From the Board of Directors



A warm welcome from Kenilworth Stadium to the Ipswich Town directors, players and supporters for today's vital Championship game.

Events such as those over the last couple of days are never easy, however it is part of the football industry, and difficult decisions are never easy to make or indeed popular.

As a Board we have been questioned over the disbursement of transfer income since we took the Club out of receivership.

We understand how emotive a subject like this can be with our committed supporters.

Therefore, while technically we are not obliged to, the Board members are all of an opinion that in view of such comment we have an obligation to publish summary details of the football business and this will be summarised on our

website, www.lutontown.co.uk on Monday (March 19).

We have stated before and state again that at no time have the Board ever instructed the Club's manager to sell a player. Equally we have never refused the Manager when it came to buying players.

Our problem has already been well documented. Until we relocate to a new stadium we will always have problems attracting or holding on to players as our revenue base simply cannot compete with most of the Clubs in this league.

Currently our football operating costs alone will this season exceed our total income (excluding transfers) and that is before we take into account all the other operating costs of the business.

These are the harsh facts of where the Club is at present and highlight the priority we

are giving to achieve relocation in order to compete on a level footing.

As a Club we have faced difficult times in the past and have always bounced back, as the spirit of this Club constantly pulls us through.

What is needed now is for everyone to get behind Brian Stein and the lads, who we know will give it their all over the remaining eight League games.

We have extremely good players at this Club and all of us can play a part in retaining our Championship status, beginning today against our opponents Ipswich Town.

Enjoy the match and get behind the lads.



We're still in a state of shock over the departure of Mike Newell this week. It's not something that we saw coming at all, to be honest, but this happens in football and we're big boys so we know that our job is just to put the shirt on and go and play as hard as we can.

We were all 100 per cent behind Mike Newell when he was in charge and we're 100 per cent behind Steiny now that he is the Caretaker Manager.

We've known Steiny for a long time. He was here when I joined and quite a few of the lads knew

him from coming up through the ranks, so there's plenty of continuity there.

Whatever happens now, whether Steiny gets the job or not, we'll just carry on with our jobs.

When something like this happens, it can go either way. You can sit back and feel sorry for yourselves or you can crack on and get on with it.

We know how important today's game against Ipswich is. A lot of our problems this season seemed to start with our away game at Portman Road, when we lost Sol, so perhaps we have the chance to put things right today.

We have eight Cup Finals coming up for the rest of the season now after losing at home on Tuesday night – it's as simple as that.

I was so pleased to be involved again in that match even though I didn't get on the pitch. I knew I wasn't match fit because I hadn't had a run out at all.

But it meant that I had to watch a very tense game from the sidelines – and I'm a shocking watcher. I know that not everyone can play and it's part of the game but I just hate it.

I would much rather be out there. When you get on the pitch and you

have a job to do you know where you are. When you're watching you're just powerless.

There's nothing we as players can do about what happens off the pitch. For example, the suggestion this week that drawn games should be decided by a penalty shoot-out. What a load of rubbish!

You can go away from home, go down to 10 men early on, pick up a couple of injuries and battle your way to a draw. If you do that you deserve to come home with a point, it's as simple as that.

I think penalty shoot-outs would be trying to turn the game into something out of the NBA or ice hockey – just Americanising the whole sport.

But these things are out of our hands, just like people leaving football clubs unexpectedly.

There's nothing we can do, but we CAN try to put a smile back on people's faces by giving 110 per cent and if we do that, we have quality players at this Club who can still turn this season around.

We'll be doing our best to do that today and for the rest of the season, so get behind the lads and I hope you enjoy the game.

With the top three in the Championship all failing to win in mid-week, the table is as tight as ever with chasing pack picking up maximum points.

DERBY'S (2nd) surprise draw at home to QPR (22nd) means they failed to close the game on league-leaders BIRMINGHAM, who were beaten by NORWICH (15th) on Tuesday night.

CARDIFF (7th) are the visitors to Pride Park this afternoon and Rams boss Billy Davies will be hoping to rectify some indifferent form which has seen them win only two of their last seven games.

Although they were held at home to STOKE (9th) in midweek, SUNDERLAND (3rd) are still in red hot form. They remain unbeaten in 2007 and have amassed a

massive 30 points from a possible 39.

Roy Keane's team will be firm favourites to win this afternoon with HULL (19th) the visitors to the Stadium of Light today, although Phil Brown has guided the Tigers to back-to-back victories recently.

WOLVES (5th) are another team who are experiencing a rich run of form that has pushed them into the promotion shake-up. Despite their defeat to COVENTRY (14th) in midweek, they will be hoping to add to their recent run of six straight victories when then make the trip to SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY (12th).

At the foot of the table, SOUTHEND (21st) at home to LEEDS (24th) is the pick of the games. Southend have managed to haul themselves out of the bottom three for the first time since the turn of the year thanks to seven points from their last nine.

LEICESTER (16th), who still need the points to push them clear of the relegation zone face QPR, who returned to the bottom three on Wednesday.

BARNSELY (20th) face a tricky trip to Coventry, while PLYMOUTH (13th) will hope to return to winning ways after being dumped out of the FA Cup by Watford, when they take on CRYSTAL PALACE (10th).

Sunday's action sees a Midlands derby as WEST BROM (6th), who have lost their last three Championship games, host Birmingham City at The Hawthorns.







Impossible dreamers

It was always going to be hard. Luton, then in League One, had beaten Oxford United in the First Round of the Worthington Cup of 1998-99 and their reward was to be drawn against Ipswich Town of the Championship.

The task was huge. Ipswich were on a roll and would go on to finish third in the Championship that season, missing out on the Premiership only in the Play-Offs. Luton under Lennie Lawrence were heading for mid-table of League One.

