



Good evening and welcome back to Pride Park Stadium for our penultimate home game of the season, another important one that is sure to be a tough test.

I'd like to begin by congratulating my players, staff and everyone at Derby County for all the hard work they've put in achieving a place in the play-offs at the very least. I'd also like to recognise the backing you, the fans, have given us along the way.

There are still three matches to go, it's all still very much to play for and we will continue to pick up as many points as we can as the aim remains the same as it always has been - to finish as high up the table as possible.

When you consider what this club has been through in recent times, on and off the pitch, I believe it's nothing short of remarkable that we find ourselves in the position we are in.

A lot has happened since my last magazine notes and it's very difficult to encompass it all into a few words - in fact there are no words that could possibly describe some of what has gone on.

Our appeal against the retrospective punishment dished out to Darren Moore following the Leicester away fixture failed and it's a huge blow to be without the services of one of our player of the year candidates for the remainder of the season.

We've recalled Lewin Nyatanga from his loan at Barnsley to provide cover but the courage of Marc Edworthy also needs a mention here - he has played at the heart of defence recently and taken a few knocks in the heat of battle that have done nothing to improve his looks!

Our appeal against Stephen Bywater's sending off at Ipswich was successful and the FA decided he had been wrongfully dismissed. He is now available to play tonight.

In the chaos that surrounded that incident - one which I said at the time, and still maintain, could have been easily diffused by yellow cards simply being shown to Bywater and Alex Bruce - I was also sent to the stands.

I am still bemused as to exactly why. Yes I went onto the pitch, but so did several members of the coaching staff from both teams. I wanted to calm a couple of my players down and urge the referee to keep showing common sense in the situation.

It's the third time I've been "sent off" and of course journalists were keen to pick up on that after the game. However it seemed to be conveniently forgotten that I have already been completely cleared of doing anything at the Burnley game and have appealed against the Southend charge.

In between all of this there was actually some football, which is what we all want to see. We picked up a good point at Leicester, which is always a tough place to go, thanks to Craig Fagan's first goal for the club.

We then showed great character to come from behind against Coventry at Pride Park, Matt Oakley's back-flick one of the more unusual goals we'll probably all ever see but they all count.

That was on Easter Monday and on the Saturday we travelled to Portman Road. This time captain Matt scored a more orthodox goal in the tenth minute, and what a volley it was too from 25 yards as we started the game in great fashion.

The incidents I've already mentioned will be what the game will be remembered for and they, in my opinion, spoilt the game at a crucial stage when we were leading 1-0.

As you would expect in the second half Ipswich came at us and Francis Jeffers' goal with 20 minutes to go levelled the scores. A late penalty gave the home side the points despite all our effort and hard work.

I'd like to welcome Kevin Blackwell, his staff, players and the Hatters supporters to Pride Park tonight.

I can't fault the effort, desire and professionalism of my players in what they have achieved this season. Now it's time for the final push and I'm sure you'll play your part by roaring on the Rams too.

My finances, job and education meant I was never really able to watch Derby, particularly as I concentrated on my Scottish team, Raith Rovers, for many

years. However, I always watched out for reports about Derby and vowed to get to see them one day.

At the end of 2001 I finished studying with the Open University, which meant that I got back evenings and weekends that I had sacrificed to concentrate on my degree. As a reward

to myself for finishing the course, I bought a half-season ticket for our last season in the Premiership, intending it only to be a one-off.

But I was hooked. I've renewed my season ticket every year since then, only missing games at Pride Park when I've been out of the UK.

Some people understand, but some don't. My line manager Daniel Kleinberg falls into the former category, perhaps because he supports Celtic and Liverpool! Roddy Maclean, Edinburgh

Where are they now? Marco Gabbiadini

“Do you know who that bloke in the marigolds reminds me of... Marco Gabbiadini!"

Okay, so it's a made-up quote, but it's something close to the reaction of fans of the striker's former clubs when they check into the sumptuous Bishops Hotel in York.

