



Welcome back to the Galpharm Stadium for today's match against Luton Town...

I'd like to extend a special welcome to Andy Hobson and his guests from today's Match Sponsor Fantastic Media, as well as to everyone who is here to support Huddersfield Town and finally to Kevin Blackwell and his team from Luton.

Our last game here at the Galpharm Stadium was disappointing, as poor defending on our behalf for all of Cheltenham's three goals resulted in a defeat. I don't want to focus on the refereeing in that game, but we know that the big decisions didn't go for us on that day and we feel that we should have ended up with a draw at least. I felt that the ref got the major points wrong in the game and I have made that clear in my report; hopefully that report will make the referee evaluate upon those decision and will make him better.

However, there's no getting away from our poor defending. We've not had a settled back four at all since the start of the season and we've had to bring in Richard Keogh on loan. It is never easy for a new lad to settle straight into a team, especially when his fellow defenders are different week on week, but he has done ok for us. We're working hard on the defensive side of things in training and we have to start defending better as a team.

We know we're not playing to our strengths at the moment, but we're getting several of the players back from injury at the moment and hopefully that will allow us to change things around a bit and make ourselves more of a threat. I didn't think that taking chances would be a problem for us coming into the season, but at the moment we are failing to do so. Taking the game at Crewe as an example, I don't think any other team will get as many opportunities against them as we did and not take them; we did it again against Cheltenham and we have to start putting things away.

We didn't cause Northampton any major problems last weekend, despite what was a bright start by us. Five of our players were sick at half-time and we had a sickness bug going through the squad and it probably contributed, as we didn't get anywhere near close enough to them in the second-half. We came in to train on Monday and another five players were missing with the same illness; professional footballers are very fit and any kind of illness is immediately noticeable during a game. However, we're very hopeful that it will be out of the system before today.

We defended everything Northampton chucked at us in the first-half until the one that matters - the goal right before half-time. It was incredibly frustrating, as we all spoke about the threat that Poul

Hubertz would pose to us - measuring in at 6' 5" - and for some unknown reason we didn't get somebody in front of him at the corner. We don't have somebody of that height who will be able to compete with him in the air all of the time, but we had done certain things in the game that had negated him - up until the last corner of the half.

Our discipline went towards the end of the game, which was disappointing as we have kept our shape in most of the games this season. You have to stay in your positions and not go wandering, but one or two people did. Communication between the players is still an issue - one which we are working on all the time - and the return of Frank Sinclair from injury will help with the organisation in defence. However, all of the players in general need to start talking more on the pitch in order to help each other out.

The lads were disappointed in the aftermath of that defeat, but we have to bounce back. We can't dwell on it forever and it's up to us as the coaching staff to get that balance right - we have to point out where we went wrong at Northampton, but then move on from it and get the mood right going into today's game.

Danny Cadamarteri is now getting back to full fitness and hopefully that will help us convert more chances and

having a settled side will really help us out. He looked very lively when he came off the bench at Sixfields and his ability to open up defences with his pace and power is a big plus for us.

Throughout the season, I've said that my preferred pairing up front would be Danny and A N Other as that pairing would give us the best of both worlds. We don't have an abundance of pace up front if Danny doesn't play; I've asked Malvin to play up there once or twice, but I'm not convinced that is his best role, but we need to have that option of going over the top.

I think that today's opponents, Luton, will be real contenders for promotion this season and today's game promises to be one of the toughest of the season. They have a lot of good players, buying well over the summer, and they will be strong and aggressive as well as play some good football. We have to regroup and focus on not conceding, as that will help us get as many points as we can from the match.

• We are hoping to get back to winning ways on home soil during this afternoon's tough clash with Luton; a team which was in the Championship last season. Today's kick off time has had to be moved forward to midday in anticipation of what we hoped would be an historic double header for the stadium with a possible Play-Off fixture for the Giants against Wigan kicking off at 7pm.

I would like to thank the vast majority of Town fans for their understanding of the changed kick-off. Any fixture change is not ideal but, under the rules of the Football League, the fixture has to be played over this weekend Friday through to Monday. Whilst I was not involved in the decision, I recognise that you, our supporters, as well as Luton, the Police, medical team and other services on which the Club relies generally need more than five day's notice and after lengthy discussions at the bi-weekly Stadium Events Panel Meeting, where pitch usage is discussed, I understand the consensus of opinion was that the time of kick off be changed to 12 noon.

I can assure you again that the decision to change the kick off time was not taken lightly and we sympathise greatly with those supporters who could not make the game.