And it got harder. In spite of a Stuart Douglas strike on the hour at Portman Road, goals from Jamie Scowcroft and Jean-Manuel Thetis had given Ipswich a 2-1 win in the first leg.

Now it was back to Kenilworth Road. Could the Hatters overcome the odds to pull off a real upset?

It didn't look so in the first half when Ipswich pulled everybody behind the ball, kept Luton at bay and then struck on the break as David Johnson made it 1-0 to Ipswich on the night and 3-1 overall.

That was the score at half time. Surely it was all over. But sometimes you just have to believe. Sometimes the impossible can happen. Though no Luton Town fan in the ground that chilly September night could have imagined what the next hour and a half would bring... (See pages 14 and 15)


Was this the greatest-ever game at Kenilworth Road?

On average, Marvin Johnson scored a goal every 44 games during his Luton career, making a total of 10 in his 440 matches for the Hatters.

So when Luton needed a goal to keep them in the Worthington Cup with a minute of extra time left, sending Marvin forward for a corner didn't exactly look like a cunning plan. But in one of the most memorable finishes of any game in the history of Kenilworth Road, the big man did the job.

Matthew Spring swung over the corner kick from the left at the Oak Road End. England Under-21 keeper Richard Wright came but couldn't clear the ball, which looped up in the air... towards Marvin.

"I think Wright went for it with one hand," Marvin remembers. "He didn't get enough on it, though, and it flew towards me. I just stuck my head out and managed to connect."

The ball flew high over Wright and the Ipswich defence and dropped under the bar. Marvin had done it and as he led the charge back towards the half-way line before being mobbed by delighted team-mates, the Hatters fans went loopy. There was barely time to kick off.

It was an incredible end to a real roller-coaster of a game that started badly and got worse when David Johnson gave Ipswich a 1-0 half-time lead, putting them 3-1 up on aggregate.

But gradually Luton turned it around. First Andrew Fotiadis won the ball near the touch-line, hustled into the centre and drove it past Wright. Then Stuart Douglas turned his man and fired home with six minutes to go. 3-3 and Hatters fans were leaping about. It was extra time.


Alan White came on and Steve Davis was pushed up front. It worked as he headed home a Gavin McGowan corner halfway through the first period of extra time. For the first time in the tie, Luton were ahead and the fans went bonkers. But the cheers were silenced as hero Davis stretched to clear a cross and put through his own net. Two minutes to go, 4-4 and suddenly Ipswich were going through on away goals.

Manager Lennie Lawrence said afterwards: "It would have been a travesty if the game had finished like that." Thanks to Marvin it didn't.

In fact, Marvin was never in any doubt how it would finish. "It didn't cross my mind that we were out," he says. "Even though there were only two minutes to go, we didn't feel we'd lost."

"We thought that if we could get down the other end we could still get something out of it."

"Going into the game, we thought we had a chance. We felt we had a chance against anybody at Kenilworth Road."

"And we were playing very well in the first half. I couldn't believe it when

they scored. I thought: 'How the hell are they winning?'

"I think the goal was my fault. I lost David Johnson from a throw in. Steve Davis often went forward if we were

behind, but once we went ahead in extra time, he came back. I remember thinking: 'Leave him up there, we're doing well.' At the end I don't remember a sense of relief even. We were just happy to have got through."

An amazing game and thanks to Marvin, a happy ending...



Roger Wash looks back on five classic games between Luton Town and Ipswich Town



November 5, 1960
Luton Town 3 Ipswich Town 2
Attendance: 11,221

The Hatters had mustered only one win in seven leading up to the visit of high-fliers Ipswich and were feeling the loss of mercurial winger Billy Bingham to Everton.

With new signing Jim Standen making his home debut in goal it was hoped that the defence would be less prone to leak goals, although the prolific Ipswich strike force of Ted Phillips and Ray Crawford would prove difficult to stop.

Our own ace marksman Gordon Turner and Alec Ashworth gave Luton leads, but Ipswich levelled twice in a thriller and seemed to have earned a point when Crawford scored with four minutes to go... until Turner came up with the clincher.

March 25, 1961
Ipswich Town 0 Luton Town 1
Attendance: 21,744

By the return the Hatters were languishing in mid-table, having blown their chance of bouncing back to the top flight first time. League leaders Ipswich on the other hand had won their previous five games and were on their way to the championship of the old Division Two.

Ipswich began as if they were going to win by a landslide but the lucky Hatters managed to keep them at bay. The good luck doubled when, in the Town's only real attack of the game, Ipswich skipper Andy Nelson mis-headed a high cross straight to Alwyn McGuffie who nodded in a simple goal.


It was back to the wall for the remainder of the game but a mixture of good defending and boot the ball anywhere meant the Town held out for an unlikely victory.

December 26, 1974
Ipswich Town 0 Luton Town 1
Attendance: 23,406

Fast forward 14 seasons and the Hatters are rock bottom of the old Division One while Ipswich are sitting proudly on top. The Town had not won away all season and started with endless backpasses to goalkeeper Graham Horn much to

the disgust of the Portman Road fans.

In truth, for all their huffing and puffing, Ipswich did not look like scoring but then neither did the Hatters until the final minute when wily winger John Aston crossed the ball with his left foot from the right wing for teenager Ron Futcher, on his full debut, to head home.

March 13, 1984
Luton Town 2 Ipswich Town 1
Attendance: 8,776

Since Christmas, when the Hatters had moved up to third spot in the Division One table, they had won only once in ten starts and supporters were beginning to wonder whether another season of struggle was on the cards.