Marco and wife Deborah are proprietors of the award-winning Victorian villa and while the marigolds reference is Deborah's joke, unwary guests are likely to see a man who banged in 68 goals for the Rams in 200 starts busy around the place.

"We get Derby and Sunderland fans as guests who don't realise we run the hotel and their reactions can be quite bizarre," says Marco. "At first there are a lot of double takes because they recognise my face but can't quite place me in a different context. Of course there are others who book especially because they know it's our place and that's great."

While the likes of Paul Simpson, a close mate from Derby County's promotion-winning side of 11 years ago, have continued their careers into football management, Marco has turned his back on the game – for the time being.

"Simmo went out and got all his coaching badges, but being a manager or coach is a full-on commitment," he says. "The main reason I've chosen to do something different is my family."

"There's no job like being a professional footballer and I was lucky enough to have played the game for 20 years. It's a great way to earn a living. Coaching and managing simply can't compare with playing. Although it's the same industry, football management is a proper job which demands time and commitment."

"Playing is different. You get plenty of time with your family and the only downside is having to move around. That's why, when my playing days were over, I decided I didn't want to be nomadic any more."

"We needed to do something of course because I wasn't able to live off my time as a player, so we chose the hotel trade. To start with, I thought we had created a monster,

but we stuck with it, did well, employed staff and live off-site now, which makes life more pleasant."

So is the Gabbiadini Hotel empire set to go global? Marco laughs. "We do look at it sometimes and feel we could run a bigger place for the same amount of effort, but we both value family life and won't do anything rash until the kids are more independent."

The family are daughters Amelia, Evangelina and Liliana and son Jules. And it's Jules, top scorer with York City's U17s this season, who is dragging Marco back into football.

"He's at York's Centre of Excellence but happily, although he's a striker, he's not going to be directly compared with me," says Marco, "because he's taller with a nice touch. I was more raw power!"

Watching Jules play for a club managed by another ex-Ram, Billy McEwan, takes Marco back to his time at the same club as a kid.

Born in Nottingham – his Italian-born dad worked on the National Grid and was based in Derby for a time – Marco grew up in York and, despite his football prowess, was urged

by his parents to work hard at school.

"I never did any of the Academy stuff," he says. "As a kid I went to Notts County on and off in the holidays when Jimmy Sirrell was there and then Middlesbrough every now and again, but I didn't live for football."

"I did fairly well academically and went to grammar school in York. I stayed on to do A-levels but things started to get a bit difficult when I had to get out of lessons to play for York Reserves. Eventually I became the last ever professionally contracted apprentice when I signed for York in 1985."

A promising goals record in his first 50 starts for York saw Marco selected for England U18s – the powers-that-be at the FA were keen they got to this dually qualified striker before the Italians!

But it was at Sunderland that this headline-writers' dream player ("Marco Goalo!") burst onto the scene. Still only 19 he followed for £80,000 when York City boss Denis Smith was appointed to the hot seat at Roker Park.

"Sunderland were at their lowest ebb when I went there," says Marco. "They'd just been relegated into the old Third Division, but I teamed up with Eric Gates, who was a veteran by then but still a great player, and

we managed to get promoted in my first year. My time at Sunderland and Derby were definitely my best years."

The goals flowed over the next four seasons as Marco helped Sunderland into the top flight and earned England U21 and England B honours before being transferred to Crystal Palace for a club record £1.8-million in October 1991.

Just three months later, after enduring a miserable time at Selhurst Park, Marco was rescued by the Rams for £1-million as Arthur Cox began to spend Lionel Pickering's huge investment in the club.

"If Derby hadn't come in for me I probably would have stayed," he says. "I think I scored five goals in 15 appearances for Palace, which wasn't bad, but I had a nagging knee injury which meant I was never 100% fit there. So it didn't work out, but I was impressed by Derby's ambition and happy to make the switch."

Don't mention the play-offs to Marco. At Sunderland he lost in the final to Swindon Town, though the Black Cats eventually benefited from the Wiltshire club's disqualification, and in his first season at Derby there was disappointment in the two-legged semi against Blackburn.

