHAEL OAKES** has generally had more luck. The ex-Villa goalkeeper chalked up 125 consecutive league appearances. Oakes is still only 33, and has made nearly 300 appearances in total for the two West Midlands clubs, including three UEFA Cup appearances.



The Defenders

Mick McCarthy raided his former club Sunderland to sign Scottish defender **NEILL COLLINS** (pictured) in a £150,000 deal earlier this season. Collins, 23, had excelled in the Scottish lower leagues for Dumbarton and Queens Park before McCarthy took him to Wearside in August 2004. Collins spent time out on loan at Hartlepool and Sheffield United last season but has been playing regular Championship football for Wolves during this campaign. Former Celtic captain **JACKIE McNAMARA** arrived at Molineux in June 2005 after enjoying a Scottish Cup Final swan song for the Glasgow giants, beating Dundee United for his third winner's medal to add to an impressive collection of silverware accumulated in his ten years at Parkhead. However, both of his seasons at Molineux have been injury-affected. A hip complaint ruled him out of the first half of this campaign and knee problems restricted McNamara to just ten league outings last season. **ROB EDWARDS** is another player who has made the short trip across the West Midlands from Villa Park in search of regular first team football. Edwards grew up in Telford but his parentage allows him to play for Wales. He enjoyed a successful time under Glenn Hoddle last season, playing more than 40 games, and is now having another run in the team. **JAMIE CLAPHAM** brings yet more experience to the Wolves squad after joining from Birmingham City last August. A tractor boy at heart, Clapham played more than 200 games for Ipswich Town between 1998 and 2003 before signing for Blues for £1.3m. In his last season at St Andrews, however, he fell out of favour with Steve Bruce after their 7-0 home defeat against Liverpool. **GARY BREEN** is another experienced defender who has had a great career. The Republic of Ireland international recently announced his retirement from the national team so he could concentrate on club football. Breen was at Sunderland with McCarthy although his season so far has been held up with two red cards.





The Midfielders

KARL HENRY (pictured) will still be pinching himself this afternoon. A year ago he was languishing in Stoke City's reserve side, and now he's captain of his home town club. Wolves fans love him due to his energetic displays and hard work, and even if he has to hand back the captain's armband to Joey Craddock when he returns from injury, Henry will still retain his new-found cult hero status at Molineux. The signing of Nigerian international **SEYI OLOFINJANA** represented a major coup for Wolves, as they beat off competition from a host of other European clubs to capture his signature for £1.7m in July 2004. A huge goalscoring midfielder, Olofinjana had a fantastic first season at Molineux but was troubled with a back problem throughout the last campaign. This season has seen him return to form, scoring seven goals in 37 league and cup appearances.

MICHAEL MCINDOE returns to Kenilworth Road after signing for Wolves following a successful loan during the January transfer window. McIndoe spent two years at Luton between 1998 and

2000, making more than 40 appearances before moving on to Hereford United, Yeovil Town, Doncaster Rovers and Barnsley. A brief loan spell at Derby County at the end of last season alerted McCarthy to his talents and led to a £250,000 move. **DARREN POTTER** initially joined Wolves on a season-long loan from Liverpool in August last year, but impressed his manager enough to sign a permanent deal in the January transfer window. The 23-year-old scouser is suspended for today's game, but has made a major impact in the Wolves midfield this season with his recent form particularly impressive. **ROHAN RICKETTS** is a member of an elite group who have played for both Arsenal and Tottenham Hotspur, albeit just a solitary appearance in the league cup for the Gunners. Ricketts followed Glenn Hoddle to Wolves from Tottenham, initially on loan, before signing a permanent deal in May 2005. Sporadic spells in the first team have been punctuated by injury and loss of form, but he remains a bright prospect and could yet have an impact on Wolves' play-off aspirations.




The Strikers

ANDY KEOGH is another one of Mick McCarthy's January transfer window signings. Yet to taste defeat in his six appearances since he joined in a £600,000 deal from promotion-chasing League One side Scunthorpe United, Keogh is awaiting his first Championship goal. A Republic of Ireland Under-21 international, Keogh learned his trade as a trainee at the Leeds Youth Academy before settling for Scunthorpe after successful loan spells at both Glandford Park and Bury.