Off the field, we have a clear aim this season and that is to be the Family Club of the Year for League One; a new divisional category added to the Football League Awards. The stipulation for being considered for this award is to first achieve the Family Club Charter mark, which rewards clubs that are delivering excellent customer service and is aimed at raising the bar for all clubs in customer service. Between now and the end of season we will be measured by a Mystery Family Group who will record their specific experiences. This will include their perceptions of each customer area, as well as overall perceptions, their readiness to return and whether they would recommend the Club to other families based on these experiences.

Whilst we know we can never please everybody all the time or cater fully for every need, we do constantly try to improve our customer services and we would be grateful for your feedback on anything you think we can improve.

This leads onto a number of exciting initiatives coming soon to Huddersfield Town and the stadium as a whole which will help us improve our service to you. The first of these is a comprehensive Customer Relationship Management system which will be dovetailed with two of our most groundbreaking projects, our Fans of the Future scheme and The Zone. See the press in the coming weeks for more information.

None of this off-field progress is distracting us from the critically important task of improving our performances on the pitch. The results to date are clearly unsatisfactory however, Andy Ritchie and the squad have been plagued by injuries and illness which hopefully we can soon put behind us and start delivering the wins we all want to see. Finally, I would like to welcome everyone from Luton Town to the Galpharm Stadium, particularly the directors, manager and the team and of course, I would like to welcome everyone who is here supporting Huddersfield Town.

Given that you're injured, how much of an active part do you play in the changing room on a match day?

- All the players play an active part in the changing room on a match day, whether they are injured or not. All the players gather in the changing room before the game and those who aren't playing wish those that are all the best. It's a nonsense that we do not get involved; we give the lads who are playing as much encouragement as possible and from then on it's up to the individual player and the coaching staff to get it right on the field because we cannot influence it anymore.
It can be very frustrating leaving the dressing room before a game knowing you are not going to be involved.

Was the defeat to Cheltenham one of the most frustrating in your time at Town?

- It was a disappointing game, but it was certainly not one of the most frustrating in my time here. Every game you lose at home is very frustrating and I agree that the result was made worse by the referee not allowing Luke Beckett's goal in the last minute when it seemed perfectly legitimate to me, but that's football sometimes.

Given that we've had three consecutive defeats, what's the mood in the camp like at the moment?

- The mood in the camp is very good. The lads here are a great bunch and quite close knit. We are still in a good position in the League and everyone is up beat. It's obviously a big blow for everyone on a Monday coming in to training after a defeat but everyone works hard to lift everyone else and stay positive. Once the defeat has gone, it's gone and we have to focus on getting better. Confidence is high at the moment and we have had a few players coming back recently - a few played in the reserves with me - which is great news because it helps to keep the squad fresh.

If you left Town for whatever reason and you only got offered deals at Bradford and Leeds, which would you choose and why?

- That's tough one. They're too close to call!





2 minutes: Andy Booth forced an early corner for the Terriers, from which Joe Skarz produced a brilliant far-post delivery. Meeting the ball at the far post was Nathan Clarke, but he placed his header inches wide of Mark Bunn's right-hand post.

28 minutes: Bradley Johnson should have opened the scoring for the home side just before the half-time when he got on the end of a Poul Hubertz flick-on from an Andy Holt long throw. He connected with a volley when stood near the Town penalty spot, but his shot went wide with the goal at his mercy.

43 minutes: Northampton took the lead just before half-time through giant Danish striker Poul Hubertz. A left-sided, in-swinging corner from midfielder Johnson dropped at the near post where the 6 foot 5 frontman rose above the Town defence to nod the ball past a helpless Matt Glennon.

54 minutes: Arguably the biggest positive of the game for Town came when Danny Cadamarteri was handed his Huddersfield debut from the bench, replacing the unwell Malvin Kamara. The former Everton striker looked lively after his introduction.

57 minutes: Andy Booth spurned what was the best chance of the game for Andy Ritchie's side when he sliced his left-foot shot over the bar from Aaron Hardy's intelligent pull-back from the by-line, roughly 12 yards out.

62 minutes: The Cobblers doubled their advantage shortly after the hour mark through an impressive Andy Holt header. The tall left-winger had been a danger in the air all afternoon and he climbed above full-back Hardy to powerfully head the ball past Glennon's left side from a looping Hubertz cross.

The sight of talented young Academy graduates plying their trade in the first team has been a regular one for a few seasons now. Right back **Aaron Hardy** is one of the latest to make an impact on the first team, but the run he is currently enjoying in Andy Ritchie's side almost did not happen at all.