"We were 2-0 up in the Ewood Park leg and ended up losing 4-2 and were winning the home leg 2-0 when Kevin Moran somehow shouldered a winner for Blackburn," he says. "It was a nightmare."

Two seasons later we went to the play-off final at Wembley and lost to Leicester when we should have won. I think John Harkes missed one from about a yard out that day.

"Even when I went to Darlington at the end of my career I lost in the play-off final... so please don't invite me to the game if Derby get involved this time around!"

Player of the Year in his second season with the Rams, Marco eventually enjoyed promotion to the Premiership in 1995/96, but can't explain why a side put together on a shoe-string through Jim Smith's wily wheeler-dealing succeeded where previous seasons' multi-million pound spending had failed.

"Jim came in and although the playing staff didn't change dramatically there were some important additions," says Marco. "Vanders (Robin Van Der Laan) came in as captain and the likes of Gary Rowett, a youngster who was perceived as a make-weight in Craig Short's

transfer to Everton, turned out to be a top player.

"Igor arrived in November and then of course there was Steve McLaren, an unknown quantity at the time, who was a great coach for the players. Whatever anyone says about Steve now as the boss of the England team, I enjoyed what we did on the training ground. Although people thought of Jim as being old school, he embraced the new techniques and let Steve run with his scientific approach to football.

"My favourite game was the pre-Christmas fixture at the Baseball Ground against Sunderland. We needed to win to go top at their expense and because Vanders was out injured Jim asked me to captain the side. I scored, we won, went top and it was one of those fantastic atmospheres at the Baseball Ground."

Sunderland and the Rams are vying for outright promotion again this time around and Marco would love to see both of his former clubs go up automatically.

"I think Sunderland will probably finish on top,



just like they did in 1996, because of the momentum they have at this stage," he says. "Everyone else seems to be throwing in strange results when they should be winning, but I would love to see the Rams succeed."

At that, the proprietor of York's Bishops Hotel (www.bishopshotel.co.uk) has work to do. "We have a nice life," he muses, "but if I'm honest I am starting to miss the football. Having played the game non-stop all those years I've enjoyed the break from that level of commitment, but watching Jules is getting me going again."

"He's a bright boy so we try to encourage him with his schoolwork, just like my parents did with me, but if he can crack it, well... I'd love him to do it because being a footballer is every kid's dream job."

I tell Marco I'll slip his hotel's website address into the article for the benefit of curious Rams fans.

He thanks me, adding: "Oh, and don't use the line about me wearing marigolds will you?.."

So who was the most frightening opponent in my time as a player? Stuart Pearce. No question.

Psycho even used to send back messages to me with Mark Wright from England squads, informing me in no uncertain terms that he was going to flatten me next time out.

And he always did – in the first five minutes! Even as the ref was booking him, Psycho would be leaning over me telling me he was going to do it again!

When he ran onto the pitch you knew by his expression that he meant business.

In those days Arthur Cox used to play with two wingers – usually me on the right and Gary Micklewhite on the left, though we did swap from time to time.

But I'll tell you something, when Stuart Pearce was playing left-back for Forest, it wasn't unusual to see Gary and me both trying to play on the left wing at the same time!

What a week it has been for Stephen Bywater! Football can be eventful at times.

The big keeper has been one of our top performers this season and it's great news that the FA has ruled that he was wrongfully dismissed at Ipswich last weekend.

He now faces a second charge of improper conduct but at least he can play against Luton and that's tremendous because he must have been feeling extremely low on the team coach back from Suffolk.

What that incident between Stephen and Ipswich's Alex Bruce emphasises is that players and referees are under so much pressure these days.

Refs are scrutinised by official observers and TV cameras, probably to the extent where they let the rulebook prevail when common sense would be a better option. It's a tough job, no question about that.

I preferred the relationship players had with refs in my playing days when you could swear at the man in black and he would swear back at you!