STEPHEN WARD could make up the other half of an all-Irish attack for Wolves this afternoon, following his January move from Bohemians. Ward has already notched up three goals since signing for his new club, including two vital winning goals in their last three games to help Wolves surge back into the promotion frame. **CARL CORT** will miss today's game as he recovers from knee surgery. Cort has rarely escaped the surgeon's knife during any of his ten seasons as a

professional. Once a £7m Newcastle forward, he was grabbed by Wolves for a cut-price £2m in January 2004. Despite the current injury nightmare that will keep him out for the rest of this season, Cort has been good value, scoring 32 league and cup goals in his 99 appearances. **JAY BOTHROYD** (pictured) has had a very interesting career so far. An ex-Arsenal trainee, Bothroyd came of age when he signed for Coventry City in July 2000. By the time he'd completed a three-year contract at Coventry, he was wanted by Italian side Perugia, and duly signed on a free transfer. Raised eyebrows were soon lowered when he scored five goals in Serie A for his new club, but he failed to adapt to a new lifestyle and soon headed back to England on a loan deal with Blackburn Rovers. Bothroyd didn't get much chance to shine at Ewood Park, and moved on to Charlton in August 2005. However, after failing to impress new manager Iain Dowie, he was soon on his way to Molineux, where he has scored four goals in 14 starts this season.




View from the Opposition





Luton suffered a narrow defeat to Crystal Palace thanks to a brace from striker Clinton Morrison.

In a first half bereft of an attacking spark, the Republic of Ireland international broke the deadlock with a quick turn and shot in stop-page time.

The Hatters had provided little as an attacking threat but were handed a gift of a goal when Mark Hudson comically put through his own net 10 minutes after the interval.

But the match found its turning point just moments later when Richard Langley was sent off after a challenge on Matthew Lawrence, who left the pitch on a stretcher.

Peter Taylor's side made the most of their numerical advantage with Morrison scoring his second of the game in the 68th minute to ensure they ended a three-game losing sequence against the Hatters.

Luton finished the game the stronger side and Dean Morgan saw sight of goal on 78 minutes, but despite a mix-up between the Palace defence, the former Reading midfielder was unable to hit the target, firing a volley from 12 yards wide of Gabor Kiraly's goal.



Everyone agrees that Luton Town Football Club urgently needs to move to a new stadium so that we can pursue our ambitions of pushing towards a place in the Premiership.

But where should that new home be? As most fans know this debate has gone on for far too many years without any real commitment being made. Hence we have had years of uncertainty as we watched other clubs who took bold decisions leap-frog ahead of us.

Clubs such as Reading and Bolton – who were both in similar positions to ourselves not so long ago – are now both in new homes and both reaping the rewards of top-flight football. This Club's

view is that the uncertainty had to stop and not be allowed to jeopardise our future any longer. We *must* have the ability to compete on a level basis with other clubs.

We know that some supporters have expressed preferences for a new home at Junction 10 or Junction 11a. We believe that for many reasons these options are



Anthony (Tony) Patrick GREALISH

Although born in West London, Tony was proud of his Irish roots and went on to make 44 appearances as a dogged midfielder for Eire. Joining Orient from school, Tony had five years at Brisbane Road before moving to Luton in 1979 in one of the first transfer tribunals. The eventual fee of £150,000 was money well spent as he enjoyed two good seasons in the Luton midfield, making 78 League appearances and scoring two goals, including a blinder at Chelsea.

Surprisingly transferred to Brighton in an exchange deal involving Brian Horton, Tony skippered the Seagulls in the 1983 FA Cup Final before working his way down through the divisions. Tony worked in insurance for many years before becoming involved in a scrap metal business.

Harry Rodney (Rodney) GREEN

A prolific scorer wherever he went, Rodney first caught the eye with Bradford City in 1963, which led to a £9,000 move to Gillingham a year later. After falling out with the management, he was sold to Grimsby where he formed a productive partnership with future Hatter Matt Tees.

The pair were sold to Charlton for £23,000 but Rodney never settled and instead he jumped at the chance to join Allan Brown's revolution at Kenilworth Road as the Hatters were about to embark on a memorable 1967-68 campaign. After scoring on his Luton debut, Rodney injured his knee and, by the time he returned, the forward line had a settled look and he became a peripheral player and moved on to Watford before ending his career in South Africa. He now owns a business selling reproduction furniture near his home town of Halifax.

David Michael GREENE

Luton-born David joined his local club from school before making his debut for the Hatters in a 3-1 defeat at Grimsby in March 1993 as a 19-year-old.

A reliable and tough centre-half, David seemed to have forced his way into a regular place in the side at the end of the following campaign in the absence of the injured Trevor Peake and starred in the FA Cup quarter-final draw at West Ham. Sadly, he was hit by injuries and was unable to force his way back into the side and instead reluctantly accepted a move to Colchester. David enjoyed four successful years at Layer Road before transferring in quick succession to Cardiff and then Cambridge after which he retired from the game.