After captaining the reserves for much of the early part of last season 'Azzer' was struck down with an ankle injury which sidelined for much of the latter part of the campaign and he was unable to play for his contract renewal. Not only that, but new boss Andy Ritchie had never seen him play and had to rely on advice from Gerry Murphy and John Dungworth about Hardy's potential and ability.

He was handed a six month contract which, thanks to his performances in defence this season, has been extended to the end of the season, which naturally, Azzer is delighted about:

"I am very pleased because it is something that I wanted to get sorted quite quickly and



that's happened. The Gaffer has given me another six months, well, until the end of the season and it's up to me to prove I'm worth it now. "Obviously I was injured when the new Gaffer came in and he hadn't seen me play but I knew that Gerry (Murphy) and John (Dungworth) had had a few words with him. He was very good with me and couldn't have done anymore to be honest. He said to me that he'd not seen me play but he was happy to take the coaches' advice and he decided to give me six months which I was delighted with. I am very grateful to Gerry and John too for having faith in me.

Whilst injury kept Azzer out of the side last term, injuries to key players this season have opened a window for the 21-year-old. "I didn't know if I would be in the team as much as I have been over the early part of the season – I didn't know what to expect to be honest. I had a pretty good pre-season and I got on the bench for the first game against Yeovil and that was my main aim.

"Unfortunately for Frank (Sinclair), he picked up a bad hamstring injury which gave me my chance to be picked in the starting line-up and hopefully I've been doing enough to keep my place. Frank is a good player and valuable for the team because of his experience, but it happens in football and it has opened the door for me." Like many of Town's players, Hardy can play various positions including centre-back and central midfield, but prefers his right-back berth. With Andy Holdsworth's recent switch from right-back to midfield, Azzer sees it as another opportunity for him to make the full-back spot his own.

"Andy has moved into midfield so there is less competition at right back than there was. It's funny because earlier this season I actually came into the team at centre-back down at Bournemouth because of (David) Mirfin's injury and then I got moved to right-back. I played well there and hopefully I can keep playing well. Obviously Frank is going to come back and he's a quality player, but that's just healthy competition for the team.

"It's a bit surreal challenging for a position with Frank Sinclair; I never thought I'd be doing that when I was

growing up! He came to the Club in the middle of last season and it's not something you expect. I get on with him quite well and he's a great lad to have about.

"You just have to learn from people like Frank. When he's playing and I'm not, I'll keep an eye on what he does because he's been doing it longer and at a higher level. "This is my third year as a professional now and I've been in and out of the team. It's a big year for me now with me signing my extension and I've got a bit of breathing space, if you can call it that. There is not as much pressure on my shoulders and my aim is to make that right-back position my own. It will be tough, but hopefully I can keep playing well and doing what the Gaffer tells me." Which is?


"Get forward and put balls into the box for the runners in the hope of creating chances. It's not just about getting crosses into the box though, we want to get in positions where we can put quality balls in for Boothby, Luke (Beckett) or Cads (Danny Cadamarteri) when he's fit. We all want to play attacking football, both at home and away."



Town are determined to win today and right the wrongs of Cheltenham Town last time at the Galpharm. Ask any player and they will give you the same response as Azzer that, “spirit in the camp is high.”

“It always is,” he assures.

“The defeats against Crewe and Cheltenham were disappointing because we felt that we should have had something from the game. At Crewe we got beat 2-0 but dominated the game and had loads of possession, but we just didn't have that edge in front of goal. Against Cheltenham you would have expected us to win the game having taken the lead, particularly with the chances we created. Everyone feels we should have got at least 4 points from the six. We took none and we know

it's a big game against Luton on home soil. We need to get the fans on our side and take a bit of pressure off ourselves.” Luton manager Kevin Blackwell has packed his

side with experienced players, but although Town's side may be younger, Hardy believes it has some valuable experience of its own.

“Luton haven't started too well so it will be interesting to see if they come for all three points or just a draw. They have brought in a few players who have been around the top two divisions and it's true that we have a young squad, but a lot of our players have played a lot of games in this League and they're still only young so they have the right kind of experience. It will be tough because they were in the Championship last season, but we feel we can give anyone a game on our day so we won't be worried about that.”



● A born and bred Lutonian, Kevin Blackwell was appointed as the Luton Town manager on March 27th 2007 following the sacking of Mike Newell. It fulfilled a lifetime ambition of Kevin's to manage the Hatters, the team he had supported as a child.

