



Having said that, I thought the boys who went out there did well and while we lost the game 2-0, we could quite easily have won it.

The keeper pulled off two great saves from Kyle Lafferty and Steve Jones and with Graham Branch hitting the crossbar and Chris McCann having a header cleared off the line, we could have easily left there with a 4-2 victory.

Now we are beginning what is likely to be our busiest time of the season, with the amount of games we have to cram into a month.

More importantly, six of them are at home, which is something we have missed.


Everyone knows we have just had nine of our last 13 games on the road so, while every game is important, these six games are even more so.

Wright, now a respected television pundit, added: "It is absolutely fitting that Burnley have a special evening to celebrate their 125th anniversary.


"As a founder member of the Football League, this is a club with a very special standing in the English game."





the time to investigate the legality of the parachute payments.

As for the proposal to introduce penalty kicks for the extra point in drawn games, that too met with disapproval.

Quite a few Football League chairmen thought it was a little too gimmicky and not what our football is all about. After all, we brand it as real football for real football fans.

As it happens, the Premiership were the main objectors anyhow, insisting they would not allow promoted teams by that method - despite being happy for a team to win promotion via a penalty shot out in the play off final!

In my view, I didn't want to just toss the proposal out without consideration and I feel it is worth

an experiment. There is no greater traditionalist than me, but

three points for a win was met with that disapproval on its introduction. Likewise the play offs because, at the time, nobody wanted the sixth club to be promoted.


Nowadays, nobody in their right mind would ditch the play offs.

I just think the penalty idea was worth a trial somewhere. There is always three points to play for: after all, aren't we in the entertainment industry?



## THIS RUN WILL MAKE US STRONGER

**At Preston we pushed them back in the second half and looked like we were going to get an equaliser.**

Had we got it, who knows what might have happened because they were getting quite jittery.

Unfortunately it wasn't to be and it was the same old story: all that hard work for no reward.

As a collective, we feel pretty luckless at the moment. Everybody is trying so much to end the run and things continue to go against us.

It is so disappointing to be involved in this right now, but we just have to keep believing that through hard work and our quality that it will change.

The manager always seems to get the blame in situations like this. But it's the players who must stand up and be counted and once that happens – and it will happen – then we will be a better and stronger team for the run we have been on.

I think you always learn more as a team when you are on a losing streak because you find the real character of your team mates.

Naturally, nobody wants to be in this situation, but it will stand us in good stead for having a good end to the season and pulling right away from the bottom of the league.

Nothing lasts forever and soon something will drop. We have a massive game today against Luton, quickly followed by another home game against Plymouth on Tuesday.

The Luton game is obviously the most important because it is the next one. If we can get that win we need, that will give us the platform to add another three points on Tuesday.

We do have to be aware that

we are in a bit of a scrap and unless we pick up wins soon, we are going to be in danger.

But these two games could pull us clear and the confidence that will give us should allow us to push on and hopefully finish the season up a few places.

Obviously, we are not scoring as many goals as we would like. That is the big disappointment.

But the law of averages says that the more crosses we put in the box and the more shots we take, the more goals you will score.

That's no slur

on the strikers either. You defend and attack as a team and while we have been pretty tight at the back and losing by the odd goal, we are not quite creating enough chances and that will improve.


Another bonus has been the support from the stands. At Preston, you were terrific and it's so important, especially when you are struggling, to have the fans behind you and encouraging you.

# Luton Town



## The Manager - Kevin Blackwell

**Luton-born Blackwell hardly had time to get to grips with the Kenilworth Road hot seat before preparing his team for today's trip to Turf Moor.**

Appointed earlier this week the former Leeds United manager, 48, returned to football just six months after his contract was terminated by fellow Championship strugglers Leeds United.

Blackwell began his playing career at Cambridge United and later appeared for Barnet and Scarborough, before linking up with Neil Warnock at Notts County.

He followed Warnock to Torquay and

**This afternoon we welcome Luton Town to Turf Moor, in what could potentially prove to be a proverbial six-pointer as the season enters its final stages.**

In complete contrast to last season Luton travel north in poor form and the recent dismissal of manager Mike Newell left the club in an unstable position, both on and off the pitch.