Anthony (Tony) Charles GREGORY

A pupil from Luton Grammar School, Tony was a teenage wonderkid playing for England schoolboys at Wembley as well as the successful Bedfordshire Youth side that won the national championship.


Not surprisingly he was snapped up by the Hatters in 1955 and such was his progress that he made his League debut less than a year later. But after this sensational start, he made only sporadic appearances over the next two years before winning a place on the left wing in the Town's FA Cup side in 1959, a side that was kept intact all the way through to the final.

A two-year stint in the National Service followed, as well as a move to Watford, which preceded a tour of the non-League sides in the south combined with a career in marketing.

Augustine Ashley (Ashley) GRIMES

Manchester United invited Dubliner Ashley over for a trial in 1972 but rejected him only to pay Bohemians £20,000 for him five years later.

Although never a regular at Old Trafford, he did manage nearly 100 League appearances in six years before moving to Coventry in 1983 and then transferring to Luton a year later in a swap deal involving Kirk Stephens. At Kenilworth Road, Ashley added to his Eire international caps and put on many cultured displays at left back or left midfield. Totally left footed, Ashley provided the awkward cross from the right that enabled Brian Stein to score the winner in the 1988 Littlewoods Cup Final. After a spell in Spain, Ashley saw out his career with Stoke before joining old colleague Lou Macari at several clubs as coach. Ashley's son is now on the books at Manchester City.

Ernest William (Bill) GRIPTON

Cool and commanding centre-half Bill signed on with his local side West Brom before the war and although he held the record for the most war-time appearances for the Baggies he could not hold a regular spot in the side once hostilities finished.

Instead, he moved to Luton for £3,000 in 1948 but could not displace Syd Owen or his deputy Les Hall at the heart of the Hatters' defence but had much more luck at his next club, Bournemouth.

Bill joined Worcester City in 1952 and became their groundsman. Motor Neurone disease forced his early retirement and he sadly died in 1980.

John GROVES

Son of pre-War Derby star Arthur, who played alongside Luton manager Dally Duncan at the Baseball Ground, it was pre-ordained that young John should sign on for the Hatters just before his 16th birthday.

After National Service, John made his Luton debut as an inside forward before reverting to his favoured wing-half position and going on to make more than 250 appearances, with the highlight of his Hatters career coming in the 1959 FA Cup final.

A move to Bournemouth followed in 1963 but after two seasons he had to retire due to a back injury. He then settled back in his native Derby where he worked for Courtaulds for 30 years. Although now retired, he is still an occasional visitor to Kenilworth Road.



Bontcho Lubomilov GUENTCHEV

Experienced, skilful, two-footed Bulgarian international Bontcho signed for Ipswich from Sporting Lisbon for £250,000 to a great fanfare in 1992. He became a cult hero at Portman Road due to his heroics in helping Bulgaria through to the 1994 World Cup semi-finals but often flattered to deceive in the blood and thunder of English football.

Moving to Terry Westley's Luton in 1995 he played in a side doomed to relegation and was often asked to turn out up front when his best position was out wide. He failed to make an impact in Division Two and was handed a free transfer in 1997.




After moving around the London non-League circuit Bontcho is now coach at Hendon.

Alan Nicoll GUILD

Alan combined studying for an eventual first class honours degree in political economy at St Andrews University with appearances as an amateur for East Fife.

Once his studies were completed the giant centre-half accepted an offer to join Luton Town in 1969 but he found his chances limited to one League appearance, at home to Middlesbrough in 1970.

One of four Luton players to join Cambridge United over the summer of 1971, Alan had a better time at the Abbey and was a regular for three seasons before moving to Cambridge City and St Neots and then drifting back to Scotland.



Robert (Bob) Edward HACKING

An amateur with Blackburn during the War, Bob was later in the RAF stationed in the south and guested for the Hatters, before signing professional forms in April 1945 at the age of 27.

He managed only one League appearance for the Town and was then recruited by Brighton for £500 in 1947 and then on to Southport a year later.

At Haigh Avenue he moved back to wing-half from inside-forward and quickly became a crowd favourite due to his clever ball skills. He managed to play on until 1954 before retiring from the game to become a market gardener. Bob continued to live in the Southport area until his death in 2001.





Earlier, Luton took the lead through Bjorn Runstrom's 11th minute strike after some great work from David Bell down the left flank.