As for the authorities, are they trying to make football a non-contact sport? It is part of a centre-half's game to do the sort of thing Darren Moore was charged with and banned for at Leicester. Big Darren and the striker were both on the move and, as he turned, the defender blocked the forward. It happens. And, by the way, defenders get plenty of knocks from strikers too! That's the game.

But people make a big deal of these challenges, TV plays them back in slow motion and the authorities see fit to act, even if, as in Darren's case, it is several days after the event.

My favourite ref was a guy called Roger

On the subject of discipline, or lack of it, I've no room to talk. Let me make it clear that a bit of chat between opposing players is commonplace in the game, but it's what you say and how you react that is important.

Defenders could say whatever they wanted about me and I didn't care, but if they started to have a go at my family, it was a different matter. Those were my rules.

I sort of bent them a bit in a Rams V Forest game when I called Nigel Clough "Daddy's boy" and Nigel made it clear he wanted to continue the conversation after the final whistle.

Forest at that time were managed by Clough senior and, as I recall, it was such a highly-charged game that Arthur Cox substituted me for my own safety! Anyway, true to his word, Nigel found me in the players' tunnel at the end of the game (I think I was hiding behind Mark Wright!) and there were a few

handbags, but then Brian stepped in and dragged us both into the Forest dressing room. He asked us both to explain ourselves. I said I'd called Nigel "Daddy's boy" and, with the ref watching over us, the great man simply said "Okay. Now shake hands." And that was that.


Another close shave came when I played for a short time in Australia. I arrived in Oz with a big reputation but in one particular game a 7ft defender – an Aboriginal lad – kicked lumped out of me from the first whistle. I gave him a few verbs, but he didn't react... until I made reference to his breath smelling of something unpleasant, and he suddenly cracked.

I could see in his eyes he intended to kill me and so I ran for my life as this giant chased me off the pitch and around the car park. I think I got sent off that game for leaving the field of play without permission!



A Matt Oakley wonder strike scorched the Rams into an early lead but the game won't be remembered by most for what was a true goal of the season contender.

Oakley latched onto Steve Howard's flick in the tenth minute to bullet home a volley from 25 yards past Shane Supple, who was beaten at full stretch.

The opening spell had seen free-flowing football but all changed just before the half-hour mark when an innocuous looking coming together between Stephen Bywater and Alex Bruce following an Ipswich corner resulted in them both being sent off.

There was a further bust-up as the pair made their way off the pitch and as calmness was being restored Derby boss Billy Davies was also sent to the stands for encroaching onto the pitch at a time when the players were taking a water break.

In the second half the Rams defended deep and Ipswich capitalised. Francis Jeffers got in behind on 69 and slotted through the legs of Grant and Danny Haynes won a penalty which he converted himself a minute from time to earn a 2-1 home win.

The opponents



Luton Town

Eight points from a possible 51 in 2007 has seen the Hatters from Luton slump to the foot of the Championship.

A turbulent season on and off the field has left last season's surprise package needing to claw back a five point deficit with only three matches remaining.

It was a different story this time last campaign, as then manager Mike Newell had guided the team - on the back of promotion from League One - to ninth place in their first Championship season.

To emulate that feat was always going to be tough, especially considering the summer sales of inspirational captain Kevin Nicholls to Leeds and talismanic Steve Howard.

Newell's job became even more difficult with the January sales of Carlos Edwards and Rowan Vine to the Rams' respective promotion rivals Sunderland and Birmingham.

By mid-March Newell was removed from his position, with the Berkshire club falling into the bottom three after key defeats against relegation rivals Leeds and Hull.

Ten days later Luton had a new man at the helm as former Leeds manager Kevin Blackwell joined his boyhood club proclaiming: "It's very rare that you ever get the chance to manage your hometown club."

"It seems strange, as a boy I stood on the Oak Road Stand and you could hear the crowd noise from where we used to live. So it's a dream to come back and manage your club, and it's a challenge I will relish."