Indeed, in Luton's last outing against Ipswich Town, some fans vented their anger, calling for the club's board to resign as the Hatters fell to their sixth successive defeat.

Caretaker Manager Brian Stein quickly called on all supporters to rally round and put aside their frustrations to help his team fight for survival in the Championship.

However, Luton have wasted little time making a new appointment, restoring stability by handing former Leeds United boss Kevin Blackwell the reins

earlier this week with just seven games remaining.

The first meeting between the two sides this season resulted in a 2-0 win for the Clarets, following up their amazing 3-2 win last season at Kenilworth Road.

On that day, Luton sat ninth in the league after an impressive start to the campaign, as they picked up where they left off last season.

The club were rocked by the loss of striker Rowan Vine in the transfer window, who had top-scored with 14 goals, 12 of them coming in the Championship.

That was the latest blow to supporters after seeing key players such as Curtis Davies, Steve Howard, Carlos Edwards and captain Kevin Nicholls all sold in the last two seasons; in turn having a massive impact on the club's fortunes.

The Hatters' form has taken a severe dip since January, with the side dropping to second from bottom in the Championship, currently four points adrift of safety.

And points certainly mean everything this afternoon as Luton bid to drag themselves out of trouble and avoid playing League One football again next season.

Huddersfield, where he took on coaching duties, before the duo worked together at Plymouth, Bury and, most notably, Sheffield United.

Assistant manager Blackwell finally took his first managerial role at Elland Road in 2004, being handed the task of rebuilding after a turbulent spell of huge financial concern for the Yorkshire club.

Massively in debt, Leeds had been forced to sell off their star players and Blackwell – initially seen as a temporary appointment – made a plethora of signings to stabilise a sinking ship.

However Leeds lost the final 3-0 to Watford at the Millennium Stadium and Blackwell never recovered.

A poor start to the 2006/07 season

inevitably followed and last September,

with Leeds lying 23rd in the

Championship, Blackwell left the club.

## ones to watch...

### Markus Heikkenen

**Former manager Mike Newell pulled off something of a coup when he captured the signature of 28-year old Heikkenen from Scottish side Aberdeen in 2005.**

The commanding centre-back has gone on to establish himself as a key member of the Luton squad already in his two years in English football.

Although he was born in Sweden, the blonde-haired defender represents Finland at international level and has partnered Liverpool defender Sami Hyypia at the back for his country on numerous occasions.

The introduction of Heikkenen was seamless as he established himself in a Luton team fresh from winning promotion in 2005 and quickly became an integral performer in the side that surprised many by finishing a respectable 10th in the Championship last season.

A tidy, composed defender by trade, Heikkenen also displays good aerial strength and good timing of tackling, which has seen him build a respected career to date, pulling on the shirts of clubs such as MyPa, HJK Helsinki, and Premiership side Portsmouth, before his move to Aberdeen and ultimately to Kenilworth Road.

As Luton's form has taken a turn for the worse, Heikkenen is now very much viewed as an essential part of the first eleven and his form will be crucial if Luton are to avoid a return to League One in their second season in the Championship.

### Matthew Spring

**Lining up in the centre of the park for Luton this afternoon is likely to be creative midfielder Spring.**


A product of the club's youth system, Spring's career turned full circle in the January transfer window, when he completed his transfer back to Kenilworth Road from local rivals Watford for a fee which could rise to £300,000.

Calm and composed in possession, Spring is capable of being the link between the back four and front two with his hard-working displays and eye for a pass – making him a useful player to have around.

After breaking on to the scene with the Hatters, he made his name in the 1998-99 season and quickly established himself as a first team regular.

At the end of the 2003-04 season, Spring was signed by then newly-appointed Leeds United manager Kevin Blackwell on a Bosman free transfer, as he looked to get the side back into the Premiership.





A familiar face to Clarets fans, goalkeeper Beresford joined the Hatters from Barnsley in July 2004. The 37-year-old was part of the Clarets side that won promotion at Wembley in the 1994 play offs. He has again showed his capabilities at this level this season, despite the Hatters' struggle.

# Learning curve

BURNLEY DEFENDER STEPHEN FOSTER FEELS HIS BEST FORM IS YET TO COME.

