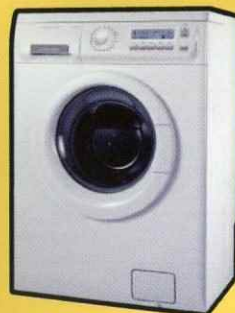

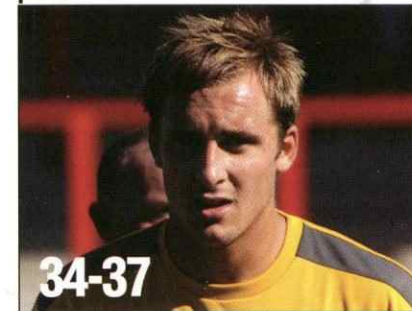

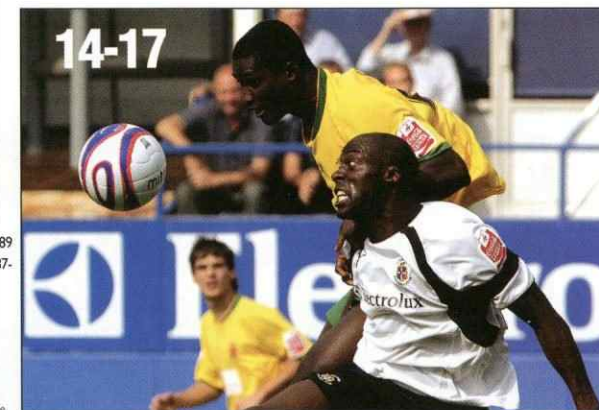

WELCOME back to Kenilworth Road this afternoon.

I would like to start these programme notes by sending my condolences to the family of Liam Carroll, who was a mascot here at our last game against Hartlepool.

As some of you may know, Liam had been suffering from a long illness and unfortunately passed away just hours after the match.

It had been his ambition to be a mascot at Luton Town Football Club and we are so pleased that we were able to fulfill his dreams. Our thoughts are with his family and friends at this difficult time.

Today's match represents another tough test for us. Gillingham have a manager at the helm in Ronnie Jepson who has built an established and fairly settled team during the two years he has been at the club. It will represent tough opposition for us and just because we are here at Kenilworth Road it doesn't give us any right to expect a win.

We will obviously be looking to bounce back to winning ways following our defeat at Swindon. I was disappointed in that result because we didn't perform to the level I expect.

After having two solid performances, we may have got a little carried away, and maybe that was a slap across the legs to wake us up a bit. I didn't think we closed the ball down well and earned the right to play at Swindon, which is something we have been working on at the training

ground, reacting positively and aggressively in winning the ball back.

After the opening three games of the season, I think we are 65 to 70 per cent of where we need to be. Time to rebuild takes patience and it's a virtue. The players are taking time to get use to what I am looking for and I believe there is more to come from us.

I have not seen anything in this division that should frighten us at the moment. It is a league you have to win by earning the right to play and that means having a scrap for 65 minutes and if you have extra quality that should come out on top. It is a tough league.

It has been a good week for Dave Edwards and I am delighted to see one of our players making a name for himself on the international scene. To be named captain of your country is a real great accolade, but I also think it shows the quality of the player that we have signed.

Our scouting team really have to be applauded for spotting Dave and then the Club to be applauded for taking him. I think the fans have taken to him already and he can move on and have an illustrious career, like so many players who come from Wales and chose to play at Luton.

We are pleased to see the return of David Bell, who came through a Reserve game on Tuesday night, but unfortunately Sam Parkin will go into hospital on Tuesday. He will have floating bones removed from his

lower ankle and we are hoping that will be the end of it.

Everyone hopes that after this next operation, Sam will be able to get on with his career. He has had bad luck with injuries, not only here, but at Ipswich as well. Everyone has got their fingers crossed that this is the last pit stop for him.

We are continuing our look to strengthen the squad and we haven't ruled moving in for someone on loan. We have identified players in every position who we could potentially come in for on a loan deal so we are looking at various options.

Today marks the first of four games at Kenilworth Road within two weeks. We have to make sure that Kenilworth Road is a hot bed and I hope you will continue the fantastic support you showed in our first game of the season against Hartlepool. I thought the fans were fantastic against Hartlepool, it was a great atmosphere here, and the players who have just arrived at the Club mentioned that after the game.

There is no doubt that sometimes the fans can make the difference. We all come to work, wanting to move mountains sometimes, but on occasions that doesn't happen. Sometimes it can take that chant from the fans or that raucous roar to make the difference.

I felt we had started well in the opening 20 minutes. We played some nice football, but we allowed Swindon to get back into the game.

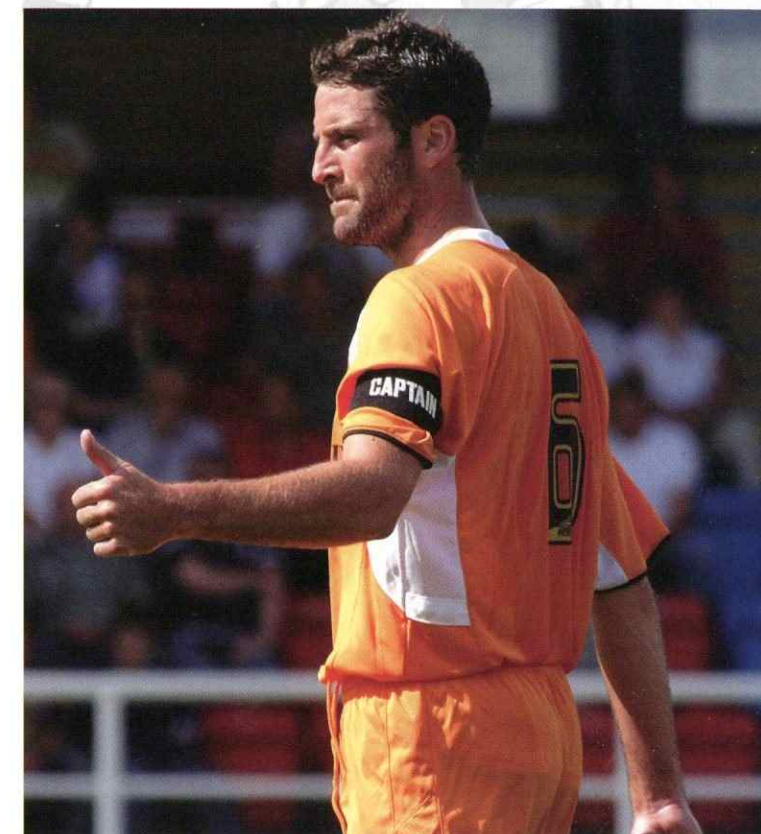

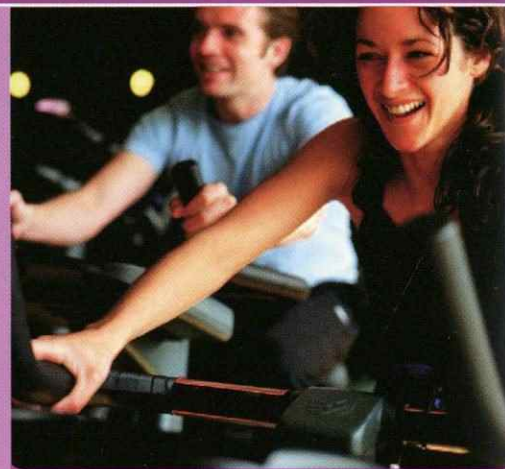

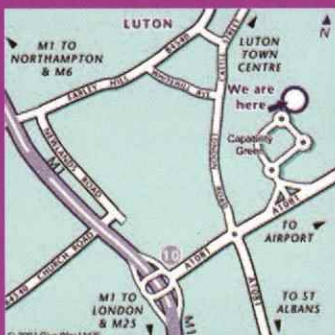

"These lads are just starting out as professionals so they're still learning and developing as footballers but we want to do well in the tournament and to play entertaining football at the same time."