Living very close to the Kenilworth Road ground as a youngster, he would be able to hear from his bedroom the cheers from the ground when Luton scored! Kevin has many connections throughout the football world, especially at Sheffield United, managed by Neil Warnock, a man that Blackwell has spent many years working alongside at Scarborough, Notts County, Huddersfield Town, Bury and Plymouth Argyle. He took over at Kenilworth Road with the Hatters placed 2nd from bottom of the Championship table and after six successive defeats, replacing the sacked Mike Newell, some six months after being dismissed as Leeds United boss. Speaking on his appointment at Kenilworth Road, Kevin said, "I'm not daunted by the size of the challenge. I can only do my best and give it a go. "I used to stand on the Oak Road and cheer on the



likes of Jimmy Ryan. I remember the first game I came to was against Halifax and my Dad brought me into the Bobbers Stand. "Even before that when we were too young to come to the games, our house was near enough to hear the cheers every time a goal went in. We've still got a house in Luton and my Dad still lives here, so it's a bit like coming home. "I've come here for the long term. There's a vision at this football club that excites me and it's something I'm looking forward to. There are things happening at Luton that could turn the club into a major player again and I want to be a part of that."

DAVID BELL

Talented young midfielder David Bell signed a three and a half year contract with the Hatters in mid-January 2006. Bell, who has been capped by Republic of Ireland at U19 and U21 level. After missing the start of the 2006/07 season through injury, Bell went on to enjoy a successful season and picked up two awards at the end of season's presentations.

DEAN BRILL

Luton-born goalkeeper Dean Brill is another young player of whom big things are expected. CHRIS COYNE



DARREN CURRIE

Darren Currie became Kevin Blackwell's third signing of the summer when he signed a two-year deal at Kenilworth Road in July 2007. The experienced midfielder started his career at West Ham United. His impressive form alerted the attentions of Ipswich boss Joe Royle, who signed the midfielder in a £250,000 deal. He was released by Ipswich prior to the end of the season.

DAVE EDWARDS

Dave Edwards became Kevin Blackwell's first ever signing at Luton Town joining in July 2007 from Shrewsbury Town. The

Republic of Ireland and San Marino in Euro 2008. During the 2006/07 season, Edwards played a pivotal role in helping Shrewsbury reach the League Two play-offs, scoring six goals in mammoth 51 competitive games.

ALAN GOODALL

Alan signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road, started his career at Welsh club Bangor City. Goodall has also tasted European football as he was part of the Bangor side that lost to Serbia side FK Smederevo in their 2002-03 UEFA Cup campaign. The

defender moved to Rochdale in 2004 and went on to become a fans favourite at Spotland.

RICHARD JACKSON

Richard Jackson, one of nine summer signings made by Kevin Blackwell prior to the start of the season, had a distinguished career at Derby County. The full-back was the longest serving player at Pride Park prior to completing a signing a two year deal at Kenilworth Road.

CHRIS PERRY

Chris Perry brought plenty of experience with him when he signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road. In 1991 Perry started his career at Wimbledon and went on to make more than 200 appearances for the club before moving to Tottenham Hotspur in 1999. He played in the Albion side which lost the 2007 Championship Play-Off final to Derby County.

PAUL PESCHISOLIDO

Experienced striker Paul Peschisolido joined Luton on a one-year deal in July 2007. The Canadian-born striker joined from Derby, where he played a big part in lifting the Rams into the Premiership. Peschisolido is vastly experienced in a career spanning almost 15 years. A flamboyant character, Paul is married to the glamorous Karren Brady, Managing Director at Birmingham City, where he made his debut in English football in 1992.

MATTHEW SPRING

Matthew Spring returned to Kenilworth Road in January 2007 after leaving the club in 2004 to join Leeds United. He was a driving force in the side which reached the FA Youth Cup semi-final in 1997. He soon became a regular in Luton's Second Division team, and his first 100 appearances were clocked up while he was only twenty. Matthew joined Luton on a two-and-a-half year contract in deal worth £200,000.



Town fanatic Dom Howson takes a light hearted look at the game and its personalities...

They say home is where the heart is - if only that was the case for Town...

- Legend has it that it is traditional for any host to provide a hospitable service to its guests.

Unfortunately for Andy Ritchie, his side's generosity at the Galpharm this season far outweighs the usual pleasantries associated with League One football.

When Ritchie's charges surrendered their goal advantage a fortnight ago against Cheltenham, the 'boo boys' wasted no time in voicing their displeasure at the team and the management. But what good will come of vehemently barracking and polarising Town's youthful squad?