**IF** Burnley's recent run of results was the subject of a court hearing, there would definitely be grounds for an appeal.

The Clarets' battling performances certainly haven't been reflected in their points return of late as the side strive to climb away from danger.

And one man hoping to make the case for his own defence is Stephen Foster, who believes he has yet to prove his full potential at Turf Moor.

"It's been a bit stop-start for me really. Coming to a new club I was pleased with how pre-season went. It was a bit of a shock as it was a little bit different to the way Crewe do things. It was more intense but I felt fitter for it," Foster told the Clarets Magazine.

"It's just been a bit bitty and when I have got my chance, I have been disappointed not to hold down a place in the team. I admit that.

"I'm not going to kid myself and say I've played to my full ability. There have been times when I think I've done well, at Derby and Birmingham maybe, but jumping up a step has been a steep learning curve."

"The manager has shown great belief in signing me though and I am determined to keep working at it and repay him for that faith."

After arriving on a free transfer from Crewe in the

summer, the 26-year-old has had to wait patiently for his chance, often biding his time on the sidelines for when opportunity knocks. And Foster knows he needs to be at the peak of his game to take full advantage and stake a claim for an extended run in the team.


"I knew when I joined the club that there were a number of centre-halves, but I thought that was going to be good for me and my career," said Foster.

"At Crewe I got into a situation where it was a bit of a comfort zone and I knew I was going to be playing every week. I didn't take my place for granted, I wouldn't say that. I knew if I was maybe playing at 70% then I'd be playing every week, whereas here things are a little tougher and I have got to strive for the performances that will keep me in the frame for a starting role in the team.

"But I've settled in now and I think my expectations for myself have grown. I don't want to set myself targets, I'm not really that kind of person, I just want to train as hard as I can and when I get the opportunity, play as well as I can to stay in the team. I know I need to play well to stay in because of the competition, so in that sense there is perhaps more expectation of me."

Burnley's recent run of results has been well ►

documented but Foster, who emerged from Crewe's highly-acclaimed academy, is no stranger to these situations and believes the experience will ultimately serve to make the team stronger.

"It's funny, I've been in exactly the same situation when I was at Crewe. I think it was two seasons ago, we were seventh in the league after beating Leeds on New Year's Day, which for Crewe was a major result. We sold Dean Ashton after that game and then we went from that game all the way until the end of the season without a win. We managed to get a result on the last day of the season to stay up," explained Foster.

"There was pressure but maybe not the same as here. Rightly so, as we should expect to win games in this league, whereas at Crewe you were always the underdog.

"Every game you go into, you say this is going to be the one where we end the run and then when you don't it's doubly disappointing. Nobody likes losing and once you have a lost a few on the trot you feel really frustrated and just want to put things right. It's not as easy as just going out there and gritting your teeth though, you've got to play well and earn it."

"You can't get yourself too down when you do lose games. You are disappointed but you have to pick yourself up again quickly for the next game. All the lads here are bad losers but that's the best way to be."

The mood in the Clarets camp remains upbeat, despite the recent troubles. And Foster reckons that fighting spirit will ultimately pull Steve Cotterill's side through as they look to get back to winning ways in today's crucial match against Luton.

The Hatters themselves have been on a poor run of form and the importance of the game cannot be underestimated, with both teams gunning for those precious three points.

"I don't think anything is going to hype the game up any more than we will do ourselves. We know how important the game is - as is every 90 minutes at this time of the season," admitted Foster.

"Luton are down there and unfortunately we've found ourselves down there too, so this is one game we are all determined to

do well in.



"Perhaps we haven't got some of the results we've deserved at home, but with the fans behind you it does help and some say it's like having a 12th man!"

"There is no winning recipe though, I don't think.

"You just have to work hard on the training ground and at your set pieces, which can get you that goal to send you on the way."

"These are frustrating times for everyone really: the players, the staff and all the fans."

"But all the lads get on, which is important, and we are all behind each other 100%, whoever is picked to go out there and get the results."