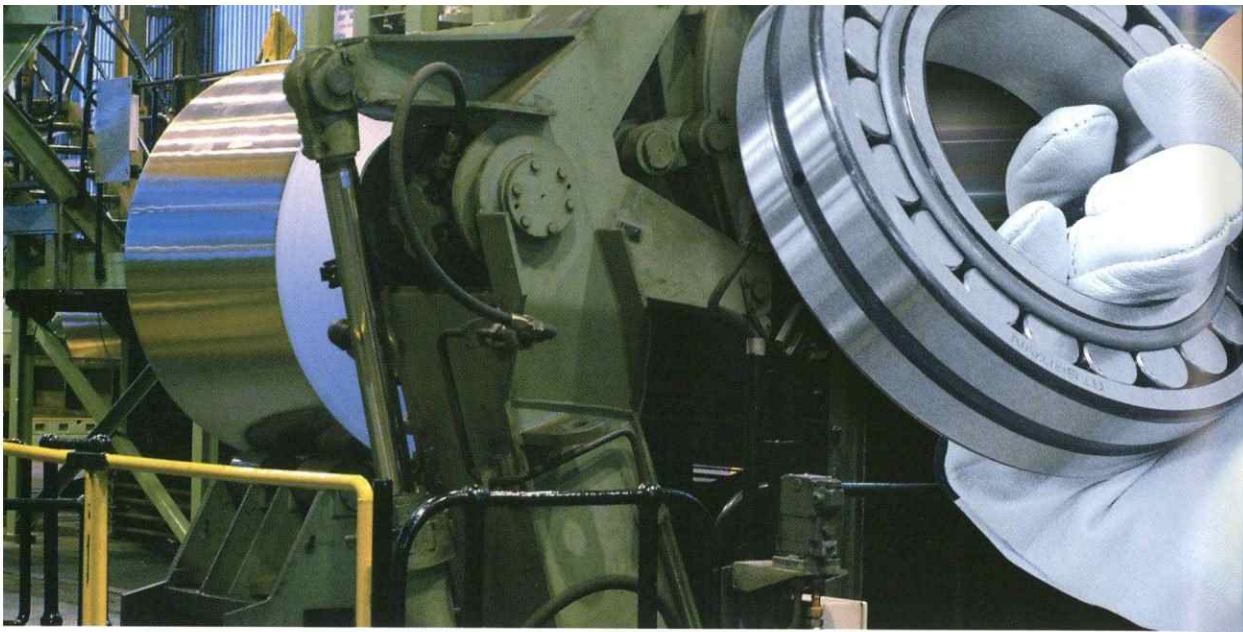

Alan spent seven years at Kenilworth Road as a player, scoring 17 goals before making the move to Millwall.

I WOULD like to take this opportunity to thank all supporters who were at the last home game for their patience and co-operation at the end of the Hartlepool game when we had to ask you to leave the stadium by different routes.

This was because of a serious incident that had

occurred in Kenilworth Road and Hazelbury Crescent shortly after the game had started.

Due to the seriousness of the incident the police needed to carry out detailed investigations at the scene, resulting in all exit routes at the Kenilworth end of the ground being closed at

the end of the game.

We have emergency plans in place to deal with emergency situations in and around the stadium, but they can only work effectively with the cooperation of supporters.

Due to the restricted number of exit routes available it took longer to get everyone out safely than it would normally do and the support you afforded the police and stewards, both inside and outside the stadium, was greatly appreciated by them and the club

"I thought Hartlepool came and played well. They looked like a side that's been together for a long time and are on a good run. However, I was really pleased with the boys. We're still 65 to 70 per cent there. We saw the desire of the players who had come to the Club to do well. Luton began life back in League One with a hard-fought 2-1 win over Hartlepool.

A new-look Luton side, which included seven of Kevin Blackwell's nine summer signings in the starting line-up, were pushed all the way by the League One newboys.

The visitors started the brighter and Ian Moore twice went close before Luton broke the deadlock.

After Alan Goodall had robbed Hartlepool of possession in the 34th minute, Darren Currie stepped inside his marker and expertly-placed his shot into the bottom left-hand corner.

The visitors continued to look dangerous and veteran Ritchie Humphreys drilled his shot wide at the start of the second half when well placed at the back post.

Goodall came close when a cleverly worked low free-kick was saved by visiting goalkeeper Aaron Lee-Barrett, but the former Rochdale man was soon celebrating his first goal for his new club.

With six minutes remaining, the full-back glanced home a Currie corner and despite the efforts of Hartlepool debutant Robbie Elliott to clear the ball off the goal line, referee Mark Haywood gave the goal.

Hartlepool found a way back when Richie Barker netted a last-minute consolation, converting a penalty after Chris Perry was adjudged to have fouled Antony Sweeney, but it was too late.

ROGER WASH tells the stories behind some special moments in Hatters history



Christmas Hatters hit Arsenal for six

THIS was the one present that Luton Town gave Arsenal over Christmas 1958. It's the only goal of the game, scored by Arsenal's Jimmy Bloomfield (10) on the far right.

The unusual photograph shows the ball half stopped by England international goalkeeper Ron Baynham before it barely trickled over the line watched by Ken Hawkes and Dave Pacey.

The Town's McNally (2) is seen sitting helplessly having failed to dispossess Arsenal winger Jackie Henderson. The Gunners player on the far side is future Hatters misfit Danny Clapton.

The goal gave Arsenal some small consolation for what happened the day before at Kenilworth Road in the days when sides met each other twice over the festive period.

For three years at the end of the 1950s, the Hatters had Christmas clashes with Arsenal and typical of the blood and thunder contests were

the games in 1958. On Boxing Day the Town were without the influential Bob Morton, who had a chill, and ace goalscorer Gordon Turner, who had tonsillitis.

Young Tony Gregory and the more experienced John Groves stepped into the breach but the Kenilworth Road crowd of 21,870 were fearing the worst, especially as the Hatters had not won since November 1.

In a game to remember, the Town went goal crazy, winning 6-3 in a pulsating contest. Gregory had the game of his life, laying on the first two goals for Jim Adam and Allan Brown and scoring one himself, while at the other end the Gunners' Len Julians, on his Arsenal debut, was well held by veteran skipper Syd Owen.

Arsenal manager George Swindin was not happy and promised changes to his well-beaten side for the return at

Highbury next day. He made three, including giving a debut to young Irishman Billy McCullough.

Meanwhile Luton had further injury worries with Owen and full-back Seamus Dunne out and replaced by Terry Kelly and Brendan McNally.

A massive crowd of 56,277 gathered at Highbury looking for revenge but were served up a limp affair which bore no resemblance to the excitement of only 24 hours before.

Gregory was kept quiet and although winger Billy Bingham had the measure of young McCullough, his crosses were wasted by the normally-reliable Brown, who missed two sitters.

Although the Town were perhaps unfortunate to fail to pick up a point at Highbury, they did not let their disappointment get the better of them as, in a glorious second half to the campaign, they fought through to the FA Cup Final at Wembley for the first time in their history.