Under-pressure Sheffield Wednesday boss Brian Laws hit the nail on the head prior to his team's engagement with Hull when he said: "The last thing the players want is to

go into a cauldron of negativity." Every club goes through peaks and troughs, but it's imperative everyone sticks together. Die-hard Huddersfield followers should not forget the club nearly went out of business four years ago - we should be grateful to still be alive and kicking.

A restless crowd baying for their own players' blood is not going to help matters on the pitch. But Andy Ritchie respects the rights of the consumer. He is, after all, in the entertainment business. He recently said: "They pay their money and have every right to voice their opinions. They are at liberty to do that." What he would really like, I am sure, is to have a crowd who lifted the team in difficult times.

But declining attendances on home soil is a real cause for concern for Town. In 2005-06 our average home gate was 13,058 but last year it fell to 10,573; a drop of 19%. Where are the Town fans? Still on holiday? Or waiting to see how this manager and team shape up before committing themselves?

CONNECTED

- Kevin Blackwell has been Luton manager since March 2007. His connection with Town dates back to the Neil Warnock era at the Galpharm - he was signed as a keeper, stayed as a coach and then followed Warnock on his travels to Plymouth, Oldham, Bury and Sheffield United.



Their sixteen years together ended when Blackwell endured a brief sojourn as manager at Leeds before his appointment by Luton. He could not save them from relegation even though they were fifth in the table in October after beating Leeds 5-1.

Fans of Warnock should read his autobiography, "Made in Sheffield". It covers his years at Town and contains humorous anecdotes on the Autoglass Trophy campaign, Booty, who he says was "probably the best header of the ball that has ever played for me" and that "likeable rogue" Darren Bullock. People may be surprised to learn that Warnock is a trained Class Two referee!



MAD HATTERS FACTS

- In January 1961 Manchester City led Luton 6-2 in an FA Cup tie when the game was abandoned. Luton won the re-match 3-1. Why are we interested? Because a certain Denis Law scored all seven City goals and he was still on the losing side!
- Luton were relegated from the old First Division in 1991-92 - the next year it became the gravy train which is the Premiership we now know and love. Talk about just missing the boat!
- Are all football club directors jokers? No, but comedian Eric Morecambe was both a fan and a director of the Hatters.
- With England's away game against Russia likely to be played on an artificial surface it is worth recalling that Luton Town enjoyed their most successful spell playing on plastic from 1985 until 1991. Oldham and Preston were amongst the handful of other clubs who provoked controversy at the time.

The moment that **Shane Killock** has been working towards finally came at Gresty Road on 8th September...

Town boss Andy Ritchie handed the second year Academy scholar his first-team début, starting him alongside David Mirfin at centre-back in the League One encounter with Crewe Alexandra.

“I didn’t find out I would be playing until we got to the Ground, so it was about 1.30pm”, Shane explained. “We went out onto the pitch to have a look around and the Gaffer came up to me and said ‘You’re starting’!

“It was a little disappointing not to be involved at Grimsby (Killock was added to the squad ahead of the game), especially after I had been added to the squad to travel, but I wasn’t shocked - the Gaffer had said on numerous occasions that he wanted to start with as strong a team as possible.

“At Crewe it was different; I didn’t expect to be involved at all, but I really enjoyed it. I was happy with how I played, but obviously I want to keep improving and become more consistent. It was a tough test, having to mark a Premiership striker in Lee Barnard - he’s a very good player - but games that like will help me to improve.”

The travelling faithful were more than impressed with the debut performance from the big centre-half, as was manager Ritchie - something Shane was very pleased about.

“It’s exactly what you want - I’m glad he thought I played well and I can continue to impress him if and when I play again.”

A large majority of the Academy scholars joined Town at a young age, but Shane’s journey to the Town first eleven was a little different.

“I played for Hepworth United from under-9s to under-16s, but then a few of our players left and with us having a small squad to begin with, we had to fold. I then came to the Academy for a trial at the end of the under-16 season, but it didn’t go anywhere and so I went to Ossett Albion for a couple of months at the end of 2005. I also joined

Greenhead College for a year, but after I had started I was approached again by Town and I started training with the Academy on a part-time basis; three times a week and whenever I could get down.

“It was Ash Berry who started the ball moving again, as he was involved at Ossett and is a coach at the Academy. I eventually signed on at the start of last year, which makes me as old as the first-year professionals now.

“I’m really enjoying my football at the moment. I was born in Huddersfield and I was a season ticket holder a couple of years ago, so it’s still a bit strange to be playing alongside some of the guys I used to watch from the stands!”

It was clear that Shane realises he still has a long way to go to be the finished article, but his passion and work ethic will stand him in good stead.