## Promotion Play-Offs

Former Luton Town central defender Steve Davis starred in Burnley's 1993-94 Second Division play-off final success. Initially moving to Turf Moor on loan from Southampton in November 1989, he rejoined Burnley for £60,000 in August 1991 and featured in the 1991-92 Fourth Division title triumph. He was sold to Luton for £750,000 in July 1995 and netted 21 goals in 138 League outings before returning to Burnley for £800,000 in December 1998. A promotion winner in 1999-2000, he scored 42 times in 327 League games overall before joining Blackpool in July 2003.

## Promotion Winner

Former Burnley midfielder Alan West helped Luton Town win promotion to the top flight in 1973-74. He was an FA Youth Cup winner with Burnley before turning professional in December 1968, making his First Division debut in the 1-1 draw at home to Stoke City in March 1970. Netting three goals in 45 League games while at Turf Moor, the England U-23 international was sold to Luton for £100,000 in October 1973. He was ever-present in 1974-75 and starred in their 1978-79 League Cup run, scoring 16 times in 285 League outings before joining Millwall in July 1981.

## In Safe Keeping



Former Burnley goalkeeper Marlon Beresford was a key figure in Luton Town's 2004-05 League One title triumph. Initially moving to Turf Moor from Sheffield Wednesday for £95,000 in August 1992, he was ever-present in Burnley's 1993-94 promotion campaign and joined Middlesbrough for £500,000 in March 1998. He rejoined Burnley in January 2002, then returned from York City in October 2002 and made 287 League appearances overall before moving to Bradford City in September 2003. Joining Luton in October 2003, he rejoined the Hatters from Barnsley in July 2004.

## Wing Wizard

One-time Luton Town winger Ted Hancock starred as Burnley reached the FA Cup semi-finals in 1934-35. Moving to Burnley from Liverpool in February 1933, he netted 23 goals in 112 League games prior to joining Luton in November 1936. He helped them win the Third Division (South) title in 1936-37, scoring three times in 26 League outings before moving to Lincoln City in July 1938. Bob Brevis, Billy Clarkson, Wilf Crompton, Jimmy Drinnan, Hugh Galbraith, Archie Heslop, Billy Knox, Steve Thompson, Jack Walders and Bob Weaver have also played for both clubs.

## Leading Marksman

One-time Burnley striker Ron Fletcher was twice Luton Town's leading marksman. Moving to Luton from Chester with his twin brother Paul in a joint £100,000 deal in June 1974, he scored a hat-trick on his full home debut in their 3-2 win over Wolves six months later. He netted 40 goals in 120 League outings for the Hatters before being sold to Manchester City for £75,000 in August 1978. Joining Burnley from Port Vale for £65,000 in November 1989, he was top scorer in 1990-91 and netted 25 times in 57 League games prior to joining Crewe Alexandra in August 1991.



## Two Spells

Former Burnley full-back Mitchell Thomas had two spells at Luton Town. Signing professional for Luton in August 1982, the England U-21 international starred as the Hatters were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and moved to Tottenham Hotspur for £233,000 in July 1986. He rejoined Luton from West Ham in November 1993 and helped them qualify for the Second Division play-offs in 1996-97, netting six goals in 292 League games overall before joining Burnley in July 1999. A promotion winner in 1999-2000, he made 99 League appearances for the Clarets.



## Wembley Finalist

One-time Luton Town striker Steve Taylor played for Burnley in the 1988 Sherpa Van Trophy final. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Oldham Athletic for £50,000 in January 1979, his solitary goal in 20 Second Division games came in Luton's 4-1 victory at home to Burnley three months later and he was sold to Mansfield Town for £75,000 in July 1979. He joined Burnley for £35,000 in July 1980 and starred alongside Billy Hamilton in the 1981-82 Third Division title triumph, netting 43 goals in 131 League games prior to joining Wigan Athletic in August 1983.



## Top Flight


Former Luton Town full-back Joe Loughran helped Burnley finish third in the top-flight in 1947-48. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Birmingham in May 1937, he made 25 Second Division appearances for Luton prior to joining Burnley in July 1939. He provided reliable cover as the Clarets won promotion and were FA Cup finalists in 1946-47, then displaced Arthur Woodruff at right-back during the 1948-49 campaign. Briefly appointed captain, he made 65 League appearances while at Turf Moor before moving to Southend United in September 1949.