On a freezing, snowy night, journeyman striker Trevor Putney opened the scoring with a delicate chip and when the same player netted from the spot after Frank Bunn was upended the game looked all over.

With seven minutes left, panic set in when Trevor Putney, who always seemed to score against Luton, was presented with an open goal but Ipswich could not push forward with purpose and the Hatters managed to hang on.

March 30, 1985
Luton Town 3 Ipswich Town 1
Attendance: 12,640

The Hatters had won through to the semi-finals of the FA Cup but were still in the relegation mire at the foot of Division One as were their visitors.

Ipswich missed a hatful of chances early on but eventually took a deserved lead through Eric Gates. By half-time, though, efforts from Mick Harford and Emeka Nwajiobi had put the Town in the driving seat and in the second period it was one-way traffic.

Harford, who had the beating of England centre-half Terry Butcher all afternoon, netted his second to make the points safe and give everyone some breathing space as they looked forward to the forthcoming cup clash with Everton.



Stat Attack

Simon Pitts on stats, players and previous meetings between today's two sides

Ipswich have played at Luton nine times in the League, with the Hatters winning six and losing twice. Luton have scored 16 goals, and the visitors 13. The sides have also met in Cup competitions three times, with a win, a draw and a defeat for each team.




Luton have bought four players from Portman Road, with another two joining on loan. In 1976 Jim McNichol signed on a permanent basis and David Geddis joined on loan. Both players made 17 appearances for the Hatters, with Geddis scoring four times during his time at Kenilworth Road. It was nearly 20 years before any more players made the switch until two joined manager Terry Westley at Luton in time for the start of the 1995-96 season. Bulgarian international Bontcho Guentchev (pictured) made more than 60 League appearances, scoring ten goals during his two seasons at the Club. Gavin Johnson made less of an impact, making only six appearances before moving to Wigan Athletic. Neil Midgley joined on loan during the 1999-2000 and scored a brace in a 2-1 win over Burnley. There was just one goal in his other nine appearances and that came in a 2-1 defeat at Oldham. The most recent signing is, of course, Sam Parkin, who joined last August. Parkin made eight appearances, and scored against Colchester before a bad ankle injury kept him out of the side.

There has been only one draw in this fixture, 1-1 back in 1982-83 when a controversial goal from Alan Brazil was given by the referee despite a linesman's offside flag. Brian Stein equalised with a penalty after a foul on Kirk Stephens. The biggest attendance for this fixture, 17,577 in September 1974, also saw the biggest victory as the then table toppers Ipswich won 4-1. Adrian Alston scored the Hatter's consolation.


Ipswich have bought only two players from Luton, and you will be forgiven for not being able to name them. Joe O'Brien played just 14 times and scored three goals between 1947 and 1949 before his move to Portman Road. Willie Havenga only just beat O'Brien's record with Luton, playing 19 times and scoring seven goals. Havenga did net a hat-trick for the Hatters against Swansea Town in December 1950.

Luton have completed only one double over Ipswich and that was in 1960-61, a season that saw Ipswich finishing as Champions. Luton won only twice away all season and Ipswich had just three defeats at home, so Alwyn McGuffie scoring the only goal of the game certainly gave an unexpected result. Luton had won 3-2 at Kenilworth Road earlier in the season, thanks to a brace from Gordon Turner and a goal from Alec Ashworth. Ipswich are looking for their first League double over the Hatters, having won at Portman Road back in October.



No Luton player has scored a hat-trick against Ipswich, but three players have scored two, including Gordon Turner's in 1960-61 as mentioned above. Trevor Aylott and Mick Harford (pictured) also achieved this feat in March 1985 and 1986 respectively. Aylott opened the scoring from the penalty spot in the first half and then doubled the lead after the break with Luton winning 2-1. Ipswich actually took the lead a year later, but Luton went into the interval ahead after goals from Harford and Emeka Nwajobi. Harford wrapped up a 3-1 win with his second on a day when a certain Terry Butcher was marking him...

And finally... Luton have scored in every League game against Ipswich at Kenilworth Road.



The Godfather

Gordon Taylor, Chief Executive of the Professional Footballers' Association, is widely regarded among pros as the godfather of football. And nobody crosses a don, not even the rivals who hold the power and the money, the FA and the Football League. They still have to make sure they don't tread too hard on the toes of one of his boys, lest they incur his wrath.

Geoff Knox talks to the head of the PFA as it reaches its 100th birthday

What does the PFA mean to the ordinary man in the street? Some football fans are sick of reading about how much the current stars of the Premiership earn, but the money is there in the game courtesy of TV and only a fool would refuse it.

Anyway, absolutely no-one dreams of becoming a professional footballer just to roll around in the money. So, when barrel loads of cash are thrust upon young men who are still in their formative years then it's understandable that they need protection.

In an exclusive interview, Gordon told me: "These days a player can earn more in a week than what Stanley Matthews earned in a career.

"It's not to the detriment of the game because football is as popular as ever. The game has been unbelievably funded since television has realised the power of football to get people paying their subscriptions with satellite TV."

And don't be fooled by watching television coverage of one of the PFA's many star-studded events, where canapés and champagne sometimes flow as freely in their hired plush conference suites as Bovril and tomato sauce does on the terraces on a Saturday afternoon.

These are fundraising events. And if the PFA don't raise £1m by the end of the year, then someone may suffer.

Don Gordon Taylor has set his sights on raising the cash as part of the PFA's Centenary celebrations to pay for a Children's Rehabilitation and Physiotherapy Unit at the University Children's Hospital in Manchester.

A noble gesture indeed. But this is indicative of the spirit of an

organisation that was born out of frustration and restraint in the north west of England exactly 100 years ago.