The Hartlepool story from 1893 History

A GROUP of Victorian gents formed New Brompton FC at the Napier Arms pub in May 1893 and became founder members of the Southern League, winning the Division Two title in 1895. They changed their name to Gillingham in 1913 and were founder members of the Third Division in 1920. The club went into administration and almost extinction in 1995 until Chairman Paul Scally took over. Since then, Gills have had two promotions, two Wembley appearances, and reached the FA Cup Quarter-Finals.

Top player

STRIKER Robert Taylor spent just over 15 months at Gillingham in the late 1990s. He not only scored 39 goals in just 70 games, but also left Gills a cool £1m to the good in transfer fees.



Taylor's goal at Wembley came so close to lifting the Gills into the Championship in May 1999 and he played a major part in reaching the Play-Offs next season.

Top manager



KEITH Peacock was a real fans' favourite, losing just 80 of his 334 games in charge between July 1981 and December 1987. He built a flamboyant, attacking team that fans loved to watch, with strikers Tony

Cascarino and Dave Shearer up front. Also a Charlton legend, he has recently left the West Ham coaching staff

Wigan 2 v Gillingham 3 (aet)

AFTER the heartache of losing at the death to Man City a year earlier, it was Gillingham who came from behind to reach the Championship at Wembley a year later. Gills took the lead through a first half own goal, but Wigan forced extra time, then went 2-1 up. But goals from subs Steve Butler and Andy Thomson saw Gills celebrate at last.

AFTER two seasons of comfortable mid-table finishes, Gillingham will be looking to push towards a Play-Off place this time round. Manager Ronnie Jepson has made some solid buys over the summer and a top six spot might not be out of the question for Kent's only League club.

The Gills have certainly made a fiery start to the season, although perhaps not in the way they wanted, with three players sent off in their first two games.

Day one saw them have two men sent off in the Cotswolds sunshine as they went down 1-0 away to Cheltenham. First Trinidad and Tobago international Ian Cox was dismissed for a professional foul, then former West Ham and Man City tyro Steve Lomas was shown a second yellow.

Veteran midfielder Nicky Southall was later involved in the controversial sending off of Cheltenham scorer Steven Gillespie in an incident which ended a disappointing day for Jepson.

Gills then had a tough Carling Cup trip to Championship Watford and were already two goals down when they had ex Hatter Efe Sodje sent off before conceding a third.

And on Saturday their woes continued as they again failed to score in their home opener, going down 2-0 against Tranmere with a goal in each half.

It makes three games without a goal, so the summer signing of pacy frontman Delroy Facey from Rotherham could be crucial when he finds his feet. He has the pedigree after scoring 10 times in 43 appearances for Rotherham last season. He has to fill the gap after the summer departure to Blackpool of last season's top scor-

er, midfielder Michael Flynn.

Jepson himself knows a thing or two about strike power, having been a prolific scorer in the lower leagues during his own playing career. "Rocket Ronnie" – as he became known during successful spells at Burnley, Huddersfield and Bury – started the 2005-06 season as assistant to Neale Cooper and took over from his boss that autumn after the Gills suffered a poor run of form and an embarrassing FA Cup defeat to non-League Burscough.

Jepson was appointed as caretaker boss, but was offered the job full time after just two months, such was the turnaround in fortunes he inspired. The club eventually finished in a creditable 14th place in

Jepson's first season in charge. But after those heroics, last season's 16th position was something of an anti-climax and Jepson culled 12 of his squad in the summer to try to improve on this.

Key to boosting their position will be an upturn in away form. Last season saw the Priestfield Stadium turned into something of a fortress, with Gills winning a very impressive 14 League games at home.

However, on the road they managed only three wins, losing 14 matches and conceding a whopping total of 53 goals on their travels – the highest in the division. They will be looking to put things right at both ends of the pitch, starting this afternoon.

£600 plot of land that has been home for 114 years

THE plot of land that the Priestfield Stadium stands on was bought for just £600 in 1893 and has been Gillingham's home ever since. It was also home to Brighton for two seasons in the late 1990s when they travelled 70 miles to home games. The ground was developed in 1923 and largely stayed the same until 1995 when the new board built three modern stands that saw the capacity swell to the present 10,952.

Interview with Gillingham Football Club's Media and Publications manager Jamie Reid.

How did Gillingham's pre-season programme go?

We did okay in pre-season. Our two high-profile matches were against Charlton Athletic and Colchester United. We came up against a very strong Charlton side and lost but then beat a good Colchester side 4-2. I don't think you can read too much into pre-season matches but the convincing victory over Colchester certainly proved to be a good night!

How have the Gills found their opening games?

Things haven't gone as well as we would have hoped so far. We've lost both of our league matches and are also out of the Carling Cup. Eleven new faces have arrived and it naturally takes time for things to gel. Hopefully results will start to pick up but it doesn't get any easier with today's game against our good friends from Luton.

What are the aims for the season?

The first aim is to improve on last season. Ideally the club would like a play-off spot but it's a real tough year and a lot of clubs have really strengthened. It's arguably tougher this season than last so hopefully we can pick up points early in the season and then see where that takes us.

Who is your most important close season signing?

I'm not one to single out individuals because I believe in team culture. If all of the new players succeed then the club will enjoy a good season. This year manager Ronnie Jepson has brought some good players to the club but the squad isn't the biggest. Hopefully one or two further additions will still arrive and prove to be important acquisitions.

Who do you think will get promoted to the Championship?

It promises to be a real exciting division because a number of clubs have the ability to impress. The likes of Nottingham Forest and Oldham Athletic should feature prominently but the relegated sides Leeds United, Southend and our opponents today, Luton Town, will also all be in the mix. And let's not discount the Super Gills because we have the ability to surprise one or two. Hopefully this will be our year!

THE SKIPPER: ANDREW CROFTS

AFTER an outstanding campaign last season, which saw him become the Supporters' Player of the Season, Andrew Crofts was handed the captain's armband by manager Ronnie Jepson for the 2007-08 season. A midfielder by trade, Crofts made his debut for the Gills at the age of 16 after a rapid rise through the youth ranks at Priestfield. He has now gone on to make more than 120 appearances for his side. He has progressed through the Welsh international ranks, from Under-19 to his full international debut in the 2005-06 season. He also captained the Welsh Under-21 side in May 2006 during a 5-1 win over Estonia. He made his full Welsh international debut as a substitute against Azerbaijan in October 2005. He has become a popular player with the Gillingham fans and was involved in the Welsh squad that played Bulgaria in an international friendly on Wednesday night.

KEEPERS

After impressing during a loan spell last season, when Gillingham had a goalkeeping crisis, **Simon Royce** joined the Club on a one-year deal in the summer. Royce may be familiar to Luton supporters after having a short spell here in 2004. Royce is experienced

NOW in his third season at Gillingham, **Gary Mulligan** is likely to be leading the attack. Mulligan, who started his career at Wolves, scored nine goals last season during an impressive campaign. He has had spells with Rushden & Diamonds and Sheffield United, while he also spent time on-loan at Port Vale during 2005.

THE STRIKERS

DELROY Facey is a well-travelled striker who made Gillingham his ninth professional club in 2007. Much of his success came while playing for Huddersfield, where he spent seven years of his career. He spent time in the Premiership playing for Bolton, while also having spells at Hull, Tranmere, Rotherham and Oldham. **David Graham** is another new face brought in by manager Ronnie Jepson in the summer and he is a player who has played in the UEFA Cup with Glasgow Rangers. He started his career at Torquay United, where he made over 120 appearances for the Club before enjoying spells with Wigan Athletic and Sheffield Wednesday. The striker has also earned eight caps for Scotland's Under-21 side. **Andy Pugh** is a striker who signed scholarship forms with Gillingham in 2005 and has made three appearances for the first team.