● Two clinical finishes from Wolves' Hungarian striker Denes Rosa proved to be the difference between the two sides in the Pontin's League match between Huddersfield and Wolves at the Galpharm Stadium, but the main focus for Town was the minutes on the pitch gained by returning injury victims Danny Cadamarteri, Frank Sinclair, Jon Worthington and Nathan Clarke.

Striker Cadamarteri looked particularly lively and worked well in tandem with strike partner Lucas Akins; in truth, Town were unlucky not to score in what was a very decent performance throughout. The strike partnership combined well as early as the second minute; a long Simon Eastwood kick being flicked on expertly by Akins into the path of Cadamarteri, who got between the two Wolves centre-backs before drilling a shot straight at the feet of visiting 'keeper Graham Stack. However, it was Wolves who took the lead in the sixth minute. A near-post ball from Elliott Bennett was flicked on by striker Liam Hughes for Wolves number 10 Denes Rosa to head the ball past a helpless Simon Eastwood and put Wanderers ahead.

The returning Cadamarteri should have equalised the 15th minute, when Lucas Akins did well to block an attempted clearance on the edge of the box with the ball falling into the path of the ex-Everton striker, who tried to place the ball low to the left of 'keeper Stack only to see his shot saved well.

Wolves extended their lead after 25 minutes, with Denes Rosa scoring once more. Midfielder Mark Salmon beat Jon Worthington to the ball in the centre-circle before advancing and splitting the Town defence with a great slide-rule pass. Rosa then tried to lift the ball over the advancing Simon Eastwood and despite getting a strong left-hand to it, 'Easty' could not prevent the

The 'Forgotten Men'

Alan Hodgson takes a look at some of the lesser known players that have contributed to Town's history over the years...



Andy McCall Inside Forward

One of the many Scots to have played for Town, Andrew Johnstone McCall was born in Cumnock in 1911. After playing

Mike Carmody Left Back

Born Michael Joseph Carmody in Huddersfield in February 1966, he joined Mick Buxton's Second Division side in December 1984 as a non-contract player from local non-Leaguers Emley, and was drafted into the Town team after regular left back David Burke broke his leg in a match against Fulham on 23rd March 1985. A week later Carmody made his debut in a 2-1 home win over Charlton Athletic and was to play in eight first team games before the season ended. His last appearance came on 11th May in a 0-2 home defeat by Portsmouth and he returned to Emley that summer. He was to make a brief return to League football in 1986/87 when he played twice for Tranmere Rovers before again returning to Emley. Back in the non-League scene Mike later played for both Ashton United and Altrincham.

Ken Turner Full Back

Born in Great Houghton in April 1941, Kenneth Turner first joined Town as an amateur in October 1957, turning professional a year later. Boss Eddie Boot gave him his chance on 2nd April 1962 in a 2-2 home draw with Preston North End in the old Second Division, but with England international Ray Wilson normally partnering the

for Ayr United and St Johnstone he signed for Clem Stephenson's First Division outfit in January 1959 and made his debut on the 29th of the month in a 2-3 defeat at Everton. What was to be the last of his five first team outings came on 29th April, the final day of the season, in a 0-0 draw at Sunderland. In July that year he was transferred to Nottingham Forest but played just three games for them in the abandoned 1959/60 League season, scoring once, before World War Two put paid to normal football for the duration. He also turned out a further seven times for Forest in wartime competitions.

Willie Campbell Half Back

redoubtable Denis Atkins in the full back berths, Ken's opportunities were somewhat limited. He played in four more fixtures that season culminating in a 0-3 home defeat by Rotherham United on 28th April, and was to finally leave Leeds Road in July 1963 for Shrewsbury Town. Having made 64 appearances for the Shrews he then joined York City in June 1966 and was to play 88 League matches for the Minstermen up to the 1967/68 campaign. Ken ended his career in the Irish Republic with Sligo Rovers.

appearance on 27th October in a 1-2 defeat at Manchester United. In March 1929 he moved to Manchester City where he ended his career.