The PFA has never been run by people just doing a job, either. Gordon has been at the helm since 1980, and this year he can at least feel that he has done his time in the role, as he matches the stint of his predecessor, Cliff Lloyd, who also clocked up 27 years in charge.

After a distinctive playing career which saw Gordon turn out for Bolton Wanderers, Birmingham City and Blackburn Rovers, he faced up to the end of his playing career as all footballers must. Fortunately, he'd been prepared by some sound advice from his parents long before.

"I was only allowed to join Bolton full time if I carried on with my education in case I didn't make the grade. That's one of the reasons why I got my coaching badge.

"So I had to make a decision to become a coach or manager as all players want to do, or to take over from Cliff Lloyd, who had been secretary of the PFA from 1953 to 1980. I saw that as a challenge and took it on."

To suggest Gordon did well in his new role is an understatement a bit like saying that Geoff Hurst did OK in the 1966 World Cup Final.

"When I joined there were two of us in a rented office in Manchester. Now we have a staff of about 250 full and part time. We have offices in London, Birmingham and Manchester and we are shaping big programmes such as the Football Club In The Community."

Gordon has an encyclopaedic

knowledge of the history of the PFA and told me how it all began.

"When the game went professional in 1888 there were a number of issues. At first players could just change clubs at the end of the season.

"Then some clubs started the transfer system but the FA were worried about that."

The football clubs were keen to comply and move the game forward, so they came up with a suggestion for the FA.

"They said: 'If you don't want a transfer system for stability then give us a registration system', which they did but that meant that players were tied to clubs. So to achieve equality and competition they put on a maximum wage.

"At the turn of the century there was a maximum £4 a week wage, which had only improved to £20 by 1961.

That's the time that Jimmy Hill (the former Chairman of the PFA) and his colleagues were prepared to strike to remove it.

"As the game evolved, other issues cropped up, and a group of players decided that they needed collective strength.

"After earlier efforts had failed, a very first meeting was arranged in Manchester at the Imperial Hotel in Piccadilly. Billy Meredith, who was the Stanley Matthews of his day, chaired the first meeting with some other players, mostly from the north west."

The Association and Players and Trainers Union, later to become known as the PFA, was formed that night. However, news travelled fast and




the people in charge of the game were not happy.

"The FA ordered all clubs not to register or pay anybody who was a member, and players had to sign a statement to prove they were not in the union. That was the sort of intimidation and hardship they had to put up with.

"They weren't even recognised as a union and they didn't have rights under the Workman's Compensation Act if they were injured.

"As a result, Meredith led a team of mainly Manchester United players and they became known as The Outcasts because they went without their wages throughout the summer of 1909. But the new season was starting and there was going to be disruption.

"In the end they stuck to their guns and the FA caved in and recognised them. Since then, of course, they've gone from strength to strength."

By the 1960s the PFA had evolved into regional organisations and had even

flirted with the TUC. Then in 1963 the PFA bravely won a major battle in court which, if they'd lost, could have seen them go bust.

Newcastle player George Eastham challenged a system where if a player rejected a new contract at their club his employers were not obliged to pay him, but could still hold on to his registration.

"That was challenged in court and the judge ruled that the Retain And Transfer System as it was then was beyond the law. Eastham was the fore-runner to the Bosman Ruling in 1995. We supported the Bosman case because the situation in Belgium was what we had in England pre-Eastham.

"The thing was it brought in literal freedom and it also failed to restrict the number of non-national players from countries within the Common Market. That had its good and bad effects."

The modern day role of the PFA is still to protect and promote its members, but the environment in which the

game is played has changed so dramatically – even since Gordon's day – that each day at the office brings a new challenge.

Players pay an annual subscription of just £95, but, boy, do they get good value for it.

"We negotiate everything. We have a standard contract through our collective bargaining agreement with the Premier League and the Football League.

"We've negotiated a share of TV money which funds our private medical insurance for all players. We have our own permanent disability for old players and the 50 or so players who have to come out of the game each year through injury."

It's also admirable that no matter what happens, Gordon's organisation would never turn its back on one of its sons. The end of your playing days can even signal the beginning of your real interaction with the numerous services in place at the PFA to help you cope with life after hanging up your boots for the last time.

"Our education fund pays out more than £10m a year in grants to coaches, managers and physiotherapists.

"Everybody who's been a member of the PFA stays a member of the PFA, even once they've retired. They keep membership and they are entitled to help with education and medical treatment. We have a hardship fund as well."

Gordon, now 62, is certainly not planning on hanging up his briefcase just yet, and is generally optimistic about the future of football.

His main concern about the state of the game is one that the rich clubs are getting richer and the smaller clubs are getting poorer. He has watched the painful transition from equality to elitism since he took up his position all those years ago.

"In the beginning with the League everything was shared out equally whether you were in Division One or Four. That was sponsorship money. There was a levy on gate receipts and television money but then suddenly that balance started to change during the 80s.

"The First Division, instead of accepting a quarter, wanted 50 per cent... then 75 per cent. Then they finally broke away in 1992.

"The biggest problem is how are we going to create a variety of success in football when it's dominated so much by fewer and fewer bigger clubs?

"That's the problem for the game's administrators."





Welcome to Ipswich Town

His appointment may have been a surprise, but Jim Magilton is working hard to turn round the fortunes of Ipswich Town. STEWART CURTIS introduces today's visitors to Kenilworth Road

Ipswich arrive at Kenilworth Road today after a midweek defeat at Preston and still not mathematically clear of the threat of relegation themselves. Much of the Hatters' difficult season began with the away trip to Portman Road in October, which not only ended in a 5-0 win for Ipswich, but also cost Luton Sol Davis for 13 games when he suffered a stroke on the team coach.