EXPERIENCE dominates Gillingham's midfield. **Steve Lomas** first made his name with Manchester City, before moving to West Ham, where he made 227 competitive appearances. He went on to join QPR and gained 46 caps for Northern Ireland, scoring three goals. Although **Mark Bentley** hasn't played at the same level as Lomas, he still has plenty of experience following a three-year career at Southend United. He has spent most of his career playing non-League football with Enfield, Aldershot and Gravesend and Northfleet. Another player with plenty of experience is **Nicky Southall**, who is in his third spell with the Club. He is a firm favourite with the Gillingham fans and has made more than 250 appearance for the Club. He is one of a few footballers who has played in every division of English League football. **Aaron Brown** was released by Swindon over the summer and snapped up by Gillingham to bolster the midfield. Brown has spent most of his career at Bristol City, where he made more than 150 appearances for the Ashton Gate club. He has had loan spells at Torquay and Cheltenham while at QPR, where he spent two years from 2004. **Barry Cogan** is an Irish midfielder who has previously played for Millwall, where he featured as a substitute in the 2004 FA Cup Final.

Two former Luton defenders are with Gillingham this afternoon. **Efetobore Sodje** and **Duncan Jupp** both return to Kenilworth Road following short spells with the Club. Sodje, who is a former Macclesfield and Southend player, made nine appearance for the Hatters while Jupp, who is also a former Southend man, made five appearance during the 2002-03 season. **Craig Armstrong** is a new recruit from Cheltenham, who has had successful times at Nottingham Forest and Huddersfield Town. Gills boss Ronnie Jepson also strengthened his defence by acquiring **Simon King** from Barnet. King won three caps for the England non-League team, scoring the winning goal on his debut against Italy. **Ian Cox**, a Trinidad and Tobago international, signed a new contract during the summer keeping him at Priestfield for another year, while **Sean Clohessy** is in his third year as a professional, having at one time been on the books of Arsenal.

SIMON'S STATS



SIMON PITTS finds some fascinating facts about today's teams

4 is the number of consecutive home League matches against Gillingham in which Jimmy Yardley scored. The run started in a 6-1 win on November 19, 1927, and next season he netted in an 8-0 win. Five months later Yardley scored the second in a 2-0 win, and in February 1931 he hit another in a 4-1 win.

12 is the number of yards from where a penalty is scored, and Luton have three successful spot kicks against Gillingham. George Dennis scored the first in a 6-1 win in 1927-28, Malcolm MacDonald netted at Gillingham in August 1969 when the Hatters won 2-0, and Liam George scored another in a 3-1 win in October 1999.

3 hat-trick heroes for Luton against the Gills are Ernie Simms (December 31, 1921), Andy Rennie (April 13, 1929), and Joe Payne (April 7, 1937).



SPOT ON... Malcolm MacDonald

16 is the number of League matches played between the two sides before Gillingham won their first match at Kenilworth Road. Their 2-0 win finally came on April 17, 1965. Luton were relegated just a few weeks later.

24 is the number of League games played at Kenilworth Road between the teams. Of these the Hatters have won 16, drawn 5 and lost 3.

3 cup matches have been played at Kenilworth Road between the sides: two FA Cup Second Round wins for Luton in the 1960s, and a League Cup First Round, 2nd Leg draw in 1979.

8 goals is the biggest margin of victory. Luton won 8-0 on April 13, 1929, with five goals from Andy Rennie, and one each from Jimmy Yardley, Harry Woods and Lewis Bedford.

17,402 is the biggest crowd for this fixture and came on December 27, 1969. Luton lost 2-1 with Mike Keen scoring for the Hatters. This was one of only two home defeats for Luton that season as they finished second and were promoted to Division Two.

3,996 is the lowest crowd. They saw a 2-2 draw on May 1, 1935. Jack Ball and George Martin scored.

Each way movers

3 players have moved from Gillingham to Luton, and all in the 1930s. Wilf Crompton played 54 matches for Luton and scored 16 goals before retiring through injury. George Kidd played 10 games without scoring, and Harry Loasby scored 14 goals in just 15 games in 1931-32, before joining Kettering.

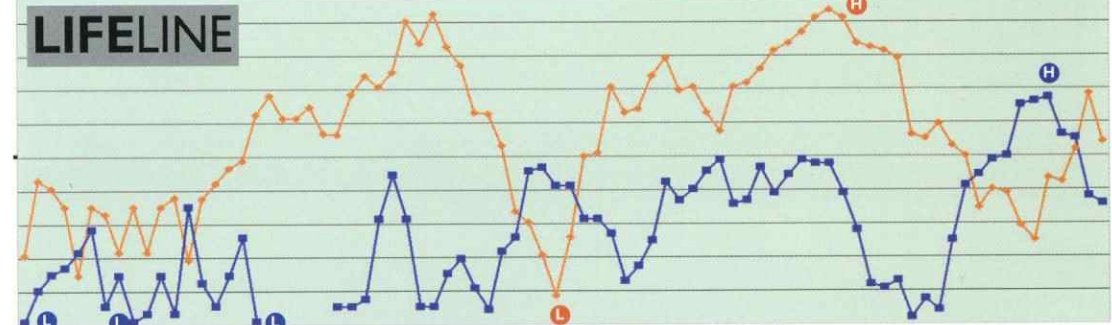
9 Luton players have been sold to Gillingham. Robert Boylen, Alec Smeaton, Joe Daly and Arthur Mills moved in the 1930s, followed by Bill and Charlie Burtenshaw, and Bill Collins in the 1940s. Tony Thear and Gordon Riddick both finished their Luton careers in the 1966-67 season before moves to Gillingham. Riddick had played more than 100 games for the Hatters and scored 17 goals. Thear hit five goals in 15 games for Luton.



The Hatters have met Gillingham 53 times in all. Luton have won 26, Gills 15 with 12 draws

10,237 days elapsed after one League game between Luton and Gillingham back in the Thirties until they met again. The Hatters won 5-2 in April 1937 and then the sides did not meet in the League again until April 1965, when Gillingham got their revenge with 2-0 win.

Hatters & Gills' ups and downs

THIS week's LIFELINE shows how Luton and Gillingham's fortunes have risen and fallen over the years in a graph that plots where they finished in every season. Luton's low point came with a 17th place in Division Four in 1966-67 and their high a top flight 7th place in 1986-87. The Gills' high was 11th in the Championship in 2002-03. Their three low points were early on, when they came bottom of Division Three South in 1920-21, 1928-29 and 1937-38.



PITCH TALK

GROUND MATTERS

with RICHARD BIRD and MARK PANTER

ANY summer's work on a football pitch is hard, but it gets even tougher when one of the two groundsmen breaks his leg and is on crutches for eight weeks in the middle of it all.

So it is a tribute to the hard work and dedication of both of them that the pitch is in such good condition for the start of the new season.

Here, RICHARD BIRD and MARK PANTER give their account of the ups and downs of the close season's work.

THIS summer's pitch maintenance programme has certainly been harder than normal. After last season's exceptionally wet winter and the problems that this brought with drainage, it was imperative that last season's grass was stripped off down to a depth of 5mm in order to clean up the top surface.

Due to the volumes of rainfall, the pitch was suffering from a covering of algae and organic matter, which was making it difficult for rainwater to find the drainage system.

"During January," says Richard, "the pitch was waterlogged on numerous occasions. So much so that it was impossible to take machinery onto it because of the extra damage that this would cause, even though a fair amount of grass cover was lost. Previous season's pitches with last year's rainfall would have resulted in huge divots and a totally uneven surface."