## Top Scorer


Former Luton Town striker Kurt Nogan was Burnley's top scorer in 1995-96. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in July 1989, he netted three goals in 33 League games for Luton prior to joining Peterborough United in September 1992. He joined Burnley for a then record £300,000 from Brighton in April 1995 and was ever-present in 1995-96, scoring 33 times in 92 League outings while at Turf Moor before being sold to Preston for £150,000 in March 1997. Luton's former loan striker Wayne Biggins was Burnley's leading marksman in 1984-85.

## Cup Hero

One-time Burnley midfielder Alan Harper was an experienced figure as Luton Town reached the FA Cup semi-finals in 1993-94. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Everton in September 1993, the England Youth international also featured prominently as Luton narrowly avoided relegation in 1993-94. His solitary goal in 41 First Division games came in the Hatters' 2-1 victory at home to Grimsby Town in December 1993 and he joined Burnley in August 1994. He featured in the Clarets' 1994-95 relegation battle and made 31 League appearances before a spell as youth team coach.

**AND so the Premiership fat cats are just going to get fatter and fatter.**

The latest television deal is so much money it is almost obscene.

And how have the big clubs getting another huge slice of financial pie reacted?

Well, at least half of them seem to have forgotten that at some point in the history of the Premiership, they have not been members.

They should remember what it is like to wait for scraps to fall from the top table.

Some of them, to their credit, have remembered that life in the Premiership is expensive, especially for their loyal supporters, and have cut prices for next season.

It's a great gesture, albeit one with a knock-on effect for clubs like Burnley, who now face the prospect of having several Premiership rivals charging less than Turf Moor admission prices when next season kicks-off.

Others simply seem to have decided that they have earned it and they are going to keep it all to themselves.

None of this is healthy for the game.

None of it offers even a sniff of a level playing field.

## 'LAST ORDERS' FOR TOO MANY CLUBS

None of it does anything other than add to the problems that have financially blighted clubs outside the top flight since the Bosman ruling.

I don't have a problem with players deciding when and where they want to further their careers.

I don't have a problem with players holding out for the best possible wage packet. After all, they are the ones who actually strive to entertain us.

But the whole problem with 'Bosman' was that it made life even harder for clubs down the ladder to cash in on their investments.

Burnley used to sell to survive and a lot of that selling was done in the close season.

Now the transfer complications – largely brought about by clubs not wanting their stars to simply walk away in the summer – and the dreaded transfer window, mean that most of the transfers that have hit the Clarets in recent seasons (Blake, Chaplow, Akinbiyi) have really stuffed up a season.

Most of this, of course, is nothing new.

But the further away the Premiership gets from the reality of every other level of football, the harder it will be to breach the gap.

And that leads me to a conclusion which has haunted me ever since the Premiership

was spawned.

I believe that somewhere there is a list of either 18 or 20 clubs. When those clubs are the ones who make up the Premiership, the door will slam shut and there will be no promotion or relegation; just franchising, as in all major American sport.

I am a Burnley fan of almost four decades.


I have watched them in all four divisions and reported on them in three.

One of my dreams is to do both in the Premiership, but the way the financial ball is rolling right now, that is something that will get harder to achieve.

Those who know me personally, or have read my work, will know that I am not a member of the glass-half-empty brigade.

I am not really a member of the glass-half-full lobby.


But I dread the thought that someone, somewhere, might tell me there are certain bars I am not allowed to visit.



## MATCHDAY PARKING – THE NORTH/EAST CAR PARK ON MATCHDAYS

Only permit holders allowed to enter from 12 noon (for 3.00pm kick-off) and 5.00pm (for 7.45pm kick off). Vehicles cannot leave the car park during the match for safety reasons and will be held back until all spectators have left the exit route towards Belvedere Road. Vehicles must be parked 45 minutes before kick off – one hour for high priority matches. No pass – no entry. All vehicles to park in the correct numbered bay.

## EVACUATION PROCEDURE

In the event of an emergency requiring the evacuation of the whole or part of the stadium, spectators are requested to leave by the exits identified in the evacuation announcement. Stewards will assist the evacuation.