After Ipswich were relegated from the Premiership in 2001-02, the Tractor Boys' fans expected an instant return to the top flight, a return they still await. Having been defeated in the play-off semis for two years running after the drop, they then finished a disappointing 15th last season.

When Joe Royle departed back in May, former club captain Jim

Magilton was appointed his successor in time for 2006-07. An inconsistent season began with realistic hopes of a play-off push, and after beating Luton, Ipswich sat just four points off the play-off places. They have since failed to continue this form, however, and their slow slide down the table has left some commentators doubting Magilton's ability as a manager.


The decline in form has continued of late, with Ipswich winning just two of their last ten games and failing to score in seven of them. Despite summer signing Alan Lee's goals, the Blues' inability to find the back of the net was the evident problem over Christmas, a problem Magilton hoped to resolve with the loan signing of Blackburn's Francis Jeffers.

Once seen as one of the country's

most promising prospects after some impressive performances for Everton, Jeffers went to Arsenal for a massive £8m in June 2001. He has since suffered a series of major injuries, however, and moved around a few more times before arriving at Portman Road in January. Magilton described the deal as "a real coup" and an "exciting signing for us".

But after he made an instant impact in his first start against Hull, scoring after 24 minutes, Jeffers pulled up with a hamstring injury, continuing Ipswich's season of bad luck. He has now gone back to Blackburn.

As well as obvious attacking problems, the Tractor Boys have managed just four clean sheets in the League this season, giving the Hatters reason to hope for a much-needed win this afternoon.

The Ipswich Town players who will face Luton at Kenilworth Road today


The Manager



Until 2006, Jim Magilton was a midfield player who represented Northern Ireland 52 times. He played for Oxford United, Sheffield Wednesday, Southampton and ended his career after seven-and-a-half years at Ipswich. He served as an apprentice at Liverpool alongside the likes of Steve McManaman and Mike Marsh. He was transferred to Oxford United in October 1990 at the age of 21, where he made 150 League appearances before moving to Southampton in February 1994. In 1997, after making 130 League appearances with Southampton, he moved to Sheffield Wednesday, and finally to Ipswich Town in 1999, first on loan then as a permanent signing. He scored a hat-trick against Bolton Wanderers in the 1999-2000 play-off semi-final, securing the club's place in the play-off finals. The 2005-06 season was Magilton's last at Ipswich as a player. He originally intended to become a coach at another club, but made a tentative approach to the board at Ipswich to fill the managerial vacancy after Joe Royle's departure in the summer of 2006. Magilton was appointed as Ipswich manager on June 5, 2006, alongside former Academy Director Bryan Klug. Although still registered as a player, Magilton has said he will not for the first team this season.

The Goalkeepers

Although both Ipswich's main keepers are relatively inexperienced, they are two of the most promising in the Championship. **LEWIS PRICE** joined Ipswich's successful Academy in October 2001 and made his first team debut against Gillingham in season 2003-04. He spent just over a month on loan at Cambridge in 2004-05 and also established himself as first choice for the Welsh Under-21s. He was also named in John Toshack's senior Welsh squad for the World Cup clash against Austria at the Millennium Stadium in March. **SHANE SUPPLE** (pictured) is one of a number of Republic of Ireland youngsters at the Club's Academy. He was in goal when Ipswich beat Southampton to lift the FA Youth Cup in 2005. Capped by his country at youth levels, Shane established himself as first choice at Portman Road in 2005-06, making his debut at Leicester in August. **ANDREW PLUMMER** is another young keeper coming through the ranks.




The Defenders

JASON DE VOS, who won 50 international caps for Canada, arrived in England from Montreal Impact in 1996, signing for Darlington where he made 52 appearances, scoring six goals. He headed north to Scotland two years later, joining Dundee United and became a popular figure at Tannadice, clocking up 111 appearances for the club. Wigan paid £500,000 for him in 2001 and he was soon skipper at the JJB Stadium, playing a prominent part in the Latics' Second Division Championship campaign in 2002-03. He joined Ipswich on a free transfer and signed a new two-year deal in the summer, replacing Jim Magilton as club skipper.

ALEX BRUCE started at Blackburn and signed for the club from trainee in July 2002. He went out on loan to Oldham in December 2004, playing eight times then left Blackburn without making a first-team appearance to join Birmingham in January 2005. Two days after signing at St Andrews he joined Oldham again for a second loan spell. In March 2005 he moved to Sheffield Wednesday on loan and played in their Second Division Play-Off Final win over Hartlepool. He made 12 appearances for Birmingham before signing a three-year deal at Ipswich on a free transfer. Alex is the son of former Manchester United skipper Steve Bruce.

RICHARD NAYLOR is Ipswich's longest-serving player and a recent contract extension will keep him at Portman Road until 2009. Since being a youth player, he has made more than 300 appearances for Ipswich. **FABIAN WILNIS** (pictured) played in Holland with NAC Breda before arriving at Portman Road in January 1999. Wilnis is an orthodox full-back, but can also play as an attacking wing-back or in the middle of the defence. **DAN HARDING** has been capped four times by England Under-21s, winning his first cap in a 3-1 win over the Ukraine at the Riverside in August 2004. He joined Ipswich in August 2006 in a player exchange deal that took Ian Westlake to Leeds with an additional £500,000 going to Portman Road.