At the end of last season, the summer renovations did not get off to the best of starts because nine days before work was due to start Richard fell down the stairs of his Dunstable home, dislocating his left ankle and breaking

his leg. This resulted in him being on crutches for eight weeks and out of action all summer while he had THREE ankle operations to straighten him out.

This meant that responsibility for overseeing the work fell on Mark Panter, who has been with the Club for just over two years after joining from Rushden and Diamonds.

Mark says: "It was a challenging experience to be responsible for getting the pitch ready for the new season, but one which I thoroughly enjoyed. The hours have been long and since the new seed started growing I have been cutting the pitch five or six times per week in order to improve the quality of the grass."

"Even though Richard could not do the mowing work on the pitch it has been

good having him in the background to provide support and ideas on how to improve the pitch."

Extra staff were brought in by Richard to help Mark maintain not only the Kenilworth Road pitch, but also the Rugby Club training ground and the new training facility on the old Electrolux Sports Ground. Staff were also used to help tidy up the surrounds of the Kenilworth Road pitch.

Mark adds: "I had to make sure that the pitch was playable one week before the first game because the manager had asked to play a training match on it on the Tuesday so that the new players could get used to the stadium."

"A training session also took place on the Thursday and then the players practised free kicks and set pieces on the day before the Hartlepool match."

"Each time, I had to make sure all the divots were repaired and the pitch was cut and watered afterwards to keep it in top condition for the first game."

Both Richard and Mark were concerned that due to a wet summer the root depth would not be as strong as it should be. However, seeing the way the pitch handled the training sessions and the Hartlepool match, the signs are encouraging that the pitch is improving."

It's just as well as starting from this afternoon's match against Gillingham, the pitch will be used for SIX games in 18 days, giving it a real test to how it plays and handles the wear."

Richard and Mark are hoping that all their hard work will help the team to promotion in May.

MY GOAL by DEAN BRILL

It's not really making amends. It's more of case of getting back on the right track. Three points is what you need every week so hopefully we can do the job again this afternoon

DEAN Brill has a new aim this season - to make Luton's No 1 jersey his own.

It's a goal that is slightly different from the start of any other season in that he goes into this campaign as first choice keeper.

The Luton-born youngster has risen up the pecking order at Kenilworth Road after a number of fine performances in the run-up to last season.

And Brill believes that his early season success has been a reward for his hard work, effort and patience in recent season - but he is not getting too carried away.

"It's nice to actually start the season and know where I am going," said the 21-year-old. "I know what I have got to do, but now it is up to me to do as well as I can and do as much as I can for the team.

"I have worked hard to get where I am, but that is obviously not the main aim. For me, I have to do all I can to keep my place in the side and make it as difficult as I can for the manager to replace me.

"It's just the same for me as it is for the outfield players. If I am not doing it then obviously someone else has to come in. So for me it's simple. I just have to keep the shirt on my back."

But Brill knows he has plenty of people to thank for his opportunity.

Although the youngster has put in the hours on the training ground, he is the first to accept that he has needed guidance from others around him.

The support of Hatters goalkeeper coach Dmitri Kharine has been second-to-none as well as that of Marlon Beresford - who had several seasons as the Club's leading goalkeeper.

And it typifies the spirit inside the Luton camp that the two continue to work closely on the training ground, analysing every second of every game in order to help improve Brill's game.

"Marlon has been a big influence on me," continued Brill. "I have been with him for a couple of years and he has always helped me, been encouraging and positive towards me.

"I still speak to Marlon about what

goes on and we are always talking about what we can do in games to help our performance so it's still good for me to have him around.

"We are in a funny little position as goalkeepers. You work primarily on

your own on the training ground but obviously as a goalkeeper you have to help each other out all the time."

Another thanks will go out to today's opponents, Gillingham. Brill highlights the importance of his loan move to the Priestfield Stadium last season, at a time when he was in desperate need of action.

He made eight appearances for the Club and earned some rave reviews from manager Ronnie Jepson.

And if there is one person who doesn't need telling that this afternoon's match will be a tough task for the Hatters, it's Brill.

"Ronnie is a good manager. He is very honest and he helped me out a lot when I was down there. Gillingham will be up for it this afternoon, they will be ready and they will know exactly what they are doing when they come here.

"Gillingham was a good time for me. At that stage of my career, I just needed games under my belt because I hadn't really played many competitive League matches.

"Gillingham were good enough to put

me straight into the team. It was good for my confidence and to get back into the run of playing games. It was a good experience for me.

"There was never really any talk of me going to Gillingham permanently - it was just all about me getting some games.

"It was a good arrangement for all parties. Luton needed me to play games so that I could push for the First Team and be fit. It helped me push on, and Gillingham were struggling for a goalkeeper."

Brill is now setting his sights on the future and is confident that the Club can return to winning ways following the set back at Swindon last weekend.

"Obviously with the two indifferent results it has been a slightly different start to the season. We need time to get together and sort things out but I think the lads are pulling together in the same way.

"We will gradually get better as the season goes on. There are a lot of new faces but they are all experienced lads and we know our jobs as a team. It is just a matter of putting it together now.

"It's not really making amends. It's more of case of getting back on the right track. Three points is what you need every week so hopefully we can do the job again this afternoon."