Tommy Smith Centre Forward

Not to be confused with the legendary Liverpool hard man, Thomas Edgar Smith was born in Wolverhampton in July 1959 and started out in football with Bromsgrove Rovers. In April 1978 he signed for Sheffield United from where Town boss Mick Buxton

recruited him in March 1979. On the 31st of the month he made his debut as a substitute, coming on for Paul Bielby, in a 2-0 home win over Hartlepool United. The following season Tommy watched from the sidelines as Huddersfield took the Fourth Division by storm, his only other appearance for the Club coming in a 1-4 home defeat by Grimsby Town in the FL Cup 4th round on 4th September. He was to spend a further season in the Terriers' reserves before finally leaving to join Emley in July 1981.



in the trenches in Northern France and Belgium. I also found the sheer magnitude of the 2002 World Cup really interesting. It was watched by almost 29 million people in 213 countries and no doubt that number went up even more in 2006. I looked into what might have led to the increased interest in football overseas, particularly in countries that hadn't previously embraced it like China. Firstly, the number of foreign players playing in English clubs had increased immensely. In the 1998-1999 season for example, there were over 500 overseas players in the Premiership and football leagues. Then of course, the Champions League started to raise awareness about various clubs on the continent and there's no denying that Manchester United's mass marketing abroad (particularly in Asia) played a part. Then there's developments in technology like satellite TV and the fact that coverage of games and club news can be accessed online from anywhere in the world. I thought it was quite funny that during the 2002 World Cup the Japanese and Korean fans supported England, especially when their teams had been knocked out. No doubt, their obsession with David Beckham played a part, in which case LA Galaxy could soon find itself with an Asian contingent.

I'm Helen, I'm a Journalist and News Reader at Home FM but I also co-ordinate all the station's sports coverage and present Huddersfield Town Live on a Saturday afternoon.

● I've always been interested in sport and football in particular, so doing my dissertation at University on a football related topic seemed like a good idea. I looked at how national identity is encouraged through sport. And because it was the 2002 World Cup at the time, I had a perfect excuse to watch the football in the pub (purely for research purposes, of course).

But, that aside it was really interesting to look into the history of football. For example, did you know that the first recorded game of football took place in the 18th century with a pig's head instead of a ball?

Although, it wasn't until the 19th century that the game became regulated and rules were introduced. Have you ever wondered why we place so much emphasis on England's matches with Argentina and Germany? Obviously, the wars played a part, as did our World Cup defeat over Germany in 1966 and Maradona's 'Hand of God' in the 1986 World Cup Quarter-final; but there's a lot more to it. In 1938 for example, England played Germany in a friendly at the Olympic Stadium in Berlin and they were asked to give a Nazi salute, during the National Anthem. Ex-England player Stanley Mathews referred to it as "the Shameful Salute".

Apparently, the first game between the two sides (although not an official match) was in 1899 and during the famous Christmas Truce in 1914, it's reported that not only did both British and German troops down their weapons and walk out into 'no man's land' where they shared jokes and cigarettes, but they also played games of football. Apparently, several games took place simultaneously






Junior Foundation Tie Ups



It's a bit unusual for a player to be playing for England before he has played for his Club, but that's the case for Town's young 'keeper **Simon Eastwood** at the moment.

The 18-year old made his England under-19 debut during the 4-0 win over Belarus at the end of August, adding to his solitary under-18 cap obtained against the Netherlands in March of this year.

"Obviously, playing for England at any level is a great achievement and I'm delighted from a personal point of view", Simon admitted. "When I got the call-up the first time, it was really special to me and to play Holland in my first England game was huge.

"I went down to Yeovil not expecting to play - I was second choice initially, but I performed well in training and ended up playing the whole 90 minutes. It happened again at Notts County for the under-19s - I was initially told that I would be playing half and that the other 'keeper, Preston Edwards (of Millwall), would be playing the second 45. I was really pleased to be playing the first-half as it meant I would be wearing the number 1 shirt, but I ended up playing the whole game once again and I kept a clean sheet!"

"To be honest, I didn't have that much to do in the Belarus game. I did make one good save though, which was nice as it was the only time I was really called upon. Holland were a

much better team and we were 3-0 up against Belarus within twenty minutes; it only became more even after one of our midfielders was sent-off on the hour and we had to play with ten men. After that, Belarus started to come at us and I had a little bit more to do, which

was actually good from my perspective!

"The setup when you're in the England squad is fantastic. The goalkeeping coach is a guy called Simon Smith and he's good to work with, but it's like a different world to me as a lot of my team-mates are from the big Clubs like Chelsea, Manchester United and Arsenal. A few of them are a little 'big-time' but the odd couple of lads are down to earth!"

Town can currently boast having the England under-19 and under-17 goalkeepers on their books, with Academy scholar Alex Smithies recently returning from the under-17 World Cup in Korea.

"I know Alex (Smithies) quite well too, but it's always a little bit awkward as we are both goalkeepers and we were kind of competing with each other at

times in the Academy teams! To be fair though, we're pretty good mates and we're both really pleased to be playing for England in our respective age-groups. He did really well in the under-17 World Cup with England and I was happy for him."