The Midfielders

SYLVAIN LEGWINSKI (pictured) started his career at Monaco and made 125 League appearances, scoring 13 goals. He joined Bordeaux in 1999-2000 and played 49 times for the club before moving to Fulham in a £3.3m deal. He made 128 Premiership appearances for the Cottagers, scoring eight goals before joining Ipswich on a two-year deal in August. **DARREN CURRIE** was at West Ham as a teenager, but left the club without making a first team appearance and joined Shrewsbury in February 1996. He played 83 League games for the Gay Meadow club before moving on to Plymouth on a short-term deal. He joined Barnet that summer and scored 19 goals in 127 League games before Wycombe paid out £200,000 for him in July 2001. He spent three years at Adams Park, before being released. He then moved to Brighton and was a virtual ever-present in their side until Ipswich paid out £250,000 for the wide player in December 2004. **GAVIN WILLIAMS** signed on loan from West Ham before making a permanent switch in January


2006, signing until the summer of 2009. **JAIME PETERS** turned down the offer of joining Chelsea and Manchester United to commit to Ipswich in the summer of 2005. Capped by Canada at full international level, he operates on the right flank. **DANNY HAYES** is an Academy graduate who made his debut at Leeds in September 2005. A quick striker who can play down the middle or wide, he was part of the winning FA Youth Cup squad of 2005. **OWEN GARVEN** is another academy product who made his senior debut in 2004-05 at the age of 16, when he was a sub in the win over Brighton in November. He has won caps for the Republic of Ireland from Under-15 to Under-17 levels. He was a regular in FA Youth Cup success in 2005 but missed the decisive second-leg of the Final against Southampton after being rushed into hospital with a virus. **GARY ROBERTS** joined Ipswich on loan from Accrington and made the move permanent after some impressive performances. He was at Liverpool and Crewe as a schoolboy but then moved out of League football, playing in the Welsh League for Bangor before joining Accrington



The Strikers

ALAN LEE (pictured) started his career at Aston Villa before moving to Burnley for £150,000 in July 1999. He made 20 appearances for the Clarets, then moved on to Rotherham in 2000 where he became a big hit, scoring 37 goals in 111 League games. A £850,000 move to Cardiff followed in August 2003 but the Galway-born striker never settled in Wales and joined Ipswich in January 2006. An instant favourite at Portman Road, he scored four times before a hamstring injury forced him to miss the last two games of the season. Republic of Ireland youth international **BILLY CLARKE** was knocking on the door of the Ipswich first team squad last season. He signed his first professional contract on his 17th birthday in December 2004 and his goals played a big part in Town's FA Youth Cup success although he missed both legs of the Final after sustaining medial knee ligament damage in the closing stages of the Semi-Final win at Tottenham. The youngster has scored

three goals in ten League starts. **JONATHAN WALTERS** started his career at Blackburn Rovers, scoring plenty of goals for their youth team before earning a move to Bolton Wanderers. He played a few first team games before signing for Hull City, then Wrexham and in 2006 he moved to Chester City. He signed for Ipswich in a deal worth £250,000 plus add-ons in mid-January 2007. Walters scored his first goal for Ipswich in their 2-1 win over Queens Park Rangers in March at Portman Road and has also played for the Republic of Ireland Under-21s. **GEORGE O'CALLAGHAN** started at Port Vale and despite an offer from Tottenham midway through his five-year stay at Vale Park, he opted to remain at the club, where he made 34 appearances. He returned to Ireland in 2002 and played for Cork, helping them pick up their first League title in 12 years. He scored 11 goals, while also being named as the Eircom League Player Of The Year for 2005. O'Callaghan completed his move to Ipswich in January.







Out of the Blues

Football doesn't always follow a smooth path as young players try to make it to the top and follow their dreams of joining one of the big clubs. As Hatters striker SAM PARKIN knows success can come from the unlikelyst of directions when you least expect it. But that doesn't mean he has given up on the dream ALL footballers share... of playing for his country again

Most players dream of making it to one of the big, mega-rich clubs in the Premiership, but success doesn't always work out that way. Hatter Sam Parkin's career really took off when he LEFT Chelsea.

"I had great times at Stamford Bridge," he remembers. "I have some really fond memories coming through the ranks at Chelsea and I played under some good managers. It was a great education. But when I look back, the three years at Swindon have been a real highlight of my career so far."

But while Sam may have had a back-to-front progression into football, his dreams are still the same as most players and he longs to pull on his country's shirt again.

He has already played for the Scotland B side and is now desperate to shake off his injury so that he can build towards that again.

"It's a door that I haven't closed and I am hopeful that the opportunity will come up again."

For the moment, though, Sam is working as hard as he knows to get back to fitness and push for a first team return at Luton. It is especially hard on him today, when his former club Ipswich Town come to Kenilworth Road and he can't be there to take on his old team mates.

Having missed out on the trip to Portman Road earlier in the season, Sam will again be kicking every ball from the stands as he sits out the return fixture.

It's the one game of the season the Luton striker had his eye on when he arrived at Kenilworth Road in August 2006 after he completed a £340,000 move from the

Suffolk club. When Sam was snapped up by former Ipswich boss Joe Royle, expectations had been high that he could fill the gap after the likes of Darren Bent left for the Premiership.

Sam came with a reputation of a proven striker who had a sharp eye for goal. His record spoke volumes, having joined Ipswich from Swindon, where he had scored 73 goals in 142 appearances.

Unfortunately, Sam had a cruel slice of bad fortune as injury restricted his chances at Portman Road. But he showed his class by banging in five goals in a restricted season.

Determined not to be defeated, Parkin was ready to show what he can really do as this Championship season began.

But fate stepped in again and Ipswich decided to let him go, a decision that saw Luton boss Mike Newell beat the rest to capture his man on a three-year deal.

"I was a little surprised when Ipswich let me go," admitted Sam, who celebrated his 26th birthday on Wednesday.

"I came back after an injury-ravaged season, which was a disappointing first season for me, but I was positive and looking forward to enjoying some success with the club.