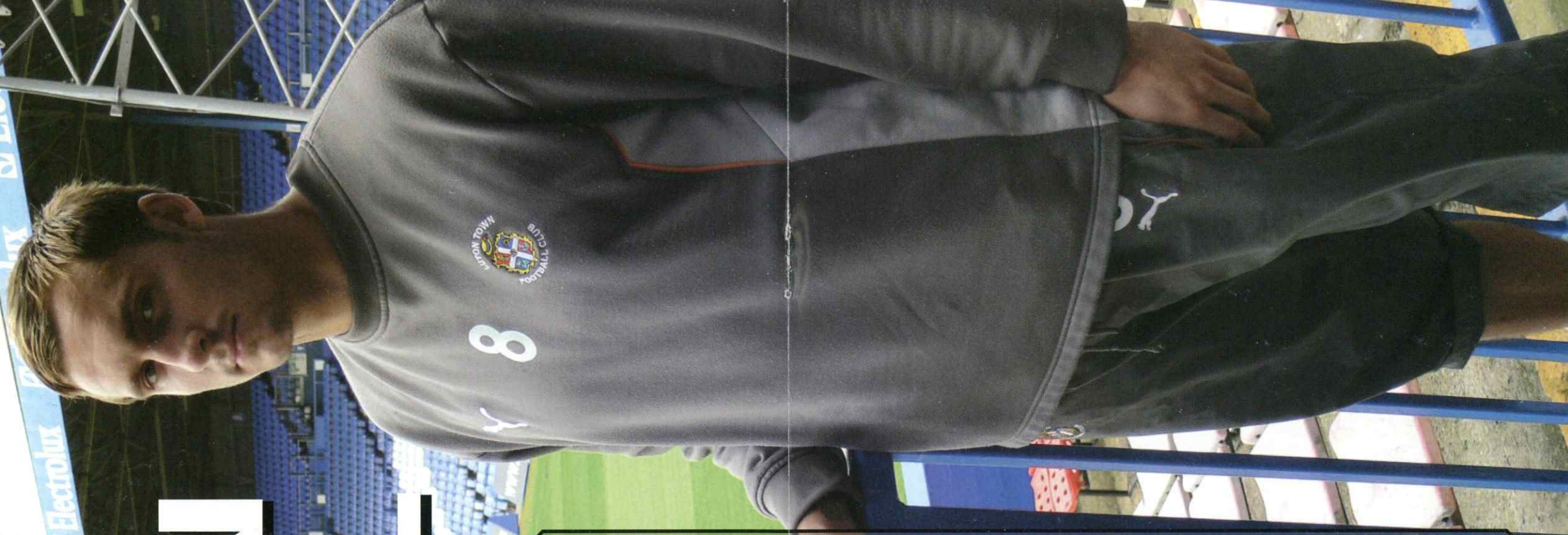

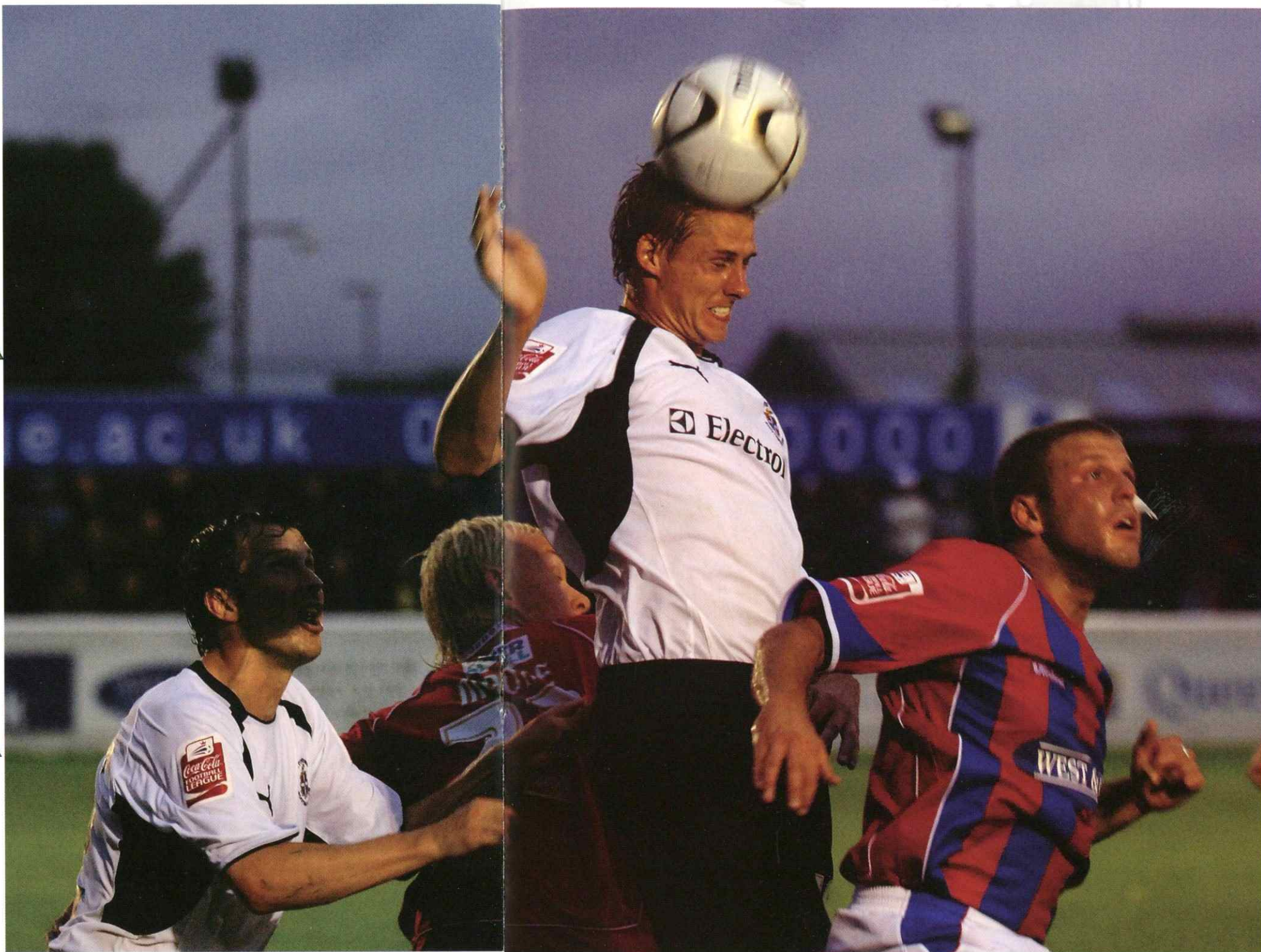

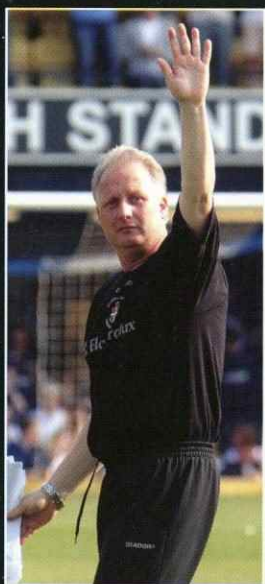

Luton were thankful to three wonderful saves from youngster Dean Brill before the Hatters opened the scoring on 42 minutes.

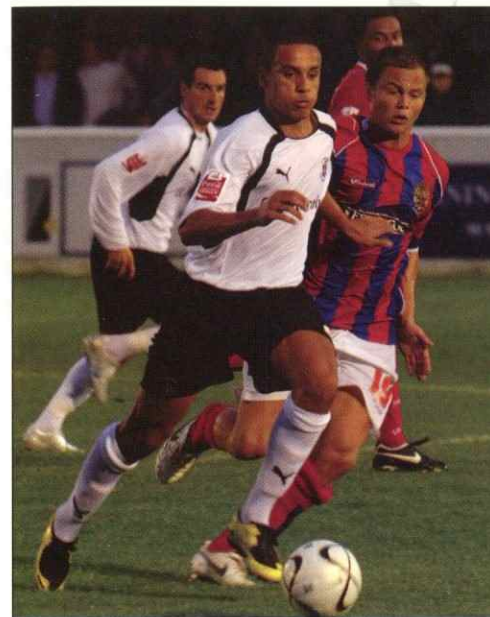

The Hatters were not having everything their own way and Nurse went close for the home side moments after the restart, but Luton soon settled and doubled their advantage in the 69th minute.

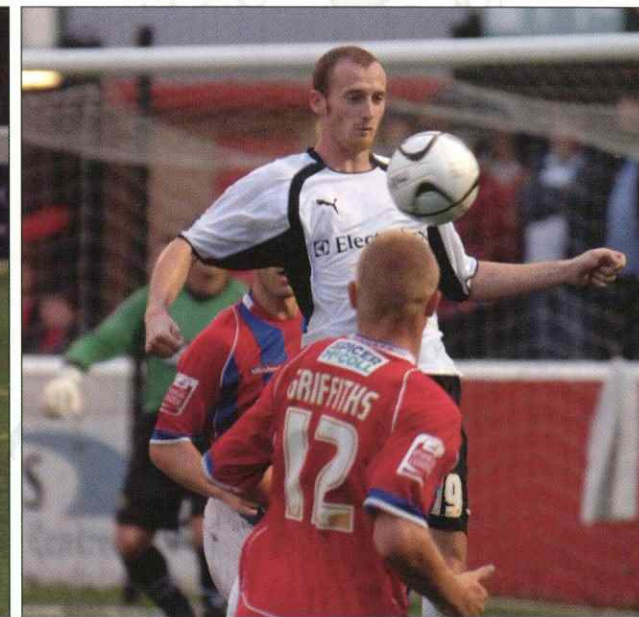

But, in a game played in torrential downpours, Luton were made to sweat for victory after Dagenham produced a tense finish.