## GROUND SAFETY







### JIMMY MCILROY STAND

#### (UPPER TIER)

Last season, family season ticket prices in the Jimmy McIlroy Stand (upper tier) were pegged at the previous season's level. This policy will continue, so a family buying their seats together in the Jimmy McIlroy Stand (upper tier) will pay the



published 2006/7 prices for their season tickets.

### JIMMY MCILROY STAND (LOWER TIER)

Due to the continuing deterioration in the condition of the David Fishwick (Cricket Field) Stand, and the possibility that we will need to perform extensive maintenance to this area, we cannot guarantee this stand will be available to visiting supporters for the whole of the 2007/8 season. After consultation with the police and our ground safety advisors, the best alternative location for these supporters is considered to be the Jimmy McIlroy Stand (lower tier).

In the event that supporters are asked to move, the club will upgrade season tickets for this area to the James Hargreaves Stand lower tier, free of charge.

### 16 TO 18 PRICES



# the game of my life

an ex-Claret takes a look back at a game close to their heart

**Alan West**  
Burnley FC  
1968-73



**Burnley have only won the FA Youth Cup once in their glorious history.**

The year was 1968 and the greatest crop of youngsters the club ever produced overcame Coventry City in the two-legged final.

One of those emerging talents was Hyde-born Alan West, who had signed for the Clarets as an apprentice the year before that epic victory; incidentally opting for Burnley instead of Manchester United.

Alan, who played in every youth cup game on the way to the final, recalled: "It really was a great team with tremendous team spirit.

"Everyone blended as a team and we were a real force...we went to the likes of Manchester

United and won!"

That early promise was reflected in a first team debut at home Stoke City, at Easter in 1970.

For Alan, the game of his life came early in his career, with a performance at Queens Park Rangers on New Years Day 1972 that was noted at the highest level.

"QPR had a great side at the time with the likes of Rodney Marsh, Terry Venables and Gerry Francis in their side," recalled West.

"They were a pretty high flying team at the time, but it was just one of those games where everything I did worked.

"Every pass was to the right place and I always seemed to be in the right place at the right

time. I really just dominated the midfield.

"Alf Ramsey was there to watch the game in his role as England manager and on the Monday he called Jimmy Adamson to tell him he wanted me in his Under 23 side that week.

"On the following Wednesday I played for the U23's against Wales at Swindon. It was so quick and just so amazing really."

Burnley had actually lost the QPR game 3-1, but West had truly cemented his place in the Clarets side.

"I learned more from Jimmy Adamson than any other coach I ever played under," admitted the former Clarets midfielder.

After being a regular under

Adamson, Alan found himself very much on the edge of things and, in October 1973 today's opponents, Luton Town, offered £100,000 for his services and he moved to Kenilworth Road.

While at Luton he made 285 appearances for The Hatters - the majority of those as club captain.

Alan recalled his time at Luton with fond memories, but after ten years he signed for Millwall in 1981, playing for The Lions until his retirement from professional football in 1983.

He then became involved in non-league football as player manager of Hitchin Town, followed by several other clubs.

Football, by that time was starting to take second place in Alan's life as he became very involved in church work and he is now a Church Minister in Luton, where he has settled.

"After being a player, how do you replace those Saturday and Tuesday nights?" asked Alan, rhetorically.

"Most players do find it a difficult transition. I just knew I wanted to work with people and seeing something tangible for what you actually do, so I became a Minister."


Sadly, Christmas 2003 saw Alan diagnosed with Non Hodgkin's Lymphoma; a cancer that was widespread in his upper body.

The stark choices were three-months to live or chemotherapy and, with support from the church, family and friends, he embarked on the tough regime of regular treatment. "My faith was an anchor," he later reflected.

The passage of time has seen Alan make a remarkable recovery and back in training for the London Marathon on 22nd April, to raise money for Eliminate Leukaemia.

**EARLIER in the season I wrote about legendary Brazilian striker Romario's quest for 1,000 goals.**

After a spell in Australia, the 41-year-old returned to former club Vasco da Gama, where he has hit three hat-tricks this season, and is thought to be two away from the magic four-figures – only ever reached by the great Pele.