"I never wanted to throw the towel in, but I think once Ipswich allowed me to talk to other clubs, the writing was on the wall.

"It was then up to me to make a decision to see where it would be best to further my career.

"I wasn't rushing out of the door at Ipswich by any stretch of the imagination but once they had accepted an

offer, I think it is best to move on."

Sam's promise had been spotted at an early age by Chelsea, who brought him through their youth set-up at Stamford Bridge.

However as an influx of promising talent came rising through the system, Sam and a host of other players were shipped out on loan, with the striker having spells at four other clubs in three years.

"I think when you are 18 years of age the lads that get put out on loan at Chelsea are the ones who are close to the first team squad. They were the ones who were put out to see if they could handle it in the professional game and make the step up into the Premiership."

However, Sam's own chances in the Premiership never arrived, despite impressive spells out on loan with Wycombe, Oldham and Millwall. Even a season-long loan at Northampton Town couldn't persuade Chelsea bosses that he should be given the opportunity.

With no first team debut forthcoming, Sam was left to consider his future and despite having a year left on his Chelsea contract he decided that it was time to move on.

So from luxury of Stamford Bridge it was off to the more humble County Ground at Swindon. It may not sound like a dream move, but for Sam it was a period of his career that he looks back with great fondness.

"Initially I thought it went well and that I might have a chance at Chelsea. However, once I had one or two loan moves and I wasn't getting anywhere near the first team, I knew it was time for me to review the situation.

"At that stage I thought it would be best for me to sign for Swindon permanently, rather than on another loan. Fortunately for me it was probably the best move I could have made."

Sam took to life in the professional game with ease. He quickly became a favourite among the Swindon fans and made an impressive start with a hat-trick on his debut.

He went on to score 26 goals in his

first season, Sam then helped Swindon reach the League One play-offs, but his 23 goals that year were in vain as the Robins lost to Brighton in the semi-finals.

Next season he banged in another 24 goals and that was enough for Ipswich to come in and take him up to the Championship.

"It started really well for me at Swindon and thankfully continued in that vein for a few years.

"The goals were flowing and the team almost got promoted in the second year. The only down side was that we didn't go up, which is something I regret to this day.

"I scored a hat-trick on my debut and we got to the play-offs the following year as well. I had three fantastic years at Swindon and probably the highlight was getting the move to Ipswich, which was something I worked so hard for."

Sam is still working hard on those international ambitions, too, and is hoping to get another chance on his return to Luton's squad. "There was talk of a call-up into the Under-21 Scotland side, but it never happened.

"However, I did play for Scotland B just over a year ago now. I played against Austria and really enjoyed the experience. If it wasn't for the injuries, it may have come around again and I am still hopeful that it will come up again."

Sam hopes it isn't long before Luton fans get to see him back in action in a Hatters shirt.

The ankle he injured at Hull in October has deprived Luton fans of seeing his talent at Kenilworth Road for a while, but signs of a recovery have been encouraging.

"It has been slow, but hopefully I'm getting there. I'm back on the training ground every day and I am

just doing my rehabilitation. The latest X-rays I have had back from the surgeons suggest that everything is going well and he is happy for me to up my rehab and to try to get back as soon as possible.

"Obviously it is going to be a slow process, but hopefully I am through the worst of it now.

"I haven't set a time frame on when I will be back in full training. I am just taking every day as it comes but hopefully it will be sometime this season, by which time we will have picked up a few results along the way.

"Because I have had a couple of operations on the ankle, it's important that I don't rush back because then I really will be in trouble. It's important for me that everything goes right this time."

And then Sam can concentrate on following those football dreams.



Michael (Mike) John HARRISON

One of the many products of the Chelsea youth system of the 1950s, Mike made his debut for the Blues as a 16-year-old but in five years at Stamford Bridge never really established himself despite winning England Under-23 caps.

An £18,000 move to Blackburn in 1962 was the making of him as he earned a regular place there as an immensely powerful and quick winger. A transfer to Plymouth in 1967 was quickly followed by a move to Luton a year later and he helped the Hatters win promotion to Division Two with a tremendous penalty kick routine as his party piece.

Mike is now settled back in Plymouth and was a representative for a medical firm.



Andrew (Andy) HARROW

With Luton Town struggling for goals at the start of the 1980-81 campaign, manager David Pleat made a rare dip into the Scottish transfer market and bought Raith Rovers marksman Andy for £50,000. Sadly, Andy did not fit in at Kenilworth Road and his three full League appearances all ended in defeat for the Hatters and in each he did not get a sniff of a goal. Pleat engineered a swift return to Scotland for the disillusioned Andy with Aberdeen boss Alex Ferguson glad to pay £50,000 for him. He did not last long at Pittodrie, though, and moved swiftly on to Motherwell, Raith and East Fife before settling down in Kirkcaldy.

John HARTSON

Luton Town scout Cyril Beach recommended several Welsh youngsters to the Hatters with Hartson another off the conveyor belt, signing professional terms in December 1992. Scoring on his League debut at the start of the following campaign, John's precocious talents came to the fore during a famous televised win over Newcastle in the FA Cup in February 1994. He scored the first in a 2-0 Fourth Round replay over the Geordies at Kenilworth Road.

The big clubs came sniffing around and Arsenal paid a record fee for a teenager of £2.5 million for the powerful striker in 1995. Since then he has become a regular for Wales and enjoyed several big money moves in both this country and Scotland.

John is currently with West Brom.



Richard George HARVEY

England Schoolboy and Youth international Richard worked his way up through the ranks at Luton Town before making his League debut as a 17-year-old in November 1986 in a 1-0 home win over QPR. A strong, fast left back or left sided player with a powerful shot, Richard eventually became a regular member of the Hatters top flight side.