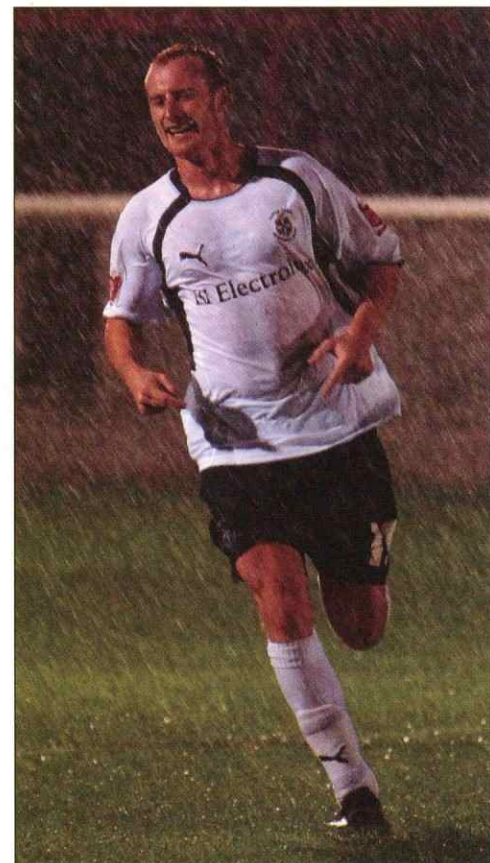
Dagenham refused to let their heads drop and pulled a goal back from substitute Ben Strevens, but despite a late flurry of chances, an equaliser never materialised.



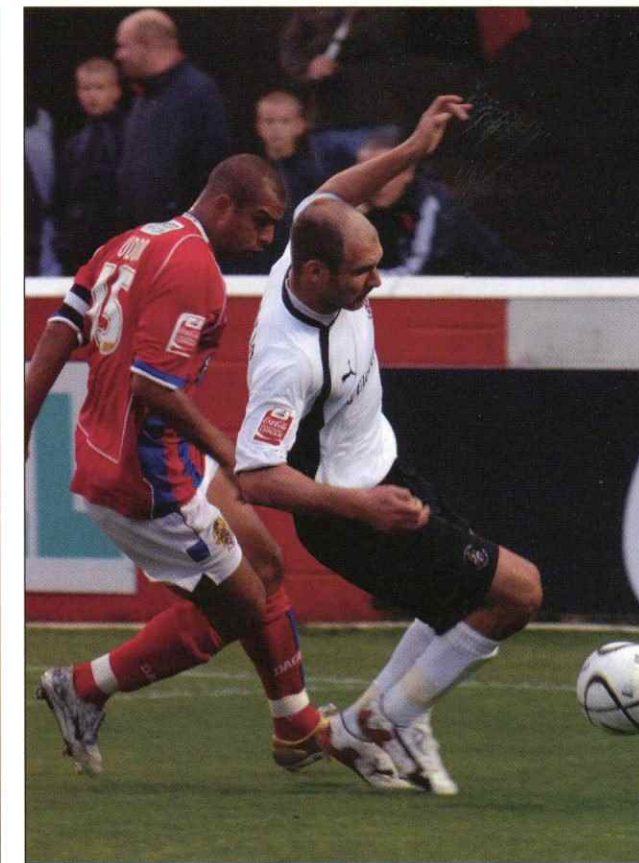

COMPOSED... Drew Talbot steadies himself as Luton mount an attack

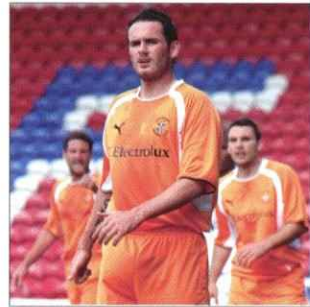

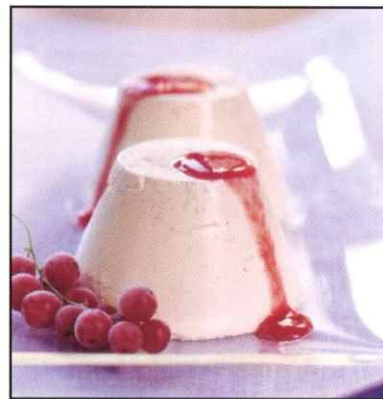

Meanwhile, defender Shane Duff needs medical clearance before he can play after sustaining a head

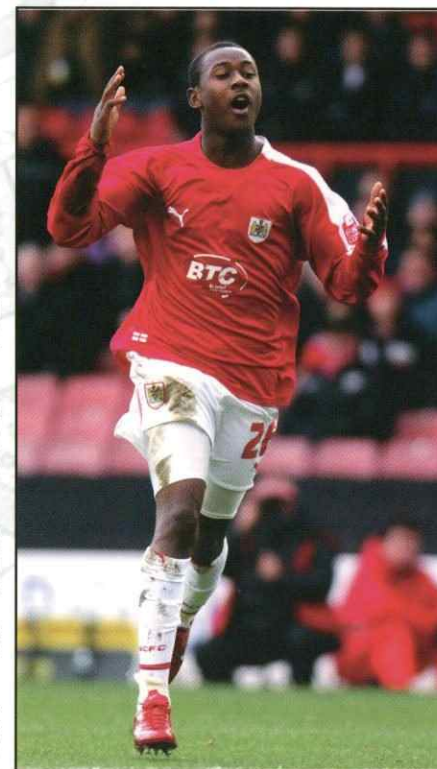
injury recently.

Duff was involved in a clash of heads with central defensive partner Michael Wyld during the friendly against Hereford.

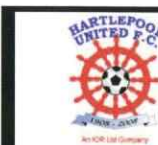
Wyld suffered a double displaced fracture of the lower jaw, and is out for around ten weeks.

Tresor Osmar KANDOL

African-born Tresor was spotted by Luton Town scouts when playing in London and signed YTS forms for the Hatters in the summer of 1997. He was awarded a full-time contract a year later and made his League debut at Bristol Rovers in February 1999.

An undoubtedly talented striker with a languid style, Tresor was also high maintenance and soon fell out with new Luton manager Joe Kinnear, who showed him the door.

After brief attempts at reviving his League career failed, Tresor moved around the non-League circuit before re-surfacing at Barnet, who paid Dagenham and Redbridge £50,000 for him in January 2006.

At Barnet his goals kept the Bees in the Football League and in a remarkable reversal of fortune he found his way into the Championship with Leeds last season.



Kent KARLSEN

Looking for strength in the spine of his team, Luton manager Ricky Hill went to Scandinavia for a centre-half who had served a solid apprenticeship in the Norwegian Premier League. An Under-21 international, Kent's five years with Valerenga brought considerable success, including a Norwegian FA Cup-winner's medal, and Hill moved swiftly to sign the player in November 2000 after a short trial period.

Sadly, Kent's stay at Kenilworth Road was short as Hill was dismissed soon after and new boss Joe Kinnear had his own preferences for central defence.

Kent left Luton after only six League appearances and returned to Norway, where he was last seen turning out for FK Tonsberg.



Robert (Rob) Steven KEAN

At the start of the 1997-98 season, Luton manager Lennie Lawrence was suffering a horrendous injury crisis culminating in only 14 players being available for an away trip to Bristol City at the end of September.

Of those 14, four would be making their League debuts, including Rob Kean, who came on as substitute for skipper Gary Waddock. Luton-born and a member of the successful youth squad at Kenilworth Road which won the South East Counties Championship in consecutive seasons, Kean was a promising midfielder but he did not get the opportunity to add to his solitary appearance, being released the following summer.

Rob, who still lives in Luton, is now an aircraft engineer, and recently turned out for Hemel Hempstead against the Hatters in a pre-season friendly.