Playing for England at any level comes with a certain level of pressure, but pressure is something that doesn't seem to bother 'Easty'. He's still awaiting his Town debut, but he was in line to make his own little piece of Town history two years ago.

"It was in the first year of my scholarship that I was on the bench three times for the first-team under Peter Jackson. I was only 16 at the time and I think that I would have been the youngest ever player if I'd come on. The call-up came as a complete shock to me and I was really nervous, but I would have loved to get on the pitch for ten minutes or

so. It was a good experience. "To be fair, I've been on the bench quite a lot now; at the back-end of last season and all of this campaign. I wouldn't say waiting for my debut is frustrating and it's always nice to be involved. Besides, I look at who's in front of me at the moment and although he's had a bit of criticism lately, I firmly believe that Matty (Glennon) is a top-class goalkeeper. I really can't praise him enough for how he is with me in training; if I do something wrong, he will point it out but at the same time we have a really good laugh.

Working with Matt and Vaughany (John Vaughan, Town's Goalkeeper Coach) makes training a really good place to be.

"It was a little bit frustrating when Rabs (Paul Rachubka) was here last season, as it stopped me from playing as much Reserve team football as I would like. I wanted him to leave as much as anybody, in

order to further my career. When he did go out on loan to Blackpool, it helped me a lot as I was suddenly on the bench and playing for the Reserves.

"It's quite a step-up from Academy football - it's a lot quicker and it's always good to be playing at proper grounds. It's also good to test yourself against some really high-quality forwards; last week, Wolves Reserves had a Hungarian international up front, for instance. Playing against such good players will only help me to improve.

"I feel like I'm ready for the first-team now, if I'm called upon. It is more than likely that Matty getting injured would present me with my chance and I think I would be more than ready."

Simon was quick to point out how easy it was to integrate into the first-team setup, having accepted his first professional deal in the summer.

"There are five or six of us (first-year professionals) and we're all quite close, having been in the same youth team for so long. I think that has helped us move into the first-team setup, as did seeing how well Joe (Skarz) adapted to life in the first-team at the back-end of last season. Boner (James Berrett) is also doing really well, having made his debut for both the first-team and Ireland under-19s.

"I think being involved at the end of last season really helped me to mix with the older professionals when I made the full step-up to the first-team this year. I've felt right at home."

Easty will feel even more at home today at the Galpharm Stadium as he has a special link with today's visitors.

"I was actually born in Luton and I lived down there for my first six or seven years. Part of my family was down there and some of them still are, so this game feels a little bit different to me. We played Luton in the FA Youth Cup at Kenilworth Road when I was still part of the youth team and that was a great experience for me given that my dad took me to a couple of games there when I was younger - even though I can't really remember them that well!"

Easty is at his most comfortable on the football field and is perhaps not as at home talking to the media - something he is well known for around the Club. A good example of this came during this season's player sponsorship evening, when he told Paul Clark that he felt Matt Glennon 'could go a long way in the game' - a comment usually attributed to players younger than the 28-year old custodian!

"Sometimes, questions get thrown at me and I just choke. They do try and prepare you for the media in the Academy and at College, but to be honest I'm not very good at it and sometimes I don't have a clue what to say. At the player sponsorship evening, I was honestly trying to complement Matt and I ended up sounding like I was trying to grill him!"







Andy Ritchie got his man in the form of Robbie Williams before the close of the transfer window, but the left-sided defender or midfielder is still awaiting his debut after suffering a shin fracture on his final day of training with the Tykes.

"When we saw him for his initial medical, we were surprised to see him come in on crutches and unable to carry any real weight on his left leg", first-team physio Lee Martin explained. "This obviously impaired the medical massively, as he couldn't even bend his leg. "The Barnsley medical staff took him to the hospital but the GP - in his wisdom - decided that it was fine, which amazes us all as the first thing we did was send him for an x-ray. That showed that he had an undisplaced fracture - meaning



that his shin bone had not moved out of place, but was cracked. This obviously meant that he had to be immobilised immediately, but at the time he was still a Barnsley player and so we sent him back as he had effectively failed the medical.

"When he came back to see us a month later, he had just gotten out of the immobilisation boot and we've looked after his rehabilitation since that point. In that month we had a good look at his medical history and it showed that this is basically the first major injury he has had, although he is only a young lad.

"It's difficult at the moment - we want to progress him, but we have to be cautious and we are led by the x-rays that are currently taking place every four weeks. The last one was carried out by our local orthopaedic surgeon two weeks ago."