His immediate concern will be to save the club from the trapdoor, but having penned a four-year deal he has longterm vision and is looking for a response from his players to prove they want to be part of it (see right).

Luton's progress throughout the season has been severely hindered by injuries.

Within two months of the Championship season starting, Steve Howard's replacement, Sam Parkin, was under the surgeon's knife. The former Swindon and Chelsea trainee was ruled out for the season to recuperate from an operation on a persistent ankle problem he had picked up at last club Ipswich.

One player who will not relish the thought of seeing an operating theatre again is ex-Rushden and Diamonds man Paul Underwood. The defender has been absent for more than a year after contracting a serious infection whilst undergoing a routine operation on a broken arm. However Underwood is now pushing for a first

team place after playing in the reserves.

Full-back Sol Davis' season has missed large portions of the season through injury and suspension. The former Swindon man suffered a life threatening stroke but was back in the fold within two months. He has recently been sidelined with a calf injury.

Likely to miss the rest of the season are attacker Dean Morgan and midfielder Ahmet Brkovic with ankle and facial injuries respectively.

Also absent from recent clashes have been the experienced pairing of former Burnley and Middlesbrough keeper Marlon Beresford and ex-Portsmouth and Cardiff central defender Russell Perrett. These absences have left the club reliant on the youth system at Kenilworth Road.

Leading the way are Republic of Ireland trio and youth products, full-back Kevin Foley, central midfielder Stephen O'Leary and right midfielder Keith Keane.

Austrian youngster Besian Idrizaj and striker Calvin Andrews have both received recent first team call-ups.

Goalkeeping youngster Dean Brill has been between the stick in Beresford's absence whilst Zac Barrett has been understudy. All these inclusions breed great confidence for fellow youngsters Danny Stevens, Shaun Ross and Ed Asafu Adjaye.

Making up the younger contingent in the squad is central defender Leon Barnett and January signing striker Drew Talbot, from Sheffield Wednesday.

Amongst the inexperience and changes Luton have a core of senior pros. In the back-line Blackwell can call upon captain Chris Coyne, former Aberdeen central defender Markus Heikkinen and summer signing from Bradford, left-back Lewis Emanuel.

In the midfield battle the Hatters have ex-Bournemouth man Steve Robinson, former QPR and Cardiff winger Richard Langley and David Bell - formerly of Rushden.

One player who Blackwell knows well is former Leeds central midfielder Matthew Spring (pictured). The ex-Luton product joined the Yorkshire outfit in 2004, whilst under the stewardship of Blackwell, before heading to Luton's local rivals Watford ahead of their 2005/06 promotion campaign. In January he rejoined Luton on a two-and-a-half year deal.

Up front the Hatters have former Hartlepool striker Adam Boyd as their main outlet.

With that confidence Blackwell has taken on the task of bringing the glory days back to Luton and has also thrown down the gauntlet to his team.







Lee and his fiancée Helen are proud parents to a little boy called True, who is 18 months old, and it's a life changing experience that the happy couple are loving, as he describes.



Clubs were asked to consider a half-time activity over the Easer period to help improve disability awareness and resonate with all supporters.









Rising Star

Jermaine Johnson talks to Gareth Davis

Leaving London at the age of 16 to move north for a switch to Derby County might seem like a daunting prospect for most youngsters.

Jermaine Johnson, however, can't wait to settle in to his new surroundings.

Jermaine is a dyed-in-the-wool Londoner - he grew up in the South London suburb of Balham, near Clapham, and has an accent native to the area.

He could be forgiven for being a little apprehensive about heading away from his roots at an early age - but instead there's a young man itching to get going.

"Moving away from my family is one of the sacrifices but I'll adapt, and I'm always willing to put in the hard work," he says, before pointing out of the window towards one of the training pitches at Moor Farm and adding: "That's my home, on the pitch - once I'm on there everything is fine."

"It's going to be different as Derby is very quiet compared to London, so it will be strange to adapt at first but I should love it here."