Keith Francis KEANE

Another local boy who rose through the ranks, Keith joined the Hatters from school and signed professional forms in August 2004 by which time he already had 15 League appearances under his belt.

A genuine utility player, 17-year-old Keith opened his Hatters account as a full-back at Wycombe in February 2004 and acquitted himself well against the speedy Jermaine McSpornan. It was not long before he scored his first goal, with a last-minute winner at home to Bristol City the following April.

He won a League One championship medal the following season, has Eire Under-21 caps, was Young Player Of The Season in 2005-06 and scored the Goal Of The Season for 2006-07 in a televised clash at West Bromwich. It is difficult to realise that Keith is still only 20.



Michael (Mike) Thomas KEEN

Mike had already enjoyed one footballing career which would have been the envy of most professional players. Then he came to Luton and had a second.

Signing on for QPR in 1959, Mike soon established himself in the side and as skipper oversaw the club's rise from Division Three to Division One as well as picking up the League Cup along the way.

Following ex-manager Alec Stock to Luton in 1969, the cultured midfielder skippered the Hatters to Division Two and then saw his side narrowly fail to win back-to-back promotions.

After leaving the Town, Mike had a spell as player and manager at Watford before taking the hot seat at Northampton and Wycombe. Since leaving the game, Mike has run sports shops in Wycombe and Bicester.



William (Billy) KELLOCK

A Glaswegian midfielder who failed to make the grade at Aston Villa, Billy moved to Cardiff in 1972 and made his League debut for the Bluebirds as an 18-year-old. Short stays at Norwich and Millwall followed before he dropped out of the League to join Kettering.

At Kettering Billy fulfilled his potential as an aggressive goalscoring midfielder and he continued to shine at Peterborough, where he banged in 43 goals in 134 starts.

Luton manager David Pleat paid £30,000 for the talented Billy just as the Hatters were about to enter the top flight in 1982 but his stay was short, presumably because Pleat did not think he could cut it in Division One.

Transfers to Wolves, who he helped to promotion, Southend, Port Vale and Halifax followed before he finished back at Kettering where he managed a Country Club.

Terence (Terry) William John KELLY

Local boy Terry signed on for his home town side Luton in 1950 after starring for Vauxhall Motors, but he then he had to spend two years in the RAF on National Service before he could begin a career at Kenilworth Road.

A tall, commanding centre-half, Terry had a problem displacing skipper Syd Owen from that position so he made his debut at centre forward at Bristol Rovers in 1954 and scored. Terry had to wait until Syd retired before claiming a regular spot in the Luton side but by the time he left the club to join Cambridge City in 1963 he had racked up 136 League appearances for the Hatters.

After a spell at Dunstable, Terry worked at Vauxhall until retirement and was still living in Luton at the time of his sad, recent death.

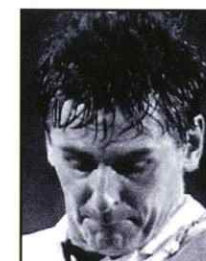


Michael (Mick) Francis Martin KENNEDY

A true football journeyman, Mick played more than 500 League games for ten clubs who paid more than £1 million for his services. And he earned a reputation as a midfield enforcer and self-styled hard man in a long career.

Starting off at Halifax, Mick rarely stayed longer than two years at a club apart from Portsmouth, who he helped to the top flight in 1987. The Hatters were one of the sides where he stayed only 12 months but the 1989-90 season was not without incident as Mick worked under three managers, was sent off twice and made sure that Derby did not score by fair means or foul after coming on as substitute in the final day 3-2 win at the Baseball Ground which saved the Hatters from relegation.

Eire international Mick now runs a Soccer School in Lahinch, Co Clare.



Spencer Charles KETTLEY

Welshman Spencer was stationed at Bletchley and was turning out for Newbury Town as the war drew to a close when he was picked up by Luton in August 1944 as the Club attempted to rebuild.

Despite being regarded as a wing-half, it was at inside-forward that Spencer made his only League appearance for the Hatters in a 1-2 home defeat against Leicester in October 1946.

Spencer filled a variety of positions for the Reserve side over that 1946-47 campaign but it was said at the time that "he did not seem to have recovered completely from (war) service in the tropics." Spencer proved everyone wrong though by continuing to play football at non-League and parks level until he was 54.

After a career in the shoe trade, Spencer lives in retirement in Desborough.

Derek Tennyson KEVAN

Derek was nearing the end of an illustrious career by the time he signed for Luton Town in December 1966 but his transfer was seen as a major coup for a side that was struggling at the wrong end of Division Four.

Born in Ripon, Derek had started out at Bradford PA but it was while at West Brom that he earned 14 caps for England and rattled in 157 goals in 262 League appearances. He continued to score for Chelsea, Manchester City, Crystal Palace and Peterborough before becoming one of Luton manager Allan Brown's first signings.

Although playing only 11 League games for the Hatters before moving to Stockport in exchange for Keith Allen, Derek certainly re-awakened enthusiasm at Kenilworth Road.

Derek now lives in retirement in Spain.

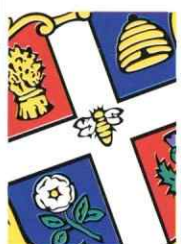

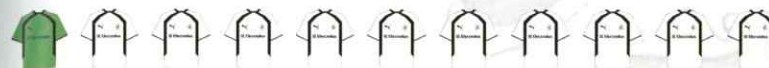

Luton Town v **SUNDERLAND**

WHEN Luton and Sunderland shook hands at the end of last season, it seemed that they would not be playing each other for a while. The Black Cats under their inspirational new boss Roy Keane were off to the Premiership as champions. Luton's rebuilding under a new board and new manager would be starting in League One.

But football is nothing if not surprising and now the Black Cats are back at Kenilworth Road on Tuesday night with the Hatters having a chance to claim a major scalp in the Second Round of the Carling Cup.

The statistics do not make happy reading. The teams have met four times in the League Cup, with Sunderland winning every time. But stats are there to be re-written.

Last season's League match at The Stadium of Light started well when Dean Morgan put the Hatters ahead on five minutes. But Sunderland equalised within four minutes and clinched the points with a second. The rematch at Kenilworth Road came when an injury-hit Luton had already been relegated and Sunderland were rampant.

But the two sides who meet on Tuesday will look very little like the teams that turned out last time.

Luton under Kevin Blackwell have nine new faces in the squad and Keane has so far bought in £27 million worth of players, with chairman Niall Quinn saying he still has more to spend. The latest signing is Craig Gordon. The Scottish goalkeeper made the move to the North East from Hearts for a cool £9 million this month, making him Britain's most expensive keeper. Other additions include Manchester United's Kieran Richardson (£5.5m) and Michael Chopra from Cardiff (£5m).

Sunderland have had a mixed start to the season with two late goals in two matches bringing them four points before the wheels came off last Saturday and the Black Cats crashed 3-0 at Wigan, leading by all accounts to Keane doing a passable impression of his former boss Sir Alex Ferguson's famous hairdryer act.

It had started so well. At White Hart Lane on the opening day, with almost the last kick of the game, new signing Michael Chopra opened his account and left Spurs feeling sick. Then when Birmingham looked on course to take the points, another late strike, this time from Stern John, saved a point.

You have to look back to the 1994-95 season for Luton's last victory over Sunderland with a 3-0 win thanks to two goals from Scott Oakes and one from John Hartson. Kevin Blackwell would settle for a scruffy 1-0 with a deflection off someone's knee and a lucrative tie in the next round. Even if it means redecorating the visitors' dressing room to put some paint back on the walls.