Norwich equalised through Chris Martin on 26 minutes, but the Hatters made the perfect start to the second half when Drew Talbot headed into an empty net after more good

work from Bell down the left.



Luton Reserves

Coach Marvin Johnson talks about the season so far and the final seven games



With the Reserves game at home to Oxford on Tuesday night postponed to make way for the re-arranged first team home game against Norwich, Coach Marvin Johnson had some time to reflect on the nature of Reserve team football.

"It's a strange team," he said. "Of course you want to win every game you play, but it's one of the few areas of football where individual performances can be far more important than a result.

"And it's a team made up of different sets of players. You have the pros who have not been involved in the first team, you have players coming back from injury who the Manager might want to have 20 minutes to get some match fitness, and you have some youth players stepping up a level and looking to impress the Manager."

The next Reserves game is at home to Norwich on Tuesday afternoon at Kenilworth Road (kick-off 2pm).

"It will be a tough game," said Marvin. "Norwich are a very good footballing side – the best we've played all season when they beat us comfortably 4-0 at their place in October.

"We don't know who will be available until after Saturday, but it's possible that Calvin Andrew could look to be involved. He's back in training and will be looking to get some games under his belt when the time is right.

"But it's good for youngsters to play against the best opposition possible. You're only going to improve if you're playing against better players than you're used to.

"We beat Milton Keynes Dons 8-0 earlier in the season, but you're not going to get much out of a game like that. You need to get stretched if

you're going to get a good performance out of players and if they're going to improve."

Marvin also thinks that young players at Luton are lucky in that they are not completely divorced from the senior squad.

"It's not Them and Us here. The players all know the youngsters here and are a lot more integrated than at some clubs. We have days when all the players train together and have five-a-sides. Our boys are very fortunate and can learn from the pros. It's great for the youngsters."

"I also often get the youth players to watch the senior players train when we've finished – see how the pros conduct themselves in training."

And the good news for the young Hatters is that they will still train at the same venue at the new training ground and can continue to absorb the professional approach and learn their trade.

With seven games of the season to go for the Reserves, including two postponed games that have yet to be re-arranged, there's still plenty to play for and plenty to think about for Marvin.

"So far I have to be honest it's been a disappointing season. Although the Club has had a lot of injuries and that affects the players who are available, I would still have expected us to have had a better season."

"The highlight for me was our recent trip to Oxford when in spite of us having eight or nine kids, we beat a very strong Oxford side and had some good individual performances. That's the sort of effort we're looking for now for the rest of the season."

Luton's youngsters were hit by two goals at the start of each half, but instead of their heads going down, they stuck at it, scored twice to make the game more respectable, but couldn't find another breakthrough.

There are a band of football clubs who are currently outside of the top flight whose fans will never accept that they are anything but Premier League clubs.

Wolverhampton Wanderers are one such club and, consequently, their expectant supporters provide a highly-charged atmosphere to any game – home or away – at any stage of the season.

The tradition at Molineux in recent years has been to have big name managers with broad shoulders and cool heads at the helm, and the present incumbent Mick McCarthy certainly fits that mould.

McCarthy has steered Wolves to within goal difference of the play-offs in his first season in charge, after being presented with the task of improving on Glenn Hoddle's much-publicised 'failure' last season when his side finished in seventh place in the Championship.

Hoddle's tactics frustrated Wolves fans with too many draws, and McCarthy has already won more league games so far this season than his predecessor managed in the whole of the last campaign.


The former Republic of Ireland manager will not be allowed to rest on his laurels, however; as no matter how many of the remaining fixtures he wins this season, the fact that arch-rivals West Brom and Birmingham City are still above them in the table will make even a play-off position as inadequate.

Wolves' solo season in the top flight was the climax to a 13-year period of investment by lifelong fan and benefactor Sir Jack Hayward, who bought the club as a phoenix rising from the ashes just after they'd won promotion from the old Division Three in 1990.

Molineux hero Steve Bull had hit 50 goals for two seasons running while Hayward's cash was used to rebuild the stadium, but play-off heartache became a regular source of frustration to those who followed the old gold.

Dave Jones eventually took Wolves to the Premiership in 2003, finally allowing Hayward to realise his dream and hand the club over to his son, Rick, but they went straight back down, costing Jones his job, and they have not yet fully recovered.

Presently, in-form Wolves have just won four Championship matches in a row, but two 3-0 defeats to West Brom – one in the league, one in the FA Cup – and two recent league defeats to Dave Jones's promotion rivals Cardiff has caused discord in the board room and the terraces alike.