"I've had a few chances to go into the city centre and I like what I see - it's a developing, up-and-coming place. Derby is the place to be."

Jermaine was released by Chelsea earlier this season but has impressed enough to be taken on for a two-year scholarship to begin next season at the Rams Academy.

A number of other clubs were interested in the centre-half but he had no hesitation about joining Derby.

Academy manager Kevin Thelwell sent him a DVD to sell the club to him

and he liked what he saw so came up for a trial.

Jermaine's thoughts on the set-up at Moor Farm go as far as "top-class" and he knew straight away that a move to Derby was the right one for him.

Many youngsters filter out of the game when released at 16 but there was no way Jermaine would let that happen.

"At first it was heart-breaking," he said of being told that Chelsea weren't going to keep him on.

"I thought I had a very good chance of getting a deal but all coaches have their opinions.

"I thought to myself 'how am I going to move on from here, who's going to want me?'.


"It's hard because at the age of 16 you're thinking that at every club everyone has their favourites, clubs already know who is going to get a scholarship.

"I had trials at Watford, Southampton and Fulham, but before I made any decisions Derby came in and I liked it a lot more here."

"The facilities here are top-class, the staff are great, Kev has introduced me to all the boys who have all welcomed me and it feels like I've known them for a long time."

Spending time at Chelsea meant Jermaine was, from time to time, in the presence of one of the game's great characters - the out-spoken boss Jose Mourinho.

He has had the pleasure of Mourinho's company, and has also had the privilege of looking up to and working with skipper John Terry. Terry, in particular, is a great role



model for any aspiring centre-half to try and emulate.

"I've met Jose once," Jermaine laughs. "He's a funny character! He's a cool guy, has a big ego but he's great - just the way he is around the training ground, he's superb."

"JT is top-class too. He's trained with us younger lads and he gives us advice, he is the perfect guy to look up to."

"For me personally the advice was about positioning, maybe relaxing on the ball, and I'll remember that. If I can do half of what he has done I'll be happy."

Jermaine has got lofty ambitions but every footballer his age should do, otherwise there's no point them getting involved in the game.

He knows that a lot of hard work lies ahead but his ultimate goal is to be playing in the Champions League by the age of 27.

That doesn't come from any form of inflated self-opinion; it just comes from the ambition and hunger to achieve as

much as possible.

"Over the next couple of years I want to be playing as much as possible, in the reserves if there's a reserve team," he says.

"Hopefully then the first-team manager will see me and like what he sees. I'm itching for that chance to move up a step."

Surprisingly, Jermaine doesn't support any of his local teams in London - instead, he's a Manchester United follower.

That comes from his dad, who suggested he watch them as a youngster, and he was taken in by some of the dazzling football on show from the likes of Ryan Giggs and Paul Scholes.


But there's affection for Chelsea having spent four years at the club, so how does he see the run-in to the end of the season for both clubs?

United and Chelsea will meet in the FA Cup final, the Premiership race is between them, and they could contest the Champions League final too.

At only 30, MacArthur has in her a bit of what we all want. She represents a victory of man against the elements; a waifish, 5ft 6in woman taking on and thrashing everything nature could throw at her.

She represents the oldest and purest sporting tradition - triumph over all the odds; the Rocky Balboa of the high seas.

She is an inspiration for not just women in sport, but for anyone wanting to achieve.

What she has done for the sport of sailing is immeasurable and, friends say, her humble nature and desperate-to-please attitude puts her poles apart from the all too familiar image of modern day detached sportsmen living in a parallel world to those who idolise them and pay their wages.

That becomes obvious by the first thing we discuss. She rates her finest



It can be argued it has also inspired others to feats of death-defying endeavour. In the last few months alone we have seen a schoolboy sail solo across







"I'd like to personally thank him for his loyalty and commitment to Derby County. I'm sure he and all the other Rams fans will be right behind the team between now and the end of the season."









correct though, we really should be making the most of the incredible turnaround we've seen this season.



It's a long time since choosing a player of the season has been so difficult.





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