He then began to have appalling luck with injuries which left him missing the best part of three seasons before he fought his way back into contention with the Town now drifting down through the divisions.


Eventually leaving Luton to join Aylesbury in 1998, Richard is now a postman in his home town of Letchworth.

Robert (Bob) James HATTON

"Have boots will travel" seemed to be the motto of Bob, who never hung about very long at most of his nine League clubs. But such was his prowess in front of goal that there was never any shortage of takers no matter how brief his stay was likely to be.

Bob was just the sort of experienced player that rookie Luton manager David Pleat needed in the summer of 1978 and although the wily striker stayed only the statutory two seasons, he took a young Brian Stein under his wing along the way and became a crowd favourite at Kenilworth Road.

After leaving the game, Bob worked in insurance and for the PFA as a financial adviser before retiring at 55. Bob now dabbles in property.



William (Willie) Stephanus HAVENGA


South African-born Willie came over to this country to join Birmingham City having been spotted playing for Bremner OB in his home country. Due to the size of the squad at St Andrews, he made only one League start in two years and accepted a move to Luton in May 1950 where he was given more of a chance. In his first season at Kenilworth Road he enjoyed a 16-game run in the side and scored a hat-trick against Swansea on Boxing Day 1950 but a broken wrist then hindered his progress.

A tiny winger with a fierce shot, he then moved on to Ipswich and had spells at Kettering, Worcester and Hinckley before returning to South Africa.

Gary John HEALE

Signed from Canvey Island by Luton Town in 1976 as an 18-year-old, Gary had an unbelievable start to his Hatters career, scoring on his debut during a 7-1 thrashing of Charlton in September 1977 and then getting two more in a League Cup second replay against Manchester City two months later. That was as good as it got for the skilful winger, though, as he fell out of favour under new manager David Pleat and was sold to Reading for £40,000, which was a record for the Royals at the time.

A regular in the Reading side for three years, Gary was then surprisingly sold to Sparta Rotterdam. He then moved to the States with his American wife and still coaches there.



Markus HEIKKINEN

Although born in Sweden due to his Finnish parents working there at the time, Markus regards himself as a Finn and has become a regular for the national team.

After playing for MyPa and HJK Helsinki, he wanted to try his luck in England and joined Portsmouth, where he was not given a fair crack of the whip and so headed north to Aberdeen, where he became a favourite.

Determined to play in England, Markus came to Mike Newell's Luton in 2005 and has not looked back since despite playing in an unfamiliar central defensive position as opposed to midfield where he is picked for his country. Markus was rightly voted Luton's Player Of The Season in 2005-06.

Vince Mark HILAIRE

Tricky winger Vince joined Crystal Palace from school, making more than 250 League appearances for the south London club and seemingly set to stay there for the rest of his career until a call came from Luton manager David Pleat in July 1984.

The chance of top flight Division One football was too good to turn down but, beset with injuries, Vince managed only nine games at Kenilworth Road before he was on his way again with Portsmouth paying £100,000 for him. He enjoyed four successful years at Fratton Park followed by spells at Leeds, Stoke and Exeter before becoming player/manager at Waterlooville. Vince now coaches junior football in the Portsmouth area.


Ricky Anthony HILL

Luton Town legend Ricky burst onto the scene as a 17-year-old. He came on as substitute in a dull end-of-season game against Bristol Rovers in 1976 and immediately lit up proceedings by laying on a goal with his first touch and scoring with his second.

After 12 months of being nurtured gently in the Reserves, Ricky eventually won a regular place which, barring injury, he kept for the next 12 years, picking up a promotion to the top flight and England caps along the way.

One of the finest midfielders in the Hatters' history, combining skill, strength and speed, Ricky left Luton in 1989 to seize a chance of French football with Le Havre.

After taking up coaching posts on both sides of the Atlantic, Ricky became manager at Kenilworth Road in 2000. Sadly, the job he craved turned sour, which was a great shame for the supporters who all badly wanted him to succeed.




But despite throwing bodies forward, Luton were unable to find an equaliser and are now just one place off the foot of the Championship table.

By Car: Burnley is yet another easy ground to get to on the road as it is not far off the M65. From Luton, take the M1 north-bound, to join the M6. Leave the M6 at Junction 29 and onto the M65, turning off at Junction 10. When you exit the motorway, follow signs for Towneley Hall. This road eventually goes past the ground.

Parking: There is a car park available at the cricket ground, by Turf Moor, which costs £3. Otherwise, its street parking.

they proudly wore the shirt and represented Luton Town.



Grant hopeful on Earnshaw return


Norwich manager Peter Grant has revealed that leading scorer Robert Earnshaw could make a return before the end of the season.

West Brom defender Curtis Davies will miss the rest of the campaign after breaking a metatarsal bone.


The injury happened during the first-half of the Baggies' 3-2 defeat at home to Crystal Palace on Wednesday.


Chief Executive Shaun Harvey told the Yorkshire Evening Post: "If the club owned the stadium there would no longer be any mystery as to who owns it."


Ridsdale rubbishes shoot-out idea

Currie makes loan move to Derby


Derby County have signed Ipswich winger Darren Currie on loan until the end of the season.





Wright-Phillips signed for Southampton from Manchester City after the Saints won the Coca-Cola Sign A Player competition, picking up £250,000 to put towards an undisclosed fee.

Behind the scenes, Southampton have made a change at the top, with Leon Crouch coming in as the new chairman.

Crouch took over when Michael Wilde failed to attract any new investment to the club. This afternoon, he will be hoping his side can push on towards the Premiership as soon as possible.