But it appears there is some debate as to whether Romario has added goals to his vast tally from friendly matches and the like, that give him 100 goals more. "Currently, there are several parallel counts going on in Brazil," says Joao Carlos Assumpção of SportTV, a Brazilian sports channel.

"Some say Romario has seven goals fewer than he claims, and others think he should not include the ones he

scored during his youth league days, before becoming a professional.

"Critics say that the perfect day for goal 1,000 would be on April Fools Day," he says.

However, another golden great, of Mexico 70 vintage, Tostao, feels Romario has earned the right to make his claim: "Some goals are being disputed because they were not scored in official games.

"But it's Romario's figures and he should be respected. Whether he scored 900, 950 or 1,000, that does not diminish the genius of Romario, one of the greatest players of all time."

Pele has questioned Romario's

for Brazil's National Army team.

However, to use the quote used by Anthony Wilson in 24 Hour Party People, and beloved of all journalists, "When the legend becomes fact, print the legend."

**IT has emerged that when Argentine ace Lionel Messi was making his way through the ranks at Barcelona, there was a bid to persuade him to play for Spain.**

Messi, who became a Spanish citizen in September 2005, was having none of it, however, with his response: "I told them I'm an Argentine, from Rosario, and a leper."

Not that he was suffering from the disease, he was merely showing his pride in his home city Rosario's

Newells Old Boys club – nicknamed The Lepers after Newells accepted an invitation to play a fund-raising match, while derby rivals Rosario Central refused, and were branded The Scoundrels.

Messi himself had a hormone deficiency in his youth, with Newells unable to afford the treatment, and he ended up at Barcelona when he was 13.

Messi shone on trial, and, in 2004, became the third-youngest player of all time to play for Barcelona, later becoming the youngest to score a league goal for the club.

But his allegiance was obvious, helping Argentina's Under 20s win the World Youth title, scoring six goals to add the golden boot, and the golden

ball as best player in the tournament.

Despite taking up Spanish citizenship, and earning a contract until 2014, Messi obviously remains happy to be "a leper", and Spain can only look on in awe at his talent, so vividly shown in his recent hat-trick in a 3-3 draw with Real Madrid.

**THE man who stole the headlines in the first game at Wembley has a new minder.**

Fiorentina striker Giampaolo Pazzini hit the first goal at the new Wembley after 28 seconds last Saturday, and went on to complete a hat-trick in a thrilling 3-3 draw against England.

And his feats certainly impressed clubmate Luca Toni, one of Italy's key frontmen.

Asked whether Pazzini might get carried away by his new-found fame, Toni said: "I will take care of him.

"I am his big brother and therefore I would scold him if that were to happen.

"He has a nice family in the background and I am confident that he will not have those kind of problems."

And he admitted he is watching over his shoulder: "I must be careful, he might steal my place.

"I'm happy for him, he deserves it. I spoke to him and congratulated him.

"He deserves this because he is a great player and a great person.

"Is he ready for the national team? Let's wait a while. He is very strong, he just needs to play with continuity to show all his qualities."



Burnley's cheerleaders, The Bees Knees, were dancing for joy at the recent UKCA National Championships in Birmingham.


The girls, coaches by Suzanne Waterworth of the Community Sports Trust, finished with a host of credible finishes despite entering a harder category than last year.


### By Road:

Leave the M6 at Junction 6 and take the A38(M) (known locally as the Aston Expressway) for Birmingham City Centre. Continue past the first turn off (Aston, Waterlinks) and then take the next turn off, for the Inner Ring Road.

Turn left at the island at the top of the slip road and take the Ring Road East, sign posted Coventry/Stratford. Continue along the ring road for two miles, crossing straight across three islands. At the fourth island (there is a large McDonalds on the far left hand corner) turn left towards Small Heath. Birmingham City's ground is about a 1/4 of a mile up this road on your left. The ground is well sign posted on the Inner Ring Road.

### By Rail:

The nearest station is Bordesley, which is about a ten minute walk away from the ground, but is only served by trains from Birmingham Snow Hill. If you arrive at New Street Station in the city centre, either walk to Snow Hill (ten minutes), take a taxi (about £4) or embark on the 20 minute walk to the ground.


